

Coaching Staff



Lou Tully is in his 11th season as San Jose State University's women's water polo head coach. As the only coach of the Spartans, he has taken a program from infancy and developed a national-caliber team that regularly finishes in the top-20 of the final national poll. Four times in the last seven seasons, San Jose State has produced a .500 or better win-loss record. Tully has a major college coaching record of 149-166 in his 10 seasons at the Spartans' helm. San Jose State players have earned All-America recognition eight times under his leadership.

Successful at the high school, community college and club levels, he joined San Jose State in 1996 after coaching the boys and girls teams at Leland High School in San Jose.

Tully began his coaching career in 1966 at Menlo Junior College, where he coached water polo and swimming. He spent 11 years coaching at various local high schools, winning league championships at Mt. Pleasant High School in 1977 and at Leland in 1997. Tully has coached high school All-Americans, including Mike Castaneda, Steve Lynn, Norman Villanueva, Tres Threatt and Brent Vanderkam.



Division I men's and women's matches. Tully currently serves on the board of the Peninsula Referees Association.

The 1967 San Jose State graduate majored in physical education and played four seasons of collegiate water polo. He went on to earn his master's degree in physical education from San Jose State in 1972. Tully also holds a California Life Teaching Credential. He and his wife, Susan, have two adult children, Megan and Ian. The Tullys reside in San Jose.


"Johnny brings a wealth of coaching and playing experience to our team," says head coach Lou Tully. "He is great to work with both from my perspective and the players' as well."

With both Division I and an international coaching background, Bega brings veteran coaching experience to the Spartans. Bega developed a strong background at the international level when he was the USA National Zone 11 Junior girl's and youth boy's head coach. From 1997 until 2001, Bega coached water polo in Japan, Hungary, Brazil, Greece and Holland.

Bega also has a winning history coaching at the club level. As the head coach of the Long Beach Shore Aquatics club team from 1996 until 2002, his teams won five gold medals, seven silver medals, and four bronze medals at the Junior Olympics.

Bega has also seen success at the high school ranks, winning the CIF Boy's Division I title three-times as the assistant coach at Wilson High School in Long Beach, Calif., and winning the 2001 Sunset-League boys and girls title as the head coach at Marina High School in Huntington Beach, Calif.

The 1999 Long Beach State graduate majored in vocational education. Bega currently resides in Menlo Park, Calif.



Doug Robinson is in his eighth season as the Spartans' volunteer assistant. He has coached high school water polo at several area schools and is in his 18th year as a middle school alternative schools teacher for the Santa Clara County Office of Education. He played water polo at Live Oak High School in Morgan Hill, Calif., and continues to compete as a member of the Bay Area Masters' Water Polo Club. The 1988 graduate of Cal Poly resides in Campbell.

Season Outlook/Quick Facts



The San Jose State University women's water polo team has high expectations for 2007. The program is looking to improve upon a 2006 season in which it finished with a 13-14 overall record and ranked No. 8 in the nation. The Spartans will rely on 10 returning letterwinners to lead the team to their eighth top-10 finish in the past 10 years.

GOALKEEPERS

Junior Kendra Adama has played significant time in her previous two seasons and will anchor the goalkeeping staff. Head coach Lou Tully says about the 2007 cocaptain, "She has played against the top teams in the country and has developed into an outstanding goalie through her hard work."

Kelly Kennison will continue her progression as a goalkeeper and will play a vital role as a reserve.

ATTACKERS

Angela Riddle is expected to be the team's top attacker. Riddle enters her senior year as the No. 10 all-time Spartan scorer, while Deanna Lowry is 15th alltime in Spartan scoring with 40 career goals.

Alexis Higlett, who has played competitively in Australia, New Zealand, Canada and the United States, is coming off a 17goal first season for the Spartans. "Alexis has great recognition skills that enable her to lead the transition phase of the game

and is a key to our team offense," says the Spartan head coach.

Tully is high on both players, "Geraldine has a very good sense for the game and is excellent at getting the ball to her open teammates, while Tanya is rapidly developing into on of the top players in the conference."

Kelly Pearce continues to play a vital reserve role, while newcomers Cynthia Gazzolo, Jenni Peters and Bridget McKee look to make a splash in their first season with the Spartans.

Don W. Kassing was appointed president of San Jose State University in May 2005, after serving eight months as interim president. He will serve as the permanent president until 2007, when a search will be undertaken for his successor.

Kassing had served San Jose State as vice president for administration and finance and chief financial officer since November 1993. As vice president for administration

and finance, he was responsible for six major administrative units on campus: Administrative Systems and Finance, Facilities Development and operations, Human Resources, University Police Department, University Computing and

Telecommunications and Spartan Shops, Inc. As Chief Financial Officer, he had overall responsibility for all business and financial affairs of the campus. He is responsible for the financing and construction of the new Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library and the Campus Village Project (student and faculty housing). He served as Treasurer of the University Foundation and provided administrative oversight to all auxiliaries. Kassing's 25 years experience in higher education includes service as:

* Vice President for University Relations and Administrative Services - Murray State University (Kentucky)

* Vice President for Development and Public Affairs - Western State College of Colorado

From 1975 to 1986, he served at Belleville Area College in Belleville, Ill., where he taught management and marketing, served as department chair, and for two years was president of the Granite City Campus. Before that, he worked for 11 years in private industry, including eight years in corporate finance and operations management for Brown Group, Inc., and three years with General Motors Corporation.

Kassing holds a master's degree in business administration and a B.S. in economics from St. Louis University. He is married, with three children and five grandchildren.



Tom Bowen Director of Athletics

Tom Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of intercollegiate athletics on December 20, 2004. Under his leadership, the Spartans have made significant and meaningful strides forward as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program.

As the director, Bowen has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; ini-

tiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with the creation of Spartan Sports Properties. The Spartan Foundation, the department's fund-raising component, has enjoyed its most successful two-year period, generating just over \$2.0 million in personal and corporate contributions.

As an integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and many other campus extra-curricular activities. His vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a Student Success Services component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores as measured by the NCAA have risen dramatically under his watch. Above all, his goal for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community.

In 2005-06, San Jose State won the Western Athletic Conference women's golf championship, recorded its highest finish ever at a NCAA regional championship in women's gymnastics, produced seven teams out of 16 with its best conference finish in years, and had WAC "Coaches of the Year" in women's golf and softball. Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the director of community affairs and the executive director of the 49ers Foundation for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. He directed all of the team's fund-raising activities and was responsible for alumni and current player participation in the community. San Francisco was the first NFL franchise to implement an annual giving program.

His Division I experience at the college level includes athletic administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame majored in theology/sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

His first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987 through 1995, he held the positions of assistant football coach and athletics director.



Bowen continues to speak before major corporations headquartered locally.

The Denver, Colo., native was born on May 27, 1961. He and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children. In 2007, Andrew will be nine years old, Peter, five, and daughter McKenna, four.



Athletics Facilities



The Student Success Services personnel, the Scott Gadway Academic Center and the football offices are in the Simpkins Stadium Center, which is located between Spartan Stadium and the Koret Athletic Training Center.









The 10,000 square-foot Koret Athletic Training Center is a state-of-theart facility that also contains a rehabilitation and training room and the Jeff Garcia Hall of Champions.







The Aquatics Center, opened in May 1988, is home to San Jose State University water polo matches and swimming and diving meets. The pool is one of the largest ever constructed in California. Dimensions are 200 feet long by 75 feet wide. Two movable bulkheads divide the pool into diving, lap swimming and recreational swimming areas.
