

TELLING RIDGELAND'S STORY

E.C. YELLOWLEY: RIDGELAND'S 'G-MAN'

Born in Madison County in 1873, Edward Clements Yellowley's grandfather was James Burroughs Yellowley (1797-1854), who moved to Mississippi from North Carolina and established roots in the area destined to become Ridgeland. Edward's father was James Brownlow Yellowlev (1848-1914), who was Ridgeland's first postmaster and the town's second mayor. In 1909, he became a U.S. Marshall in Jackson; six years later, his son joined him in law enforcement and received his training by working along the Mexican border to prevent the smuggling of narcotics into the United States.

In 1925, Edward C. Yellowley was promoted to oversee the Prohibition Office in Chicago. Prohibition began in 1920 after the passage of the Eighteenth Amendment, which prohibited the production, transportation, or sale of alcoholic beverages. With the advent of prohibition, of course, criminal elements sold beer and whiskey on the black market, and it was up to Federal agents like Yellowley to stop them. Upon his arrival, the soft-spoken Southerner promised to make a "Sahara" out of the

Windy City. Yellowley faced significant resistance from organized crime in Chicago, especially from Capone, who had infiltrated local law enforcement and had numerous public officials on his payroll. Yellowley realized that he needed help to combat the bootleggers and requested a squad of men unknown to the Chicago gangsters.

This special unit, led by twenty-six-year-old Eliot Ness, used unorthodox methods to break up the bootleggers' operation. Known as "The Untouchables," their success made them national heroes, so much so that cartoonist Chester Gould started a new



comic strip based on their crime-fighting abilities. In fact, his main character, Dick Tracy, was based on Eliot Ness, In the end, Al Capone was tried and sent to prison, though his conviction wasn't based on bootlegging per se. Instead, he was found guilty of tax evasion, and much of the information used by the Internal Revenue Service to convict Capone was supplied by none other than E.C. Yellowley. After prohibition ended in 1933 with the passage of the Twenty-First Amendment, Yellowley continued serving as a Federal agent in

Washington, New York, and other cities. By the time he retired in 1947, he had worked in more than forty states.

While his career as a crime fighter was a success, Yellowley's private life was somewhat tragic. His first wife, Mary Laura Helm, died in 1900 "despite skilled medical attention and the kind of solicitous care of family and friends." Her death came just one month after the couple lost their only child. Edward married again, this time to Callie Hays from New Orleans. On March 22, 1927, the second Mrs. Yellowley also died; two days later, her body arrived in Jackson by train from Chicago. Her funeral, held at St. Andrews Episcopal Church in Jackson, was attended by "a wide circle of friends" from Louisiana and Mississippi. After the death of his second wife, E.C. Yellowley did not remarry.

Following his retirement, Yellowley resided in Chicago's posh, lakeside Congress Hotel. Ironically, the grand hotel (which still exists) was frequented by none other than Al Capone during the height of his reign. Yellowley also returned often to Jackson, where he rented a room at the King Edward Hotel. Edward Clements Yellowley died in Chicago in 1962. He was 88 years old. His funeral service was held at the Wright & Ferguson Chapel in downtown Jackson, and he was buried in nearby Greenwood Cemetery alongside both his wives and his infant son.

During his forty-eight-year career in law enforcement, Yellowley never sought the limelight. As a result, he wasn't featured in the Hollywood version of "The Untouchables." However, E.C. Yellowley's story deserves to be remembered for his role in our nation's history and as another part of Ridgeland's colorful past.

In celebration of Ridgeland's anniversary year, the pecan tree was officially designated as the City's tree honoring the community's deep agricultural roots and long-standing connection to the natural landscape.

Following the designation, the pecan tree quickly became a source of inspiration. The Ridgeland History Trail team commemorated its agricultural significance with a new marker along the trail, while the City's anniversary planning committee incorporated it into milestone celebrations. Ridgeland's First Lady, Jane McGee, proposed a beautification project that brought the pecan tree to life across the cityscape-44 traffic signal boxes were transformed with custom artwork depicting the tree, created by Think Creative Intelligence. The signal boxes were wrapped in vibrant, pecan tree-themed artwork, adding color and character to street corners throughout the City.

The City of Ridgeland is proud to announce that it has received an Award of Merit from the Mississippi Historical Society for the Ridgeland History Trail. The award was presented on Friday, March 7, recognizing the trail's contribution to preserving and showcasing local history. The History Trail was officially unveiled on October 1, 2024, as part of Ridgeland's 125th anniversary celebration.

The Ridgeland History Trail features 22 interpretive wayside exhibits that highlight the area's rich past, from its early days to the thriving community it is today. Designed to blend history with the City's natural landscape, the trail provides an interactive and educational experience for visitors of all ages. It is located along Ridgeland's extensive multi-use trails, with additional sites off the main path.

Pat Truesdale, President of the Historical Society of Ridgeland, confirmed that the history trail was in the making for three years, and she was excited when Jim



Woodrick brought his concept to the group and helped to lead the effort. "Our history is about the first families who settled here and made a home for themselves; it's about those with the vision to establish schools and churches; and it's about folks who persevered through wars and economic downturns to create the prosperity we enjoy today," said Woodrick. 

RIDGELAND WILDELOWER FIELD AND ART PARK **UNVEILS NEW WILDFLOWER PAVILION**

This one-of-a-kind metalwork structure was designed with assistance from Copper Sculptures. Be sure to check out the back wall, which is an interactive photo spot. New benches offer a place to relax after walking the trails and view birds and pollinators in their natural habitat.

"The Ridgeland Wildflower Field and Art Park is a nature sanctuary for families and children who love walking out in the fresh air among unique art and beautiful wildflowers," said Chris Chapman, President/ CEO of Explore Ridgeland. "We saw the potential of this park as a place for visitors to enjoy, especially weary travelers looking to stretch their legs. The new Wildflower Pavilion is designed to be a cool respite out of the sun, with seating and wall art depicting the Ridgeland pecan tree, butterfly, firefly, and wildflowers perfectly arranged for selfie photos. Travelers can also use the QR codes in the shelter to download information on the Wildflower Field and the Explore Ridgeland Visitors Guide—with even more reasons to eat, stay, and play."

Keep Ridgeland Beautiful recently added two interactive butterfly wing photo stops to the park. Take a photo with the Monarch and the Red Spotted Purple Butterfly, both native to our area! And don't forget about our Letterbox (letterboxing.org) located here, which combines elements of orienteering and clues to find the hidden box. Most Tuesday mornings, our team is out caring for the Wildflower Field. We welcome volunteers to join us.






CITY OF RIDGELAND CODE ENFORCEMENT

The City of Ridgeland's Code Enforcement Program provides the requirements to ensure public health, safety, and welfare of its residents. The program is designed to help residents identify and correct violations which detract from the appearance of their home, neighborhood, and community. A clean, well-kept City increases property values and enhances community pride.

WHEN REPORTING A VIOLATION:

Please provide the exact location of the property in violation. Reporting the exact location of the property is very important. If the property is vacant or you're not sure of the address, please provide the block number or the direction from a known address. Please provide an exact description of the violation: For example, "inoperable vehicle in the driveway," or "junk stored on the front porch."

In order to provide proper follow-up, it is important to leave your name, address, and telephone number. The Code Enforcement Officer may need to contact you for additional information.

BEING A GOOD NEIGHBOR STARTS WITH....

- Keeping your lawn mowed. This not only looks nice, but helps keep out unwanted bugs, and keeps weed seeds from spreading.
- Keeping your property clear of debris and garbage. This helps keep it out of other yards.
- Making sure your garbage receptacles and recycling containers are stored out of sight when not in use.



- Working on limited vehicle repair in appropriate areas. Major vehicle repair is not allowed in residential areas.
- Making sure your vehicles are parked on a paved surface. Parking on your lawn is prohibited in Ridgeland.
- Keeping vehicles operable, registered, and licensed. Junk cars are an eyesore to your neighbors.
- Making sure your mailbox is structurally sound and in good repair, to include the box, post, and all attachments.
- Keeping open containers and receptacles free from standing water in order to prevent mosquito infestation. Items should be covered and regularly emptied.
- Keeping your fence looking good. Fences and walls shall be free from loose, missing, broken, or rotting materials and be attached properly.
- Removing any fallen or cut trees, and limbs from your property. Removing brush

piles helps deter unwanted rodents and pests, and lessens the risk of fires.

- Obtaining a permit to conduct a garage sale on your property. Residents are allowed two garage sales within a twelve month period. Signs for such sales are not allowed to be posted on any other property other than the property where the sale is being held or by written permission of your neighbors.
- Contacting the Building Department before starting any construction, remodeling, and installation of pools or sheds to verify whether a permit is needed
- Making sure your pets are not causing disturbing noises by repeatedly barking, howling, or whining. (these type of complaints are handled by the Animal Control officer through the Ridgeland Police Dept., 601-856-2121)
- Cleaning up after your dog. This helps avoid noxious odors and unwanted pests.


