The winningest head baseball coach in San Jose State University history, Sam Piraro is in his 23rd season at the helm in 2010. Piraro is the program's only leader to guide the Spartans to multiple NCAA Championship appearances and Western Athletic Conference pennants. As the only San Jose State baseball coach with more than 500 victories, his teams have an overall record of 726-540-6 in 22 seasons. Over 100 of those wins have come against ranked teams.

In 35 years, the four-time WAC Coach of the Year has compiled 990 wins and been associated with 30 winning, two .500 and just three losing seasons. He has produced seven All-Americans, five Freshman All-Americans, 74 all-conference selections, including 40 All-WAC picks, and 42 academic honorees at the conference level during his tenure. Former standout Junior Ruiz is the only player in WAC history to earn both the league's Freshman of the Year (1999) and Player of the Year (2000) awards. Ryan Shopshire was the program's first WAC Pitcher of the Year in 2009, while Gerad Cawhorn was the 1993 Big West Conference Player of the Year.

## Spartan Baseball Back Atop the WAC

In 2009, Piraro guided the Spartans to the WAC regular-season crown, their first since 2000, earning a second straight WAC Coach of the Year award as a result and fourth in his 12 seasons in the league. Among numerous team superlatives, San Jose State compiled the best overall record among the nine NCAA Division I baseball programs in Northern California for the second time in three years, at 41-20, reaching the 40-win plateau for the sixth time in program history, fifth under Piraro, and first since a school-record 45 triumphs in 2002. The 41 wins tied for the third-most at San Jose State with the 2000 College World Series squad. The Spartans were one of the final three teams in the country left undefeated, along with eventual NCAA Championship participants Georgia and Virginia, thanks to a 9-0 start, their best since 1989. At 15-7, San Jose State posted an above-.500 league mark in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 2001-02.

Piraro's team lost just one series of three games or more all year long, going 11-1-1 in such sets, rallying from two games down for a weekend split against WAC rival and defending national champion Fresno State, before capping its first three-game sweep of area rival Santa Clara since 2003. An impressive 27-6 home ledger included four-game sweeps over league foes Louisiana Tech and Nevada for a second straight year. The Spartans led the league in pitching for the first time and fielding for the fourth time in five years. They were second in hitting, shattering the school record with a .339 average, among a total of eight new single-season program standards. WAC Pitcher of the Year Ryan Shopshire was joined by four teammates in earning All-WAC distinction. Five Spartans were selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, including fourth-rounder Kyle Bellows, with seven moving on to the professional ranks in all.

Along the way, San Jose State achieved its first in-season national ranking since 2002, taking over the No. 25 spot in *Collegiate Baseball Newspaper's* poll on March 9, and produced its first victory over a nationally-rated opponent since 2005, when the Spartans edged then-24th-ranked Hawai'i, 3-2, in Honolulu on April 4.

For Piraro individually, win No. 700 came at home against Dartmouth, 6-1, on March 19, the milestone commemorated prior to the April 25 Fresno State doubleheader with the presentation of a framed home plate signed by Spartan players and coaches.

The 2008 campaign saw Piraro's Spartans post a winning record and 30-plus victories for the third year in a row, at 31-25, and qualify for a third successive WAC Tournament. San Jose State won its last five regular-season games to complete the WAC slate at 17-14, its first above-.500 league mark since going 21-9

in 2002. Picked to finish fifth in the preseason, the Spartans were just half a game out of the runner-up spot, in fourth.

Piraro and his brand-new coaching staff accomplished this with a squad that had just four seniors and 11 players returning from the previous year. He was rewarded by being selected the WAC Co-Coach of the Year. In 47 out of 56 games played, Piraro started no fewer than five freshmen and sophomores. In back-to-back non-conference victories at Washington State of the Pacific-10 Conference on April 27 and at home against San Francisco State on April 30, he had five true freshmen in the lineup. The Spartans, second in the WAC in both pitching and fielding, posted a 21-6 record at home.

In 2007, Piraro led San Jose State to a 34-26 mark, tops in Northern California. At the WAC Tournament, his squad took the first two games before falling to repeat champion Fresno State and host Nevada. The Spartans knocked off top local opponents California and Stanford in the same season and posted a series triumph at Hawai'i for the first time since 2002, and took the three-game set with Santa Clara for the first time since 2003.

A head coach who prides his program on being sound defensively, Piraro saw his squad top the conference in fielding (.970) for a third straight year while also pacing the WAC in hitting for the first time with a .312 average behind a then-school-record 653 hits. Kyle Bellows became the first Spartan to earn All-America honors of any kind since 2003 by being named a Freshman All-American by two media outlets, while also garnering second-team All-WAC distinction alongside a pair of teammates, including Donato Giovanatto, who was later selected in the First-Year Player Draft.

Piraro notched win No. 600 on March 12, 2006, in a 9-3 defeat of Miami (Ohio) at San Jose Municipal Stadium. The Spartans concluded the 2006 campaign with an overall record of 33-26, surpassing the .500 mark for the first time since 2002. An even conference record of 12-12 was good for third in the final standings and a berth in the reinstated WAC Tournament.

San Jose State's team fielding percentage of .979 in 2006 bettered the school record it had just broken the year before with a mark of .978. The Spartans led the conference and ranked second nationally behind Oklahoma (.983).

The Spartans had pitcher Branden Dewing and outfielder Ryan Angel recognized as All-WAC performers. Two of Piraro's pupils were chosen in the MLB Draft.

In 2005, Piraro's squad was an even 28-28-1, and San Jose State became one of only two teams in WAC history to put together a three-game sweep over national power Rice, the conference's perennial champion from 1997 through 2005.

The then-school-record .978 fielding percentage in 2005 led the WAC while putting the Spartans in a three-way tie for first nationally with Texas and Washington. The Spartans did not commit an outfield error in 30 conference contests. First-team All-WAC shortstop Anthony Contreras produced a school-record 32-game hitting streak to close the season.

## A Winning Tradition

After missing the 2003 season for medical reasons, Piraro returned to serve the University as its baseball head coach in 2004. He has averaged

33 coaching wins per season at San Jose State, and has directed teams to .500-or-better records 19 times. He is also the only Spartan baseball coach to lead teams to seven consecutive .500-or-better seasons. His Spartans have five 40-win seasons, including a school-record 45 victories in 2002, when the team was ranked as high as 18th nationally, set eight school records and qualified for the NCAA Championship for the second time in three years.

On February 23, 2002, Piraro became the first Spartan head coach to reach the 500-win plateau with a road win at Cal Poly. On March 13, 2001, he took over the number-one spot for San Jose State baseball coaching victories with his 468th triumph, passing his mentor, Gene Menges, following a win at the University of San Francisco.

Sixteen of Piraro's San Jose State teams have reached the 30-win mark, including six in a row from 1997 through 2002. The 1989 and 1990 editions of the Spartans are the only two to post back-to-back 40-win seasons.

In 2000, Piraro directed one of the most celebrated seasons in Spartan athletic history. San Jose State won a share of the WAC crown and earned the program's first NCAA Championship berth since 1971. The Spartans proceeded to win the Waco (Texas) Regional by defeating nationally-ranked Florida, and the Houston Super Regional over fifth-

ranked host Houston, to advance to the College World Series for the first time. Piraro was named *Rawlings* Coach of the Year, ABCA West Region Coach of the Year and WAC Coach of the Year.

Named the San Jose State head coach in the summer of 1986, Piraro reached the 200-win mark in 1992, accomplishing the feat in fewer games than any previous SJSU baseball coach. His 300th Spartan coaching victory came in 1996 against Southern Utah, and his 400th win on April 10, 1999, at UNLV.

In 1997, the Spartans were 38-21 and won the WAC West Division championship. Piraro was named the WAC Coach of the Year and *Louisville Slugger* WAC Coach of the Year.

Piraro's teams have appeared in the national rankings a total of 48 times, including seven in the 2002 campaign and 10 weeks in 2000. The Spartans were ranked nationally for 11 weeks and as high as 11th by *Collegiate Baseball* during the 1989 season. In 1990, the Spartans received their first preseason ranking and were ranked for 14 weeks, peaking at No. 4 by *The Sporting News*. San Jose State appeared twice in the *Collegiate Baseball* rankings in 1992, at 29th and 27th, and was rated as high as 17th in 1997.

## Guiding Young Men's Careers

Piraro has profoundly influenced the careers of his student-athletes. Nearly 80 of his San Jose State players have gone on to sign a professional baseball contract. Kevin Frandsen, a Spartan infielder from 2001-04, went 3-for-4 with three runs in his first game for the San Francisco Giants on April 28, 2006, and hit his first major-league home run on August 17 that year in San Diego. A local product who completed his first full season in the majors in 2007, Frandsen was a 12th-round pick by the Giants during the 2004 Amateur Draft. Three more former Spartans made their MLB debuts in 2009.

Previously, Anthony Telford pitched in the major leagues for nine seasons. Third baseman Jeff Ball played for the Giants in 1998 and managed the Atlantic City Surf professional baseball club from 2004-06. Second baseman Gabe Lopez was a Double-A prospect of the New York Yankees. Pitcher Matt Durkin was a second-round choice of the New York Mets in the 2004 draft. In all, Piraro has sent 32 players onto the next level via draft selection since 1997.

Over 50 of Piraro's former players and assistants have moved into the high school and collegiate baseball coaching ranks. Ninth-year Santa Clara University head coach Mark O'Brien played on the 1991 and 1992 Spartans. Scott Hertler, Piraro's assistant at Mission College and

later for 12 years at San Jose State, has been the head coach at De Anza College since 1999. Also included are Todd Eagen (1987-88), former head coach at Mission College; Shane Carley (1993-94), a former assistant at Mission and now the head coach there; Jason Bugg (1991-92), a former Spartan assistant and now the associate head coach at Mission; Dave Sick (1991-94), a former assistant at De Anza College; and Greg Mugg (1990), another former assistant at De Anza.



The Spartan coach also places a premium on academic performance. Pitcher Donnie Rea and catcher Kevin Tannahill were Academic All-Americans in 1989. Dave Sick was a three-time Academic All-District VIII selection, with current senior Karson Klauer now a two-time choice. The program has set new highs in Academic All-WAC honorees the last four years, with four in 2006, eight in 2007, seven in 2008, and 10 in 2009. Fifteen Spartans earned San Jose State University Scholar-Athlete recognition for the 2005-06 academic year, 14 for 2006-07, 10 for 2007-08 and 12 for 2008-09. Baseball players have posted the highest grade point average among male SJSU student-athletes in four of the past five school years, with Wes Porter in 2004-05, and Klauer over the last three.

Corey Cabral, a pitcher who graduated in May of 2007, became the first Spartan male to be presented the WAC Stan Bates Award in August of 2007, as the top male scholar-athlete in the conference based on academic record, athletic performance, character, sportsmanship, leadership and community service.

From 1992-99, Piraro served as an assistant athletic director in addition to his duties as head coach. His fundraising efforts through the years have augmented the baseball operations budget and facilities. The Blethen Field project, through the generosity of Fred and Sandra Blethen-Chasalow, brought in \$350,000. The gift enabled the program to refurbish Blethen Field into a first-class practice facility and alternate game site. Since Piraro's hiring in 1986, he has raised over \$1,000,000 for his program and the athletics department.

## Background Rooted in San Jose

Piraro was an infielder on the 1971 and 1972 Spartan teams. He received both his bachelor's degree, in physical education in 1975, and master's degree (1982), from San Jose State University.

The San Jose native is in his 36th season as a college baseball coach, and has amassed 990 victories during his three head-coaching appointments. He began his career in 1974 as a graduate assistant and junior varsity coach at San Jose State. His first year as the junior varsity coach resulted in a 22-5 record and a league championship. Piraro produced a 74-43 mark with the junior varsity squad in three seasons. He was the Spartans' top varsity assistant under Gene Menges from 1977 through 1979.

# Four-Time WAC Coach of the Year



In 1980, Piraro became the first baseball coach at Mission College in Santa Clara, Calif. In seven seasons, he compiled a 190-70 record, won five Coast Conference championships and two state titles (1981 and 1983). Following each of the state crowns, Piraro was named California Community College Coach of the Year. He also was the school's athletic director and chair of the physical education department from 1983 to 1986. In 1996, Piraro became the second-youngest coach to be inducted into the California Community College Baseball Hall of Fame, for his contributions to community college baseball.

The Santa Clara County chapter of the Italian-American Heritage Association recognized Piraro in 2000 as its Sportsman of the Year. He has served as an NCAA regional advisor and a voting member of the *Collegiate Baseball* rankings panel, and was selected to represent the West Region on the NCAA Championship Selection Committee prior to the 2006 season. He has co-authored a book with fellow coaches, titled *Gold Glove Defense*, through the American Baseball Coaches Association.

Piraro and his wife, JoAnn, live in San Jose with their two children, Jason (27) and Jenna (22). Jason is in his fifth season as the Spartans' coordinator of baseball operations, having completed his undergraduate degree requirements at San Jose State.

Tom Kunis, a nationally-regarded pitching educator, is in his second season back and sixth season overall with the San Jose State University baseball program in 2010, as the associate head coach. In addition to directing the pitchers, Kunis takes the lead on identifying pitching targets during the recruiting process, and coordinates the Spartan youth camps. He carries 26 years of coaching experience into the new campaign.



The impact of Kunis' return to his alma mater was felt immediately in 2009, as San Jose State won the regular-season Western Athletic Conference title behind a pitching staff that led the league in team ERA for the first time in 13 years since joining the conference in 1997. The Spartans posted a 4.66 ERA, well ahead of Fresno State's next-closest mark of 5.61. Kunis' staff led the WAC in complete games (6), shutouts (4), saves (17) and strikeouts with a school-record total of 453, among several other categories.

Three of the top six individual ERA marks belonged to Spartans, with David Berner (3.20), Ryan Shopshire (4.04) and Max Peterson (4.55) first, third and sixth, respectively. Shopshire became the first Spartan to earn WAC Pitcher of the Year honors, and was joined on the All-WAC first team by Berner. All three were selected in the 2009 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft, alongside Trevor Gibson, with Jack Adams also earning an opportunity to play professionally.

Kunis is a well-recognized name not just in the Bay Area, but national baseball circles, from his eight-year stint as an assistant and pitching coach under Mark Marquess at Stanford University from 2000-07. He aided the Cardinal to four College World Series trips during that span, with national runner-up finishes in 2000, 2001 and 2003.

Kunis served as the head coach at Ohlone College in Fremont, Calif., during the 2008 campaign. He had previously been a Spartan assistant under Sam Piraro for four seasons from 1988-91. Kunis' pitching staff was the best in the Big West Conference for the first three of those years, as the program posted back-to-back 40-plus win seasons for the only time in its history in 1989 (40) and 1990 (43). Five of his pupils were 10-game winners.

At Stanford, Kunis' pitchers led the Pacific-10 Conference in earned run average in three of his eight seasons, were either first or second in six of those years, and in the top half in all but the last one. The Cardinal posted a team ERA of under 4.00 four times under Kunis' direction. Nine of his pitchers were selected in the first five rounds of the MLB Draft over eight years, highlighted by right-hander Greg Reynolds being picked second overall by the Colorado Rockies in 2006.

Under Kunis' guidance, right-hander John Hudgins put together one of the finest seasons in Stanford history in 2003, going 14-3 with a 2.99 ERA in a school-record 165.1 innings while earning Pac-10 Pitcher of the Year and College World Series Most Outstanding Player distinction. Kunis coached four conference Pitcher of the Year honorees in all during the past decade, with Shopshire (2009), Hudgins (2003), first-round-er and current Baltimore Oriole Jeremy Guthrie (2002), and first-round-er (No. 5) Justin Wayne (2000).

Kunis began his coaching career in 1984 as the head assistant at West Valley College in Saratoga, Calif., serving in that capacity through the 1987 season. In between his stints at San Jose State and Stanford, he was the pitching coach at De Anza College in Cupertino, Calif., from 1991-94, when the Dons twice topped the Coast Conference in ERA, and the head coach there for the 1995 campaign, leading De Anza to a 31-14-2 mark and a California state playoff berth.

From 1996-99, Kunis coached the pitchers as the head assistant at Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo, Calif. During his tenure with the Mustangs, his staff consistently ranked among the best in the WAC (1996) and Big West (1997-99). He directed the Cal Poly arms to a 4.45 ERA in 1996 in just the school's second year of Division I competition.

A graduate of San Jose's Branham High School, Kunis earned his bachelor's degree from San Jose State in kinesiology, and a master's degree in sports administration in 1993 from Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. He and his wife, Kim, reside in San Jose with their five children, sons Austin (16), Tyler (14), Landon (8) and Cooper (2), and daughter Megan (13).

Jeff Pritchard is in his third season as an assistant coach for the San Jose State University baseball program in 2010. His main responsibilities are to serve as the hitting coach and as the recruiting and academic coordinator. He also coaches the catchers, oversees the prospect camps, and serves as the third base coach.

Pritchard has needed only a short amount of time to make a mark on the program on the field, on the recruiting trail, and in the classroom.

In just his second go-around directing the Spartan hitters, Pritchard oversaw a group that broke seven single-season school marks. On its way to the 2009 Western Athletic Conference regular-season crown, San Jose State shattered the previous program record of .319 in 1993 by batting .339, second in the league, while generating additional standards for runs (472), hits (723), doubles (135), RBI (424), total bases (1,007) and sacrifices (92 combined). The Spartans had six players hit .335 or better with 160-plus at-bats, led by Jacob Bruns at .399, third-best in the WAC, and fourth-round draft choice Kyle Bellows at .389, both with slugging percentages above .600. The Spartans belted 43 home runs, their highest team total since they hit 52 in 2002.

In September of 2009, Pritchard's recruiting class for the 2010 campaign was rated No. 42 nationally and No. 1 in the WAC by *Collegiate Baseball Newspaper*.

In December of 2008, Pritchard was recognized at the Arm & Pat Hanzad Scholar-Athlete Celebration as the recipient of the SJSU Athletics Board Academic Assistant Coach of the Year award, due in large part to guiding the Spartans to the top GPA among men's teams at San Jose State for the fall 2007 and spring 2008 semesters combined.



Pritchard made the short trip over to San Jose State from Santa Clara University, where he served as an assistant under former Spartan player and current Bronco head coach Mark O'Brien during the 2007 season. He was a hitting and fielding instructor, coached first base, co-directed the Bronco camps, developed and oversaw community outreach, and helped with recruiting.



During the 2007 summer, Pritchard was the head coach of the Mat-Su

Miners, located in Palmer, Alaska, of the Alaska Baseball League. The Miners were ranked as high as fifth on the PG Crosschecker Summer 16 chart, which rates the nation's top college summer league clubs, and named ABL co-champions with a 24-11 season mark. In the summer of 2006, Pritchard was the associate head coach of the Kauai Menehunes of the Hawaii Collegiate Baseball League. The Menehunes finished in second-place.

Prior to his year on the Santa Clara staff, Pritchard was an assistant coach at the University of California of the Pacific-10 Conference for the 2006 season. From 2002-05, he was the assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at San Francisco State University for then-Gator head coach and former Spartan assistant coach Matt Markovich.

Pritchard was also the head coach of the Monterey Bay Sox in Monterey, Calif., during the summer of 2005, earning California Coastal Collegiate League Manager of the Year honors while leading the Bay Sox to the 2005 National Baseball Congress World Series in Wichita, Kan., and a final national ranking of 13th.

A native of Carmel Valley, Calif., Pritchard earned an associate degree in liberal studies in 1997 from Allan Hancock College in Santa Maria, Calif., a bachelor of arts degree in English from the University of San Francisco in 2000, and a master's degree in English from San Francisco State during the fall of 2006.

As a player, Pritchard was a 1996 junior college All-American, two-time All-Western State Conference pick, 1996 WSC batting champion and two-time team Most Valuable Player at Allan Hancock before moving on to play two seasons as an outfielder at USF. Pritchard then played professional baseball in the independent leagues with three separate teams from 1999-2002. He and his wife, Carrie, welcomed a daughter, Peyton, in September of 2009, and currently reside in San Jose.

Brian Yocke, who patrolled center field for the Spartans in 2007, is in his second season as the volunteer assistant coach for the San Jose State University baseball program in 2010. He handles the outfielders and base-running, assists with academics and camps, and serves as the first base coach.

Yocke's first foray into college coaching in 2009 was a successful one for the Western Athletic Conference regular-season champion Spartans. With his help, Jacob Bruns went from drawing just 33 at-bats as a junior newcomer in 2008, to leading the team in hitting as a senior right-fielder with a .399 average, third-best in the league. Bruns smacked seven home runs, and finished in the top 10 in the WAC in slugging percentage (.618), on-base percentage (.473) and doubles (16). Spartan outfielders committed just seven errors in 378 chances defensively, for a fielding percentage of .981.

During the summer of 2009, Yocke was the number-one assistant coach for the Peninsula Oilers of the Alaska Baseball League, in Kenai, Alaska. He was previously one of two coaches for the junior varsity team at his high school, San Jose's Archbishop Mitty, in the spring of 2008, and spent that summer assisting with Mitty's varsity squad.

Though he played just one season at San Jose State, Yocke made his mark with a unique story of perseverance. He was cut after one day of tryouts, but returned to the baseball offices the next day to ask for a second chance. Head coach Sam Piraro and his staff allowed Yocke to train with the team through the fall. He eventually walked on to the squad and earned a roster spot for the 2007 spring campaign.



Yocke began the year on the Spartan bench, but worked his way onto the field on February 17 and into the starting lineup at the University of the Pacific on April 17. He then became a fixture in center field, starting each of the next 17 contests before sitting out the regular-season finale, and earning a lineup spot in all four games the Spartans played at the 2007 WAC Tournament in Reno, Nev. Yocke finished with a .346 batting average (27-for-78) over 31 games, 22 of them starts. He produced 25 runs, three doubles, one

triple, 14 RBI, a .410 slugging percentage, nine walks, 11 hit-by-pitches, a .480 on-base percentage, seven sacrifice hits and four steals in five attempts. On three separate occasions, he reached base safely five times in a single game. Defensively, Yocke made just one error in 59 chances for a fielding percentage of .983.

Voted by teammates as Most Inspirational, Yocke was San Jose State's recipient of the Loyd Christopher Award at the 2008 Santa Clara County Hot Stove Banquet.

Head coach **Sam Piraro** faces a unique challenge as he takes the San Jose State University baseball program into the 2010 campaign. The Spartans will have an incredibly young and inexperienced pitching staff, with no seniors, and the entire starting rotation changed over from a 2009 group that led the league in earned run average en route to San Jose State's first Western Athletic Conference title since 2000.

Of the 41 wins and 61 starts from a year ago, only four wins, six starts, and 17 percent of the innings pitched return to help defend that crown.

"The pitching, obviously, is a work in progress," says Piraro. "The reason you spend so many hours trying to evaluate your talent in the fall, is because you're trying to get a handle on your most inexperienced area. In our case, that is the pitching. I'm not saying it's under-talented. I'm saying it's inexperienced. Sometimes, that's just as deadly. It is our job as coaches to develop these guys, speed up their learning curve, push the envelope with them in practice and in intrasquad games, and get them prepared to compete as early as we can."

The question marks on the mound do not, however, lessen expectations for a San Jose State team that has boasted the best overall record among the nine NCAA Division I programs in Northern California in two of the last three seasons. Piraro's Spartans go right back to work with five starting position players among nine returning letterwinners and 17 players in all off of last year's championship roster, six of them pitchers.

"In baseball, you play a lot of games. Your goal is to win every game you play. You don't say, I hope we can win 30 games, 35 games, 40. You try to win every game you play, literally. That is how you approach it. You never go into a game, not thinking you're going to win. That is the whole mindset. That's your preparation. Along the way, goals begin to fall in line.

"I tell our team, if you win every game, you know this for sure. You beat every opponent that you played. That's always a goal, to beat every opponent you play. Certainly, you want to challenge for the conference championship, you want to make the conference tournament, you want to win the conference tournament, you want to make the NCAA Championship, but those are the residue of your daily goal, which is to win every game you play, not to get too far ahead of yourself, and not try to think too far ahead."

## Opportunities Abound for 16 Arms

The WAC will again feature four-game week-end sets in league play, so Piraro and pitching coach Tom Kunis are looking for a minimum of four starters on the mound.

**John Austin**, a junior left-hander from College of San Mateo, and sophomore right-hander **Esteban Guzman**, seem set to occupy half of that contingent.

"Coming off the fall, John proved to be our most consistent pitcher, and I certainly consider him a person that will be in the rotation at this point. Esteban had an outstanding fall season as well. He showed great development throughout, and by the end, he might have been our best pitcher."

Some intriguing choices follow behind that duo. **Blake McFarland** is a graduate of San Jose's Leigh High School who spent the past two seasons at Santa Barbara City College. A right-hander with good size, he is the grandson of John Oldham, a member of the San Jose State Baseball Hall of Fame from his collegiate playing days, and the former baseball head coach at Santa Clara University from 1985-97.

Left-hander **Drew Bradshaw** saw minimal action at Danville's Monte Vista High School behind three other Division I prospects on the mound. Fellow freshman **Zack Jones** comes in from nearby Santa Teresa High School with high expectations for both his arm and his bat. The right-hander was the *Mercury News* Player of the Year in 2009. **Eric LeBaron**, a right-hander with a live arm who has shown some bright spots, is an option.

"Drew came on at the end of the fall and really opened up some eyes with his competitiveness, and the type of stuff he brought out there. He has a future. He might be a guy that could be a real pleasant surprise for San Jose State.

"Zack is the first guy that we've taken this deep into our thought process of how can we get him on the field, because he really swings the bat, he's a good athlete, and we need pitching. I need Zack's arm, but playing both ways is really tough to do. When he's with the hitters, infielders or base-runners, he's missing the pitching. When he's with the pitchers, he's missing everything else. It is incredibly difficult and complicated. How we manage it will play a huge part in whether or not we can make it work.

"Shifting to the end of the game, it is one of the most important things a coach has to look at. You have to have capable people there. That is the part that is still very much up in the air. **Luke Mazzanti**, **Craig Broussard** and **Sean Martin** are some of the people that we're going to have to take a look at there. Luke and Craig got a little experience last year.

"Sean didn't pitch much in the fall because he had a tender arm from the summer. He was a big recruit for us, so instead of throwing him out in the rotation before he's ready, we would start him off in the bullpen and give him a shot toward the end of the game, to see if he fits that role for us."

Martin is a sophomore right-hander who spent the 2009 season at Ohlone College.

"**David Wayne Russo**, a freshman, and **Graham Rodriguez**, are two left-handers that we could use in late match-ups. Then I have guys like **Ryan Vander Tuig**, who has had some experience, **Andy Hennessey**, **Patrick Hennessey**, **Dylan Morrow** and **Michael Kwan**, who all have good arms. We've got to get as much playing time for them as possible."

## Primarily Three Behind the Plate

Piraro has three main options to replace departed senior Anthony Aguilera behind the plate, in junior **Bryson Rahier**, **Chris Carrillo**, a freshman from Aguilera's alma mater, St. Paul High School in Southern California, and **Corey Valine**.

"Bryson and Chris will be catching on a full-time basis in terms of what they do in practice. Corey is in the picture as well. We have him

working out behind the plate, and his services can be utilized as needed. We're preparing for that contingency.

"In his third year, Bryson has the most experience at that position. He knows our system extremely well. Chris is a very bright defensive catcher. He does a good job in that he understands the nuances that we require, which is very tough for a freshman. We think those two guys are very capable defensively. Corey, of course, gives us a dimension of offense that if we need to field the nine best bats, he would be in that scenario."

## Veteran Infield Needs a Shortstop

Around the infield, San Jose State has three starters back in Valine at third, fellow fourth-year senior **Karson Klauer** at second, and **Danny Stienstra** at first, along with fellow junior **Craig Hertler**, who has plenty of experience at second base at the college level. The Spartans will, however, need to fill the void left by Kyle Bellows, an All-American and first-team All-WAC shortstop who the Cleveland Indians selected in the fourth round of last June's Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

"We have a plethora of people at first base, with four players working out over there. Danny is the incumbent. In his third year in the program, he is our starting first baseman. **Breyon Canez** is coming off his best fall in this program, where he's made himself a viable contender for playing time. Danny played some second base over the summer, and I used him there a little bit in the fall. If something happened, I wouldn't hesitate to

move Danny over, and insert Breyon. That's more a credit to Breyon than anything else.

"**Anthony Bona** has improved by leaps and bounds at first base. His strength is his ability to swing the bat. Anthony is important to us, because he also could catch in a pinch. The fourth guy we have over there, **Barney Evans**, primarily will be used for his offensive prowess. Barney had an excellent fall swinging the bat. He's a good left-handed hitter and a tough out. He has an idea of what he's doing up there, and he's a good guy to bring off the bench from the left side of the plate."

"Karson is our projected starter at second base. He's coming off a very steady fall, where defensively, he was just tremendous. He gives us that savvy and leadership out there. Craig Hertler missed the entire fall with a back injury, so it's difficult to plan what his status is going to be for us, but he's definitely an option. Once again, I could also use Danny Stienstra over there in an emergency. **Nick Borg** is a utility infielder that can play all three positions. He could fill in at second, and of course, **Michael Reiling** has played there before, so we're not lacking in bodies.

"The shortstop position is really interesting. I've always believed that your best defensive infielder should be there. That individual touches the ball the most, and he's involved with most of the plays. That's where a lot of balls are hit. We have some real good competition there. Mike Reiling had a good fall for us. Mike is very steady with the glove. He catches just about everything he touches.

"Freshman **Richie Johnson** is going to be an outstanding player here at San Jose State. He sustained a stress fracture in his foot and missed the last month of the fall, but he's back, and he brings a very potent bat with him. Richie is not only capable of being a real good shortstop, but he's going to swing the bat for us, so he's right in the picture.

"Zack (Jones) played shortstop in high school, and could play shortstop here, but because of his pitching, this is a unique scenario for me in my coaching career. Shortstop and pitcher is a tough combination, so I'm leaning toward moving Zack over to third, to possibly lessen some of the things he has to be aware of.

"Zack is just flat out a great athlete. He is one of the few guys I have ever coached that I think could do both, pitch and play a position, and I've done this a long time. Very few guys can do it. I think he can.

"Corey is our number-one third baseman. He's

one of the more consistent players in our program, and a great guy to have on the field. Corey's going to have the responsibility of catching when we ask him to do that. We have some other good, solid people over there.

**Tyler Christian** is just a freshman, and a guy I have real high expectations for. He's going to have a chance to be an outstanding offensive player. He's strong, and a good hitter with power. It's just a matter of time before he can really develop. Defensively, he's improved a lot. He came here as an average infielder, but is making strides to get better."

## Martin the Leader of a Talented Outfield

Local walk-on revelation **Jason Martin**, a second-team All-WAC honoree in 2009, sustained a break in his hand while attempting to make a diving grab and missed most of the fall season, but is back to full strength, and will again patrol center field. He was in the starting lineup for all 61 games of his sophomore campaign.

"Jason is just an outstanding player. We're expecting him to continue to do the things that he has done for us. Backing him up, we have several options, but **Tommy Gale** is our best bet. This will be his third year in our program. We've seen Tommy develop very well."

“The rest of the outfield is very competitive. Tommy is competing for the starting right field job, so, right now, we’re also working **Andrew Rodriguez** in center. As a freshman, he has a lot to learn, but has great speed, so we have to take a look and develop him.

Gale, **Alex Sofranac** and junior newcomer **Kolton Klauer** are pushing each other in right field. Sofranac took a medical redshirt last season after breaking a bone in his wrist 10 games in, and is one of just three seniors on the 2010 roster. Klauer joins his older brother on the squad. Piraro states that a platoon situation is a possibility in right.

**Kerry Jenkins**, a junior who spent the last two seasons at Chabot College and the University of the Pacific, respectively, “was probably our top leftfielder in the fall.” The staff believes that Jenkins has a chance to be a really good offensive player, in addition to already being an adept base-runner.

A pair of first-time freshmen from area high schools, **Tim Quiery** of Serra and **Nick Schulz** of Saint Francis, are also getting looks in left. Quiery provides a left-handed bat.

### Options on Both Sides of the Plate at Designated Hitter

With seven left-handed bats on the roster, Piraro will have no shortage of possibilities to fill the designated hitter role.

“We have a number of candidates, and we can mix and match in terms of whether we’re fac-

ing a right-handed pitcher or a left-handed pitcher. To me, the designated hitter is the hot bat, whoever is the next best hitter on your team that’s not already on the field.

“From the left side, we have guys like Tim Quiery and Barney Evans who could fill that void. If Craig Hertler isn’t playing second base, he would certainly be a candidate. Breyon Canez has earned the right to be considered for that spot. From the right side, we will take a look at Anthony Bona, Tyler Christian or Zack Jones, if they aren’t already playing. It shouldn’t be a problem for us. I believe we have enough capable bodies.”

### Plenty of Challenges on the Schedule

Coming off of the success of last season, Piraro has stacked the schedule for 2010. The non-conference slate, in addition to the annual three-game series with Santa Clara, two-game set with Stanford, and the remaining usual suspects from the Bay Area, is highlighted by the inaugural Jack Gifford Memorial Tournament. The four-day, five-team, 10-game event will be co-hosted by San Jose State and Santa Clara inside their respective venues. The Spartans also travel to one of the top college baseball towns in the country in Wichita, Kan., for three games against the Wichita State Shockers in April.

“We literally have to take this stance that, we don’t have to be the best team in the country that day, but we have to be the best team in the stadium, and that’s our approach. Whoever we’re playing, and we’re facing some good teams, we have to out-play our opponent on that day, and not worry about anything else.

“There’s no doubt that the schedule is laden with a lot of challenges, particularly on the road. We are going to go to some venues that are going to test us tremendously. The non-conference schedule is very good. It will be good preparation going into WAC play.

“We understand that baseball in California is as good as anywhere in the country. There are no bad teams here. There are no bad teams on the West Coast. Any opponent you face, that roster is stocked with outstanding baseball players, so we are fully aware of the chal-

lenges we have in front of us. We’re looking forward to when we meet up with Saint Mary’s. We know that Saint Mary’s has an outstanding team, with a lot of returning talent, and that series is going to be a real good test for us to start.”

### The WAC in 2010

The seven-team race in the WAC will be as competitive as ever, with the top six heading to Mesa, Ariz., at the end of May for the league’s first neutral-site championship tournament at Hohokam Park, the spring training home of the Chicago Cubs.

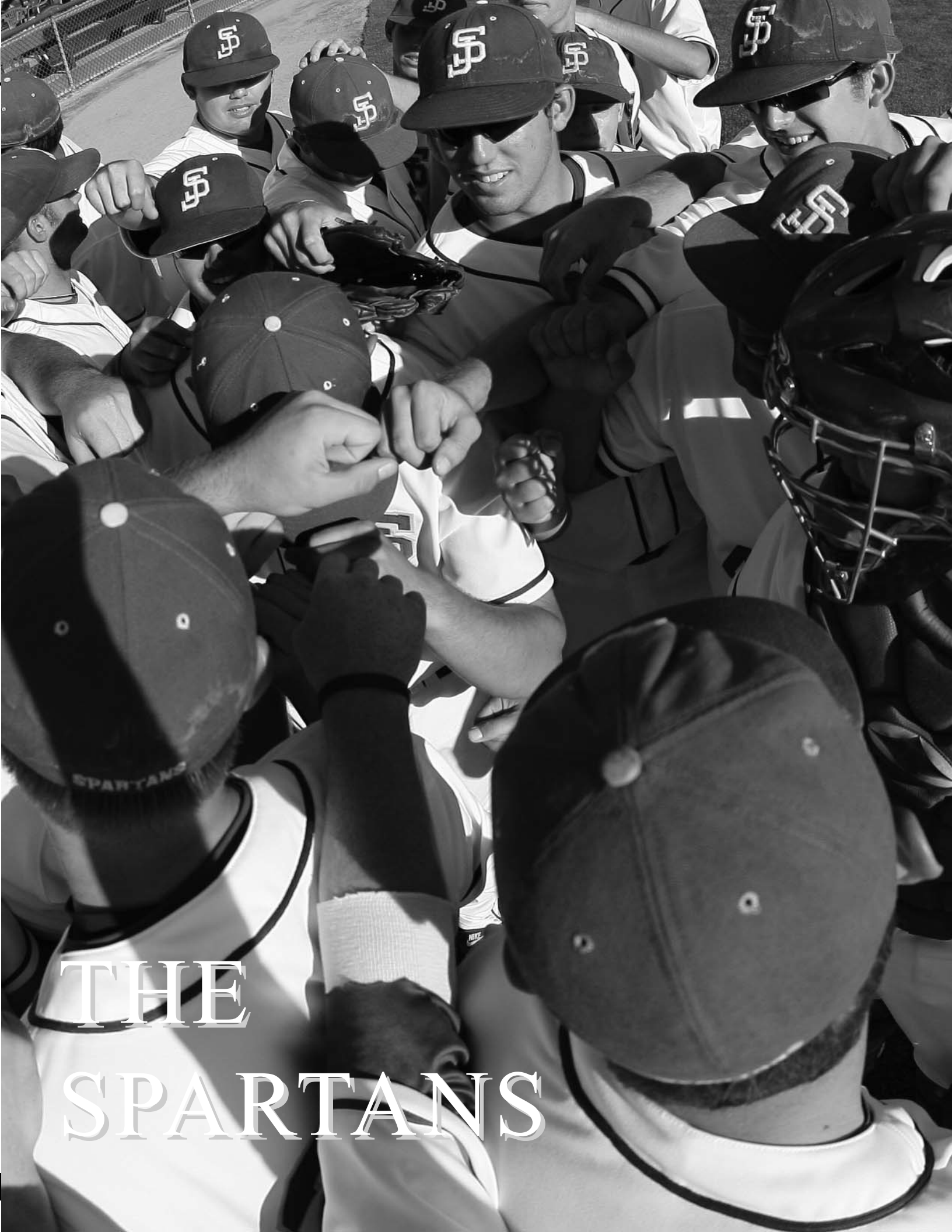
“As we get closer to league play, and we see how everybody is doing, then we’ll start to be concerned about that. This league is such a great league. Anybody can come up and challenge for the championship, just like we did last year, and we totally expected to. We thought that we had a chance to be that kind of team.

“Fresno State’s talent base puts them right up there. They have some of the best players in the state and in the country. Hawai’i has the roster to compete for the title, as does New Mexico State, with a lot of guys back. We know we’re going to have our hands full. The venues that we’re going to are extremely difficult. Louisiana Tech, Nevada and Fresno State are tough trips. My concern right now is to get our guys ready for that first weekend against Saint Mary’s.

“I have to sell this team on the fact that every game is going to be hard to win,” concludes Piraro. “We’re going to have to put our best resources into every game. Because of the lack of pitching experience, I can’t blow smoke and set goals for these guys that are unrealistic, but I can sell them on the fact that we’re going to put our best foot forward every day, and try to win every game. At the end of the year, if we did it the right way, we’re going to have our share of victories.”

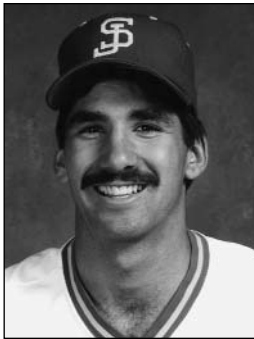

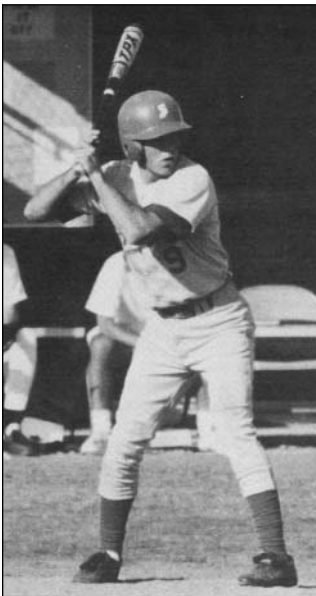

## Retired Number Gene Menges, Head Coach, 1970-86

# 22

The only number in San Jose State baseball history to have ever been retired - #22 - belongs to former Spartan head coach Gene Menges. The second-winningest coach in the school's 94-year history of the sport, Menges led the team for 17 seasons and compiled a 467-434-4 career record. Twice, in 1978 and 1979, he was named Coach of the Year by the Northern California Baseball Association.

Menges received his bachelor's degree from San Jose State in 1951. The quarterback of the 1948-50 Spartan football teams was one of the school's most prolific passers, and his totals still rank among the best in Spartan history. He continued his education at his alma mater and received his master's degree in 1957. While pursuing his education, he joined the Spartan coaching staff in 1952 as an assistant baseball coach before assuming the head coaching duties in 1970. He has the rank of professor emeritus in the human performance department at SJSU, and is also a member of the San Jose State University Sports Hall of Fame.

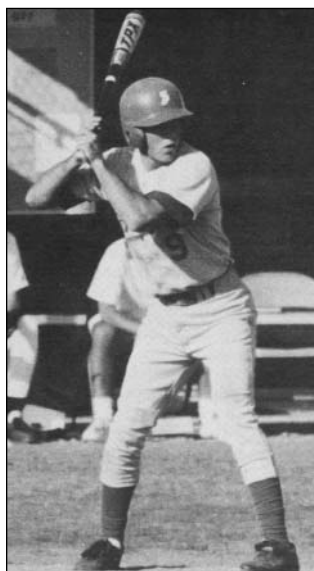

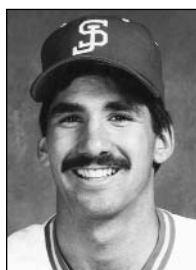

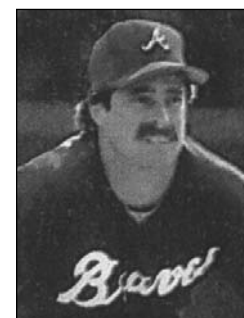

The 2000 San Jose State University baseball team made the program's first trip to the College World Series, winning the Waco Regional and the Houston Super Regional, both in Texas, on its way to Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, Neb. It was the Spartans' first NCAA Championship appearance in 29 years, since 1971. San Jose State upended nationally-ranked Florida twice in Waco and knocked off then-fifth-ranked host University of Houston in three games during the Super Regional.

In Omaha, the Spartans dropped 10-6 and 6-3 decisions to Clemson and fellow first-timer Louisiana-Lafayette, finishing their magical season with an overall record of 41-24. The Spartans shared the Western Athletic Conference championship in 2000 with perennial league powerhouse Rice, each with marks of 19-11.

Head coach Sam Piraro was recognized as the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) West Region Coach of the Year, the *Rawlings* Coach of the Year and the WAC Coach of the Year. Junior outfielder Brandon Macchi, sophomore designated hitter Junior Ruiz, senior pitcher Jared Sandler and sophomore second baseman Brian Stream were all selected to the Waco Regional All-Tournament Team. Ruiz was the WAC Player of the Year and a first-team All-WAC honoree. Catcher Adam Shorsher, first baseman John Fagan, third baseman Tony Tognetti and pitchers Chris Key and Tim Adinolfi all earned spots on the All-WAC second team.

### 2000 San Jose State University Baseball NCAA College World Series Timeline

#### **2000 NCAA Waco Regional (Baylor Ballpark in Waco, Texas)**

##### **Game 2, May 26, 2000: (3) San Jose State 4, (2) Florida 1**

Senior left-hander Chris Key tossed a four-hit complete game, allowing just one run and one walk while striking out three. The Spartans scored single runs in the third through sixth innings, including a solo home run by sophomore catcher Adam Shorsher in the sixth to give them a 4-0 advantage. Sophomore DH Junior Ruiz drove in a pair.

##### **Game 4, May 27, 2000: (3) San Jose State 5, (4) Southwest Texas State 2**

Junior right-hander Joey Baker threw the second straight complete game by a Spartan, allowing nine hits and two runs, just one of them earned, while striking out six without issuing a walk. Senior third baseman Tony Tognetti and junior first baseman John Fagan came through offensively with a two-run home run and solo shot in the first and second innings, respectively, to trot the Spartans out to a 3-0 lead.

##### **Game 6, May 28, 2000:**

##### **(2) Florida 8, (3) San Jose State 7**

San Jose State was just one out away from the Super Regional as senior left-handed starter Tim Adinolfi got the first two outs in the ninth with the Spartans ahead, 7-4, but the second-seeded Gators rallied for four runs to win the game, 8-7, and force a deciding game between the two teams the following day.

##### **Game 7, May 29, 2000: (3) San Jose State 3, (2) Florida 1**

With the season on the line, senior left-hander Jared Sandler got the starting call from head coach Sam Piraro for the first and only time in his major college career, and threw a five-hit complete game, giving up one run and four walks with four strikeouts. The Spartans got all the runs they needed in the first two innings on RBI singles by Tony Tognetti, Brandon Macchi and Ryan Brucker.



## 2000 NCAA Houston Super Regional (Cougar Field in Houston, Texas)

### Game 1, June 2, 2000: San Jose State 5, Houston 3

Chris Key again started things off for the Spartans, earning his 13th win of the season by allowing just six hits and three runs, one of them earned, over 7.1 innings pitched with five strikeouts and no walks. Tim Adinolfi got the final five outs for his seventh save. Offensively, Brandon Macchi's three-run home run to left with two outs in the top of the third was the big blow. Macchi finished with four RBI.

### Game 2, June 3, 2000: Houston 5, San Jose State 2

The host Cougars forced a third-game decider on their home field, breaking a 2-2 tie with three runs in the top of the 14th inning. Brandon Macchi homered for the second straight day for the Spartans, a two-run shot to right field with two outs in the bottom of the seventh to knot the game at 2-2. Jared Sandler threw 5.1 innings of scoreless relief before eventually getting pinned with the loss.

### Game 3, June 4, 2000: San Jose State 3, Houston 2

Tim Adinolfi was back on the mound as the starter just two days after his 1.2 frames of scoreless relief, and he went eight strong innings to earn his eighth win of the year. The Spartans took a 2-0 lead in the top of the second inning on a two-out, two-run home run by senior leftfielder Rob Douglass. What proved to be the game-winning run, however, came on John Fagan's solo shot to left with one out in the top of the sixth.

## 2000 NCAA College World Series (Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, Neb.)

### Game 1, June 9, 2000: Clemson 10, San Jose State 6

The Spartans kicked off the 2000 College World Series, falling behind to Clemson, 10-2 after three innings before pulling back to within just four runs at 10-6. Sophomore second baseman Brian Stream had a two-out, two-run triple in the fourth and John Fagan added a solo home run with two outs in the fifth. Junior right-hander Chris Sherman allowed a pair of unearned runs over 5.2 innings in relief of starter Chris Key.

### Game 6, June 11, 2000: Louisiana-Lafayette 6, San Jose State 3

A two-run, one-out home run by John Fagan, his second in as many games at the College World Series and team-leading 13th of the year, pulled the Spartans to within one run at 4-3 in the top of the seventh inning, but Louisiana-Lafayette went on to the 6-3 victory to end San Jose State's dream season. Rob Douglass had three hits.

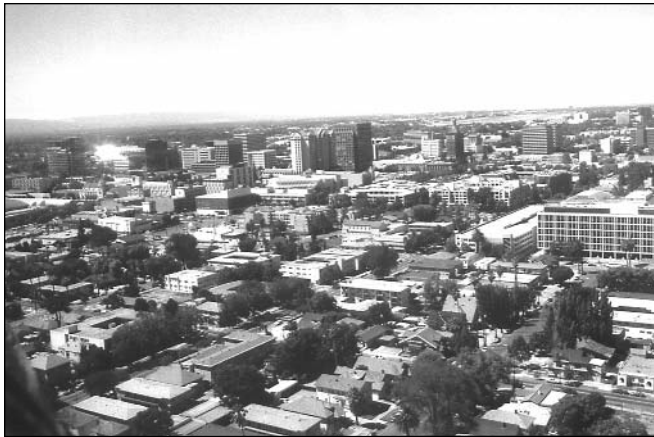

San Jose State provides a comprehensive university education, granting bachelor's and master's degrees in 134 areas of study. From its beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, SJSU has matured into a metropolitan university. Quality teaching and small classes are a priority at SJSU, where tenured professors teach introductory as well as advanced courses. One of the 200 top research universities in the nation, SJSU offers rigorous course work and research opportunities to more than 30,000 undergraduate and graduate students in eight colleges.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

Graduating about 7,000 students annually, San Jose State University also provides the professional infrastructure for the region – from teachers to social workers to artists to law enforcement officers to nurses. His distinguished professional history in academia began in 1967 at Washington State University. Positions at Highline Community College in Seattle and the University of California preceded an 11-year tenure (1974-1985) at West Virginia University, where he gained full professorship and was Interim Dean of the College of Creative Arts. Dr. Whitmore spent five years (1985-1990) at the University of Iowa as the Dean, Faculty of Arts and Letters and a professor of theatre.

He was the Dean of the College of Fine Arts, the Effie Marie Cain Regents Chair and a professor of theatre at the University of Texas (1990-1996) and the Provost and a professor of theatre at the University of Iowa (1996-2003).

The native of Seattle, Wash., earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in speech from Washington State University. He and his wife, Jennifer, have a son, Ian, enrolled at the University of Iowa, and daughter, Amy, enrolled at Vanderbilt University.

**I**n the fall of 2005, San Jose State University opened the doors of Campus Village to more than 2,279 students, faculty and staff.

Positioned on Tenth Street between San Carlos and San Salvador, on the southeast corner of the main campus, the Campus Village is a gateway to incredible academic resources and campus activities, the excitement of downtown San Jose, the opportunities of Silicon Valley, and some of the world's greatest recreational areas.

The Campus Village includes three buildings featuring apartment and suite-style living accommodations and a typical college dormitory experience. Campus Village includes recreational and study areas, a full-service computer lab, wireless Internet access, an interactive gaming center, laundry facilities, meeting rooms, retail stores and underground parking for 700 vehicles. Fully-equipped nearby recreational facilities offer residents space to work out, swim, play basketball, volleyball, ping-pong or pool.

Hassle-free access to the main campus is another asset to the Campus Village. Walking to the Student Union or to The Event Center, home of the San Jose State University men's and women's basketball teams, takes five minutes or less. Residents also can walk or bike to the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library without crossing any streets.

## The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library

**T**he Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library, located on the main campus of San Jose State University, opened in August, 2003.

A first-of-its-kind collaboration between a city and a university, the \$177-million, 475,000 square-foot library provides a center for life-long learning. Students, faculty and the community have access to the information they will need for educational and personal growth throughout their lives.

The 10-floor library features:

- 3,623 seats
- 1,800 seats wired for the Internet
- 400 public computers
- 135 databases of information
- Four computer instruction laboratories
- 112 workstations available in the computer instruction labs
- 37 group-project rooms

The collaborative design provides many opportunities for academic, cultural and community programs. Multilingual and special collections for San Jose's diverse ethnic groups are available. An adaptive technology area assures all people have the ability to access the information and databases available.

## Blethen Field

Thanks to a generous gift from Fred and Sandra Blethen-Chasalow, the San Jose State University baseball program was able to refurbish its once-antiquated practice facility into a first-rate practice and alternate game site.

The gift, totaling nearly \$350,000, enabled SJSU head coach Sam Piraro and his staff to make improvements in several areas, including the construction of dugouts and a new outfield fence, grandstand seating, a scoreboard and a press box, installation of an infield irrigation system, and electrical improvements.

A new backstop, fencing, batting cages and the outfield fence were originally constructed in the fall of 1997. The next spring, after the Blethens' initial gift, the outfield fence was moved and other improvements completed.

The field was also renamed Blethen Field, in memory of Howard "Lefty" Blethen, who played baseball at San Jose State from 1933 to 1935, and is the father-in-law and father of Fred and Sandra Blethen-Chasalow, respectively. Lefty was inducted into the SJSU Baseball Hall of Fame in 1987.

Blethen, who is recognized as the first San Jose State graduate to sign a professional baseball contract, enrolled at then-San Jose Normal School after playing professional baseball in the St. Louis Browns organization. His professional playing career included a brief stint in the major leagues. After graduation, he was a teacher and an elementary school principal in the Bay Area for 33 years.

His support of San Jose State continued the rest of his life, including serving as a member of the board of directors of the Spartan Foundation, the athletic department's fundraising organization. His wife, Laura (Wolf) Blethen, graduated from San Jose State in the late 1930s. She taught in Santa Barbara, Calif., and in the Bay Area, before becoming a speech pathologist.

"This is about Lefty and Laura, who were there through the 60s, 70s and 80s," said Fred Chasalow. "We're so glad that we'll be able to honor both Lefty and Laura."

Piraro says the gift has helped in three ways – recruiting, providing an alternate playing facility, and fundraising. "Now, we can take a recruit to our practice field and feel proud," Piraro said. "It gives us an alternative playing facility. In the past we've been totally dependent on Municipal Stadium. (And) it gives us a chance to raise money for the program through the rental of the facility."

"I'm glad that we've been able to make a difference in the future of the program," Fred Chasalow said, adding that another San Jose-area resident, Alan Smith, started the initial discussions and did a lot of the preliminary work with Piraro on the project. Smith was Laura Blethen's financial advisor.

A dedication ceremony was held prior to the 2001 alumni game. Blethen Field is the second home of the San Jose State Spartan baseball team. The field also hosts area high school

playoff games and selected summer league competitions.

"It has been a very challenging experience," said Piraro. "But the family has been very supportive. I can't say enough good things about them."

## Municipal Stadium

San Jose Municipal Stadium, located at the corner of Alma Street and Senter Road, is the primary home field for the San Jose State baseball team.

Built in 1941 at a cost of \$80,000, this city-owned natural-grass stadium was a Public Works Administration project. "Muni" was one of the first stadiums built entirely of reinforced concrete, and has been known for years as one of the state's finest minor league baseball facilities.

Over the years, the 5,200-seat stadium has served as the home field for the San Jose Owls, the San Jose Missions, the San Jose Bees, the San Jose Expos and now, the San Jose Giants, the Class A Advanced California League affiliate of the San Francisco Giants.

With the new outfield wall that was rebuilt during the 2007 season, field dimensions are now 320 feet down the foul lines, 365 feet to the gaps and 390 feet to straightaway center field.

A new scoreboard was installed during the 2006 season. The visitor's clubhouse that San Jose State occupies was re-painted in Spartan colors prior to the 2007 season, with logos and signage. Further stadium improvements took place in addition to the outfield wall during the 2007 calendar year, including new bullpen areas and renovated seating areas.

Tom Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of intercollegiate athletics on December 20, 2004. Under his leadership and with his vision for the department, San Jose State has established itself as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program with proven athletics and academic successes and financial advancements to his credit.

### CULTURE OF CHAMPIONS

At the core of Bowen's mission for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community. To that end, the Notre Dame alum has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; initiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with the creation of Spartan Sports Properties.

Bowen has led the Spartan Foundation - the department's fundraising component - through cyclical economic conditions to unprecedented development heights at the University. The Spartans have produced annual budget surpluses under his direction and have re-invested their gains back into their student-athletes and teams.

An integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and other campus extra-curricular activities. His initiatives and leadership foster energy department- and university-wide. Athletics' increased visibility has coincided with record donations coming to the University, particularly in 2006-07.

Since taking over, San Jose State has more football wins in a three-year period than any similar span since 1990-92. The 2006, 2007 and 2008 Spartans are the first three Spartan teams to post consecutive .500 or better records in the Western Athletic Conference football standings. In 2006, football capped its finest season in nearly two decades, posting a 9-4 overall record and capturing the New Mexico Bowl championship.

Athletics success extends beyond football in this 16-sport intercollegiate program. Baseball, women's golf and women's soccer are the most recent teams to win a conference championship. Women's water polo is a consistent top-10 national program and had its best season in 2009. Women's swimming finished the

2008-09 season with one of the longest dual meet winning streaks in Division I. Women's gymnastics is entrenched as a NCAA Regional Championship qualifying team. Men's basketball and men's soccer have produced measurable gains the last four years, particularly in conference competition.

Individually, Spartans have earned All-America honors in baseball, football, women's golf and women's water polo. San Jose State had its first women's gymnastics individual NCAA Regional champion in 2009. Twelve student-athletes were honored nationally and nearly another hundred at the conference level for academic achievements in 2008-09.

Bowen's vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a Student Success Services component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores, as measured by the NCAA, have risen steadily under his watch and were at a university best in the 2009 report.

He has appointed new head coaches in football, women's soccer, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's golf, women's golf, women's swimming and diving, softball, women's cross country and women's volleyball. Since 2005, coaches in baseball, women's golf, water polo, women's soccer and softball have received conference Coach of the Year recognition.

In 2008, San Jose State was named as one of 12 Division I universities cited for Overall Excellence in Diversity in the most recent national study by Texas A&M on behalf of the NCAA.

### A VALUED PROFESSIONAL

Bowen's proven record at San Jose State has resulted in meaningful national appointments in college athletics. He is one of eight Football Bowl Subdivision directors of athletics serving on the 24-member NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee. In 2009, he was one of 12 named to serve as a mentor to aspiring women and ethnic minority athletics administrators in the NCAA Fellows Leadership Program.

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the Director of Community Affairs for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. He directed all of the team's fund-raising activities and was responsible for alumni and current player participation in the community. Also serving as the executive director of the 49ers Foundation, San Francisco was the first NFL franchise to implement an annual giving program.

His Division I experience at the collegiate level includes athletics administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. As an assistant and associate director of athletics at the University of California from July 2000 through September 2002, he was responsible for athletics fund-raising. Bowen was credited with developing the first comprehensive planned giving program for the Golden Bears.

At Saint Mary's College, he was the Director of Foundations and Corporate Relations from May 1995 to January 1997, before being appointed to an associate director of athletics position by the president of the college. His grant proposal acumen helped raise \$6.1-million in academic funding for the institution. From January 1997 through April 2000, he managed the athletics department's budget, directed a corporate sponsorship program and interacted with the academic senate, faculty and university personnel on student-athlete issues.

His first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987-95, he held the titles of athletics director and assistant football coach.

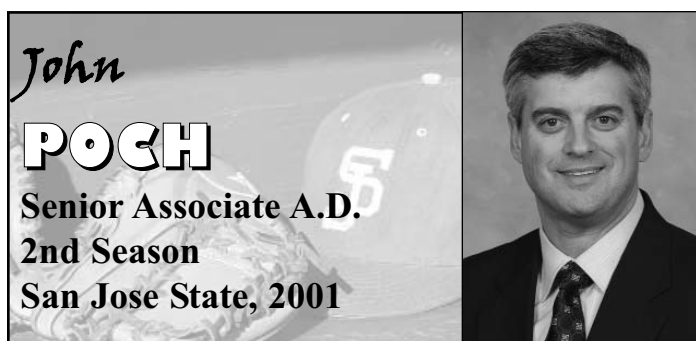
## EDUCATION & COMMUNITY

He is a Level 2 certified member of the College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA) and has memberships in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the National Society of Fund Raising Executives.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame majored in theology/sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

An active member of the Bay Area community, he was named to the 2008 *San Jose Mercury News*' Top-25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in the Bay Area. He serves on the board of the San Jose Sports Authority. He is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management and at San Jose State University's Department of Kinesiology where he teaches sports management classes. Bowen is a frequent guest lecturer at several Bay Area university campuses and continues to speak before major corporations headquartered locally on the topics of leadership, management and motivation.

The Denver, Colo., native and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children: sons, Andrew and Peter, and daughter, McKenna.



John Poch returned to San Jose State University in January 2009 as a Senior Associate Athletics Director/Deputy Director of Athletics. His duties include overseeing and managing the department's external relations components of fund-raising, licensing, branding, marketing, community relations and media relations.

Poch served as the Tournament Director of the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Women's College Cup hosted by San Jose State University and was an assistant coach for the Spartans' women's soccer team from 1995 to 2000. Under his direction, the 1999 College Cup attracted more than 28,000 spectators for two semi-final contests and the championship match. The 14,410 in attendance for the championship game remains the top attendance figure for a Women's College Cup contest.

As a San Jose State assistant coach, he was on the ground floor of the new Spartan program. In the first five seasons, San Jose State posted a 53-44-3 overall win-loss record and a 11-9-2 mark in Western Athletic Conference action.

Poch also was a successful youth soccer coach at the prep, club and Olympic Development levels. San Jose's Pioneer High School won three Central Coast Section championships in boy's soccer. He was named the National Coach of the Year in 2001 by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) for the Youth Girl's Competitive category.

From 2000 through 2008, he was the executive director of the After-School All-Stars of Greater San Jose - a program targeting at-risk youths. In his eight years, After-School All-Stars grew from a two-person staff with a \$275,000 annual operating budget, to a full-time staff of 36 and 230 part-time employees and a \$3.9-million budget comprised largely of dollars raised through his fund-raising acumen and direction. More than 3,000 students from 50-plus elementary and middle schools in San Jose benefited annually from After-School All-Stars when he elected to return to San Jose State athletics in an executive role.

He is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics) and remains well-connected in San Jose. He also serves on the board of directors for After-School All-Stars.

The 2001 San Jose State University graduate majored in kinesiology. As a student-athlete, he played football at West Valley College before enrolling at San Jose State. John and his wife, Debora, a 1988 San Jose State University graduate, are the parents of one daughter, Nicole.

Liz Jarnigan joined the San Jose State University staff in June 2008. Originally named the Director for Student-Athlete Success Services, she was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Student Services in June 2009. In her expanded role, she oversees compliance, academics, student services, life skills, student-athlete advising and tutoring and the assignment of learning specialists.

Jarnigan came to San Jose State from the University of Tulsa. She was the Coordinator of Student Services (2001-06) and an Associate Athletics Director for Student Services (2007-08). In 2003 and 2004, she was honored locally with the Tulsa Area Girls and Women in Sports Role Model Award.

Her professional career began at Briar Cliff College where she was an Assistant Athletics Director (1994-96) and Interim Director of Athletics (1996).

The 1987 graduate cum laude of St. Olaf College in was a four-year letterwinner in volleyball. She received her master's degree in athletic administration from Fort Hays State University in 1988.

Jarnigan has high school and college teaching and coaching experiences in Minnesota, Iowa and Kansas. She was the women's volleyball head coach at Bethel College (1989-94), Briar Cliff College (1994-96) and Carleton College (1996-99). Her 1992 Bethel College squad was a conference champion, and she was named the conference Coach of the Year for the team's accomplishment.

One half of a coaching family, her husband, Jeff Jarnigan, is a professional football coach. Most recently, he was the defensive coordinator for the San Jose SaberCats of the Arena Football League.

The Jarnigans are the parents of three children, Mary, Jack and Emily. They reside in Los Gatos, Calif.

Ken McDonald, an administrator in the San Jose State Athletics Department since 2005, is Associate Athletics Director for Advancement and the Executive Director of the Spartan Foundation.

He originally joined the Spartans' staff as an Assistant Athletics Director to head up corporate sales. In 2006, he shifted his focus to the Spartan Foundation - the fund-raising arm for San Jose State University student-athlete scholarships. Faced with an economically-challenged environment, volunteer drive workers under his leadership still raised an unprecedented \$3.8-million plus over the last three years for the university's 400-plus member student-athlete population.

McDonald also has a history of successful revenue generation in the private sector. He was a development consultant for the Boys & Girls Club of Oakland, Calif. McDonald worked in sales, promotions and marketing for two Northern California-based brewing companies. He also was the founder and president of Gamut, Inc., a commercial construction company. More than \$3.0-million per year came into these companies as a result of his sales and fund-raising acumen.

The graduate of Stanford University majored in English and earned a master of science degree in wildland resource science from the University of California, Berkeley. While at Stanford, he played on the 1966 freshman football team and was a member of the 1970 national championship rugby team.

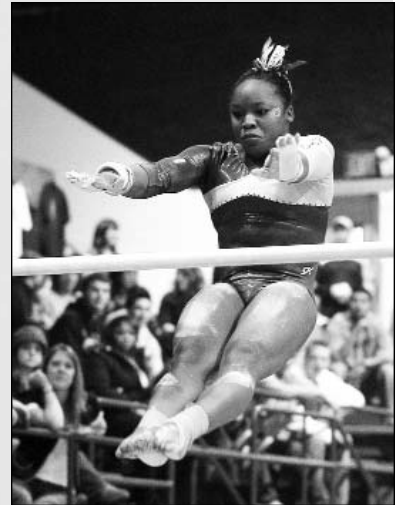

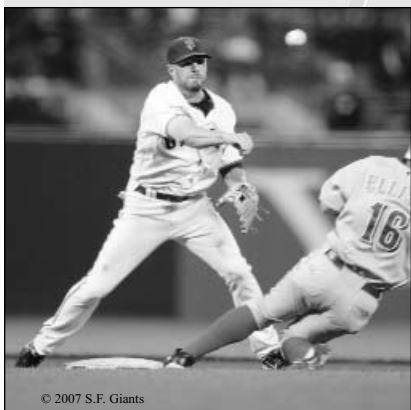

# Strength & Conditioning

## The Koret Athletic Training Center

The Koret Athletic Training Center, opened in November, 2001, is a state-of-the-art facility that encompasses over 10,000 square feet of training space, and is located adjacent to Spartan Stadium, the athletic locker rooms and the football practice field.

The Koret Athletic Training Center also contains a 1,000-square-foot rehabilitation and training room that services physical therapy and sport-specific rehabilitation. The facility enables the sports medicine staff of athletic trainers, doctors and physical therapists to provide the best possible care to help prevent and rehabilitate injuries.

### “Our Philosophy”

- We teach a hands-on approach where the student-athlete is expected to develop a comprehensive understanding of not only the How’s, but also the Why’s of our program.
- We teach correct movement patterns to optimize efficiency and performance.
- Our program design is centered on ground-based, free weight, multi-joint movements that will transfer to the playing field and keep our student-athletes out of our sports medicine facility.
- Our primary concern is the development of speed in all our sports.
- We develop speed and flexibility through strength.
- Our speed program consists of functional and straight-line speed training. Functional means acceleration, deceleration and change-of-direction work.
- We train through an entire range-of-motion in all lifts to enhance active flexibility, develop strength to prevent injury, and unlock joints with mobility issues.
- Olympic-based movements are utilized for speed of movement, active flexibility and dynamic stability.
- Squats and deadlifts have a permanent home in our program for developing hip strength and back stability. Single-leg variations are used to fix strength imbalance and lateral deficits.

# Jeff Garcia Hall of Champions



The Jeff Garcia Hall of Champions is the latest addition to the San Jose State Athletics Department. Located in the Koret Athletic Training Center, this interactive display features great athletes, great teams, great events and moments in San Jose State Athletics history. Former Spartan athletes that became famous after graduation, great donors, great coaches and administrators are on display. Also displayed in the Jeff Garcia Hall of Champions is the San Jose State Sports Hall of Fame, which includes over 300 former players and coaches.

“I am excited to be able to give something of this magnitude back to San Jose State University,” Garcia said in 2001. “They have been such an integral part of my life. I am just happy to be at a point in life that I can do something like this. My family and I are proud to create this legacy that will always serve as a reminder of how much San Jose State means to me.”

Garcia was a quarterback on the 1991, 1992 and 1993 San Jose State teams. As a sophomore, he was third nationally in passing efficiency. He led San Jose State to its first win in school history over a Big Ten Conference team, the University of Minnesota, and went on to receive honorable mention All-America recognition in 1992. The former school record-holder for total offense with 7,274 yards was named the Outstanding Offensive Player at the 1994 East-West Shrine All-Star Game in Palo Alto, Calif.

Professionally, he played five seasons (1994 through 1998) for the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League, was a four-time all-star and led the team to the 1998 Grey Cup championship. Garcia joined the San Francisco 49ers in 1999 and took the team to playoff appearances in 2001 and 2002. He was a Cleveland Brown in 2004, with the Detroit Lions in 2005, led the Philadelphia Eagles to the 2006 NFC playoffs, was a starter for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2007, earning a trip to the Pro Bowl, stayed with the Bucs in 2008, and spent time with both the Oakland Raiders and the Eagles in 2009. Garcia earned his undergraduate degree as a business administration major from San Jose State University through the National Football League's Continuing Education Program.



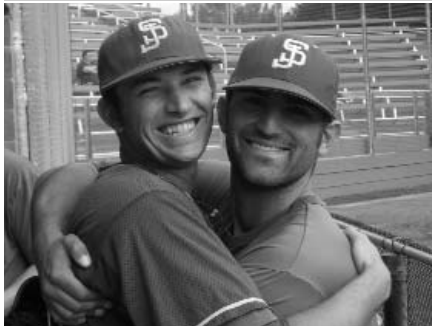

## CHAMPS/Life Skills

The San Jose State University athletics department introduced the Spartan CHAMPS/Life Skills program in 1998. The program is developed for use by colleges and universities and is supported by the NCAA Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association and the NCAA.

### CHAMPS/Life Skills = Challenging Athletes' Minds for Personal Success

CHAMPS/Life Skills is dedicated to providing student-athletes with the best growth opportunity in five major areas - A Commitment to Academic Excellence, A Commitment to Athletic Excellence, A Commitment to Personal Development, A Commitment to Service, and A Commitment to Career Development.

## San Jose State Baseball Scholar-Athletes

San Jose State Baseball is synonymous with success both on the field and in the classroom.

In 1978, Spartan infielder Randy Johnson was honored as a first-team Academic All-American - the first SJSU baseball player to receive this distinction. Three other Spartans have also received Academic All-America recognition - Dana Corey (3rd team, 1983), Donnie Rea (2nd team, 1989) and Kevin Tannahill (2nd team, 1989). Former Spartan starting pitcher Dave Sick was an Academic All-District VIII honoree for four seasons. Current fourth-year senior second baseman Karson Klauer has garnered CoSIDA/ESPN *The Magazine* Academic All-District VIII Baseball First Team accolades for 2007-08 and 2008-09.

There are eight San Jose State University Scholar-Athletes on the 2010 roster, with 12 recognized for the 2008-09 academic year. The distinction is given to Spartans who post a 3.00-or-better cumulative grade point average. A baseball player has had the highest grade point average among male Spartan student-athletes in four of the last five academic years, with Wes Porter (3.66 GPA) in 2004-05 and Klauer (3.91) in each of the past three. Baseball players occupied the top three spots in 2006-07, with Josh Amberson (3.757) and Greg Fyfe (3.756) behind Klauer, and two of the top five in the last two years (Danny Stienstra and Jack Adams, respectively alongside Klauer).

The Spartans have also produced numerous Academic All-WAC honorees the past four seasons, with four in 2005-06, eight in 2006-07, seven in 2007-08 and a program-best 10 in 2008-09.

On August 2, 2007, the WAC named former Spartan pitcher Corey Cabral (2003-07) the recipient of the 2006-07 Stan Bates Award. He became the first male scholar-athlete to earn the prestigious distinction in San Jose State's 11th year as a member of the conference. The annual award, named in honor of former WAC commissioner Stan Bates, recognizes the top individual male and female scholar-athletes in the conference based on academic record, athletic performance, character, sportsmanship, leadership and community service.

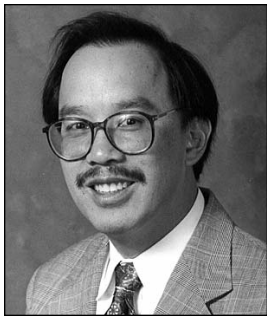
