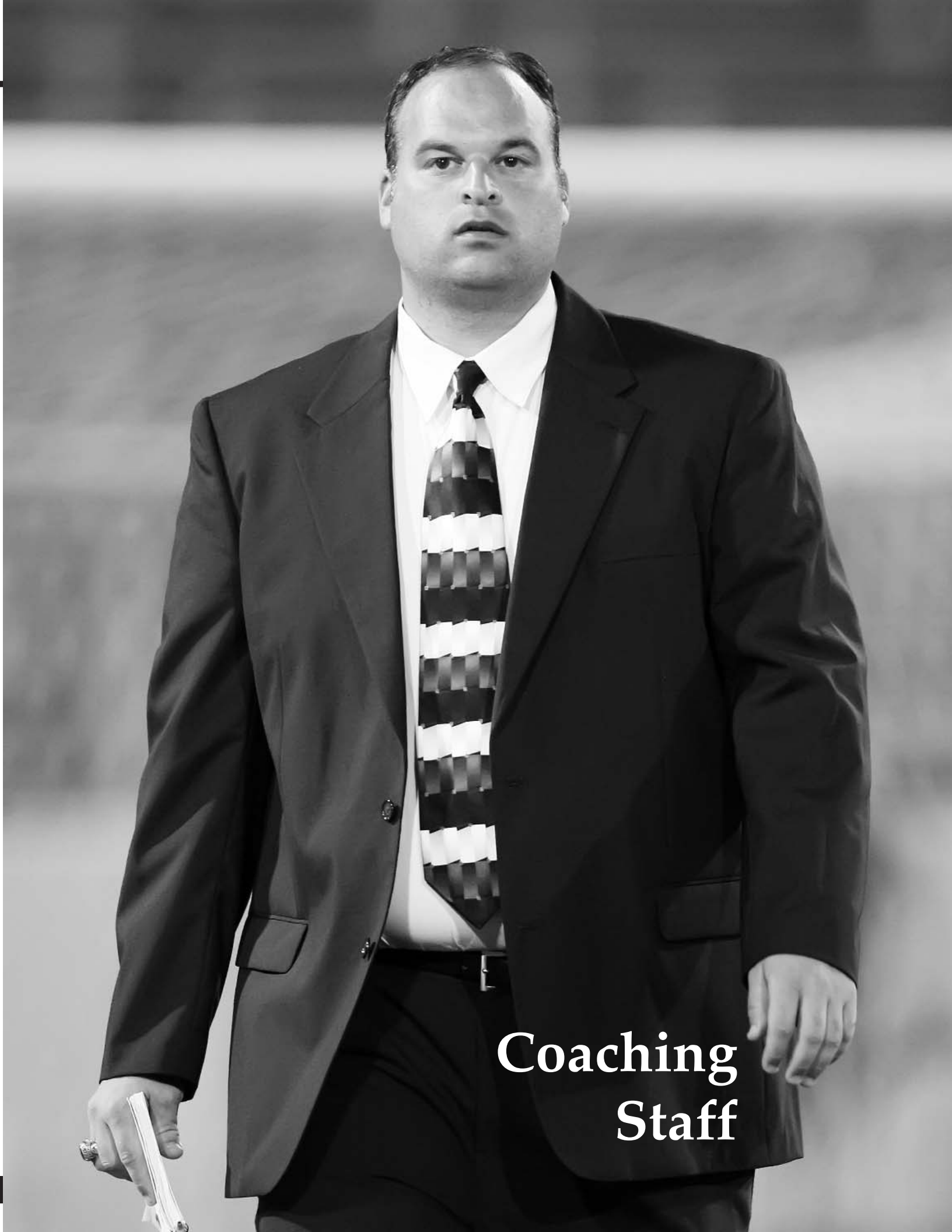

Jeff Leightman was named the head coach of the San Jose State University women's soccer program on February 27, 2008.

Leightman comes from his alma mater, Binghamton University in Binghamton, N.Y., where he compiled an overall record of 102-66-1 as the women's soccer head coach over the past 10 seasons. He led the Bearcats to the 2004 America East Conference regular-season and tournament championships and an NCAA Championship berth with a 14-6-1 record after the team was picked to finish eighth, earning America East Coach of the Year honors.



In all, Leightman has worked at the collegiate level for the past 15 years, having coached a nationally-ranked NCAA Division III program, a regionally-ranked Division I Big East Conference program at Villanova University and a Division I national champion at the University of North Carolina prior to coaching a Division II powerhouse and Division I America East champion and NCAA Championship participant at Binghamton.

At Binghamton, Leightman seamlessly transitioned the program from a mediocre Division III team into a regionally-ranked

Division I force. The 2004 America East title and NCAA Championship berth came in just the Bearcats' fourth season at the Division I level.

In 1998, Leightman's first year in charge at Binghamton and the program's first year in Division II following a move up from Division III, the Bearcats were ranked nationally and finished with a 14-3-1 record and an Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) crown. Over seven years at Division I, Leightman directed his squad to top-10 rankings in the Northeast Region by both the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) and Soccer Buzz Magazine. In 2001, Soccer Buzz ranked Binghamton as the top first-year Division I program in the nation.

In addition to the 2004 title, Leightman led Binghamton to the America East semifinals in 2005 and 2007, and the quarterfinals in 2006. The Bearcats were ECAC runners-up in 1999 and semifinalists in 2003 and 2001. Leightman served as the America East Women's Soccer Coaches' Chair from 2005-07, the National Chairman for the NSCAA/adidas rankings and the East Region Chairman for the NSCAA Scholar-Athlete All-America Committee.

Leightman has also been involved with the Olympic Development Program since 2002 as a United States Youth Soccer Region I staff coach at the U-13 and U-14 levels, and was the Director of Coaching for the BC United Fusion, a premier girl's youth soccer program. He was previously the girl's soccer head coach of the New York State West ODP U-16 and U-17 teams in 1999-2000.

As an assistant coach at Villanova during the 1997 season, Leightman helped guide the Wildcats to an 8-8-2 record, the Big East Tournament semifinals and an ECAC Tournament appearance. At North Carolina in 1996, he assisted in a national championship as the Tar Heels finished with a 25-1 record and the Atlantic Coast Conference title.



Leightman's coaching career began at Binghamton as an assistant coach from 1993-96. The Bearcats went 39-13-8 overall during that span, earning a SUNYAC crown and a berth in the NCAA Division III Championship in 1995.

Leightman earned a bachelor of arts degree in biological sciences from Binghamton in 1995. He holds an NSCAA Premier Diploma.

Prior to joining the Spartan staff in 2006, Winans had been the director of coaching of the Xtreme Soccer Club, based in Pacifica, Calif., where he was responsible for building the recently-formed club program. In addition, he was the girl's head coach at Sacred Heart Cathedral Prep in San Francisco, Calif., during the 2004 season.

Winans has also been a state staff coach and instructor since 1997 and district Olympic Development Program (ODP) head coach since 1995 for the California Youth Soccer Association (CYSA), based in Pleasanton, Calif.

The 1981 San Francisco State University graduate majored in business with an emphasis in accounting. Winans also attended the United States Air Force Academy, where he played collegiate soccer, and Cal State Hayward.

The San Francisco native holds an NSCAA Premier diploma and a United States Soccer Federation National "B" coaching license.

He and his wife, Vickie, have four children, Bridget, Brendan, Kevin and Theresa, and reside in San Francisco, Calif.

Matt Witty was named Assistant Athletic Director for Business and Finance in July 2008. Witty oversees all business operations for the Athletic Department, which includes 16 sports, 28 departments and 115 employees. In addition, he has oversight for Equipment Services, as well as, being the sport supervisor for women's soccer.

Witty first came to San Jose State in 2001, working in the business office. In June 2002, he was promoted to Assistant Ticket Manager and held that position until April 2004. After brief stops in the ticket offices of Marshall University and the University of Wisconsin, he returned to San Jose State, in 2005, as Assistant Director of Ticket Operations. In June 2006, Witty became the Athletic Business Manager, where he remained until his promotion to his current position.

Witty received a bachelor's degree in Sports Administration from Ball State University in 2001. In 2008, he earned a master's in Sports Marketing & Management from Marshall University. Witty is a member of CABMA (Collegiate Athletic Business Management Association) and NACDA (National Association of College Athletics Directors). He and his fiancé, Kathy, reside in Campbell, Calif.

In 2008, a new era begins for the San Jose State University women's soccer program.

First year head coach **Jeff Leightman** arrives after 10 years as head coach at Binghamton University, where he amassed a 102-66-21 record, including in 2004, a 14-6-1 record, American East Conference regular season and tournament championship, as well as, a birth in the NCAA Championship Tournament.

Under Leightman's leadership the Binghamton program went from a mediocre Division III squad to a regionally-ranked Division I power. In his first year the Bearcats were 14-3-1, nationally ranked and ECAC Champions. From 2001-07, his teams were consistently ranked by both the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and by *SoccerBuzz Magazine* as a top-10 team in the Northeast Region.

"I have always structured my teams so that we are incredibly creative and effective in the attack," stated Leightman. "We are going to attack with numbers and try to score lots of goals. We are going to play very entertaining and fun soccer, but we will also work relentlessly in the defensive end.

"I think the strength of this team will be our attacking. We have lots of flair, personality and athleticism. The most important thing to building a women's soccer program in college, is a great keeper and goal scorer. If you have both of those you will win a lot of games. I think we have both.

"What we need to do is solidify the middle of the field. We have the talent, but we are so young and the system is new: so it is just a matter of time before we put it together. Throughout the season fans will see this team continue to improve. We have been working on building relentless pressure defensively and as that improves we will improve as a team."

FORWARDS

The front line will be led by JC transfer **Emmy Belding**, who scored 56 goals in two seasons at Cabrillo College and redshirt freshman **Stephanie Righetti**.

"Emmy is our most explosive and dynamic player. She has tremendous speed and an explosive change of pace. She has a very good shot from both feet and is a pure goal scorer. We are looking

for great things from her. Stephanie has been very impressive in preseason. She has become a great one-on-one attacker and plays with great flair. She has a great instinct as to when to take on a defender and when to pass. She can set up teammates or take to play herself, so she is very tough to mark.

Adding strength and depth will be junior **Roxy Kamal**, sophomore **Danielle Drago**, freshman **Lauren Sanchez**, and walk-on **Michelle Haughey**.

"Roxy is our best player technically and tactically. She just finds seams and balls that no one else on the field is going to find. She is magic on the ball. Lauren and Danielle are both tough and physical and will add a different dimension to our attack. Michelle, a walk on, has great athleticism and tremendous speed that she uses to her advantage.

MIDFIELDERS

Midfield is where the Spartans have the most experience. Senior co-captain, **Jennifer Guadagnolo**, junior **Hallsie Pacheco**, senior **Kaila Waitley**, sophomores **Katie Bonadies** and **Lauren Ng-Pinkerton** all return and should provide veteran leadership to newcomers **Kira Helmer** and **Shanelle Furner**.

"Jennifer very dynamic attacker and great dribbler who will run at defenders and beat two or three at a time. Her game has great one-v-one flair. She can be really special on the attack from the flank. Kaila will start at outside mid. She brings attacking flair and hard nose defending. She goes end to end and does a lot of the little things well. Hallsie is very smart and plays very simply. She is a good ball winner and sprays balls around very well. Shanelle has a rocket shot with both feet and good technical skill for a young player. Katie is a good athlete with strong attacking qualities who will play at outside mid. Lauren and Kira will vie for time and add depth to the position.

DEFENDERS

The Spartans backline will have a young look as three returners, sophomores **Brittany Boehm**, **Kim Johnston** and senior **Lauren Moniz**, are teamed up with five newcomers; freshmen **Britnee Chesney**, **Kelsy Holm**, **Amanda Martin** and **Angela Santoro** as well as junior college transfer **Angela Nuñez**.

"Brittany (Boehm) has good experience and the skill to play center back or an outside back position. Kim is a bit more versatile. She can play outside back or outside midfield and go end to end on the attack. Lauren, one of our co-captains, brings great leadership to our backline.

"Of the freshman, Britnee (Chesney) is smaller in stature but plays much bigger. She has done very well and could start at a right back position. Amanda is very feisty, technical and quick. She will be starting at left back. She defends well and attacks well. Kelsy is a really good center back. She is very composed on the ball, makes good decisions and is very strong as a one on one defender. Angela (Santoro) is very athletic and scrappy and will be an impact player for us. Angela (Nuñez) will provide depth.

GOALKEEPERS

The Spartans have three keepers who will vie for time in goal. Sophomore **Nina Butera** returns as the incumbent along with sophomore **Sarah Wisotsky** and freshman **Jordan-Michelle Santos**.

"Nina has a very physical presence for a keeper," stated Leightman. "She commands her box very well and has all the physical attributes to be a top Division I goalkeeper." Butera posted a 1.22 goals against average and had a .822 save percentage and two shutouts in 2007.

Santos comes to San Jose State off a successful high school and club career. At Los Alamitos (Calif.) High School she won the 2007 Sunset League title and the 2007 Excalibur Tournament championship with five consecutive shutouts.

"Jordan-Michelle is extremely athletic and has a lot of technical and physical attributes. She is very explosive and quick so she can make those upper 90 saves and game-changing saves."

Wisotsky, who walked-on in 2007, completes the troika. "Sarah has great size and good physical stature. She has improved greatly since last year. She is one of the hardest workers on our team and is truly respected by all the members of the team."

2007: Started all 21 games as a central midfielder and forward ...only goal and points came at Idaho State (9/21)... her 25 shots ranked third on the squad...at Fresno State (10/12) took a season high four shots...had nine shots on goal including two in a win versus Nevada (10/14)...named to the All-Tournament Team of the 2007 Idaho State Classic...ranked in the top-10 in points, goals, shots and shots on goal for the season.



2006: Appeared in 19 games, starting 17...was fifth on the team with eight total points from three goals scored and two assists ...all three goals and both assists came in first 10 games of the season...scored at UC Davis (9/6), against Notre Dame de Namur (9/15) and at Pacific (9/22)...goal at UC Davis came from distance and knotted the game at 2-2 with 7:37 left in regulation to send it into overtime...assists came on the lone goal in the season-opening tie at LMU (8/25), and on the only Spartan goal against UC Riverside (9/24)...seven of 17 shots were on goal...season high was three shots at Pacific.

2007: Played in four games...at Sacramento State (9/7), at Idaho State (9/21) and against UC Davis (10/17) and versus Utah State (11/8) in the WAC Tournament...only shot of the year and her second collegiate shot came in the UC Davis game.



2006: Appeared in six games, including the match at third-ranked Santa Clara (10/4) and league contests at home against Boise State (10/6) and Louisiana Tech (10/15) ...produced her first collegiate goal on her first collegiate shot, in the 61st minute at UC Davis (9/6)...finished the year with one goal for two points, on one shot.

2005: Played in five games ...appeared in all four games of a four-game road stretch, and made home debut vs. Utah State (10/14).

San Jose State University, Silicon Valley's metropolitan university, is pre-eminent in broadly educating leaders and professionals for an increasingly complex and global society.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

Graduating about 7,000 students annually, San Jose State University also provides the professional infrastructure for the region - from teachers, to social workers, to artists, to law enforcement officers, to nurses. The terms, "leaders and professionals," describe not just the types of graduates who earn their degrees at San Jose State,

but also the roles they assume in their communities and in their fields of endeavor.

San Jose State University's place in history is well-established. Founded in 1857, it was the first public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its humble beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, it has matured into a master's university offering 191 bachelor's and master's degrees.

The University's 30,000 students study in eight fully-accredited colleges: Applied Sciences and the Arts, Business, Education, Engineering, Humanities and the Arts, Science, Social Sciences and Social Work. One strength of the academic program is the broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism -- to diverse studies. Academic strength also is seen in the University's nationally-recognized programs. In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach introductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning facilities include computer-equipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the NASA Ames Research Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.

San Jose State University also finds strength in its diversity. For many first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development, and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Campus Village

In the fall of 2005, San Jose State University opened the doors of Campus Village to more than 2,279 students, faculty and staff.

Positioned on Tenth Street between San Carlos and San Salvador, on the southeast corner of the main campus, Campus Village is a gateway to incredible academic resources and campus activities, the excitement of downtown San Jose, the opportunities of Silicon Valley, and some of the world's greatest recreational areas.

Campus Village includes three buildings featuring apartment and suite-style living accommodations and a typical college dormitory experience. Walking to the Student Union or to The Event Center, home for the San Jose State University men's and women's basketball teams, will take five minutes or less. Residents also can walk or bicycle to the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library without crossing any streets.

The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library

The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library, located on the main campus of San Jose State University, opened in August, 2003.

A first-of-its-kind collaboration between a city and a university, the \$177-million, 475,000 square-foot library provides a center for life-long learning. Students, faculty and the community have access to the information they will need for educational and personal growth throughout their lives.

The 10-floor library features:

- 3,623 seats
- 1,800 seats wired for the internet
- 400 public computers
- 135 databases of information
- Four computer instruction laboratories
- 112 workstations available in the computer instruction labs
- 37 group-project rooms

The collaborative design provides many opportunities for academic, cultural and community programs. Multilingual and special collections for San Jose's diverse ethnic groups are available. An adaptive technology area assures all people have the ability to access the information and databases available.

Jon Whitmore **University President**

Dr. Jon S. Whitmore was named President of San Jose State University in April 2008 with a start date in August 2008.

Dr. Whitmore, whose Ph.D. is from the University of California, Santa Barbara in theatre history, returns to California after five years (2003-2008) as the Texas Tech University president and a professor of theatre.

His distinguished professional history in academia began in 1967 at Washington State University. Positions at Highline

Community College in Seattle and the University of California preceded an 11-year tenure (1974-1985) at West Virginia University where he gained full professorship and was Interim Dean of the College of Creative Arts. Dr. Whitmore spent five years (1985-1990) at the University of Iowa as the Dean, Faculty of Arts and Letters and a professor of theatre.

He was the Dean of the College of Fine Arts, the Effie Marie Cain Regents Chair and a professor of theatre at the University of Texas (1990-1996) and the Provost and a professor of theatre at the University of Iowa (1996-2003).

The native of Seattle, Wash., earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in speech from Washington State University. He and his wife, Jennifer, have a son, Ian, enrolled at the University of Iowa, and daughter, Amy, enrolled at Vanderbilt University.



Tom Bowen **Director of Athletics**

Tom Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of intercollegiate athletics on December 20, 2004.

Under his leadership and with his vision for the department, San Jose State has established itself as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program with proven athletic, academic and financial

successes to its credit.

At the core of Bowen's mission for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community. To that end, the Notre Dame alum has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; initiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with the creation of Spartan Sports Properties.

As an integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and many other campus extra-curricular activities. His initiatives and leadership have created new energy department-wide and throughout the university. The university has benefitted from Athletics' increasing visibility, receiving record donations, particularly in 2006-07.

In 2007-08, the Spartans sent their women's gymnastics team to NCAA post-season action and had individuals from the women's swimming and women's golf teams compete in NCAA Championships. Women's water polo was ranked seventh in the final national coaches poll. Men's basketball had its best win total since the 2001 season. San Jose State capped the school year with a budget surplus for an unprecedented third year in a row and was cited as one of 12 Division I universities cited for Overall Excellence in Diversity in a national study by Texas A&M University on behalf of the NCAA.

In 2006-07, football capped its finest season in nearly two decades, posting a 9-4 overall record and capturing the New Mexico Bowl championship. Women's cross country and women's water polo, ranked sixth nationally in the final coaches' poll, turned in their best record in years. The 2007 season marked the second year in a row a Spartan won the Western Athletic Conference women's golf individual title.

In 2005-06, San Jose State won the Western Athletic Conference women's golf championship, recorded its highest finish ever at a NCAA regional championship in women's gymnastics, produced seven teams out of 16 with its best conference

finish in years, and had WAC "Coaches of the Year" in women's golf and softball.

Bowen's vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a Student Success Services component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores as measured by the NCAA have risen steadily under his watch.

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the Director of Community Affairs for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. Also serving as the executive director of the 49ers Foundation, San Francisco was the first NFL franchise to implement an annual giving program.

His Division I experience at the collegiate level includes athletics administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. At the University of California, Bowen was credited with developing the first comprehensive planned giving program for the Golden Bears.

At Saint Mary's College, he was the Director of Foundations and Corporate Relations before being appointed to an associate director of athletics position by the president of the college. His grant proposal acumen helped raise \$6.1-million in academic funding for the institution. For three years he managed the athletics department's budget, directed a corporate sponsorship program and interacted with the campus community on student-athlete issues.

His first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987 through 1995, he held the positions of assistant football coach and athletics director.

He is a Level 2 certified member of the College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA), the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the National Society of Fund Raising Executives.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame played high school football at Moreau High in Hayward, Calif. He majored in theology / sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

He was named to the 2008 San Jose Mercury News' Top-25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in the Bay Area. Bowen is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management and at San Jose State University's Department of Kinesiology where he teaches sports management classes.

The Denver, Colo., native and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children: sons, Andrew and Peter, and, daughter, McKenna.



Spartan Stadium

Spartan Stadium, which seats 30,456, is the home for San Jose State women's soccer, men's soccer and football.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.

The Koret Athletic Training Center, opened in November, 2001, is a state-of-the-art facility that encompasses over 10,000 square feet of training space, and is located adjacent to Spartan Stadium and the athletic locker rooms.

The Koret Athletic Training Center also contains a 1,000-square-foot rehabilitation and training room that services physical therapy and sport-specific rehabilitation. The facility enables the sports medicine staff of athletic trainers, doctors and physical therapists to provide the best possible care to help prevent and rehabilitate injuries.
