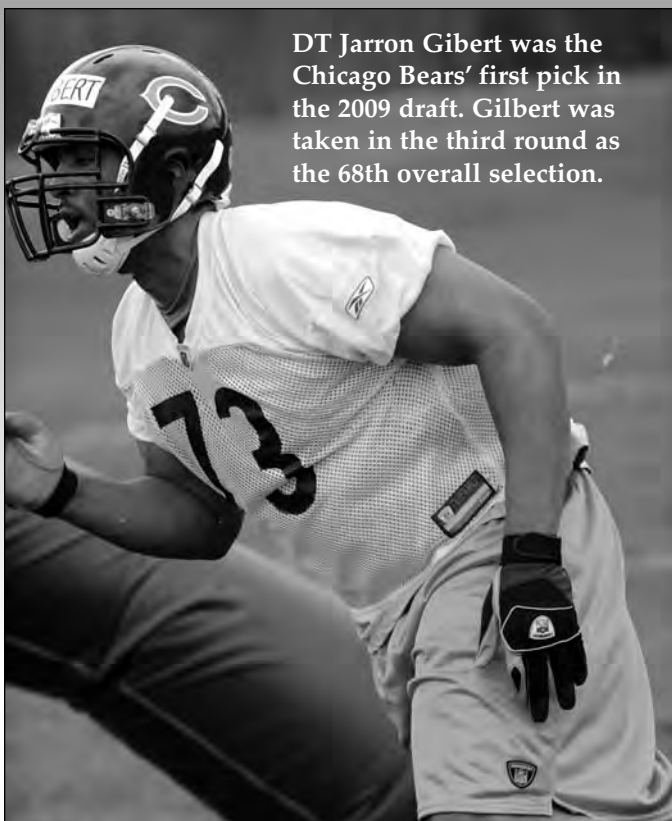

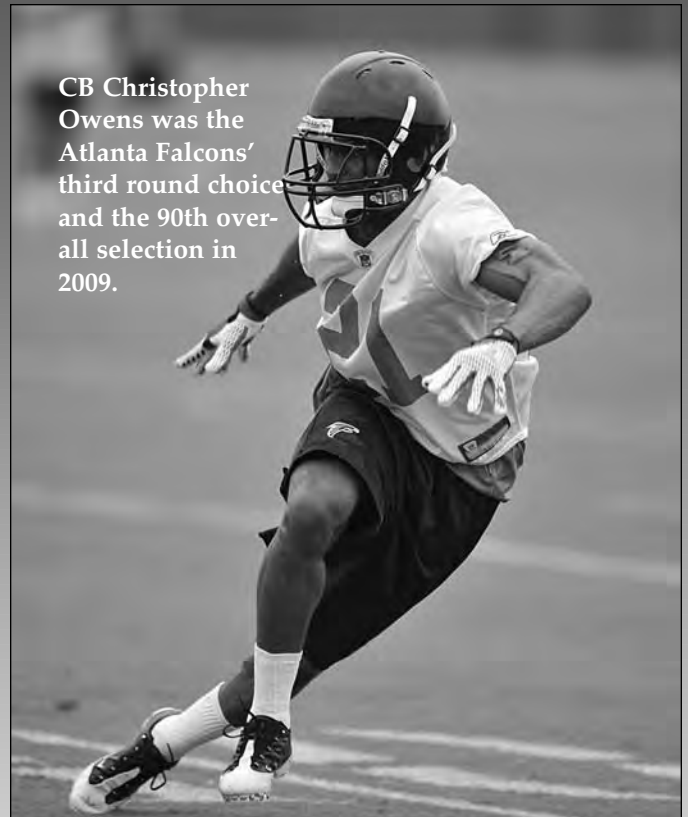

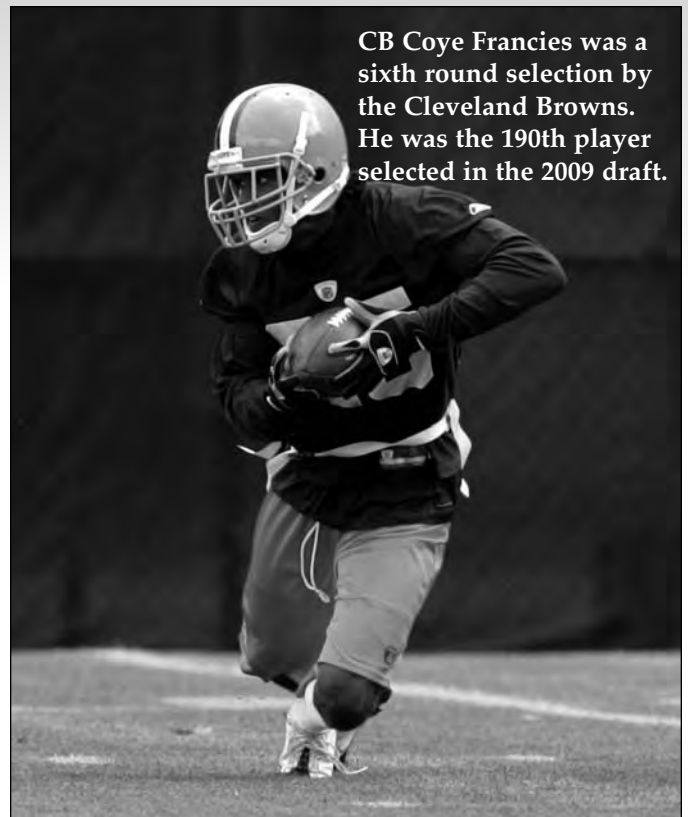
Spartans in the NFL

CB Christopher Owens was the Atlanta Falcons' third round choice and the 90th overall selection in 2009.



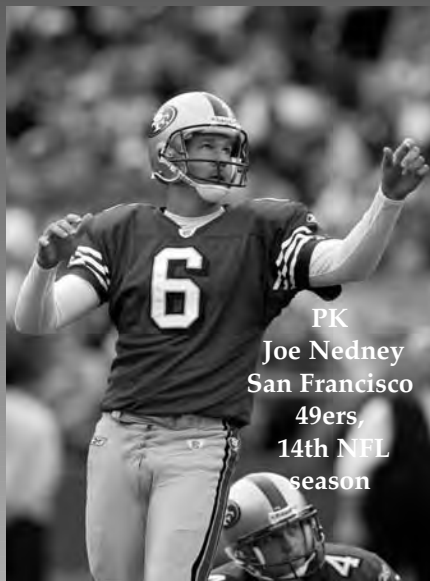
CB Coye Francies was a sixth round selection by the Cleveland Browns. He was the 190th player selected in the 2009 draft.

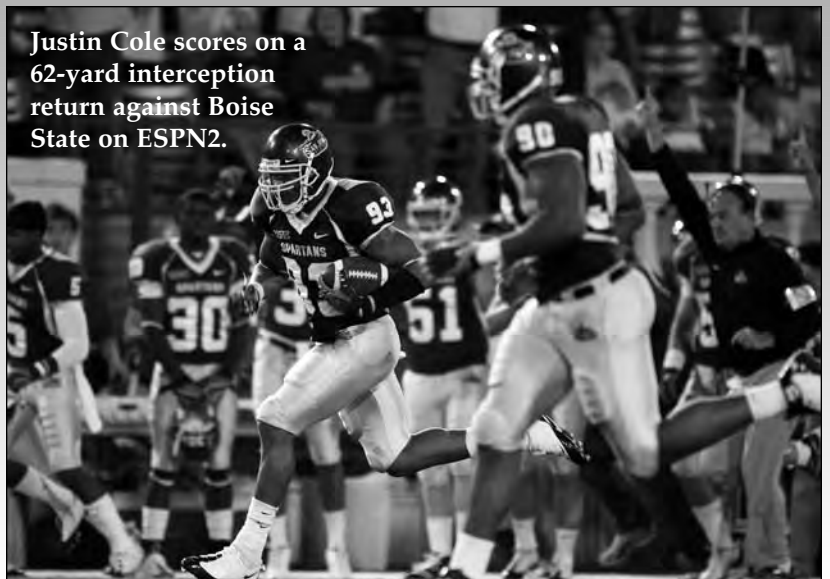

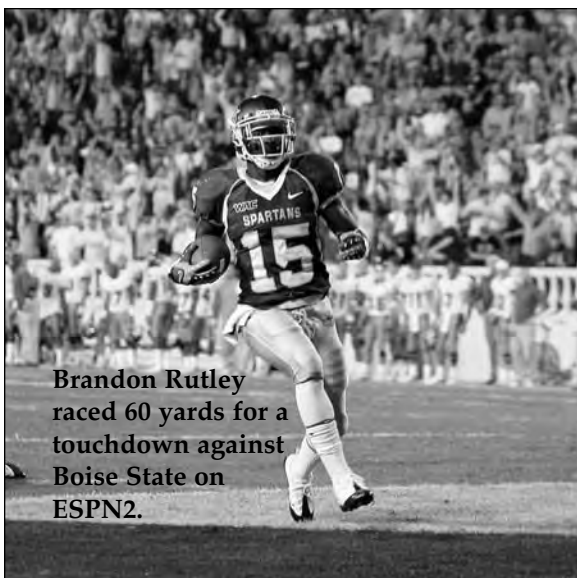
Duke Ihenacho scores on a 43-yard interception return against Utah State on ESPN2.



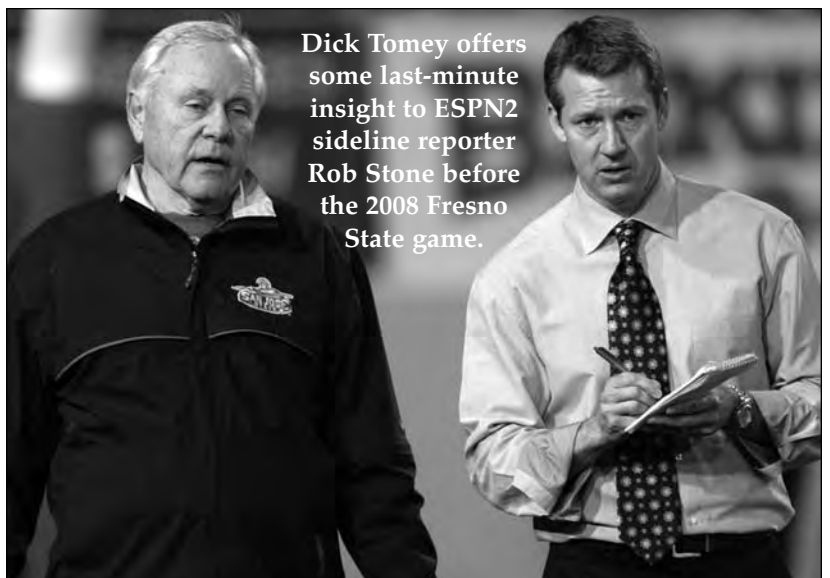
Carl Ihenacho offers a dose of Nacho brothers against Boise State on ESPN2.

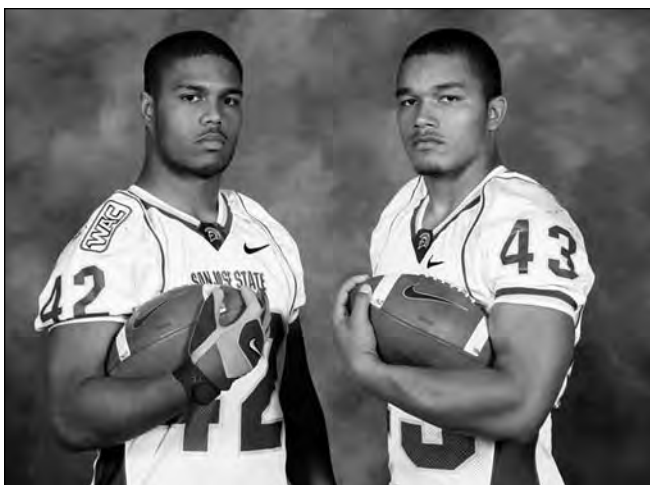

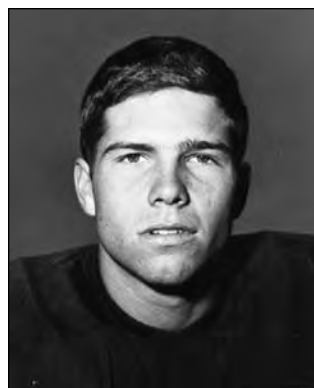

Walsh stayed intimately involved in football and became one of the game's most successful coaches leading the San Francisco 49ers to three Super Bowl victories in the 1980's. He is the only Spartan who is an inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

The two world-class sprinters from the 1960's are best known for their actions on the Olympic Games victory stand following Smith's gold-medal performance in 1968. A statue commemorating their historic event is located on the university's main campus.

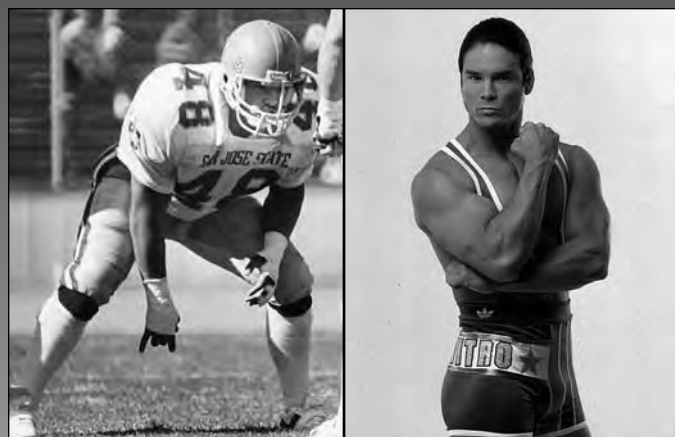

Kinji Green was a 2005 team captain and All-WAC defensive lineman in Dick Tomey's first season at San Jose State. The 26-year-old is the program's only four-time Academic All-WAC honoree and is one of the youngest full-time assistant coaches in the Football Bowl Subdivision this season.

The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library, located on the main campus of San Jose State University is a \$177-million, 475,000 square-foot library providing a center for life-long learning. Students, faculty and the community have access to the information they will need for educational and personal growth throughout their lives.

The 10-floor library features:

- 3,623 seats
- 1,800 seats wired for the internet
- 400 public computers

- 135 databases of information
- 4 computer instruction laboratories
- 112 workstations available in the computer instruction labs
- 37 group-project rooms

The collaborative design provides many opportunities for academic, cultural and community programs. Multilingual and special collections for San Jose's diverse ethnic groups are available. An adaptive technology area assures all people have the ability to access the information and databases available.

Bowl Success

Dick Tomey is the WAC's only head coach with a winning record in bowl games. Now 5-3 in post-season bowls, he led the Spartans to a 2006 New Mexico Bowl win.

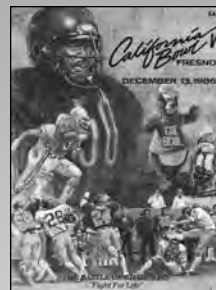

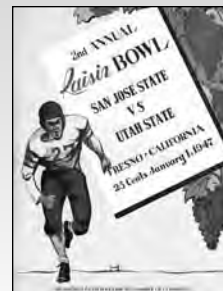

- Every element of our program is grounded in the sciences and draws on many training disciplines.

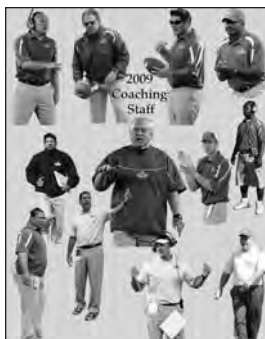


- Speed training, resistance exercise and flexibility development are components of our program.

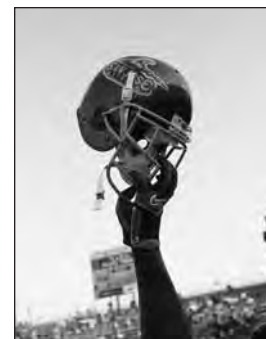

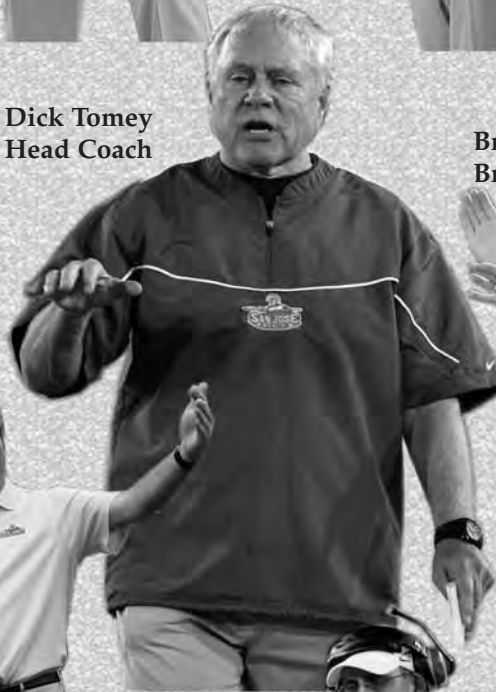

Dick Tomey Head Coach



One of college football's most respected and accomplished men, Dick Tomey is in his fifth season as San Jose State's head coach and is the 2009 President of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). Named the 26th head coach in university history December 29, 2004, Tomey resurrected the Spartans' football program with the support and vision of athletics director Tom Bowen.

In his first four seasons, San Jose State has a bowl title, the 2006 New Mexico Bowl, and 23 wins – more victories than any four-season span at the university in the last 15 years. He has infused a successful home-field culture into the Spartans with 15 wins in their last 20 games. The on-field success in Spartan Stadium has translated to an unprecedented 320-plus percent rise in home attendance from 2004 to the present.



Leading the program progressively and with a stabilizing presence, Tomey has turned San Jose State into a consistent Western Athletic Conference (WAC) championship contender. The 2006, 2007, and 2008 Spartans posted conference marks of .500 or better – the first San Jose State teams to do so consecutively since the university joined the WAC in 1996. As a result, the Spartans have been bowl-eligible two of the last three years including 2008 when the Spartans posted a 6-6 win-loss record.

Readily adapting to the changes in the college game, smart, disciplined football is a Tomey trademark. While the 2008 team was one of the best defensive units at San Jose State in the last 20 years, the Spartans remained one of the top teams nationally in turnover margin for the third year in a row.

Tomey's "team first" belief paved the way for San Jose State's finest season of the 21st century in 2006. The Spartans posted a 9-4 win-loss record, its best since 1990, a plus-six turnaround in the win column, and ended a 16-year bowl drought. With a New Mexico Bowl win, Tomey joined a select group of head coaches to reach nine victories in a season at three different

FBS institutions. He enters the 2009 season as the only WAC head coach with a winning record in bowl games and is among the top-15 active FBS coaches for bowl victories and post-season winning percentage.

Tomey's instruction and leadership integrates player accomplishments. Defensive tackle Jarron Gilbert led the country in 2008 in tackles for loss and was the WAC Co-Defensive Player of the Year.

Cornerback Dwight Lowery became the university's first two-time, first-team All-America selection as a member of the 2006 and 2007 AFCA teams. Gilbert, a 2009 third round choice by the Chicago, and Lowery, the New York Jets' fourth round pick in 2008, are among six Spartans selected in the last three NFL drafts. Cornerbacks Christopher Owens (Atlanta, third round, 2009) and Coye Francies (Cleveland, sixth round, 2009) and wide receivers James Jones (Green Bay, third round, 2007) and John Broussard (Jacksonville, seventh round, 2007) are recent drafted players. Seventeen seniors have played in post-season all-star games since 2006, the Spartans' largest group for any four-year span.

AMONG THE BEST

His 181 career victories, all in the Football Bowl Subdivision, rank fourth among active coaches. Only Joe Paterno, Bobby Bowden and Mack Brown have more wins in FBS/Division I-A games. His overall head coaching record from his years at San Jose State University (2005-08), the University of Arizona (1987-2000) and the University of Hawai'i (1977-86) is 181-135-7. Tomey is the only head coach who ranks in the top-10 for conference coaching victories in both the WAC and the Pacific-10 Conference.

The 2009 season will be his 46th year coaching football. His impact, dedication and love for the game are evident in his role as AFCA President. More than 35 of his coaching proteges are either in the National Football League or coaching at the NCAA Division I level. Rich Ellerson (Army), Pat Hill (Fresno State), June Jones (SMU), Ron McBride (Weber State) and Tom Williams (Yale) are head coaches at NCAA Division I programs. Former Tomey players like Chuck Cecil (Tennessee Titans defensive coordinator), Ken Niumataloto (Navy head coach) and Rich Miano (Hawai'i associate head coach) are among those now in coaching.

Tomey's presence also fostered the Spartans return to national television. The 2009 season is the second in a row San Jose State is appearing three times in nationally televised games.

In his San Jose State debut season of 2005, the Spartans posted a winning home record for the first time since 2000, were the Division I-A category leader in home attendance increase with a 95-percent year-over-year upgrade and were one of 11 teams whose defense reduced its points allowed by more than 100 points (112) from 2004.

Before joining San Jose State, Tomey was the University of Texas assistant head coach in 2004. The Longhorns won the 2005 Rose Bowl and his enthusiasm and encouragement of the Texas players carried over to a national championship the following season. The Longhorns were one of the nation's top defensive units ranking in the top-30 nationally or higher in every major statistical category.

A REVERED FIGURE IN HAWAII

His first head coaching job came at the University of Hawai'i in 1977. A revered figure in the Islands today, he was a 2006 inductee into the University of Hawaii Sports Circle of Honor.

Tomey's 1981 Rainbows were the first team in school history to break into the top-20 national rankings.

Finishing 9-2, he was named the 1981 WAC Coach of the Year. Tomey also produced Hawai'i's first Associated Press first-team All-America player in defensive lineman Al Noga, a 1986 selection. Home attendance more than doubled to 44,651 per game in his final year at Hawai'i (1986). His teams fashioned a 63-46-3 win-loss record and eight .500 or better finishes in 10 seasons.

PAC-10 SUCCESS

Moving to Arizona in 1987, his Wildcat teams were the second winningest Pacific-10 Conference program in the decade of the '90's, trailing only the University of Washington. Arizona, with just one bowl win in 85 seasons prior to his arrival, appeared in seven post-season bowls over a 14-season span and won the 1989 Copper, 1994 Fiesta, 1997 Insight.com and 1998 Culligan Holiday Bowls. The 1994 Fiesta Bowl win over then-No. 10 Miami (Fla.), 29-0, was the first shutout victory in the bowl game's history. The 1998 Culligan Holiday Bowl triumph was a 23-20 victory over then-14th-ranked Nebraska. Tomey's Wildcats were the only team to beat both Miami (Fla.) and Nebraska in bowl games in the decade of the '90's.

His 1993 and 1998 Arizona teams were the first two at the school to finish as a consensus top-10 program in the final national polls. The 1993 team that had a 10-2 record was ninth in the USA Today coaches and 10th in the Associated Press final polls. The 1998 Wildcats were fourth in both polls' final balloting. The 1989 (25th) and 1994 (20th) teams also finished the season nationally ranked.

At Arizona, the Wildcats accumulated a 95-64-4 win-loss record covering 14 seasons and his 60 Pacific-10 head coaching triumphs still ranks ninth best on the all-time conference list. The 1992 Pacific-10 Coach of the Year coached five National Football League first-round draft choices, 20 All-Americans and 43 first-team All-Pacific-10 selections. His defensive units trademarked Desert Swarm in the early 1990's leading the nation in scoring defense in 1992 and rushing defense in 1993.

FORMATIVE YEARS & FAMILY

The native of Bloomington, Ind., is a 1960 graduate of DePauw University where he played football and baseball. He began his coaching career in 1962 at Miami University (Ohio) as a graduate assistant coach first under Johnny Pont and then Bo Schembechler in 1963. Tomey was an assistant coach at Northern Illinois (1964), Davidson (1965-66), Kansas (1967-70) and UCLA (1971-76). While at Kansas and UCLA, he worked for Pepper Rodgers, San Jose State graduate and Super Bowl winning coach Dick Vermeil, and Terry Donahue.

Tomey was inducted into the DePauw University Hall of Fame in 1994. He was a 1999 recipient of a Provost Award as the University of Arizona's Outstanding Teacher – the only coach in school history to be so honored by the university faculty.

After leaving Arizona, he was a broadcast analyst for University of Hawai'i football telecasts in 2001 and 2002. He returned to coaching in 2003 as a San Francisco 49ers defensive assistant coach.

Sony Pictures released the movie "My Life Without Me" in 2003 as an adaptation from her novel, "Pretending the Bed is a Raft."

They are the parents of four adult children and grandparents of five. Rich Tomey, a business development manager for the NFL's Arizona Cardinals, and his wife, Rachelle, and daughter, Taylor, and son, Ryan, live in Phoenix, Ariz. Ali Berghthold, her husband, Eric, employed by Research Triangle Institute, and sons, Caid and Coby, and daughter Carleigh are relocating to Chapel Hill, N.C. Leigh Kincaid is the Managing Director of Programs for Teach for America in Hawaii. Angie Tomey, a yoga teacher, organic farmer, and farmer's market manager in Nevada City, Calif., and John Tecklin have an August 2009 wedding planned.

Kent Baer Linebackers Coach



Kent Baer is in his second season as the San Jose State University linebackers coach. In 2009, he also will coordinate the work of linemen with the linebackers. In his first season, Baer's teachings produced the team's leading tackler in Travis Jones and a second-team All-WAC selection in Justin Cole. Both players return for the 2009 season.



In a noteworthy coaching career, he has been a defensive coordinator at six Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) universities and participated in eight bowl games and the 1986 NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. He was the interim head coach of the University of Notre Dame for the 2004 Insight Bowl. Three teams - Notre Dame in 2002 (17th), California in 1991 (8th) and Idaho in 1986 (16th) finished a season ranked in the Top-20 by the Associated Press.

As a defensive coordinator, Baer molded outstanding groups that excelled in stopping the run. At Notre Dame in 2004, the Fighting Irish yielded just five rushing touchdowns and was third nationally in rushing defense. The 2002 Notre Dame team was nationally ranked in scoring defense (9th), pass efficiency defense (10th), rushing defense (10th), and total defense (13th). Baer was recognized for the Irish's accomplishments that season as a finalist for the Frank Broyles Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding assistant coach. Arizona State ranked seventh nationally in total defense in 1992.

Among a select group of coaches to work at the three Bay Area FBS schools, he was at Stanford for four bowl games including the 2000 Rose Bowl during his seven seasons on the staff. The 2001 Cardinal led the Pac-10 in rushing defense - just the second Stanford unit to top the conference in that category. California won 17 of 23 games in his final two seasons there.

The last 23 years, he has coached and coordinated the New Era Bowl in Japan. The game annually integrates top Japanese college players with selected American players and coaches.

Baer was a standout linebacker at Utah State during the 1969 through 1972 seasons. He set a school record for total tackles, 116, a record that stood for 10 years. Baer graduated from Utah State in 1973 as a physical education and recreation major.

He has three adult sons - Brian, Aaron James (A.J.), and Steven Blake. Baer also has three grandchildren through his son, Brian, and wife Kristen - girls, Alex and Isabella, and a boy, Max.

Brent Brennan is in his fifth year with the Spartans coaching staff. In 2009, he will serve as co-offensive coordinator, coach the offensive tackles and tight ends and head up the Spartans' special teams.

The last two seasons, Brennan served as the tight ends coach, special teams coordinator and recruiting coordinator. The 2008 Spartans were 20th nationally in kickoff returns and the 2007 team was ninth in punt returns. In 2005 and 2006, Brennan was the wide receivers coach and directly responsible for the development NFL draft choices: James Jones (3rd round, Green Bay) and John Broussard (7th round, Jacksonville). In two seasons, they combined for 168 receptions and 20 touchdowns.

Brennan has a track record of attracting and nurturing high-caliber players who attract attention from pro teams. Rufus Skillern, the Spartans' top pass receiver in 2005, played for the British Columbia Lions of the CFL. At Cal Poly, Brennan tutored 2009 New York Giants third round choice Ramses Barden and Adam Herzing who spent time with Indianapolis, San Francisco and the Rhein Fire of NFL Europa. Brennan also coached Tampa Bay tight end Jerramy Stevens at the University of Washington.

Brennan joined the Spartans as a member of Dick Tomey's coaching staff in January 2005, after being named San Diego State's quarterbacks coach. From 2001 through 2004, he was the receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Cal Poly.

A native of Redwood City, Calif., Brennan began his coaching career at Woodside (Calif.) High School in 1996. He served as a graduate assistant at Hawai'i in 1998, Washington in 1999 and Arizona in 2000.

As a college player, Brennan was a wide receiver for the 1991 through 1995 UCLA teams and lettered on the Bruins' 1993 Rose Bowl squad. He graduated from UCLA in 1996.

Brennan is a second-generation Spartan. His dad, Steve Brennan, was an end who lettered in the 1967 season. Brent and his wife, Courtney, have two daughters, Blake and Casey, and a son, Scott.

Keith Burns Defensive Coordinator/ Cornerbacks Coach



Keith Burns is in his sixth season at San Jose State and his third as defensive coordinator. Besides managing the overall defense, Burns is the cornerbacks coach.

Last season, Burns coordinated a San Jose State defense that ranked in the top-20 nationally in tackles for loss (7th), passing defense (10th) and quarterback sacks (11). San Jose State was 21st nationally in points allowed and turnover margin. The Spartans were either first or second in the WAC in all of those categories in 2008.

As the cornerbacks coach, Burns has mentored three NFL draft choices in the last two seasons. Cornerback Dwight Lowery became San Jose State's first two-time, first-team All-America player. Lowery, a 2008 fourth-round pick of the New York Jets, and Christopher Owens, a two-time All-WAC corner and 2009 third-round choice by Atlanta, teamed up in 2006 and

2007. Coye Francies, a 2009 sixth-round pick by the Cleveland Browns, replaced Lowery in 2008. Punter Waylon Prather and kicker Jared Strubeck earned All-WAC honors under his guidance in 2006.

In his 26th season as a football coach, Burns was the head coach at Tulsa (2000-02). His teams were the basis for Tulsa's 2003 Humanitarian Bowl appearance.

He has coordinated defenses at San Jose State, Arkansas, Southern California and Pacific. At Rice, he was the defensive pass coordinator. Burns also was the offensive coordinator at Pacific in 1988. In 1998, he was one of five finalists for the Frank Broyles Award - given annually to the nation's number-one assistant coach.

The native of Hurst, Texas, was a three-time letterwinner at Arkansas (1980-82). He and his wife, Yvonne, have three sons, K.C., Tanner and Davis. Tanner is a sophomore at San Jose State and a safety on the 2009 football team.

Kinji Green is in his fourth season as a member of the San Jose State University football coaching staff and his second year as defensive ends coach.

In his first season as a full-time assistant coach, he coached Carl Ihenacho to second-team All-WAC honors. His other starter at defensive end was Jeff Schweiger who went on to sign a free agent contract with the Denver Broncos.

One of the youngest full-time coaches in the Football Bowl Subdivision at age 26, he was a four-year starting defensive lineman at San Jose State (2002-05). As a senior, he was a co-captain, the team's Most Valuable Player and was a second team All-WAC selection. Originally, a walk-on offensive lineman in 2001, he received the Outstanding Scout Team award during his redshirt season.

He completed his college career playing in the 2006 Hula Bowl and went on to earn a spot on the San Jose SaberCats and the Chicago Rush practice rosters for the 2006 Arena Football League season.

Green returned to college football in the fall as an operations assistant at San Jose State. In 2007, he moved into coaching as the Spartans' graduate assistant working with the defense.

A member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), he accepted an invitation to participate in the 2007 AFCA Future Coaches Academy designed to assist recent graduates with the professional tools to pursue a coaching career.

The 2005 graduate majored in kinesiology. He was a four-time San Jose State University Scholar-Athlete and the program's first four-time WAC All-Academic team honoree. In addition, Green was a two-time CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII football selection in 2004 and 2005. Kinji, who oversees the team's academics progress, completed master's degree in kinesiology with an emphasis in exercise physiology in 2008.

Terry Malley Assistant Head Coach Offense/ Quarterbacks Coach



Terry Malley, regarded as one of the keenest offensive minds in Arena Football League history, returns to college coaching in 2009 as San Jose State University's assistant head coach for offense and quarterbacks coach.

Malley comes to San Jose State after spending 14 years with the San Jose SaberCats. In his nine seasons as the team's offensive coordinator, San Jose won four Arena Football League championships, led the league in scoring four times

and was second four other seasons. The 2007 San Jose team scored 1,012 points and averaged 63.2 points a game - the third highest scoring team in league history.

With 30 years of coaching experience, Malley's coaching roots are in the Bay Area. He began his coaching career in 1976 at San Jose's Leland High and spent two seasons (1978-79) at Moreau High in Hayward. In 1980, he joined his dad, head coach Pat Malley, as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Santa Clara University. He was named head coach in 1985 and led the Broncos to a 47-39-1 win-loss record over eight seasons. Six of his eight teams were nationally-ranked among NCAA Division II schools.

Malley coached 27 all-conference players including long-time National Football League pros Brent Jones, a standout tight end for the San Francisco 49ers, and two-time Pro Bowl punter Bryan Barker. He was the Western Football Conference Coach of the Year in his first season directing Santa Clara to an 8-2-1 record and a conference championship.

His first experience in professional football came in 1994 when he was named the Director of Football Operations for the SaberCats, an Arena Football League expansion franchise. Malley added the duties of General Manager in 1995. In 1999, he returned to the field as the offensive coordinator after a mid-season coaching change and retained his general manager responsibilities through 2006.

As a player, Malley was a quarterback, team captain and four-year letterwinner for Santa Clara during the 1972 through 1975 seasons. The 1976 Santa Clara University graduate majored in business management. He and his wife, Leslie, have three children - Christina and sons, Patrick and Ryan.

Ken Margerum Wide Receivers Coach/ Recruiting Coordinator



Ken Margerum, a coach at every level of organized football, is in his fifth season as a Spartan assistant coach and third as wide receivers coach. He also is the team's recruiting coordinator.

Five times in the last three seasons, San Jose State produced a wide receiver with at least 50 receptions and 800 receiving yards. Kevin Jurovich, now a senior, set a school single-season record in 2007 with 85 receptions for 1,183 yards. David Richmond, a 2009 Cincinnati Bengals free agent, did it twice.

In 2006, Margerum was the co-offensive coordinator and running backs coach. The top six backs each averaged at least 4.0 yards per carry and three-time All-WAC choice Yonus Davis became the program's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2000.

Following an All-American career at Stanford, Margerum became a third-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears. He was named to the league's 1981 All-Rookie team and was a member of Chicago's Super Bowl XX championship team. Margerum finished his career playing for the San Francisco 49ers (1986-87).

He joined the Spartans' staff after serving one season as the Stanford wide receivers coach (2004). He was the wide receivers coach at California (2000-01); the tight ends coach at Laney College (2002); the offensive coordinator for the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe (2003) and an assistant coach at Hawai'i (1996). The Claymores set a NFL Europe record for most yards per game (417.3) and averaged 30.3 points per game.

In 2009, Margerum was named to the 2010 Class of the College Football Hall of Fame. At Stanford, he was a two-time first-team All-America, three-time first-team All-Pac-10 and an academic All-America. For 25 years, he held the Pac-10's career record for touchdown receptions (32) and finished with 141 receptions for 2,430 yards. The two-sport star also clocked a collegiate best time of 14.3 in the 110-meter high hurdles and ran on the Cardinal's all-time best 4x100 meter relay team.

His wife, Joy, was an All-American in track and field at Cal State Hayward. They have two daughters, Sunny and Windy.

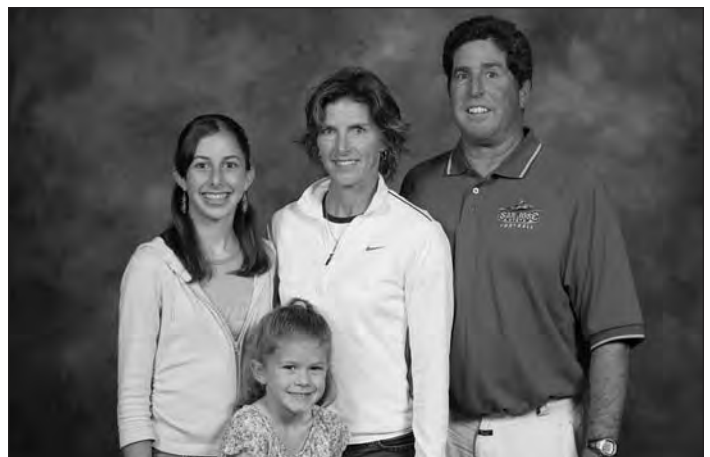

Steve Morton Offensive Coordinator/ Offensive Line Coach



Steve Morton is in his fifth season at San Jose State and his 35th season coaching at the major college level. Throughout his distinguished career, Morton has coached many players who realized success at the college level and enjoyed long NFL careers.

He returns in 2009 for his fourth season as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. Under his direction, the Spartans made numerous strides in total offense, points scored and, specifically, offensive line play.

Prior to his arrival, San Jose State allowed 29 sacks in 2004. The last four years, the Spartans surrendered an average of 20.25 sacks. Consistent blocking helped the Spartans produce their first 1,000-yard rusher since 2000 in 2006. Tackles Matt Cantu (2006) and John Booker (2007) became the team's first offensive linemen since 2003 to receive All-WAC recognition.



Morton began his coaching career in 1975 as a Washington State University graduate assistant. He was promoted to a full-time assistant coach at his alma mater in 1977 where he spent the next 10 seasons. Then, Morton moved to Iowa State University for five seasons (1987-91).

He returned to the Pac-10 in 1992, joining the University of Washington staff as offensive line coach. After seven seasons and five bowl appearances, he moved to the University of Southern California (1999-2000). He was at the University of Nevada (2001) before completing three seasons (2002-2004) as the Stanford University offensive line coach.

Morton has coached five Pac-10 Morris Trophy winners, signifying the conference's best lineman; four first-team All-America players, and NFL first-round draft choices Kwame Harris of Stanford and Lincoln Kennedy of Washington.

As a player, he was a center and offensive guard on the 1973 and 1974 Washington State teams. He graduated in 1977 as a physical education major.

Steve and his wife, Karen, have two adult children. Their son, Beau, lives in the Seattle area as does their daughter, Bethany, and son-in-law, Zechariah Bordon.

Charles Nash Running Backs Coach



Charles Nash enters his ninth season working with the San Jose State University football team. He is in his eighth season as running backs coach for the Spartans.

In 2006, Nash served as the assistant football strength and conditioning coach. At San Jose State, he has coached five All-WAC selections. Tyson Thompson played three seasons with the Dallas Cowboys. Deoncé Whitaker, San Jose State's career rushing leader, played two seasons in the Canadian Football League. Yonus Davis was a three-time all-conference back.

Nash joined the San Jose State staff in 2001 after coaching football and track and field and serving as a high school athletics director in the Los Angeles area. In 2000, his Inglewood High team set a state of California record rushing for 7,003 yards in 14 games. Nash also coached at Serra High in Gardena, Calif., Beverly Hills (Calif.) He and his wife, Shirley, are the parents of two adult children. Charles, Jr., a graduate of Northern Arizona University, earned his M.B.A. at NAU in May, 2009. Living in Tucson, Ariz., he is employed by Zimmer Holdings, Inc. Nadra, their daughter, earned a master's degree in biomedical science from Barry University in Miami Shores, Fla. She is currently employed as a toxicologist at the Broward County Medical Examiner's Office in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

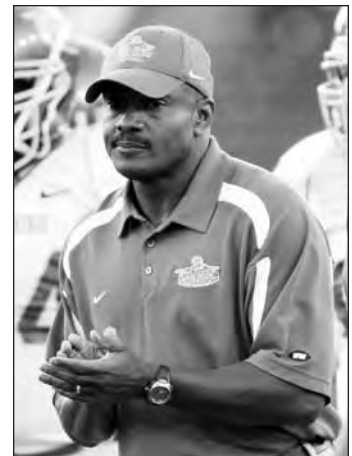

Joe Salave'a Defensive Line Coach



Joe Salave'a, one of American Samoa's foremost ambassadors promoting the game of American football, is in his second season as the San Jose State University defensive line coach.

Salave'a made an immediate impact in his first coaching venture after a noteworthy pro football career. In 2008, he was side-by-side with tackle Jarron Gilbert, the NCAA leader in tackles for loss and the first pick by the Chicago Bears in the 2009 NFL Draft.

Salave'a was recruited by head coach Dick Tomey in 1993 and played his college football at the University of Arizona. He became one of the mainstays of the Wildcats' defenses of the 1990's. An often immovable defensive tackle, Salave'a was a second team All-Pacific-10 Conference selection in 1996 and first-team choice in 1997. He was selected as a team captain and named his team's Most Valuable Player for the 1996 season. Salave'a has the unique distinction of being invited to both the East-West Shrine and Hula Bowl All-Star Games after his junior and senior seasons.

His NFL career spanned nine years (1998-2007) with four different teams and 100 games. Salave'a was a fourth pick (#107 overall) by Tennessee in 1998. He played four seasons with Tennessee and was a member of the Titans' Super Bowl XXXIV team that lost to St. Louis, 23-16. Salave'a spent the 2003 season with Baltimore and San Diego. His final three seasons were with the Washington Redskins.

He founded the Joe Salave'a Foundation in 2001. The foundation specializes in free football clinics for youngsters in American Samoa and Hawai'i. His work was recognized by Congressman Eni Faleomavaega in a 2005 White House ceremony hosted by President George W. Bush and celebrated Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month.

Salave'a is a 1997 graduate of the University of Arizona who majored in sociology. He and his wife, Josephine, have a daughter, Katalina Elizabeth, and a son, Joseph Fatuimoana, Jr.

Mayur Chaudhari is in his second season as a member of the San Jose State University football staff. In 2009, he is a graduate assistant who will coach the rover and bandit positions in the Spartans' defensive secondary. In his first season with the program, Chaudhari was an operations assistant.

The San Jose State graduate assistant is in his ninth season working in college football. His variety of experiences include being at UC Davis twice, Menlo College and Stanford University.

His trademarks as a player (2002-05) were his versatility and adaptability. He was a running back his first two seasons and a middle linebacker as a junior and a senior. Staples, who scored a touchdown against Washington on his first major-college rushing attempt, was the Spartans' 2002 Freshman of the Year. He was fifth on the 2003 team in pass receiving with 25 receptions.

As a linebacker, he was credited with 209 tackles and 11.0 tackles for loss in his two seasons in a starting role.

Staples, a 2005 co-captain, was second on the 2004 team in tackles and tops on the 2005 squad. His most amazing statistical performance came in the 2004 win over Rice in which he played more than 100 snaps and was credited with a game-high 24 tackles in a 70-63 victory. He concluded his career playing in the 2006 Hula Bowl All-Star Game.

The three-time academic All-Western Athletic Conference honoree is a member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). He participated in the 2008 AFCA Future Coaches Academy designed to assist recent graduates with the professional tools to pursue a coaching career. The Lynwood, Calif., native born on September 27, 1984, is a 2008 graduate and is pursuing his master's degree in kinesiology with an emphasis in sports management.

Season Outlook

The core of the 2009 San Jose State University football team is a group of 29 seniors; 15 of whom enjoyed immediate success as part of the school's first bowl-winning season of the decade. Now, as seniors, this core can play a significant role in a successful conclusion to their college football careers.

The challenges are many for this year's Spartans. There is the desire to erase the disappointment of losing the last three 2008 games to finish 6-6 and without a post-season bowl opportunity. A number of key players, five All-Western Athletic Conference selections last year including three 2009 National Football League draft choices, must be replaced. San Jose State faces a schedule that demands immediate attention and does not let up once Western Athletic Conference play begins.

After evaluating spring practice, head coach **Dick Tomey** determined there was more competition and at a higher level for spots on the depth chart since taking over in 2005. There are 53 returning letterwinners, the most the Spartans have had in many years.

"The fact that we have a large senior class and a large number of returning lettermen means we don't have to depend on newcomers nearly as much as our teams in the past. That will be a plus for us," says Tomey. "There's no question the experience level will be a big help."

DEFENSE

San Jose State has seven returning starters spread evenly front-to-back from last year's defense that was 21st nationally in total defense and tenth in the country in pass defense. Five of them were among the top eight tacklers on a hard-charging unit that was 11th nationally sacking the opposing team's quarterback.

Most prominent is **Carl Ihenacho** (6-3, 256, SR, 3V), a quiet terror at defensive end. Ihenacho ranked among the top-10 players nationally in quarterback sacks, tackles for loss and forced fumbles at different stages of the 2008 season. The second-team All-Western Athletic Conference selection is joined up front by three-year starter **Adonis Davis** (6-1, 295, SR, 3V) and **Kalvin Cressel** (6-4, 282, SR,

3V) at tackles and **Mohamed Marah** (6-0, 245, SR, 2V) at end. Cressel had his most effective spring at San Jose State and Marah has a permanent home after experiments at linebacker and fullback.

Sophomores **Pablo Garcia** (6-2, 290, SO, 1V) at tackle, and **Joe Nigos** (6-2, 260, SO, 1V) and **Vincent Abbott** (6-0, 230, SO, 1V) at ends played a lot after injuries began piling up in the defensive line. Their game experience along with the return of tackle **Justin Willis** (6-1, 290, JR, 2V), who redshirted the 2008 season, can be valuable for this year's squad.

Travis Jones (6-1, 230, SR, 3V), **Justin Cole** (6-3, 240, SR, 3V) and **Pompey Festejo** (6-0, 215, JR, 2V) form the basis of the linebacker group. Jones led the 2008 team with 72 tackles. Cole was a 2008 second-team All-WAC choice who can

play defensive end. Festejo may have been the team's most improved player in 2008 with his 49 tackles as a reserve and top special teams player. **Ryno Gonzalez** (6-1, 230, JR, 2V), a solid contributor as a freshman in 2006, is coming off a redshirt year and **Wade O'Neill** (6-1, 225, SO, 1V) seeks a breakthrough season.

For the first time since coming to San Jose State, Tomey is looking at a set of young cornerbacks eager to match a recent legacy of excellence. Dwight Lowery, Christopher Owens and Coye Francies now are in the National Football League. **Peyton Thompson** (5-11, 170, SO, 1V) and **Alex Germany** (5-9, 170, SO, 1V) top the opening fall depth chart at the cornerback spots. **Ralph Johnson** (5-10, 175, SO, 1V), **Austin Carter** (5-10, 170, SR, 2V) and junior college transfer **Brandon Driver** (6-0, 185, JR, JC) figure in the mix, too.

"We have people. It's a matter of baptism of fire. Peyton and Alex both did very well this spring and did well against an outstanding receiving corps in practice," the San Jose State head coach proclaims.

Another possibility at corner is safety **Devin Newsome** (5-10, 185, JR, 2V), who played as a cornerback his freshman season. Newsome and **Duke Ihenacho** (6-1, 210, JR, 2V), a first-team All-WAC pick and the conference leader in interceptions, both started in every game in 2008 and should be able to support the efforts of the cornerbacks playing in the secondary. **Tiuke Tuipulotu** (5-10, 195, SO, 1V) tops the depth chart at a third safety position. **Tanner Burns** (6-1, 185, SO, 1V) is capable of playing any of the safety positions.

For this year's defense to be better, it must stay strong in the fourth quarter. Despite a pair of fourth-quarter comeback wins a year ago, the Spartans allowed their opponents an average possession time of 8:06 and were outscored, 100 to 40, in the final 15 minutes.

"Defensively, we did a great job last year except against the run in the fourth quarter of the games we lost. You look at our numbers, we were one of the top-25 defenses in the country, but that's inconsistent with our fourth quarter performance," says Tomey.

OFFENSE

Equally important in 2009 is improvement from an offense that experienced its share of ups and downs. San Jose State had three different starters at quarterback, only one offensive lineman who started all 12 games at the same position and injuries at the wide receiver position.

"I see an improved running game. We have a veteran offensive line. The return of Patrick Perry is unexpected and most encouraging because he gives us a big back that can make you miss. Our receiver corps is healthy. We have a set of running backs that can be a plus. The competition at quarterback is the best we've had at this point in the season," says Tomey. "We must be a more tougher, more physical offensive football team."

Season Outlook

"We're going to play more than one quarterback early. In what form that will take will depend on what happens in practice. Kyle Reed is ahead a little bit, but it's close," the head coach says.

The San Jose State quarterback should benefit from the return of wide receivers **Kevin Jurovich** (6-0, 190, SR, 2V) and **Jalal Beauchman** (6-4, 220, JR, 2V). Between them, they have 142 career receptions and 11 touchdowns. **Terrance Williams** (6-5, 240, SR, 2V), third on last year's team with 22 catches, is moving to tight end. Youngsters **Michael Avila** (5-9, 175, SO, 1V), **Josh Harrison** (5-11, 170, SO, 1V) and **Khalil Paden** (6-1, 165, SO, 1V) benefited from the increased playing time as freshmen and hope to make a greater impact this season. **Ryan Otten** (6-5, 235, FR, RS) should be a big help at tight end.

The Spartans have six offensive linemen who have started at least 10 games at the major college level. **Ronnie Castillo** (6-0, 292, SR, 3V), who has started at guard and center, tops the depth chart at center with **Robbie Reed** (6-3, 290, JR, 2V) pushing for playing time. Right guard **Ailao Eliapo** (6-2, 320, JR, 2V) was the one San Jose State lineman to

start all 12 games at one position. **Isaac Leatiota** (6-4, 305, JR, 2V) has been the primary left guard the last two seasons. **John Konye** (6-4, 290, JR, 2V) and **Fred Koloto** (6-3, 290, SO, 1V) manned the left tackle position in 2008 and 2007, respectively. Either one could slide over to left guard. **Jon Moreno** (6-4, 285, SR, 1V) is the returning starter at right tackle and will be pushed by **Andres Vargas** (6-4, 305, SO, SQ)

Philip Zavala (6-1, 200, SR, 1V) is back for his second season as the punter. **Tyler Cope** (6-1, 180, SO, TR), a transfer from the University of Colorado, is the number-one placekicker. Freshman **Harrison Waid** (6-1, 175, FR, HS) joins the kicking competition in the fall.

"Brandon Rutley was one of the best kickoff return men in the country last year. He'll get better. Kevin Jurovich or Michael Avila will return punts. We'll have more experienced guys covering kicks this year by virtue of having so many lettermen."

San Jose State is the only FBS school to play two BCS winners from last season. USC, the Rose Bowl champion, and Utah, the Sugar Bowl winner, are the first two opponents. The Spartans' head coach is not deterred.































2008 in Review

UC Davis vs. San Jose State Spartan Stadium, San Jose, Calif. August 30, 2008 18,730 in attendance

San Jose, Calif.----The drama of the season-opener ended happily when wide receiver **Kevin Jurovich** cradled a 17-yard pass from quarterback **Kyle Reed** in the end zone with 0:08 left in the game giving San Jose State a 13-10 win over determined UC Davis.

The Spartans (1-0) needed a quarter to get their legs under themselves defensively and just over two quarters before the offense found its groove. UC Davis scored all of its points in the first quarter. The rest of the day, the Aggies mustered just three first downs and 122 yards of total offense.

Myles Eden started at quarterback for San Jose State. **Jordan La Secla** saw action in the first quarter. It wasn't until Reed entered the game in the third quarter that the Spartans moved the football.

Reed hooked up with wide receiver **Terrance Williams** on a fourth-and-goal, 3-yard pass play to get San Jose State on the score-board.

After stalling out on UC Davis' side of the field on their first two fourth-quarter possessions, the Spartans covered 64 yards on seven plays with a two-minute offense. On fourth down on the final play of the drive, Reed literally threaded a needle to find Jurovich in the front of the end zone for a touchdown and the eventual victory.

Lincoln, Neb.----San Jose State sensed it could pull off one of its biggest upsets in school history. After **Jared Strubeck** booted his second field goal of the game, the Spartans (1-1) trailed host Nebraska, 14-12, early in the fourth quarter.

However, Niles Paul took Strubeck's next kickoff, found a seam and raced 85-yards for the first of three fourth-quarter Huskers touchdowns in Nebraska's 35-12 win.

Boise, Idaho-----Myles Eden returned to the starting lineup as San Jose State's quarterback and directed the Spartans to a 30-24 win at Idaho.

For the first time since joining the Western Athletic Conference, the Spartans (6-3, 3-1 WAC) won three conference road games in a season. Eden had a lot to do with the outcome. Replacing a battered **Kyle Reed**, he threw two touchdown passes to wide receiver **David Richmond** and passed for 295 yards. Richmond finished with a season-best 138 yards of pass receiving.

As it turned out, San Jose State also needed a strong game from kicker **Jared Strubeck**. He delivered - making all three of his field goal tries and popped a pooch punt deep in Idaho territory giving the Spartans field position advantage.

After a second Eden-to-Richmond touchdown connection, San Jose State withstood two Idaho fourth-quarter scores for the win.

Western Athletic Conference

In its 48th year, the Western Athletic Conference continues to evolve and features some of the nation's best intercollegiate competition. One thing that remains unchanged is the persistent nature of the nine schools in the WAC to advance their programs to contend at the top levels of the NCAA.

The WAC provides its student-athletes the chance to travel to scenic destinations and gain exposure in some of the nation's most diverse markets. In addition, the WAC's student-athletes work to achieve the highest levels of success with the academic support of their respective institutions.

The WAC has experienced tremendous success. Since 2001, the WAC has sent 27 teams to bowl games. Hawai'i, in 2008, earning

a Sugar Bowl bid followed Boise State's unforgettable 2007 Fiesta Bowl victory as WAC representatives in BCS games.

The WAC has sent at least two teams to the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament in 23 of the past 26 seasons. Every current WAC school has competed in the NCAA Tournament since 1990. In baseball, the WAC boasts two national champions in the past six years.

In 2001, the WAC partnered with ESPN for coverage of football and basketball giving the conference national exposure. An extension was signed in 2008 that guarantees over 300 regular season WAC contests and 45 championship events will be aired on the ESPN networks through 2017. The WAC officially added WAC.tv in 2006 to give fans streaming internet access to many of its postseason championships.

The WAC is the sixth oldest among the nation's 11 Division I-A conferences. Its history traces back to July 27, 1962, when the original six-team league of Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New

Mexico, Utah and Wyoming began competition.

The first championship was held in November 1962, when Arizona won the men's cross country title and New Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona finished second in the NCAA College World Series and, less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series. Fresno State was the last WAC school to earn an NCAA team title when it won the College World Series in 2008.

Since 1962, changes have occurred. UTEP and Colorado State became members in September 1967. Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978. The WAC then added San Diego State (1978), Hawai'i (1979) and Air Force (1980). Before 1990, the WAC sponsored championships only in men's sports. However, a merger with the High

Country Athletic Conference formed a single conference under one administrative structure, and the 1990-91 athletic year was the first in which both men and

women competed under the WAC name.

Fresno State was added in 1992, and then in 1996, the women's programs from Air Force and Hawai'i along with six new schools (UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa) came into the WAC. Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, UNLV, New Mexico, San Diego State, Utah and Wyoming withdrew on June 30, 1999. Nevada (2000), Boise State (2001) and Louisiana Tech (2001) were added. TCU withdrew following the 2000-01 season. The current membership was established on July 1, 2005, when Idaho, New Mexico State and Utah State joined the WAC after Rice, SMU, UTEP and Tulsa withdrew.

Presently, the WAC crowns team and individual champions in 19 sports – eight men's and 11 women's. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field. Championships for women are held in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball,

San Jose State was scheduled to play two games in Hawaii to end the 1941 season. The Spartans were in Honolulu when the attack on Pearl Harbor occurred on December 7, 1941. Many players immediately joined the local police force or the armed services. The games against the University of Hawai'i on December 13 and Willamette College of Oregon on December 16 were cancelled.

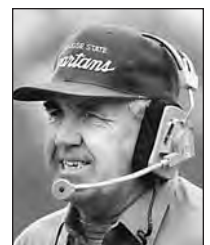

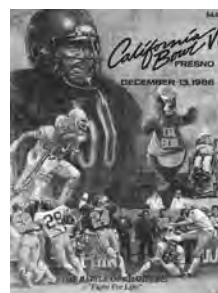

SAN JOSE STATE OVERCAME A DEFICIT OF 14 OR MORE POINTS TO WIN: San Jose State trailed Nevada, 24-10, in the second quarter and came back to win, 27-24, on November 24, 2007.

THE OPPONENT OVERCAME A DEFICIT OF 14 OR MORE POINTS TO WIN: San Jose State led Hawai'i, 35-21, in the fourth quarter, but lost, 42-35 in overtime, on October 12, 2007.

SAN JOSE STATE WON A GAME ON THE FINAL PLAY: Placekicker Nick Gilliam booted a 37-yard field goal as San Jose State defeated Illinois, 38-35, on September 21, 2002.

SAN JOSE STATE LOST A GAME ON THE FINAL PLAY: Boise State kicker Anthony Montgomery kicked a 37-yard field goal as the Broncos defeated the Spartans, 23-20, on November 11, 2006.

A SHUTOUT WAS RECORDED: San Jose State shut out Grambling State, 29-0, on August 23, 2003...**and by the opponent:** Louisiana Tech blanked the Spartans, 21-0, on November 8, 2008.

SAN JOSE STATE DEFEATED A NATIONALLY-RANKED OPPONENT: San Jose State defeated #9-ranked TCU, 27-24, in San Jose, on November 4, 2000.

THE SPARTANS PLAYED AN OVERTIME GAME: The Spartans lost to Hawai'i, 42-35, in one overtime on October 12, 2007.

THE SPARTANS HAD A WINNING SEASON: The Spartans had a 9-4 record in 2006.

THE SPARTANS WENT TO A BOWL GAME: The Spartans beat New Mexico, 20-12, in the New Mexico Bowl on December 23, 2006.

THE SPARTANS RECEIVED VOTES IN A NATIONALLY-RECOGNIZED FINAL POLL: The Spartans received one vote and tied for 32nd place in the Associated Press' final 2006 poll.



Spartan Stadium



The San Jose State University football team has played its home games in Spartan Stadium since 1933. The Spartans won the first football game played in the stadium, 44-0, over San Francisco State, on October 7. Since then, the Spartans have played 348 games over 73 seasons. The team's 100th win in the stadium came on October 21, 1967, against New Mexico, 52-14. The 200th victory occurred in the debut of head coach Dick Tomey in 2005. SJSU's home field record is 215-116-17 entering the 2009 season.

Spartan Stadium currently seats 30,456 for football. Every seat puts the spectator either close to or right on top of the action. Two stadium expansions and renovations in the 1980's increased the seating capacity from 18,000 to over 30,000.

A FieldTurf surface replaced natural grass after 75 seasons. Replacement began in December 2008 and installation was completed in May 2009.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, religious convocations, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium. The 1999 Women's World Cup and 1999 NCAA Women's College Cup soccer events attracted record-setting crowds.

Five Silicon Valley Football Classics were held in Spartan Stadium. Air Force in 2000, Michigan State in 2001, Fresno State in 2002, UCLA in 2003 and Northern Illinois in 2004 were bowl-game winners.

The largest attendance at a home football game was a 31,681 sellout crowd at the 2003 season-opening win over Grambling State. The game marked the first time under the current stadium configuration that San Jose State had a "sellout" prior to game day.

The largest crowd to attend any event in the stadium was estimated at 37,000 for a ZZ Top music concert.

San José State provides a comprehensive university education, granting bachelor's and master's degrees in 134 areas of study. From its beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, SJSU has matured into a metropolitan university. Quality teaching and small classes are a priority at SJSU, where tenured professors teach introductory as well as advanced courses.

One of the 200 top research universities in the nation, SJSU offers rigorous course work and research opportunities to more than 30,000 undergraduate and graduate students in eight colleges.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

Graduating about 7,000 students annually, San Jose State University also provides the professional infrastructure for the region – from teachers to social workers to artists to law enforcement officers to nurses. The terms, 'leaders and professionals,' describe not just the types of graduates who earn their degrees at San Jose State, but also the roles they assume in their communities and in their fields of endeavor.

One strength of the academic program is the broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism -- to diverse studies. Academic strength also is seen in the university's nationally-recognized programs.

In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach introductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning facilities include computer-equipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the NASA Ames Research Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.

San Jose State University also finds strength in its diversity. For first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Students range in age from first-time freshmen to college transfers to professionals seeking additional education. Student demographics – with ethnic pluralism – provide the benefits of multiple cultures and diverse student interests and activities.

Dr. Jon Whitmore University President



Dr. Jon Whitmore was named President of San Jose State University in April 2008 with a start date in August 2008.

Dr. Whitmore, whose Ph.D. is from the University of California, Santa Barbara in theatre history, returned to California after five years (2003-2008) as the Texas Tech University president and a professor of theatre.

His distinguished professional history in academia began in 1967 at Washington State University. Positions at Highline Community College in Seattle and the University of California preceded an 11-year tenure (1974-1985) at West Virginia University where he gained full professorship and was Interim Dean of the College of Creative Arts. Dr. Whitmore spent five years (1985-1990) at the University of Iowa as the Dean, Faculty of Arts and Letters and a professor of theatre.

He was the Dean of the College of Fine Arts, the Effie Marie Cain Regents Chair and a professor of theatre at the University of Texas (1990-1996) and the Provost and a professor of theatre at the University of Iowa (1996-2003).

The native of Seattle, Wash., earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in speech from Washington State University. He and his wife, Jennifer, have a son, Ian, enrolled at the University of Iowa, and daughter, Amy, enrolled at Vanderbilt University.

Tom Bowen, Director of Athletics

Tom Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of intercollegiate athletics on December 20, 2004. Under his leadership and with his vision for the department, San Jose State has established itself as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program with proven athletics and academic successes and financial advancements to his credit.

CULTURE OF CHAMPIONS

At the core of Bowen's mission for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community. To that end, the Notre Dame alum has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; initiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with the creation of Spartan Sports Properties.

Bowen has led the Spartan Foundation - the department's fund-raising component - through cyclical economic conditions to unprecedented development heights at the university. The Spartans have produced annual budget surpluses under his direction and have re-invested their gains back into their student-athletes and teams.

An integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and other campus extra-curricular activities. His initiatives and leadership foster energy department and university-wide. Athletics' increased visibility has coincided with record donations coming to the university, particularly in 2006-07.

Since taking over, San Jose State has more football wins in

the latest three-year period than any similar span since 1990-92. The 2006, 2007 and 2008 Spartans are the first three Spartan teams to post consecutive .500 or better records in the Western Athletic Conference football standings. In 2006, football capped its finest season in nearly two decades, posting a 9-4 overall record and capturing the New Mexico Bowl championship.

Athletics success extends beyond football in this 16-sports intercollegiate program. Baseball and women's golf, last spring, are the most recent teams to win a conference championship. Women's water polo is a consistent top-10 national program and had its best season in 2009. Women's swimming finished the 2008-09 season with the longest dual meet winning streak in Division I. Women's gymnastics is entrenched as a NCAA Regional Championship qualifying team. Men's basketball and men's soccer have produced measurable gains the last four years, particularly in conference competition.

Individually, Spartans have earned All-America honors in football, women's golf and women's water polo. San Jose State had its first women's gymnastics individual NCAA Regional champion in 2009. Twelve student-athletes were honored nationally and nearly another hundred at the conference level for academic achievements in 2008-09.



Bowen's vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a Student Success Services component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores, as measured by the NCAA, have risen steadily under his watch and were at a university best in the 2009 report.



Tom Bowen is a widely-known and highly-effective athletics administrator. He was named to the San Jose Mercury News' 2008 Top-25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in the Bay Area.

He has appointed new head coaches in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's golf, women's golf, women's swimming and diving, softball, women's softball, women's cross country and women's volleyball. Since 2005, coaches in baseball, women's golf, water polo and softball have received conference Coach of the Year recognition.

In 2008, San Jose State was named as one of 12 Division I universities cited for Overall Excellence in Diversity in the most recent national study by Texas A&M University on behalf of the NCAA.



Under Bowen's leadership, basketball is on the rise at San Jose State. The University is hosting 2010 NCAA Men's Basketball First and Second Round Regional games at the HP Pavilion.

A VALUED PROFESSIONAL

Bowen's proven record at San Jose State has resulted in meaningful national appointments in college athletics. He is one of eight Football Bowl Subdivision directors of athletics serving on the 24-

member NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee. In 2009, he was one of 12 named to serve as a mentor to aspiring women and ethnic minority athletics administrators in the NCAA Fellows Leadership Program.

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the Director of Community Affairs for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. He directed all of the team's fund-raising activities and was responsible for alumni and current player participation in the community. Also serving as the executive director of the 49ers Foundation, San Francisco was the first NFL franchise to implement an annual giving program.

His Division I experience at the collegiate level includes athletics administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. As an assistant and associate director of athletics at the University of California from July 2000 through September 2002, he was responsible for athletics fund-raising. Bowen was credited with developing the first comprehensive planned giving program for the Golden Bears.

At Saint Mary's College, he was the Director of Foundations and Corporate Relations from May 1995 to January 1997 before being appointed to an associate director of athletics position by the president of the college. His grant proposal

acumen helped raise \$6.1-million in academic funding for the institution. From January 1997 through April 2000, he managed the athletics department's budget, directed a corporate sponsorship program and interacted with the academic senate, faculty and university personnel on student-athlete issues.

His first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987 through 1995, he held the positions of athletics director and assistant football coach.

EDUCATION & COMMUNITY

He is a Level 2 certified member of the College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA) and has memberships in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the National Society of Fund Raising Executives.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame majored in theology/sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

An active member of the Bay Area community, he was named to the 2008 San Jose Mercury News' Top-25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in the Bay Area. He serves on the board of the San Jose Sports Authority. He is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management and at San Jose State University's Department of Kinesiology where he teaches sports management classes. Bowen is a frequent guest lecturer at several Bay Area university campuses and continues to speak before major corporations headquartered locally on the topics of leadership, management and motivation.

The Denver, Colo., native and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children: sons, Andrew and Peter, and, daughter, McKenna.

Stacy Martin Senior Associate Athletics Director

A San Jose State alumna, Stacy Martin was promoted to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director/Chief Operating Officer in June 2008. Martin also is the department's Senior Woman Administrator.

Having served the university in increasingly progressive and vital administrative roles, she previously was the Associate Athletics Director for Business and Finance. For three full years and part of a fourth, Martin had fiscal oversight for the department's \$20-million annual budget that includes 16 sports, 32 departments and 125 employees. Her business savvy and acumen have resulted in San Jose State finishing each of the last four academic years with a budget surplus – a university first.

Martin oversees future football scheduling and serves as a sports supervisor for baseball, softball, women's basketball, women's gymnastics and volleyball. In 2009, she was named the West Region Administrator of the Year by the women's gymnastics coaches in the Pacific and Mountain time zones.

Her professional career started as a San Jose State ticket office employee in 2002. She moved to the business office in January 2003 and was promoted to Athletics Business Manager in 2004. In 2006, she was named an associate athletics director.

Nationally respected, she is the second vice-president of CABMA (College Athletic Business Management Association) for 2009-10. She holds memberships in NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), Beta Gamma Sigma (International Honors society for studies in Business), WISC (Women In Sports Careers), NACWAA (National Association Of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators) and the Golden Key International Honor Society.

At the conference level, Martin is San Jose State's representative on the Western Athletic Conference finance, championships, gender equity and code book committees.

A four-time letterwinner and former captain of the Spartan women's gymnastics team, Martin has bachelor's and master's degrees from San Jose State University. The 2002 graduate majored in business administration and corporate financial management. She earned an M.B.A. in finance in 2005. While an undergraduate, Martin was recognized by "Who's Who Among Students" for her scholarship, leadership and service to the campus and community.

Additionally, Martin is a graduate of the Sports Management Institute – a collaboration of the Universities of Southern California, Texas, Michigan, Notre Dame and North Carolina. The Sports Management Institute provides a specialized executive management program for sports professionals.

John Poch returned to San Jose State University in January 2009 as a Senior Associate Athletics Director/Deputy Director of Athletics. His duties include overseeing and managing the department's external relations components of fund raising, licensing, branding, marketing, community relations and media relations.

Poch served as the Tournament Director of the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Women's College Cup hosted by San Jose State University and was an assistant coach for the Spartans' women's soccer team from 1995 to 2000. Under his direction, the 1999 College Cup attracted more than 28,000 spectators for two semifinal contests and the championship match. The 14,410 in attendance for the championship game remains the top attendance figure for a Women's College Cup contest.

As a San Jose State assistant coach, he was on the ground floor of the new Spartan program. In the first five seasons, San Jose State posted a 53-44-3 overall win-loss record and a 11-9-2 mark in Western Athletic Conference action.

Poch also was a successful youth soccer coach at the prep, club and Olympic Development levels. San Jose's Pioneer High School won three Central Coast Section championships in boys soccer. He was named the National Coach of the Year in 2001 by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) for the Youth Girls Competitive category.

From 2000 through 2008, he was the executive director of the After-School All-Stars of Greater San Jose – a program targeting at-risk youths. In his eight years, After-School All-Stars grew from a two-person staff with a \$275,000 annual operating budget to a full-time staff of 36 and 230 part-time employees and a \$3.9-million budget comprised largely of dollars raised through his fundraising acumen and direction. More than 3,000 students from 50-plus elementary and middle schools in San Jose benefited annually from After-School All-Stars when he elected to return to San Jose State athletics in an executive role.

He is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics) and remains well-connected in San Jose. He also serves on the board of directors for After-School All-Stars.

The 2001 San Jose State University graduate majored in kinesiology. As a student-athlete, he played football at West Valley College before enrolling at San Jose State. John and his wife, Debora, a 1988 San Jose University graduate, are the parents of one daughter, Nicole.



Liz Jarnigan Associate Athletics Director



Liz Jarnigan joined the San Jose State University staff in June 2008. Originally named the Director for Student-Athlete Success Services, she was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Student Services in June 2009. In her expanded role, she oversees compliance, academics, student services, life skills, student-athlete advising and tutoring and the assignment of learning specialists.

Jarnigan came to San Jose State from the University of Tulsa. She was the Coordinator of Student Services (2001-06) and an Associate Athletics Director for Student Services (2007-08). In 2003 and 2004, she was honored locally with the Tulsa Area Girls and Women in Sports Role Model Award.

Her professional career began at Briar Cliff College where she was an Assistant Athletics Director (1994-96) and Interim Director of Athletics (1996).

The 1987 graduate cum laude of St. Olaf College was a four-year letterwinner in volleyball. She received her master's degree in athletic administration from Fort Hays State University in 1988.

Jarnigan has high school and college teaching and coaching experiences in Minnesota, Iowa and Kansas. She was the women's volleyball head coach at Bethel College (1989-94), Briar Cliff College (1994-96) and Carleton College (1996-99). Her 1992 Bethel College was a conference champion and she was named the conference Coach of the Year for the team's accomplishment.

One half of a coaching family, her husband, Jeff Jarnigan, is a professional football coach. Most recently, he was the defensive coordinator for the San Jose SaberCats of the Arena Football League.

The Jarnigans are the parents of three children, Mary, Jack and Emily. They reside in Los Gatos, Calif.

Ken McDonald Associate Athletics Director



Ken McDonald, an administrator in the San Jose State Athletics Department since 2005, is Associate Athletics Director for Advancement and the Executive Director of the Spartan Foundation.

He originally joined the Spartans staff as an Assistant Athletics Director to head up corporate sales. In 2006, he shifted his focus to the Spartan Foundation - the fund raising arm for San Jose State University student-athlete scholarships. Faced with an economically-challenged environment, volunteer drive workers under his leadership still raised an unprecedented \$3.8-million plus over the last three years for the university's 400-plus member student-athlete population.

McDonald also has a history of successful revenue generation in the private sector. He was a development consultant for the Boys & Girls Club of Oakland, Calif. McDonald worked in sales, promotions and marketing for two Northern California-based brewing companies. He also was the founder and president of Gamut, Inc., a commercial construction company. More than \$3.0-million per year came into these companies as a result of his sales and fund-raising acumen.

The graduate of Stanford University majored in English and earned a master of science degree in wildland resource science from the University of California, Berkeley. While at Stanford, he played on the 1966 freshman football team and was a member of the 1970 national championship rugby team.

Press Box

The Spartan Stadium press box is located on the 7th Street side of the stadium and is an open-air facility. Carry a jacket with you. The press box remains open three hours after each contest.

Game Day Parking

Media parking is located in Lot 1, located on 7th and Humboldt streets. Media parking passes for home games are issued by the media relations office.

Photographers

Passes are issued to newspapers, wire services, video crews and team photographers. NCAA rules limit photographers to a wide area behind the restraining line around the playing field and outside the 25-yard lines.

Production truck and satellite uplink parking is on the 7th street side of the stadium. Arrangements must be made to park a truck overnight inside Spartan Stadium.
