With last year's number one and number two players gone from the team, the outlook for the San Jose State women's team may have been bleaker than the past...on paper that is. The reality of the situation is that John Dormann's squad banded together in a tighter, closer knit group and rallied with a more than respectable fall season to garner a #35 GolfStat national team ranking. Three of his top five players were ranked in GolfStat's national individual rankings.

"I'm pretty pleased with where we are after the fall considering that two of our five players had never played in a college tournament and one other played sparingly as a freshman last year," Dormann said. "Our performance has been steady, we've been competitive in every tournament and the attitude and general atmosphere of the team is very positive."

last year was a great accomplishment and when you have that kind of success, sometimes it becomes harder to repeat it," said the Spartans' head coach, now in his third full season. "She worked through some of that this fall and we need her to play as well as she's capable of playing.

"Katrina has been a huge surprise for us. She played worldwide as a junior golfer so I knew she wouldn't be awed by the environment of college golf, but she has played better than anticipated. Dana (Dormann) focused on her the first week of practice and you could see the ability was there. We asked if she was ready to get really good really fast. She said yes, worked on some minor swing changes and has been solid ever since. She has been able to process a great deal of information in a short-time."

Also contributing to the steady fall season were Cristina Corpus, Kanika Minocha and Kimberly Punyasavatsut.

Corpus, the 2007 WAC Freshman of the Year, is third on the team with an average of 75.75 in the fall. Her best individual finish was a 7th place, 221 total at the Ron Moore Intercollegiate that included a second-round, two-under par 70.

"Cristina has the potential to be a top-flight Division-I player," said Dormann. "Her ball striking has been excellent. It was her short-game and putting that let her down in the fall.

Atmosphere around this team will need to be positive as it is one of the smallest squads in recent memory. Just five players saw action in fall tournaments and the roster sports only seven for the year.

In the fall, Erica Moston, the returning Western Athletic Conference medalist, and Katrina Delen-Briones, a freshman walk-on from San Francisco, led the Spartans. Moston and Delen-Briones have identical scoring averages at 75.5 after the fall and have set the pace for the rest of the team.

"I think Erica put a little added pressure on herself to come out and be successful early on. Winning the WAC

We'll spend time working on that over the break."

Punyasavatsut played sparingly as a freshman, but worked hard on her fitness and conditioning.

"Kimberly is just scratching the surface of her potential," added Coach Dormann. "Our strength & conditioning program has really helped her, she's probably 15 yards longer off the tee. The one area of focus for Kimberly is learning to expect more of herself on the course. Once she gets that belief in her game, she will become a very good player for us."

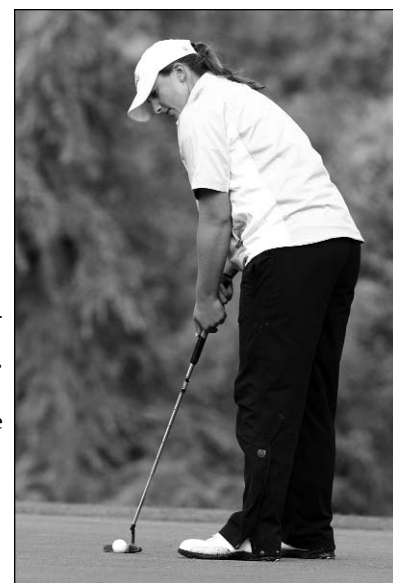
Perhaps the least experienced player in terms of competitive golf among the five players who competed in the fall is Minocha. The native of India is an excellent student, earning San Jose State Scholar-Athlete honors and is quickly adapting to playing at the Division-I level.

"Kanika is learning to be more competitive and is getting mentally stronger each tournament," said Dormann. "Physically she's a solid ball-striker and owns a decent short-game. For her it's a matter of gaining confidence and putting it all together at the same time."

A pair of freshmen, Ayla Friga and Jenny Kim, round out San Jose's roster of seven. Friga, a walk-on from Palmdale, Calif. is described as a "super athlete who is learning to play golf" by Dormann. Friga was a multi-sport athlete in high school with cross-country, track and golf on her athletics resume.

Kim is a skilled player with the ability to "string together some good rounds. She's very capable of playing at this level."

When tournament competition resumes in February, the Spartans have their sights on winning a second WAC championship in the last three years and an automatic NCAA Regional Championship berth. Moston, Corpus and Punyasavatsut were part of the 2007 team that was one stroke away from playing in the NCAA Championships. They'll take that memory with them throughout the remainder of the season with a goal of traveling to Albuquerque, N.M. for the 2008 NCAA Championships.

John Dormann Head Coach 10th Season at SJSU



Re-establishing one of the top golf programs in the country, John Dormann begins his third season as the San Jose State University women's golf head coach. Now in his tenth season affiliated with San Jose State golf, Dormann was the assistant for both the men's and women's teams from October 1998 through 2005 when he took over as the head coach for both teams. Dormann was named the women's head coach in April 2005.

As head coach, the Spartans played in the NCAA Regional Championships each of the last two seasons, won the 2006 Western Athletic Conference (WAC) Championship, captured four in-season tournament titles and been ranked in the top-30 of the GolfStat rankings. San Jose State has been a consistent threat at any tournament it has entered for top team honors since Dormann took over. The Spartans have placed in the top-three in 13 of 25 tournaments.

Dormann has recruited effectively and honed the games of young talents into tournament-proven skilled players. The 2006 WAC Coach of the Year has coached the last two conference tournament champions including Erica Moston, now in her junior season, and the last two WAC Freshmen of the Year including current sophomore Cristina Corpus. San Jose State players have received three first and five second-team all-conference honors with Dormann as head coach.

As the assistant coach for the men's and women's programs, the Spartans women's teams finished in the top-20 at the 1999 through 2001 NCAA Championships including a 15th place finish in 2000. San Jose State men's and women's golfers received All-Western Athletic Conference first or second-team recognition 24 times while he was the assistant coach. Ashley Gomes, a 2004 honorable mention All-American, was the 2004 WAC champion and "Player of the Year." In the classroom, Spartan golfers received 25 Academic All-WAC awards and 10 national awards for academic excellence from the Golf Coaches Association of America (GCAA) and the National Golf Coaches Association (NGCA) during his tenure as the Spartans' top assistant.

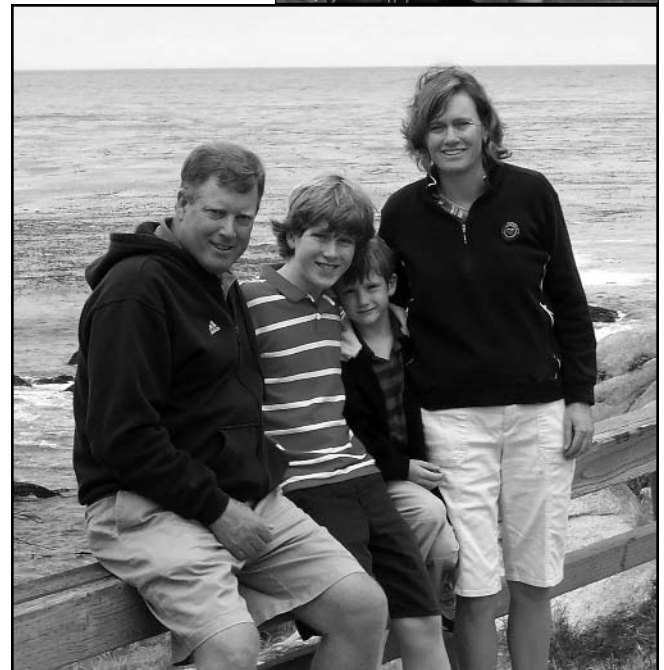
"In addition to building a national championship-caliber team, we want to develop a program and student-athletes that represent the best in San Jose and the university," says the Spartans' coach.

Before coming on board with the Spartans, Dormann was a professional caddy on the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) Tour. He worked for Meg Mallon, the 1991 LPGA Player of the Year and two-time U.S. Open champion, and his wife, Dana Dormann, when she, too, was one of the LPGA's top players of the 1990's. Though Dana no longer competes as a LPGA touring pro on a regular basis, the Dormanns have reunited as player and caddy at the last three U.S. Open Championships.

The native of Daly City, Calif., is a 1979 graduate of Riordan High School in San Francisco, Calif. A 1989 graduate of San Jose State, he majored in social studies. John and Dana Dormann have two sons, William and Jason, and reside in Pleasanton, Calif.

Dana Dormann Assistant Coach 4th Season at SJSU



Dana Dormann returns for her fourth season as an assistant women's golf coach. Dormann played on the San Jose State University women's golf teams during the 1985 through 1988 seasons. She was a member of the Spartans' 1987 NCAA Championship team. Dormann was a four-time tournament winner; the 1987 Pacific Coast Athletic Association "Player of the Year" and a three-time All-American. Her 76.46 stroke average for 141 rounds of college competition puts her in the top-10 all-time on the San Jose State list.

Dormann was the 1985 U.S. Junior and Junior World champion. The win at the U.S. Girls Junior Championship earned her an invitation to the 1986 U.S. Open. The native of Oxnard, Calif., began her professional career on the Women Professional Golfers' European Tour (WPGET). In her first LPGA event, the 1991 Oldsmobile LPGA Classic, she finished in second place. She won the 1992 Las Vegas LPGA International, birdieing her last hole, and won the 1993 McCall's LPGA Classic in Stratton Mountain, Vermont. Dormann was also a member of the 1992 and 1993 U.S. Nicheri Cup teams that competed against teams from Japan. She was the 1993 Most Valuable Golfer of the competition. Dormann still ranks #110 on the all-time LPGA money winning list.

She was one of five Spartan All-Americans to make the cut at the 2006 U.S. Open after qualifying for her 13th Open of her career. She won the 2005 LPGA T-and-CP Championship for teaching and club professionals. That win garnered her an invitation to the 2006 LPGA Championship. No longer active on the LPGA Tour, she is a teaching professional at the Pleasanton (Calif.) Golf Academy.

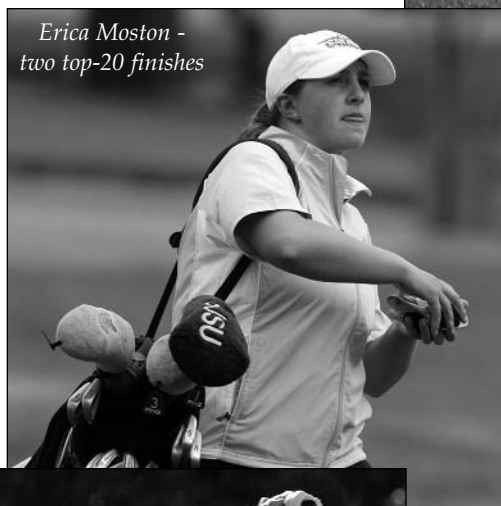

San José State University

Located at the core of Silicon Valley, San José State University is an exceptional place for hands-on learning, professional development and personal growth. Whether you are a graduate or a friend of the university, there are many reasons you can be proud of San José State. From an award-winning faculty and high-achieving students to cutting-edge programs and growing collaborations with the community and the corporate world, SJSU is on the move as it meets the challenges of the 21st century.

Known for the high quality of its academic programs, its excellent faculty (87 percent hold doctorates or the highest degrees in their academic disciplines), and its diverse and committed student body, San José State successfully educates students to compete in today's complex, high tech and global economy.

For the past six years, San José State has been ranked among the top ten masters-level public universities in the West by U.S. News & World Report's survey of "America's Best Colleges." In the 2006 survey, the College of Engineering is ranked 14th among the nation's Best Undergraduate Engineering Programs (in addition, electrical engineering ranks 11th; civil engineering, 16th; mechanical engineering, 16th).

San José State is the number one supplier of education, engineering, computer science and business graduates to Silicon Valley, the world's high tech capital. The oldest and one of the largest universities in the 23-campus California State University (CSU) system, SJSU attracts students from throughout California, the United States and 100 countries of the world.

Located in the nation's 10th and California's third largest city, San José State had a fall 2005 enrollment of 29,975 students. Approximately 75 percent of the students were undergraduates; 25 percent were graduate students. Almost 59 percent of the student population had an ethnic affiliation. More than 100 different languages are spoken on campus.

Founded in 1857, SJSU is the oldest public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its beginnings as a normal school to train teachers, the campus has matured into a comprehensive university offering 134 bachelors' and masters' degrees.

San José State is one of the largest public-sector employers in Silicon Valley, with about 2,500 full-time employees and an annual budget of \$472 million (2005-06).

Some 7,862 bachelors' and masters' degrees were awarded in 2005-06 — continuing to support the region by supplying Silicon Valley with more graduates at the baccalaureate and masters' levels than any other school in the nation.



Don W. Kassing President

Don W. Kassing was appointed president of San José State University, the oldest and one of the largest universities in the 23-campus California State University system, in May 2005.

Kassing has moved the university forward in several key areas. Under his leadership, the campus is engaged in university-wide

strategic planning, with the goal of making San José State University a university of choice by 2010. Since February 2006, he has accepted the three largest private donations to the university in its 150-year history.

As president and in his former role as vice president for administration and finance, Kassing led the development, construction and successful opening of two major campus facilities: the award-winning Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Library, based on a first-of-its-kind and highly successful partnership with the city of San José; and Campus Village, a state-of-the-art residence complex for students, faculty and staff, the largest such project in the California State University system, and the focus of a renewed sense of community on campus.

Before his appointment to the presidency, Kassing had served for more than a decade as vice president for administration and finance and as chief financial officer. As CFO, he had responsibility for all business and financial affairs of the university.

His previous 18 years of experience in higher education includes service as:

- * Vice President for University Relations and Administrative Services - Murray State University (Kentucky)
- * Vice President for Development and Public Affairs - Western State College of Colorado

From 1975 to 1986 he served at Belleville Area College, in Belleville, Illinois, where he taught management and marketing, served as department chair, and for two years was president of the Granite City Campus. Before that he worked for 11 years in private industry, including eight years in corporate finance and operations management for Brown Group Inc. and three years with General Motors Corporation.

Tom Bowen Athletics Director

Tom Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of intercollegiate athletics on December 20, 2004. Under his leadership and with his vision for the department, San Jose State has established itself as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program with proven athletic, academic and financial successes to his credit.

At the core of Bowen's mission for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community. To that end, the Notre Dame alum has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; initiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with Spartan Sports Properties.

As an integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and many other campus extra-curricular activities. His initiatives and leadership have created new energy department-wide and throughout the university. The university benefitted from Athletics' increasing visibility, receiving record donations during the 2006-07 time frame.

In 2006-07, football capped its finest season in nearly two decades, posting a 9-4 overall record and capturing the New Mexico Bowl championship. Women's cross country and women's water polo, ranked sixth nationally in the final coaches' poll, turned in their best record in years. There were All-American performances in football and women's water polo. Men's basketball, football, women's swimming, women's volleyball and women's water polo players competed in national team or individual national competitions. For the second year in a row, a San Jose State player won the Western Athletic Conference women's golf individual title.

In 2005-06, San Jose State won the WAC women's golf championship, recorded its highest finish ever at a NCAA regional championship in women's gymnastics, produced seven teams out of 16 with its best conference finish in years, and had WAC Coaches of the Year in women's golf and softball.

Bowen's vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a Student Success Services component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores as measured by the NCAA have risen dramatically under his watch – a 42-point increase since his installation as director.

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the Director of Community Affairs for the San Francisco 49ers. His Division I experience includes athletics administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame majored in theology/sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood. Bowen earned a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

An active member of the Bay Area community, he serves on the board of the San Jose Sports Authority. He is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management and at San Jose State's Department of Kinesiology. He is a frequent guest lecturer at several Bay Area university campuses.

The Denver, Colo., native and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children: sons, Andrew and Peter, and, daughter, McKenna.



Koret Athletic Training Center

The Koret Athletic Training Center

The Koret Athletic Training Center, opened in November 2001, is a state-of-the-art facility that encompasses over 10,000 square-feet of training space and is located adjacent to Spartan Stadium, the athletic locker rooms and the football practice field.

The Koret Athletic Training Center also contains a 1,000-square-foot rehabilitation and training room that services physical therapy and sports-specific rehabilitation. The facility enables the sports medicine staff of athletic trainers, doctors, and physical therapists to provide the best possible care to help prevent and rehabilitate injuries.

Our Philosophy

- We teach a hands-on approach where the student-athlete is expected to develop a comprehensive understanding of not only the How's, but also the Why's of our program.
- We teach correct movement patterns to optimize efficiency and performance.
- Our program design is centered on ground-based, free weight, multi-joint movements that will transfer to the playing field and keep our student-athletes out of our sports medicine facility.
- Our primary concern is the development of speed in all our sports.
- We develop speed and flexibility through strength.
- Our speed program consists of functional and straight-line speed training. Functional means acceleration, deceleration and change-of-direction work.
- We train through an entire range-of-motion in all lifts to enhance active flexibility, develop strength to prevent injury, and unlock joints with mobility issues.
- Olympic-based movements are utilized for speed of movement, active flexibility and dynamic stability.
- Squats and deadlifts have a permanent home in our program for developing hip strength and back stability. Single-leg variations are used to fix strength imbalance and lateral deficits.

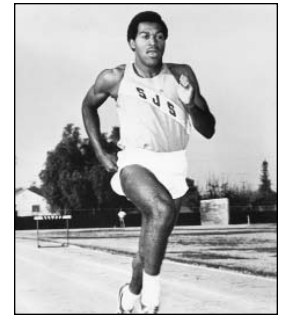

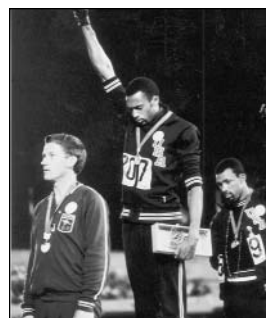

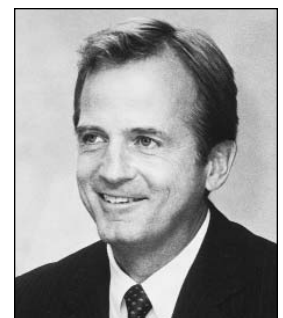

Lee Evans set a world and Olympic Games record winning the 400-meter dash at the 1968 Olympics.



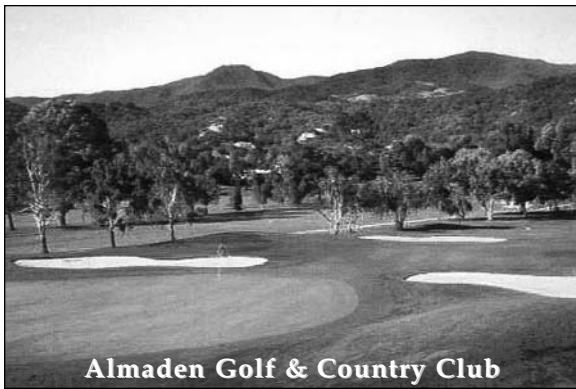

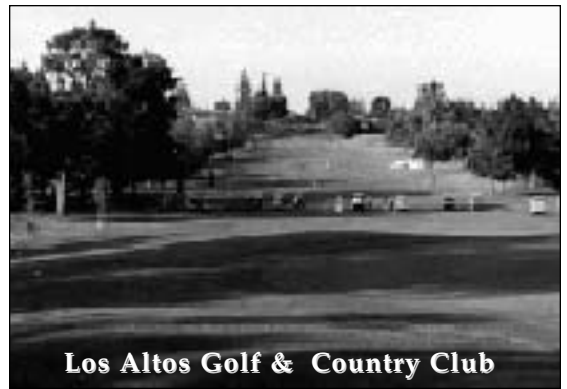

Los Altos Golf & Country Club

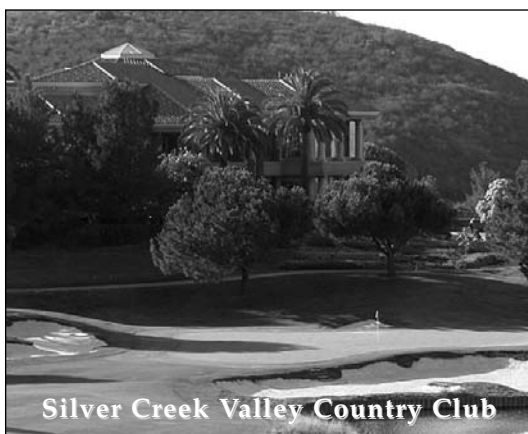
Los Altos Golf & Country Club, the home of Juli Inkster, is a premier facility 20 minutes from San Jose State.

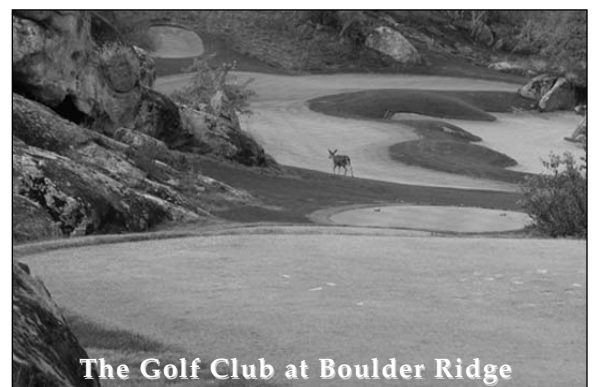
Coyote Creek Golf Club
