Mostly Ghostly have written a collection of children's stories especially for the Festival, and aim to create a magical atmosphere where young people can experience the joy of interactive storytelling.




Friday 23rd | 5 - 6pm Art Exhibition Launch

Mythical Landscape: Secrets of the Vale

Inspired by William Wilson's 1904 book, Folk Lore and Genealogies of Uppermost Nithsdale, "Mythical Landscape: Secrets of the Vale" is an exhibition by an international group of artists, all of whom travelled to Sanquhar to investigate a sense of place and make artwork that speaks to the rich history and folklore of the region.

Artworks reference stories from the past (true or otherwise), consider the history of the region, and speculate on future myths and legends. An evolving exhibition at MERZ Gallery will culminate with the Festival of Folklore. The outdoor artwork, My Own Best Ghost, by EveNSteve will be displayed until the end of September on the exterior wall of MERZ.

Visitors are encouraged to bring in folklore-related finds to the Museum to help us record how people in Upper Nithsdale, and beyond, protected their homes.





'Up the Middle Road': Stories from the Crichton Royal Asylum

Presented by Dr Valentina Bold

Based on an oral history project that spanned the pandemic, this June a series of performances were held in the Crichton estate, Dumfries. Based on the memories of former patients and staff, they combined touring with new songs and stories inspired by lived experiences.

There was a learning picnic for schools, combining storytelling and artistic interpretation, and an exhibition with quotations from the almost forty people recorded as part of the project. All of this was part of 2022 Scotland's Year of Stories. This session will discuss the creative processes involved in generating new stories and songs, in traditional styles, from real life experiences, remaining respectful to what we had been told.

'Up the Middle Road' was developed collaboratively by Dr. Bold, Kathleen Cronie, Emily Smith, Jamie McClennan Amanda Edmiston, Julie Stephen and Apprentices Zephyra Durkin and Daniel Heinrich.


