Instructional Design Document

Business Plan E-Learning Course

1. Project Context

The "Create your Business Plan" is an introductory-level online course for adults who have a business idea, but want to learn how to create a business plan to pitch their idea to stakeholders. This course covers the essential key aspects that typically go into an effective business plan in a relevant and engaging manner. By the end of the course, the learners will be prepared to create their own business plans.

2. Learning Objectives

By the end of the course, the learners will:

- → Understand the benefits of writing a Business Plan
- → Define and Describe five key elements of a business plan
- → Demonstrate understanding of what business aspects need to be addressed in each section of the Plan
- → Gain access to templates and job aids that can help create your own business plan.

3. Project Requirements

- → **Budget** The project has a total of 120 hours to deliver the following:

4. Learning Requirements

- → Learner profile Adult Learners in the age range of 18 to 30 years, Freelancers, and Entrepreneurs
- → Learning environment The self-paced e-Learning course is free and can be accessed anywhere using a phone or a laptop with an internet connection. The course is flexible for the learners to complete at their own pace of learning.

5. Instructional Strategy

- → The course is being developed on the evidence-based educational pedagogies of Merrills Design Principles, Project-Based Learning(PBL) and Blooms Taxonomy of Learning. Founding the instruction on these principles will enable learners to build their content knowledge in a sequence, practice key concepts, demonstrate and apply the new knowledge gained to real-world situations.
- → There will be audio, visual, job aids/infographic and screen interactive elements in the course to meet diverse learning styles and keep the learners engaged.

6. Assessment Strategy

- → Formative assessments in the form of Quiz, Drag, and Drop, and Match will be included after every module to confirm understanding. The creation of business plan document can serve as a summative assessment for organizations that intend to measure the course outcome.
- → The training evaluation forms after the course will follow the 'Kirkpatrick Model' to assess learners' reaction to the course and learning outcomes.

If you have a team, you can also include your team members and their roles. Tell a Story: It is beneficial when you include what inspired you to start your company. Sometimes there is a personal story or motivation to start a business. Other times, your business might have the mission to support the welfare of others, serve humanity, or serve a public good. All these can be highlighted to share your company profile and gain attention from stakeholders.
