

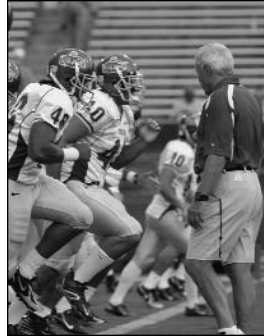

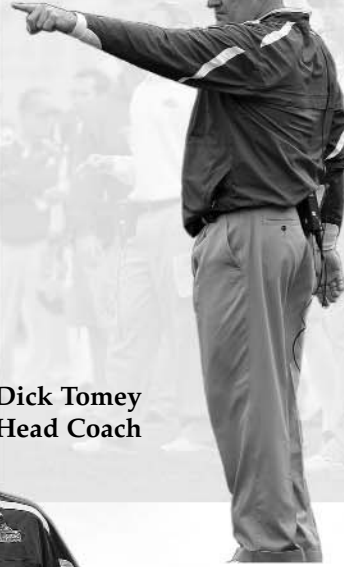

## Dick Tomey Head Coach



One of the most respected and accomplished men in college football, Dick Tomey enters his fourth season as the head coach of the San Jose State Spartans. Named the 26th head coach in school history December 29, 2004, Tomey resurrected the Spartans football program with the support and vision of athletics director Tom Bowen.

In his first three seasons, San Jose State has a bowl title, the 2006 New Mexico Bowl, and 17 wins – more victories than any three-season span at the university since 1990 through 1992. He has infused a successful home-field culture into the Spartans with 12 wins in their last 14 games. Among the seven FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision/I-A) schools in California, only the University of Southern California is better for the same number of games.



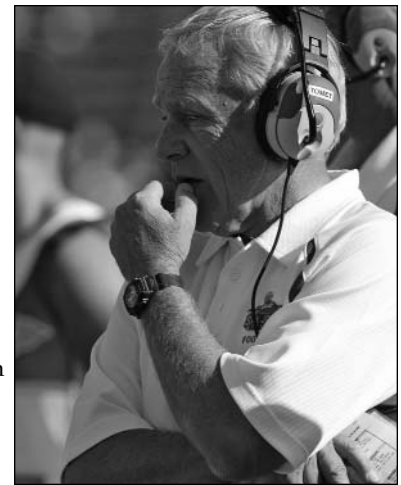
Leading the program steadily and progressively with a stabilizing influence, Tomey, under contract through 2010, has turned San Jose State into a Western Athletic Conference championship contender. The 2006 and 2007 teams are the first two at San Jose State to post back-to-back conference marks of .500 or better since the university joined the WAC in 1996.

Tomey's "team first" belief paved the way for San Jose State's finest season of the 21st century in 2006. The Spartans posted a 9-4 win-loss record, its best since 1990, and snapped a 16-year bowl drought. A plus-six turnaround in the win column included victories over Stanford, San Diego State and conference rival Fresno State. The school's first winning record in six years resulted in home attendance increasing 300 percent since he took over as head coach.

With the New Mexico Bowl win, Tomey joined a select group of head coaches to reach nine victories in a season at three different NCAA FBS institutions. He enters the 2008 season as the only coach in the WAC with a winning record in bowl

games and is among the top-10 active FBS coaches for bowl victories and post-season winning percentage.

Tomey's instruction and leadership seamlessly integrates player accomplishments. Cornerback Dwight Lowery became the university's first two-time, first-team All-America selection as a member of the 2006 and 2007 American Football Coaches Association teams. Lowery, chosen in the fourth round (113th overall) of the 2008

National Football League draft by the New York Jets, is the third Spartan picked in the two most recent NFL drafts. Wide receivers James Jones and John Broussard, respectively, went in the third round to Green Bay (78th overall) and in the seventh round to Jacksonville (229th overall). Sixteen seniors have participated in post-season all-star football games since 2006, the Spartans' largest group for any three-year span.

### AMONG THE BEST

At the start of the 2008 season, his 175 career victories, all in the Football Bowl Subdivision, rank fourth among active coaches. Only Joe Paterno, Bobby Bowden and Mack Brown have more wins in FBS/Division I-A games. His overall head coaching record from his years at San Jose State University (2005-07), the University of Arizona (1987-2000) and the University of Hawai'i (1977-86) is 175-129-7. Tomey is the only head coach who ranks in the top-10 for conference coaching victories in both the WAC and the Pacific-10 Conference.

The 2008 season is his 45th year coaching football. His impact, dedication and love for the game are evident in his role as First Vice President of the 10,000-member American Football Coaches Association. His standing within the coaching profession led to USA Football selecting San Jose State University as its summer training home in preparation for the 2007 World Championship of American Football in Japan.

Tomey's presence also fostered the Spartans return to ABC-TV. This year, for the first time since 1987, San Jose State has two national television appearances in a season and both originate from Spartan Stadium – another first for the program. Additionally, he is a voting participant in the ESPN/USA Today coaches poll.

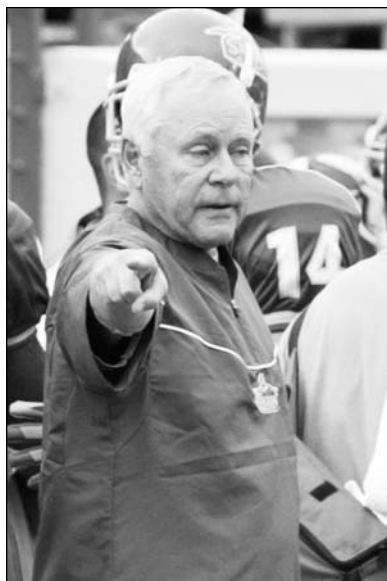

with a 95-percent year-over-year upgrade and were one of 11 teams whose defense allowed more than 100 fewer points (112) than it did in 2004. San Jose State reduced the number of times its quarterback was sacked from 29 to 14.

Before joining San Jose State, Tomey spent the 2004 season as the University of Texas assistant head coach. His enthusiasm for the game and encouragement of the Longhorn players contributed to a 2005 Rose Bowl win and carried over to Texas' national championship the following season. The Longhorns were one of the nation's top defensive units ranking in the top-30 nationally or higher in every major statistical category.

## A REVERED FIGURE IN HAWAII

His first head coaching job came at the University of Hawai'i in 1977. He remains a revered figure in the Islands and, in February 2006, he was inducted into the University of Hawaii Sports Circle of Honor.

Tomey was the first coach at Hawai'i to lead the Rainbows to an in-season national ranking when the 1981 team cracked the top-20 in both the Associated Press and United Press International polls. The 1981 Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year also produced Hawai'i's first Associated Press first-team All-America player in defensive lineman Al Noga, a 1986 selection. Home attendance, averaging 20,236 the season prior to his arrival, grew to 44,651 in his final year at Hawai'i (1986). His teams fashioned a 63-46-3 win-loss record and eight .500 or better finishes in 10 seasons.

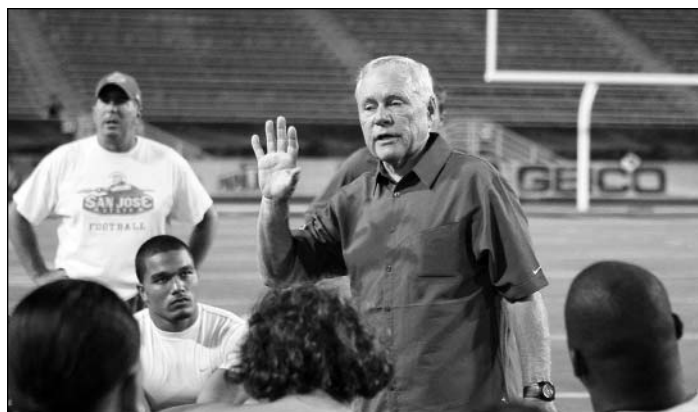

## PAC-10 SUCCESS

Moving to Arizona in 1987, his Wildcat teams were the second winningest Pacific-10 Conference program in the decade of the '90's, trailing only the University of Washington. Arizona, with just one bowl win in 85 seasons prior to his arrival, appeared in seven post-season bowls over a 14-season span and won the 1989 Copper, 1994 Fiesta, 1997 Insight.com and 1998 Culligan Holiday Bowls. The 1994 Fiesta Bowl win over then-No. 10 Miami (Fla.), 29-0, was the first shutout victory in the bowl game's history. The 1998 Culligan Holiday Bowl triumph was a 23-20 victory over then-14th-ranked Nebraska. Tomey's Wildcats were the only team to beat both Miami (Fla.) and Nebraska in bowl games in the decade of the '90's.

His 1993 and 1998 Arizona teams were the first two at the school to finish as a consensus top-10 program in the final national polls. The 1993 team that had a 10-2 record was ninth in the USA Today coaches and 10th in the Associated Press final polls. The 1998 Wildcats were fourth in both polls' final balloting. The 1989 (25th) and 1994 (20th) teams also finished the season nationally ranked.

At Arizona, the Wildcats accumulated a 95-64-4 win-loss record covering 14 seasons and his 60 Pacific-10 head coaching triumphs still ranks ninth best on the all-time conference list. In addition to his Coach of the Year honors, he was inducted into the DePauw University Hall of Fame in 1994. Tomey was a 1999 recipient of a Provost Award as the University of Arizona's 'Outstanding Teacher' – the only coach in school history to be so honored by the university faculty.

After leaving the University of Arizona, he was a broadcast analyst for University of Hawai'i football telecasts in 2001 and 2002. He returned to coaching in 2003 as a San Francisco 49ers defensive assistant coach.

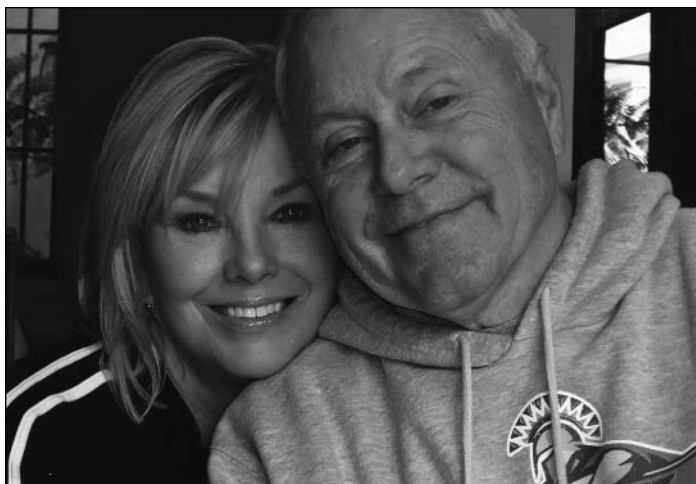

## Marcus Arroyo Co-Offensive Coordinator/ Quarterbacks Coach



**A** former starting quarterback for the Spartans, Marcus Arroyo is in his fifth season as a member of the San Jose State coaching staff, his third as quarterbacks coach and second as co-offensive coordinator. Arroyo heads into 2008 as the play-caller for the Spartans' offense – his key game-day role since 2006. Truly a rising force in college coaching circles, he is among a select group of under-30-year-old Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) coordinators or co-coordinators.

His influence and impact were evident the last three seasons in the development of record-setting quarterback Adam Tafralis. Under Arroyo's guidance, Tafralis set San Jose State career passing records for most completions, passing yardage and total offense. Tafralis set a school single-season record completing 65.9 percent of his passes in 2006 and followed up with a 62.8 percent mark in 2007 to become the university's first quarterback to complete 60 percent or more of his attempts in two different seasons. Contrast that to 2005 in which Tafralis completed 49.7 percent of his passes.

A graduate assistant in 2005 at San Jose State, Arroyo is in his sixth season of major college coaching. He entered the coaching field in 2003 as a San Jose State undergraduate assistant, and in 2004, he was the offensive coordinator at Prairie View A&M University in Prairie View, Texas.

Arroyo was a signal caller for the 1998 and the 2000 through 2002 Spartan teams. He became just the second true freshman to start a game at quarterback at San Jose State. Arroyo was a starter five times in 1998 and directed the Spartans to conference wins over New Mexico and Rice.

In 2000, Arroyo enjoyed his best statistical season passing for 2,334 yards and 15 touchdowns. The Spartans won four times on the road that season including a win over Pacific-10 Conference foe Stanford for the third consecutive year. Arroyo went on to lead the San Jose State offense to a 27-24 come-from-behind upset triumph over #9-ranked and then-unbeaten Texas Christian in front of an ESPN audience.

During his career, he led the Spartan offense to some of its highest scoring games. The most memorable may have been his NCAA record-setting performance in a 64-45 victory over the University of Nevada in 2001. Arroyo recorded a single-game passing efficiency rating of 298.02 throwing for 476 yards and five touchdowns in the triumph.

On the San Jose State career lists, Arroyo ranks ninth in passing yards (4,603), pass completions (348) and total offense (4,525 yards), and tenth in passing efficiency (115.6). He still holds the school records for single-game passing efficiency and average yards per completion.

The 2003 graduate majored in kinesiology.

## Kent Baer Linebackers Coach



**K**ent Baer joins the San Jose State University football coaching staff in 2008 as the linebackers coach. Baer adds more than 30 years of college experience to the Spartans' staff.

In a distinguished career, the new San Jose State assistant coach has been a defensive coordinator at six Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) universities, participated in eight bowl games and the 1986 NCAA Division I-AA playoffs with the University of Idaho. He was the interim head coach of the

University of Notre Dame in its 2004 Insight Bowl appearance. Three teams - Notre Dame in 2002 (17th), California in 1991 (8th) and Idaho in 1986 (16th) finished a season ranked in the Top-20 by the Associated Press.

As a defensive coordinator, Baer molded several outstanding groups that excelled in stopping the run. At Notre Dame in 2004, the Fighting Irish yielded just five rushing touchdowns and was third nationally in rushing defense. The 2002 Notre Dame team was ninth nationally in scoring defense, 10th in pass efficiency defense and rushing defense, and 13th in total defense. Baer was recognized for the Irish's accomplishments that season as a finalist for the Frank Broyles Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding assistant coach.

While at Stanford, the Cardinal played in four bowl games and made its first Rose Bowl appearance in 28 years during his seven seasons on the staff. The 2001 Cardinal led the Pac-10 Conference in rushing defense - just the second Stanford unit to top the conference in that category.

Arizona State ranked seventh nationally in total defense in 1992. California won 17 of 23 games in his final two seasons at his first Pac-10 coaching assignment.

The last 21 years, he has coached and coordinated the New Era Bowl in Japan. The game annually integrates top Japanese college players with selected American players and coaches.

Baer was a standout linebacker at Utah State during the 1969 through 1972 seasons. He established a school record for total tackles, 116, a record that stood for 10 years. Baer graduated from Utah State in 1973 as a physical education and recreation major.

He has three adult sons - Brian, Aaron James, and Steven Blake. Baer also has three grandchildren through his son, Brian, and wife Kristen - girls, Alex and Isabella, and a boy, Max.

**B**rent Brennan is in his fourth year with the Spartans coaching staff. In 2008, he will coach the San Jose State receivers corps and coordinate the special teams.

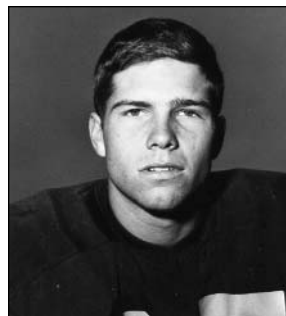

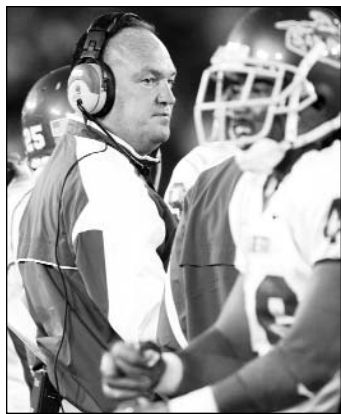

## Keith Burns Defensive Coordinator/ Defensive Backs Coach



**K**eith Burns is in his fifth season as a Spartan assistant football coach and his second as defensive coordinator. Besides managing the overall defense, Burns will coach the defensive backfield.

Burns coached the cornerbacks and directed special teams play in 2006 and 2007. He was instrumental in cornerback Dwight Lowery becoming San Jose State University's first two-time, first-team All-America player. Lowery and returning senior Christopher Owens combined for 23 interceptions in 25 games played and became just the second pair of Spartan cornerbacks to receive all-conference honors in the same season. Lowery was a first team All-WAC pick in 2007 and Owens was a second-team choice. Punter Waylon Prather and kicker Jared Strubeck earned All-WAC honors under his guidance in 2006.



Burns served the Spartan program as the defensive coordinator in 2004 and the tight ends coach and special teams coordinator in 2005.

In his 24th season as a football coach, Burns was the head coach at the University of Tulsa (2000-02). His teams formed the basis for Tulsa's 2003 Humanitarian Bowl appearance.

He has coordinated defenses at San Jose State, Arkansas, Southern California and Pacific. At Rice, he was the defensive pass coordinator and special teams coach. Burns also was the offensive coordinator in his final season at Pacific. In 1998, he was one of five finalists for the Frank Broyles Award - given annually to the nation's number-one assistant coach.

The native of Hurst, Texas, was a three-time letterwinner at the University of Arkansas (1980-82). He and his wife, Yvonne, have three sons, K.C., Tanner and Davis. Tanner is a freshman at San Jose State and a safety on the 2008 football team.

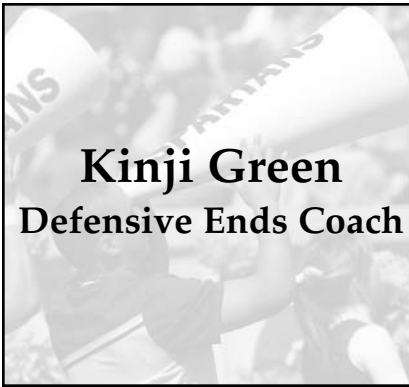

## Kinji Green Defensive Ends Coach



**K**inji Green is in his third season working with the San Jose State University football coaching staff. One of the youngest full-time coaches in the Football Bowl Subdivision at age 25, he begins his first season coaching the defensive ends.

One of two Spartan alums on the coaching staff, Green was a four-year starting defensive lineman on the San Jose State teams (2002-05). As a

senior, he was named a co-captain, the team's Most Valuable Player and was a second team All-Western Athletic Conference selection. Originally, a walk-on offensive lineman in 2001, he received the Outstanding Scout Team award as he learned the defensive tackle position during his redshirt season. In 2002, The Sporting News named him to its Western Athletic Conference (WAC) all-freshman team.

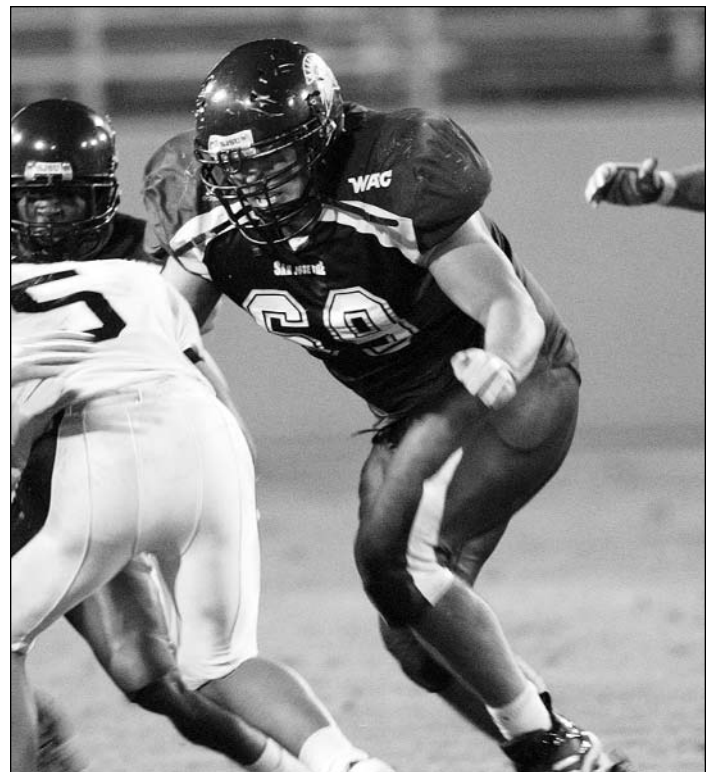

## Ken Margerum Wide Receivers Coach



**K**en Margerum, who has coached at every level of organized football, is in his fourth season as a Spartan assistant coach and his second as wide receivers coach.

The 2007 season marked the second year in a row San Jose State produced a pair of wide receivers with at least 50 receptions and 800 receiving yards. Kevin Jurovich set a school single-season record with 85 receptions for 1,183 yards and David Richmond added 55 catches for 852 yards.

In 2006, he served as the co-offensive coordinator and running backs coach. The top six backs each averaged at least 4.0 yards per carry and two-time all-conference choice Yonus Davis became the program's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2000.

Following an All-American career at Stanford, Margerum became a third-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears. He was named to the league's 1981 All-Rookie team and was a member of Chicago's Super Bowl XX championship team. Margerum finished his career playing for the San Francisco 49ers (1986-87).

Margerum joined the Spartans' staff after serving one season as the Stanford University wide receivers coach (2004). He was the wide receivers coach at the University of California (2000-01); the tight ends coach at Laney College in Oakland, Calif., (2002); and the offensive coordinator for the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe (2003). The Claymores set a NFL Europe record for most yards per game (417.3) and averaged 30.3 points per game.

The 1981 graduate of Stanford was a two-time first-team All-America, three-time first-team All-Pac-10 and an academic All-America selection. Margerum held the conference's career record for touchdown receptions (32) for 25 years. He finished his college career with 141 receptions for 2,430 yards. The two-sport star also was an outstanding high hurdler. He had a college best time of 14.3 in the 110-meter high hurdles, and was a member of the Cardinal's all-time best 4x100 meter relay team.

His wife, Joy, was an All-American in track and field at Cal State Hayward. They have two daughters, Sunny and Windy.

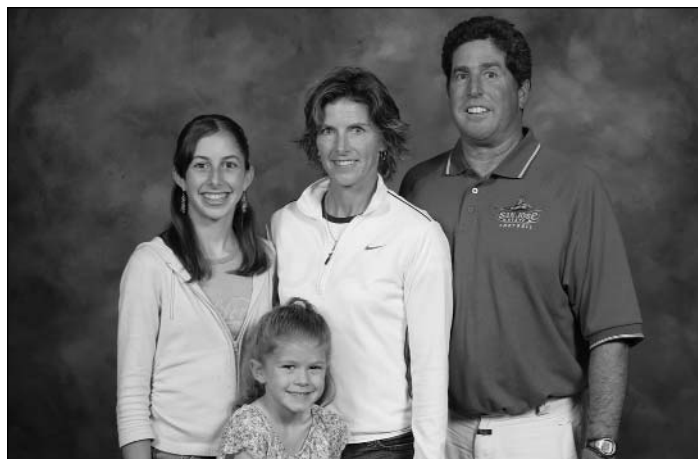

**S**teve Morton is in his fourth season at San Jose State and his 34th season coaching at the major college level. Throughout his distinguished career, Morton has coached many players who have realized success at the college level and enjoyed long NFL careers.

He returns in 2008 for his third season as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. Under his direction, the Spartans made numerous strides in total offense, points scored and, specifically, offensive line play.

Prior to his arrival, San Jose State allowed 29 sacks in 2004. The last three years, the Spartans surrendered an average of 16 sacks. Consistent blocking helped the Spartans produce their first 1,000-yard rusher since 2000. Tackles Matt Cantu (2006) and John Booker (2007) became the team's first offensive linemen since 2003 to receive all-conference recognition.



Morton began his coaching career in 1975 as a Washington State University graduate assistant. He was promoted to a full-time assistant coach at his alma mater in 1977 where he spent the next 10 seasons. Then, Morton moved to Iowa State University for five seasons (1987-91).

He returned to the Pac-10 in 1992, joining the University of Washington staff as offensive line coach. After seven seasons and five bowl appearances, he moved to the University of Southern California (1999-2000). He was at the University of Nevada (2001) before completing three seasons (2002-2004) as the Stanford University offensive line coach.

Morton has coached five Pac-10 Morris Trophy winners, signifying the conference's best lineman; four first-team All-America players, and NFL first-round draft choices Kwame Harris of Stanford and Lincoln Kennedy of Washington.

As a player, he was a center and offensive guard on the 1973 and 1974 Washington State teams. He graduated in 1977 as a physical education major.

Steve and his wife, Karen, have two adult children. Their son, Beau, lives in the Seattle area as does their daughter, Bethany, and son-in-law, Zechariah Bordon.

## Charles Nash Running Backs Coach



**C**harles Nash enters his eighth season working with the San Jose State University football team. He is in his seventh season as running backs coach for the Spartans.

In 2006, Nash served as the assistant football strength and conditioning coach. In his first five seasons at San Jose State, he coached four all-conference selections. Tyson Thompson enters 2008 in his fourth season with the Dallas Cowboys. Yonus Davis returns for his senior year with the Spartans. Deoncé Whitaker played two seasons in the Canadian Football League.

Nash joined the San Jose State staff in 2001 after coaching football and track and field and serving as a high school athletics director in the Los Angeles area. In 2000, his Inglewood High team set a state of California record rushing for 7,003 yards in 14 games. Nash also coached at Serra High in Gardena, Calif., Beverly Hills (Calif.) High and Fremont High in Beverly Hills.

The Spartan coach earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Arizona majoring in business administration. He went on to earn a master's degree in educational administration from National University.

As a wide receiver at Arizona (1974-76), he was a second-team All-Western Athletic Conference choice. The Cleveland Browns chose him in the 11th round of the 1977 NFL Draft. He played for the Browns in 1978 and the Washington Redskins in 1979.

He and his wife, Shirley, are the parents of two adult children. Charles, Jr., a graduate of Northern Arizona University, is working towards completion of his M.B.A. at NAU. Living in Tucson, Ariz., he is employed by Zimmer Holdings, Inc. Nadra, their daughter, earned a master's degree in biomedical science from Barry University in Miami Shores, Fla. She is currently employed as a toxicologist at the Broward County Medical Examiner's Office in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

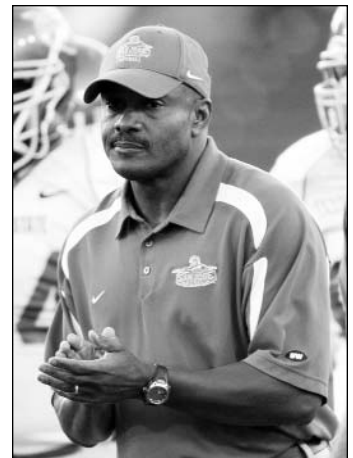

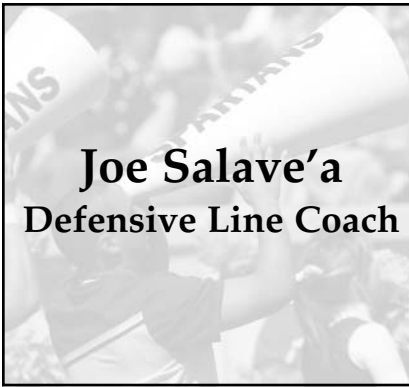

**Joe Salave'a**  
**Defensive Line Coach**



**J**oe Salave'a, one of American Samoa's foremost ambassadors promoting the game of American football, embarks on a college football coaching career with San Jose State University. He will be coaching the defensive line in 2008.

Salave'a's venture into coaching also reunites him with Dick Tomey, who recruited him to the University of Arizona in 1993. He became one of the mainstays of the Wildcats' defenses of the 1990's. An often immovable defensive tackle, Salave'a accumulated 29 tackles for loss in his last two seasons at Arizona. He was a second team All-Pacific-10 Conference

selection in 1996 and first-team choice in 1997. He was selected as a team captain and named his team's Most Valuable Player for the 1996 season. Salave'a has the unique distinction of being invited to both the East-West Shrine and Hula Bowl All-Star Games after his junior and senior seasons.

His professional football career spanned nine years (1998-2007) with four different teams and 100 games. Salave'a was a fourth pick (#107 overall) by Tennessee in 1998. He played four seasons with Tennessee and was a member of the Titans' Super Bowl XXXIV team that lost to St. Louis, 23-16. Salave'a spent the 2003 season with Baltimore and San Diego. His final three seasons were with the Washington Redskins.

He founded the Joe Salave'a Foundation in 2001. The foundation specializes in free football clinics for youngsters in American Samoa and Hawai'i. His work was recognized by Congressman Eni Faleomavaega in a 2005 White House ceremony hosted by President George W. Bush and celebrated Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month.

Salave'a is a 1997 graduate of the University of Arizona who majored in sociology. He and his wife, Josephine, have a daughter, Katalina Elizabeth, and a son, Joseph Fatuimoana, Jr.

In his first three seasons with the Spartans, McGinnis worked as an operations assistant in the areas of video services, equipment, recruiting and learned the college game from the defensive coaches.

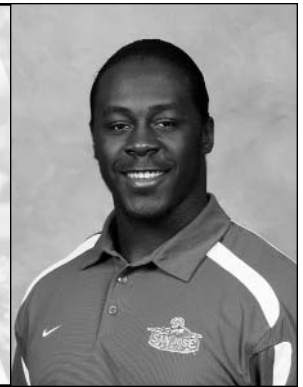

## Ezekiel Staples Graduate Assistant – Defense



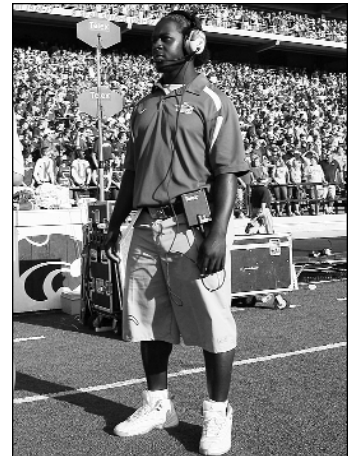

His trademarks as a player (2002-05) were his versatility and adaptability. He was a running back his first two seasons and a middle linebacker as a junior and a senior. Staples, who scored a touchdown against Washington on his first major-college rushing attempt, was the Spartans' 2002 Freshman of the Year. He was fifth on the 2003 team in pass receiving with 25 receptions.

As a linebacker, he was credited with 209 tackles and 11.0 tackles for loss in his two seasons in a starting role.

Staples, a 2005 co-captain, was second on the 2004 team in tackles and tops on the 2005 squad. His most amazing statistical performance came in the 2004 win over Rice in which he played more than 100 snaps and was credited with a game-high 24 tackles in a 70-63 victory. He concluded his career playing in the 2006 Hula Bowl All-Star Game.

The three-time academic All-Western Athletic Conference honoree is a member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). He participated in the 2008 AFCA Future Coaches Academy designed to assist recent graduates with the professional tools to pursue a coaching career. The Lynwood, Calif., native born on September 27, 1984, is a 2008 graduate and is pursuing his master's degree in kinesiology with an emphasis in sports management.





## Chris Holder

### Director of Strength & Conditioning



**C**hris Holder was named San Jose State University director of strength and conditioning in April 2007. A staff member since January 2006, he originally joined the Spartans' athletics staff as the director of football strength and conditioning. His impact was noticeable in the team's New Mexico Bowl-winning season. The highly-conditioned Spartans shut out five opponents in the second half and recorded four comeback victories in 2006. In 2007, San Jose State's fitness helped produce two fourth-quarter comeback wins.

Holder came to San Jose State after spending four football seasons (2002-05) at Cal Poly as the strength and conditioning head coach. He and his two-person staff designed and implemented the strength and conditioning programs for the 500-member Mustang student-athlete population. The progress was most notable in football. Cal Poly produced three consecutive winning seasons in football (2003-05) for the first time in 25 years and advanced to the second round



of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs in 2005. Six Mustang football players were named to 2005 Division I-AA All-American teams.

In his ninth year as a strength and conditioning coach, he began his professional career at Eastern Kentucky University in January 2000 as an intern working with the football and volleyball teams. Holder moved to Cal Poly in May 2000 as a strength and conditioning coach. He was the assistant strength and conditioning coach at Appalachian State University the first half of the 2002 calendar year before returning to Cal Poly.

The 2000 graduate of Eastern Kentucky University majored in physical education and earned a master's degree in kinesiology from Cal Poly in 2005. He was a starting center for the Colonels' 1997 and 1999 football teams. The 1997 Eastern Kentucky team was the Ohio Valley Conference champion.

Holder is certified by the National Strength and Conditioning Association and is a Russian Kettlebell certified instructor. In 2007, he was promoted to RKC-Team Leader, the second highest distinction a Russian Kettlebell certified instructor can achieve. Only 27 people in the world have reached this level of achievement. He also is certified in CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and first aid by the American Red Cross.

# Season Outlook

**S**an Jose State University seeks its second winning season in three years and an unprecedented third straight .500 or better record in Western Athletic Conference action with **Dick Tomey's** most balanced accumulation of talent since he took the Spartan reins in December 2004.

With 43 returning letter winners including 13 with starting experience from 2007, the Spartans have a core group that has realized success. In the last two seasons, 32 freshmen contributed to 14 victories, the most by any two San Jose State teams in the last 16 years. Many of those freshmen from the Spartans' 2006 New Mexico Bowl winning season are upperclassmen in 2008. Still, it's a team with just 19 seniors.

"This is a much more experienced team than we've had and there is much more experience throughout the team. We have more guys who have played. It will be much harder team for a true freshman to play on, because we have a lot more quality depth," says Tomey as he embarks on his fourth season with the Spartans. "I think we also have better incoming freshmen than we've had. It will be interesting to see how that plays out to see if some of the more capable incoming freshmen can fight their way into the lineup."

## OFFENSE

The youth movement in the 2007 offensive line carries over into this season with returning starters **Ronnie Castillo** (6-0, 292, JR, 2V), **Isaac Leatiota** (6-4, 295, SO, 1V) and **Fred Koloto** (6-3, 290, SO, 1V). None of the three started at their respective positions for the Spartans prior to 2007. Castillo anchors the line at center; Leatiota, left guard; and Koloto, left tackle. **Ailao Eliapo** (6-2, 320, SO, 1V), who moved from defense to offense for the second half of last season, is number one at right guard and can fill in at center. **Jon Moreno** (6-4, 280, JR, RS), a left tackle at the start of 2007, is at right tackle with **Bradis McGriff** (6-6, 355, SR, 1V), the only senior in the group. McGriff has seven starts in his two seasons as a Spartan. **Steve Lightsey** (6-4, 350, JR, JC), **Andres Vargas** (6-4, 280, FR, RS) and **Nathaniel Timo** (6-1, 335, JR, RS) can figure into the mix, too.

These linemen are charged with making the offense potent and effective for a new number-one quarterback with

The quarterbacks will benefit from proven pass catchers. San Jose State returns three players who each caught at least 30 passes in 2007. Second-team All-WAC

selection **Kevin Jurovich** (6-0, 183, SR, 2V) made the move from safety to wide receiver a success setting a single-season school record with 85 receptions for 1,183 yards and nine touchdowns. **David Richmond** (6-4, 200, SR, 1V) hauled in 55 passes for 852 yards and three scores in his first season at the major college level. **Jalal Beauchman** (6-4, 220, JR, 2V) had 36 receptions, a 400 percent increase over

Perhaps the most interesting competition when fall camp commences will be at the running back spots. **Dominique Hunsucker** (5-10, 194, JR, 2V), one of the Spartans' most versatile players, and **James Callier, Jr.** (6-0, 225, SR, 1V) top the opening fall depth chart. **Chris Reese** (5-9, 205, JR, 2V) spent his redshirt year adapting to a running back role after two seasons as a reserve linebacker. **Cameron Island** (5-9, 187, JR, 2V) hopes 2008 is his breakthrough season.

**Philip Knight** (6-1, 225, JR, RS) made a positive impression in the spring. **Brandon Rutley** (5-10, 195, FR, HS) is a promising threat. **Yonus Davis** (5-7, 185, SR, 3V), who rushed for 1,007 yards in 2006, but only had three carries in 2007, and **Patrick Perry** (5-10, 205, SR, 2V) both hope to flash their form of two years ago.

Our running back position with the return of **Yonus Davis**, gives us a very experienced player. We have some players who have competed very well for us, but have not been a dominant running back," states **Tomey** who prefers using a corps of backs to last an entire season. "We're going to have several running backs that we think we can win with including **Brandon Rutley**, who I think will open some eyes."

### DEFENSE

Among WAC teams, San Jose State has more starting experience in its defensive line than any of the others and hopes this group sets the standard for the rest of the defense. Three moves, potentially, can produce one of the best Spartan units in years. **Jarron Gilbert** (6-6, 280, SR, 3V), a 2007 second-team All-WAC pick, transitioned from end to tackle midway through last season. No conference player has more than **Gilbert's** 20.0 career tackles for loss heading into 2008. **Justin Cole** (6-3, 240, JR, 2V), a starting defensive end his first two seasons, is an outside linebacker still capable of playing at end in the Spartans' scheme. **Jeff Schweiger** (6-5, 276, SR, TR), a University of Southern California transfer, is in line to take **Gilbert's** spot at end.

# Season Outlook

Matt Castelo, a two-time All-WAC choice. **Duke Ihenacho** (6-1, 200, SO, 1V), Carl's younger brother and a safety in his first season with the Spartans, is opposite Cole as an outside linebacker. **Mohamed Marah** (6-0, 245, JR, 1V), originally recruited as a linebacker is back at here again after stints at defensive end and running back. **Dimitrous Chattman** (6-0, 190, Grad, 2V) is another productive player when he has seen game action.

"Travis Jones, in the spring, was a tremendous leader for our defense and our linebacker position. We can't discount Mo Marah. He's made tremendous progress so far. And, we're hoping to get Ryno Gonzalez back," says the San Jose State head coach whose team is only one of three schools to rank in the top-20 nationally in turnover margin each of the last two seasons.

The previous cornerback tandem of **Christopher Owens** (5-10, 170, SR, 3V) and Dwight Lowery contributed greatly to the takeaway total intercepting 23 passes in 25 games and earned numerous post-season honors. Lowery completed his career as the Spartans' first two-time, first-team All-America football. Owens, a 2007 second-team All-WAC choice with 12 career interceptions, gets a new running mate in **Coye Francies** (6-1, 185, SR, TR), a transfer from Oregon State.

Our top three corners are in the game to start with Devin being at free safety," Tomey states.

Community college transfers **Matt Wigley** (6-1, 230, JR, JC), a long snapper and punter **Philip Zavala** (6-1, 200, JR, JC) figure prominently in special teams play. **Shaheen Pourfallah** (5-11, 200, FR, RS) opens the fall in a battle with Zavala for the punting duties. Strubeck also did some punting in 2008 spring practice as the Spartans seek a replacement for 2006 first-team All-WAC punter Waylon Prather. **Brian Elledge**, originally recruited for his snapping skills four years ago, is competing with Wigley for the snapping responsibilities.

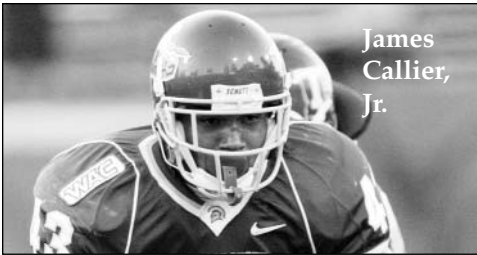

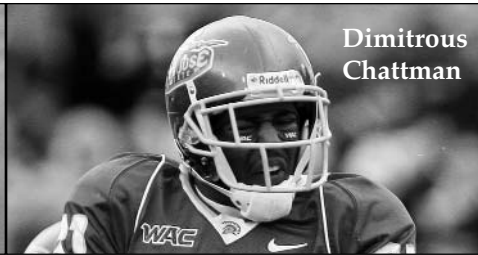
## Did You Know?

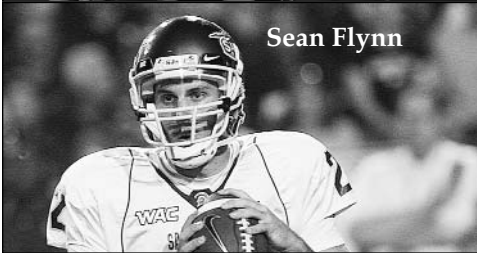

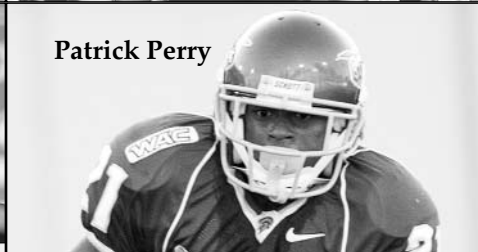

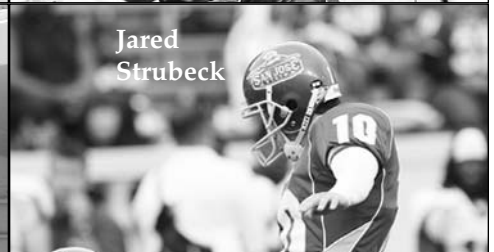

Before the Calliers, the last set of brothers to score points in a San Jose State football game was Jewerl and Ken Thomas in 1979. And, they did it twice that season.

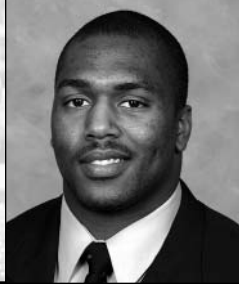

# 2007 in Review

## San Jose State at Arizona State Sun Devil Stadium, Tempe, Ariz. September 1, 2007 54,405 in attendance

**Tempe, Ariz.**----The season-opener for San Jose State and Arizona State marked the 11th time Dick Tomey and Dennis Erickson have faced each other as head coaches. Erickson, the new Sun Devils' coach, was an assistant at San Jose State from 1979-81 and added Tomey to his San Francisco 49ers staff in 2002.

Arizona State gave Erickson his sixth head-to-head win over Tomey with tailback Ryan Torain rushing for three first-half touchdowns and 123 yards total on 17 carries in a 45-3 win over San Jose State.

San Jose State's first score of the season came on a 28-yard Jared Strubeck field goal with 3:47 in the first quarter. The drive started following safety Jonathan Harris' fumble recovery. Linebacker Matt Castelo forced the fumble on tight end Ryan Miller's reception.

Arizona State controlled the football throughout the game rushing 53 times and keeping possession for 37:10. San Jose State managed just seven first downs and punted eight times against the Sun Devils.

**Manhattan, Kan.**----Kansas State (1-1) pulled away from San Jose State (0-2) with 17-fourth quarter points en route to a 34-14 non-conference victory.

For the second game in a row, the Spartans used four quarterbacks. Starter Adam Tafralis, who completed 16-of-20 for 134 yards, hooked up with wide receiver Jalal Beauchman on a 20-yard play in the second quarter to cut the deficit to 10-7. The San Jose State drive was set up by Dwight Lowery's first interception of the season. A Lowery read on a second-half Kansas State pass play helped Christopher Owens come up with his first interception in 2007.

Tafralis would see action as a wide receiver in the second half and caught three passes. The Spartans' final score in the game came on a 21-yard pass play from redshirt freshman Jordan La Secla to running back Jacob French.

Wide receiver Kevin Jurovich gave the first indication of big things the rest of the season with 10 receptions for 82 yards and two carries for 13 yards.

## San Jose State at Stanford Stanford Stadium, Stanford, Calif. September 15, 2007 36,144 in attendance

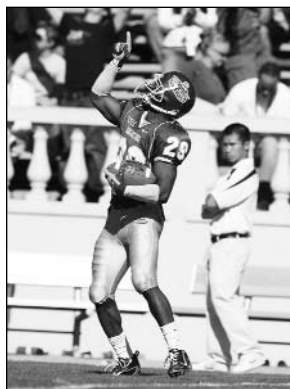

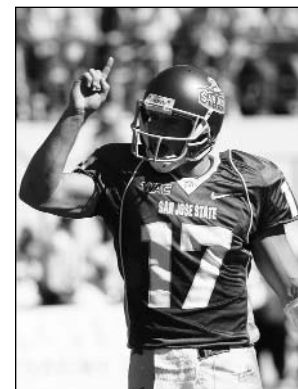
## San Jose State at Utah State Romney Stadium, Logan, Utah September 22, 2007 13,685 in attendance

Logan, Utah-----Adam Tafralis led San Jose State (1-3, 1-0 WAC) on a 6-play, 83-yard drive with less than two minutes to go as the Spartans posted a come-from-behind 23-20 win over Utah State in the Western Athletic Conference opener for both teams.

Tafralis completed 4-of-6 in the deciding possession hitting wide receivers Kyle Flynn for gains of 17 and 11 and Jalal Beauchman for 24 yards before teaming up with David Richmond on a 31-yard scoring play with 0:53 left in the game. The San Jose State signal caller threw for a career best 426 yards and three touchdowns and Richmond caught a season-high 10 passes for 180 yards and two touchdowns.

Callier's 31 carries and 93 yards, single-game career highs, would be the most by a Spartan running back in 2007. The Spartans' 134 rushing yards were the first time in 2007 the team surpassed the 100-yard plateau.

Adam Tafralis had another stellar day, eclipsing the 300-yard passing mark for a third consecutive game. He finished with 302 yards on 22-of-30 completions and two touchdowns.

The teams alternated Tino Amancio field goals with Callier short touchdown runs resulting in a San Jose State 14-6 second-quarter lead. Tafralis hooked up with Kevin Jurovich on a 33-yard scoring play and tight end Jeff Clark for another Spartan touchdown for a 28-6 fourth quarter advantage. Idaho battled back scoring touchdowns on a blocked punt and a 19-yard run by Brian Flowers.

San Jose, Calif.-----With first place in the WAC at stake, 16th-ranked Hawai'i edged San Jose State, 42-35, in an overtime thriller.

The Spartans (3-4, 2-1 WAC) overcame an early 14-0 deficit with 28 unanswered points. Dwight Lowery became the first player in 2007 to score touchdowns on a punt and interception return in the same game. An 84-yard punt runback near the end of the second quarter preceded a 24-yard interception return of a Colt Brennan pass to tie the score at 14-14. Kevin Jurovich staked the Spartans to a 28-14 lead late in the third quarter with touchdown passes of 16 and 68 yards.

Brennan constantly kept the pressure on the Spartans to negate four interceptions by completing 44-of-75 for 545 yards and four scores. His 2-yard run with 31 seconds left in the fourth quarter sent the game into overtime.

Adam Tafralis finished 27-of-47 for 302 yards, his fourth 300-plus yard passing game in a row and two touchdowns.

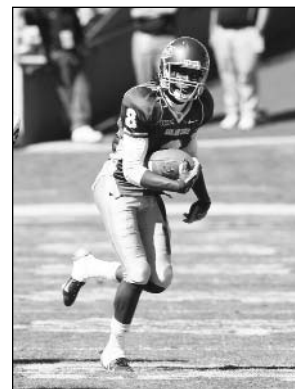
## San Jose State at Fresno State Bulldog Stadium, Fresno, Calif. October 20, 2007 35,494 in attendance

The #21-Broncos (8-1, 5-0 WAC) had two punt returns for 30 or more yards, a 51-yard kickoff return and a pair of scoring plays of more than 35 yards in the victory over the Spartans (3-6, 2-3 WAC). Boise State's big-play capability was evident in the second quarter as a 37-yard Jeremy Avery run and a 44-yard Tyler Tharp to Ryan Putnam pass gave the Broncos a 14-0 lead. Boise State then retaliated quickly scoring on Tharp's second TD pass of the quarter with 0:34 before halftime and added three second-half touchdowns.

Only four penalties were assessed in the game - all against Boise State. The Spartans

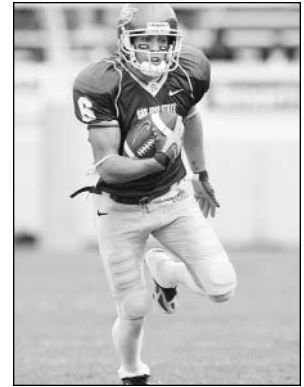
## San Jose State vs. New Mexico State Spartan Stadium, San Jose, Calif. November 10, 2007 10,452 in attendance

# 2007 in Review

In its 47th year, the Western Athletic Conference continues to evolve and features some of the nation's best intercollegiate competition. One thing that remains unchanged is the persistent nature of the nine schools in the WAC to advance their programs to contend at the top levels of the NCAA.

The WAC provides its student-athletes the chance to travel to scenic destinations and gain exposure in some of the nation's most diverse markets. In addition, the WAC's student-athletes work to achieve the highest levels of success with the academic support of their respective institutions.

The WAC has experienced tremendous success. Over the past six years, it has won 54.5 percent of its bowl games, the third best winning percentage of any conference in the nation, and has sent 22 teams to bowl games. Boise State has won 76 games since joining the conference, the most in the nation during that time span (2001-07). For the second year in a row, the WAC sent a team to a BCS bowl game as Hawai'i earned a Sugar Bowl bid following Boise State's unforgettable 2007 Fiesta Bowl victory.

The WAC has sent at least two teams to the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament in 23 of the past 25 seasons. Every current WAC school has competed in the NCAA Tournament since 1990. In baseball, the WAC boasts two national champions in the past five years.

WAC alums have made their presence felt as well. David Carr (Fresno State) was the first player selected in the 2002 NFL Draft by the Houston Texans.

In 2001, the WAC partnered with ESPN for coverage of football and basketball giving the conference national exposure. The WAC officially added WAC.tv in 2006 to give fans streaming internet

access to many of its postseason championships.

The WAC is the sixth oldest among the nation's 11 Division I-A conferences. Its history traces back to July 27, 1962, when the original six-team league of Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming began competition.

The first championship was held in November 1962, when Arizona won the men's cross country title and New Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona finished second in the NCAA College World Series and, less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series. Rice was the last WAC school to earn an NCAA team title when it won the College World Series in 2003.

Since 1962, changes have occurred. UTEP and Colorado State became members in September 1967. Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978.



The WAC then added San Diego State (1978), Hawai'i (1979) and Air Force (1980). Before 1990, the WAC sponsored champi-

onships only in men's sports. However, a merger with the High Country Athletic Conference formed a single conference under one administrative structure, and the 1990-91 athletic year was the first in which both men and women competed under the WAC name.

Fresno State was added in 1992, and then in 1996, the women's programs from Air Force and Hawai'i along with six new schools (UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa) came into the WAC. Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, UNLV, New Mexico, San Diego State, Utah and Wyoming withdrew on June 30, 1999. Nevada (2000), Boise State (2001) and Louisiana Tech (2001) were added. TCU withdrew following the 2000-01 season. The current membership was established on July 1, 2005, when Idaho, New Mexico State and Utah State joined the WAC after Rice, SMU, UTEP and Tulsa withdrew.

Presently, the WAC crowns team and individual champions in 19 sports – eight men's and 11 women's. For the men,

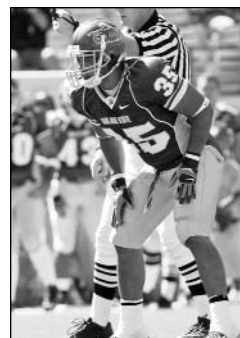

## Joe Nedney - 2008 San Jose State University Sports Hall of Fame inductee



Joe Nedney, whose San Jose State University football kick scoring records continue to stand the test of time, is a 2008 inductee into the University's Sports Hall of Fame.

Joining the Spartans in 1991, the left-footed kicker was the national leader in field goals midway through his first season and went on to receive freshman All-American recognition.

He made a name for himself in the NCAA Record Book and established himself as a clutch performer with game-winning field goals in the 1992 triumphs at Wyoming and at Utah State. His 60-yard game winner at Wyoming still has not hit the ground after 16 years.

Nedney added the punting duties as a senior in 1994. He finished his San Jose State career with 236 points – all on extra-point and field goal conversions.

His pro career spans nine NFL teams dating back to 1995 when Green Bay signed him as a free agent. Nedney enters 2008 as a San Francisco 49er. Only two Spartans have played in more games than his 136 regular-season NFL contests. His 858 points scored are the most by a San Jose State player in the NFL.

Many players immediately joined the local police force or the armed services. The games against the University of Hawai'i on December 13 and Willamette College of Oregon on December 16 were cancelled.

The San Jose State University football team has played its home games in Spartan Stadium since 1933. The Spartans won the first football game played in the stadium, 44-0, over San Francisco State, on October 7. Since then, the Spartans have played 342 games over 72 seasons in this grass-field facility. The team's 100th win in the stadium came on October 21, 1967, against New Mexico, 52-14. The 200th victory occurred in the debut of head coach Dick Tomey in 2005. SJSU's home field record is 212-113-17 entering the 2008 season.

Spartan Stadium currently seats 30,456 for football. Every seat puts the spectator either close to or right on top of the action. Two stadium expansions and renovations in the 1980's increased the seating capacity from 18,000 to over 30,000.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, religious convocations, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.



The 1999 Women's World Cup and 1999 NCAA Women's College Cup soccer events attracted record-setting crowds.

Five Silicon Valley Football Classics were held in Spartan Stadium. Air Force in 2000, Michigan State in 2001, Fresno State in 2002, UCLA in 2003 and Northern Illinois in 2004 were bowl-game winners.

The largest attendance at a home football game was a 31,681 sellout crowd

at the 2003 season-opening win over Grambling State. The game marked the first time under the current stadium configuration that San Jose State had a "sell-out" prior to game day.

The largest crowd to attend any event in the stadium was estimated at 37,000 for a ZZ Top music concert.

Idaho scored a defensive extra point when Jeff Edwards blocked a third-quarter San Jose State extra-point kick attempt and teammate Cole Snyder ran with the loose ball into the end zone during the 26-18 Spartan win on November 26, 2005.

The Spartans scored 70 points in the 70-63 win over Rice on October 2, 2004...**and by the opponent:** Fresno State scored 62 points in a 62-28 victory over San Jose State on November 27, 2004.

San Jose State and Rice combined for a NCAA-record 133 points in a 70-63 Spartan victory on October 2, 2004. There are eight times in school history in which 100 or more points were scored in a football game.

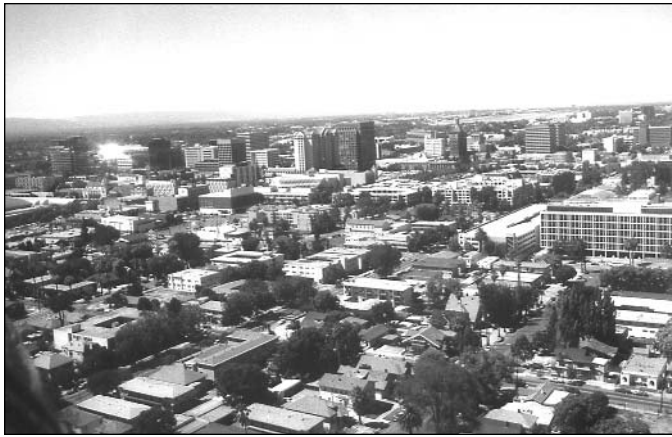

From its beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, SJSU has matured into a metropolitan university. Quality teaching and small classes are a priority at SJSU, where tenured professors teach introductory as well as advanced courses.

One of the 200 top research universities in the nation, SJSU offers rigorous course work and research opportunities to more than 30,000 undergraduate and graduate students in eight colleges.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

**D**r. Jon S. Whitmore was named President of San Jose State University in April 2008 with a start date in August 2008.

Dr. Whitmore, whose Ph.D. is from the University of California, Santa Barbara in theatre history, returns to California after five years (2003-2008) as the Texas Tech University president and a professor of theatre.

His distinguished professional history in academia began in 1967 at Washington State University. Positions at Highline Community College in Seattle and the University of California preceded an 11-year tenure (1974-1985) at West Virginia University where he gained full professorship and was Interim Dean of the College of Creative Arts. Dr. Whitmore spent five years (1985-1990) at the University of Iowa as the Dean, Faculty of Arts and Letters and a professor of theatre.

He was the Dean of the College of Fine Arts, the Effie Marie Cain Regents Chair and a professor of theatre at the University of Texas (1990-1996) and the Provost and a professor of theatre at the University of Iowa (1996-2003).

The native of Seattle, Wash., earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in speech from Washington State University. He and his wife, Jennifer, have a son, Ian, enrolled at the University of Iowa, and daughter, Amy, enrolled at Vanderbilt University.

# Tom Bowen, Director of Athletics

**T**om Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of intercollegiate athletics on December 20, 2004. Under his leadership and with his vision for the department, San Jose State has established itself as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program with proven athletic, academic and financial successes to his credit.

## CULTURE OF CHAMPIONS

At the core of Bowen's mission for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community. To that end, the Notre Dame alum has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; initiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with the creation of Spartan Sports Properties.

With his fund raising acumen, Bowen has led the Spartan Foundation - the department's fund-raising component - to unprecedented development heights with \$3.0-million during the last two annual fund drives.

As an integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and many other campus extra-curricular activities. His initiatives and leadership have created new energy department-wide and throughout the university. The university has benefitted from Athletics' increasing visibility, receiving record donations particularly in 2006-07.

Since taking over, San Jose State has more football wins in a three-year period than any similar span since 1990-92. The 2006 and 2007 Spartans are the

first two Spartan teams to post back-to-back .500 or better records in the Western Athletic Conference football standings.

In 2007-08, the Spartans sent their women's gymnastics team to NCAA post-season action and had individuals from the women's swimming and women's golf teams compete in NCAA Championships. Women's water polo, with two All-American team members, was ranked seventh in the final national coaches poll. Men's basketball had its best win total since the 2001 season and beat two teams that played in the 2008 NCAA Tournament. San Jose State capped the school year with a budget surplus for an unprecedented third year in a row and was cited as one of 12 Division I universities cited for Overall Excellence in Diversity in a national study by Texas A&M University on behalf of the NCAA.

In 2006-07, football capped its finest season in nearly two decades, posting a 9-4 overall record and capturing the New Mexico Bowl championship. Women's cross country and women's water polo, ranked sixth nationally in the final coaches' poll, turned in their best record in years. There were All-American performances in football and women's water polo.



Men's basketball, football, women's swimming, women's volleyball and women's water polo players competed in national team or individual national competitions. The 2007 season marked the second year in a row a Spartan won the Western Athletic Conference women's golf individual title.

He has appointed new head coaches in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's golf, women's golf, women's swimming and diving, softball, women's softball, women's cross country and women's volleyball. In 2005-06, San Jose State won the Western Athletic Conference women's golf championship, recorded its highest finish ever at a NCAA regional championship in women's gymnastics, produced seven teams out of 16 with its best conference finish in years, and had WAC "Coaches of the Year" in women's golf and softball.

## EXPERIENCED PROFESSIONAL

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the Director of Community Affairs for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. He directed all of the team's fund-raising activities and was responsible for alumni and current player participation in the community. Also serving as the executive director of the 49ers Foundation, San Francisco was the first NFL franchise to implement an annual giving program.

His Division I experience at the collegiate level includes athletics administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. As an assistant and associate director of athletics at the University of California from July 2000 through September 2002, he was responsible for athletic fund-raising. Bowen was credited with developing the first comprehensive planned giving program for the Golden Bears.

At Saint Mary's College, he was the Director of Foundations and Corporate Relations from May 1995 to January 1997 before being appointed to an associate director of athletics position by the president of the college. His grant proposal acumen helped raise \$6.1-million in academic funding for the institution. From January 1997 through April 2000, he managed the athletics department's budget, directed a corporate sponsorship

program and interacted with the academic senate, faculty and university personnel on student-athlete issues.

His first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987 through 1995, he held the positions of assistant football coach and athletics director.

## EDUCATION & COMMUNITY

He is a Level 2 certified member of the College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA), the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the National Society of Fund Raising Executives.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame played high school football at Moreau High in Hayward, Calif. He majored in theology/sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

An active member of the Bay Area community, he was named to the 2008 San Jose Mercury News' Top-25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in the Bay Area. He serves on the board of the San Jose Sports Authority. He is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management and at San Jose State University's Department of Kinesiology where he teaches sports management classes. As a senior faculty member of the Capital Campaign Institute based in Minneapolis, Minn., from 1996 through 2002, he is a frequent guest lecturer at several Bay Area university campuses. Bowen continues to speak before major corporations headquartered locally on the topics of leadership, management and motivation.

The Denver, Colo., native and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children: sons, Andrew and Peter, and, daughter, McKenna.

Otoupal, the department's sport supervisor for Spartan baseball, was promoted to his current position in 2007. He came to San Jose State as an associate athletics director in 2005 from the Stanford Athletics Department where he worked two stints for the Cardinal, 1998-2000 and 2002-05. Otoupal served as the Director of the Buck-Cardinal Club and Annual Giving, as a Major Gift Officer, and Project Manager for the acquisition of the Stanford Red Barn - Stanford's equestrian center.

As a M.B.A. student at the University of Oregon's Warsaw Sports Marketing Center, Otoupal was a consultant analyzing PAC-10 financial trends for the University of Oregon Athletics Department (2001-02).

An outside linebacker for the Stanford football team, he redshirted the 1988 season when former San Jose State coaching great Jack Elway was the Cardinal head coach. He went on to be a four-year letterwinner (1989-92) and Captain of Special Teams. Otoupal played for Spartan legend and Stanford coach Bill Walsh his senior season.

Following graduation, he joined the United States Marine Corps and achieved the rank of Captain in his five years of service as an infantry officer. Otoupal was awarded the Marine Corps' Certificate of Commendation and was a Recipient of the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal.

The 1993 Stanford graduate majored in political science and organizational behavior. He earned his M.B.A. from the University of Oregon in 2002.

Otoupal is a member of NAADD (National Association of Athletic Development Directors), NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics), and the AFP (Association of Fund-raising Professionals).

He and his wife, Brady, are the parents of one son and reside in San Jose.

**A** San Jose State alumna, Stacy Martin was promoted to the position of Senior Associate Athletics Director/Chief Operating Officer in June 2008. Martin also begins the current academic year as the department's Senior Woman Administrator.

Having served the university in increasingly progressive and vital administrative roles, she recently was the Associate Athletics Director for Business and Finance. For two full years and part of a third, Martin had fiscal oversight for the department's \$20-million annual budget that includes 16 sports, 28 departments and 115 employees. In a first for the Spartans, San Jose State finished each of the last three academic years with a budget surplus.

Martin's professional career started as a San Jose State ticket office employee in 2002. She moved to the business office in January 2003 and was promoted to Athletics Business Manager in 2004. In 2006, she was named an associate athletics director.

She is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), CABMA (College Athletic Business Management Association), Beta Gamma Sigma (International Honors society for studies in Business), WISC (Women In Sports Careers), NACWAA (National Association Of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators) and the Golden Key International Honor Society.

Additionally, Martin is a graduate of the Sports Management Institute – a collaboration of the Universities of Southern California, Notre Dame and North Carolina. The Sports Management Institute provides a specialized executive management program for sports management professionals.

At the conference level, Martin is San Jose State's representative on the Western Athletic Conference finance, championships, gender equity and code book committees.

A four-time letterwinner and former captain of the Spartan women's gymnastics team, Martin has bachelor's and master's degrees from San Jose State University. The 2002 graduate majored in business administration and corporate financial management. She earned an M.B.A. in finance in 2005. While an undergraduate, Martin was recognized by "Who's Who Among Students" for her scholarship, leadership and service to the campus and community.

**T**om Hastings joined the San Jose State Athletics Department staff October 9, 2006 as Associate Athletics Director for Media Services. Now as the Associate Athletics Director for Communications, Hastings supervises all of the department's broadcast services and the sports information staff that coordinates communication, media services, and public relations for San Jose State's 16 Division I sports. **K**en McDonald, an administrator in the San Jose State Athletics Department since 2005, is an Associate Athletics Director for Advancement and the Executive Director of the Spartan Foundation.

He originally joined the Spartans staff as an Assistant Athletics Director to head up corporate sales. In 2006, he shifted his focus to the Spartan Foundation - the fund raising arm for San Jose State University student-athlete scholarships.
