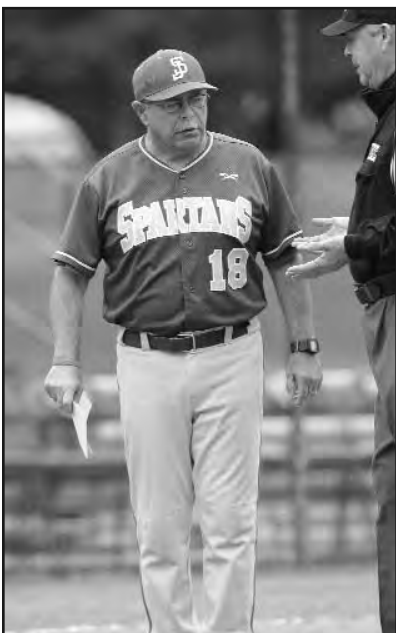

Sam Piraro, the winningest head baseball coach in San Jose State University history, is entering his 24th season in 2011. Piraro is the program's only head coach to guide the Spartans to multiple NCAA Championship appearances, as well as, Western Athletic Conference pennants. In addition, he is the only San Jose State baseball coach with more than 500 victories. His teams have an overall record of 749-577-6 in 23 seasons and more than 100 wins have come against nationally-ranked teams.

The four-time WAC Coach of the Year has compiled 1,013 wins and been associated with 30 winning and two .500 seasons while suffering just four losing campaigns in 36 total years as a collegiate head coach. He has produced seven All-Americans, six Freshman All-Americans, 76 all-conference selections, including 42 All-WAC picks, and 50 academic honorees at the conference level during his tenure. Last season Zack Jones became the second Spartan to earn WAC Freshman of the Year honors. Former standout Junior Ruiz is the only player in WAC history to earn both the league's Freshman of the Year (1999) and Player of the Year (2000) awards. Ryan Shopshire was the program's first WAC Pitcher of the Year in 2009 and Gerad Cawhorn was the 1993 Big West Conference Player of the Year.



In 2009, Piraro guided the Spartans to the WAC regular-season crown. It was their first since 2000 and earned him his second straight WAC Coach of the Year award and fourth overall in 12 seasons in the league. San Jose State compiled the best overall record among the nine NCAA Division I programs in Northern California for the second time in three years. They reached the 40-win plateau, at 41-20, for the sixth time in program history, fifth under Piraro, and

first since a school-record 45 victories in 2002. The 41 wins were the most since the 2000 College World Series team. A 9-0 start was their best since 1989. At 15-7 in conference play, San Jose State posted a winning league record in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 2001-02.

The Spartans and WAC Pitcher of the Year Ryan Shopshire led the league in pitching for the first time. The team was tops in fielding for the fourth time in five years and second in hitting, shattering the school record with a .339 average, among a total of eight new single-season program standards.

For Piraro individually, win No. 700 came at home against Dartmouth.

The 2008 campaign saw Piraro's Spartans post 30-plus victories for the third year in a row and qualify for a third successive WAC Tournament. They completed WAC play at 17-14, their first winning league record since 2002. Piraro was rewarded by being selected the WAC Co-Coach of the Year.

In 2007, San Jose State posted a 34-26 record, tops in Northern California. The Spartans knocked off top local opponents California and Stanford in the same season and posted a series triumph at Hawai'i for the first time since 2002. They took the three-game set with Santa Clara for the first time since 2003.

The squad topped the conference in fielding (.970) for a third straight year. They also paced the WAC in hitting (.312) for the first time and Kyle Bellows was named a Freshman All-American.

Piraro notched win No. 600 in 2006. The Spartans finished the year with an overall record of 33-26, its first winning record in four seasons. A 12-12 conference record was good for third place and a berth in the reinstated WAC Tournament.



Ranked second nationally behind Oklahoma, the Spartans' team fielding percentage of .979 set a school record.

In 2005, Piraro's squad was an even 28-28-1, and San Jose State became one of only two teams in WAC history to put together a three-game sweep over the conference's perennial champion and national-power Rice.

SJSU led the WAC defensively and the Spartans ended the season in a three-way tie with Texas and Washington for the best defense in the nation.

A Winning Tradition

He has averaged 33 coaching wins per season at San Jose State, and has directed teams to a winning record 17 times. Twice his teams have had .500 records and just four times in 23 campaigns did one of his squads fail to reach the .500 mark. He is the only Spartan baseball coach to record seven consecutive winning seasons. His teams have five 40-win seasons, including a school-record 45 victories in 2002. That team was ranked as high as 18th nationally and qualified for the NCAA Championship for the second time in three years.

In 2002, Piraro became the first Spartan head coach to reach the 500-win plateau. In 2001, he passed his mentor, Gene Menges, and became San Jose State baseball's winningest coach with his 468th victory.

Sixteen of Piraro's San Jose State teams have reached the 30-win mark, including six in a row from 1997 through 2002.

His 1989 and 1990 Spartans are the only teams to post back-to-back 40-win seasons.

In 2000, Piraro directed one of the most celebrated seasons in Spartan athletic history. San Jose State won a share of the WAC crown and earned the program's first NCAA Championship berth since 1971. San Jose State won the Waco (Texas) Regional by defeating nationally-ranked Florida, and the Houston Super Regional over fifth-ranked host Houston, to advance to the College World Series for the first time. Piraro was honored as the Rawlings Coach of the Year, ABCA West Region Coach of the Year and WAC Coach of the Year.

In 1997, the Spartans were 38-21 and won the WAC West Division championship. Piraro was named the WAC Coach of the Year and Louisville Slugger WAC Coach of the Year.

Named the San Jose State head coach in the summer of 1986, Piraro reached the 200-win mark in 1992, accomplishing the feat in fewer games than any other SJSU baseball coach. His 300th Spartan coaching victory came in 1996, and his 400th in 1999.

Piraro's teams have appeared in the national rankings a total of 48 times, including seven in the 2002 campaign and 10 weeks in 2000. The Spartans were ranked nationally for 11 weeks, as high as 11th by Collegiate Baseball, during the 1989 season. In 1990, the Spartans received their first preseason ranking and stayed there for 14 weeks, peaking at No. 4 by The Sporting News. San Jose State appeared twice in the Collegiate Baseball rankings in 1992, at 29th and 27th, and was rated as high as 17th in 1997.

Guiding Young Men's Careers

Piraro has profoundly influenced the careers of his student-athletes. Nearly 80 of his players have gone on to sign professional baseball contracts.

Kevin Frandsen, currently with the San Diego Padres or-



ganization, has also played with the San Francisco Giants and Los Angeles Angeles of Anaheim. Anthony Telford pitched in the major leagues for nine seasons. Third baseman Jeff Ball played for the Giants in 1998 and managed the Atlantic City Surf professional baseball club from 2004-06. Second baseman Gabe Lopez was a Double-A prospect of the New York Yankees. Pitcher Matt Durkin was a second-round choice of the New York Mets in the 2004 draft. In all, Piraro has sent 32 players onto the next level via draft selection since 1997.

Over 50 of Piraro's former players and assistants have moved into the high school and collegiate baseball coaching ranks. Tenth-year Santa Clara University head coach Mark O'Brien played on the 1991 and 1992 Spartans. Scott Hertler, Piraro's assistant at Mission College and later for 12 years at San Jose State, has been the head coach at De Anza College since 1999. Also included are Todd Eagen (1987-88), former head coach at Mission College; Shane Carley (1993-94), a former assistant at Mission and now the head coach there; Jason Bugg (1991-92), a former Spartan assistant and now the associate head coach at Mission; Dave Sick (1991-94), a former assistant at De Anza College; and Greg Mugg (1990), another former assistant at De Anza.

The Spartan coach also places a premium on academic performance. Outfielder Jason Martin and Infielder Karson Klauer were named Academic All-Americans in 2010, pitcher Donnie Rea and catcher Kevin Tannahill were also honored as Academic All-Americans in 1989. Dave Sick was a three-time Academic All-District VIII selection, with current senior Jason Mar-



tin. The program has set new highs in Academic All-WAC honorees the last five years, with four in 2006, eight each in 2007, 2008 and 2010, and 10 in 2009. Fifteen Spartans earned San Jose State University Scholar-Athlete recognition for the

2005-06 academic year, 14 for 2006-07, 10 for 2007-08, 12 for 2008-09 and 11 for 2009-10. Baseball players have posted the highest grade-point average among male SJSU student-athletes in four of the past five school years, with Wes Porter in 2004-05, and Klauer from 2006-07 to 2008-09.

Corey Cabral, a pitcher who graduated in May of 2007, became the first Spartan male to be presented the WAC Stan Bates Award in August of 2007, as the top male scholar-athlete in the conference based on academic record, athletic performance, character, sportsmanship, leadership and community service.

From 1992-99, Piraro served as an assistant athletic director in addition to his duties as head coach. His fundraising efforts through the years have augmented the baseball operations budget and facilities. The Blethen Field project, through the generosity of Fred and Sandra Blethen-Chasalow, brought in \$350,000. The gift enabled the program to refurbish Blethen Field. Since Piraro's hiring in 1986, he has raised over \$1,000,000 for his program and the athletics department.



Rooted in San Jose

Piraro was an infielder on the 1971 and 1972 Spartan teams. He received both his bachelor's degree, in physical education in 1975, and master's degree in 1982, from San Jose State.

The San Jose native is in his 37th season as a college baseball coach, and has amassed 1,013 victories during his three head-coaching appointments. He began his career in 1974 as a graduate assistant and junior varsity coach at San Jose State. His first year as the junior varsity coach produced a 22-5 record and a league championship. Piraro compiled a 74-43 mark with the junior varsity squad in three seasons. He was the Spartans' top varsity assistant under Gene Menges from 1977 through 1979.

In 1980, Piraro became the first baseball coach at Mission College in Santa Clara, Calif. In seven seasons, he compiled a 190-70 record, won five Coast Conference championships and two state titles (1981 and 1983). Following each of the state crowns, Piraro was named California Community College Coach of the Year. He was also the school's athletics director and chair of the physical education department from 1983 to 1986. In 1996, Piraro became the second-youngest coach to be inducted into the California Community College Baseball Hall of Fame.

The Santa Clara County chapter of the Italian-American Heritage Association recognized Piraro in 2000 as its Sportsman of the Year. He has served as an NCAA regional advisor and a voting member of the Collegiate Baseball rankings panel, and was selected to represent the West Region on the NCAA Championship Selection Committee prior to the 2006 season. He has co-authored a book with fellow coaches, titled *Gold Glove Defense*, through the American Baseball Coaches Association.

Piraro and his wife, JoAnn, live in San Jose with their two children, Jason (28) and Jenna (23).

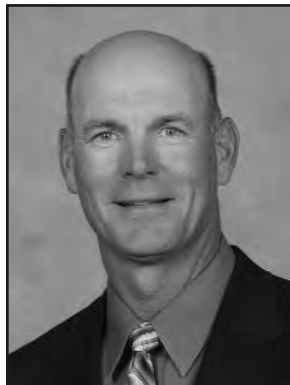

Associate head coach Tom Kunis, a nationally-regarded pitching coach, is in seventh season overall with the San Jose State University baseball program. In addition to leading the pitching staff, he plays an integral part in the recruiting process and coordinates Spartans baseball youth camps.

Under Kunis' guidance, two Spartan hurlers received post-season honors in 2010. Starter Blake McFarland was named first-team All-WAC and was selected to the WAC All-Tournament team. Zack Jones listed as a utility player, earned Freshman of the Year honors in the WAC, and inclusion on the Louisville Slugger Freshman All-America team and first-team selection on the All-Ping! Freshman Baseball Team. Jones, a two way player, was the teams primary closer. He finished the year with a 5-1 record and five saves.

In 2009 San Jose State won the regular-season WAC title behind a pitching staff that led the league in team ERA. It was the first time the Spartans led the WAC in pitching since joining the conference in 1997. San Jose State's 4.66 ERA, was nearly a full run better than second-place Fresno State's 5.61. San Jose State led the conference in complete games (6), shutouts (4), saves (17) and a school-record 453 strikeouts.

Three of the top six individual ERA marks in 2009 WAC play belonged to San Jose State hurlers. Ryan Shopshire became the first Spartan to earn WAC Pitcher of the Year honors, and was joined on the All-WAC first-team by David Berner. Including Shopshire, Kunis has coached four conference Pitchers of the Year since 2000.



In his first tour with the Spartans, Kunis was an assistant coach from 1988-91. His pitching staff was the best in the Big West Conference for three of those years. In 1989 and 1990 the program posted back-to-back 40-plus win seasons, the

only time in school history.

During the 2008 campaign, he served as the head coach at Ohlone College in Fremont, Calif. Prior to that he was an assistant at Stanford from 2000-07, where he aided the Cardinal to three national runner-up finishes in four College World Series trips. The Cardinal posted a team ERA under 4.00 four times and nine of his pitchers were selected in the first five rounds of the MLB Draft.

From 1996-99 Kunis was the top assistant at Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo, Calif. His rotations consistently ranked among the best in the WAC (1996) and Big West (1997-99).

He was the pitching coach at De Anza College in Cupertino, Calif., from 1991-94. The Dons twice topped the Coast Conference in ERA. He was head coach for the 1995 campaign, earning a 31-14-2 record and a California state playoff berth.

Kunis began his coaching career as an assistant at West Valley College in Saratoga, Calif. from 1984-87.

A graduate of San Jose's Branham High School, Kunis earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from San Jose State, and a master's degree in sports administration from Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif.

He and his wife, Kim, reside in San Jose with their five children, sons Austin (17), Tyler (15), Landon (9) and Cooper (3), and daughter Megan (14).

Jeff Pritchard is in his fourth season as an assistant coach for San Jose State University. His chief responsibilities are as the hitting coach and recruiting and academic coordinator. He also coaches the catchers, oversees the prospect camps, and serves as the third base coach.

In 2009, his second season working with the Spartans, Pritchard's hitters broke seven single-season school marks. On its way to the WAC regular-season crown, San Jose State shattered the program's batting record by hitting .339, 20 points higher than the previous mark. In addition, program records were set for runs (472), hits (723), doubles (135), RBI (424), total bases (1,007) and sacrifices (92 combined).

The Spartans had six players hit .335 or better with 160-plus at-bats. Jacob Bruns led the way at .399, third-best in the WAC. Both Bruns and Kyle Bellows (.389) had slugging percentages above .600. The Spartans belted 43 home runs, their highest team total since 2002.

In September 2009, Pritchard's 2010 recruiting class was rated No. 42 nationally and No. 1 in the WAC by *Collegiate Baseball Newspaper*.

In 2008, he received the SJSU Athletics Board Academic Assistant Coach of the Year award, for guiding the Spartans to the

top GPA among men's teams at San Jose State for the fall 2007 and spring 2008 semesters combined.

Pritchard coached at Santa Clara University, under former Spartan player Mark O'Brien, during the 2007 season. He was a hitting and fielding instructor, coached first base, co-directed the Bronco camps, developed and oversaw community outreach, and assisted with recruiting.

He spent the 2006 season an assistant coach at University of California. From 2002-05, he worked as the assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at San Francisco State University, for then head coach and former Spartan assistant Matt Markovich.

During the 2007 summer, he was head coach of the Alaska Baseball League's (ABL) Mat-Su Miners. The Miners, located in Palmer, Alaska, were ranked as high as fifth on the PG Cross-checker Summer 16 chart, which rates the nation's top college summer league clubs. The team finished with a 24-11 record and earned the ABL co-championship.

In the summer of 2006, Pritchard was the associate head coach of the Kauai Menehunes of the Hawaii Collegiate Baseball League. The Menehunes finished in second-place.

Serving as the head coach of the Monterey Bay Sox in Monterey, Calif., during the summer of 2005, he earned California Coastal Collegiate League Manager of the Year honors and led the Bay Sox to the National Baseball Congress World Series. The team finished the summer ranked 13th nationally.

A native of Carmel Valley, Calif., Pritchard earned his associate degree in liberal studies from Allan Hancock College (AHC) in Santa Maria, Calif., in 1997 and bachelors degree in English from the University of San Francisco in 2000. In 2006 he earned a master's degree in English from San Francisco State.

As a player at AHC, Pritchard was a 1996 junior college All-American and the 1996 Western State Conference (WSC) batting champion. He was a two-time All-WSC honoree and a two-time team MVP before playing his final two seasons at USF. In addition, he played three seasons of professional baseball.

He, his wife Carrie and daughter Peyton (1) reside in San Jose.

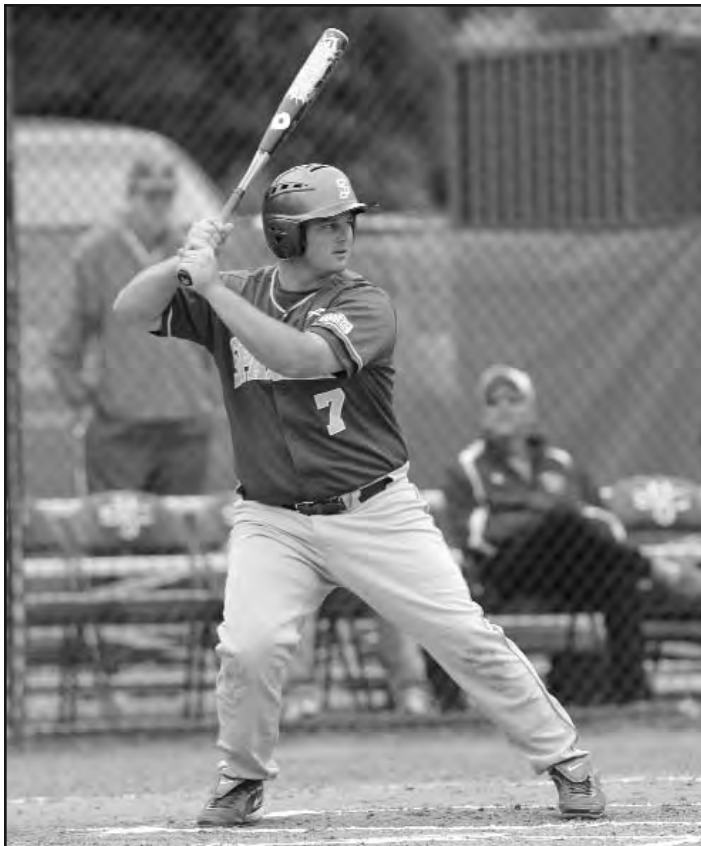
CORY VALINE VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH 1ST SEASON SAN JOSE STATE, 2010

Corey Valine enters his first season as a volunteer assistant coach for San Jose State University. His responsibilities include working with catchers, assistant hitting coach and he serves as the team's first base coach.

Valine spent four seasons on the Spartan baseball team primarily as a third baseman. His .387 batting average in 2009 is the eighth best single-season mark in school history and his 22-game hit streak, that same year, is the program's third best.

Valine's career marks of 116 RBI and 14 home runs are seventh and 10th, respectively, all-time. In addition, he is the only hitter in San Jose State history to have two games in which he recorded eight at bats.

In 2010, as a senior co-captain, he earned first-team All-WAC honors. Making 40 starts at third and 15 times behind the plate, he hit .307 in 228 at bats. His 70 hits, 33 runs, 11 doubles,



four home runs and 39 RBI all ranked in the top-three on the team. Starting all 24 WAC games, he hit a team-best .361. He added 14 runs, six doubles, one home run and 20 RBI, also team highs.

As second-team All-WAC selection in 2009, Valine hit .449 in conference play and .387 overall with seven home runs and 46 RBI. Among Division I batters, he was the seventh toughest to strikeout, with just eight in 186 at-bats. In his best day at the plate he went 5-for-5 at Sacramento State (5/3). He had hitting streaks of 18 and 23 games during that year and earned the team's Big Stick Award.



A four-year letterwinner at Christian Brothers High School in Sacramento, Calif., he was twice selected as the team's MVP. He earned the 2006 Best Pitcher distinction and three times was an All-Capital Valley Conference honoree.

Valine was the Spartan baseball team's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee representative for the 2008-09 and 2009-10 seasons and in 2008 he attended the NCAA Leadership Council.

In the summer of 2010 he was the hitting coach of the Bend (Ore.) Elks of the West Coast League (WCL). The Elks shattered the WCL single-season home run record by smacking 35, surpassing the previous high of 23. In addition they set new league records including total runs (256), doubles (88), triples (15), RBI (228), total bases (652), slugging percentage (.399) and HRs.

He earned a degree in justice studies from San Jose State in 2010. A native of West Sacramento, Calif., he resides in San Jose.

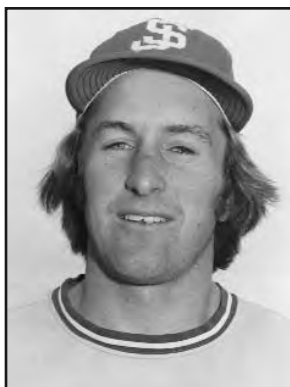
Retired Number Gene Menges, Head Coach, 1970-86

The only number in San Jose State baseball history to have ever been retired - #22 - belongs to former Spartan head coach Gene Menges. The second-winningest coach in the school's 94-year baseball history, Menges led the team for 17 seasons and compiled a 467-434-4 career record. Twice, in 1978 and 1979, he was named Coach of the Year by the Northern California Baseball Association.

Menges received his bachelor's degree from San Jose State in 1951. The quarterback of the 1948-50 Spartan football teams was one of the school's most prolific passers, and his totals still rank among the best in Spartan history. He continued his education at his alma mater and received his master's degree in 1957. While pursuing his education, he joined the Spartan coaching staff in 1952 as an assistant baseball coach before assuming the head coaching duties in 1970. He has the rank of professor emeritus in the human performance department at SJSU, and is also a member of the San Jose State University Sports Hall of Fame.



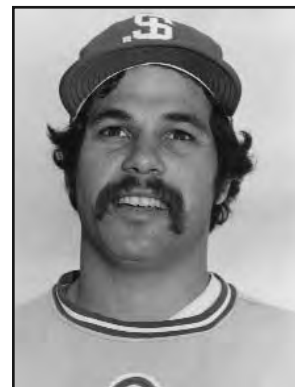

Tom Bowen
Athletics Director

Tom Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of intercollegiate athletics on December 20, 2004. Under his leadership and with his vision for the department, San Jose State has established itself as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program with proven athletics and academic successes and financial advancements to his credit.

CULTURE OF CHAMPIONS

At the core of Bowen's mission for San Jose State University athletics is building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community. To that end, the Notre Dame alum has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; initiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with the creation of Spartan Sports Properties.

Bowen has led the Spartan Foundation - the department's fund-raising component - through cyclical economic conditions to unprecedented development heights at the university. The Spartans have produced annual budget surpluses under his direction and have re-invested their gains back into their student-athletes and teams.

An integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and other campus extra-curricular activities. His initiatives and leadership foster energy department and university-wide. Athletics' increased visibility has coincided with record donations coming to the university, particularly in 2006-07.

Since taking over, San Jose State has more football wins in the latest four-year period than any similar span since 1990-93. The 2006 through 2008 Spartans are the first three Spartan teams to post consecutive .500 or better records in the Western Athletic Conference football standings. The 2006 Spartans capped their finest season in many years, posting a 9-4 overall record and capturing the New Mexico Bowl championship.

Recent athletics accomplishments add to his Culture of Champions. Women's golf, women's soccer and baseball are the latest teams to win a Western Athletic Conference championship. Women's water polo is a consistent top-10 national program. Women's swimming finished 2008-09 with the longest dual meet winning streak in Division I. Women's gymnastics is entrenched as a NCAA Regional Championship qualifying team. Men's basketball, men's soccer and men's golf have produced measurable

gains, particularly in conference competition.

Spartans have earned All-America honors in football, women's golf, baseball and women's water polo. San Jose State had its first women's gymnastics individual NCAA Regional champion in 2009. Twelve student-athletes were honored nationally and more than 100 at the conference level for academic achievements in 2009-10.

Bowen's vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a Student Success Services component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores, as measured by the NCAA, have risen steadily and strikingly under his watch and were at a then university-best in 2009 and were surpassed in the 2010 report.

He has appointed new head coaches in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, men's golf, women's golf, women's swimming and diving, softball, women's softball, women's cross country and women's volleyball. Since 2005, coaches in baseball, women's golf, water polo and softball have received conference Coach of the Year recognition.

In 2008, San Jose State was named as one of 12 Division I universities cited for Overall Excellence in Diversity in the most recent national study by Texas A&M on behalf of the NCAA.

A VALUED PROFESSIONAL

Bowen's proven administrative and managerial record at San Jose State has resulted in meaningful national appointments in college athletics. He is one of eight Football Bowl Subdivision directors of athletics serving on the 24-member NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee. In 2009, Bowen was one of 12 named to serve as a mentor to aspiring women and ethnic minority athletics administrators in the NCAA Fellows Leadership Program. He was the Tournament Director for the 2010 NCAA Men's Basketball Division I Championship first and second rounds games played in San Jose.

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the Director of Community Affairs for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. He directed all of the team's





fund-raising activities and was responsible for alumni and current player participation in the community. Also serving as the executive director of the 49ers Foundation, San Francisco was the first NFL franchise to implement an annual giving program. His Division I experience at the collegiate level includes athletics administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. As an assistant and associate director of athletics at the University of California from July 2000 through September 2002, he was responsible for athletics fund-raising. Bowen was credited with developing the first comprehensive planned giving program for the Golden Bears.

At Saint Mary's College, he was the Director of Foundations and Corporate Relations from May 1995 to January 1997 before being appointed to an associate director of athletics position by the president of the college. His grant proposal acumen helped raise \$6.1-million in academic funding for the institution. From January 1997 through April 2000, he managed the athletics department's budget, directed a corporate sponsorship program and interacted with the academic senate, faculty and university personnel on student-athlete issues.

His first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987 through 1995, he held the positions of athletics director and assistant football coach.

EDUCATION & COMMUNITY

He is a Level 2 certified member of the College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA) and has memberships in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the National Society of Fund Raising Executives.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame majored in theology/sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

An active member of the Bay Area community, he was named to the 2008 San Jose Mercury News' Top-25 Most Powerful Sports Figures in the Bay Area. He serves on the board of the San Jose Sports Authority. He is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management and at San Jose State University's Department of Kinesiology where he teaches sports management classes. Bowen is a frequent guest lecturer at several Bay Area university campuses and continues to speak before major corporations headquartered locally on the topics of leadership, management and motivation.

The Denver, Colo., native and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children: sons, Andrew and Peter, and, daughter, McKenna.



Don W. Kassing
Interim President

Past President Don W. Kassing who retired in 2008, has packed up his Arizona home and returned to San José State to lead the university once more. Kassing is serving as interim president following the departure of President Jon Whitmore, who was named CEO of the nonprofit organization ACT.

As president from 2005 to 2008, Kassing led the development, construction and opening of two major campus facilities, King Library and residential Campus Village, and earned the respect and trust of many faculty members, students and off-campus partners.

His previous 18 years in higher education included service as vice president for university relations and administrative services at Murray State University, and vice president for development and public affairs at Western State College of Colorado. Before that, he worked for 11 years in private industry in corporate finance and operations management for Brown Group, Inc., and with General Motors Corporation.

Kassing served on the boards of the San José Sports Authority, United Way Silicon Valley, San José Chamber of Commerce, Silicon Valley Leadership Group, Joint Venture: Silicon Valley, and Silicon Valley Higher Education Roundtable. Kassing holds an M.B.A. and a B.S. in Economics from St. Louis University. He is married with three children and five grandchildren.

CSU Chancellor Charles B. Reed, who reached out to Kassing and his wife, Amy, says he's pleased that San José State will be in the hands of a proven leader with a record of stability and familiarity with the campus, students and community. Meanwhile, the search for SJSU's next president has already begun, led by the Chancellor's Office.

The Campus Village

Home to more than 2,279 students, faculty and staff and located on the southeast corner of the main campus, the Campus Village is a gateway to incredible academic resources and campus activities. You are moments away from the excitement of downtown San Jose, the opportunities of Silicon Valley, and some of the world's greatest recreational areas.

The Campus Village includes three buildings featuring apartment and suite-style living and a typical college dormitory experience. It includes recreational and study areas, a full-service computer lab, wireless Internet access, an interactive gaming center, laundry facilities, meeting rooms, retail stores and underground parking for 700 vehicles. Fully-equipped nearby recreational facilities offer residents space to work out, swim, play basketball, volleyball, ping-pong or pool.

Immediate access to the main campus is another asset to the Campus Village. Walking to the Student Union or to The Event Center, home of the San Jose State University men's and women's basketball teams, takes a minute. Residents also can walk or bike to the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library without crossing any streets.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library

The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library, located on the main campus of San Jose State University, is a first-of-its-kind collaboration between a city and a university. The \$177-million, 475,000 square-foot library provides a center for life-long learning. Students, faculty and the community have access to the information they will need for educational and personal growth throughout their lives.

The 10-floor library features:

- 3,623 seats - 1,800 seats wired for the Internet
- 400 public computers
- 135 databases of information
- 112 workstations available in four computer instruction labs
- 37 group-project rooms

The collaborative design provides many opportunities for academic, cultural and community programs. Multilingual and special collections for San Jose's diverse ethnic groups are available. An adaptive technology area assures all people have the ability to access the information and databases available.



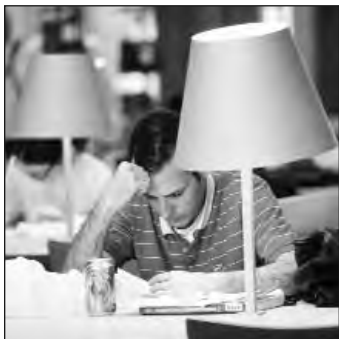

San Jose Municipal Stadium



San Jose Municipal Stadium, or Muni, located at the corner of Alma Street and Senter Road, is the primary home of San Jose State baseball.

Constructed in 1941 at a cost of \$80,000, it is one of the first stadiums built entirely of reinforced concrete. Muni is city-owned and has a natural-grass field.

Over the years, the 5,200-seat stadium has served as the home field for several minor league teams and currently houses the Class A Advanced California League affiliate of the San Francisco Giants, the San Jose Giants.

Recent upgrades include a scoreboard which was installed during the 2006 season. Prior to the 2007 season the San Jose State clubhouse was refurbished, a new outfield wall was completed along with new bullpen areas and renovated seating areas.

With the new outfield wall the field dimensions are now 320 feet down the foul lines, 365 feet to the gaps and 390 feet to straightaway center field.

Blethen Field

Thanks to a generous gift from Fred and Sandra Blethen-Chasalow, the San Jose State University baseball program has a first-rate facility on its South Campus.

The gift enabled San Jose State to construct dugouts, a new outfield fence, grandstand seating, a scoreboard and a press box. An infield irrigation system was installed and electrical improvements were made.

The field was renamed Blethen Field, in memory of Howard "Lefty" Blethen, who played baseball at San Jose State from 1933 to 1935. Lefty was inducted into the San Jose State Baseball Hall of Fame in 1987.

Blethen, who is recognized as the first San Jose State graduate to sign a professional baseball contract, enrolled at then-San Jose Normal School after playing professional baseball in the St. Louis Browns organization which included a brief stint in the major leagues.

The new facility was dedicated prior to the 2001 season. Blethen Field is the second home of the San Jose State Spartan baseball team. The field also hosts area high school playoff games and selected summer league competitions.

The Koret Athletic Training Center

The Koret Athletic Training Center, opened in November, 2001, is a state-of-the-art facility that encompasses over 10,000 square feet of training space, and is located adjacent to Spartan Stadium, the athletic locker rooms and the football practice field.

The Koret Athletic Training Center also contains a 1,000-square-foot rehabilitation and training room that services physical therapy and sport-specific rehabilitation. The facility enables the sports medicine staff of athletic trainers, doctors and physical therapists to provide the best possible care to help prevent and rehabilitate injuries.



“Our Philosophy”

- We teach a hands-on approach where the student-athlete is expected to develop a comprehensive understanding of not only the How’s, but also the Why’s of our program.
- We teach correct movement patterns to optimize efficiency and performance.
- Our program design is centered on ground-based, free weight, multi-joint movements that will transfer to the playing field and keep our student-athletes out of our sports medicine facility.
- Our primary concern is the development of speed in all our sports.
- We develop speed and flexibility through strength.



- Our speed program consists of functional and straight-line speed training. Functional means acceleration, deceleration and change-of-direction work.
- We train through an entire range-of-motion in all lifts to enhance active flexibility, develop strength to prevent injury, and unlock joints with mobility issues.
- Olympic-based movements are utilized for speed of movement, active flexibility and dynamic stability.
- Squats and deadlifts have a permanent home in our program for developing hip strength and back stability. Single-leg variations are used to fix strength imbalance and lateral deficits.

Located in the Koret Athletic Training Center, this interactive display features great athletes, great teams, great events and moments in San Jose State Athletics history. Former Spartan athletes that became famous after graduation, great donors, great coaches and administrators are on display. Also displayed in the Jeff Garcia Hall of Champions is the San Jose State Sports Hall of Fame, which includes over 300 former players and coaches.

“I am excited to be able to give something of this magnitude back to San Jose State University,” Garcia said in 2001. “They have been such an integral part of my life. I am just happy to be at a point in life that I can do something like this. My family and I are proud to create this legacy that will always serve as a reminder of how much San Jose State means to me.”

Garcia was a quarterback on the 1991, 1992 and 1993 San Jose State teams. As a sophomore, he was third nationally in passing efficiency. He led San Jose State to its first win in school history over a Big Ten Conference team, the University of Minnesota, and went on to receive honorable mention All-America recognition in 1992. The former school record-holder for total offense with 7,274 yards was named the Outstanding Offensive Player at the 1994 East-West Shrine All-Star Game in Palo Alto, Calif.



Jeff Garcia was in his 17th season as a pro in 2010.

Professionally, he played five seasons (1994 through 1998) for the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League, was a four-time all-star and led the team to the 1998 Grey Cup championship. Garcia joined the San Francisco 49ers in 1999 and took the team to playoff appearances in 2001 and 2002. He was a Cleveland Brown in 2004, with the Detroit Lions in 2005, led the Philadelphia Eagles to the 2006 NFC playoffs, was a starter for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2007, earning a trip to the Pro Bowl, stayed with the Bucs in 2008, and spent time with both the Oakland Raiders and the Eagles in 2009.

Garcia earned his undergraduate degree as a business administration major from San Jose State University through the National Football League’s Continuing Education Program.

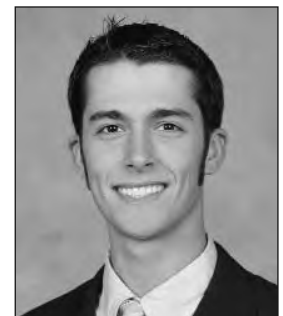
