"If a player has a good foundation, if he loves and cares about his teammates, and if he's doing really well in school, then he will be a focused football player."




San José State University

Standards – Graduation is the expected standard for all student-athletes.






James Orth (left) is a wide receiver in his second season with the Spartans. His older brother, offensive guard Jacob Orth (right), is an offensive guard.

He is the only Spartan who is an inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

A statue commemorating their historic event is located on the university's main campus.



David Diaz-Infante (63) was a co-captain of the 1986 Spartans. After playing on two Super Bowl champion teams in a 12-season pro career, he now is an analyst for ESPN and ESPNU college football games.



Steve Clarkson was the Spartans' starting quarter-back during the 1980 through 1982 seasons. Today, he is the premier evaluator and developer of young quarterbacks nationally. He is in his second year conducting the Steve Clarkson Dreammaker Tour.





Danny Clark was a 1985 all-conference defensive lineman for the Spartans. He went on to star as Nitro in the original American Gladiators television series.



Kinji Green was a 2005 team captain and All-WAC defensive lineman. The 27-year-old is the program's only four-time Academic All-WAC honoree and is one of the youngest full-time assistant coaches in the Football Bowl Subdivision this season.

The 10-floor library features:

- 3,623 seats
- 1,800 seats wired for the internet
- 400 public computers

- 135 databases of information
- 4 computer instruction laboratories
- 112 workstations available in the computer instruction labs
 - 37 group-project rooms

The collaborative design provides many opportunities for academic, cultural and community programs. Multilingual and special collections for San Jose's diverse ethnic groups are available. An adaptive technology area assures all people have the ability to access the information and databases available.

Bowl Success

Dick Tomey is the WAC's only head coach with a winning record in bowl games. Now 5-3 in post-season bowls, he led the Spartans to a 2006 New Mexico Bowl win.





- Every element of our program is grounded in the sciences and draws on many training disciplines.


















- Speed training, resistance exercise and flexibility development are components of our program.



ike MacIntyre, the 2009
American
Football Coaches
Association Football Bowl
Subdivision Assistant
Coach of the Year was
named the 29th San Jose
State University football
coach on December 17,
2009.

The 45-year old MacIntyre is a head coach for the time in a progressively successful 20-season coaching career that includes positions in the

Football Bowl Subdivision and the National Football League.

"By hiring Mike MacInture, San Jose State University tak

"By hiring Mike MacIntyre, San Jose State University takes a tremendous step forward enhancing its football program. Mike MacIntyre was the unanimous first choice of the search team...," said San Jose State athletics director Tom Bowen upon MacIntyre's appointment. "He offered the most compelling case to build upon the great base that (former coach) Dick Tomey created in his five years. Mike's tireless energy and dynamic leadership will motivate our student-athletes to reach great heights in the classroom and on the playing field as they did under Dick Tomey."

MacIntyre spent the last two seasons at Duke as the defensive coordinator. His defensive units recorded some of the Blue Devils' best annual statistics over a 20-year span. The 2008 team allowed 356.9 yards per game, 67.4 fewer yards than the year



before, and 23.4 points per game, 9.8 fewer than the previous season. In 2009, Duke's five wins were the most in a season by the Blue Devils since 1994. Three Duke defenders received 2009 All-Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) honors – the university's largest total in a single season in several years.

Prior to joining the staff at Duke, MacIntyre spent five seasons in the NFL with the New York Jets (2007) and Dallas Cowboys (2003-06) coaching defensive backs. Working for legendary coach Bill Parcells, the Cowboys returned to the playoffs in 2003 and again in 2006 after missing out on post-season competition during the 2000 through 2002 seasons.

MacIntyre has coached on both sides of the ball, spending four years at Ole Miss (1999-2002) where he started as the wide receivers coach two seasons and the defensive secondary coach in his final two years. The Rebels posted a 29-19 record with bowl appearances in the 1999 and 2002 Independence Bowls and the 2000 Music City Bowl. The 2001 Rebels ranked fifth nationally in pass defense, allowing just 161.3 yards per game.



Along his coaching trail, he has mentored many current NFL players including current Cincinnati Bengals safety Roy Williams, the eighth overall selection in the 2002 draft. Williams was selected to the Pro Bowl each of the four seasons MacIntyre coached him in Dallas. MacIntyre was instrumental in recruiting current San Francisco 49ers All-Pro linebacker Patrick Willis to Mississippi.

His coaching career began as a two-year graduate assistant at the University of Georgia (1990-91). He then worked one year as the defensive coordinator at Davidson (1992), four at Tennessee Martin (1993-96), and two at Temple (1997-98).

A 1989 graduate of Georgia Tech, he played two seasons (1987-88) at free safety and punt returner for head coach Bobby Ross. Prior to becoming a Yellow Jacket, MacIntyre played two seasons (1984-85) at Vanderbilt for his father, George MacIntyre, the head coach of the Commodores from 1979-85.

MacIntyre earned a bachelor's degree in business management at Georgia Tech and then earned a master's degree in education with an emphasis on sports management from Georgia in 1991.

Born on March 14, 1965, in Miami, Fla., he and his wife, Trisha, have three children, Jennifer, a freshman at Baylor University, Jay Michael and Jonston.

ent Baer is in his third season on the San Jose State University football staff. After two seasons as the linebackers coach, he adds the duties of defensive coordinator in 2010. In his first two seasons with the Spartans, Baer's teachings produced a two-time second-team All-WAC selection in Justin Cole and Travis Jones, the team's top tackler in 2008.



In a noteworthy coaching career, he has been a defensive coordinator at six Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) universities and participated in eight bowl games and the 1986 NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. He was the interim head coach of the University of Notre Dame for the 2004 Insight Bowl. Three teams - Notre Dame in 2002 (17th), California in 1991 (8th) and Idaho in 1986 (16th) finished a season ranked in the Top-20 by the Associated Press.

As a defensive coordinator, Baer molded outstanding groups that excelled in stopping the run. At Notre Dame in 2004, the Fighting Irish yielded just five rushing touchdowns and was third nationally in rushing defense. The 2002 Notre Dame team was nationally ranked in scoring defense (9th), pass efficiency defense (10th), rushing defense (10th), and total defense (13th). Baer was recognized for the Irish's accomplishments that season as a finalist for the Frank Broyles Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding assistant coach. Arizona State ranked seventh nationally in total defense in 1992.

Among a select group of coaches to work at the three Bay Area FBS schools, he was at Stanford for four bowl games including the 2000 Rose Bowl during his seven seasons on the staff. The 2001 Cardinal led the Pac-10 in rushing defense - just the second Stanford unit to top the conference in that category. California won 17 of 23 games in his final two seasons there.

The last 24 years, he has coached and coordinated the New Era Bowl in Japan. The game annually integrates top Japanese college players with selected American players and coaches.

Baer was a standout linebacker at Utah State during the 1969 through 1972 seasons. He set a school record for total tackles, 116, a record that stood for 10 years. Baer graduated from Utah State in 1973 as a physical education and recreation major.

He has three adult sons – Brian, Aaron James (A.J.), and Steven Blake. Baer also has three grandchildren through his son, Brian, and wife Kristen - girls, Alex and Isabella, and a boy, Max.

Brennan is in his sixth year with the Spartans coaching staff. In 2010, he will serve as the wide receivers coach. co-offensive coordinator, coach the offensive tackles and tight ends and head up the Spartans' special teams.

Brennan has served the Spartans in many capacities - all at a very high level. As a wide receivers coach, he was directly responsible for the development of NFL draft choices James Jones and John Broussard and free agents Kevin Jurovich and Rufus Skillern, who played three seasons professionally.

When he was the special teams coordinator, the 2008 Spartans were 20th nationally in kickoff returns and the 2007 team was ninth in punt returns.

Brennan's track record of attracting and nurturing high-caliber players who attract attention from pro teams extends beyond San Jose State. At Cal Poly, Brennan coached current New York Giants wide receiver Ramses Barden and Adam Herzing who spent time with Indianapolis, San Francisco and the Rhein Fire of NFL Europa. Brennan also coached Tampa Bay tight end Jerramy Stevens at the University of Washington.

Brennan joined the Spartans in January 2005, after being named San Diego State's quarterbacks coach. From 2001 through 2004, he was the receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Cal Poly.

The Redwood City, Calif., native began his college coaching as a graduate assistant in 1998 at Hawai'i. He also worked in the same capacity at Washington in 1999 and Arizona in 2000.

The 1996 graduate of UCLA was a wide receiver for the 1991 through 1995 teams and lettered on the Bruins' 1993 Rose Bowl squad.



John DeFilippo Quarterbacks Coach





fter spending the last five seasons with National Football League teams working with high-profile, young quarterbacks, John DeFilippo joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in April 2010 as the quarterbacks coach.

DeFilippo came to the Spartans from the New York Jets where he was the assistant quarterbacks coach. There, he worked with first-year quarterback

Mark Sanchez who took the Jets to the American Football Conference playoffs for the first time since 2006 and all the way to the conference championship game.

DeFilippo's NFL coaching career began in 2005 with the New York Giants as the offensive quality control coach. The Giants made the playoffs in each of his two seasons with the organization and Eli Manning as its quarterback.

In between working for the New York teams, DeFilippo was the Oakland Raiders' quarterbacks coach in 2007 and 2008. Daunte Culpepper, Josh McCown and JaMarcus Russell were among the quarterbacks he coached there.

DeFilippo began his coaching career in 2000 as the Fordham University quarterbacks coach. He also served as the graduate assistant coach at the University of Notre Dame in 2001 and 2002 and was the quarterbacks coach at Columbia University during the 2003 and 2004 seasons.

The 2000 graduate of James Madison University majored in speech communication. He played quarterback, earned four varsity letters for the Dukes and was a member of the James Madison team that won the 1999 Atlantic-10 Conference championship. As an undergraduate, he completed training camp coaching internships with the Carolina Panthers in 1997 and the Indianapolis Colts in 1998.

inji Green is in his fifth season as a member of the San Jose State University football coaching staff. In 2010, he will be the cornerbacks coach.

During his first two seasons as a full-time assistant coach, Green coached the defensive ends. Carl Ihenacho was a two-time second-team All-WAC player. Jeff Schweiger and

Justin Cole, two more defensive ends, signed free agent contracts with Denver (2009) and Kansas City (2010), respectively.



Tim Landis Offensive Coordinator/ Tight Ends Coach



fter serving as a head coach at three Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) schools for the last 17 seasons, Tim Landis joined the San Jose State University coaching staff in January 2010. In his first season with the Spartans, he will serve as the offensive coordinator and coach the tight ends.

As a head coach, Landis could be termed a turnaround specialist. He had 10 seasons of .500 or better win-loss records. Six times between 2000 and 2006, his teams were ranked nationally in the top-10 for rushing offense in the FCS.

Landis comes to San Jose State from Bucknell University where he was the head coach from 2003 through 2009. His arrival followed the untimely death of his predecessor, Tom Gadd, who went to Bucknell in 1995 after two seasons as San Jose State's defensive coordinator. The Bison finished with a .500 or better three times and compiled a 32-46 win-loss record.

His first head coaching position came at Davidson College starting in 1993 where he was one of the youngest Division I head coaches at age 29. The 1998 and 1999 seasons were his best. Davidson had never won eight football games in a single season and the Wildcats did it twice, first, in 1998, and again in 1999. In four of his seven seasons, Davidson had .500 or better winning percentages. His coaching record at Davidson was 35-36-1.

At Saint Mary's College, Landis reversed a Gaels program that won just four times in two years. He strung together three win-loss records of .500 or better from 2000 through 2002. With a 6-5 record in 2001 and 6-6 in 2002, he was named the Division I-AA Independent Coach of the Year.

His overall major college head coaching record is 85-98-1. The 1986 graduate of Randolph-Macon College majored in English and was an accomplished two-sport student-athlete. Landis was a first-team All-Old Dominion Athletic Conference quarterback in football and pitcher in baseball. As a senior, he was the school's recipient of the Compton Award recognizing excellence in athletics and academics. In 2000, Landis was inducted into the Randolph-Macon Athletic Hall of Fame.

His first coaching position was in 1986 as Randolph-Macon's wide receivers coach. Three seasons coaching high school football and baseball in the suburban Philadelphia area preceded his return to college football when he was hired as an assistant football coach at Davidson in 1991.

A member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), Landis is a former chair of the FCS All-America Selection Committee and a member of the Board of Directors Executive Committee.

Landis and his wife, Karen, have three sons, T.J., Jack and Charlie, and a daughter, Jordan.

Terry Malley Running Backs Coach/ Recruiting Coordinator





erry Malley is in his second on the San Jose State coaching staff. In 2010, he is coaching the running backs and serving as the program's recruiting coordinator. Last season, he was the assistant head coach for offense and coached the quarterbacks.

Malley came to the Spartans in 2009 after spending 14 seasons with the San Jose SaberCats where he was regarded as one of the keenest offensive minds in Arena Football League history. In his

nine seasons as the team's offensive coordinator, San Jose won three Arena Football League championships, led the league in scoring four times and was second four other seasons. The 2007 San Jose team scored 1,012 points and averaged 63.2 points a game - the third highest scoring team in league history.

With 31 years of coaching experience, Malley's coaching roots are in the Bay Area. Two-year stints at San Jose's Leland High (1976-77) and Moreau High in Hayward (1978-79) preceded five seasons (1980-84) as an assistant coach for legendary coach Pat Malley, his dad, at Santa Clara University, his alma mater. Terry was named head coach in 1985 and led the Broncos to a 47-39-1 win-loss record over eight seasons. Six of his eight teams were nationally-ranked among NCAA Division II schools.

Malley coached 27 all-conference players including longtime National Football League pros Brent Jones, a standout tight end for the San Francisco 49ers, and two-time Pro Bowl punter Bryan Barker. He was the Western Football Conference Coach of the Year in his first season directing Santa Clara to an 8-2-1 record and a conference championship.

His first experience in professional football came in 1994 when he was named the Director of Football Operations for the SaberCats, an Arena Football League expansion franchise. Malley added the duties of General Manager in 1995. In 1999, he returned to the field as the offensive coordinator after a mid-season coaching change and retained his general manager responsibilities through 2006.

As a player, Malley was a quarterback, team captain and four-year letterwinner for Santa Clara during the 1972 through 1975 seasons. The 1976 Santa Clara University graduate majored in business management. He and his wife, Leslie, have three children - Christina and sons, Patrick and Ryan.

Bryant Young Defensive Line Coach



Regarded as one of the National Football League's premier defensive tackles of the current generation, Bryant Young joined the San Jose State University football staff in January 2010. In his first season as a full-time college football assistant, he will be the Spartans' defensive line coach.

Young comes to San Jose State after serving as the defensive graduate assistant at the University of Notre Dame during the 2009 season.

His professional football career, solely with the San Francisco 49ers, was one of sustained excellence from the 1994 through 2007 seasons. He was the seventh overall selection by San Francisco in the 1994 NFL draft. A starter from his first season to last, 208 games total, he was the 1994 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year as San Francisco became the first NFL franchise to win five Super Bowls in January 1995. During his career, San Francisco won four NFC West Division championships and qualified for the playoffs seven times.

In 1998, devastating fractures to his tibia and fibula the 12th week of the season ended a highly productive year in which he was leading all NFL defensive tackles in quarterback sacks at the time of the injury. Young returned to the 49ers the following season playing at a Pro Bowl level and earned the NFL Comeback Player of the Year for 1999.

Young was a four-time (1996, 1999, 2001 and 2002) NFL Pro Bowl selection. For his exemplary and consistent play, he was one of four defensive tackles named to the NFL's 1990's All-Decade Team.

His immeasurable value to the 49ers transcended the playing field. Eight times, he was the team's recipient of the Len Eshmont Award voted annually by the players for the 49er who best exemplifies courage and leadership. In the 53 years of the Eshmont Award, no other 49er has won the award more than twice or as many as four years in a row. Young was the recipient in 1996, 1998 through 2000 and 2004 through 2007.

As a college star at Notre Dame, the Chicago Heights, Ill., native was a four-year letterwinner from 1990 through 1993. He was a 1993 first-team All-America selection and team captain. Each of his four seasons, he played in a bowl game.

The 1994 Notre Dame graduate majored in marketing. With his wife, Kristin, also a 1994 University of Notre Dame graduate, they founded the Young Dreams Foundation that is currently funding the Dream Team scholarship program for local high school students who have college aspirations under the umbrella of the San Francisco 49ers Academy. They are the parents of four children – Kai, Colby, Kennedy and Bryce.

hris Holder was named San Jose State University's Director of Strength and Conditioning in April 2007. A staff member since January 2006, he originally joined the Spartans' athletics staff as the director of football strength and conditioning. His impact was noticeable in the team's 2006 New Mexico Bowl-winning season. The highly-conditioned Spartans shut out five opponents after halftime and recorded four comeback victories in 2006.



Holder came to San Jose State after four football seasons (2002-05) at Cal Poly as the strength and conditioning head coach. He and his two-person staff designed and implemented the strength and conditioning programs for the 500-member student-athlete population. The progress was most notable in football. Cal Poly produced three consecutive winning seasons in football (2003-05) for

the first time in 25 years and advanced to the second round of the 2005 NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. Six Mustang football players were named to 2005 Division I-AA All-American teams.



Season Outlook

ollowing an emphasis on the game's basics, establishing a new level of conditioning and much position experiementation during 2010 spring practice, San Jose State University embarks on its next chapter of major college football led by new head coach **Mike MacIntyre**.

In his debut as a head coach at any level, MacIntyre inherits a team with 39 returning letterwinners, 14 of them starters from the 2009 Spartans that finished with a 2-10 overall win-loss record and a 1-7 mark in Western Athletic Conference action. A corps of 19 redshirts and a promising recruiting class look to make their mark and turn the program's fortunes in a positive manner.

"I'm really excited about watching the whole team come together. We have a group of young men on a mission. We're playing the ninth hardest schedule in America. These young men know it. We're excited about taking the challenge," says MacIntyre. "So, I'm looking forward to seeing us grow as a team every week as the year goes on."

"We're going to have good mixture of young guys and older guys. We're still going to be primarily a young football team. There's going to be a learning curve in the beginning as our young men improve."

Competition for playing time and starting roles should be fierce when preseason drills commence in August. Many positions remain up for grabs especially since the Spartan coaching staff looked at nearly every player in spring practice as a potential contributor on offense and defense.

"We moved a lot of guys around (in the spring). Now, they've got to get down to the fundamentals of where they are going to play. Our two-way players (we've identified) must utilize their strengths at both positions," says MacIntyre who has specialized roles in mind for a two-way player's secondary position.

"The other thing we have to hone in on (in preseason camp) is our special teams. We have to get a core of special teams players. We did quite a bit of that

in the spring. Now, that I know who the starters kind of are, I've got to get a core of special teams guys that can take our special teams and run with it. "

OFFENSE

A balanced attack is at the root of San Jose State's offensive philosophy. For the Spartans, a necessary staple is an effective ground game. San Jose State last averaged over 4.0 yards per carry in 2006 - the most recent season the program finished with a winning record and participated in a bowl game.

Offensive Line

Quessenberry (6-6, 290, SO, 1V) is the only other lineman with any major college action. Any number of the five returning redshirts and four incoming freshmen can work their way quickly up the depth chart and earn playing time.

There are a number of big back hopefuls, all-around backs that are capable pass receivers, big-play threats and grinders who look to churn out a repetition of first downs.

Lamon Muldrow (5-9, 210, SR, 1V) topped the 2009 team with 592 yards, a disappointing total to him, and a 4.5 yards per carry average. Brandon Rutley (5-10, 195, JR, 2V) seeks to show more of the form he displayed in 2008 when he was the team's number-two rusher and a meaningful multi-purpose threat. With an interest to use some two-back sets, Wade O'Neill (6-1, 225, SO, 1V), a 2009 redshirt, from linebacker to a running back role and tops the opening fall depth chart at one of the backfield positions. Ina Liaina (6-1, 225, SO, 1V) was used as a power back runner in 2008 and also is coming off a redshirt season.

Whoever is under center will have a young pass receiving corps of wide receivers and tight ends. Jalal Beauchman (6-4, 225, SR, 3V) and Josh Harrison (5-11, 183, JR, 2V) each caught 35 passes a year ago and are the top returning pass catchers. Devin Newsome (5-10, 185, SR, 3V) and James Orth (6-2, 190, SO, 1V), two defensive backs in 2009, now are wide receivers. Five incoming freshmen and three returning redshirts all have a chance to become part of the playing rotation at wide receiver.

Ryan Otten (6-5, 230, SR, 3V), who had 10 receptions in 2009, stood out at tight end in the spring, particularly with his two touchdown grabs in the 2010 Spring Game. Going into preseason camp, he tops a group of seven hopefuls. Five of the seven could find themselves at another position as the Spartans develop their position depth throughout the roster.

As a unit, the entire offense seeks more productivity in all areas compared to a year ago. An increase in meaningful output can go a long way to making the San Jose State defense have a much better season in 2010.

DEFENSE

Quite simply, the defense intends to be better in every phase of play. The majority of playing experience is in the backfield, but there is a viable core to build on in the defensive line and at linebacker.

The Spartans return three of their six busiest tacklers and their co-leader in sacks from the 2009 team. Safety Duke Ihenacho (6-1, 210, SR, 3V) is a two-time, first-team All-Western Athletic Conference player. As a safety in 2009, his 89 tackles were second best on the team. Linebacker Pompey Festejo (6-0, 215, SR, 3V) earned a starting role early in the season and was right behind Ihenacho with 83 tackles. Festejo tops the opening fall depth chart at middle linebacker in the Spartans' new defensive scheme.

Defensive linemen Pablo Garcia (6-2, 290, JR, 2V), who shared the team lead with 4.0 quarterback sacks, and Travis Johnson (6-3, 235, SO, 1V), who started the final four 2009 games at a defensive end position, return for 2010. The Spartans are counting on Mohamed Marah (6-0, 245, SR, 2V) playing a key role. Marah started as an end in the 2009 season opener, picked up a quarterback sack against #4-USC, was injured in the game and missed the remainder of the season.

End Joe Nigos (6-2, 260, JR, 1V) has starting experience from a year ago. It's possible Ailao Eliapo and Ray Rodriguez (6-1, 265, SO, 1V), a two-way player in 2009, will be part of the defensive line group.

With a real need for players and depth in the defensive line, the Spartans signed eight prospects, two of which are possible multi-positional players. Ja'Rodd Watson (6-2, 275, JR, JC) was the only one of the eight making an impression in spring practice. The coaching staff expects the other seven to report when pre-season drills commence.


THE SEASON AHEAD

San Jose State is one of six Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) teams playing 13 regular-season games in 2010. For the second time in school history and first since 2000, the Spartans open a season against a pre-season #1-ranked team when they travel to defending national champion Alabama. By the end of September, San Jose State will face Wisconsin and Utah, two more 10-win teams from 2009, on the road.

In all, the Spartans play two teams, Alabama and Boise State, that went undefeated in 2009, and five more squads (Wisconsin, Utah, Nevada, Fresno State, and Idaho) that played in a bowl game a year ago.


There were six lead changes and neither team led by more than eight points.



Western Athletic Conference

In its nearly 50year existence, the Western Athletic Conference continues to evolve and feature some of the nation's best intercollegiate competition. One thing that remains unchanged is the persistent nature of the nine schools in the WAC to advance

their programs to contend at the top levels of the NCAA.

The WAC provides its student-athletes the chance to travel to scenic destinations and gain exposure in some of the nation's most diverse markets. In addition, the WAC's student-athletes work to achieve the highest levels of academic success at their respective institutions.

The WAC has experienced tremendous

success. Since 2001, the WAC has sent 31 teams to bowl games. The conference has sent teams to BCS bowl games in three of the last four seasons.



The WAC has sent at least two teams to the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament in 24 of the past 27 seasons. Every current WAC school has competed in the NCAA Tournament since 1990. In baseball, the WAC boasts two national champions in the past seven years.

In 2001, the WAC partnered with ESPN for coverage of football and basketball giving the conference national exposure. An extension was signed in 2008 that guarantees over 300 regular season WAC contests and 45 championship events will be aired on the ESPN networks through 2017. The WAC officially added WAC.tv in 2006 to give fans streaming internet access to many of its postseason championships.

The WAC is the sixth oldest among the nation's 11 Division I-A conferences. Its history traces back to July 27, 1962, when the original six-team league of Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming began competition.

The first championship was held in November 1962, when Arizona won the men's cross country title. New Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona finished second in the NCAA College World Series and, less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series. Fresno State was the last WAC school to earn an NCAA team title when it won the College World Series in 2008.

Since 1962, changes have occurred. UTEP and Colorado State became members in September 1967. Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978. The WAC then added San Diego State (1978), Hawai'i (1979) and Air Force (1980). Before 1990, the WAC sponsored championships only in men's sports. However, a merger with the High Country Athletic Conference formed a single conference under one administrative structure, and the 1990-91 athletic year was the first in which both men and

> women competed under the WAC name.

Fresno State was added in 1992, and then in 1996, the women's programs from

Air Force and Hawai'i along with six new schools (UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa) came into the WAC. Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, UNLV, New Mexico, San Diego State, Utah and Wyoming withdrew on June 30, 1999. Nevada (2000), Boise State (2001) and Louisiana Tech (2001) were added. TCU withdrew following the 2000-01 season. The current membership was established on July 1, 2005, when Idaho, New Mexico State and Utah State joined the WAC after Rice, SMU, UTEP and Tulsa withdrew.

Presently, the WAC crowns team and individual champions in 19 sports - eight men's and 11 women's. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field. Championships for women are held in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and volleyball.



San Jose State was scheduled to play two games in Hawaii to end the 1941 season. The Spartans were in Honolulu when the attack on Pearl Harbor occurred on December 7, 1941. Many players immediately joined the local police force or the armed services. The games against the University of Hawai'i on December 13 and Willamette College of Oregon on December 16 were cancelled.

Spartan Stadium



The San Jose State University football team has played its home games in Spartan Stadium since 1933. The Spartans won the first football game played in the stadium, 44-0, over San Francisco State, on October 7. Since then, the Spartans have played 354 games over 74 seasons. The team's 100th win in the stadium came on October 21, 1967, against New Mexico, 52-14. The 200th victory occurred in 2005. SJSU's home field record is 217-120-17 entering the 2010 season.

Spartan Stadium currently seats 30,456 for football. Every seat puts the spectator either close to or right on top of the action. Two stadium expansions and renovations in the 1980's increased the seating capacity from 18,000 to over 30,000.

A FieldTurf surface replaced natural grass in 2009. Replacement began in December 2008 and installation was completed in May 2009.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, religious convocations, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.

Five Silicon Valley Football Classics were held in Spartan Stadium. Air Force in 2000, Michigan State in 2001, Fresno State in 2002, UCLA in 2003 and Northern Illinois in 2004 were bowlgame winners. The 1999 Women's World Cup and 1999 NCAA Women's College Cup soccer events attracted record-setting crowds.

The largest attendance at a home football game was a 31,681 sellout crowd at the 2003 win over Grambling State. The game marked the first time under the current stadium configuration that San Jose State had a "sellout" prior to game day.


The largest crowd to attend any event in the stadium was estimated at 37,000 for a ZZ Top music concert.

San Jose State University





an Jose State University, Silicon Valley's metropolitan university, is pre-eminent in broadly educating leaders and professionals for an increasingly complex and global society.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

Graduating about 7,000

students annually, San Jose State University also provides the professional infrastructure for the region – from teachers to social workers to artists to law enforcement officers to nurses. The terms, "leaders and professionals," describe not just the types of graduates who earn their degrees at San Jose State, but also the roles they assume in their communities and in their fields of endeavor.

San Jose State University's place in history is well-established. Founded in 1857, it was the first public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its humble beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, it has matured into a master's university offering 191 bachelor's and master's degrees.

The university's 30,000 students study in eight fully-accredited colleges: Applied Sciences and the Arts, Business, Education, Engineering, Humanities and the Arts, Science, Social Sciences and Social Work. One strength of the academic program is the

broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism diverse studies. Academic strength also is seen in the university's nationally-recognized programs. Examples include the School of Music, the School of Art and Design, the School of Journalism and Mass Communications, the School of Nursing and the School of Library and Information

In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach intro-



ductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning faciliinclude computerequipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the Ames Research NASA Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.



San Jose State University also finds strength in its diversity. For many first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Students range in age from first-time freshmen to college transfers to professionals seeking additional education. Student demographics – with ethnic pluralism – provide the benefits of multiple cultures and diverse student interests and activities. From residence life to athletic teams to social clubs to co-op jobs – student activities meet the needs of this diverse student body.

"CULTURE OF CHAMPIONS"

At the core of Bowen's mission for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community. To reach that end, the Notre Dame alum has instilled a greater sense of purpose, commitment and execution from student-athletes, coaches, staff, alumni and friends. He has invested resources both in external and internal operations; enhanced the department's internet and social media presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally through the creation of Spartan Sports Properties.

Bowen has led the Spartan Foundation - the department's fund-raising component - through consistently challenging and uncertain economic conditions to unprecedented fiscal heights at the university. The Spartans have produced annual budget surpluses four straight years under his direction and have re-invested their gains back into their student-athletes and teams.

An integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created and implemented short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and other campus extracurricular activities. His initiatives and leadership foster energy university-wide. Athletics' increased visibility has coincided with major and significant donations coming to the University.

Since taking over, San Jose State has more football wins in the latest four-year period than any similar span since 1990-93. The 2006 through 2008 Spartans are the first three Spartan teams to post consecutive .500 or better records in the Western Athletic Conference football standings. The 2006 Spartans capped their finest season in many years, posting a 9-4 overall record and capturing the New Mexico Bowl championship.

Recent athletics accomplishments add to his Culture of Champions. Women's soccer and women's golf are the latest teams to win a Western Athletic Conference championship. Women's water polo is a consistent top-10 national program. Women's swimming finished 2008-09 with the longest dual meet winning streak in Division I. Women's gymnastics is entrenched as a NCAA Regional Championship qualifying team. Men's basketball, men's soccer and men's golf have produced measurable gains, particularly in conference competition.

Spartans have earned All-America honors in football, women's golf, baseball and women's water polo. San Jose State had its first women's gymnastics individual NCAA Regional champion in 2009. Twelve student-athletes were honored nationally and more than 100 at the conference level for academic achievements in 2009-10.





Tom Bowen is a widely-known and highly-effective athletics administrator. The San Jose Mercury News recognizes him regularly in its Top-25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in the Bay Area.

Bowen's vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a *Student Success Services* component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores, as measured by the NCAA, have risen steadily and strikingly under his watch and were at a then university-best in 2009 and were surpassed in the 2010 report.

He has appointed new head coaches in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's golf, women's golf, women's swimming and diving, softball, women's softball, women's cross country and women's volleyball. Since 2005, coaches in women's soccer, baseball, women's golf, water polo and softball have received conference Coach of the Year recognition.

In 2008, San Jose State was named as one of 12 Division I universities cited for Overall Excellence in Diversity in the most recent national study by Texas A&M University on behalf of the NCAA.

A VALUED PROFESSIONAL

Bowen's proven administrative and managerial record at San Jose State has resulted in meaningful national appointments in college athletics. He is one of eight Football Bowl Subdivision directors of athletics serving on the 24-member NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee. In 2009, Bowen was one of 12 named to serve as a mentor to aspiring women and ethnic minority athletics administrators in the NCAA Fellows Leadership Program. He was the Tournament Director for the 2010 NCAA Men's Basketball Division I Championship first and second rounds games played in San Jose.

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the Director of Community Affairs and the executive director of the 49ers Foundation for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. He directed all of the team's fund-raising activities and was responsible for alumni and current player participation in the community.

His Division I experience at the collegiate level includes athletics administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. As an assistant and associate director of athletics at the University of California from July 2000 through September 2002, he was responsible for athletics fund-raising. Bowen was credited with developing the first comprehensive planned giving program for the Golden Bears.

At Saint Mary's College, he was the Director of Foundations and Corporate

Relations from May 1995 to January 1997 before being appointed to an associate director of athletics position by the president of the college. From January 1997 through April 2000, he managed the athletics department's budget, directed a corporate sponsorship program and interacted with the academic senate, faculty and university personnel on student-athlete issues.

His first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987 through 1995, he held the positions of athle

held the positions of athletics director and assistant football coach.

EDUCATION & COMMUNITY

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame majored in theology/soci-

ology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

Active throughout the entire Bay Area, he has been named to the San Jose Mercury News' Top-25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in the Bay Area. He serves on the board of the San Jose Sports Authority. He is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management and at San Jose State University's Department of Kinesiology where he teaches sports management classes. Bowen is a frequent guest lecturer at several Bay Area university campuses and is a welcomed speaker before major corporations headquartered locally on the topics of leadership, management and motivation.

He is a Level 2 certified member of the College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA) and has memberships in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the National Society of Fund Raising Executives.

John Poch returned to San Jose State University in January 2009 as a Senior Associate Athletics Director/Deputy Director of Athletics. His duties include overseeing and managing the department's external relations components of fund raising and community relations and serving as the sports supervisor for baseball.

Poch served as the Tournament Director of the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Women's College Cup hosted by San Jose State University and was an assistant coach for the Spartans' women's soccer team from 1995 to 2000. Under his direction, the 1999 College Cup attracted more than 28,000 spectators for two semifinal contests and the championship match. The 14,410 in attendance for the championship game remains the top attendance figure for a Women's College Cup contest.

As a San Jose State assistant coach, he was on the ground floor of the new Spartan program. In its first five seasons, San Jose State posted a 53-44-3 overall win-loss record.

Poch is a successful youth soccer coach with United States Soccer Federation and National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) national licenses. He coached the San Jose Pioneer High School boys' teams to three Central Coast Section championships and was named the National Coach of the Year in 2001 by the NSCAA for the Youth Girls Competitive category.

From 2000 through 2008, he was the executive director of the After-School All-Stars of Greater San Jose - a program targeting at-risk youths. In his eight years, After-School All-Stars grew from a two-person staff with a \$275,000 annual operating budget to a full-time staff of 36 and 230 part-time employees and a \$3.9-million budget comprised largely of dollars raised through his fundraising acumen and direction. More than 3,000 students from 50-plus elementary and middle schools in San Jose benefited annually from After-School All-Stars when he elected to return to San Jose State athletics in an executive role.

Poch presently is enrolled in the Sports Management Institute – a collaboration of the Universities of Southern California, Texas, Michigan, Notre Dame and North Carolina. The Sports Management Institute provides a specialized executive management program for sports professionals.

He is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), NAADD (National Association of Athletic Development Directors) and AFP (Association of Fundraising Professionals) and remains well-connected in San Jose. He also serves on the board of directors for After-School All-Stars.

The 2001 San Jose State University graduate majored in kinesiology. As a student-athlete, he played football at West Valley College before enrolling at San Jose State.

arie Tuite joined the San Jose State University athletics administrative team in an executive capacity in June 2010 as the Senior Associate Athletics Director/Chief Operating Officer.

At San Jose State, Tuite will oversee all of the Spartans' internal components and affairs. She will manage the daily operations of the department, have direct supervision of student services and serve as sports supervisor for women's basketball.

Her professional career includes executive positions at Pacific-10 Conference universities and the NCAA. She comes to the Spartans from Seattle University where she was a Special Assistant to the Athletics Director. Tuite assisted Seattle University's recent transition to NCAA Division I athletics status and provided administrative leadership to the Redhawks' men's basketball program successfully negotiating a facility lease of the 17,000-seat Key Arena and a local radio contract with an ESPN broadcast affiliate.


