Ron Caragher accepted the head football coaching position at San José State University in December 2012.

Now in his third season, Caragher took the San José State reins as the program transitioned into the Mountain West Conference – arguably, the biggest leap in competition for a program that played its first football game in 1893. In his two seasons, the Spartans played 16 of 24 games against teams that would go on to post-season bowl games.

For the first time in 21 years covering five predecessors, he was a first-year San José State football head coach to produce a .500 or better winning percentage and a winning record in conference play with the 2013 Spartans. San José State finished 5-3 in its first Mountain West Conference season and 6-6 overall. In the university's previous two moves into new conferences in 1969/70 and 1996, San José State finished no better .500 in the league standings.

San José State concluded its 2013 season with its first victory over a top-20 team in 13 years when the Spartans outscored #16/#13-Fresno State, 62-52, ending a string of 21 consecutive losses to nationally-ranked opponents.

In 2013, San José State's balanced and potent offense set single-season school records for total offense, most passing yards, most first downs and most field goals, ranked in the top-20 nationally in passing offense and total offense per game.

Last year, San José State ended a 17-season winless streak in overtime games with a comeback win at Wyoming. The Spartans' combined four road wins in 2013 and 2014 compare favorably with the eight San José State head coaches before him. Overhauling a defense that ranked 103rd both in total defense and points allowed in 2013, the Spartans were the Football Bowl Subdivision's (FBS) top statistical team in fewest passing yards allowed, and finished 20 spots higher in scoring defense and 32nd overall in total defense in 2014.

Since 2013, 15 Spartans received All-Mountain West first, second or honorable mention all-conference honors, seven played in post-season all-star games and three were National Football League draft picks.

San José State's academic achievements are noteworthy, too. The program now is tied for second among the seven Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in California for its Academic Progress Rate score with an all-time high 975 (out of 1,000) score.

In each of the last two years, a program best 16 players earned academic all-conference honors - two more than the previous best of 14 in 2007. Three Spartan seniors were named to the National Football Foundation's Hampshire Honor Society in the last two years compared to one in the previous six. Also, current Spartan wide receiver Tim Crawley was named a 2015 Arthur Ashe, Jr., Sports Scholar.

Caragher came to San José State after six seasons at the University of San Diego (USD). The Toreros compiled a 44-22 win-loss record and were the 2007, 2011 and 2012 Pioneer Football League co-champions. Overall in eight seasons, Caragher's head coaching record is 53-37.

Twice, in 2007 and 2011, he was a nominee for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award recognizing the top head coach in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS). The 2007 team finished second in the final Sports Network Mid-Major Poll, ranked first among all FCS teams in scoring and passing efficiency and third in total offense.

In 2011, Caragher was the Pioneer Football League Coach of the Year after leading the Toreros to a third 9-2 win-loss record in five seasons and a ranking in FCS Coaches Top-25 poll during the regular season.

San José State is Caragher's fourth university in a coaching career that includes six bowl appearances between 1994 and 2006. The 1990 UCLA graduate got his first taste of college coaching as a graduate assistant at his alma mater in 1994. He was promoted to a full-time assistant's position in 1996. In seven seasons, he coached wide receivers, punters and kickers.

Before accepting the University of San Diego head coaching position, Caragher worked four years as the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Kentucky. In 2006, the Wildcats posted an 8-5 record, was invited to a bowl game for the first time in seven years and concluded the season with a Music City Bowl victory - Kentucky's first bowl win since 1984.

Born on January 24, 1967, in nearby Redwood City, Calif., the 48-year old Caragher grew up in San José and nearby Morgan Hill, and graduated from San José's Bellarmine Prep.

A college quarterback, Caragher played on the 1985 through 1989 UCLA teams that won four consecutive bowl games including the 1986 Rose Bowl.

Caragher and his wife, Wendy, focus their community service energies on the effects of autism – an interest that gained their attention when he was the head coach at the University of San Diego. His Spartans joined forces with the University's communicative sciences and disorders department and the Autism Tree Project Foundation based in San Diego to service locally affected youngsters and adults.

He and his wife, Wendy, have three sons - Josh, Ryan and Scott. Wendy is the San José State women's tennis volunteer assistant coach.

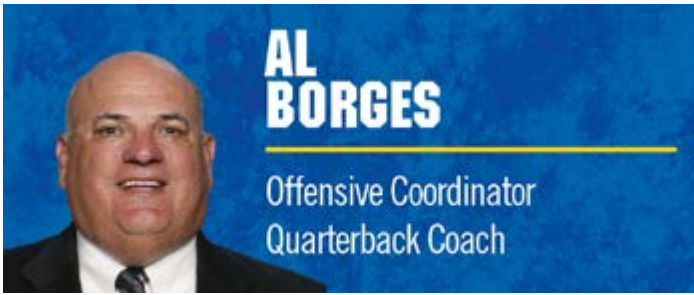

San José State has its first overtime win in 17 years, first victory over a nationally-ranked team since 2000, and a season of bowl eligibility and a winning conference record with Ron Caragher as head coach.



Al Borges joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in February 2015 as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

For Borges, the 2015 season marks a return working with Spartans head coach Ron Caragher. The two were part of the UCLA staffs during the 1996 through 2000 seasons when the Bruins won the 1998 Pac-10 championship and Rose Bowl and shared the conference title the previous season. At UCLA, he was a two-time finalist for the Broyles Award given annually to the top Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) assistant coach.

Borges has 27 seasons of major college experience and worked at seven FBS schools. His reach spreads from the Mountain West and Pac-12 in the west across the Mississippi River to the Big Ten and Southeastern Conference. Teams he coached played in 11 post-season bowl games and were ranked in the final FBS national polls seven times.

The 1981 Cal State, Chico graduate has high school, community college and major college coaching experiences starting in 1975 as an assistant coach at Salinas (Calif.). He spent three seasons at Diablo Valley College (1983-85) and was appointed an offensive coordinator for the first time in 1985.



His first major college coaching opportunity was in 1982 as an assistant coach at the University of California coaching tight ends and outside linebackers. In 1986, he began a seven-season stint as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Portland State. He moved to Boise State in a similar capacity for the 1993 and 1994. The 1994 Broncos finished third in the final Sports Network NCAA I-AA poll and played in the I-AA championship game.

Since 1995, Borges was an offensive coordinator at Oregon (1995), UCLA (1996-2000), California (2001), Indiana (2002-03), Auburn (2004-07), San Diego State (2009-10) and Michigan

(2011-13). In his four seasons at Auburn, the Tigers were ranked in the top-20 every year and had an undefeated season in 2004. UCLA finished in the top-10 in the 1997 and 1998 Associated Press polls. Oregon was ranked #18 in the final 1995 A.P. poll.

He and his wife, Nikki, have a son, Cole, and a daughter, Mady Joe.

Jimmie Dougherty joined the San José State University football coaching staff in January 2013. In 2015, besides his duties as Assistant Head Coach, he is serving as the Passing Game Coordinator and Wide Receivers Coach.

Dougherty was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in his first two seasons with the Spartans. San Jose State's quarterbacks combined to complete at least 60 percent of their passes in each season. The Spartans accomplished the feat in 2014 with three starting quarterbacks, each of whom exceeded 60 percent for the season. He was side-by-side with Joe Gray, who tied a Mountain West record for consecutive games passing for at least 300 yards, Blake Jurich, who completed 88.0 percent of his passes in a 2014 victory, and Mitch Ravizza, a dual-threat quarterback pressed into action when injuries sidelined Gray and Jurich.

Dougherty added the responsibilities of Assistant Head Coach in 2014. He was the mastermind behind one of the top offenses in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in 2013.

Nationally, the Spartans were sixth in passing offense, 15th in total offense and averaged 32.4 points per game.

San José State's offense set 10 single-season team school records and its players had a hand in tying or establishing more than 35 new school individual marks. Dougherty worked directly with quarterback David Fales on a passing game that gained more than 4,000 yards for the second season in a row. His success was recognized nationally as a 2013 nominee for the Broyles Award honoring the top assistant coach in the NCAA Division I FBS football.

He came to San José State after spending the 2009 through 2012 seasons coaching wide receivers at the University of Washington. In his last three seasons with the Huskies, Washington participated in the 2010 Holiday, 2011 Alamo and 2012 Maaco Las Vegas Bowls. Dougherty guided the college careers of Jermaine Kearse and Devin Aguilar, two of the top pass catchers to play at Washington. For 2012, Dougherty added the title of passing game coordinator.

The Spartans' offensive coordinator is reunited with San José State head coach Ron Caragher. The two worked together in 2007 and 2008 at the University of San Diego. In all, Dougherty coached five seasons with the Toreros. Dougherty's players included San Francisco 49ers quarterback Josh Johnson, who completed his seventh NFL season in 2014.

A quarterback at the University of Missouri during the 1997 through 2001 seasons, Dougherty began his coaching career at Illinois Wesleyan College in 2002 and was there two seasons coaching defensive backs.

The 2001 Missouri graduate majored in interdisciplinary studies. Dougherty earned his master's degree in sports management from Illinois State University in 2004. He and his wife, Harper, have two daughters, Collins and Ellie.

Dan Ferrigno joined the San Jose State University football staff in February 2015 as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach.

The San Francisco native returns to the West Coast after four seasons as the special teams coordinator and the tight ends coach at the University of Michigan. He brings more than 35 years of college coaching experience to San Jose State.

Through the years, Ferrigno (pronounced furr-reen-yo) was part of 11 teams that played in a post-season bowl game and developed outstanding players in all phases of special teams play and pass receiving.

While at Michigan, his placekicker Brendan Gibbons was a record-setting kick-scorer and Will Hagerup was named the Big Ten's Punter of the Year in 2012. At the University of California, he coached DeSean Jackson, one of the college game's most dangerous wide receiver/return specialists of the 2000's. He and his wife, Shondrela, have two sons, James, IV, and Wesley, and a daughter, Jzunie.

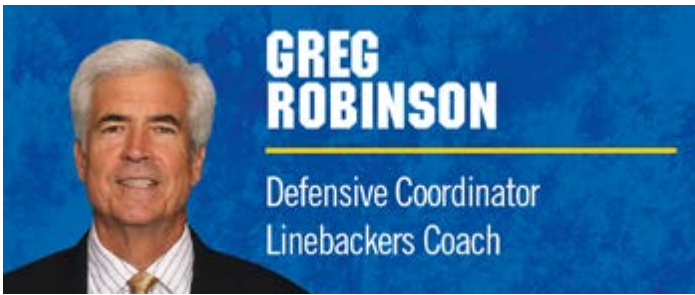

A two-time Super Bowl winner, Greg Robinson was appointed San José State University's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach in February 2014.

Robinson has five decades of National Football League (NFL) and NCAA Division I coaching experience to the Spartans. He was the Denver Broncos defensive coordinator (1995-2000) when the Broncos won Super Bowls XXXII and XXXIII in 1998 and 1999, respectively. He also was the defensive coordinator for the New York Jets (1994) and the Kansas City Chiefs (2001-03).

In his first season with the Spartans, San José State finished 32nd nationally in total defense, just the third time in the last 15 years the Spartans were in the top-40 in total defense. Five opponents were limited to less than 300 yards of total offense. San José State gave up the fewest passing yards per game among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) schools - 117.8 yards per game and was 12th nationally in pass efficiency defense.

Previously, Robinson coordinated defenses for the University of Texas (2004 & 2013) and the University of Michigan (2009 & 2010). The 2004 Texas team won the 2005 Rose Bowl and 2010 Michigan team played in the 2011 Gator Bowl.

Born on October 9, 1951, the Los Angeles native began his coaching career in 1975 at the University of the Pacific. In his early coaching years, he also worked at Cal State Fullerton (1977-79), North Carolina State (1980-81) and UCLA (1982-89). At UCLA, he was the defensive line coach (1982-88) and offensive coordinator (1989) when Caragher was a Bruins quarterback during the 1985 through 1989 seasons.

Overall, Robinson is a coach of 16 teams to play in a bowl game or advance to the NFL playoffs. During the 2005 through the 2008 seasons, he was the head coach at Syracuse University.

Robinson is a 1975 graduate of the University of the Pacific. He played linebacker and tight end for the 1972 through 1974 Tigers teams and was the recipient of the team's Most Inspirational Player Award as a senior.

He and his wife, Laura, are the parents of three adult children - Dominic, Lindsay and Leslie.

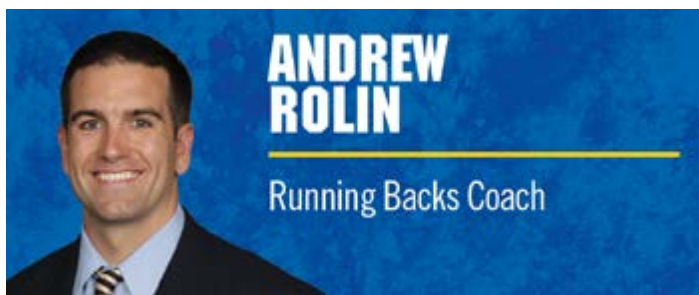

Andrew Rolin joined the San José State University football coaching staff in July 2013 as the running backs coach. A graduate assistant for the 2013 season, he was promoted to an assistant coaching position in March 2014.

His first two seasons with the Spartans were characterized by deft adaptation to evolving team dynamics and resulted in more than 1,600 yards rushing in each season. In 2013, five players started at least one game at one of the two running back positions. Last year, the number was six with five different starters in the first five games before junior Tyler Ervin settled into a banner season as an SI.com honorable mention All-America pick.

In his first season with San José State, the Spartans set single season school records for total offense yardage (5,919) and average yards per game (493.2). San José State was 15th nationally in total offense with its most diversified and effective ground game since 2006 relying heavily on four freshmen.

Redshirt freshman Jarrod Lawson, the team's leading rusher despite only rushing 10 times in the first four games, was named a CollegeFootballNews.com honorable mention Freshman All-American. Lawson's 788 rushing yards were a San José State freshman record and eighth best among all 2013 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) freshmen.

Lawson and two more freshmen Thomas Tucker, a converted defensive back, and Tim Crawley became the first trio of San José State running backs with 20 or more receptions each in a season since 1979.

Rolin came to the Spartans after spending 2012 as a graduate assistant at the University of Washington. He worked with the offensive coaching staff and in season primarily with a tight ends group that featured John Mackey Award finalist Austin Seferian-Jenkins. Rolin also helped guide a running backs crew

As a player, the Bakersfield, Calif., native was a quarterback on the 2005 through 2008 USD teams that won three conference championships and had a 40-6 win-loss record.

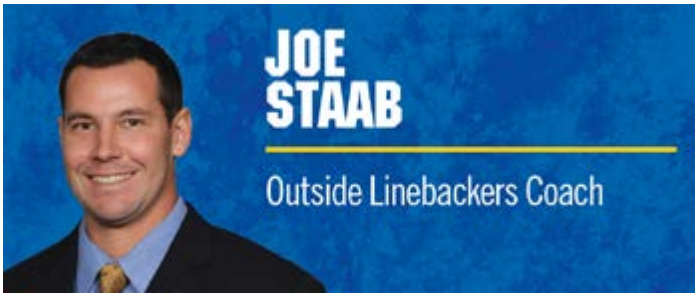

Joe Staab joined the San José State University football coaching staff in January 2013 as the safeties coach. Since the 2014 season, he served as the team's outside linebackers coach.

Staab came to the Spartans after four seasons with Ron Caragher at the University of San Diego. He coached the safeties and was the recruiting coordinator his last three seasons (2010-12). In his first season, he assisted coaching the defensive backs and special teams. At USD, his players received five Pioneer Football League all-conference and two all-academic awards.

Besides his on-the-field responsibilities, Staab also serves as the program's academic liaison. In each of the last two seasons, San José State's Academic Progress Rate (APR) score continue to increase and matches the second best among the seven California-based Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institutions. Also, a San José State player was named a Mountain West Scholar-Athlete and 16 Spartans were named Academic All-Mountain West - the most for a Spartan team in one season.

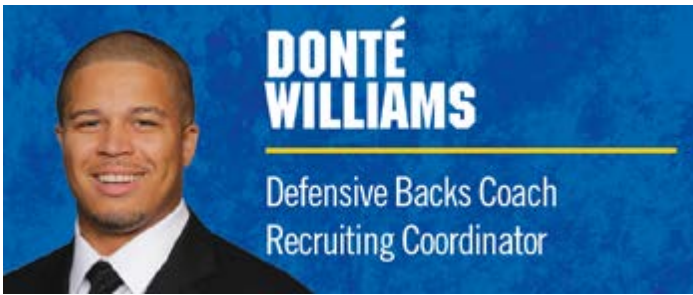

Donté Williams joined the San José State University football staff in January 2013 as the cornerbacks coach. In January 2014, he was promoted to defensive backs coach with responsibilities for the entire secondary. Williams added the duties of recruiting coordinator in January 2015.

San José State led the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in fewest passing yards allowed and finished 12th nationally in passing efficiency defense in 2014. Cornerback Bené Benwikere, in 2014, and safety Akeem King, in 2015, were NFL draft choices and versatile Forrest Hightower signed a 2015 free agent contract with the Ottawa Redblacks of the Canadian Football League. Benwikere and returning cornerbacks Cleveland Wallace, III, and Jimmy Pruitt were All-Mountain West picks.



His impact extends into recruiting future San José State players. 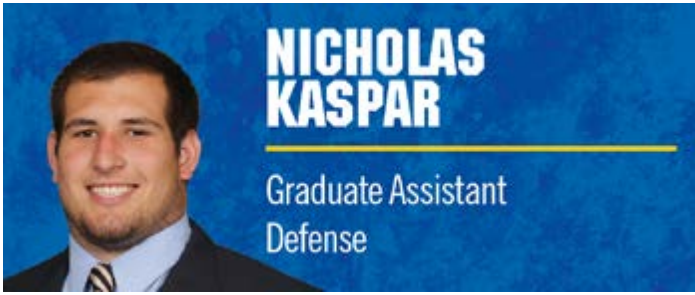

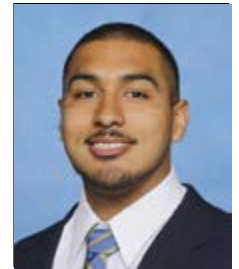
Osumi earned his master's degree from Chico State in 1996 and went on to become video coordinator at the University of Hawai'i for the 1997 and 1998 school years.



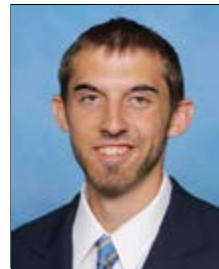

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its 16th year, the MW has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

Changes in the NCAA governance structure set the table for another Conference first, when two members of the MW Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) were included in the June 2014 meeting of the Mountain West Board of Directors. During the 2014-15 academic year, MW student-athletes participated on monthly membership calls and were included in the 2015 Spring Joint Council Meetings in Scottsdale, Arizona.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements during its first 16 years, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system, and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games, winning three. In the inaugural year of the new College Football Playoff system, Boise State earned the automatic slot into a New Year's Six bowl game as the highest-ranked champion from the Group of Five 5 conferences. The Broncos defeated then 10th-ranked Arizona, 38-30, in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl. In 2011-12, the Mountain West was among the first conferences to use a league-wide state-of-the-art basketball instant replay system.



Additionally, the Mountain West was the first conference to have a member institution with No. 1 overall picks in both the NFL and NBA drafts in the same year (Utah's Alex Smith and Andrew Bogut, respectively in 2005). With UNLV's Anthony Bennett claiming the No. 1 pick in the 2013 NBA Draft, the Mountain West is one of three conferences to have multiple No. 1 NBA draft selections since 2000. Also, with San Diego State's Stephen Strasburg earning the No. 1 pick in the 2009 MLB Draft, the Mountain West is one of two conferences to have the No. 1 selection in each of the NFL, NBA and MLB drafts since the MW was founded in 1999.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, respectively, while Fresno State, San Diego State and San José State add a West coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean.

San José State was scheduled to play two games in Hawaii to end the 1941 season. The Spartans were in Honolulu when the attack on Pearl Harbor occurred on December 7, 1941. Many players immediately joined the local police force or the armed services. The games against the University of Hawai'i on December 13 and Willamette College of Oregon on December 16 were cancelled.



Did You Know?

In 1981 and 1987, San José State was the “mythical champion” of the San Francisco Bay Area. The Spartans defeated both California and Stanford in those two seasons.

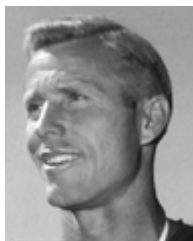

The San José State University football team has played its home games in Spartan Stadium since 1933. The Spartans won the first football game played in the stadium, 44-0, over San Francisco State, on October 7. Since then, the Spartans have played 371 games over 77 seasons. The team’s 100th win in the stadium came on October 21, 1967, against New Mexico, 52-14. The 200th victory occurred in 2005. SJSU’s home field record is 231-135-17 entering the 2015 season.

Spartan Stadium currently seats 30,456 for football. Every seat puts the spectator either close to or right on top of the action. Two stadium expansions and renovations in the 1980’s increased the seating capacity from 18,000 to over 30,000.

A FieldTurf surface replaced natural grass in 2009. Two new scoreboards - one on the East side and a state-of-the-art videoboard were installed in 2011.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school’s annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, religious convocations, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.

Five Silicon Valley Football Classics were held in Spartan Stadium. Air Force in 2000, Michigan State in 2001, Fresno State in 2002, UCLA in 2003 and Northern Illinois in 2004 were bowl-game winners. The 1999 Women’s World Cup and 1999 NCAA Women’s College Cup soccer events attracted record-setting crowds.

The largest attendance at a home football game was a 31,681 sellout crowd at the 2003 win over Grambling State. The game marked the first time under the current stadium configuration that San José State had a “sellout” prior to game day.

The largest crowd to attend any event in the stadium was estimated at 37,000 for a ZZ Top music concert.

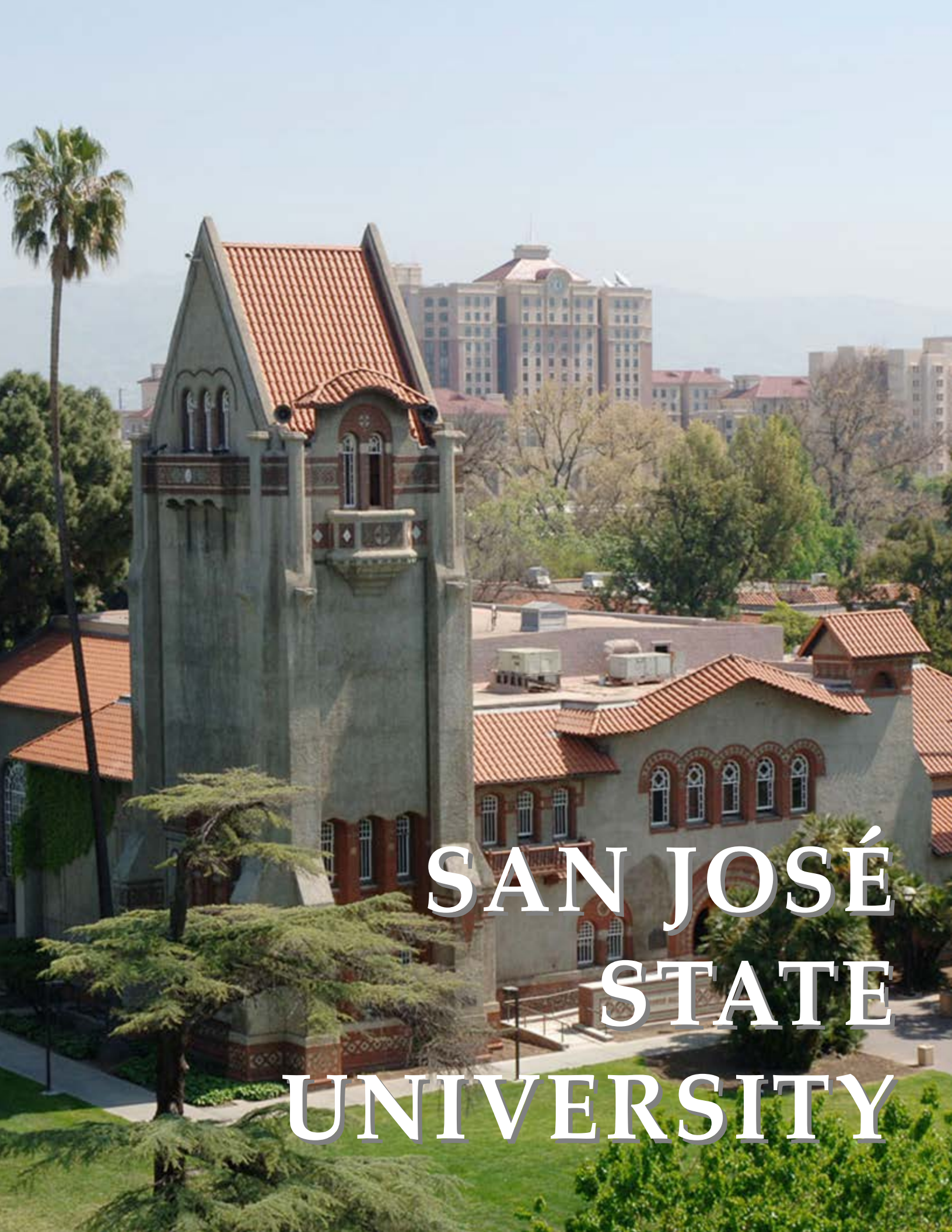

Susan Martin, Ph.D., was appointed interim president of San Jose State University effective August 18, 2015. She replaces President Mohammad Qayoumi who will serve as the chief advisor for infrastructure and technology to Afghanistan President Ashraf Ghani.

Dr. Martin is the former president of Eastern Michigan University (EMU) and comes to San José State as a seasoned higher education leader with extensive experience in managing large, diverse universities. During her tenure as the first female president in EMU’s 165 year-plus history, the university made strategic investments of \$210-million in facilities including a science complex and the campus’ largest and busiest classroom building, expansion of health programs including a new Physician Assistant program, record-setting enrollment including doubling the size of the Honors College, doubled financial aid from \$21 to \$42 million and was a leader in tuition restraint.

Prior to her tenure as Eastern Michigan’s president, Dr. Martin was the provost and vice-chancellor of Academic Affairs at the University of Michigan-Dearborn. She also spent 18 years at Grand Valley State University in Allendale, Mich., where she was a professor, department chair, program administrator, assistant and associate vice-president for Academic Affairs and the executive associate vice-president of Academic Affairs. While at Grand Valley State University, she received the Glenn A. Niemeyer Outstanding Faculty Award and the Beta Alpha Psi Accounting Professor of the Year Award twice.

Dr. Martin also brings an impressive public sector leadership experience to San Jose State University. She served the state of Michigan as assistant auditor general; deputy state treasurer for the Bureau of Local Government Services for Michigan; commissioner of revenue; chair of the Michigan State Hospital Finance Authority and member of the Michigan Education Trust Board. At the Federal level, she served on the Internal Revenue Service Commissioners Advisory Council and the Electronic Tax Administration Advisory Council.

Dr. Martin holds a bachelor’s degree in public speaking from Central Michigan University and a M.B.A. and Ph.D. in accounting from Michigan State University. In 2009, she received the Michigan State University Department of Accounting and Information Systems Alumna of the Year Award.

She is married to Dr. Larry Martin, professor of economics at Michigan State University, and has three children and four grandchildren.

San José State University's place in history is well-established. Founded in 1857, it was the first public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its humble beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, it has matured into a master's university offering 191 bachelor's and master's degrees.

The university's 27,000 students study in eight fully-accredited colleges: Applied Sciences and the Arts, Business, Education, Engineering, Humanities and the Arts, Science, Social Sciences and Social Work.

One strength of the academic program is the broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism -- to diverse studies. Academic strength also is seen in the university's nationally-recognized programs. Examples include the School of Music, the School of Art and Design, the School of Journalism and Mass Communications, the School of Nursing and the School of Library and Information Science.

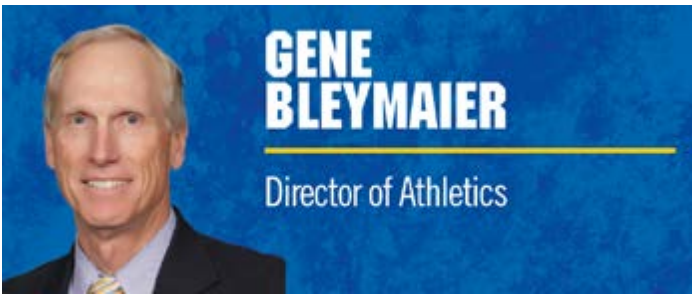
In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach introductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning facilities include computer-equipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the NASA Ames Research Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.

San José State University also finds strength in its diversity. For first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Students range in age from first-time freshmen to college transfers to professionals seeking additional education. Student demographics – with ethnic pluralism – provide the benefits of multiple cultures and diverse student interests and activities. From residence life to athletic teams to social clubs to co-op jobs – student activities meet the needs of this diverse student body.

Gene Bleymaier, one of the most-experienced and accomplished athletics directors in college athletics, was named San José State University's director of athletics on May 24, 2012.

In his three years, the Spartans' athletics and academic achievements cover a wide spectrum. Bleymaier led the University's transition into the Mountain West Conference, added the sports of women's indoor and outdoor track and field, beach volleyball and men's water polo, conceived plans for new and upgraded athletics facilities, and successfully promoted San José State as a practice site for Super Bowl 50 in February 2016.

Academically, San José State reported its highest-ever NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) multi-year department score – 976 (out of 1,000) in 2015. Six programs, including football, had an all-time best APR score, 11 scored 975 or higher, and 14 out of 16 Spartan sports listed scored higher year-over-year.

The 2012-13 year was one of the University's best for comprehensive athletics success. The Spartans were listed in the final 2012 BCS standings for the first time in school history at #24, won the 2012 Military Bowl and were voted #21 nationally in the season-ending Associated Press and USA Today/ESPN coaches polls. San José State won conference championships in women's swimming, women's tennis and softball. The Spartans finished an all-time best 106th out of the 295 NCAA Division I programs in the final Learfield Sports Directors Cup standings that measure overall program success in national competition.

Bleymaier came to San José State with an impressive array of personal and professional accomplishments from 30 years as Boise State University's athletics director.

He directed the Broncos through three conference affiliation upgrades to comprehensive success in conference and national competition. Boise State posted 33 top-25 finishes in nine different sports. Most recognizable was Boise State football's ascension to a national brand. The Broncos were the only football program from 2009 through 2011 to finish in the top-10 each year in the Associated Press and coaches' final polls and had six top-10 finishes in the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) standings between 2004 and 2011.

In 10 years of WAC membership, the Broncos were the only three-time winner of the Commissioner's Cup signifying the conference's best overall athletics program. There were conference championships in 11 sports. Boise State coaches earned 31 Coach of the Year awards and Bronco student-athletes received conference Athlete of the Year awards 35 times and 68 All-America honors over a 10-year span.

Academically, the Broncos consistently produced the conference's highest APR score. The NCAA recognized Boise State in 2010 with a Public Recognition Award for achieving an APR score that ranked in the top-10 percent for all NCAA Division I football-playing schools. The Boise State student-athlete population also produced five consecutive semesters of cumulative grade-point averages over 3.00 per semester.

Bleymaier can take credit for conceiving Boise State's unique blue artificial turf for Bronco Stadium. Installed in 1986, it remains one of the most distinguishing playing surfaces in the United States. His fundraising acumen and vision led to the creation of enhanced practice and competition facilities for football, track and field, basketball, softball, tennis, and women's gymnastics over a 15-year span. New sports medicine, student-athlete support services and strength and conditioning facilities also were constructed.

In August 2013, Boise State unveiled the Gene Bleymaier Football Complex honoring his accomplishments at the University.

In 1997, he founded the Humanitarian Bowl game, now known as the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. The Boise-hosted game now is in its 19th year matching top college teams.

For his exemplary leadership, Bleymaier received the 2008 Astro Turf Athletics Director of the Year and the 2011 Bobby Dodd Athletics Director of the Year Awards. In 2009, he was one of five finalists for the Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal and Sports Business Daily Athletic Director of the Year Award and the only nominee from a non-automatic qualifying Bowl Championships Series (BCS) conference school.

The 1975 UCLA graduate was a three-year letter-winning tight end on the Bruins' 1972 through 1974 football teams playing for legendary San José State alum Dick Vermeil and Pepper Rodgers. Bleymaier was a third-team All-Pacific 8 Conference selection and was the 1974 recipient of the UCLA Alumni Association's Outstanding Senior Award.

Bleymaier earned a law degree from Loyola Law School in 1978. He served as a UCLA assistant athletics director before joining the Boise State athletics department in 1981 as an assistant athletics director. In 1982, he was promoted to the Broncos' athletics director.

John Poch returned to San José State University in January 2009. As the Deputy Director of Athletics/External Operations, his duties include managing the department's external relations components of fund raising and community relations. He also has a lead role in the fund raising for the Spartan Stadium Vermeil-Walsh Athletic Complex.

Previously, Poch served as the Tournament Director of the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Women's College Cup hosted by San José State University and was an assistant coach for the Spartans' women's soccer team from 1995 to 2000. Under his direction, the 1999 College Cup attracted more than 28,000 spectators for two semifinal contests and the championship match. The 14,410 in attendance for the championship game remains the top attendance figure for any college women's soccer contest.

As a San José State assistant coach, he was on the ground floor of the new Spartan program. In its first five seasons, San José State posted a 53-44-3 overall win-loss record.

Poch is a successful youth soccer coach with United States Soccer Federation and National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) national licenses. He coached the San José Pioneer High School boys' teams to three Central Coast Section championships and was named the National Coach of the Year in 2001 by the NSCAA.

From 2000 through 2008, he was the executive director of the After-School All-Stars of Greater San José - a program targeting at-risk youths. In his eight years, After-School All-Stars grew from a two-person staff with a \$275,000 annual operating budget to a full-time staff of 36 and 230 part-time employees and a \$3.9-million budget comprised largely of dollars raised through his fundraising acumen and direction. More than 3,000 students from 50-plus elementary and middle schools in San José were After-School All-Stars beneficiaries.

In 2011, Poch completed course work in the Sports Management Institute - a collaboration of the Universities of Southern California, Texas, Michigan, Notre Dame and North Carolina. The Sports Management Institute provides a specialized executive management program for sports professionals.

He is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), NAADD (National Association of Athletic Development Directors) and AFP (Association of Fundraising Professionals) and remains well-connected in San José. He also serves on the board of directors for After-School All-Stars.

The 2001 San José State University graduate majored in kinesiology. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in sport management at San José State. As a student-athlete, he played football at West Valley College before enrolling at San José State.

John and his wife, Debora, a 1988 San José University graduate, are the parents of one daughter, Nicole.

Marie Tuite joined the San José State University athletics administrative team in an executive capacity in June 2010. Presently, she is the Deputy Director of Athletics/Internal Operations.

From April through June 2012, Tuite also was the Interim Director of Athletics. In that time, she took a leadership role in San José State's invitation and acceptance to join the Mountain West in July 2013.

Tuite oversees all of the Spartans' internal components and affairs. She manages the department's daily operations, has direct supervision of student services, compliance and business affairs, manages future football scheduling and serves as a sports supervisor for men's and women's basketball.

Her professional career includes executive positions at Pacific-12 Conference universities and the NCAA. She came to the Spartans from Seattle University where she was a Special Assistant to the Athletics Director. Tuite assisted Seattle University's transition to NCAA Division I athletics status.

Her first athletics administrative position was at Alma (Mich.) College in 1981 as the Director of Women's Athletics Programs and Activities. She joined the University of California women's athletics staff in 1984 as an assistant athletics director.

Tuite then relocated to the NCAA office in the Kansas City area and served as an Assistant Director of Championships from 1989 to 1994. She assisted the organization's sport committees in the administration of the National Collegiate Championships program and coordinated the Association's corporate partner, merchandising, promotional, and official ball programs for NCAA championships.

She returned to a campus setting in 1994 as a senior associate athletics director at the University of Washington. Her duties included overseeing the process and appointment of new head coaches, directing day-to-day operations including fiscal responsibility and leadership opportunities for numerous sports, and initiating and implementing "keys to success" for priority Husky sports programs.

A two-sport student-athlete and graduate of Central Michigan University, she was inducted into the university's Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990 as just the third female inductee. Tuite played field hockey and was a star basketball player who majored in physical education. She earned her master's degree from her alma mater in athletic administration.

Tuite is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), NACWAA (National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletics Administrators) and the Women's Sports Foundation. In May 2012, she was one of 41 local female executives honored at the 28th annual Tribute to Women Awards program by the YWCA Silicon Valley.

The native of Livonia, Mich., has two sons, Michael, a 2015 University of Washington graduate, and John.



Liz Jarnigan joined the San José State University staff in June 2008. Originally named the Director for Student-Athlete Success Services, she was promoted to Associate Athletics Director for Student Services in June 2009. In April 2010, Jarnigan added the responsibilities of Senior Woman Administrator. Her most recent promotion to Senior Associate Athletics Director was in July 2015.

Her current responsibilities include serving as a sports supervisor and overseeing compliance, academics, student services, life skills, student-athlete advising and tutoring and the assignment of learning specialists.

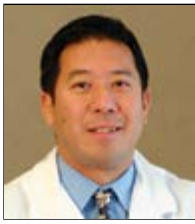

Credential Requests

Credentials are issued for news and editorial coverage on a case-by-case basis to those filing game stories, accredited members from established media outlets, and personnel assigned by the sports information office. Requests should be directed to Lawrence Fan, Athletics Media Relations Director. The credential recipient agrees to all conditions set forth by the University relating to conduct and print, video, audio, digital and photographic game coverage.

Press Box

The Spartan Stadium press box is located on the 7th Street side of the stadium and is an open-air facility. Carry a jacket. The press box remains open three hours after each contest.



Game Day Parking

Media parking is located in Lot 1, located on 7th and Humboldt streets. Media parking passes for home games are issued by the athletics media relations office.

Photographers

Credentials are issued to newspapers, wire services, video crews and team photographers. NCAA rules limit photographers to a wide area behind the restraining line around the playing field and outside the 25-yard lines.

Play-by-Play Television

Contact Lawrence Fan in writing at least 30 days prior to a game concerning video play-by-play of San José State University home football games.

Radio Broadcasts

The radio broadcast booth for the designated official flagship station of the visiting team at Spartan Stadium is Box B on the mezzanine level of the press box and has space for five working individuals. ISDN and regular telephone service are provided.

Production Truck & Satellite Uplink Parking

Production truck and satellite uplink parking is on the 7th street side of the stadium. Arrangements must be made to park a truck overnight inside Spartan Stadium.

Scouts

Space limitations prohibit seating and standing in the press box for scouting purposes.

Spotters & Statisticians

Requests for spotters and/or statisticians should be placed two weeks prior to a home game.

Statistics & Services

Game statistics, play-by-play accounts and post-game quotes are compiled and distributed. FAX service is available. A meal is available two hours before kickoff.

Team Practices & In-Person Interviews

During the season, the Spartans practice in the morning. In-person, post-practice interview opportunities with the student-athletes, generally, occur at approximately 11:00 a.m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Please contact the athletics media relations office in advance with your interview request.

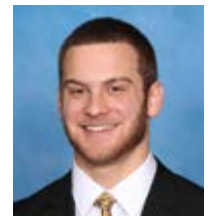
