San José State University football's next era begins in 2013 with new head coach Ron Caragher taking the Spartans into their first season of Mountain West Conference action.

Coach Caragher brings a 44-22 head coaching record to San José State. The Spartans are back after an 11-2 win-loss record in 2012, finishing #24 in the final BCS standings, winning the Military Bowl, and ranking #21 in the final national polls.

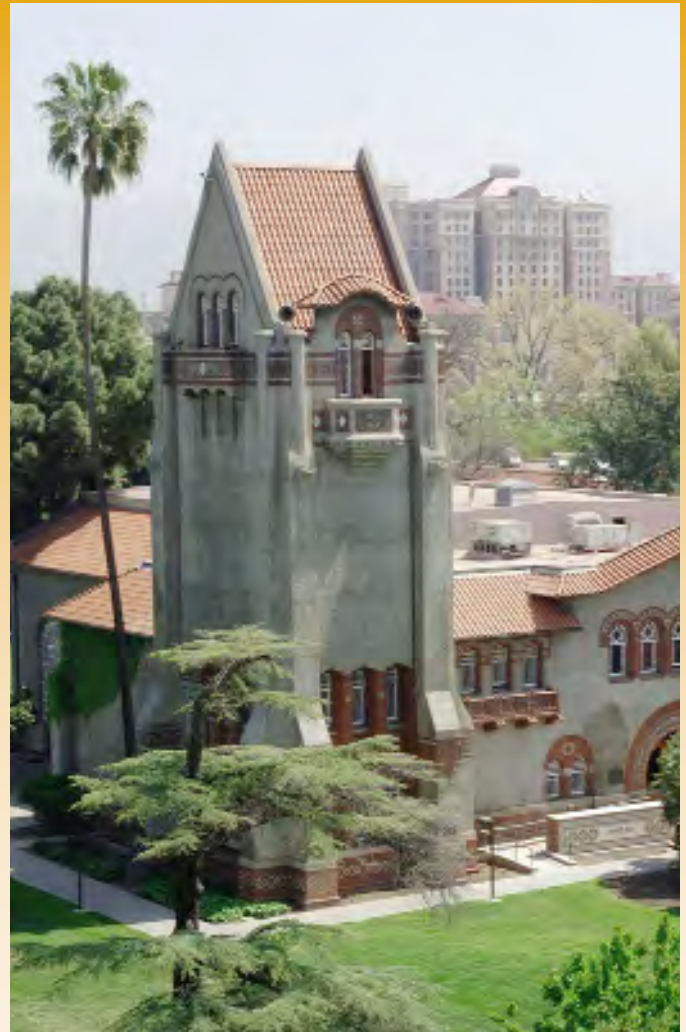

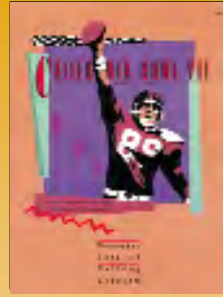




David Fales passed for 395 yards and two touchdowns leading San Jose State to victory and earning the 2012 Military Bowl Most Valuable Player award.

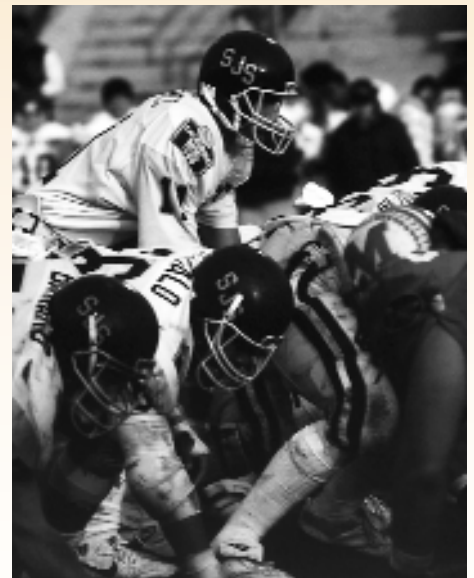

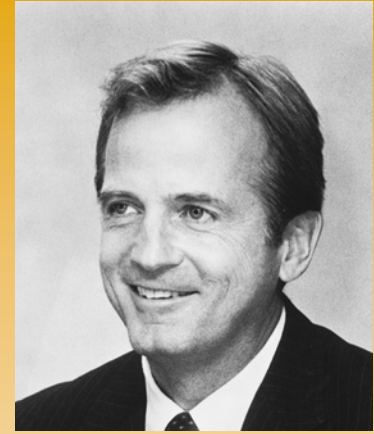
Success Stories

The Campus Village

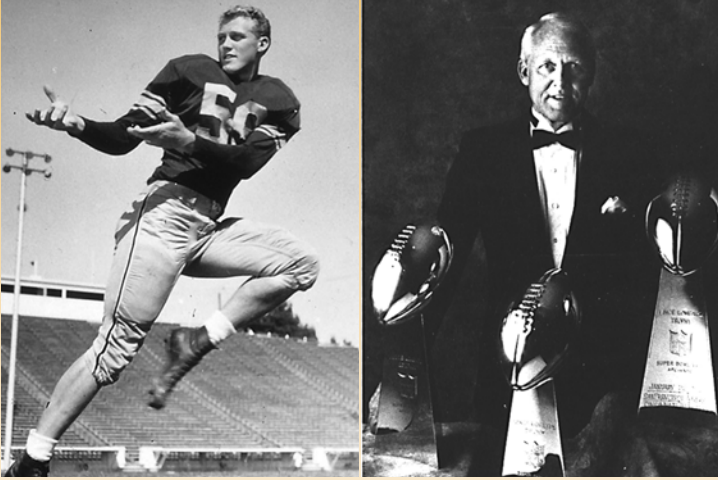

Success Stories



Bill Walsh was an end on the 1952 and 1953 Spartan teams. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from San Jose State. Walsh stayed intimately involved in football and became one of the game's most successful coaches leading the San Francisco 49ers to three Super Bowl victories in the 1980's. He is the only Spartan who is an inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



Tommie Smith (front) and John Carlos (back) played professional football after their days at San Jose State. The two world-class sprinters from the 1960's are best known for their actions on the Olympic Games victory stand following Smith's gold-medal performance in 1968. A statue commemorating their historic event is located on the university's main campus.

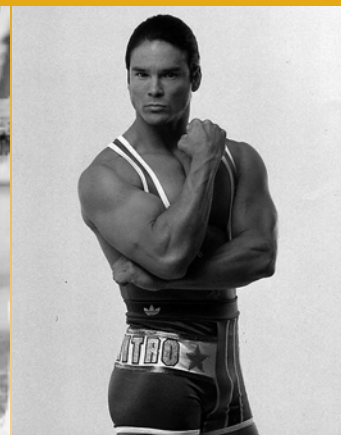


The Simpkins Stadium Center, home of Spartan football, is one of two San José State University Athletics facilities bearing the Simpkins family name.

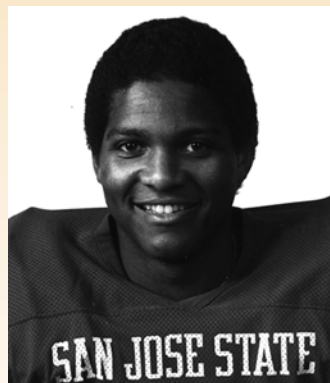

After leading teams to three conference co-championships in his first six seasons as a NCAA Division I head coach, Ron Caragher accepted the head football coaching position at San José State University in December 2012.

Caragher comes to San José State from the University of San Diego (USD). The Toreros compiled a 44-22 win-loss record and were the 2007, 2011 and 2012 Pioneer Football League co-champions.

Twice, in 2007 and 2011, he was a nominee for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award established by The Sports Network to recognize the top head coach in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS). After his third 9-2 win-loss season record at USD, he was named the 2011 Pioneer Football League Coach of the Year.

The new Spartans' coach agreed to a five-year contract with San José State.

"I'm very excited about the opportunity to lead the San José State football program. Having grown up in the San José area, I

understand the rich tradition of Spartan Football - it's lineage of great coaches, terrific teams, and outstanding players," says Caragher, who remembers watching San José State games in Spartan Stadium as a youngster.

San José State is Caragher's fourth university in a coaching career that includes six bowl appearances between 1994 and 2006. The 1990 UCLA graduate got his first taste of college coaching as a graduate assistant at his alma mater in 1994. He was promoted to a full-time assistant's position in 1996. In seven seasons with the Bruins, he coached wide receivers, punters and kickers.

Before accepting the University of San Diego head coaching position, Caragher worked four years as the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Kentucky. In 2006, the Wildcats posted an 8-5 record, was invited to a bowl game for the first time in seven years and concluded the season

A college quarterback, Caragher played on the 1985 through 1989 UCLA teams that won four consecutive bowl games including the 1986 Rose Bowl.

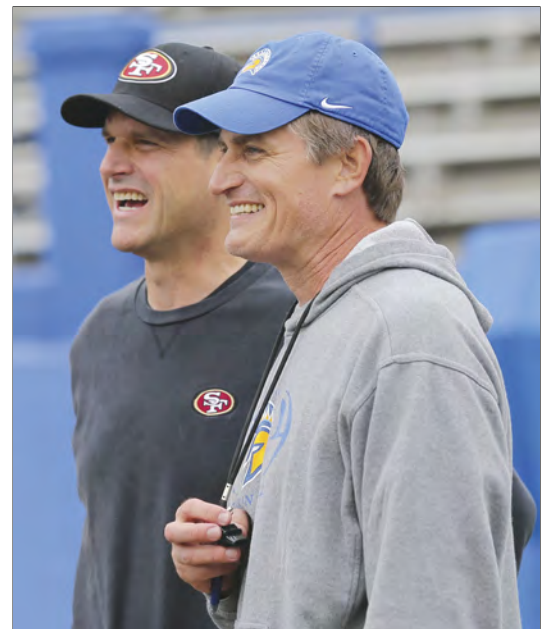

Jimmie Dougherty joined the San José State University football coaching staff in January 2013 as the Spartans' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Dougherty comes to San José State after spending the 2009 through 2012 seasons coaching wide receivers at the University of Washington. In his last three seasons with the Huskies, Washington participated in the 2010 Holiday, 2011 Alamo and 2012 Maaco Las Vegas Bowls. For 2012, Dougherty added the title of passing game coordinator.



The Spartans' new offensive coordinator re-unites with Caragher. The two worked together in 2007 and 2008 at USD. In all, Dougherty coached five seasons with the Toreros - the first three with current San Francisco 49ers head coach Jim Harbaugh. Dougherty's players included All-American and NCAA record-setting quarterback Josh Johnson and All-American wide receiver Mike Gasperson.

A quarterback at the University of Missouri during the 1997 through 2001 seasons, Dougherty began his coaching career at Illinois Wesleyan College in 2002 and was there two seasons coaching defensive backs.

The 2001 Missouri graduate majored in interdisciplinary studies. He earned his master's degree in sports management from Illinois State University in 2004.

He and his wife, Harper, have a daughter, Collins.

Hank Fraley became a member of the San José State football coaching staff in January 2013 as the Spartans offensive line coach.

Fraley comes to San José State after coaching the offensive linemen at the University of San Diego in 2012 where he produced three All-Pioneer Football League offensive linemen in his first season as a coach.



An All-American lineman at Robert Morris University, Fraley was in the middle of the Colonials' 1998 Sports Network Mid-Major Division I-AA national championship. He went on to a productive 11-year National Football League career as a center with the Philadelphia Eagles (2000-05), Cleveland Browns (2006-09) and the St. Louis Rams (2010). Over 142 games, he was a starter 124 times. Fraley was the Eagles' starting center in Super Bowl XXXIX and nine other NFL playoff games.

In 2003 and 2004, he was a National Football Conference alternate to the Pro Bowl. He was named a team captain for the 2007 and 2008 Cleveland Browns.

Fraley was enshrined in the Robert Morris University Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006 and the Northeast Conference Hall of Fame in 2010. The native of Gaithersburg, Md., had his jersey number, 75, retired by Robert Morris in 2001.

The first Robert Morris University player to play in a Super Bowl earned his bachelor's degree majoring in organizational leadership.

He and his wife, Danielle, are the parents of four sons – Trent, Mason, Travis and Beau.

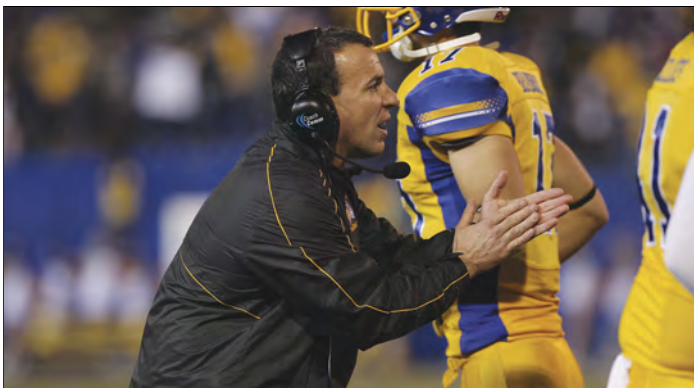


COACHING STAFF



Fred Guidici is in his second season as a member of the San José State University football coaching staff. In 2013, he will coordinate all of the Spartans' special teams units.

Guidici joined the San José State University staff in March 2012 as the special teams coordinator and running backs coach. The Spartans produced effective special teams in many respects setting a single-season school record for kick-scoring points, producing the program's highest percentage of field goals made in a season, scoring points on punt defense and tying the San José State record for kickoff returned for a touchdown. He also coached the Spartans' first 1,000-yard rusher in six seasons, De'Leon Eskridge, and mentored two of his senior running backs to National Football League free agent opportunities.



A long-time Bay Area resident, Guidici returned to his alma mater after a 16-year career at Menlo College in nearby Atherton, Calif., with three seasons as the Oaks' head coach. The 2011 Menlo squad was the school's first in eight years to post a .500 or better win-loss record.

The 1989 San José State graduate has more than 20 years of professional and college coaching experience. He coached at Santa Clara University for three seasons (1990-92), Stanford University for two seasons (1993-94) and at Menlo College (1996-2011). Guidici worked with current San José State wide receivers coach Terry Malley at Santa Clara and the late Bill Walsh as a defensive assistant coach.

Joining the staff in January 2013, most recently, he was the defensive line coach and special teams coordinator at the University of Northern Colorado in 2011 and 2012.

Jones also coached at Dartmouth (2005, 2008-10), Kentucky State (2007), Kansas State (2006), Prairie View A&M (2004), Texas Southern (1996 as a student assistant, 2003), Wagner (2000-02), Cornell (1999), Morehouse (1998) and Bowling Green (1997 as a graduate assistant).



Besides coaching defensive linemen, Jones was a defensive coordinator at Prairie View A&M and Wagner and a special teams coordinator at Northern Colorado, Kentucky State and Cornell.

Jones completed National Football League coaching internships with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2005 and the Seattle Seahawks in 2010.

ESPY Award winner Greg Lewis joined the San José State University football coaching staff in January 2013. He will be coaching the wide receivers.

Following eight seasons as a player in the National Football League, Lewis began his coaching career in 2012 as a summer intern with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Lewis also joined Ron Caragher's University of San Diego staff as the Toreros' wide receivers coach for the 2012 college season. In his first season of coaching, his three leading receivers combined for 144 receptions and 15 of the Toreros' 20 touch-down receptions on a team that produced an 8-3 win-loss record.



Lewis was a wide receiver for the Philadelphia Eagles (2003-08) and the Minnesota Vikings (2009-10). During his NFL career, he caught 152 passes for 1,992 yards and eight touchdowns. His most productive season was in 2005 when he caught 48 passes for 561 yards.

The native of Chicago won a 2010 ESPY for his September 27, 2009 game-winning touchdown reception with two seconds remaining in the Minnesota Vikings' 27-24 comeback win over the San Francisco 49ers. He shared the award for Best Play with quarterback Brett Favre who delivered the pass to Lewis in the back of the end zone.

The 2002 University of Illinois graduate played the 1999 through 2002 seasons for the Fight Illini. His 103 receptions ranked eighth on the University's career receiving list at the completion of his college career. His 1,456 receiving yards was 10th best at Illinois heading into the 2012 season.

Terry Malley is in his fifth season on the San José State University football coaching staff. In 2013, he will be the tight ends coach and serve as the team's recruiting coordinator. He previously coached the Spartan quarterbacks, running backs and wide receivers in his first four seasons.

Last year, his wide receivers caught 236 passes - the third year in a row the position produced at least 200 receptions. All-WAC honorees Noel Grigsby and Chandler

Jones were named to the Biletnikoff and Paul Hornung Award Watch Lists, respectively. To date, his players earned three all-conference honors, one freshman honorable mention All-America recognition and set seven San José State single-season and career records.

Malley came to the Spartans after spending 14 seasons with the San José SaberCats where he was regarded as one of the keenest offensive minds in Arena Football League history. In his nine seasons as the team's offensive coordinator, San José won three Arena Football League championships, led the league in scoring four times and was second four other seasons.

With 34 years of coaching experience, Malley's coaching roots are in the Bay Area. Two-year stints at San José's Leland High (1976-77) and Moreau High in Hayward (1978-79) preceded five seasons (1980-84) as an assistant coach for legendary coach Pat Malley, his dad, at Santa Clara University, his alma mater. Terry was named head coach in 1985 and led the Broncos to a 47-39-1 win-loss record over eight seasons. Six of his eight teams were nationally-ranked among NCAA Division II schools.

Malley coached 27 all-conference players including long-time National Football League pros Brent Jones, a standout tight end for the San Francisco 49ers, and two-time Pro Bowl punter Bryan Barker. He was the Western Football Conference Coach of the Year in his first season directing Santa Clara to an 8-2-1 record and a conference championship.

His first experience in professional football came in 1994 when he was named the Director of Football Operations for the SaberCats, an Arena Football League expansion franchise. Malley added the duties of General Manager in 1995. In 1999, he returned to the field as the offensive coordinator after a mid-season coaching change and retained his general manager responsibilities through 2006.

As a player, Malley was a quarterback, team captain and four-year letterwinner for Santa Clara during the 1972 through 1975 seasons. The 1976 Santa Clara University graduate majored in business management. He and his wife, Leslie, have three children - Christina and sons, Patrick and Ryan.

Joe Staab joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in January 2013 as the safeties coach.

Staab brings four seasons of coaching experience - all with current head Ron Caragher - at the University of San Diego to the Spartans. He coached the safeties and was the recruiting coordinator the last three seasons (2010-12). In his first season, he assisted coaching the defensive backs and special teams. Kenwick Thompson returned to the San José State University football coaching staff in January 2013 as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

Neil Parry, one of the most inspirational football players of his generation, is in his second season as a San José State University as a graduate assistant. In 2013, he will be working primarily with the linebackers.

Parry finished the 2003 season playing in eight games and was named a team captain for the second time in his career. He is only one of five San José State players to be named or elected a team captain more than once. Parry's final college football game was in the 2004 East-West Shrine All-Star Game.

As a student, he was greeted personally by United States Presidents Bill Clinton in 2000 and George W. Bush in 2003.

His comeback story earned him a 2004 ESPY nomination. Parry was the recipient of the 2003 Disney Spirit Award at the annual ESPN College Football Awards Show. Other awards include the Gene Autry Courage in Sports Award from the Tempe (Ariz.) Sports Authority, the first Most Inspirational Award from the New Orleans Bowl, an Arete Award for Courage in Sports, a Jim Valvano Don't Ever Give Up Award from the V Foundation and a Most Inspirational Athlete of the Year Award from the Philadelphia Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association.

He and his wife, Rougeyar, are the parents of two children, Leonidas, Klanoosh and Valentina.

McMillan came to San José State after one year as the Head Equipment Manager at Fordham University where he serviced a 20-sport, 500 student-athlete NCAA Division I program.

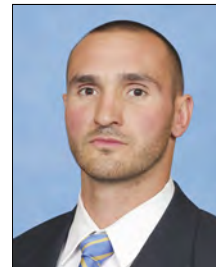

He began his career in equipment services at Wagner in 2009. As the Head Football Equipment Manager, he serviced 130 student-athletes and a coaching staff for two seasons.

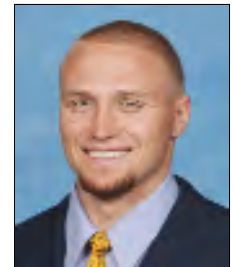

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its 15th year, the MW has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements over its first 14 years of existence, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system, and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, respectively, while Fresno State, San Diego State and San José State add a West coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean.

in four BCS bowl games, winning three. Additionally, the Mountain West was the first conference to have a member institution with No. 1 overall picks in both the NFL and NBA drafts in the same year (Utah's Alex Smith and Andrew Bogut, respectively in 2005). With San Diego State's Stephen Strasburg claiming the No. 1 pick in the 2009 MLB Draft, the Mountain West is one of two conferences to have the No. 1 selection in each of the NFL, NBA and MLB drafts since the MW was founded in 1999. In 2011-12, the Mountain West was among the first conferences to implement a league-wide state-of-the-art basketball instant replay system.

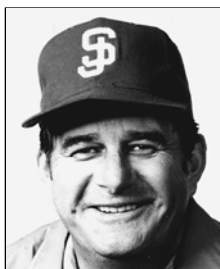

San José State was scheduled to play two games in Hawaii to end the 1941 season. The Spartans were in Honolulu when the attack on Pearl Harbor occurred on December 7, 1941. Many players immediately joined the local police force or the armed services. The games against the University of Hawai'i on December 13 and Willamette College of Oregon on December 16 were cancelled.



Did You Know?

In 1981 and 1987, San José State was the "mythical champion" of the San Francisco Bay Area. The Spartans defeated both California and Stanford in those two seasons.

A MODERN-ERA SPARTAN PLAYED IN 50 GAMES IN A CAREER:

Dominique Hunsucker played in 53 games during the 2006 through 2010 seasons. Hunsucker's 50th game was on October 30, 2010 at New Mexico State.

A PLAYER RUSHED FOR 200 OR MORE YARDS IN A GAME: Harry Beck rushed for 209 yards versus Santa Clara on October 7, 1950... **and by the opponent:** Dick Bass of the College of the Pacific rushed for 226 yards on November 8, 1958.

A SPARTAN RUSHED FOR 1,000 OR MORE YARDS IN A SEASON: Rick Kane rushed for 1,144 yards and seven touchdowns on 210 carries in 1975.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 10 OR MORE PASSES IN A GAME: Steve Cox caught 10 passes for 137 yards at Stanford on September 17, 1966.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 50 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Steve Cox caught 54 passes for 653 yards and three touchdowns in 1966.

THREE SPARTANS CAUGHT 50 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Guy Liggins (72), Lafo Malauulu (56) and Kenny Jackson (51) had at least 50 receptions in 1986 regular-season play.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 80 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Edell Shepherd caught 83 passes for 1,500 yards and 14 touchdowns in 2001.

A SPARTAN RUSHED FOR 100 OR MORE YARDS AND GAINED 100 OR MORE YARDS RECEIVING IN A GAME: Brandon Rutley rushed for 132 yards and two touchdowns and caught eight passes for 101 yards in the 27-24 win over Navy on November 19, 2011.

A SPARTAN RUSHED FOR 1,000 OR MORE YARDS AND CAUGHT 50 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Gerald Willhite rushed for 1,210 yards and caught 55 passes in 1980. Willhite was the second player in NCAA history to rush for at least 1,000 yards and catch 50 or passes in a season and did it in 1981, too.

A SPARTAN PASSED FOR 400 OR MORE YARDS IN A GAME: Steve DeBerg threw for 404 yards at the

University of the Pacific in a 50-30 win on November 13, 1976.

A SPARTAN PASSED FOR 3,000 OR MORE YARDS IN A SEASON: Ed Luther threw for 3,049 yards and 20 touchdowns in 11 games in 1979.

A SPARTAN THREW FIVE OR MORE TOUCHDOWN PASSES IN A GAME: Steve Clarkson threw six touchdowns in the 65-33 win at Fresno State on October 3, 1981.

A SPARTAN THREW 50 OR MORE TOUCHDOWN PASSES IN A CAREER: Craig Kimball threw 50 touchdown passes during the 1972 through 1974 seasons.

A SPARTAN COMPLETED AT LEAST 60 PERCENT OF HIS PASSES IN A SEASON: Danny Holman completed 61.5 percent (160-of-260) of his passes in the 1966 season.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 100 OR MORE PASSES IN A CAREER: Ike McBee caught 106 passes for 1,571 yards and eight TDs from 1972 through 1974.

TWO CONSECUTIVE SAN JOSÉ STATE TOUCHDOWNS WERE ON PLAYS OF 90 OR MORE YARDS: In the September 18, 2003 game with Nevada, Gerald Jones returned an interception 99 yards at the end of the second quarter. The first time San José State gained possession in the second half, Trestin George returned the kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown in a 42-30 loss.

SAN JOSÉ STATE SCORED A DEFENSIVE EXTRA POINT: San José State earned two points when Duke Ihenacho picked up a blocked PAT and ran into the end zone in the 28-27 win over Hawai'i on October 14, 2011.

SAN JOSÉ STATE PLAYED IN AN OVERTIME GAME: San José State defeated UNLV, 55-48, on November 2, 1997.

SAN JOSÉ STATE FINISHED A SEASON RANKED IN THE BCS STANDINGS: San José State was listed 24th in the 2012 Bowl Championship Series standings.

SAN JOSÉ STATE FINISHED A SEASON RANKED IN THE NATIONAL POLLS: San José State was ranked 21st in the final 2012 Associated Press and USA Today/ESPN coaches polls.

A BLOCKED PUNT RESULTED IN A SPARTAN TOUCHDOWN: Patrick Perry blocked a punt and Jeff Clark picked up the loose ball and returned it 2 yards in the fourth quarter of the Spartans' 31-21 win at New Mexico State on November 4, 2006.

A FUMBLE RESULTED IN AN OPPONENT TOUCHDOWN: UTSA's Steven Kurfels picked up a San José State fumble and ran 50 yards for a touchdown, but the Spartans defeated the Roadrunners, 52-24, on October 20, 2012.

A PLAYER SCORED THREE OR MORE TOUCHDOWNS IN A GAME: De'Leon Eskridge rushed for three touchdowns in a 52-43 win over Louisiana Tech on November 24, 2012...**and by the opponent:** Utah State's Kerwynn Williams rushed for three touchdowns in a 49-27 win over San José State on October 13, 2012.

A SPARTAN SAFETY WAS SCORED: San José State scored a safety when Bené Benwikere blocked a punt by Bowling Green punter Brian Schmiedebusch out of the end zone in a 29-20 win in the Military Bowl on December 27, 2012.

AN OPPONENT SAFETY WAS SCORED: Brigham Young scored a safety when quarterback Matt Faulkner was tackled in the end zone in the Spartans' 29-16 loss to BYU on October 8, 2010.

TWO BROTHERS SCORED IN THE SAME SAN JOSÉ STATE GAME: James Callier, Jr., caught a 2-point conversion pass and James T. Callier caught an 8-yard touchdown pass in the Spartans' 31-21 win at New Mexico State on November 4, 2006.

A PLAYER KICKED THREE OR MORE FIELD GOALS: Austin Lopez kicked field goals of 29, 19, 32 and 43 yards in a 12-0 win at Navy on September 29, 2012...**and by the opponent:** Trey Farquhar kicked field goals of 23, 52 and 26 yards as Idaho defeated the Spartans, 29-25, on October 10, 2009.

A SPARTAN LED THE NATION IN A STATISTICAL CATEGORY AT THE END OF A SEASON: Jarron Gilbert was the national leader in tackles for loss average in 2008. He averaged 1.81 tackles for loss per game and had 22.0 in 2008.

A DEFENSIVE EXTRA-POINT WAS SCORED IN A SAN JOSÉ STATE GAME: San José State scored a defensive extra point when Travis Johnson blocked a fourth-quarter Hawai'i extra-point kick attempt and teammate Duke Ihenacho ran with the loose ball into the end zone in the 28-27 Spartan win on October 14, 2011.



Nick Gilliam made a 37-yard field goal on the final play of the game in San José State's 38-35 victory over Illinois in 2002.

MORE THAN 60 POINTS WERE SCORED BY ONE TEAM: The Spartans scored 70 points in the 70-63 win over Rice on October 2, 2004...**and by the opponent:** Nevada scored 62 points in a 62-7 victory over San José State on November 8, 2009.

MORE THAN 100 POINTS WERE SCORED IN A SAN JOSÉ STATE GAME: San José State and Rice combined for a then-NCAA-record 133 points in a 70-63 Spartan victory on October 2, 2004. There are eight times in school history in which 100 or more points were scored in a football game.

SAN JOSÉ STATE SCORED 28 OR MORE POINTS IN A QUARTER: The Spartans scored 28 points in the first quarter of the 52-24 win over UTSA on October 20, 2012.

THE OPPONENT SCORED 28 OR MORE POINTS IN A QUARTER: Utah scored 28 points in the second quarter of a 56-3 win over the Spartans on September 25, 2010.

SAN JOSÉ STATE OVERCAME A DEFICIT OF 14 OR MORE POINTS TO WIN: San José State trailed Nevada, 24-10, in the second quarter and came back to win, 27-24, on November 24, 2007.

THE OPPONENT OVERCAME A DEFICIT OF 14 OR MORE POINTS TO WIN: San José State led Idaho, 20-0, in the second quarter, but lost, 32-29, on November 5, 2011.

SAN JOSÉ STATE WON A GAME ON THE FINAL PLAY: Placekicker Nick Gilliam booted a 37-yard field goal as San José State defeated Illinois, 38-35, on September 21, 2002.

SAN JOSÉ STATE LOST A GAME ON THE FINAL PLAY: New Mexico State wide receiver Taveon Rogers caught an 8-yard pass from quarterback Matt Christian as the Aggies defeated the Spartans, 29-27, on October 30, 2010.

A SHUTOUT WAS RECORDED: San José State shut out Navy, 12-0, on September 29, 2012...**and by the opponent:** Boise State blanked the Spartans, 48-0, on October 16, 2010.

SAN JOSÉ STATE DEFEATED A NATIONALLY-RANKED OPPONENT: San José State defeated #9-ranked TCU, 27-24, in San José, on November 4, 2000.

THE SPARTANS PLAYED AN OVERTIME GAME: The Spartans lost to Idaho, 26-23, in one overtime on December 4, 2010.

THE SPARTANS HAD A WINNING SEASON: The Spartans had an 11-2 record in 2012.

THE SPARTANS WENT TO A BOWL GAME: The Spartans beat Bowling Green, 29-20, in the Military Bowl on December 27, 2012.



SPARTAN STADIUM



The San José State University football team has played its home games in Spartan Stadium since 1933. The Spartans won the first football game played in the stadium, 44-0, over San Francisco State, on October 7. Since then, the Spartans have played 371 games over 77 seasons. The team's 100th win in the stadium came on October 21, 1967, against New Mexico, 52-14. The 200th victory occurred in 2005. SJSU's home field record is 226-129-17 entering the 2013 season.

Spartan Stadium currently seats 30,456 for football. Every seat puts the spectator either close to or right on top of the action. Two stadium expansions and renovations in the 1980's increased the seating capacity from 18,000 to over 30,000.

A FieldTurf surface replaced natural grass in 2009. Two new scoreboards - one on the East side and a state-of-the-art videoboard were installed in 2011.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, religious convocations, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.

Five Silicon Valley Football Classics were held in Spartan Stadium. Air Force in 2000, Michigan State in 2001, Fresno State in 2002, UCLA in 2003 and Northern Illinois in 2004 were bowl-game winners. The 1999 Women's World Cup and 1999 NCAA Women's College Cup soccer events attracted record-setting crowds.

The largest attendance at a home football game was a 31,681 sellout crowd at the 2003 win over Grambling State. The game marked the first time under the current stadium configuration that San José State had a "sellout" prior to game day.

The largest crowd to attend any event in the stadium was estimated at 37,000 for a ZZ Top music concert.

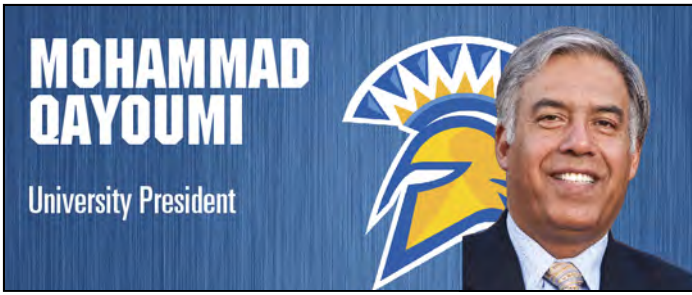

Mohammad Qayoumi was appointed the 28th San José State University President in March 2011 and began his duties July 1, 2011 for one of the oldest and one of the largest universities in the 23-campus CSU system.

Previously, Qayoumi served as president of California State University East Bay, where under his leadership, the university adopted long-range academic and strategic plans that significantly strengthened its regional position and profile.

In addition to his more than 30 years of experience in the service of higher education and industry, Qayoumi is a licensed professional engineer and a certified management accountant. He has published eight books, more than 85 articles, and several chapters in various books. Additionally, he has presented at numerous national and international conferences on topics ranging from quality and energy to systems theory. Qayoumi is a senior member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers and has served as a Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award examiner and senior examiner.

For Qayoumi, he returned to San José State where he served as the Associate Vice-President for Administration from 1986 to 1995 and as an adjunct professor from 1983 through 1995.

During his six years at California State University, Northridge, Qayoumi achieved the rank of professor of engineering management. He was a tenured professor of engineering at Cal State East Bay.

Qayoumi has served his native country, Afghanistan, in various capacities, including as a senior advisor to the Minister of Finance and member of the board of directors for the Central Bank of Afghanistan.

Locally, Qayoumi is a member of the Silicon Valley Leadership Group, and serves on several boards including the Bay Area Council, the East Bay Economic Development Alliance and the Contra Costa Business Council.

President Qayoumi is a graduate of the American University of Beirut where he majored in electrical engineering. He holds master's degrees from the University of Cincinnati - a M.S. in nuclear engineering, a M.S. in electrical and computer engineering and a M.B.A. in finance and accounting. Qayoumi has his Ph.D. in electrical and computer engineering also from the University of Cincinnati.

The multi-lingual San José State president is fluent in English, Persian Dari, Pashto and Arabic and conversant in Italian, German and French.

His wife, Najia Karim, is a Persian poet and a clinical dietitian.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

Graduating about 7,000 students annually, San José State University also provides the professional infrastructure for the region – from teachers to social workers to artists to law enforcement officers to nurses. The terms, “leaders and professionals,” describe not just the types of graduates who earn their degrees, but also the roles they assume in their communities and in their fields of endeavor.

San José State University's place in history is well-established. Founded in 1857, it was the first public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its humble beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, it has matured into a master's university offering 191 bachelor's and master's degrees.

The university's 27,000 students study in eight fully-accredited colleges: Applied Sciences and the Arts, Business, Education, Engineering, Humanities and the Arts, Science, Social Sciences and Social Work.

One strength of the academic program is the broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism -- to diverse studies. Academic strength also is seen in the university's nationally-recognized programs. Examples include the School of Music, the School of Art and Design, the School of Journalism and Mass Communications, the School of Nursing and the School of Library and Information Science.

In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach introductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning facilities include computer-equipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the NASA Ames Research Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.

San José State University also finds strength in its diversity. For first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Students range in age from first-time freshmen to college transfers to professionals seeking additional education. Student demographics – with ethnic pluralism – provide the benefits of multiple cultures and diverse student interests and activities. From residence life to athletic teams to social clubs to co-op jobs – student activities meet the needs of this diverse student body.

Gene Bleymaier was named San José State University's director of athletics on May 24, 2012 and oversaw one of the University's best years of overall athletics success in his first year with the Spartans.

In 2012-13, the Spartans won 11 football games in a season for the first time since 1940, were listed in the final BCS standings for the first time in school history at #24, won the 2012 Military Bowl and were voted #21 nationally in the season-ending Associated Press and USA Today/ESPN coaches polls. San José State won Western Athletic Conference championships in women's swimming, women's tennis and softball. The Spartans finished an all-time best 106th out of the 295 NCAA Division I programs that scored points in the final 2012-13 Learfield Sports Directors Cup standings that measure overall program success in national competition.

As one of the most-experienced athletics directors working for a Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) school, Bleymaier was selected as one of 10 Division I directors of athletics to serve on a new national advisory council to NCAA President Mark Emmert.

Bleymaier came to San José State with an impressive array of personal and professional accomplishments from 30 years as Boise State University's athletics director.

His foresight and vision led to Boise State changing conferences three times during his tenure. Once a member of the Big Sky Conference, Boise State moved to the Big West Conference in 1996, the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) in 2001 and the Mountain West Conference in 2011.

Bleymaier directed the Broncos to comprehensive success in conference and national competition. Boise State posted thirty-three top-25 finishes in nine different sports. Most notable and easily recognizable is Boise State football's ascension to a national brand. The Broncos are the only football program from 2009 through 2011 to finish in the top-10 each year in the Associated Press and coaches' final polls. Since 2004, Boise State has six top-10 finishes in the Bowl Championship Series standings and was as high as sixth in 2009.

In 10 years of WAC membership, the Broncos were the only three-time winner of the Commissioner's Cup signifying the best overall athletics program in the conference. There were conference championships in football, women's gymnastics, women's swimming and diving, men's basketball, women's basketball, women's soccer, women's tennis and women's cross country – all sports San José State offers – and men's tennis and men's indoor and outdoor track and field.

Boise State coaches earned 31 Coach of the Year awards and Bronco student-athletes received conference Athlete of the Year awards 35 times and 68 All-America honors over a 10-year span.

Academically, the NCAA recognized the Boise State football program with a 2010 Public Recognition Award for achieving an

Academic Progress Rate (APR) score that ranked in the top-10 percent for all NCAA Division I football-playing schools. Consistently, the Broncos produced the highest APR score among WAC football playing members. The Boise State student-athlete population produced a five-semester run of cumulative grade-point averages over 3.00 per semester.

Bleymaier can take credit for conceiving Boise State's unique blue artificial turf for Bronco Stadium. Installed in 1986, it is one of the most distinguishing playing surfaces in the United States and now is imitated in various ways throughout the country. His fundraising prowess and vision led to the creation of enhanced practice and competition facilities for Boise State football, track and field, men's and women's basketball, softball, tennis, and women's gymnastics over a 15-year span. New sports medicine, student-athlete support services and strength and conditioning facilities also were constructed under his watch.

In August 2013, Boise State's new football facility will open its doors as the Gene Bleymaier Football Complex honoring his accomplishments at the University.

He was the driving force in the creation of the post-season Humanitarian Bowl game. Now known as the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, the Boise-hosted game now is in its 17th year attracting top college football teams.

During his Boise State tenure, Bleymaier was recognized nationally for exemplary leadership. He received the 2011 Bobby Dodd Athletics Director of the Year and 2008 Astro Turf Athletics Director of the Year Awards. In 2009, he was one of five finalists for the Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal and Sports Business Daily Athletic Director of the Year Award and the only nominee from a non-automatic qualifying Bowl Championships Series (BCS) conference school.

The 1975 UCLA graduate was a three-year letter-winning tight end on the Bruins' 1972 through 1974 football teams. Bleymaier was a third-team All-Pacific 8 Conference selection and was the 1974 recipient of the UCLA Alumni Association's Outstanding Senior Award.

His college coaches were legendary San José State alum Dick Vermeil and Pepper Rodgers.

Bleymaier earned a law degree from Loyola Law School in 1978. He served as a UCLA assistant athletics director before joining the Boise State athletics department in 1981 as an assistant athletics director. In 1982, he was promoted to the Broncos' athletics director.

He and his wife, Danell, have four adult children, Maribeth, Joe, Claire and Tom; and a granddaughter, Madeleine.

John Poch returned to San José State University in January 2009. As the Deputy Director of Athletics/External Operations, his duties include managing the department's external relations components of fund raising and community relations and serving as the sports supervisor for baseball and women's tennis. He also has a lead role in the fund raising for the Spartan Stadium Vermeil-Walsh Athletic Complex.

Previously, Poch served as the Tournament Director of the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Women's College Cup hosted by San José State University and was an assistant coach for the Spartans' women's soccer team from 1995 to 2000. Under his direction, the 1999 College Cup attracted more than 28,000 spectators for two semifinal contests and the championship match. The 14,410 in attendance for the championship game remains the top attendance figure for any college women's soccer contest.

As a San José State assistant coach, he was on the ground floor of the new Spartan program. In its first five seasons, San José State posted a 53-44-3 overall win-loss record.

Poch is a successful youth soccer coach with United States Soccer Federation and National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) national licenses. He coached the San José Pioneer High School boys' teams to three Central Coast Section championships and was named the National Coach of the Year in 2001 by the NSCAA.

From 2000 through 2008, he was the executive director of the After-School All-Stars of Greater San José - a program targeting at-risk youths. In his eight years, After-School All-Stars grew from a two-person staff with a \$275,000 annual operating budget to a full-time staff of 36 and 230 part-time employees and a \$3.9-million budget comprised largely of dollars raised through his fundraising acumen and direction. More than 3,000 students from 50-plus elementary and middle schools in San José were After-School All-Stars beneficiaries.

In 2011, Poch completed course work in the Sports Management Institute - a collaboration of the Universities of Southern California, Texas, Michigan, Notre Dame and North Carolina. The Sports Management Institute provides a specialized executive management program for sports professionals.

He is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), NAADD (National Association of Athletic Development Directors) and AFP (Association of Fundraising Professionals) and remains well-connected in San José. He also serves on the board of directors for After-School All-Stars.

The 2001 San José State University graduate majored in kinesiology. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in sport management at San José State. As a student-athlete, he played football at West Valley College before enrolling at San José State.

John and his wife, Debora, a 1988 San José University graduate, are the parents of one daughter, Nicole.

Marie Tuite joined the San José State University athletics administrative team in an executive capacity in June 2010. Presently, she is the Deputy Director of Athletics/Internal Operations.

From April through June 2012, Tuite also was the Interim Director of Athletics. In that time, she took a leadership role in San José State's invitation and acceptance to join the Mountain West in July 2013.

Tuite oversees all of the Spartans' internal components and affairs. She manages the department's daily operations, has direct supervision of student services, compliance and business affairs, manages future football scheduling and serves as a sports supervisor for men's and women's basketball.

Her professional career includes executive positions at Pacific-12 Conference universities and the NCAA. She came to the Spartans from Seattle University where she was a Special Assistant to the Athletics Director. Tuite assisted Seattle University's transition to NCAA Division I athletics status.

Her first athletics administrative position was at Alma (Mich.) College in 1981 as the Director of Women's Athletics Programs and Activities. She joined the University of California women's athletics staff in 1984 as an assistant athletics director.

Tuite then relocated to the NCAA office in the Kansas City area and served as an Assistant Director of Championships from 1989 to 1994. She assisted the organization's sport committees in the administration of the National Collegiate Championships program and coordinated the Association's corporate partner, merchandising, promotional, and official ball programs for NCAA championships.

She returned to a campus setting in 1994 as a senior associate athletics director at the University of Washington. Her duties included overseeing the process and appointment of new head coaches, directing day-to-day operations including fiscal responsibility and leadership opportunities for numerous sports, and initiating and implementing "keys to success" for priority Husky sports programs.

A two-sport student-athlete and graduate of Central Michigan University, she was inducted into the university's Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990 as just the third female inductee. Tuite played field hockey and was a star basketball player who majored in physical education. She earned her master's degree from her alma mater in athletic administration.

Tuite is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), NACWAA (National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletics Administrators) and the Women's Sports Foundation. In May 2012, she was one of 41 local female executives honored at the 28th annual Tribute to Women Awards program by the YWCA Silicon Valley.

Office Location

Credential Requests

Credentials are issued for news and editorial coverage on a case-by-case basis to those filing game stories, accredited members from established media outlets, and personnel assigned by the sports information office. Requests should be directed to Lawrence Fan, Athletics Media Relations Director. The credential recipient agrees to all conditions set forth by the University relating to conduct and print, video, audio, digital and photographic game coverage.

Press Box

The Spartan Stadium press box is located on the 7th Street side of the stadium and is an open-air facility. Carry a jacket. The press box remains open three hours after each contest.

Game Day Parking

Media parking is located in Lot 1, located on 7th and Humboldt streets. Media parking passes for home games are issued by the athletics media relations office.

Photographers

Credentials are issued to newspapers, wire services, video crews and team photographers. NCAA rules limit photographers to a wide area behind the restraining line around the playing field and outside the 25-yard lines.

Radio Broadcasts

The radio broadcast booth for the designated official flagship station of the visiting team at Spartan Stadium is Box B on the mezzanine level of the press box and has space for five working individuals. ISDN and regular telephone service are provided.

Production Truck & Satellite Uplink Parking

Production truck and satellite uplink parking is on the 7th street side of the stadium. Arrangements must be made to park a truck overnight inside Spartan Stadium.

Scouts

Space limitations prohibit seating and standing in the press box for scouting purposes.

Spotters & Statisticians

Requests for spotters and/or statisticians should be placed two weeks prior to a home game.

Statistics & Services

Game statistics, play-by-play accounts and post-game quotes are compiled and distributed. FAX service is available. A meal is available two hours before kickoff.

Team Practices & In-Person Interviews

During the season, the Spartans practice in the morning. In-person, post-practice interview opportunities with the student-athletes, generally, occur at approximately 11:00 a.m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Please contact the athletics media relations office in advance with your interview request.

Telephone Lines & Wireless Internet

Landline telephone service and wireless internet are available in the press box area.

Travel

Mineta San José International Airport is a 15-minute drive to Spartan Stadium. Alaska, American, Delta, Hawaiian, Horizon, Jet Blue, Northwest, Southwest, United, US Air and Virgin America are major domestic carriers with daily flights into San José. San Francisco and Oakland International Airports are 45-minute freeway drives to San José State University.

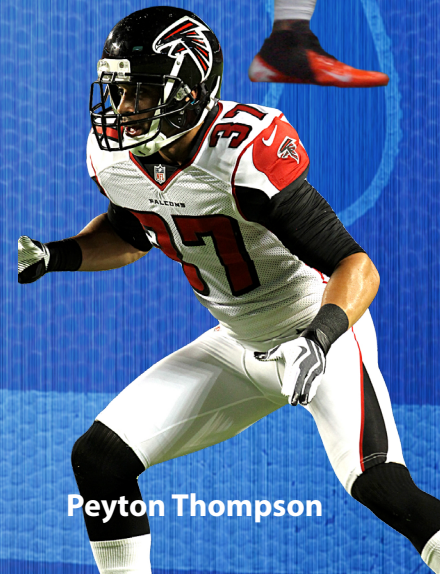
