COACHING STAFF



Brent Brennan, a San Jose native and second-generation Spartan, enters his third season as the San Jose State University football head coach.

In his two seasons as a head coach, the Spartans realized achievements on the playing field, academically and in the community. Building a program with long-term success and sustainability in mind, 47 freshmen earned playing time in either of the first two years. San José State enters 2019 with 60 players who have game experience – the most ever to start a season.

He can look back to players receiving 11 All-Mountain West post-season awards, seven that played in a post-season all-star game and NFL draftees Josh Oliver, a tight end by the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2019, and defensive back Jermaine Kelly by the Houston Texans in 2018. Playing the #11-toughest schedule in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in 2018, the Spartans had a +27 improvement in turnover margin compared to 2017, second highest by a FBS team in the category.

Academically, San José State players have earned 57 Mountain West academic honors, and 14 institutional President’s Scholars and Dean’s Scholar awards at the university’s annual Honors Convocation, the most in any two-year period in program history. In 2017, the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) recognized San Jose State for the first time for academic achievement based on the NCAA’s Graduation Success Rate (GSR) formula.

And Spartan players and coaches are highly visible in the fertile Silicon Valley participating in more than 5,000 hours annually of community service, campus engagement and personal outreach activities through the Beyond Football program Brennan instituted. The program was recognized for its exemplary contributions and participation with grants from The Ellen Show in 2017 and the Bill Belechick Foundation.

Brent Brennan described June 5, 2019, the day of the “groundbreaking ceremony” for a new Football Operations Center at CEFCU Stadium as the most important day in the program’s 125-year plus history.

Most recently, a team video of its participation in the Silicon Valley YWCA’s “Walk A Mile In He Shoes” fundraiser to bring greater awareness of the problems of domestic violence and abuse in all forms against women generated more 1.7-million views in less than 10 days.

The 46-year old Brennan returned to the Spartans on December 8, 2016. He was an assistant coach with the Spartans during the 2005 through 2010 seasons under head coaches Dick Tomey and Mike MacIntyre. From 2011 through 2016, he coached receivers at Oregon State. The Beavers played Texas in the 2012 Alamo Bowl and won the 2013 Hawaii Bowl over Boise State. Oregon State had one of the best passing offenses in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) ranking in the top-20 in 2011 (19th), 2012 (20th) and 2013 (3rd).

At Oregon State, he coached All-American wide receivers Brandin Cooks and Markus Wheaton and former school career pass receiving leader James Rodgers. Cooks was the 2013 Biletnikoff Award winner signifying the nation’s top wide receivers and is continuing his NFL career with the Los Angeles Rams.

Brennan first joined the Spartans in January 2005 after being named San Diego State’s quarterbacks coach. He had a variety of duties at San Jose State. Brennan coached wide receivers, tight ends and offensive tackles, was a special teams coordinator and recruiting coordinator.

Five wide receivers he recruited or coached are among the Spartans’ top-10 career pass receiving leaders with 146 or more receptions. Brennan coached San Jose State’s only two players with at least 200 career receptions and 3,000 career receiving yards, Noel Grigsby and Chandler Jones. He also coached Josh Oliver, the Jacksonville Jaguars’ third-round draft choice in 2019, and Ryan Otten, two of the top tight ends in school history.

As the special teams coordinator, the 2008 Spartans were 20th nationally in kickoff returns and the 2007 team was ninth in punt returns.

Brennan began his coaching career at Woodside (Calif.) High School in 1996. He was a graduate assistant at the University of Hawaii in 1998, at the University of Washington in 1999 and

at the University of Arizona in 2000. From 2001 through 2004, he was the receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Cal Poly.

As a college player, Brennan was a wide receiver for the 1991 through 1995 UCLA teams and lettered on the Bruins' 1993 Rose Bowl Squad. He majored in history and graduated from UCLA in 1996.

Brennan watched San Jose State home football games growing up. His dad, the late Steve Brennan, was an end who lettered in the 1967 season. Brent and his wife, Courtney, have two daughters, Blake and Casey, and a son, Scott.



Coach Brennan coached wide receiver James Jones at San José State. Jones went on to a nine-year NFL career, a Super Bowl XLV championship with the Green Bay Packers, and now is a NFL Network broadcast analyst.

COACHING STAFF



Joe Bernardi was named San Jose State University's offensive line coach in January 2017. He added the title of run game coordinator in 2018. Bernardi came to the Spartans after spending the 2016 season as the tight ends coach at Fresno State.

Bernardi is a second-generation college football coach. His dad, Gary Bernardi, was a NCAA Division I assistant coach for more than 40 years, primarily at Pac-12 Conference schools and at San Jose State (2010-12). The Bernardis are the second multi-generation football coaches at San Jose State after former assistants Mike Quinn (1976-78) and current New York Giants special teams coach Tom Quinn (1999-2001).

In his rapidly ascending coaching career, Bernardi has experiences from the SEC, the Pac-12 Conference, the Mountain West and the pursuit of a College Football Playoff (CFP) national championship.

Bernardi began his coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 2011 as the offensive line quality control coach. He assisted in all phases of coaching and recruiting offensive linemen and tight ends. In his second season, the 2012 Volunteers led the SEC and finished fifth nationally for fewest quarterback sacks allowed per game (0.67).

During the 2013 through 2015 seasons, he was a graduate assistant at the University of Oregon assisting with the offensive line and tight ends. He coached four first-team All-Pac-12 offensive linemen while with the Ducks. Oregon won 33 games; was ranked ninth, second and 19th, respectively, in the final Associated Press polls; and played in the first College Football National Championship game against Ohio State in 2015.

The 2010 Fresno State graduate majored in communications and was a member of the Bulldogs football team from 2006 through 2010. The offensive lineman started in 32 games and was part of four Fresno State teams that played in a bowl game. Bernardi was named to the Rimington Award Watch List for the best center in college football twice during his playing career. In his 2010 senior year, he received the Paul Schechter Award for Courage given annually to a Fresno State student-athlete who overcame a physical challenge to become a champion.

He and his wife, Lindsey, have a daughter, Quinn.

Alonzo Carter joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in January 2017 as the running backs coach. He added the duties of recruiting coordinator in 2018.

Carter came to the Spartans with much fanfare as a highly successful community college and high school football head coach and an unparalleled five years in the world of musical entertainment. In 18 seasons as a head coach, his teams compiled a 129-69-3 win-loss record, won 11 league championships, three California Interscholastic Federation (C.I.F.) Oakland Section titles, and six post-season bowl games. He was named a league or conference "Coach of the Year" in seven of those seasons.



As the Contra Costa College head coach, he took over a program in 2010 that won just 11 games the five previous seasons. In seven seasons, the Comets posted a 47-27 win-loss mark, captured four conference championships and won two bowl games. He was named a conference Coach of the Year in 2012, 2014 and 2015 and was a California Community College regional Coach of the Year in 2012 and 2014.

His first football head coaching position was at McClymonds High in Oakland, Calif. McClymonds won four league championships and three Oakland Section titles in eight seasons. Three times (2001, 2005, 2006), he was named the East Bay Coach of the Year.

In 2007, Carter took over a floundering Berkeley (Calif.) High program and produced a league championship season in each of his three seasons at the helm. To cap off his high school head-coaching career, he picked up his fourth league coach of the year honors of the decade as the 2009 Alameda Contra Costa Area League Coach of the Year.

Carter's coaching career began as McClymonds High's track and field coach in February 1993. In his three years as the track and field head coach, McClymonds produced eight league and section champions. He also had responsibilities as a varsity assistant football coach.

The 2016 California State University East Bay graduate majored in African American Studies. When the school was known as Cal State Hayward, he was a member of the Pioneers' football and track and field teams.

At Cal State Hayward, he and a group of friends answered an audition call, became backup dancers and rap artists, and toured extensively with iconic hip-hop musician MC Hammer. Carter was awarded a multi-platinum record signifying at least 10 million albums sold for "Please Hammer Don't Hurt Em."

Carter was inducted into the African American Ethnic Sports Hall of Fame in 2001. He holds coaching certifications from the American Football Coaches Association, the California Interscholastic Federation and the California Community College Athletic Association. Carter was selected to participate in the Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship program in 2017 with the San Francisco 49ers.

He and his wife, Rozell, are the parents of six children – Alonzo II, Isaiah, Alona, Malikhi, Anthony and Kennedie. Malikhi is a freshman wide receiver on the 2019 Spartan football team. The Carter family resides in Oakland, Calif.

Kevin Cummings was named San Jose State University's wide receivers coach in January 2017. He came to the Spartans after three seasons as Oregon State University's quality control coach for wide receivers.

As a player, Cummings was a wide receiver and special teams player on the 2010 through 2013 Oregon State teams. He went on to play for the Edmonton Eskimos and the Ottawa Redblacks during the 2014 Canadian Football League season.

His playing career also includes two championship experiences with USA Football. He was a wide receiver for the 2009 International Federation of American Football (IFAF) Under-19 World Championship team. In 2015, Cummings played for USA Football's Men's National Team that won a world championship.

The 2014 Oregon State University graduate majored in business entrepreneurship.

Cummings is a native of Los Angeles. He and his wife, Nellie, live in San Jose.

At San Jose State, he has coached the Spartans' career leaders in punting average (Michael Carrizosa), kick scoring (Austin Lopez) and combined return yardage (Tyler Ervin). His special teams players have earned seven All-Mountain West honors.

In first coaching stint with the Spartans covered the 2012 through 2014 seasons. San José State enjoyed a variety of special teams successes. He was the special teams coordinator all three seasons and coached the running backs in 2012 when the Spartans won the Military Bowl and finished 21st in the final Associated Press national poll.

The 2013 Spartans were the co-national leader for blocking opponent's kick scoring tries with seven. For the first time in school history, the Spartans recorded back-to-back seasons of at least 100 kick-scoring points with a single-season team record 108 in 2012 and 105 in 2013. The 2012 San José State team successfully executed its first onside kick attempt in two years which resulted in a touchdown in the school's 62-52 victory over #16-Fresno State. The win was the Spartans' first over a top-20 ranked opponent since the 2000 season.



Guidici initially joined the San José State University staff in March 2012 as the special teams coordinator and running backs coach. That year, the Spartans set a single-season school record for kick-scoring points, produced the program's highest percentage of field goals made in a season, scored points on punt defense and tied the school single-season record for kickoffs returned for a touchdown.

As the 2012 running backs coach, he coached De'Leon Eskridge, the Spartans' first 1,000-yard rusher in six seasons, and Tyler Ervin, who would set the single-season school-record for rushing yards in 2015.

Guidici worked with Pro Football Hall of Fame and Super Bowl winning coach Bill Walsh (1931-2007) at Stanford as a defensive assistant coach.

Guidici spent the 1995 season with the Oakland Raiders as the defensive quality control coach. He moved on to the San José SaberCats of the Arena Football League in 1996 and coached the team's offensive and defensive lines and assisted with special teams coaching in his first three ARENA League seasons. Guidici returned to the Arena Football League's San Jose team as an assistant coach for the 2015 season. The SaberCats posted a 20-1 record and won the Arena Bowl – the league's equivalent to the Super Bowl.

COACHING STAFF



Scott White was named San Jose State University's linebackers coach in December 2018. He is in his second season with the Spartans. He joined the staff in 2018 as a football staff analyst.

White brings 10 seasons of college coaching and noteworthy recruiting experiences to his new position with Spartans. Most notably, he was a UCLA football assistant for seven seasons (2011-17) working with head coaches Rick Neuheisel and Jim Mora, Jr.

He was a quality control coach for the Bruins' defense and special teams during the 2011 through 2014 seasons, and promoted in 2015 to linebackers and special teams coach for the next three seasons.

White coached some of the nation's top linebackers at UCLA. Eric Kendricks, currently with the Minnesota Vikings, was the 2014 Butkus Award and Lott Impact Trophy winner. In 2013, current Jacksonville Jaguars linebacker Myles Jack became the first player in Pac-12 Conference history to be named the conference's "Freshman of the Year" on offense and defense. Anthony Barr, the Minnesota Vikings' 2014 first-round draft choice, was a first-team All-America and finalist for the 2013 Butkus Award.

As the special teams coach, he oversaw the growth of UCLA kicker Ka'imi Fairbairn, the 2015 Lou Groza Collegiate Placekicking Award winner and current placekicker for the Houston Texans.

One of the top college recruiters nationally, he was recognized by 247Sports as its 2016 Pac-12 Recruiter of the Year. That same year, Rivals.com named him to its list of National Top-25 Recruiters

The 2006 graduate of the University of Washington majored in ethic studies and was a four-year starter on the 2003 through 2006 Huskies teams. He was a team captain and second-team All-Pac 10 Conference linebacker as a senior.

He began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Seattle Prep School in 2007. After two seasons, White was named the linebackers coach at Central Washington University for the 2009 season. The Wildcats posted a 12-1 win-loss record, were #1 in scoring defense, #3 in rushing defense and #4 in passing defense among all NCAA Division II schools. White spent the 2010 season as an assistant coach at Palomar College before heading to UCLA.

Matt Adkins is in his fourth season with the San Jose State University football staff and his third as a graduate assistant. He will be working with the offensive coaches and the tight ends specifically in 2019.

In 2018, he coached first-team All-Mountain West tight end Josh Oliver, the 69th overall selection in the 2019 National Football League draft as the Jacksonville Jaguars' third-round choice.

A quarterback during his playing days at Shasta College and Southern Oregon University, Adkins began coaching in 2009 at Shasta College working with the team's quarterbacks. In 2010, he was Southern Oregon's tight ends coach. Adkins coached safeties at the College of the Siskiyous in 2011.

Jones returned to San Jose State after a professional career in the NFL and Canadian Football League. He was a member of the practice squads for Tampa Bay in 2014 and the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL in 2015. In 2016, he was on the Alouettes' active roster during the season before he was released in July.

The 2013 San Jose State graduate finished his college career as the Spartans career leader in number of receptions (248) and touchdown receptions (31). His best season was in 2013 when he caught 79 passes for 1,356 yards and 15 touchdowns. Jones was a first-team All-Mountain West selection, was named an honorable mention All-America wide receiver and concluded his college career playing in the East-West Shrine Game.

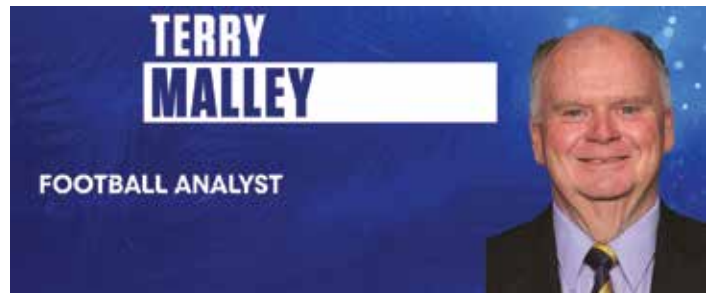


Patrick Markarian was named a San Jose State University football graduate assistant in 2018. Heading into his second season with the Spartans, he works with the offensive coaches and the offensive linemen specifically.

Markarian joined the Spartans after coaching the Fresno City College offensive line in 2017. He began his coaching career in 2015 as a student assistant coach at Indiana State University. In 2016, he was promoted to a graduate assistant position and was responsible for coaching the tight ends and the offensive linemen.

The Fresno, Calif., native was an offensive lineman on the 2012 and 2013 Fresno City College teams that won the Valley Conference championship. He transferred to Indiana State and completed his playing career in 2014.

Markarian graduated from Indiana State in 2015 as a history major.



Terry Malley is in his eighth season on the San José State University coaching staff. In 2019, he returns in a staff analyst role. Previously, he coached the quarterbacks, running backs, tight ends, wide receivers and was the team's recruiting coordinator at different times in his first six seasons.

Malley specialized in nurturing young players into meaningful contributors. His Spartans earned four all-conference honors, two freshman honorable mention All-America honors and set 14 school single-season and career records. Chandler Jones and Noel Grigsby, two of his wide receivers in 2011 and 2012, rank one-two on the school's list for career receptions. Tight end Billy Freeman was a 2015 honorable mention All-Mountain West choice as a freshman.

Malley originally came to the Spartans after spending 14 seasons with the San José SaberCats where he was regarded as one of the keenest offensive minds in Arena Football League history. In his 10 seasons as the team's offensive coordinator, San José won four Arena Football League championships, led the league in scoring four times and was second four other seasons.

With more than 35 years of coaching experience, Malley's coaching roots are in the Bay Area. Two-year stints at San José's Leland High (1976-77) and Moreau High in Hayward (1978-79) preceded five seasons (1980-84) as an assistant coach for legendary coach Pat Malley, his dad, at Santa Clara University, his alma mater. Terry was named head coach in 1985 and led the Broncos to a 47-39-1 win-loss record over eight seasons. Six of his eight teams were nationally-ranked among NCAA Division II schools.

Malley coached 27 all-conference players including long-time National Football League pros Brent Jones, a standout tight end for the San Francisco 49ers, and two-time Pro Bowl punter Bryan Barker. He was the Western Football Conference Coach of the Year in 1985, his first season, directing Santa Clara to an 8-2-1 record and a conference championship.

His first experience in professional football came in 1994 when he was named the Director of Football Operations for the SaberCats, an Arena Football League expansion franchise. Malley added the duties of General Manager in 1995. In 1999, he returned to the field as the offensive coordinator and retained his general manager responsibilities through 2006.

As a player, Malley was a quarterback, team captain and four-year letterwinner for Santa Clara during the 1972 through 1975 seasons. The 1976 Santa Clara University graduate majored in business management. He and his wife, Leslie, have three children - Christina and sons, Patrick and Ryan.

Gary Uribe joined the San Jose State University athletics staff in February 2013 as the department's head athletic performance coach.

Uribe has 17 years working with NCAA Division I student-athletes and athletics programs. His experiences include working in the Southeastern Conference (SEC), the Pac-12, the Western Athletic Conference (WAC), the Big Sky and in the Mountain West with the Spartans.

The 1996 graduate of University of LaVerne majored in health services management. He earned a master's degree in physical education from Azusa Pacific University in 2005.

Uribe began his professional career in 2002 as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at the University of Southern California. In his four years with the Trojans and in his role working with the football team, USC participated in two Rose Bowls and two Orange Bowls and were the 2003 and 2004 national champions.

He was named the director of speed, strength and conditioning at Sacramento State in 2006 and was responsible for 20 intercollegiate teams. The Hornets won eight conference championships in five different sports in his three years.

Uribe spent two years at New Mexico State University as the football speed, strength and conditioning coach, a year at UCLA as an assistant athletic performance coach and one year at Auburn as an assistant football strength and conditioning coach. While at Auburn, he also served as the football team's director of nutrition.

He is certified as a USA Weightlifting Sports Performance Coach Level 1 and is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA).

Gary and his wife, Christie, have two sons, Jake and Caleb.



Ben Thienes was named San Jose State University's Director of Football Operations in January 2017. In his professional career, he was a part of nine teams to win a conference championship and/or participate in a post-season bowl game.

Thienes came to the Spartans after serving as the linebackers coach and director of player personnel at Portland State University for the 2015 and 2016 seasons. The 2015 Vikings made their first appearance in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs in 15 years.

He began his college athletics career in 2007 at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High school in Parkland, Fla., as an assistant football coach. He was the team's defensive coordinator, special teams coordinator and defensive backs coach.

Thienes spent the 2008 through 2010 seasons at Ellsworth Community College in Iowa Falls, Iowa as an assistant football coach and strength and conditioning coordinator. Ellsworth won the 2008 and 2009 NJCAA Region XI Championships and Graphic Edge Bowls.

During the 2011 through 2013 seasons, he was a Boise State football graduate assistant. He worked with the defensive backs and had various special teams responsibilities. The Broncos were the 2012 Mountain West champions, won bowl games in two of his three seasons and compiled an overall 31-8 win-loss record.

Tobruk Blaine joined the San Jose State University football staff in July 2017 as the program's first Beyond Football Coordinator.

In her role, she is responsible for enhancing the lives of football student-athletes through the university's new Beyond Football program. Student-athletes are encouraged to explore what is around them, identify interests, and inspire themselves and others through a culture of volunteerism in a greater community. Student-athletes will develop career-focused proficiencies and cultivate knowledge, relationships and skills necessary to establish a successful personal and professional life beyond the game of football.

Spartan football players have participated in approximately 10,000 hours of Beyond Football programming since her arrival. In 2019, she was acknowledged for her work and leadership as the recipient of the John Ralston Award at the San Jose State University athletics department's annual SAMMY Awards.

Blaine came to San Jose State with a background in coaching, teaching, fund raising and program building. She was a high school and college cheerleading coach at Eagle and Rocky Mountain High Schools in Idaho and at Boise State University. Her high school teams won the Idaho 5A state cheerleading championships twice for Eagle High (2005, 2006 and 2008) and twice for Meridian's Rocky Mountain High (2010). The 2016 and 2017 Boise State teams were named the United Spirit Association's (USA) national champion in the Division I Small Coed cheerleading category. Blaine was named the 2006 state of Idaho Cheerleading Coach of the Year for leading Eagle High to its championship.

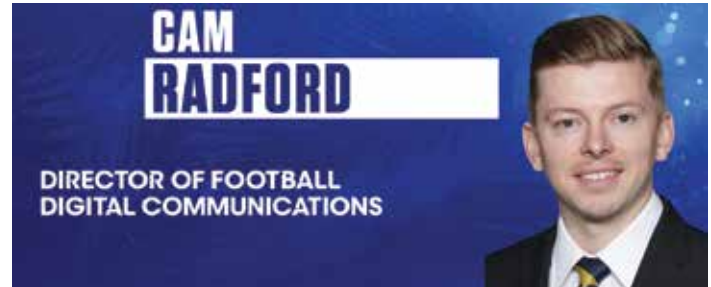

In his first spring at San Jose State, Radford gained national notoriety for capturing, recording and posting the video of assistant coach Alonzo Carter briefly recreating his dance moves when Carter was a backup dancer to hip hop icon MC Hammer after a weekend spring practice session. Millions of clicks were counted and many national major mainstream media outlets reported on the story.

In June 2019, his work produced a second "viral" video of the program. Radford and his team captured jubilant scenes from the team's annual participation in the YWCA Silicon Valley's annual "Walk A Mile In Her Shoes" fund-raiser to raise awareness against domestic violence and all forms of abuse and assault aimed at women.

The 2010 Oregon State University graduate majored in psychology. He got his start in college athletics in 2008 as an undergraduate intern for Beaver football working in its video department. Radford was promoted to assistant video coordinator in 2011 and director of football video and technology in 2015. As the director, he managed a \$300,000 budget, was the primary resource to solve all technological challenges faced by the coaching staff and student-athletes, and produced compelling and entertaining video content for the team, alumni and fans of the program.

In 2016, "Arizona Motivational," a video his department produced, was a finalist in the motivational category for a SAVVY Award sponsored by the College Sports Video Association (CSVA) – the nation's premiere network of college sports video professionals.

He is a member of College Sports Video Association.

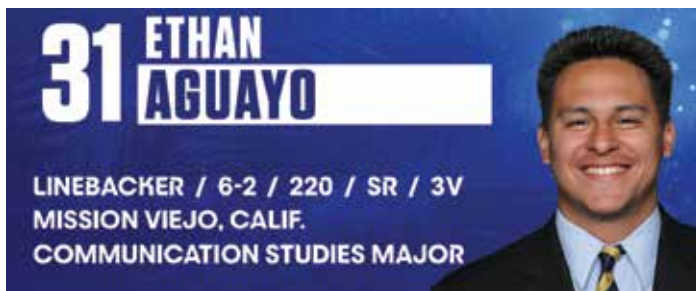

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions.

Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements during its first 20 years, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system, and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games, winning three. In 2011-12, the Mountain West was among the first conferences to implement a league-wide state-of-the-art basketball instant replay system.

Changes in the NCAA governance structure set the table for another Conference first, when two members of the MW Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) were included in the June 2014 meeting of the Mountain West Board of Directors. During the last four academic years, MW student-athletes participated on monthly membership calls and have joined MW administrators in the annual Joint Council Spring Meetings in Arizona.

Additionally, the Mountain West was the only conference to have the same member institution with No. 1 overall picks in both the NFL and NBA drafts in the same year (Utah's Alex Smith and Andrew Bogut, respectively in

2005). With UNLV's Anthony Bennett claiming the No. 1 pick in the 2013 NBA Draft, the Mountain West is one of three conferences to have multiple No. 1 NBA draft selections since 2000. Also, with San Diego State's Stephen Strasburg earning the No. 1 pick in the 2009 MLB Draft, the Mountain West is one of three conferences to have the No. 1 selection in each of the NFL, NBA and MLB drafts since the MW was founded in 1999.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State).

The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, respectively, while Fresno State, San Diego State and San José State add a West coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean.

From the outset, Mountain West member institutions have been committed to creating strong academic relationships, as well as athletic competition. To that end, the chief academic officers of each institution have explored academic exchange programs, library crossovers and shared research. In addition, the faculty athletics representatives routinely provide academic assistance and test-taking services for student-athletes visiting from fellow member institutions for competition.

The MW has produced 1,214 All-America selections among its 18 sponsored sports (men's swimming was discontinued as a Conference sport following the 2010-11 season) in the last 20 years, including a league-record 103 All-America honorees in 2016-17. A total of 208 MW student-athletes have also earned Academic All-America accolades in that span. The Mountain West has sent at least 25 teams to NCAA postseason events in each of the past 20 years, capturing five team national championships in women's cross country and producing 49 individual national champions in the sports of men's golf, men's cross country, women's diving, and men's and women's indoor track & field and outdoor track & field.

Mountain West members have participated in 96 bowl games under the league umbrella, including four appearances in BCS games and one CFP game. The MW has earned 84 postseason bids in men's basketball, with six Sweet 16 appearances, as well as three NIT Final Four berths. MW women's basketball has tallied 81 postseason slots, including 38 NCAA bids, five Sweet 16 appearances and one Elite Eight berth since 2000.

In women's volleyball, the MW has had 44 NCAA bids with nine Sweet 16 berths and one Elite Eight appearance. Women's soccer has earned 33 NCAA bids since 1999, with two Sweet 16 berths and one Elite Eight appearance. Mountain West men's golf has sent at least three teams to the NCAA Men's Golf Regionals in each of its 20 years, while women's golf has had at least three teams participate in NCAA Regionals 15 of the last 20 years.

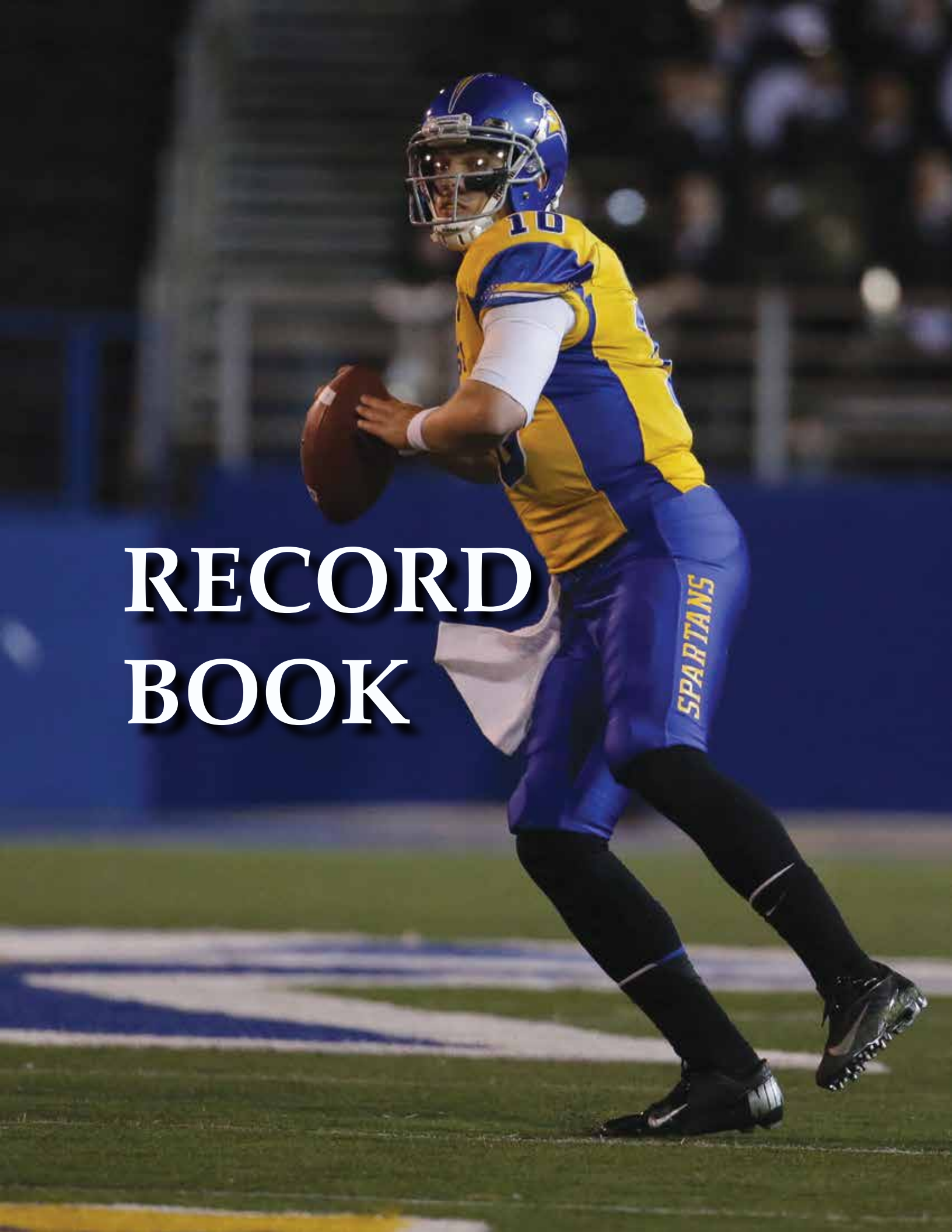

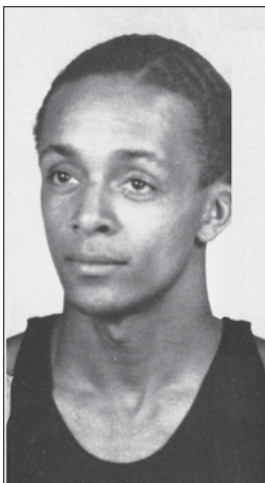

ALL-AMERICAS

Lloyd Thomas is the first San José State University football player to receive first-team All-America honors. The Spartan played as an end on the 1936, 1937 and 1938 teams that had a combined record of 27-7-1. He was an Associated Press Little All-America as a senior in 1938, one of the organization's first black All-America football players. Thomas also was a three-time letterwinner in basketball at San José State.

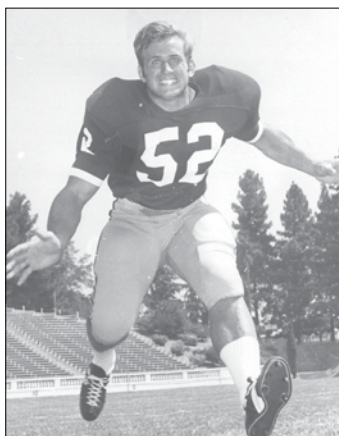

Leroy Zimmerman was a small college Associated Press first-team All-America back in 1939 – San José State University's first undefeated and untied season. The Spartans were 13-0 outscoring their opponents, 324-29. Zimmerman was the team's rushing leader, most proficient passer, led the team with eight interceptions and in scoring, and averaged 40.6 yards a punt. He was the first San José State player selected in a NFL draft when the Washington Redskins made him the 58th overall pick in 1940. He would go on to play nine seasons for five NFL teams.

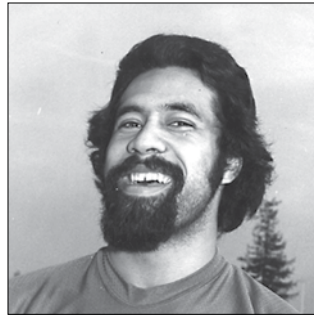
Dave Chaney was a two-time All-America linebacker. A United Press International second-team All-America as a junior in 1970, Chaney became the Spartans first major college first-team All-America when he was named to the Associated Press and Newspaper Enterprise Association 1971 teams. His greatest single-game performance was in the Spartans' 13-12 upset win over eventual Rose Bowl champion Stanford on November 13, 1971. Chaney was credited with 17 tackles, two fumble recoveries and intercepted a pass. His jersey number 52 was the first to be retired at San José State. After his college football career, he became a very successful high school tennis coach in Central California.

Charles Pauley was the NCAA Division I-A kickoff return leader in 2002 averaging a San José State single-season school 31.6 yards per return. The collegefootballnews.com first team and Associated Press third-team All-America returned kickoffs of 98 yards against UTEP and 97 yards at Stanford for touchdowns his senior season. Pauley was one of the most versatile players to wear a Spartan uniform. He played wide receiver, returned punts and kickoffs, gained yardage running the football and passed for four touchdowns in his two-year San Jose State career. As a junior in 2001, Pauley set a San Jose State single-game record of 355 all-purpose yards in a 64-45 win over Nevada. On the school's career list, he still ranks sixth for all-purpose running yardage and second in kickoff return average.

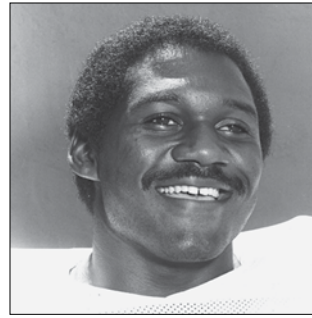
Dwight Lowery is San José State University's only player with multiple first team All-America honors. In 2006, Lowery's school record nine interceptions tied for the nation's most and played a major role in the team's 9-4 win-loss record and New Mexico Bowl victory. He became the first San Jose State player to receive American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) All-America honors. Lowery repeated as an AFCA All-America in 2007. The New York Jets selected Lowery in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL draft. He played for the Jets, Jacksonville Jaguars, Atlanta Falcons, Indianapolis Colts and San Diego Chargers.

A MODERN-ERA SPARTAN PLAYED IN 50 GAMES IN A CAREER: Dominique Hunsucker played in 53 games during the 2006 through 2010 seasons. Hunsucker's 50th game was on October 30, 2010 at New Mexico State.

A PLAYER RUSHED FOR 200 OR MORE YARDS IN A GAME: Harry Beck rushed for 209 yards versus Santa Clara on October 7, 1950... and by the opponent: Dick Bass of the College of the Pacific rushed for 226 yards on November 8, 1958.

A SPARTAN RUSHED FOR 1,000 OR MORE YARDS IN A SEASON: Rick Kane rushed for 1,144 yards and seven touchdowns on 210 carries in 1975.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 10 OR MORE PASSES IN A GAME: Steve Cox caught 10 passes for 137 yards at Stanford on September 17, 1966.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 50 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Steve Cox caught 54 passes for 653 yards and three touchdowns in 1966.

THREE SPARTANS CAUGHT 50 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Guy Liggins (72), Lafo Malauulu (56) and Kenny Jackson (51) had at least 50 receptions in 1986 regular-season play.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 80 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Edell Shepherd caught 83 passes for 1,500 yards and 14 touchdowns in 2001.

A SPARTAN RUSHED FOR 100 OR MORE YARDS AND GAINED 100 OR MORE YARDS RECEIVING IN A GAME: Brandon Rutley rushed for 132 yards and two touchdowns and caught eight passes for 101 yards in the 27-24 win over Navy on November 19, 2011.

A SPARTAN PASSED FOR 3,000 OR MORE YARDS IN A SEASON: Ed Luther threw for 3,049 yards and 20 touchdowns in 11 games in 1979.

A SPARTAN THREW FIVE OR MORE TOUCHDOWN PASSES IN A GAME: Steve Clarkson threw six touchdowns in the 65-33 win at Fresno State on October 3, 1981.

A SPARTAN THREW 50 OR MORE TOUCHDOWN PASSES IN A CAREER: Craig Kimball threw 50 touchdown passes during the 1972 through 1974 seasons.

A SPARTAN COMPLETED AT LEAST 60 PERCENT OF HIS PASSES IN A SEASON: Danny Holman completed 61.5 percent (160-of-260) of his passes in the 1966 season.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 100 OR MORE PASSES IN A CAREER: Ike McBee caught 106 passes for 1,571 yards and eight TDs from 1972 through 1974.

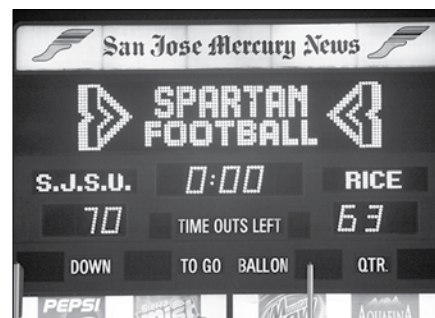

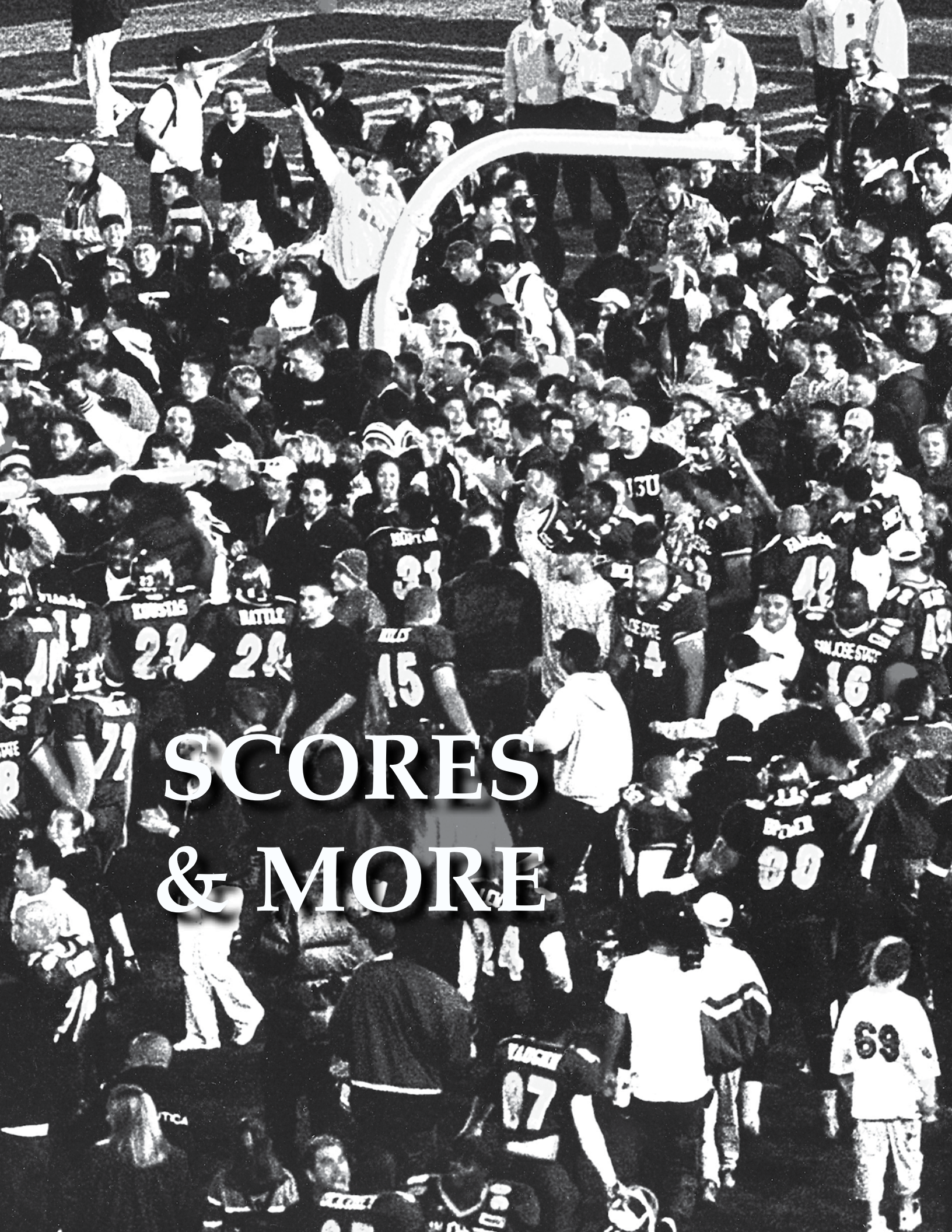

San José State was scheduled to play two games in Hawaii to end the 1941 season. The Spartans were in Honolulu when the attack on Pearl Harbor occurred on December 7, 1941. Many players immediately joined the local police force or the armed services. The games against the University of Hawai'i on December 13 and Willamette College of Oregon on December 16 were canceled.

The San José State University football team plays its home games in CEFCU Stadium. Built in 1933, the stadium was known as Spartan Stadium until CEFCU entered into a 15-year naming rights with the University in 2016.

The Spartans won the first football game played in the stadium, 44-0, over San Francisco State, on October 7, 1933. Since then, the Spartans have played 395 games over 81 seasons. The team's 100th win in the stadium came on October 21, 1967, against New Mexico, 52-14. The 200th victory occurred in 2005. SJSU's home field record is 240-150-17 entering 2019.

This season, CEFCU Stadium is undergoing a massive change to its east side in preparation for the construction of an operations center scheduled to be completed in 2023. Seating on the east side was removed during the summer. Two stadium expansions and renovations in the 1980's increased the seating capacity from 18,000 to over 30,000.

A FieldTurf surface replaced natural grass in 2009. The original FieldTurf surface was replaced in May 2017 with an AstroTurf surface. Two scoreboards - one on the East side and a state-of-the-art videoboard were installed in 2011.

The multi-purpose facility previously was the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, religious convocations, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.

Five Silicon Valley Football Classics were held in CEFCU Stadium. Air Force in 2000, Michigan State in 2001, Fresno State in 2002, UCLA in 2003 and Northern Illinois in 2004 were bowl-game winners. The 1999 Women's World Cup and 1999 NCAA Women's College Cup soccer events attracted record-setting crowds.

The largest attendance at a home football game was a 31,681 sellout crowd at the 2003 win over Grambling State. The game marked the first time in memory that San José State had a "sellout" prior to a football game day.

The largest crowd to attend any event in the stadium was estimated at 37,000 for a ZZ Top music concert.

A PLAYER KICKED THREE OR MORE FIELD GOALS: Bryce Crawford kicked field goals of 50, 36 and 45 yards in a 50-37 win over UNLV on October 27, 2018, ...**and by the opponent:** San Diego State's John Baron made kicks of 36, 22 and 51 yards in the Aztecs' 16-13 win on October 20, 2018.

A SPARTAN LED THE NATION IN A STATISTICAL CATEGORY AT THE END OF A SEASON: Frank Ginda was the national leader in total tackles in 2017. He was credited with 173 tackles and a 13.3 per game average.

A DEFENSIVE EXTRA-POINT WAS SCORED IN A SAN JOSÉ STATE GAME: San José State scored a defensive extra point when Travis Johnson blocked a fourth-quarter Hawai'i extra-point kick try and teammate Duke Ihenacho ran with the loose ball into the end zone in the 28-27 Spartan win on October 14, 2011.

MORE THAN 60 POINTS WERE SCORED BY ONE TEAM: The Spartans scored 66 points in a 66-35 win over Portland State on September 10, 2016... **and by the opponent:** Utah State defeated San José State, 62-24, on November 10, 2018.

Dr. Mary A. Papazian, a seasoned leader with nearly 30 years of experience as a university professor, academic and administrative leader, joined San Jose State University as its 30th president on July 1, 2016.

As the leader of the founding campus of the California State University and Silicon Valley’s only public university, Papazian — a Southern California native — is firmly committed to student success; open, transparent and inclusive leadership; fostering a culture of curiosity and discovery; and building enduring campus and community partnerships.

At San Jose State University

Papazian is focused on revitalizing communication among and between campus leaders, students, faculty and staff; energizing alumni, supporters and friends of the university; meaningfully elevating engagement with elected, industry and community leaders on important regional policy issues; empowering people across the university singularly to focus on student success; inclusively assessing opportunities to enhance operational effectiveness; and articulating an aspirational vision for SJSU to be America’s preeminent urban public university.

Notable milestones at SJSU since Papazian’s appointment include the groundbreaking for the Interdisciplinary Science Building—the first new SJSU academic building in 30 years—and approval of plans to build a Science Park; a series of Town Hall events hosted by SJSU’s Institute for the Study of Sport, Society and Social Change; and the launch of a new, 10-year strategic plan known as Transformation 2030.

Previous appointments

Before coming to SJSU, Papazian was president of Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven, Connecticut. There, her accomplishments included strengthening programs supporting the successful transition of first-year and transfer students; establishing a vision for what will be SCSU’s first-ever comprehensive philanthropic campaign and securing a \$3 million gift and a \$1.2 million bequest to establish its first endowed chair; opening the new Academic Laboratory and Science Building; expanding international education and study abroad programs; increasing research opportunities for undergraduate students, and expanding scholarships to support student recruitment, retention and completion.

Previously, Papazian was the provost and senior vice president for Academic Affairs at Lehman College of The City University of New York, managing a \$70 million budget that supported 450 full-time faculty members and 200 staff members, creating a research advisory board, hiring a new director of the Office of Research and Sponsored Programs, and developing a research handbook for faculty.

She also served as the dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at Montclair State University in New Jersey, and as associate dean of the College of Arts and Science at Oakland University in Rochester, Michigan, where she began her academic career as an assistant, associate and tenured professor of English.

Academic interests and leadership

Papazian holds bachelor’s, master’s and doctoral degrees in English from the University of California, Los Angeles. She and husband Dr. Dennis R. Papazian, founding director of the Armenian Research Center at the University of Michigan, Dearborn, have two adult daughters.

Papazian is actively engaged in national and regional volunteer leadership, serving on the boards of Higher Education Resource Services, Association of American Colleges and Universities, Bay Area Council, Silicon Valley Leadership Group and Joint Venture Silicon Valley. She and Dennis both remain actively involved in Armenian historical and cultural efforts.

In May 2019, Papazian was named to a four-year term to the NCAA’s 24-member Board of Directors as the Mountain West representative. The appointment followed her service to the national organization as the vice-chair of the NCAA Division I Presidential Forum in 2018. At the conference level for the 2019-20 academic year, she is a member of the Mountain West Board of Directors’ Executive Committee. Papazian is designated as the Board’s Incoming Chair beginning in July 2020.

San José State University, Silicon Valley's metropolitan university, is pre-eminent in broadly educating leaders and professionals for an increasingly complex and global society.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

Graduating more than 7,000 students annually, San José State University also provides the professional infrastructure for the region – from teachers to social workers to artists to law enforcement officers to nurses. The terms, “leaders and professionals,” describe not just the types of graduates who earn their degrees, but also the roles they assume in their communities and in their fields of endeavor.

San José State University's place in history is well-established. Founded in 1857, it was the first public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its humble beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, it has matured into a master's university offering 191 bachelor's and master's degrees.

The university's 32,000 students study in eight fully-accredited colleges: Applied Sciences and the Arts, Business, Education, Engineering, Humanities and the Arts, Science, Social Sciences and Social Work.

One strength of the academic program is the broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism -- to diverse studies. Academic strength also is seen in the university's nationally-recognized programs. Examples include the School of Music, the School of Art and Design, the School of Journalism and Mass Communications, the School of Nursing and the School of Library and Information Science.

In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach introductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning facilities include computer-equipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the NASA Ames Research Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.

San José State University also finds strength in its diversity. For first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Students range in age from first-time freshmen to college transfers to professionals seeking additional education. Student demographics – with ethnic pluralism – provide the benefits of multiple cultures and diverse student interests and activities. From residence life to athletic teams to social clubs to co-op jobs – student activities meet the needs of this diverse student body.

ATHLETICS ADMINISTRATION



Marie Tuite was promoted to the position of director of athletics at San José State University on May 19, 2017 after seven years of university service in several executive athletics administration positions. As of July 1, 2019, Tuite is one of 10 women who is an athletics director at a NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institution.

Her many contributions at San José State include:

- Leading a NCAA Division I athletics department with a \$34-million budget that supports 22 NCAA Division I programs and 490 student-athletes
- Creating a positive culture for student-athletes' academic retention, success and graduation. In 2018-19, Spartan student-athletes earned more than 300 institutional, conference and national academic and scholar-athlete awards.
- Facility enhancements on the University's 62-acre South Campus. Student-athletes now have a state-of-the art men's and women's golf practice facility; the Stephens Family Pitching & Hitting Facility for baseball; and new home facilities for men's and women's soccer, women's tennis, softball, and beach volleyball; and a commitment for a football operations center connected to CEFCU Stadium. On the main campus, there are recently renovated locker room facilities for men's and women's basketball, volleyball and women's gymnastics; and a new aquatics center for men's and women's water polo matches and women's swimming and diving meets.
- Facilitating a 15-year naming rights agreement in 2016 for CEFCU Stadium, the Home of the Spartans; the department's first all-sports apparel partnership in 2017, a six-year agreement with adidas; and creating mutually beneficial corporate participation opportunities for the Women's Tennis Association and The Golf Channel to partner with San Jose State Athletics.
- Adding the sports of women's indoor and outdoor track and field in 2013, beach volleyball in 2014, men's water polo in 2015 and reinstating the men's track and field program in 2018.
- Shepherding the most successful donor major gift campaign for Spartan Athletics in any two-year period in the program's 125-year-plus history.
- Successfully promoting San José State to be the practice site for the Carolina Panthers as the National Football Conference (NFC) representative in Super Bowl 50 and Clemson University in preparation for the 2019 College Football Playoff national championship.

- Taking a leadership role in San José State's invitation and acceptance to join the Mountain West in July 2013.

She originally joined San José State in June 2010 as a senior associate athletics director and the athletics department's chief operating officer. Tuite also held the positions of deputy director of athletics/internal operations, fulfilled the role of senior woman administrator (SWA) and was the interim athletics director in 2012 and 2017 before being named athletics director.

Tuite was a sports supervisor for football, men's and women's basketball and women's golf. She managed future football scheduling, compliance, business affairs, and student services. The football team won its two bowl games, the 2012 Military Bowl and the 2015 Auto National Cure Bowl, and the Spartans as a department captured 11 conference team championships.

Her professional career includes executive positions at Pacific-12 Conference universities and the NCAA. She came to the Spartans from Seattle University where she was a Special Assistant to the Athletics Director. Tuite assisted Seattle University's transition to NCAA Division I athletics status.

Her first athletics administrative position was at Alma (Mich.) College in 1981 as the Director of Women's Athletics Programs and Activities. She joined the University of California women's athletics staff in 1984 as an assistant athletics director.

Tuite worked for the NCAA as an Assistant Director of Championships from 1989 to 1994. She assisted the organization's sport committees in the administration of the National Collegiate Championships program and coordinated the Association's corporate partner, merchandising, promotional, and official ball programs for NCAA championships.

She returned to a campus setting in 1994 as a senior associate athletics director at the University of Washington. Her duties included overseeing the process and appointment of new head coaches, directing daily operations, and initiating and implementing "keys to success" for priority Husky sports programs.

A two-sport student-athlete and graduate of Central Michigan University, she was inducted into the university's Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990 as just the third female inductee. Tuite played field hockey and was a star basketball player who majored in physical education. She earned her master's degree from her alma mater in athletic administration.

Tuite is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), Women Leaders in College Sports, and the Women's Sports Foundation. In May 2012, she was one of 41 local female executives honored at the 28th annual Tribute to Women Awards program by the YWCA Silicon Valley. She served on the 2019 College Football National Championship Host Committee Executive Board and is on the San Jose Sports Authority Board of Directors.

The native of Livonia, Mich., has two sons, Michael, a 2015 University of Washington graduate, and John.



Steve O'Brien, who has 13 years of progressive NCAA Division I athletics administration senior level management experience and success, accepted the position of deputy director of athletics at San Jose State University in July 2017.

O'Brien's wide-ranging background in college athletics administration includes developing revenue-generating opportunities, sports supervision, facilities enhancement, compliance and academic support services, introducing life skills programs for student-athletes, enhancing alumni and student body relations, and NCAA committee service.

His San José State duties include future football scheduling, serving as the department liaison to the Women's Tennis Association's Mubadala Silicon Valley Classic and the Western Intercollegiate tournament coverage by The Golf Channel, and supervising the sports of men's and women's golf and women's basketball.

He joined the Spartans after six years as a senior associate athletics director at the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., two years as an associate athletics director at UC Santa Barbara and three years at his alma mater, Santa Clara University.

At Navy, he transformed the athletics department's development activities and created new strategies for revenue generation. More than \$76-million in revenues from contributions, pledges, ticket and suite revenues, corporate sales and other forms of income were attributable to his initiatives.

A 1998 Santa Clara University graduate with honors, O'Brien's first position in intercollegiate athletics was at his alma mater from 2006 to 2009. He was an academic support manager and later as an assistant athletics director responsible for the operation and management of the Bronco Bench Foundation.

O'Brien was named the associate athletics director for development at UC Santa Barbara in 2009. He supervised sports, created revenue streams for facility improvements, and managed all aspects of athletics fund raising with an emphasis on major gifts and capital campaigns. O'Brien created The Gaucho Fund, which increased annual giving by 70 percent in two years, UCSB's Living Scholar program in which the number of top-tier donors doubled and a multi-million dollar capital campaign, The Walk of Champions.

The San Jose native earned his juris doctorate from the University of Southern California in 2001. He worked as a transactional finance and real estate attorney for California law firms until 2006 when he began his intercollegiate athletics administration career. O'Brien still possesses his California State Bar Association license.

He begins service on the San Jose Arena Authority's Board of Directors in August 2019. O'Brien recently served one three-year term on the NCAA's Committee on Sportsmanship and Ethical Conduct.

A men's cross country letterwinner at Santa Clara University, he was named his team's Most Inspirational Athlete in 1997. He, and his wife, Julianne, have two sons, John and James.

Josh Thiel, an accomplished fundraising professional and seasoned administrator with two decades of successful experiences in higher education, was named San Jose State University's deputy director of athletics for advancement in January 2018.

His primary responsibility includes leading the Athletics Advancement team dedicated to collaborating with San Jose State Athletics on expanding support for student-athletes, coaches, and the department's 22 NCAA sports programs. He also serves as a sports supervisor for women's tennis, men's water polo and women's water polo.

Since joining the Spartans, he oversaw the transition of the 50-year old Spartan Foundation to the recently created Spartan Athletics Fund as the primary annual year-round giving platform for San Jose State University Athletics. He also helped close seven-figure gifts in support of the planned Football Operations Center that will benefit the football and soccer programs and be a resource for all Spartan student-athletes.

Thiel came to San Jose State from Rice University where he served as a senior associate athletics director and chief development officer from 2014 through January 2018. He and his team completed \$41.5 million in fundraising for three capital projects including a football operations and student-athlete training center, locker and team rooms for six sports, a grandstand and team space for track, and a new batting cage and hospitality area for baseball.

Familiar with the Bay Area landscape, Thiel also served as an associate development director for Stanford Athletics and the Stanford University School of Medicine. He served as a development liaison for football, men's basketball, baseball, men's and women's soccer, softball, women's lacrosse, synchronized swimming, men's and women's volleyball, men's and women's water polo, and wrestling. For the Stanford School of Medicine, he raised \$3-million for the medical school's Li Ka Shing Center for Learning and Knowledge.

He also served as a development officer for the University of Colorado Hospital in Boulder, Colo., from 2010 to 2012 raising funds for the top-ranked academic medical center in the country, and, specifically, the O'Connor Thompson Breast Center.

Thiel is a 1996 graduate of California State University Fullerton. He majored in business administration with a concentration in finance. Thiel earned a master's degree in sport management from the University of San Francisco in 1999.

Eileen Daley was appointed San Jose State University's senior associate athletics director for academics and student services in June 2016. Now in her 14th year at the University, she is in her second tenure with the University's athletics department.

Daley oversees the academic services program and addresses the overall academic goals for the Athletics Department. She has liaison roles with academic advising, University admissions and the NCAA and manages the Spartans' Fifth Year program, grant submissions and student orientation programs.

Daley's first San Jose State Athletics position was as the lead academic advisor in 2005. She was promoted to an assistant athletics director position for academic services in 2007. Daley was a central figure in the department's major improvement in the NCAA's measurement of Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores. Once saddled with an APR score for football below 900 (out of 1,000), San Jose State's score in the sport rose steadily during her tenure and beyond topping at 975 for the 2015 NCAA report.

Between 2011 and 2016, she served the University as the associate director for undergraduate admissions and outreach. She and her team were assigned to recruit undergraduate students for San José State with a focus on under represented demographic groups.

The 1995 Sonoma State University graduate majored in psychology and competed in track and field for two seasons. She earned a master's degree in sports psychology from John F. Kennedy University in 1997.

Daley was an assistant track and field coach at Petaluma (Calif.) High School before embarking on a career in athletics administration. As a graduate student, she was assigned to work on psychological performance enhancement with injured University of California Davis student-athletes.

She worked at Sonoma State University (1998-99) in student-athlete support services and the California Interscholastic Federation (C.I.F.) for four years (1999-2003) as an assistant director focusing on educational programs. She was the academic coordinator for San Francisco State University Athletics (2003-05) before coming to San Jose State.

Daley, her husband, Brian, and daughter Mackenzie, live in Hollister, Calif.

Kevin Gonzalez, who has more than 20 years of fundraising experiences in higher education, was appointed San Jose State University's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Major Gifts in February 2019.

Since joining the Spartans, Gonzalez has used his expertise in major, planned and blended gifts to work with donors on naming opportunities for the Football Operations Center and the South Campus Athletic Complex and on endowments for student-athlete scholarships.

Gonzalez's fundraising accomplishments in higher education are divided with equal success between public and private institutions in Northern California.

The 1995 graduate of Cal Poly majored in recreation administration, special events/marketing. He earned a M.B.A. from Santa Clara University in 2003 and his doctorate in educational leadership from California State University, Sacramento in 2013.

He began his professional career in 1996 as the alumni director and coordinator of annual giving for Jesuit High School in Carmichael, Calif. He worked for the Santa Clara University School of Law from 1998 to 2004 first as the associate director of annual and special gifts and later as the director of alumni relations and annual giving.

Gonzalez was a senior development officer for the University of the Pacific McGeorge School of Law for six years (2004-10) before holding several fundraising and major gift executive positions at California State University, Sacramento for the next seven years (2010-17). His fundraising acumen and success for the university resulted in more than \$30-million for capital projects, endowed chairs, scholarships and campus programs.

Gonzalez holds current memberships with Planned Giving Forum of Sacramento and CASE (Council for Advancement and Support of Education). He is a certified national official by USA Swimming, has coached youth soccer, tennis, high school mountain biking and plays ice hockey in his spare time.



David Rasmussen accepted the position of senior associate athletics director for compliance at San José State University in December 2018. He and his staff handle and manage athletics compliance, amateurism and eligibility issues, transfer matters, recruiting, rules education, and playing and practice seasons.

Rasmussen also is the sports supervisor for the Spartans' men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's outdoor track and field, women's volleyball, and women's beach volleyball programs.

He came to San Jose State with 10 years of NCAA Division I experience in athletics compliance from Penn State where he was the director of compliance. He held a similar position at Brigham Young University from June 2014 until moving east in July 2017.

The 2007 Brigham Young University graduate majored in communications and graduated magna cum laude. He received his J.D., from Penn State Law in 2010.

While he was earning his J.D. degree, Rasmussen began his career in intercollegiate athletics compliance at Penn State as a graduate assistant. After an internship in academic and membership affairs at the NCAA headquarters in Indianapolis, his first full-time position was at the University of Utah as a compliance coordinator.

Rasmussen returned to his alma mater in August 2011 as a manager of athletics eligibility and was promoted to the position of director of compliance three years later.

Rasmussen is certified by the National Association for Athletics Compliance.



Blake Sasaki became the senior associate athletics director for external relations at San José State University in April 2013. He is the sports supervisor for Spartan baseball, men's basketball, and women's soccer. Sasaki oversees marketing and advertising, ticket sales and ticket operations, and major gift donations.

Sasaki came to San José State from the University of California where he was the Associate General Manager for the IMG Sport Marketing Department from 2009 to 2013. He was responsible for managing over 30 corporate partners and achieved status as a top-10 performer among all college properties.

Prior to his position at Cal, Sasaki spent three years as a Senior Account Executive for the San Francisco 49ers. He negotiated corporate partnerships with a focus on increasing sponsorship revenue and developed new relationships with first-time, non-traditional sponsors.

Sasaki was the Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing, Promotions and External Relations at UC Irvine from 1998 to 2006. There, he directed the corporate sponsorship, marketing, promotions and event-management programs. He also assisted in athletics development and worked with numerous campus student groups.

After graduating from college, Sasaki began his career at Weber State where he was an assistant director of marketing and promotions. He was responsible for all marketing, promotions, corporate sponsorships and advertising for football, men's and women's basketball, women's soccer and volleyball.

Sasaki earned his Master's of Sport Administration degree from Ohio University and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in exercise science from UC Davis.

Sasaki and his wife, the former Staci Kawakami, reside in Campbell with their sons, Cole and Max. Staci is a 1997 graduate of San José State with the Bachelor of Science degree in business accounting.

Mike Waller was named San José State University’s senior associate athletics director for business operations in July 2015.

Waller came to San Jose State after two successful years working in the Mountain West conference office as a Senior Associate Commissioner and the Chief Financial Officer.

Before joining the Mountain West in 2013, the Jefferson City, Mo., native worked in the Boise State University athletics department for 24 years. He first joined the Broncos coaching staff in 1989 as the assistant women’s volleyball coach. He remained in that capacity until the end of the 1998 season when he was named interim head coach.

Waller began his administrative duties at Boise State in 1998 as an associate athletics director and chief financial officer. During his 12-year tenure as C.F.O., Waller oversaw a budget growth of \$25-million while assisting with the construction, expansion and renovation processes of more than 10 athletics facilities.

Besides his duties and responsibilities connected with the Broncos athletics budget, he was an Associate Athletics Director for Administration for two years. He supervised contracts and negotiations for equipment, apparel, football travel, bowl games, served as a sports supervisor and managed and supervised NCAA Championships events that came to Boise State.

The 1983 University of Central Missouri graduate majored in secondary education. He and his wife, April, have two sons and two daughters and nine grandchildren.

Darren Coelho, a San José State University athletics staff member since 2001, is the Assistant Athletics Director for Ticket Operations. He is responsible for all ticketing operations for the Spartan Athletics Department including selling season and individual tickets and all ticket operations on game days. He ensures compliance with all NCAA rules regarding all player-guest admissions and is responsible for road game ticket consignments and any postseason ticketing duties.

Coelho also oversees the ticketing operations for special events in CEFCU Stadium such as international soccer matches.

He is the San José State representative to the Mountain West Football Championship Working Group. Coelho was the first ticket director in the group that encompasses a cross-section of expertise from various professionals that provides guidance and knowledge in planning for the championship game.

Coelho joined the Spartans as the athletics ticket manager. In 2005, he was named director of ticket operations and was promoted to an assistant athletics director in 2008. At San José State, he also served as the ticket manager for the 2001 through 2004 Silicon Valley Football Classic bowl games and the 2007 and 2010 NCAA Division I Men’s Basketball Championship games played in San Jose, Calif. Coelho’s experience in ticketing dates back to 1997 when he was named ticket manager for the San Jose SaberCats of the Arena Football League.

The 1996 San José State University graduate majored in public relations. 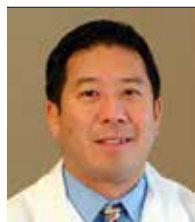

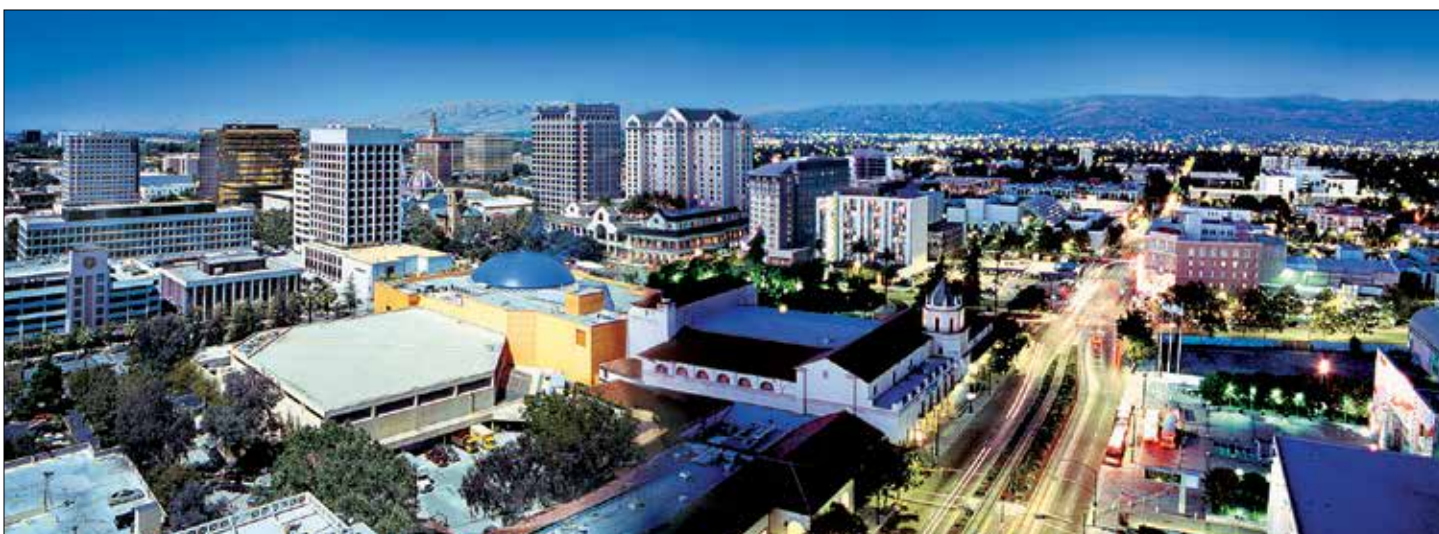
Light rail and historic trolley lines, the 18,000-seat HP Pavilion at San José, convention facilities, shops and a diverse

NOTES TO THE MEDIA

Office Location

The athletics media relations office is located at 1393 S. 7th Street, San José, CA 95112. Parking and work space for the media are available.

Credential Requests

Credentials are issued for news and editorial coverage on a case-by-case basis to those filing game stories, accredited members from established media outlets, and personnel assigned by the athletics media relations office. Requests should be directed to Lawrence Fan, Associate Athletics Director for Football Communications. The credential recipient agrees to all conditions set forth by the University relating to conduct and print, video, audio, digital and photographic game coverage.

Press Box

The CEFCU Stadium press box is located on the 7th Street side of the stadium and is an open-air facility. Carry a jacket. The press box remains open three hours after each contest.



Game Day Parking

Media parking is located in the Mayflower Lot at the corner of 7th & Alma. Media parking passes for home games are issued by the athletics media relations office.

Photographers

Credentials are issued to newspapers, wire services, video crews and team photographers. NCAA rules limit photographers to a wide area behind the restraining line around the playing field and outside the 25-yard lines.

Play-by-Play Television

Contact Lawrence Fan in writing at least 30 days prior to a game concerning video play-by-play of San José State University home football games.

Radio Broadcasts

The radio broadcast booth for the designated official flagship station of the visiting team at Spartan Stadium is Box B on the mezzanine level of the press box and has space for five working individuals. ISDN and regular telephone service are provided.

Production Truck & Satellite Uplink Parking

Production truck and satellite uplink parking is on the 7th street side of the stadium. Arrangements must be made to park a truck overnight inside CEFCU Stadium.

Scouts

Space limitations prohibit seating and standing in the press box for scouting purposes.

Spotters & Statisticians

Requests for spotters and/or statisticians should be placed two weeks prior to a home game.

Statistics & Services

Game statistics, play-by-play accounts and post-game quotes are compiled and distributed. FAX service is available. A meal is available two hours before kickoff.

Team Practices & In-Person Interviews

During the season, the Spartans practice in the morning. In-person, post-practice interview opportunities with the student-athletes, generally, occur at approximately Noon on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Please contact the athletics media relations office in advance with your interview request.

Wireless Internet

Wireless internet is available in the press box area. The wireless network is SpartanAthletics.

Travel

Mineta San José International Airport is a 15-minute drive to Spartan Stadium. Alaska, American, Delta, Horizon, Jet Blue, Northwest, Southwest, United and Virgin America are major domestic carriers with daily flights into San José. San Francisco and Oakland International Airports are 45-minute freeway drives to San José State University.

Weekday Telephone Interviews

Players are available for telephone interviews. Best interview days are Tuesday and Wednesday late mornings. Place a request at least a day in advance. Out-of-town telephone interviews with players originate from the media relations office at a mutually-convenient time.
