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# Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children The ROMAC Story

ROMAC (Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children) commenced in March 1988 out of the actions of an Australian Rotarian who, with a group of surgeons, visited Lambasa in Fiji. They found the child mortality rate as high as 25% in some places. They quickly identified that lack of ROMAC provides surgical treatment for children medical and surgical facilities and skills for children of the island nations in Oceania, was a major cause. Rotary faced the challenge to assist an 18-year-old Fijian girl whose right leg was threatened if immediate surgery was not performed.

During the next four years, eight children were brought to Australia for major, often lifesaving, surgery. Soon 20 Australian Rotary clubs were caught up in the success of each case and assisted in various ways. ROMAC established five regions representing clubs in the west, east, south, north and centre of the country.

A New Zealand region was formally established in 2004 and treated its first patient, from Vanuatu, in December 2005. The inaugural New Zealand region representative was Trish O'Reilly and Dr Max Morris, the first New Zealand Medical Director.

It was a slow and steady process to promote the objectives and raise awareness of ROMAC in the New Zealand region, but the number of patients treated in New Zealand has risen to more than 25 patients per year.

ROMAC in New Zealand and Australia enlists assistance from medical experts, hospitals, nurses, physiotherapists, pathology and radiology services, airlines, sponsors and other supporters. Today ROMAC is providing surgical treatment to around 40-50 children from Oceania every year - we are making a huge difference in their lives.

# **Chair's Report**

Because of the ongoing challenges of the COVID Special thanks must go to Marc Charette from -19 pandemic and the (correct) decisions of both the Federal Governments of Australia and New Zealand to close their borders to any international travellers, ROMAC was unable to treat any children in Australia during the 2021-22 Rotary year. We were, however, able to bring three patients from Tonga in to Auckland for urgent heart surgery during a brief period when borders between Tonga and New Zealand remained open.

Thankfully, international travel restrictions have now been lifted, and new patients are currently being processed for medical treatment. In both Australia and New Zealand.

During the COVID shutdowns, many Clubs opted to hold regular club meetings via Zoom which enabled ROMAC volunteers to join these meetings and update members on the work of ROMAC and to show our new 11 minute video.

Often, these clubs were in more remote areas not easily accessible to our volunteers and consequently had not had a presentation on ROMAC for quite some time. This resulted in an increase in the number of clubs donating to ROMAC during the year compared with recent years, and amazingly, our income for the 12 months was almost the same as in the previous year.

## **Treasurer's Report**

I am delighted to submit my report as Treasurer for ROMAC for the year ended 30 June 2022. This is my first year as Treasurer and I acknowledge the \$277,472). A total of 112 contribution of former Treasurer Michael Carrigan who continued as Treasurer up to the 2021 AGM. Michael was Treasurer for a term of four years and fulfilled this role with distinction.

The overall result for the current financial year was a surplus of \$403,268, this being a reduction from the surplus of \$535,252 for the prior financial year. These surplus's have resulted directly from the fact that for these two financial years the impact of COVID-19 was such that we were not able to care for any children. The current year's results are after a write-down on the value of investments following a share market correction of \$24,817. In the prior year there was a revaluation upwards of \$108,903. If these market valuation adjustments are ignored, the surplus for the current year is \$428,085 compared to the prior year surplus of \$426,349.

In my opinion this is a very good result in a period of continued disruption due to COVID-19 across Australian society, and Rotary Clubs across Australia.

Donations from Rotary Clubs within Australia have again been impacted by COVID-19 with total

contributions received of Rotary Oceania \$253,217 (2021 Clubs made donations during the year - who

had not donated in the prior year. The total number of Clubs who donated during the current year was 137. I also note that several Clubs were late in making their donations prior to 30 June 2022. A review of the history of donations from Clubs over the last few years indicates that past patterns of regular donations may have been impacted by the ability of Clubs to make donations. The change on society impacted by COVID-19, lockdowns, and consequent impacts on the ability of some Clubs to firstly raise funds and then competition for these funds within the community almost certainly had an impact.

In addition, ROMAC has continued to benefit from other donations and bequests, this year receiving \$172,760 (2021 \$147,404). ROMAC continues to be indebted to those individuals and organisations who contribute year after year.

Income from investments for the current year (dividends and interest) totalled \$53,729 (2021 \$43,327).

In relation to expenses I comment:

<u>Medical expenses</u> for the current year were \$4,400 (2021 \$6,393). These compare with the 2020-year medical expenses of \$419,215. Now that Australia is opening up to international travel, and we are able to bring in patients we can expect that the medical costs will increase significantly. Fortunately, we do have significant reserves available.

<u>Indirect costs</u> (Administrative, promotion and development costs and donations) for the current year are \$46,722 (2021 \$46,958).

<u>Meeting costs</u> of \$15,637 (2021 \$915) arose through the first *face to face* meeting for the Board and regional Chairs in two years. This was seen as a necessity to ensure preparedness as Australia opened after the years of COVID-19 lockdowns.

The ROMAC Board is focused on being prepared for an increase in patient case load in the coming year. This is why ROMAC was established. The Medical Director together with those assessing individual cases prior to acceptance, have a focus on maximising patient outcomes – whilst minimizing the risk of cost "blow out", thus ensuring that ROMAC maximises its beneficial impact across the countries and regions that we serve.

I would like to thank and acknowledge all the Rotary Clubs and individual Rotarians and non-Rotarians who have contributed to ROMAC during the last twelve months. The ongoing support of Rotary Clubs and Rotarians is critical to the ongoing success of ROMAC.

# **Medical Director's Report**

As everyone knows, borders were closed through all of 2021.

The borders, to some degree, are now open and we have had our first (post-Covid) ROMAC patient receive successful surgery for a large benign tumour. After the tumour had been removed from a neonate, both the tumour and the baby had the same weight. Not surprisingly, this surgery was extensive and difficult. The surgery took many hours and ROMAC is extremely grateful for the expertise of the paediatric surgeons, and the district chair, in Canberra.

We have many children "in the wings" and they have a variety of conditions.

We shall commence sending our ROMAC medical consultants to do clinics in the "home countries" as this will make it easier for us to triage those children and decide who will best benefit from ROMAC support. Money, which only comes from Rotarians and their clubs, is not limitless and there is considerable time required for "setting up" a trip to Aust or NZ. We need to find a suitable hospital (and surgeon) and we need to ensure the cost is not prohibitive. As well, we need to ensure the disruption to the family by ensuring the time away from home is not going to be too long.

During the lockdown we had zoom meetings both with Interplast and East Timor Hearts. Interplast is a College of Surgeons' initiative which has government funding. It funds Australasian surgeons to voluntarily go to, and operate within, Pacific and Oceania countries. Children referred to us with a cleft lip or palate are referred to Interplast and children with burns can be initially assessed by them to decide as to whether a child requires "a trip down". It

is good to have a good working relationship with them.

East Timor Hearts organises adult cardiac surgery in Australia but not for children. They have requested, and are keen for, ROMAC to manage Timor Leste children who require surgery for cardiac conditions and for whom the children cannot receive the surgery in Timor Leste.

Understandably, we have a backlog of children who could not come down for over two years. We are already "busy" sorting out logistics, particularly Laurence (Larry) Roddick OAM FRACP as many referrals are from over two years ago and we need updated information so we can assess the child's current situation.

ROMAC would like to thank the Rotarians, and their clubs, for the continuing support of ROMAC's voluntary work in Oceania and the Pacific. We look forward to your continuing support of ROMAC.

It would be remiss not to thank our recently retired Chair, Harold Sharp OAM. ROMAC is indebted to Harold for his enthusiasm, guidance and mentorship of us during his time as ROMAC Chair.
