The San Jose State volleyball team enters the 2006 season with lots of court experience as all six starters and the libero return from last season's squad. After a youthful 2005 season, this year's Spartan team should have the court experience to compete among the top teams in the Western Athletic Conference.

"Last year's starting lineup was one of the youngest I have had in my coaching career," said San Jose State head coach Craig Choate. "The experience that our team got on the court playing together last season should be an advantage for us this year."

Junior **Jennifer Senftleben** leads the returning class after being named a first team All-WAC selection last season. She led the team in kills with 469, the eighth highest total in a season at San Jose State. She averaged 4.15 kills and 2.32 digs per game.

Senior libero **Jessie Shull** returns for her fourth season to anchor the Spartan defense. The three-time All-WAC selection (first team once, second team twice) is the San Jose State career dig leader with 1,584 in three seasons.

Sophomore **Colleen Burke** played in all 29 matches last season. She led the team in hitting with a .269 percentage. A WAC All-Freshman team selection, Burke averaged 3.03 kills and 0.65 blocks per game.



Niki Clement (hitting) led the team in blocks with 96, while Brittany Collet (#6) was the Spartans' primary setter for the 2005 season.

Sophomore **Brittany Collet** was the Spartans' starting setter for a majority of the season. She averaged 11.48 assists and 2.00 digs per game and was selected to the WAC All-Freshman team.

Sophomore **Niki Clement** led San Jose State in blocks with 96 in 108 games played (0.89 pg). She recorded 10 or more blocks in two matches – 11 against Fresno State and 10 at San Francisco.

Senior **Dyana Thompson** averaged 1.18 kills and 0.85 blocks per game. She recorded a career high 12 blocks at San Francisco and hit .611 at Santa Clara.

Senior **Kristina Conrad** saw action at outside hitter, the back row and at setter. She averaged 2.48 kills and 1.84 digs per match and had the only 20/20 match last year with 20 kills and 20 digs at UC Davis.

Junior **Nia Freeman** played in 83 games and averaged 1.71 kills and 1.24 digs. She hit .625 against Portland with a career high 20 kills.

Also returning for the Spartans are **Amber Biddle, Sarah Christensen, Courtney Lorusso** and **Thao Pham**. Biddle saw limited action in 13 games and had four kills and four blocks at Idaho. Christensen missed last season due to a knee injury. Lorusso redshirted last season and could see time at outside hitter. Pham joined the team late last season and could see action in the back row.

Three newcomers join the Spartan squad and bring different experiences with them to the court. Junior outside hitter **Keri Anglin** played in 2004 at Loyola Marymount and last season at Sacramento City College. She was an All-Big 7 selection last year and the Northern Section "Female Athlete of the Year" for the 2003-04 high school year.

Sophomore outside hitter **Kelly Crow** transferred from UC Riverside where she spent the past two seasons. After redshirting in 2004, Crow saw action in 74 games last year for the Highlanders. Crow's mother, the former Jan Baszak, played at San Jose State in the late 1970s.

Freshman defensive specialist **Kristal Tsukano** was a three-year letterwinner at Kamehameha High School in Honolulu. She helped lead her team to the 2005 Hawaii Division I State Championship and was a two-time second team All-State selection.

San Jose State will travel from coast to coast this season for matches. The team travels to Northern Arizona, San Francisco and New Hampshire for tournaments. The Spartans will host Santa Clara, a 2005 NCAA Tournament semifinalist, and the SJSU Hyatt Invitational at Spartan Gym before beginning WAC play.



Jessie Shull is San Jose State's career dig leader with 1,584 the past three years. She is a three-time All-WAC selection.

CRAIG CHOATE Head Volleyball Coach

Five 20-win seasons and three NCAA Tournament appearances are just a few of the accomplishments San José State head volleyball coach Craig Choate has achieved the past 13 years at the helm of the Spartan program. He begins the 2006 campaign with a 225-179 school record and

a 254-244 coaching record in 16 years.

Choate begins his 14th season as the Spartan coach with the most wins in school history. During the 2003 season, he surpassed Dick Montgomery who had 191 wins. His players and teams have set numerous match, season and career records at San Jose State. Three players (Joslynn Gallop, Kimberly Noble and Jessie Shull) hold various Western Athletic Conference records.

San Jose State has advanced to the championship match of the Western Athletic Conference Tournament twice, in 2001 and 2003. The Spartans entered the 2003 tournament as the sixth seed and upset third-seeded Fresno State in the quarterfinals in five games before upsetting second-seeded SMU, 3-1, in the semifinal match. SJSU faced Hawai'i in the championship and lost, 3-0, but four Spartans were named to the all-tournament team - Carrie Nash, Kimberly Noble, Jessie Shull and Allison Dillon. Noble was named to the first team All-WAC, while Shull was named to the second team.

The Spartans finished fourth in the WAC in 2002 and reached the semifinals of the WAC Volleyball Tournament for the second consecutive season. Middle blocker Stephanie Pascucci was named to the All-WAC first team.

The 2001 season was a great success for Choate's team. For the first time since 1990, San Jose State finished the season ranked in the top-25. The Spartans finished 24th after making its 12th NCAA Tournament appearance. For the first time in Choate's tenure, San Jose State won its opening round NCAA Tournament match, defeating Santa Clara, 3-2. The Spartans then lost in the second round, 3-0, to eventual national champion Stanford. The team also finished second at the 2001 WAC Volleyball Tournament held in San Jose. Choate recorded his 200th career coaching victory in a 3-0 win over Auburn.

Choate took the 2000 Spartan team to the NCAA Tournament for the second time while at the helm of the

Spartan program. The team posted a 22-10 win-loss record, won two tournaments and finished second in the WAC standings for the second consecutive year.

WAC "COACH OF THE YEAR"

The 1999 team finished with a 25-6 overall and an 11-3 WAC record. The Spartans, second in the WAC, broke the school record for most consecutive matches won at 14 and best match winning percentage at .806. Spartan Joslynn Gallop was named the WAC Co-Player of the Year and honorable mention ASICS All-America. She also broke three school and WAC records.

For all of his team's accomplishments in 1999, Choate was honored by his peers by being named the Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year. It was the first time in his coaching career that he had won this honor.

Choate's 1998 team advanced to the semifinal match of the WAC Volleyball Tournament after defeating top-seeded Colorado State, 3-2, in the quarterfinals. That year, SJSU made its 10th appearance in the NCAA Tournament in a first-round match against Colorado.

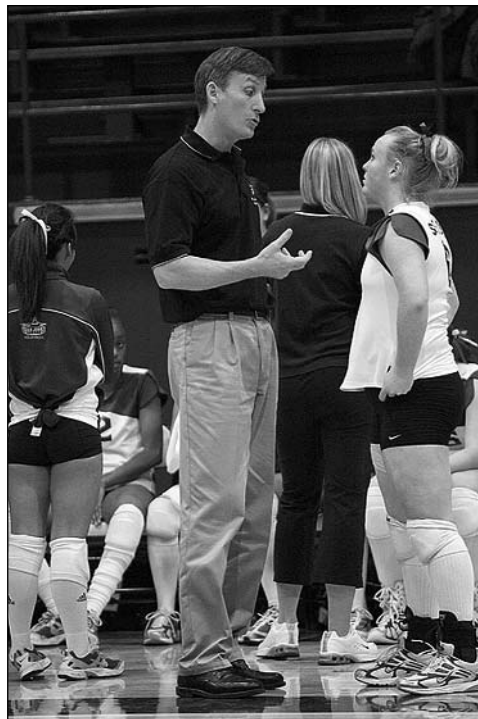
Choate's teams have produced six winning seasons at the school during his tenure. He recorded his 100th victory at San José State with a 3-0 win over SMU at the 1998 WAC Tournament. His 21-12 record in 1998 was the second 20-win team he has coached at the school. The 1994 team won 23 matches and finished second at the 1994 National Invitational Volleyball Championship.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS & RECOGNITION

During his tenure at San José State, the Spartans have beaten nationally-ranked teams including Hawai'i, Pacific, Brigham Young, Fresno State, Santa Clara and San Diego. Choate has coached two honorable mention All-America selections, one first team All-West region player, one first team and three second team All-Northwest Region players, 12 first team and 12 second team all-conference selections and five WAC All-Freshman team selections.

Choate also involves his team in various community service activities throughout the school year. The team has sorted food and clothing for the Sacred Heart Community Center, picked oranges for the Second Harvest Food Bank and fed the homeless on Thanksgiving in Reno and Las Vegas.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, Choate is an active player in various tournaments. He won a silver medal at the 2004 USA Open Volleyball Championships with

While attending BYU, Choate played on the Cougars' men's club volleyball team for four years. He played on the club volleyball team from 1976-78 before serving a two-year Mormon mission in West Germany. He returned to BYU and played two years, 1980-82, while earning his master's degree.

Choate was an assistant coach at the Olympic Festival in 1994 and 1995. He holds memberships in the AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association) and USA Volleyball and has a CAP III (Coaching Accreditation Program) coaching certification. He is an AVCA/USA Today Top-25 Poll voter and was a clinician at the 1992 YES Clinic.

Choate, born March 18, 1956, in Los Angeles, Calif., resides in San José.

his Men's "45's" Team in Atlanta. Choate also won silver medals in 2002 and 2003 as a member of the "45's" Team in Dallas and in 1999 as a member of the "40's" Team in San Jose. Choate participated in the 1981 USVBA senior men's division open championships and received All-America honors.

Academics are also stressed to the student-athlete. Choate has had at least one player named to the Academic all-WAC team the past 10 years. Some of his former student-athletes have gone on to become successful coaches and administrators in the athletic profession.

Choate came to SJSU after three years as the head coach of the New Mexico State University women's volleyball program; one he brought up from a five-win season his first year as head coach to a 14-15 record in 1992. Prior to New Mexico State, he was an assistant coach for five years for the Brigham Young and Cal Poly women's programs and the Pepperdine men's program.

Choate began his coaching career in 1985 at BYU. In 1990, Choate was an assistant coach with the men's volleyball program at Pepperdine under Marv Dunphy, the head coach of the 1988 U.S. Olympic men's volleyball team.

A 1978 graduate of Brigham Young University with a Bachelor of Science in physical education, Choate earned a Master of Arts degree in physical education in 1982 and a second undergraduate degree, a Bachelor of Arts in history, in 1984, both from BYU.

Former Spartan player Jeanine Haldi returns to the Spartan sidelines this season as she joins the coaching staff as an assistant coach for the 2006 season.

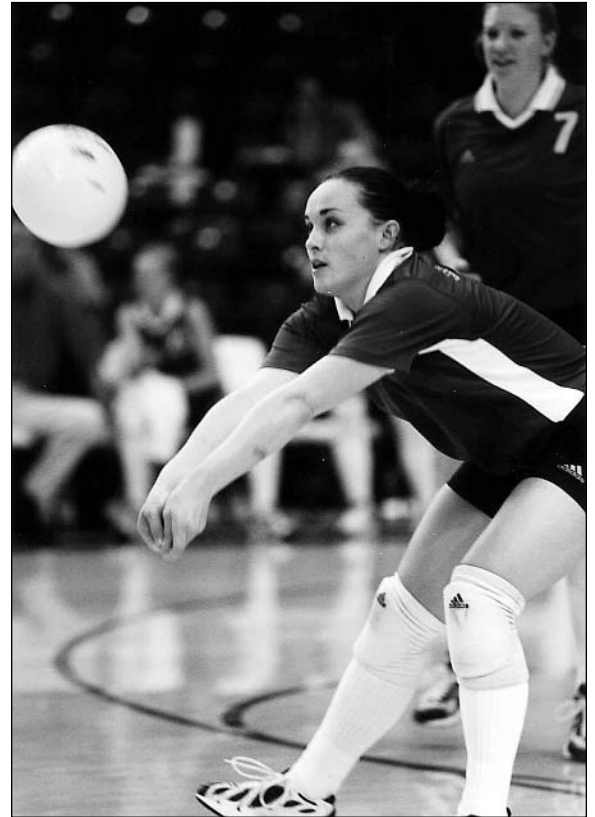
Haldi played for San Jose State head coach Craig Choate from 1999 to 2002. She finished her four-year career with 982 digs which ranks sixth all-time at San Jose State.

Haldi is considered the first libero in Spartan history as the position was instituted her senior year. That season, she had 370 digs to lead the team. She played in two NCAA Tournaments (2000 and 2001) including the 2001 upset of Santa Clara where she had eight block assists in the victory.

This past school year, Haldi spent the year in the San Jose State Athletics Department as a compliance assistant while completing her master's degree at the University of San Francisco. She worked in 2005 at the University of California Athletic Department as a sponsorship intern.

Haldi is involved in the club volleyball system as she is the president, trainer and coach of Club Leville in Tracy, Calif. The club is certified by the Northern California Volleyball Association.

A three-time Scholar Athlete, Haldi graduated from San Jose State in 2003 with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and sport management. She received her master's degree from the University of San Francisco in May 2006.

First Season

Jeremy Penaflor begins his first season as an assistant coach for the San Jose State women's volleyball program.

Penaflor has worked in the club volleyball system for the past six years. He has coached at Yahoo! Volleyball Club for two years and assists with running practices and teaching the game of volleyball to younger players. He also works at City Beach, Inc., in Santa Clara, where he teaches volleyball classes.

An active player, he is a member of the San Jose State Men's Volleyball Club Team. He is the club's President and handles many of the behind-the-scenes tasks such as travel arrangements, marketing and fundraising. He also played on the Moreau Catholic High School team during his prep years.

In its 44th year, the Western Athletic Conference continues to evolve and features some of the nation's best intercollegiate competition. One thing that remains unchanged is the persistent nature of the nine schools in the WAC to advance their programs to contend at the top levels of the NCAA.

The WAC provides its student-athletes the chance to travel to scenic destinations and gain exposure in some of the nation's most diverse markets. In addition, the WAC's student-athletes work to achieve the highest levels of success with the academic support of their respective institutions.

The WAC has experienced tremendous success. Over the past three years, it has won 63.6 percent of its bowl games, the best winning percentage of any conference in the nation. In the past two seasons, the WAC has sent a total of eight teams to bowl games.

In men's basketball, a team has advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 11 consecutive seasons. Every current school in the WAC has competed in the NCAA Tournament since 1990. Fresno State softball and Louisiana Tech women's basketball have both competed in every NCAA Tournament ever held.

In 2001, the WAC partnered with ESPN and added SportsWest in 2003 for unprecedented coverage of football and basketball. Over the past two years, the networks have shown a total of 52 football games, by far the most in a two-year range in WAC history.

The WAC is the sixth oldest among the nation's 11 Division I-A conferences. Its history traces back to July 27, 1962, when the original six-team league of Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming began competition.

The first championship was held in November 1962. Arizona won the men's cross country title and New Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona

finished second in the NCAA College World Series and, less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series trophy. Rice was the last WAC school to earn an NCAA team title when it won the College World Series in 2003.

Since that year, several changes have occurred. UTEP and Colorado State became members in September 1967, while Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978. The WAC then added San Diego State (1978), Hawai'i (1979) and Air Force (1980).

The 1990-91 athletic year was the first in which both men and women competed under the WAC name. Fresno State was added in 1992, and then in 1996, the women's programs from Air Force and Hawai'i along with six new schools (UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa) came into the WAC. Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, UNLV, New Mexico, San Diego State, Utah and Wyoming withdrew on June 30, 1999. Nevada (2000), Boise State (2001) and Louisiana Tech (2001) were added while TCU withdrew following the 2000-01 season. The current membership was established on July 1, 2005, when Idaho, New Mexico State and Utah State joined the WAC after Rice, SMU, UTEP and Tulsa withdrew.

Presently, the WAC crowns champions in 19 sports - eight men's and 11 women's. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field. Championships for women are held in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and volleyball.

Lisa was one of 13 inducted into the San José State University Sports Hall of Fame on November 5, 1999. She was a 1986 First Team All-American and 1985 Second Team All-American. In 1987, she was honored with the NCAA Top Six Award. Lisa was a member of the 1983 U.S. Olympic Festival Gold Medal Team. She is the San José State career leader in hitting percentage at .317. She held the match records for most digs with 38.

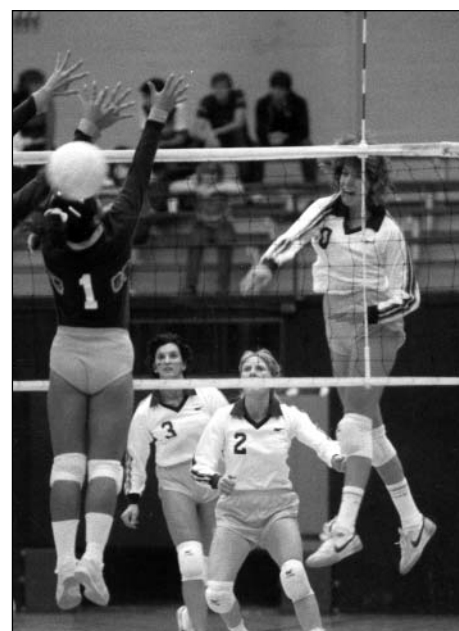

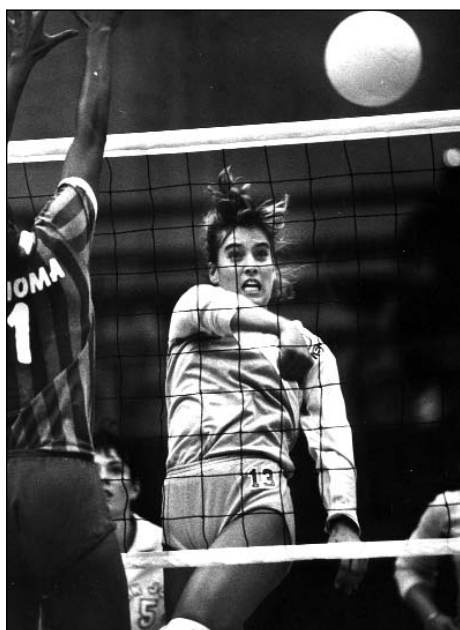

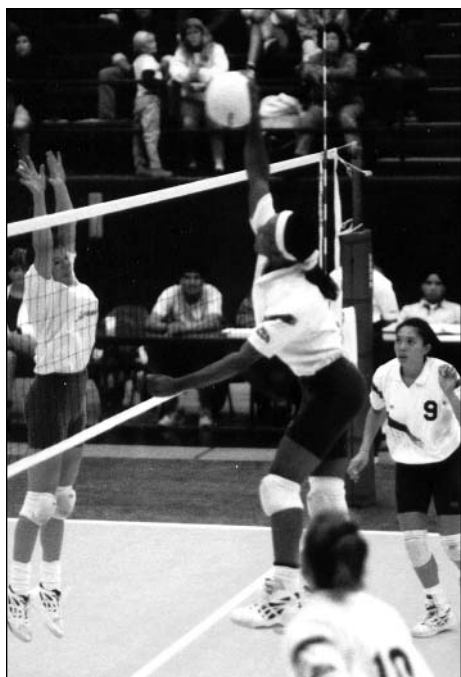

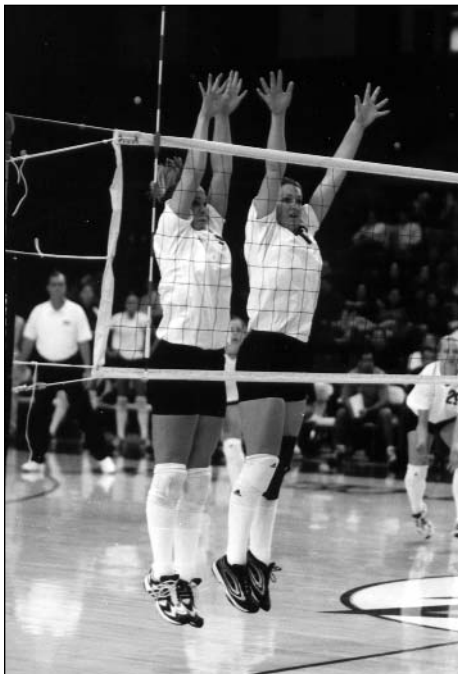

Known for the high quality of its academic programs, its excellent faculty (87 percent hold doctorates or the highest degrees in their academic disciplines), and its diverse and committed student body, San José State successfully educates students to compete in today's complex, high tech and global economy.

For the past six years, San José State has been ranked among the top ten masters-level public universities in the West by U.S. News & World Report's survey of "America's Best Colleges." In the 2006 survey, the College of Engineering is ranked 14th among the nation's Best Undergraduate Engineering Programs (in addition, electrical engineering ranks 11th; civil engineering, 16th; mechanical engineering, 16th).

San José State is the number one supplier of education, engineering, computer science and business graduates to Silicon Valley, the world's high tech capital. The oldest and one of the largest universities in the 23-campus California State University (CSU) system, SJSU attracts students from throughout California, the United States and 100 countries of the world.

Located in the nation's 10th and California's third largest city, San José State had a fall 2005 enrollment of 29,975 students. Approximately 75 percent of the students were undergraduates; 25 percent were graduate students. Almost 59 percent of the student population had an ethnic affiliation. More than 100 different languages are spoken on campus.

Founded in 1857, SJSU is the oldest public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its beginnings as a normal school to train teachers, the campus has matured into a comprehensive university offering 134 bachelors' and masters' degrees.



San José State is one of the largest public-sector employers in Silicon Valley, with about 2,500 full-time employees and an annual budget of \$472 million (2005-06).

Don W. Kassing President

Don W. Kassing was appointed president of San José State University, the oldest and one of the largest universities in the 23-campus California State University system, in May 2005.

Kassing has moved the university forward in several key areas. Under his leadership, the campus is engaged in university-wide strategic planning, with the goal of making San José State University a university of choice by 2010. In February 2006, he accepted the largest single private donation to the university in its history, a \$10 million gift from alumni Donald and Sally Lucas, to create a new graduate school of business.

As president and in his former role as vice president for administration and finance, Kassing led the development, construction and successful opening of two major campus facilities: the award-winning Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Library, based on a first-of-its-kind and highly successful partnership with the city of San José; and Campus Village, a state-of-the-art residence complex for students, faculty and staff, the largest such project in the California State University system, and the focus of a renewed sense of community on campus.

Before his appointment to the presidency, Kassing had served for more than a decade as vice president for administration and finance and as chief financial officer. As CFO, he had responsibility for all business and financial affairs of the university.

His previous 18 years of experience in higher education includes service as:

- * Vice President for Development and Public Affairs - Western State College of Colorado

From 1975 to 1986 he served at Belleville Area College, in Belleville, Illinois, where he taught management and marketing, served as department chair, and for two years was president of the Granite City Campus. Before that he worked for 11 years in private industry, including eight years in corporate finance and operations management for Brown Group Inc. and three years with General Motors Corporation.

Martin Luther King, Jr., Library



The new Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library, located on the main campus of San Jose State University, opened on August 16, 2003. A first-of-its-kind collaboration between a city and a university, the \$177-million, 475,000 square-foot library provides a center for life-long learning. Students, faculty and the community have access to the information they will need for educational and personal growth throughout their lives.

Among the features of the 10-acre, 10-floor Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library on the northwest corner of the main campus are:

- 3,623 seats
- 4 computer instruction laboratories
- 1,800 seats wired for internet connections
- 37 group-project rooms
- 400 public computers
- 112 workstations available in the computer instruction labs
- 8 built-in projector screens
- 135 databases of information
- 4 pianos

The collaborative design of the new Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library provides many opportunities for academic, cultural and community programs.

Multilingual and special collections for San José's diverse ethnic groups are available. A special adaptive technology area in the library assures all people have ability to access the information and databases available.

Campus Village

In the fall of 2005, San José State University opened the doors of Campus Village to more than 2,279 students, faculty and staff. Positioned on Tenth Street between San Carlos and San Salvador on the southeast corner of the main campus, the Campus Village is a gateway to incredible academic resources and campus activities, the excitement of downtown San José, the opportunities of Silicon Valley, and some of the greatest recreational areas in the world.



The Campus Village includes three buildings featuring apartment and suite-style living accommodations and a typical college dormitory experience. Campus Village includes recreational and study areas, a full-service

computer lab, wireless internet access, an interactive gaming center, laundry facilities, meeting rooms, retail stores and underground parking for 700 vehicles. Fully equipped nearby recreational facilities offer residents space to work out, swim, play basketball, volleyball, ping-pong or pool.

Hassle-free access to the main campus is another asset to the Campus Village. Walking to the Student Union or the main entrance to The Event Center is five minutes or less. Residents can walk or bicycle to the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Library without crossing any streets.





Tom Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of intercollegiate athletics on December 20, 2004. Under his leadership, the Spartans have made significant and meaningful strides forward as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program.

As the director, Bowen has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; initiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with the creation of Spartan Sports Properties. The Spartan Foundation, the department's fund-raising component, has enjoyed its most successful two-year period generating just over \$2.0-million in personal and corporate contributions.

As an integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and many other campus extra-curricular activities. His initiatives and leadership have created new energy department-wide and throughout the university.

His vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a Student Success Services component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores as measured by the NCAA have risen dramatically under his watch. Above all, his goal for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community.

He has appointed new head coaches in football, men's basketball, men's golf, women's golf and women's swimming and diving. In 2005-06, San Jose State won the Western Athletic Conference women's golf championship, recorded its highest finish ever at a NCAA regional championship in women's gymnastics, produced seven teams out of 16 with its best conference finish in years, and had WAC "Coaches of the Year" in women's golf and softball.

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the director of community affairs and the executive director of the 49ers Foundation for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. He directed all of the team's fund-raising activities and was responsible for alumni and current player participation in the community. San Francisco was the first NFL franchise to implement an annual giving program.

His Division I experience at the college level includes athletic administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif.

As an assistant and associate director of athletics at the University of California from July 2000 through September 2002, he was responsible for all athletic fundraising. Bowen was credited with developing the first comprehensive planned giving program for the Golden Bears.

At Saint Mary's College, he was the Director of Foundations and Corporate Relations from May 1995 to January 1997 before being appointed to an associate director of athletics position by the president of the college. His grant proposal acumen helped raise \$6.1-million in academic funding for the institution. From January 1997 through April 2000, he managed the athletics department's budget, directed a corporate sponsorship program and interacted with the academic senate, faculty and university personnel on student-athlete issues.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame played high school football at Moreau High in Hayward, Calif. He majored in theology/sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

His first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987 through 1995, he held the positions of assistant football coach and athletics director.

He is a Level 2 certified member of the College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA), the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), the National Society of Fund Raising Executives and an associate member of the Indiana University School of Philanthropy.



Bowen currently is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management. A senior faculty member of the Capital Campaign Institute based in Minneapolis, Minn., from 1996 through 2002, he has been a guest lecturer at several Bay Area university campuses. Bowen continues to speak before major corporations headquartered locally on the topics of leadership, management and motivation.

The Denver, Colo., native was born on May 27, 1961. He and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children. In 2006, Andrew will be eight-years-old; Peter, four; and, daughter, McKenna, three.

Kellie Elliott is in her second year as a Senior Associate Athletics Director at San Jose State. Elliott has 21 years of diverse and comprehensive professional, amateur and collegiate sports leadership experiences. She supervises 11 Spartan sports; oversees the business and finance, student services, strength and conditioning, sports medicine, facility management and sports information programs; and serves as the Senior Woman Administrator. Elliott is the Tournament Director for the sold-out 2007 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship San Jose Regional.

She came to the Spartan staff from Stanford University where she served the university in several managerial and leadership roles. As a "Project Manager," she was directly involved with the renovation of Maples Pavilion, the home for the basketball and volleyball teams. Elliott also worked in alumni relations and as the director of football operations.

Elliott worked for two professional sports franchises – the Huntsville Flight of the National Basketball Development League (NBDL) from 2001 to 2003 as its first president and the San Jose Sharks as a guest services manager. With the Huntsville franchise, her marketing acumen generated more than \$600,000 in corporate sponsorship packages. Huntsville led the league in paid attendance averaging 6,572 fans per game, nearly double the NBDL minimum requirement of 3,500.

For the last two Olympic Games held in the United States, she was a regional operations manager for the 1996 Atlanta Summer Olympic Committee and a senior general manager for the 2002 Salt Lake City Winter Olympic Committee. Her team of workers in Atlanta was voted "Best Operational Management Team" by the senior directors of the Olympic committee. At Salt Lake City, she was responsible for operational planning and implementation at six of the 10 competition venues.

Elliott is a 1985 graduate of Stanford University who majored in communication.

Vince Otoupal joined the San Jose State University athletics staff as an Associate Athletics Director in 2005. He oversees the activities of the Spartan Foundation, the department's fund-raising arm, and serves as a sports supervisor for San Jose State baseball.

Otoupal came to San Jose State from Stanford where he worked two stints for the Cardinal, 1998-2000 and 2002-2005. He served as the director of annual giving, a major gift officer, and project manager. Otoupal served as a consultant analyzing financial trends for the University of Oregon athletics department in 2001 and 2002.

A linebacker for the Stanford football team, he was a four-year letterwinner from 1989 through 1992. He achieved the rank of captain in his five years of service for the United States Marine Corps as an infantry officer.

Otoupal graduated from Stanford in 1993, majoring in political science and organizational behavior and earned his M.B.A. from Oregon in 2002. He and his wife, Brady, reside in San Jose.

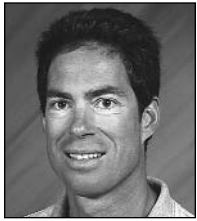

Spartan Gym

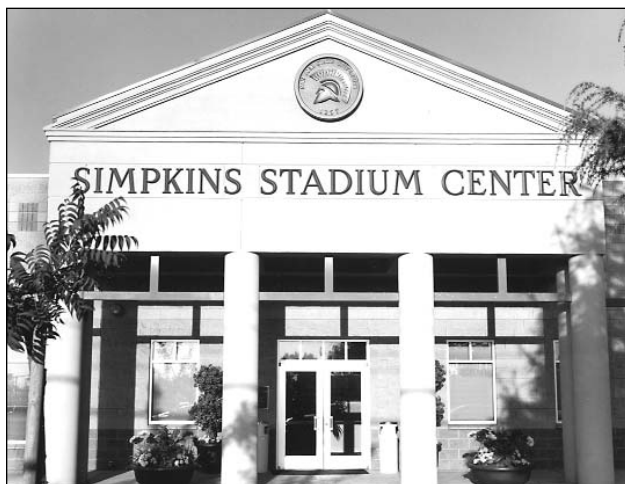


Spartan Gym is the home of the San Jose State women's volleyball and women's gymnastics teams. Seating capacity of the gym varies from 1,000-1,500 people depending on the gym setup. The gym is located on the corner of Fourth and Paseo de San Carlos Streets. Also housed in the Spartan Gym complex are two training rooms, locker rooms and an uneven bar training room for gymnastics.

During the summer of 2005, Spartan Gym underwent extensive renovations to update the facility. New paint, new ceiling, new windows and new scoreboards highlight the many changes to the facility. The locker rooms also were redone.

The Aquatics Center, across the street from The Event Center, is the home of the women's swimming and diving and water polo teams. There is plenty of pool area for recreational swimming.

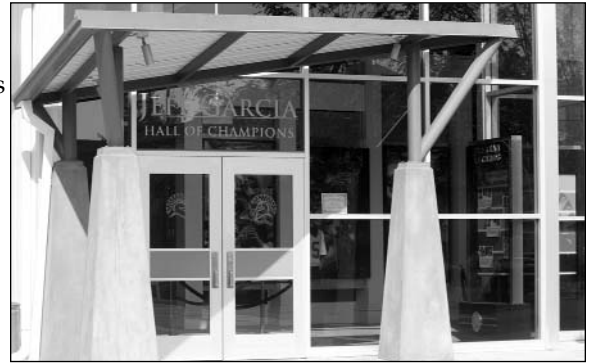

Garcia was a quarterback on the 1991, 1992 and 1993 San Jose State teams. As a sophomore, he was third nationally in passing efficiency. He led San Jose State to its first win in school history over a Big Ten Conference team, the University of Minnesota, and went on to receive honorable mention All-America recognition in 1992. The school record holder for total offense with 7,274 yards was named the "Outstanding Offensive Player" at the 1994 East-West Shrine All-Star Game in Palo Alto, Calif.

Professionally, he played five seasons (1994 through 1998) for the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League, was a four-time all-star and led the team to the 1998 Grey Cup championship. Garcia joined the San Francisco 49ers in 1999 and took the team to playoff appearances in 2001 and 2002. He was a Cleveland Brown in 2004 and a Detroit Lions in 2005 and signed with Philadelphia for 2006. Garcia earned his undergraduate degree as a business administration major from San Jose State University through the National Football League's Continuing Education Program.

She was the assistant director for learning in academic counseling and student services/intercollegiate athletics. Kato joined the Big Ten school in 1990 as the its original learning specialist for intercollegiate athletics.

The Koret Athletic Training Center

The Koret Athletic Training Center, open since November 2001, is a state-of-the-art facility that encompasses over 10,000 square-feet of training space and is located adjacent to Spartan Stadium.

The Koret Athletic Training Center also contains a 1,000-square foot rehabilitation and training room that services physical therapy and sports specific rehabilitation. The facility enables the sports medicine staff of athletic trainers, doctors, and physical therapists to provide the best possible care to help prevent and rehabilitate injuries.

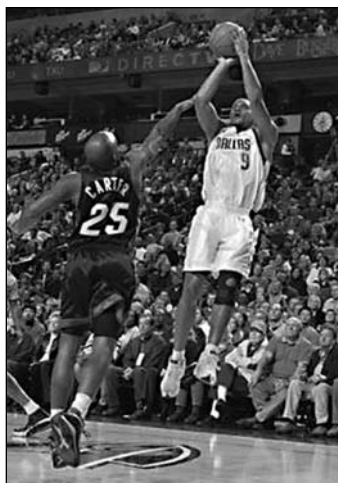

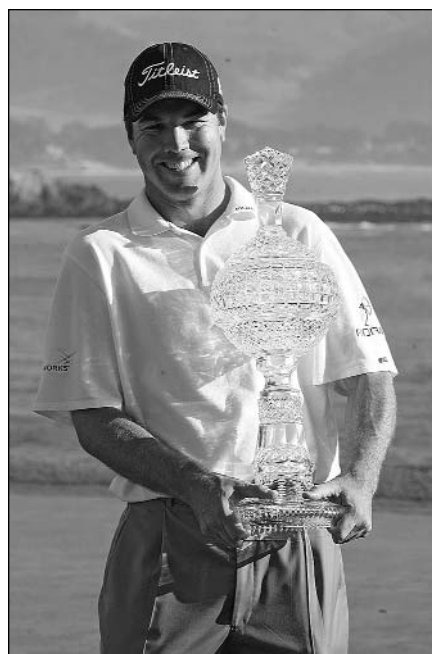

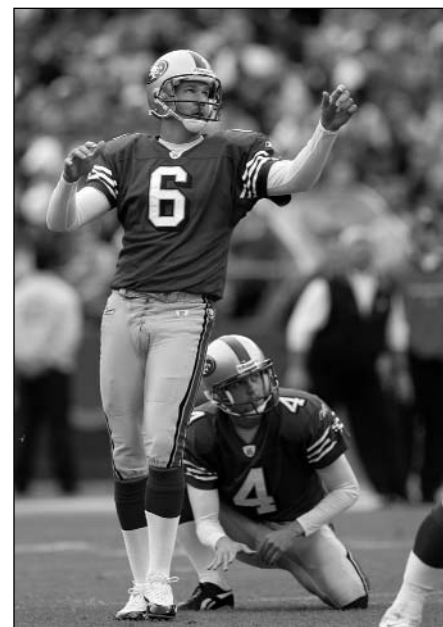

Years later, the city is now known as the "Capital of Silicon Valley" and around the globe as a high-tech center.

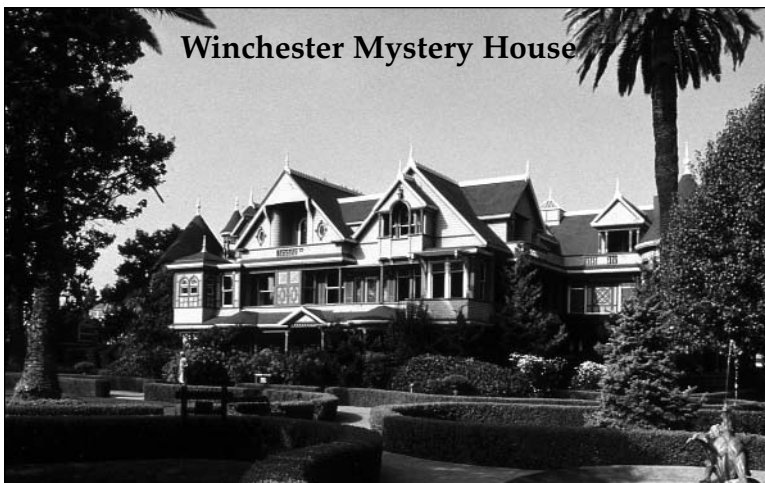

CREDENTIALS

Media credential requests for San José State volleyball home games must be sent to Amy Villa prior to the match. Passes may be picked up at the sports information office or left at the Spartan Gym ticket window.

PRESS ROW SERVICES

Pregame notes, statistics and match programs will be available prior to the start of each game on press row. Game and final statistics will be distributed from press row.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

Following a 10-minute cooling off period, post-game interviews will be held at the home bench. Head coach Craig Choate and requested Spartan players will be available at that time. A sports information representative will be available for requests.

INTERVIEWS

Interviews with San José State players and coaches must be arranged through the sports information office. Please contact Amy Villa for times and allow 24 hours prior notice for all interviews. No interviews will be allowed on game-day prior to a match. Home phone numbers for players will not be provided to the media. Players will not accept phone calls without clearance from the sports information staff.

TELEPHONES

The volleyball press row phone number is (408) 924-3348. One analog line is available for visiting radio broadcasts but notice *must be* given prior to gameday for use. Additional phone lines for radio broadcasts must be arranged at least a month in advance, and there maybe a cost for additional lines.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photographers may work from any side of the court except in front of the team benches and press row. Please be aware that you could become part of the action in Spartan Gym because of the narrow sideline and endline

areas. It is recommended that photographers shoot on the sideline opposite of the team benches.

LIVE STATS/VIDEO

All home San Jose State volleyball matches will have live statistics available on the San Jose State web site. Home matches will be streamed live on the Spartan web site through the Gold Zone.

DIRECTIONS TO SPARTAN GYM

From I-280: Take the Seventh Street exit. Head north on Seventh Street three blocks to San Salvador. Park in the Seventh Street Garage and walk one block north to Paseo de San Carlos. Take the street (which is closed to traffic) west until you reach Spartan Gym which is located at Fourth and Paseo de San Carlos.
