





Lawrence Tang Fan (1954-2022) was born in San Francisco, California, on September 9, 1954. He was a proud 1972 graduate of Lowell High School and received his degree in economics from the University of California Berkeley in 1976. After heading to the Midwest to earn his master's degree at Western Illinois in 1978, he worked at LaSalle University in the sports information department. Lawrence returned to the Bay Area when he accepted the Sports Information Director position at San Jose State in 1980.

Sports were a constant in Lawrence's life. A lifelong San Francisco Giants and San Francisco 49ers fan (how appropriate), he talked fondly of taking the buses to see games at Kezar Stadium with his brother, Stephen. His father was a 49ers season ticket holder until his death, even picking out his seats at Levi's Stadium. Lawrence and his brother continued this tradition as they remained ticket holders.

Serving in the SJSU Athletics Department for 42 years, Lawrence was a champion in representing San Jose State to local, state and national media. He put the Spartan student-athletes before himself and served the Bay Area media in many capacities including arranging interviews for all Spartan athletes and serving as the spokesman for the department.

One of his greatest achievements that he was proud to publicize happened on November 11, 2021, when he worked his 500th consecutive San Jose State football game.

Lawrence has been a great mentor to those who worked in the sports information/media relations/ strategic communications industry. He never forgot a face or a fact and treated everyone the same, whether you were the star guard on the basketball team, a walk-on on the women's water polo team, a national media member or a student reporter in your first semester.

His legacy will live on in everyone.

Credentials are issued for news and editorial coverage on a case-by-case basis to those filing game stories, accredited members from established media outlets, and personnel assigned by the sports information office. The credential recipient agrees to all conditions set forth by the University relating to conduct and print, video, audio, digital and photographic game coverage.

Football Press Box

The CEFCU Stadium press box is located on the 7th Street side of the stadium and is an open-air facility. Carry a jacket with you. The press box remains open three hours after each contest.

Football Game Day Parking

Media parking passes for home football games are issued by the athletics media relations office.

Football Telephone Lines & Wireless Internet

Nine telephone lines and wireless internet are available for the working media in the press box area.

Photographers

Credentials are issued to newspapers, wire services, video crews and team photographers. NCAA rules limit photographers to a wide area behind the restraining line around the playing field and outside the 25-yard lines.

Production Truck & Satellite Uplink Parking

Production truck and satellite uplink parking is on the 7th Street side of the stadium. Arrangements must be made to park a truck overnight inside CEFCU Stadium.

Radio Broadcasts

The radio broadcast booth for the designated official flagship station of the visiting team at CEFCU Stadium is Box A on the mezzanine level of the press box and has space for five working individuals. ISDN and regular telephone service are provided.

Scouts

Space limitations prohibit seating and standing in the press box for scouting purposes.

Statistics & Services

Game statistics, play-by-play accounts and post-game quotes are compiled and distributed. FAX service is available. A meal is available two hours before kickoff.

Team Practices

During the football season, the Spartans practice in the morning. In-person, post-practice interview opportunities with the student-athletes, generally, occur at approximately 11:30 a.m. on Monday, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Please contact the media relations office in advance with an interview request. Brent Brennan will have his weekly media availability at 1 p.m. every Tuesday in the press conference room of the new SAC building.



NEW SPARTAN ATHLETICS CENTER





The Spartans opened the new Spartan Athletics Center on the east side of CEFCU Stadium prior to the 2023 season. The most tranformative capital project in SJSU history approached 70 million dollars and made it's television debut on Sept. 3 against Oregon State.

The two-story, 55,000-square foot building will be the new home for Spartan football and men's and women's soccer while providing amenities for all student-athletes on San José Sate's 22 athletics teams. It is critical to leveling the playing field in the areas of facilities and recruiting by providing access to first-class amenities including:

- Locker rooms, auditorium, dining facilities, player lounge
- Coaches offices, position meeting rooms, nutrition station
- Premium viewing and hospitality areas on game day





KEN NIUMATALOLO Head Football Coach



The all-time winningest coach in the Naval Academy, Ken Niumatalolo, was named San José State's 30th head football coach in program history on Jan. 21, 2024. Niumatalolo won a program-best 109 games, led Navy to 10 bowl games over 15 seasons and is a three-time American Athletic Conference (AAC) Coach of the Year (2015, '16, '19). He earned the 2019 Stallings Award, presented to the college football head coach who is both a humanitarian and an exceptional head coach.

Niumatalolo started his reign in Annapolis with eight straight wins over Army and 10 overall, which is the most in the history of the rivalry game. Navy won 6-of-10 bowl games during Niumatalolo's tenure and picked up wins over Pittsburgh and Kansas State after posting a school record 11-2 marks in 2015 and '19, finishing inside the top 25 for the first time in the last 60 years.

Niumatalolo, 58, helped Navy earn the Lambert Trophy in 2015, awarded to the best team in the East, for the first time since 1963. He led Navy to its first outright division title in 2016 going 7-1 in the AAC, winning the West division, and is the only coach in Navy history to win three-consecutive bowl games. His six bowl wins and six Commander-In-Chief trophies are the most in Navy history.

In 2015, Niumatalolo was one of four coaches to be named a finalist for the Dodd Trophy and the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award. In 2016, he was a Dodd Trophy finalist again and was named AFCA Region 1 Coach of the Year. In 2019, he was a Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award for the second time in his career.

In 2013, Niumatalolo was selected to the inaugural class of the Polynesian Football Hall of Fame and was the second Polynesian head coach in Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) history and the first Samoan collegiate head coach on any level.

The La'ie, Hawai'i native played quarterback at Hawai'i from 1987-89 and was part of their first bowl team in 1989. After he graduated, he then joined head coach Paul Johnson's staff at Hawai'i first as a graduate assistant and then eventually as a full-time assistant (1990-94).

In 1995, Niumatalolo followed Johnson to Navy first as the running backs coach and then in 1997 was named the offensive coordinator. His first stint at Navy lasted from 1995-98 before he left to go to UNLV to be tight ends coach/special teams coordinator from 1999-2001. Niumatalolo returned to Navy in 2002 to be assistant head coach under Johnson until taking over head coaching duties in 2007.

Niumatalolo and his wife, Barbara, have three children, Alexcia, Va'a and Ali'i and five granddaughters, Aussie Keanani, Rosie Momi, Jada Keala, Barbara Lilia and Ivory Meli.

DERRICK Associate Head Coach **Defensive Coordinator**



Derrick Odum finished his seventh season as the Spartans' defensive coordinator in 2023, his tenure coordinating defenses is the longest in San Jose State history. He added the title of associate head coach in February 2018. The Spartans have won 31 games over the last five seasons and have been to three bowl games in the past four seasons for the first time ever.

In 2023, his defense finished second in the Mountain West averaging just 353.2 yards per game. The Spartans pass defense finished first in the conference and 16th in the nation only letting up 186.8 yards per game. Under Odum's leadership, five Spartans made All-Mountain West defense including first year player Jay Vion Cole who was named to the Pro Football Focus All-Mountain West Team who according to PFF "surrendered just a 40.8 passer rating when targeted this season, ranking sixth among Group of Five cornerbacks. His 86.2 grade led all Mountain West defenders, or wall "The Spartage also finished the season fourth in the as well." The Spartans also finished the season fourth in the Mountain West and 33rd in the country with 21 turnovers gained while finishing third in the Mountain West and 36th in the nation intercepting 12 passes including one returned 98 yards for a touchdown by Michael Dansby in a 42-18 win over No. 25 Fresno State.

In 2022, he had his second Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year under him in Viliami Fehoko (Cade Hall was named in it in 2020). His defense led the Mountain West in sacks with 39 while playing in a conference low 12 games and finished fifth in the nation averaging 3.27 sacks per game. SJSU also finished averaging 7.4 tackles for loss per game which led the Mountain West and was good for eighth in the country. They also finished second in the conference with 14 interceptions and helped the Spartans to a conference regular season best +12 in turnover margin. Three players from the defensive side of the ball (Fehoko, Hall and Kyle Harmon) were named All-Mountain West First Team.

The 2020 season was a banner year for the San Jose State defense en route to the MW championship. For the first time in 30 years, the Spartans limited the opposition to less than 20 points a game and finished 15th nationally in scoring defense. San Jose State ranked in the top-10 among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) teams in red zone defense (9th) and quarterback sacks (10th). The Spartans ended the season ranked 24 in the AP poll.

The San Jose State defense's "big play" trait began showing itself in 2019 as the Spartans ranked ninth nationally in passes intercepted and in turnover margin. The Spartans' penchant for creating takeaways was most evident in its win that season at Arkansas with five interceptions as San Jose State defeated a Southwestern Conference (SEC) opponent for the first time in school history and was named the Reveal Suits Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) Team of the Week.

His players have earned 40 all-conference awards and nine of them were selected in a National Football League draft.

Joined the Spartans staff after coaching Oregon State's defensive backs in 2015 and 2016 while Brennan was

- His 26 seasons of coaching experience includes being part of 11 teams that played in a Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) bowl game, two squads that went to the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs, and five conference champions.

CRAIG STUTZMANN

Offensive Coordinator
Ouarterbacks Coach



Craig Stutzmann was named the offensive coordinator at San José State on Jan. 22, 2024. Prior to SJSU, Stutzmann was wide receivers coach/passing game coordinator at Texas State since December 2022.

In 2023, the Bobcats, who ranked 28th in the country in passing offense, featured three different receivers with 55 or more catches. Texas State also broke the program's overall record for passing yards in a season.

The trio of receivers marked the first time in Texas State's FBS history that the Bobcats had 3 different players with 50+ catches in a season.

Stutzmann's run-and-shoot offense influence also played a role in the Bobcats ranking 15th in the country and tops in the Sun Belt in total offense (457.6 yards/game) and 12th in scoring offense (36.7 points/game).

He was also one of six finalists for FootballScoop's National Wide Receivers Coach of the Year. He also helped Hobert get named to the Biletnikoff Award watch list.

Before arriving at Texas State, Stutzmann had previous coaching stops at Utah Tech, Washington State, Hawaii and others in 20+ years coaching at the collegiate and high school levels.

Immediately prior to being a member of the Bobcats' coaching staff, Stutzmann spent one season at Utah Tech as the offensive coordinator in 2022. He helped the Trailblazers utilize the "Spread-and-Shred" offense and, while they were not eligible for national rankings as they were in their third NCAA Division I transition season, the Trailblazers would have ranked No. 25 in the country in total offense and No. 6 in passing offense. They averaged 425.4 yards per game, including 310.4 passing yards, and scored 28.4 points per contest.

Bobcat receiver Joey Hobert was a consensus FCS All-American within Stutzmann's offense at Utah Tech in 2022. Hobert, who transferred to the program from Washington State, led the nation in receiving yards and touchdown catches and also finished second in the country in receiving yards per game and receptions per game.

Stutzmann also served as a member of the Green Bay Packers Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship program in the summer of 2022.

Stutzmann went to Utah Tech after two seasons at Washington State, where he was the Cougars' co-offensive

coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 2020 to 2021. In his first season, the Cougars were the Pac-12's top red zone offense and had the conference's third-best passing attack.

Prior to his time at Washington State, Stutzmann served in the same role at his alma mater, Hawai'i, from 2016 to 2019. With the Rainbow Warriors, he helped guide them to three bowl games, including a 38-34 victory over BYU in the Hawai'i Bowl in 2019 that helped the team finish with a 10-win season.

Stutzmann helped direct a Hawai'i offense that improved in total offense and passing offense in each of those four seasons, producing the country's ninth-ranked passing offense in 2018, the fifth-rated passing attack in 2019, and an offense that averaged over 30 points a game over that two-year span.

In 2019, Stutzmann was named one of six finalists for the FootballScoop National Quarterback Coach of the Year for his efforts in coaching two-time All-Mountain West Conference quarterback Cole McDonald. McDonald finished third in the nation that season in passing yards (4,135), seventh in passing yards-per-game (295.4), eighth in touchdown passes (33) and was second on the team with seven rushing touchdowns.

In 2018, Stutzmann helped the Hawai'i offense finish ninth in the country in passing offense as McDonald passed for the sixth-most touchdowns (36) and eighthmost yards (3,875) nationally while wide receiver John Ursua led the country with 16 touchdown catches and was fifth in receiving yards (1,343).

Stutzmann helped the Hawaii offense earn 12 All-Mountain West selections in his four seasons, highlighted by Ursua, who was a 2018 Biletnikoff Award Semifinalist and Polynesian Football Hall of Fame College Player of the Year Finalist. He was later selected in the seventh round of the 2019 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks.

Stutzmann had other coaching stops at Emory & Henry College (2014-15) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, Weber State (2012-13) as the wide receivers coach, and Rhodes College (2011) as the wide receivers coach.

Stutzmann began his college coaching career as a graduate assistant at Hawai'i during the 2008 season, which was followed by stints at Portland State (wide receivers coach in 2009) and Memphis (graduate assistant in 2010).

A native of Hawai'i, Stutzmann also coached at Kalaheo High School in Kailua, O'ahu, where he spent the 2003 seasons as a teacher and offensive coordinator before moving on to his alma mater, Saint Louis High School, where he coached for four years (2004-07), including three years as junior varsity head coach. While at Saint Louis, he coached Marcus Mariota, who won the 2014 Heisman Trophy and was the second overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Tennessee Titans.

Stutzmann was a four-year letterwinner and three-year starter at Hawai'i from 1998-2001, where he finished fifth on the school's all-time receiving list (2,025 yards) and was a two-time All-WAC honorable mention selection.

He earned his bachelor's degree in 2002 and master's degree in 2014, both at Hawai'i. He and his wife, Briana, have one son, Baylor. His brother is SJSU senior offensive analyst Billy Ray Stutzmann.

Started 54 games consecutively for Hawai'i (school record) and was the schools only Rimington finalist.

Played in 2007 Sugar Bowl.

Grandfather Pat Hiram and uncle Roy Hiram both played at SJSU and were All-American running backs. Pat led the Spartans in rushing yards, punt return yards and kickoff return yards in 1954.



MICHAEL SMITH Running Backs Coach



Michael Smith comes to San José State in March of 2024 as the running backs coach after one season at Northern Colorado, serving as the Associate Head Coach, Run Game Coordinator, and Running Backs Coach.

Smith came to Northern Colorado after spending four seasons on the Utah Tech Football coaching staff. At Utah Tech, he was the defensive pass game coordinator (2022) and oversaw a talented safety and nickelback group. One defensive back earned first-team all-conference.

In 2021, Smith oversaw one of the most talented and deepest secondary units in the WAC and FCS headlined by safety Tyrell Grayson, who finished the 2021 regular season as the unofficial NCAA D-I FCS leader in solo tackles (79) and led the WAC in total tackles (103). Tyrell made his way to second-team all-conference and HERO Sports Freshman All-American honors.

In the program's first FCS season in the spring of 2021, Smith helped lead a defensive unit that surrendered just 168.8 yards in the air.

In Smith's first season at Utah Tech in 2019, he led the Blazer defensive backs to the RMAC top mark in passing defense, allowing just 193.8 yards per game to go with an opponent completion percentage of 46.7 percent. Three UT defensive backs earned All-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference honors, led by Aaron Simpson, who also earned All-Region honors.

Coming to Utah Tech after spending the 2018 season as a defensive analyst at BYU, Smith helped analyze and break down offensive and defensive coaching strategies, developed assessments and recommendations on athletes' recruitment, and aided in the development of coaching and practice sessions. That year, BYU earned a berth in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, where it claimed a 49-18 win over Western Michigan.

Before his time at BYU, Smith served three years (2015-18) as a football strength and conditioning graduate assistant at Oregon State where, among many duties, he helped coach all concepts of the OSU football strength and conditioning program.

Smith was selected by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the seventh round of the 2012 National Football League draft. He spent two years with the Buccaneers and a short time with the New York Jets before injuries hampered his NFL career. Smith's professional career also included a stint with the Ottawa Redbacks of the Canadian Football

League in 2014, before he retired and turned to coaching.

Smith enjoyed an exceptional career as a running back at Utah State (2009-11), where as a senior in 2011, he led the Western Athletic Conference and ranked third in the NCAA in rushing yards per attempt, averaging 7.6 yards per carry. Smith also helped lead the Aggies to a berth in the 2011 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, USU's first bowl appearance in 14 years. Smith rushed for 157 yards and two touchdowns on just 12 carries, earning game MVP honors.

Before Utah State, Smith earned All-Western States Football League honors as a sophomore at Eastern Arizona College, where he was named EAC Athlete of the Year in 2009. He was also named a team captain at both Eastern Arizona and Utah State.

He earned two bachelor's degrees in Finance and Economics at Utah State in 2012, and a master's degree in Interdisciplinary Studies at Oregon State in 2017. Michael and his wife, Karrie, are the parents of two children – a daughter London, and a son August.



KEVIN MCGIVEN

Wide Receivers Coach
Passing Game Coordinator



Kevin McGiven finished his sixth season in 2023 after he joined the San José State University football coaching staff in February 2018. In 2023, he will be the Spartans passing game coordinator/wide receivers coach after previously being the offensive coordinator. The Spartans have won 31 games and have been to three bowl games over the past four seasons under his guidance while they had only won seven games the three seasons before that

In 2023, as the offensive coordinator, the Spartans ran for 150 yards or more in nine games and surpassed 100 yards in 11 games. The Spartans tallied 313 yards on the ground against No. 25 Fresno State which were the most since Sept. 10, 2016 when they rushed for 409 yards against Portland State. The Spartans also rushed for 259 yards at UNM (10/14) and 251 yards against Utah State (10/21) and that was the first time since 2006 the Spartans had back-to-back 250 plus rushing yard games. The 2,393 rushing yards the Spartans finished the season with are the most for the Spartans this century and only 85 yards behind the SJSU single-season record.

Senior running back Kairee Robinson led the charge for the Spartans finishing with all single-season career-highs in touchdowns (18, SJSU record), yards (1,127), and average per game (102.5). Robinson scored a rushing touchdown in 11 of 12 games played this season. Both Robinson and senior quarterback Chevan Cordeiro made All-Mountain West First Team. Cordeiro's four interceptions were good for seventh in the country and threw the fewest interceptions in the Mountain West. Cordeiro a passer rating of 142.0 which was good for third in the Mountain West. Cordeiro's 140.7 passer rating at SJSU is good for second all-time at SJSU only behind David Fales who had a 161.7 rating.

In 2022, SJSU led the country with only six turnovers during the regular season and +12 overall in the regular season which led the Mountain West Conference. Quarterback Chevan Cordeiro led the Mountain West with 3,251 yards passing and 23 throwing touchdowns. He also led the Mountain West with 31 total touchdowns. The 23 passing touchdowns were the most under Brennan in a season and the nine quarterback rushing touchdowns are a SJSU modern day record. Wide receiver Elijah Cooks ended the campaign with 10 touchdowns which is the most under Brennan and had 1,076 yards on the season. It was the second time under McGiven that a quarterback threw for over 3,000 yards and a wide receiver had over 1,000 yards receiving.

In 2021, the Spartans had 28 touchdowns and 4081 yards and in 2020, he helped lead Nick Starkel and the Spartans to a Mountain West Championship with 2174 yards passing and 17 touchdowns in only eight games. The Spartans ended the 2020 season ranked 24 in the AP poll.

He has nurtured the college careers of quarterbacks Josh Love, the 2019 Mountain West Offensive Player of the Year, and Starkel, the 2020 Mountain West football championship game Most Valuable Offensive Player and a second-team all-conference selection. In the national rankings, San Jose State was fourth in passing offense

in 2019 and 19th in the same category in its 2020 championship season.

McGiven has 16 seasons of experience coaching quarterbacks and coordinating NCAA Division I offenses.

Throughout his career, he coached three of the top six passing yardage signal callers at Utah State (Chuckie Keeton, Kent Myers, Diondre Borel), and the career passing yardage leaders at Montana State (Denarius McGhee) and Weber State (Cameron Higgins).

McGiven began his coaching career in 1998 at Louisiana Tech as a student assistant coach after being a wide receiver on the 1996 and 1997 Bulldog teams. He accepted an assistant coaching position in 2001 at Mountain View High in Orem, Utah, and returned to the college ranks in 2002 as a graduate assistant on the Brigham Young University staff.

MIKE JUDGE Associate Head Goach Defensive Coordinator



Mike Judge joined SJSU in 2024 after being an offensive assistant with the Miami Dolphins of the NFL since 2019. He started his career with the New England Patriots in 2005 and 2006.

He was a quality control coach from 2019-20, assistant tight ends coach in 2021 and assisted the personnel department in 2022.

The Dolphins have posted winning seasons (2020-22) in three of Judge's four years with the team, including a playoff appearance in 2022.

As assistant tight ends coach, Judge worked closely with a unit that broke franchise tight end records in back-to-back seasons with a combined 122 receptions for 1,271 yards in 2021. Mike Gesicki's 73 receptions matched the single-season franchise record for a tight end (73, Randy McMichael, 2004) and ranked fifth among all NFL tight ends that year. Gesicki's 780 receiving yards were just 11 shy of the team tight ends record.

Judge helped the Dolphins win 10 games in 2020. It was the team's first 10-win season since 2016. Judge worked closely with the tight ends, who, at the time, had the most productive season by a tight end unit in franchise history. Gesicki, Durham Smythe and Adam Shaheen combined for 91 receptions and 1,061 yards, both team records for the tight end unit. Their 11 receiving touchdowns tied for the most by a tight end group in Dolphins history.

In Judge's first season in Miami in 2019, he helped the Dolphins win five of their final nine contests. Miami defeated two division champions in the final month of the season, knocking off Philadelphia of the NFC East in Week 13 and finishing the season with a road win at the AFC East champion New England Patriots

Prior to Miami, Judge spent 11 seasons (2008-18) at the Naval Academy, where he coached fullbacks. During his tenure, the Midshipmen went 87-57 (.604), beat Army eight times, earned nine bowl bids, won five bowl games and won five Commander-In-Chief's Trophies.

In 2017, Navy set a school record averaging 351.4 rushing yards per game, which ranked second in FBS. The team capped off the season with a 49-7 win over Virginia in the Military Bowl.

Navy went 7-1 in the American Athletic Conference in 2016 and played in the conference championship game. The Midshipmen made their 13th bowl appearance in the previous 14 seasons and their nine total wins tied for the fifth-most in program history. Navy's offense set school records for points (531), touchdowns (73), touchdowns per game (5.2), rushing touchdowns (61), total offense (6,136 yards) and yards per play (6.8) despite playing four

different quarterbacks

In 2015, Navy won a school-record 11 games, won their 10th bowl game in school history and finished in the top 25 of both major polls. In their first season playing in a conference, the Midshipmen won a share of the AAC West Division. Judge helped fullback Chris Swain earn second-team all-conference honors after he rushed for 1,023 yards.

Prior to Navy, Judge spent one season (2007) at Harvard coaching wide receivers. He was part of the New England Patriots' coaching staff as a defensive assistant in 2005 and an offensive assistant in 2006.

Judge was an option quarterback at Springfield College, where he was a four-year letterwinner (2001-04) in football and baseball. During his collegiate career, he interned with the Patriots.

Judge and his wife, Jennifer, have two sons, Brecken and Kagan, and a daughter, Kinsley.

GREG BURNS Cornerbacks Goach



Greg Burns joined San José State in 2024. Burns comes from UCLA where he was on the coaching staff since 2021 as a defensive analyst. Burns has been a defensive backs coach for over 20 years, including recent duties on staff at not only UCLA, but Oregon State in 2018, USC in 2019 and in 2020 at Arizona.

Prior to that, Burns spent three seasons (2014-16) at California. He was at Massachusetts in 2013 and also served that season as a co-defensive coordinator in the Senior Bowl. He spent the 2012 campaign at Purdue, which played in the Heart of Dallas Bowl.

Burns was at Arizona State for four seasons (2008-11) during which time the Sun Devils led the Pac-10 in pass defense in 2009. ASU played in the 2011 Las Vegas Bowl. Before that, he spent the 2007 season at Kansas State.

In 2006, Burns worked in the NFL, with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, where he coached Pro Bowl selection Ronde Barber.

Burns spent four years at USC during his first stint (2002-05) with the Trojans. USC finished atop the Pac-10 each season, went to a couple of Rose Bowls and two Orange Bowls while capturing national titles in 2003 and 2004. Troy Polamalu and Darnell Bing were frst-team All-America selections and NFL draft picks. while Will Poole was a first-team All-Pac-10 pick. USC was ranked ninth nationally in pass efficiency defense in 2004. In all, he coached 10 future NFL players in his first stint at USC ---Polamalu, Bing, Poole, Terrell Thomas, Eric Wright, Kevin Thomas, Cary Harris, Kevin Ellison, John Walker and William Buchanon.

Burns handled the cornerbacks at Louisville from 1998-2001. The Cardinals were ranked 18th nationally in pass efficiency defense and totaled 20 interceptions in 2001 (the team went 11-2 and won the Liberty Bowl). In 2000, Louisville led the nation in interceptions (27) and was 20th in pass efficiency defense. Anthony Floyd (2000-01) and Antonio Roundtree (1998) earned first-team All-Conference USA honors. Louisville also played in the 1998 Motor City Bowl, the 1999 Humanitarian Bowl and the 2000 Liberty Bowl.

In 1997, Burns served as the cornerbacks coach at the University of Idaho, as the Vandals intercepted 13 passes. In 1996, he was an academic counselor at Washington State.

Burns was a four-year letterman (1991-93, 1995) and twoyear starter as a defensive back at Washington State, earning All-Pac-10 honorable mention honors in 1992 when the Cougars won the Copper Bowl. He had nine career interceptions, with five coming in 1992 (including two against USC). He missed the 1994 season and part of the 1995 season due to injury.

Brother, Dexter, played football for the Spartans in the 1990's.

BOJAY **FILIMOEATU**

Inside Linebackers Coach Run Game Coordinator



Bojay Filimoeatu joins the San José State football staff for the 2024 season. He comes from San Diego State where he coached two seasons as the defensive line coach. Filimoeatu (BO-jay FEElee-moe-EE-ah-tu) joined SDSU in 2023.

In his lone season coaching at San Diego State, Filimoeatu's linemen contributed to the Aztecs' 48 total tackles for loss including 18 sacks. Leading that group was Garret Fountain, who finished his move from linebacker to defensive end and surpassed the century mark with 104 tackles, including 17 TFL.

A former Broyles Award nominee for the best assistant coach in college football, Filimoeatu came to The Mesa with seven years of collegiate experience, including five in the Mountain West.

In his one season at UNLV in 2022, Filimoeatu guided Adam Plant Jr. and Eliel Ehimare to all-MW honors. Plant Jr. earned second-team accolades after recording 62 tackles, and team highs of 13.5 tackles for loss, eight sacks, and three forced fumbles. Plant Jr.'s best game arguably came against the Aztecs at Snapdragon Stadium on Nov. 5 when he totaled seven tackles (all solo), three tackles for loss and a pair of sacks. Ehimare, meanwhile, had two sacks and two tackles for loss in 2022 en route to earning honorablemention status.

Filimoeatu also has stints at Weber State (2021), Utah State (2019-20), San José State (2017-18) and Oregon State (2016).

Filimoeatu helped WSU in the spring 2021 campaign to a 5-1 record and 5-0 Big Sky mark for its first outright league title in program history. The Wildcats were ranked as high as second in the nation during the season.

Prior to Weber State, Filimoeatu spent two seasons at his alma mater Utah State, where he coached four Aggie defensive linemen to all-MW accolades in 2019 and the outside linebackers in 2020.

Before joining USU, Filimoeatu coached the SJSU linebackers for two years (2017-18) as Ethan Aguayo was a MW honorable mention pick in 2018 with 106 tackles. In 2017, Frank Ginda became just the second Spartan linebacker to earn first-team all-MW honors when he established a single-season conference record with 173 tackles, currently the 10th most in a season in FBS history. Filimoeatu was a Broyles Award nominee in 2017.

Filimoeatu began his coaching career at Oregon State in

2016 as a quality control defensive coach.

As a player, Filimoeatu was a two-year starting linebacker at Utah State in 2011 and 2012, where he helped lead the Aggies to a pair of bowl games and the 2012 Western Athletic Conference title.

Filimoeatu graduated from Utah State in 2012 with an interdisciplinary studies degree with an emphasis in sociology and physical education. Prior to Utah State, he played two seasons at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, California.

Filimoeatu spent the 2014 season in the NFL with the Oakland Raiders, where he had eight tackles in eight games.

AL LAPUAHO Defensive Line Coach



Al Lapuaho joined the San José State coaching staff in 2024 after two years coaching the defensive line at Nevada.

Last season, Lapuaho oversaw a group that featured defensive tackle Dom Peterson, who was named to the All-Mountain West Second Team. Peterson led the Pack defense in sacks (6.0) and tackles-for-loss (13.0), in addition to fumble recoveries, with his three sharing the Mountain West lead.

Peterson led a defensive line which also featured Dion Washington, James Hansen, and Thomas Witte, among others, which played a key role in the Wolf Pack ranking 43rd nationally and fourth in the Mountain West in tacklesfor-loss (6.3 per game). The quartet of Peterson, Washington, Hansen, and Witte combined for 25.0 of the Pack's 76 on



the season. the unit also made five of the Pack's eight fumble recoveries, a figure that ranked second in the Mountain West.

In 2021, Lapuaho (pronounced Lah-poo-ah-ho) was a full-time assistant for the first time in his career, helping Utah State win the MW title while going 11-3 and finishing No. 24 in the final AP Top 25. The Aggies ranked sixth in the nation in tackles for loss per game (7.9) and 60th in sacks per game (2.29). Utah State allowed 161.9 rushing yards per game, 84th in the country.

During his two seasons working with the Aggies' defensive line, Lapuaho helped Utah State play in consecutive bowl games. He also mentored three Aggies who earned honorable mention all-Mountain West honors in Adewale Adeoye, Fua Leilua and Christopher 'Unga.

Lapuaho spent the last four seasons on Utah State's staff, including two as a defensive graduate assistant (2018-19) and one as a strength and conditioning graduate assistant (2020) before being elevated to defensive line coach last season. He also served as a defensive graduate assistant at Oregon State from 2016-17. Prior to joining the staff at Oregon State, Lapuaho worked as an account/capacity manager for England Logistics.

During the 2018 season at Utah State, Lapuaho helped the Aggies to a school-record-tying 11 victories and a 52-13 win against North Texas in the New Mexico Bowl. USU finished the season with an 11-2 record, including a 7-1 mark in the Mountain West, and was ranked 22nd in the final Associated Press poll. That season, USU set 36 school records and tied six others.

Lapuaho came to Utah State after spending the 2016 and 2017 seasons as a defensive graduate assistant at Oregon State, where he worked specifically with the defensive line. Prior to joining the staff at Oregon State, Lapuaho worked as an account/capacity manager for England Logistics.

The native of West Valley City, Utah, earned first-team allconference honors at Snow College before making his way to Utah State, where he spent his junior and senior seasons in 2011 and 2012.

During his two seasons at Utah State, Lapuaho helped Utah State snap a 14-year bowl drought as the team played in consecutive bowl games for just the second time in school history. USU also won the 2012 WAC title, its first outright league championship since 1936, as it finished the year with a school-record 11 wins after posting a 41-15 victory against Toledo in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. USU concluded the 2012 season ranked 16th in the final Associated Press poll, 17th in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll and 22nd in the final BCS standings.

After graduating from Utah State with an interdisciplinary studies degree emphasizing in psychology and physical education, Lapuaho signed an NFL free agent contract with the St. Louis Rams. During the 2013 NFL campaign, he spent time on the practice squad for both the Rams and Miami Dolphins. Lapuaho then joined the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2014 and was on their preseason roster. He also played one season for the Colorado Crush of the Indoor Football League.

A graduate of Chapman University in Orange, Calif., Irvin played for the Panthers from 2011 to 2013 and served as a team captain before joining the coaching staff as defensive backs coach.

Garrett Wolfe joins San José State as Assistant Athletics Director for Football Operations in February of 2024. He comes from Stanford where he was the Director of Football Operations since January 2023.

Prior to Stanford, Wolfe spent four seasons as Director of Football Operations and Assistant Athletic Director for Football Administration at Sacramento State.

Serves as a representative on the National Director of Football Operations Committee.

Wolfe spent four previous seasons at Stanford (2015-18) and finished his tenure as the Assistant Director of Recruiting Operations.

Wolfe was critical at Stanford in revamping the football program's academic & athletic evaluation protocols leading to three national top-20 recruiting classes in that time.

During his first stint at Stanford, the Cardinal captured the 2015 Pac-12 and Rose Bowl Game Championships, two Sun Bowl Championships (2016, 2018), a Pac-12 North Division title (2017) and a trip to the Alamo Bowl (2017).

At Sacramento State (2019-22), Wolfe played a pivotal off-the-field role with the team where his numerous tasks included budgeting, travel planning, alumni relations, fundraising, and managing football's support stuff.

One of his major initiatives with the program was to reconnect the alumni to the new staff and players.

Wolfe, with the help of some key alumni, helped reestablish The Huddle to centralize alumni outreach and fundraising support and created an honorary captain program which allowed an alum to speak to the team the night before each game and take part in all gameday activities.

Wolfe also helped advance the technology used by the staff and players.

He implemented the use of Teamworks for scheduling and communication, helped onboard players with INFLCR for social media outreach, made the team the first FCS program to sign with Pro Football Focus and worked closely with Kissick Family Director of Sports Performance Ryan Deatrick (formerly Assistant A.D./Sports Performance at Sacramento State) to sign a deal with Catapult to help track on field performance metrics.

Behind the scenes, Wolfe helped increase revenue through the team's Rising Stars Mega Camp which brings thousands of high school players to campus during the summer. He also worked closely with the Recreation, Parks, and Tourism Administration department to create two graduate assistant football coach positions.

Prior to working at Stanford the first time, Wolfe served as the Director of Football Operations at Portland State in 2014.

While with the Vikings, Wolfe was responsible for the dayto-day operations of the program, including team travel, NFL liaison, football camps and clinics management, recruiting, and assisting the coaches with administration of the program.

Wolfe began his career in football with a pair of jobs in Sacramento. He worked as the Video Coordinator for the Sacramento Mountain Lions of the United Football League and was also the Assistant Director of Football Operations at Sacramento State from 2011-13.

He also worked for ACS Athletics as their football liaison on the customer success team. ACS provided database support for athletics programs in compliance, recruiting, and team management.

- A native of Folsom, California, Wolfe earned a degree in kinesiology with an emphasis in sports management from The University of Texas in 2010. He followed that with an internship with Octagon Football, a full-service NFL Agency.






