



# **MEET THE MAKERS**



Our island communities have long been renowned for their resourcefulness, creativity and skill. Historically, islands were almost entirely self-reliant, depending exclusively on what they could make, grow and produce locally.

This resilience has continued into the modern-day, with island communities having a wealth of talent and skill, inspiring arts and crafts.

With a rich landscape and diverse heritage and culture, Scotland's islands attract craft makers, artists, and designers producing paintings, sculptures, textiles, ceramics, jewellery, photos, soaps, candles, and more.

Bound by the sea and inspired by landscapes of sweeping hills, secluded beaches and rugged cliffs shaped by the powerful Atlantic Ocean, our





Amongst our stunning landscapes it's tempting to sugar-coat the past and view our islands through rose-tinted spectacles. But our built heritage also reflects the harder side of island life through the ages - with an historic reliance on subsistence farming, fishing and industries like kelp to eke out a meagre living. Some islands also still bear the scars of the Clearances and mass emigration in the ruins of abandoned villages and decaying infrastructure.

The islands you visit today were built on the self-reliant innovation of past

generations, characteristics many of our present-day islanders have inherited.
Their built heritage maps the stories and cultural development of these places, and we hope that this travelogue will encourage you to learn more about our incredible island communities and the people who shaped them.

This travelogue is not a comprehensive guide – think of it as more of a window to peer through, and an invitation to open the door and explore our islands' fascinating places of worship, work, home and community.

COLLECT STAMPS!



# **EDAY**



Eday is an island that is almost forgotten by those experiencing Orkney; sitting in the heart of the North Isles, Eday has a little bit of everything, from sweeping beaches and incredible cliffs to archaeological gems and heather-clad moorland, all set within an 8 mile long island. Eday is fantastic for walking and cycling.

# **FAMOUS FOR**

- ★ The Setter Stone is a 4.5 metre monolith, the highest sole standing stone in Orkney.
- ⋆ Orkney's infamous pirate, John Gow, washed up on the island and was imprisoned at Carrick House, the laird's summer residence.
- Eday is the base for an innovative tidal and wave energy company.

## ASK AN ISLANDER

- Dedicated local submarine enthusiast Mike Illet painstakingly reconstructed the O-Class submarine at The Old Schoolroom.
- ★ Eday is a fantastic place to spot wildlife. Keep your eyes on the skies and seas to watch for their resident snowy owls and the occasional passing orca. Enjoy the birdwatching opportunities at Red Head and from the Bird Hide on Mill Loch.

# **WANDERING OUR ISLANDS**

- \* With 10 square miles to explore, Eday is fantastic to cycle through, stopping off at various points to enjoy the wildlife and scenery of this beautiful island, including the Heritage Centre, where you can enjoy the displays and fuel up with tea and coffee!
- \* Enjoy Eday's 10 km Heritage Walk, which takes you through the island's colourful history from the Neolithic to the Norse period. This walk takes in the impressive Stone of Setter, the Vinquoy Chambered Cairn and the scenery of Red Head and Carrick House.



Scottish Citylink (citylink.co.uk) operates coach travel between major hubs and most ferry ports in Scotland. Many ports are also accessible by train (scotrail.co.uk). Traveline Scotland provides public transport information to help you plan your trip.

## BY PLANE

You can fly to the following islands in this travelogue with Loganair (loganair.co.uk) or Hebridean Air (hebrideanair.co.uk)

# MAINLAND ORKNEY, SOUTH RONALDSAY, SANDAY & WESTRAY

Loganair operates flights to Kirkwall Airport from Glasgow, Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Inverness and Sumburgh. An inter-island ferry service operates to Westray & Sanday. South Ronaldsay is accessed via causeway.

# MAINLAND SHETLAND & UNST

Loganair operates flights to Sumburgh Airport from Glasgow, Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Inverness, Manchester, Bergen and Kirkwall, Orkney. From Mainland Shetland, an inter-island ferry service operates to Unst.

# BARRA, BENBECULA, ISLAY, LEWIS, TIREE

Loganair operates flights for Barra, Islay and Tiree from Glasgow, and for Lewis\* with flights to Stornoway from Glasgow, Edinburgh, Inverness and Benbecula\*. Benbecula also has flights to Glasgow and Inverness. Hebridean Air will operate flights from Stornoway to Benbecula from early 2024.

# TIREE, ISLAY, COLONSAY

Hebridean Air operate flights between Tiree, Colonsay

\* Once you arrive in Lewis or Benbecula, it is possible to cross to Scalpay by road bridge or South Uist by causeway.
