







Lawrence Tang Fan (1954-2022) was born in San Francisco, California, on September 9, 1954. He was a proud 1972 graduate of Lowell High School and received his degree in economics from the University of California Berkeley in 1976. After heading to the Midwest to earn his master's degree at Western Illinois in 1978, he worked at LaSalle University in the sports information department. Lawrence returned to the Bay Area when he accepted the Sports Information Director position at San Jose State in 1980.

Sports were a constant in Lawrence's life. A lifelong San Francisco Giants and San Francisco 49ers fan (how appropriate), he talked fondly of taking the buses to see games at Kezar Stadium with his brother, Stephen. His father was a 49ers season ticket holder until his death, even picking out his seats at Levi's Stadium. Lawrence and his brother continued this tradition as they remained ticket holders.

Serving in the SJSU Athletics Department for 42 years, Lawrence was a champion in representing San Jose State to local, state and national media. He put the Spartan student-athletes before himself and served the Bay Area media in many capacities including arranging interviews for all Spartan athletes and serving as the spokesman for the department.

One of his greatest achievements that he was proud to publicize happened on November 11, 2021, when he worked his 500th consecutive San Jose State football game.

Lawrence has been a great mentor to those who worked in the sports information/media relations/ strategic communications industry. He never forgot a face or a fact and treated everyone the same, whether you were the star guard on the basketball team, a walk-on on the women's water polo team, a national media member or a student reporter in your first semester.

His legacy will live on in everyone.

Head Football Coach



Brent Brennan, a San Jose native and secondgeneration Spartan, enters his sixth season as the San Jose State University football head coach in 2022.



"Climb the Mountain" was a San José State University football rallying cry and a team slogan during its 2020 championship season.

The Spartans come off a 5-7 injury plagued season in 2021 in which backup quarterback Nick Nash was moved to wide receiver for a few games due to lack of healthy bodies. Two Spartans signed NFL contracts in the offseason in Jack Snyder (LAR) and Derrick Deese, Jr. (DET).

In 2020, Brennan led the Spartans to a 7-1 record with their first Mountain West Conference championship and first league title of any kind since sharing the 1991 Big West Conference championship and first outright crown since winning the Big West in 1990. The Spartans were

back in the post-season bowl picture for the first time since 2015 and ranked in the final Associated Press poll since 2012 (24).

The Spartans ended the 2020 season at the Offerpad Arizona Bowl while playing the fifth toughest schedule of the season according to the NCAA.

San Jose State's .875 winning percentage from its 7-1 record was the third best in school history and best by a Spartan team since 1940. The Spartans were one of the last four undefeated teams in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in 2020. Brennan became the first San Jose State football coach to receive votes in the Associated Press' coach of the year balloting with three first place votes and a fifth-place finish. He was a semifinalist for the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award and the George Munger Coach of the Year Award





conveyed by the Maxwell Football Club of Philadelphia. Brennan has an overall record of 20-37 at SJSU.

 Brennan coached San Jose State's only two players with at least 200 career receptions and 3,000 career receiving yards, Noel Grigsby and Chandler Jones. He also coached Josh Oliver, the Jacksonville Jaguars' 2019 third-round draft choice, and Ryan Otten, two of the top tight ends in school history.
- As the special teams coordinator, the 2008 Spartans were 20th nationally in kickoff returns and the 2007 team was ninth in punt returns.





• Brennan began his coaching career at Woodside (Calif.) High School in 1996. He served as a graduate assistant at the University of Hawaii in 1998, at the University of Washington in 1999 and at the University of Arizona in 2000. From 2001 through 2004, he was the receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Cal Poly.

- As a college player, Brennan was a wide receiver for the 1991 through 1995 UCLA teams and lettered on the Bruins' 1993 Rose Bowl squad. He majored in history and graduated from UCLA in 1996.
- Brennan watched San Jose State home football games growing up. His dad, the late Steve Brennan, was an end who lettered in the 1967 season. Brent and his wife, Courtney, have two daughters, Blake and Casey, and a son, Scott.

MATT ADKINS Tight Ends Coach



Matt Adkins is entering his sixth season with the San Jose State University football staff and his third as an assistant coach. From 2017 through 2019, he was a graduate assistant working with the offensive coaching staff and the tight ends specifically.

His 2020 tight end contingent included John Mackey Award semifinalist and current Detroit Lions tight end Derrick Deese, Jr., and Sam Olson. In 2019, he employed a trio of tight ends with diverse skill sets and each of the three had their most productive season at the major college level.

The 2018 season was different for the Spartan coach. Adkins coached first-team All-Mountain West tight end Josh Oliver, the 69th overall selection in the 2019 National Football League draft as a third-round choice of the Jacksonville Jaguars.

ALONZO CARTER

Assistant Head Coach Running Backs Coach



Alonzo Carter is entering his sixth season with the Spartans. He joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in January 2017 as the running backs coach and added the duties of recruiting coordinator in 2018 and assistant head coach in 2021.

The 2020 calendar year was an eventful one for Carter beyond coaching a running back group that seamlessly fit into a balanced and productive offense that won a Mountain West championship and finished ranked 24 in the final AP poll.



During the early stages of the COVID-19 pandemic and up to the start of the delayed season, Carter became a national figure through his West Coast Zoom clinics - weekly sessions involving hundreds of football coaches. The concept originated from the desire to assist minority coaches with upward mobility in the coaching profession, the # BlackLivesMatter movement, and the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on sports and society. Rooted in listening, learning and networking, the Spartan assistant coach relied on his professional connections and hosted engaging ZOOM calls lasting as long as seven hours either once or twice a week.

For his use of the Zoom technology platform, he received a 2020 Zoomtopia award for innovation - emphasis on diversity: bridging the divide.

In August, 2020, he was named to the National Coalition of Minority Football Coaches (NCMFC) executive committee. The organization's goal is to identify and groom coaches of color, and create a list of coaching candidates for upward mobility. The NCMFC recognized his organizational commitment through his recruitment of more than 100 new members, providing mentoring, and mock interview sessions with its MVP Advocate Award for 2020. Since August 2020, he assisted 26 NCMFC members that advanced to coaching positions of greater responsibility or visibility. On campus, he serves as an advisor to the student-athlete groups, People of Change and



#SJSpeaksUp.

The Spartans' running backs were productive and timely with their productivity during the 2020 Mountain West championship season. San Jose State averaged 4.5 yards per rush, its best average as a team in five years, and became the one of the first two teams in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) history to complete a season without losing a fumble by a ball handler on offense, defense and special teams. The



running backs' pass protection proficiency also contributed to San Jose State finishing tied for eighth nationally in fewest quarterback sacks allowed per game.

Carter came to the Spartans with much fanfare as a highly successful local community college and high school football head coach and an unparalleled five years in the world of musical entertainment.

The Spartan assistant has 18 years of head coaching experience. His teams compiled a 129-69-3 win-loss record, won 11 league championships, three California Interscholastic Federation (C.I.F.) Oakland Section titles, and six post-season bowl games. He was named a league or conference coach of the year in seven of those seasons.

At Cal State Hayward, he and a group of friends answered an audition call, became backup dancers and rap artists, and toured extensively with iconic hip-hop musician MC Hammer. Carter was awarded a multi-platinum record signifying at least 10 million albums sold for "Please Hammer Don't Hurt Em."

Carter was inducted into the African American Ethnic Sports Hall of Fame in 2001. He holds coaching certifications from the American Football Coaches Association, the California Interscholastic Federation and the California Community College Athletic Association. Carter was selected to participate in the Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship program in 2017 with the San Francisco 49ers.

Carter's coaching career began as McClymonds High's track and field coach in February 1993. In his three years as the track and field head coach, McClymonds produced eight league and section champions. He also had responsibilities as a varsity assistant football coach.

Rob Christoff joined the San Jose State University football staff as the outside linebackers coach in March 2021. He is entering his second season with the Spartans.

Christoff brings more than 25 years of college, high school and pro football coaching experiences to the Spartans. Most recently, he spent 2020 with the Seattle Dragons of the XFL as an assistant offensive line coach, his first coaching a position group on offense.

He has 10 seasons as a defensive coordinator – eight of them at Eastside Catholic High in Sammamish, Wash. The Crusaders won state championships in 2014, 2015, 2018 and 2019 and played in the 2012 and 2013 Class 3A state championship games.

Coached at Montana State when they won three Big Sky Conference championships (2002, 2003, 2005) and was on the staff when Idaho won the 2009 Humanitarian Bowl.

KEVIN MCGIVEN

Offensive Coordinator Ouarterbacks Coach



Kevin McGiven is entering his fifth season after he joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in February 2018 as the team's offensive coordinator. In 2021, he added the duties of coaching the quarterbacks to his responsibilities. The Spartans have won 17 games over the past three seasons under his guidance while they had only won seven games the three seasons before that.

In 2021, the Spartans had 28 touchdowns and 4081 yards and in 2020, he helped lead Nick Starkel and the Spartans to a Mountain West Championship with 2174 yards passing and 17 touchdowns in only eight games. The Spartans ended the 2020 season ranked 24 in the AP poll.

He has nurtured the college careers of quarterbacks Josh Love, the 2019 Mountain West Offensive Player of the Year, and Starkel, the 2020 Mountain West football championship game Most Valuable Offensive Player and a second-team all-conference selection. In the national rankings, San Jose State was fourth in passing offense in 2019 and 19th in the same category in its 2020 championship season.

McGiven has 16 seasons of experience coaching quarterbacks and coordinating NCAA Division I offenses.

Throughout his career, he coached three of the top six passing yardage signal callers at Utah State (Chuckie Keeton, Kent Myers, Diondre Borel), and the career passing yardage leaders at Montana State (Denarius McGhee) and Weber State (Cameron Higgins).

McGiven began his coaching career in 1998 at Louisiana Tech as a student assistant coach after being a wide receiver on the 1996 and 1997 Bulldog teams. He accepted an assistant coaching position in 2001 at Mountain View High in Orem, Utah, and returned to the college ranks in 2002 as a graduate assistant on the Brigham Young University staff.

DERRICK ODUM Associate Head Goach Defensive Coordinator



Derrick Odum is entering his sixth season as the Spartans' defensive coordinator in 2022, his tenure coordinating defenses is the second longest at San Jose State in the last 50 years. He added the title of associate head coach in February 2018.

Since joining the Spartans in 2016, Odum has recorded 20 wins and a Mountain West Championship.

The 2020 season was a banner year for the San Jose State defense en route to the MW championship. For the first time in 30 years, the Spartans limited the opposition to less than 20 points a game and finished 15th nationally in scoring defense. San Jose State ranked in the top-10 among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) teams in red zone defense (9th) and quarterback sacks (10th). The Spaertans ended the season ranked 24 in the AP poll.

The San Jose State defense's "big play" trait began showing itself in 2019 as the Spartans ranked ninth nationally in passes intercepted and in turnover margin. The Spartans' penchant for creating takeaways was most evident in its win that season at Arkansas with five interceptions as San Jose State defeated a Southwestern Conference (SEC) opponent for the first time in school history and was named the Reveal Suits Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) Team of the Week.

His players have earned 35 all-conference awards and eight of them were selected in a National Football League draft.



JOSH OGLESBY Offensive Line Coach



Josh Oglesby is entering his third season with the Spartans after he was named the San José State University offensive line coach in March 2020.

In his first season with the Spartans, his offensive linemen formed one of top pass protecting units nationally. Even with four different starting offensive lines in an eight-game season, San Jose State tied for eighth nationally yielding only 1.00 quarterback sacks per game. The Spartans also had their best rushing offense in five years averaging 4.5 yards a carry and 132.5 yards per game. Left tackle Jack Snyder became the first San Jose State offensive lineman in eight years to earn first-team all-conference honors. Snyder signed with the Los Angeles Rams in 2022.

At the University of Wisconsin, Oglesby was a 2011 first-team All-Big Ten honoree and an offensive lineman on the 2010 and 2011 Badgers teams that represented the Big Ten Conference in the Rose Bowl. Oglesby pursued a professional football career with Washington of the National Football League in 2012 before entering coaching.

JOE SEUMALO Defensive Line Goach



Joe Seumalo returned to San José State University for his second stint as the team's defensive line coach in 2017. In the same role in 2005, he is in his seventh season with the Spartans.

In San Jose State's 2020 Mountain West championship season, Cade Hall and Viliami Fehoko, two of his four starters, were first-team All-Mountain West honorees, only the second time in the last 20 years, two Spartan defensive linemen earned the accolade in the same year. Hall, a 2020 first-team All-America choice by The Saporting News, also became the second conference defensive player of the year to be coached by Seumalo.

Seumalo has 22 seasons of NCAA Division I experience coaching defensive linemen. Ten of his players went on to play professional football. Chris Gocong, who played for Seumalo at Cal Poly, finished second in the 2004 Buck Buchanan Award voting for the top defensive player in the NCAA Division I-AA classification, now know as the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS). Oregon State's Stephen Paea was the 2010 Pac-12 Conference Defensive Player of the Year.

A defensive lineman at the University of Hawaii from 1985 through 1988, Seumalo was a second-team All-Western Athletic Conference his senior season. He went on to play in the Canadian Football League for Calgary Stampeders and Ottawa Roughriders in 1989 and the Edmonton Eskimos in 1994. Seumalo concluded his pro playing career with the Rhein Fire of NFL Europe in 1995.

SCOTT WHITE Linebackers Coach Special Teams Coordinator



Scott White is entering his fifth season at San Jose State University. In 2021, he continues coaching the linebackers and served as special teams coordinator. White first joined the Spartans in 2018 as a football staff analyst. For the 2019 season, he was promoted to linebackers coach. He added the duties of special teams coordinator in 2020.

White was one of 59 nominees for the annual Broyles Award in 2021 recognizing the top NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) Division I assistant coach.

In 2021, White coached an inside linebacker group led by Kyle Harmon who led the country in total tackles (121) and was



fourth nationally in tackles per game (11.0). In four of the team's first 11 games, San Jose State limited the opposition to less than 100 rushing yards. Opponents have rushed for eight touchdowns, 12th best among FBS teams and second fewest in the 12-team Mountain West.

As the special teams coordinator in 2021, San Jose State was tied for fourth nationally with four blocked kicks (combined field goal and point after touchdown attempts) and is tied for 12th in total blocks (combined blocked kicks plus punts blocked) with five. The Spartans' punt return coverage ranked 14th allowing only 3.36 yards per return. Opponents attempted to return just 11 of 63 punts that season and no return was longer than 15 yards. San Jose State ranked second in the Mountain West and 34th nationally in kickoff return coverage and was 33rd in net punting averaging 41.27 yards per punt. Punter Will Hart had a 44.1 yard per punt average prior to the November 25 regular-season finale hosting Fresno State.

Since taking over the linebackers, Ethan Aguayo was a 2019 second-team All-Mountain West selection and returning starter Kyle Harmon was a 2020 and 2021 first-team All-Mountain West pick.

He coached some of the nation's top linebackers at UCLA.

Eric Kendricks, a 2019 first-team All-Pro with the Minnesota Vikings, was the 2014 Butkus Award and Lott Impact Trophy winner. In 2013, current Jacksonville Jaguars linebacker Myles Jack became the first player in Pac-12 Conference history to be named the conference's "Freshman of the Year" on offense and defense. Anthony Barr, the Minnesota Vikings' 2014 first-round draft choice, was a first-team All-America and finalist for the 2013 Butkus Award.

As a special teams coordinator, he oversaw the growth of UCLA kicker Ka'imi Fairbairn, the 2015 Lou Groza Collegiate Placekicking Award winner and current placekicker for the Houston Texans.

Was a four-year starter on the 2003 through 2006 University of Washington teams. He was a team captain and second-team All-Pac 10 Conference linebacker as a senior.


In between his two tenures at Oklahoma, Viney was at the University of Nevada in 2017 coaching cornerbacks.

REIS SAGGEBRUCH Graduate Assistant - Defense



Reis Seggebruch is entering his second season with the San José State University football coaching staff as a graduate assistant. In his first season with the Spartans, he worked with the defensive coaches.

Seggebruch began his coaching career at St. Thomas Catholic High School in Houston, Texas in 2019. As the linebackers coach, the Eagles won two TAPPS Division I District 3 titles and advanced to the 2019 semifinal round of the state championship.

The 2019 graduate of Cornell University majored in mechanical engineering. He was a linebacker on the 2015 through 2018 Big Red football teams. Seggebruch was credited with 198 tackles in three varsity seasons. As a 2018 senior, he was elected team captain, was named an honorable mention All-Ivy League selection, and received the team's Most Valuable Player award at the end of the season.

The Tomball, Texas native also served on the Cornell University Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and was named to the Red Key Service Organization - the university's athletics honor society.



TERRY MALLEY Football Analyst



Terry Malley is in his 11th season at San José State University and his fifth as a staff analyst. He previously coached the quarterbacks, running backs, tight ends, wide receivers and was the team's recruiting coordinator in his first six seasons.

Malley specializes in nurturing young players into meaningful contributors. His Spartans earned four all-conference honors, two freshman honorable mention All-America honors and set 14 school single-season and career records. Chandler Jones and Noel Grigsby, two of his wide receivers in 2011 and 2012, signed NFL free agent contracts in May 2014. Billy Freeman, the returning starter at tight end, was an honorable mention All-Mountain? West choice as a freshman during his San José State career.

Malley originally came to the Spartans in 2009 after spending 14 seasons with the San José SaberCats where he was regarded as one of the keenest offensive minds in Arena Football League history. In his 10 seasons as the team's offensive coordinator, San José won four Arena Football League championships, led the league in scoring four times and was second four other seasons.

With 37 years of coaching experience, Malley's coaching roots are in the Bay Area. Two-year stints at San José's Leland High (1976-77) and Moreau High in Hayward (1978-79) preceded five seasons (1980-84) as an assistant coach for legendary coach Pat Malley, his dad, at Santa Clara University, his alma mater. Terry was named head coach in 1985 and led the Broncos to a 47-39-1 win-loss record over eight seasons. Six of his eight teams were nationally-ranked among NCAA Division II schools.

Malley coached 27 all-conference players including long-time National Football League pros Brent Jones, a standout tight end for the San Francisco 49ers, and two-time Pro Bowl punter Bryan Barker. He was the Western Football Conference Coach of the Year in 1985, his first season, directing Santa Clara to an 8-2-1 record and a conference championship.

His first experience in professional football came in 1994 when he was named the Director of Football Operations for the SaberCats, an Arena Football League expansion franchise. Malley added the duties of General Manager in 1995. In 1999, he returned to the field as the offensive coordinator and retained his general manager responsibilities through 2006.

As a player, Malley was a quarterback, team captain and four-year letterwinner for Santa Clara during the 1972 through 1975 seasons.

Fred Guidici returned to San Jose State University in February 2017 as the Spartans' first quality control coach after being with the Spartans from 2012-14. He was named the Spartans' special teams coordinator again in February 2018. In 2020, Guidici took on the role of football analyst - special teams with the coaching staff. Overall, he is entering his ninth season with the Spartans.

The 1989 San José State graduate has more than 30 years of professional and college coaching experience

His first coaching stint with the Spartans covered the 2012 through 2014 seasons. San José State enjoyed a variety of special teams successes. He was the special teams coordinator all three seasons and coached the running backs in 2012 when the Spartans won the Military Bowl and finished 21st in the final Associated Press national poll.

The 2013 Spartans were the co-national leader for blocking seven opponent's kick scoring tries. Three of them came in the San Diego State game alone. For the first time in school history, the Spartans recorded back-to-back seasons of at least 100



kick-scoring points with a single-season team record 108 in 2012 and 105 in 2013. Punter Harrison Waid and placekicker Austin Lopez finished their careers as the University's leaders in yards per punt and kick scoring points, respectively. The 2012 San José State team successfully executed its first onside kick attempt in two years which resulted in a touchdown in the school's 62-52 victory over #16-Fresno State. The win was the Spartans' first over a top-20 ranked opponent since the 2000 season.

Also in 2012, the Spartans set a single-season school record for kick-scoring points, produced the program's highest percentage of field goals made in a season, scored points on punt defense and tied the San José State season record for kickoffs returned for a touchdown.

As the 2012 running backs coach, he coached De'Leon Eskridge, the Spartans' first 1,000-yard rusher in six seasons, and Tyler Ervin, who would later set the single-season school-record for rushing yards in 2015.

During the 2015 and 2016 seasons, Guidici was the special teams coordinator at the College of San Mateo. The Bulldogs won the 2016 Bay 6 Conference championship and were in the Northern California community college playoffs both seasons.

A long-time Bay Area resident, Guidici spent 16 seasons at Menlo College in nearby Atherton, Calif., with three seasons as the Oaks' head coach. The 2011 Menlo squad was the school's first in eight years to post a .500 or better win-loss record.

Guidici worked with Pro Football Hall of Fame and Super Bowl winning coach Bill Walsh (1931-2007) at Stanford as a defensive assistant coach.

Guidici spent 1995 with the Oakland Raiders as the defensive quality control coach. He moved on to the San José SaberCats of the Arena Football League in 1996 and coached the team's offensive and defensive lines and assisted with special teams coaching in his first three ARENA League seasons. Guidici returned to San Jose as an assistant coach for the 2015 season. The SaberCats posted a 20-1 record and won the Arena Bowl – the league's equivalent to the Super Bowl.

LYLE MOEVAO Football Analyst - Defense



Lyle Moevao joined the San José State University football coaching staff as an analyst in June 2021. He will be working with the team's defensive personnel and coaching staff.

Moevao (pronounced Moy-vow) comes to the Spartans from the University of Northern Colorado where he was the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator for the 2020 season. During the spring 2019, he was the running backs coach for the San Antonio Commanders of the Alliance of American Football (AAF). Moevao was the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator at Lewis and Clark College for the 2017 and 2018 seasons.

The 2010 Oregon State graduate majored in sociology and was a quarterback on the Beavers football team during the 2006 through 2009 seasons. As a starting quarterback, Oregon State posted a 14-4 win-loss record and won the 2007 Emerald Bowl in San Francisco and the 2008 Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas. Moevao went on to play two seasons of professional football in France and Japan.

BEN THIENES Assistant Athletics Director for Football Operations



Ben Thienes is entering his sixth season with the Spartans. He was promoted to Assistant Athletics Director for Football Operations in May 2020. Besides his role with the football program, Thienes is involved in the programming and planning of the Spartan Athletics Center facility project.

He was named SJSU's director of football operations in January 2017. During his professional career, he has been involved with eight teams to win a conference championship and/or participate in a post-season bowl game including the 2020 San José State University team. Thienes received the 2022 Football Scoop Operations Director of the Year Award presented by AstroTurf at the American Football Coaches Association's (AFCA) annual convention. The award encompasses the 2020 and 2021 seasons when the Spartans



won the Mountain West championship in 2020 and the daily challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic locally, statewide, and nationally.

Thienes came to the Spartans after serving as the linebackers coach and director of player personnel at Portland State University for the 2015 and 2016 seasons. The 2015 Vikings made their first appearance in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs in 15 years.

He began his college athletics career in 2007 at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High school in Parkland, Fla., as an assistant football coach. He was the team's defensive coordinator, special teams coordinator and defensive backs coach.

Thienes spent the 2008 through 2010 seasons at Ellsworth Community College in Iowa Falls, Iowa as an assistant football coach and strength and conditioning coordinator. Ellsworth won the 2008 and 2009 NJCAA Region XI Championships and Graphic Edge Bowls.

During the 2011 through 2013 seasons, he was a graduate assistant for the Boise State football program. He worked with the defensive backs and had various special teams responsibilities. The Broncos were the 2012 Mountain West champions, won bowl games in two of his three seasons and compiled an overall 31-8 win-loss record.

Thienes was at the University of Washington as a graduate assistant in 2014. He worked with the linebackers and special teams players. The Huskies finished their season playing in the Cactus Bowl.

TANNER Schultheis Director of Football Operations



Tanner Schultheis was named San José State University's director of football operations in December 2020.

Schultheis came to the Spartans after two seasons as director of football operations at Samford University.

The 2013 Ohio University graduate majored in sports administration and has worked his entire professional career in college football operations. His first assignment was as a recruiting and operations assistant at the University of Akron in 2014. He served as the director of football operations and assistant recruiting coordinator at Robert Morris University during the 2014 through 2016 seasons.

Before joining Samford University, Schultheis worked for USA Football as the national team's operations manager in 2017 and 2018.

At San José State, Schultheis will collaborate with Ben Thienes, the assistant athletics director for football operations, in the daily activities of the Spartans' football program.

TOBRUK BLAINE

Assistant Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Development/Beyond Football Coordinator



Tobruk Blaine joined the San Jose State University football staff in July 2017 as the program's first Beyond Football Coordinator. In June 2021, she was promoted to the new position of Assistant Athletics Director for Student-Athlete Development.

As the Beyond Football Coordinator, she is responsible for enhancing the lives of football student-athletes. The program's success led to taking its concepts department-wide to Beyond Sparta serving more than 450 student-athletes who are encouraged to explore what is around them, identify interests, and inspire themselves and others through a culture of volunteerism in a greater community. Student-athletes will develop career-focused proficiencies and cultivate knowledge, relationships and skills necessary to establish a successful personal and professional life beyond the game of football.

Blaine came to San Jose State with a background in coaching, teaching, fund raising and program building. She was a high school and college cheerleading coach at Eagle and Rocky Mountain High Schools in Idaho and at Boise State University. Her high school teams won the Idaho 5A state cheerleading championships twice for Eagle High (2005, 2006 and 2008) and twice for Meridian's Rocky Mountain High (2010). The 2016 and 2017 Boise State teams were named the United Spirit Association's (USA) national champion in the Division I Small Coed cheerleading category. Blaine was named the 2006 state of Idaho Cheerleading Coach of the Year for leading Eagle High to its championship.

While coaching at Eagle and Rocky Mountain High, she was a health sciences teacher. Her teaching style and philosophy was geared to students better understanding and aligning their approach to state and national health education standards. She developed effective student-teacher programs and lesson plans for students to meet and exceed the state and national standards. In 2012, she was one of 18 teachers from the state of Idaho honored at Boise State University's annual Barbara Morgan Mentor of the Year Awards program.

An effective fund raiser for the Boise State spirit squad program, she annually raised more than double the program's annual operating budget to support the university's cheerleading, dance aand mascot's program activities.

The 2002 Oregon State University graduate majored in health promotion and education. She has master's degrees in health education from Oregon State and educational leadership from the University of Idaho.

She holds certifications from the American Association of Cheerleading Coaches and Administrators and the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS). Blaine is certified by the American Red Cross in first aid and CPR.
