All-Time Series: UCLA leads 21-1-1

UCLA leads the series, which dates back to 1922, by a count of 21-1-1. This is the first meeting in San Diego since 2005.

THE MATCHUP

The Bruins, who have compiled a 13-4 record in their most recent 17 outings, will take to the road for a matchup with San Diego State (2-0) Saturday. UCLA is looking for its fifth straight non-conference regular-season win in the contest and its first non-conference regular-season road win since the 2016 campaign. After last week's season-opening victory against Coastal Carolina, the Bruins have won their past seven games played in the month of September.

The Bruins have not played the Aztecs in San Diego since the 2005 season. SDSU notched its first win of the series in the most recent meeting of the two teams, a 24-13 decision at Rose Bowl Stadium in 2019.

Saturday's battle with the Aztecs will be televised by CBS, with coverage beginning at 4:30 p.m. PT. The Bruin IMG Radio Network will broadcast the contest, which will also be aired over SiriusXM and the Varsity App.

The Bruins opened the 2023 season with a 27-13 win over Coastal Carolina Sept. 2. It marked the third straight season-opening win for UCLA and the third straight season opener in which the Bruins limited their opponent to fewer than 20 points.

MEET THE BRUINS

Sixth-year head coach Chip Kelly took the reins of UCLA's program Nov. 25, 2017. Kelly owns a collegiate head-coaching record of 74-36, compiled across five-plus seasons at UCLA and four at Oregon.

UCLA has added two new assistant coaches to head coach Chip Kelly's staff for 2023: defensive coordinator D'Anton Lynn and cornerbacks coach Kodi Whitfield. In addition, Ikaika Malloe will now coach all players along the defensive line and Ken Norton Jr. will lead the linebackers. Brian Norwood will guide the Bruin safeties. Transfers from four-year schools who have joined the 2023 team include: RB Anthony Adkins (Army West Point), DB Jordan Anderson (Bowling Green), WR Kyle Ford (USC), K Blake Glessner (Montana State), DL Jake Heimlicher (Pennsylvania), OL Spencer Holstege (Purdue), OL Khadere Kounta (Old Dominion), TE Moliki Mataavao (Oregon), LB Oluwafemi Oladejo (California), RB Minaya Olivo (Montana State), P Will Powers (Princeton), QB Collin Schlee (Kent State), WR J.Michael Sturdivant (California), LS Salem Wahab (Northern Colorado), OL Jake Wiley (Colorado) and DL Keanu Williams (Oregon).

SERIES HISTORY

The Bruins and the Aztecs have met 23 times on the gridiron, with UCLA holding a 21-1-1 advantage. This is the first meeting held in San Diego since 2005. San Diego State won the most recent meeting of the teams, a 23-14 decision at Rose Bowl Stadium in 2019. UCLA had won the previous 19 meetings, with a tie in the 1924 contest, after opening the series with wins in 1923 and 1922. The Bruins own an 8-0-1 edge in series games played in San Diego.

AT A GLANCE

- UCLA has not played at San Diego State since a win in the 2005 season. This is the first UCLA road regular-season non-conference game played since the 2019 season, when the Bruins lost at Cincinnati to open the campaign. UCLA's most recent non-conference road victory came at BYU (17-14) in 2016. Since that win, the Bruins have lost at Memphis in 2017, at Oklahoma in 2018 and to the Bearcats in 2019. UCLA did not play non-conference opponents on the road the following three seasons.
- UCLA has won six of its past seven regular-season non-conference matchups and most recent four, including its season-opening win versus Coastal Carolina. UCLA recorded a non-conference sweep of its non-conference regular-season games in 2022, which was the first time it had done so since 2015.
- UCLA is 13-4 overall in its past 17 games dating back to the 2021 season, 8-2 in its past 10 true road games and now 11-5 at Rose Bowl Stadium the past two-plus seasons.
- UCLA had a road record of 3-1 in 2022 and won its final two such games at California (Nov. 25) and Arizona State (Nov. 5).
- The Bruins have now won their past seven September games played since Sept. 25, 2021.
- In his 11-plus seasons as a coach at UCLA (five-plus as head coach) and Oregon (four as head coach and two as assistant coach), Chip Kelly has had seven of his teams rank among the nation's top 25 in total offense. Kelly has had eight rushers on his teams rank among the nation's top 15. Nine of those teams have rated among the top 20 in the nation in scoring average.
- Quarterback Ethan Garbers, who made his second career start against CCU, played 32 snaps and threw one scoring pass. He totaled 121 passing yards. Dante Moore came off the bench in the second quarter and took 30 snaps, connecting on consecutive passes for two scores through the air, albeit a quarter apart, as the first came in the second quarter and the second was in the fourth. He totaled 143 passing yards in the win.
- WR J.Michael Sturdivant recorded his second career 100-yard receiving day and first as a Bruin, hauling in five passes for 136 yards that included a 62-yard scoring toss from Moore.
- The Bruins forced three turnovers by CCU, which tied last year's UCLA single-game season high. A Bruin team most recently recorded more than three takeaways in a game at Washington State during the 2019 campaign (six). UCLA also turned the ball over three times to the Chanticleers and won -- a first since 2019, when the Bruins lost three fumbles at Arizona State.
- In 2022's four losses, UCLA committed 11 turnovers and forced two.

MOST RECENT MEETING

San Diego State quarterback Ryan Agnew passed for 293 yards and a touchdown, Matt Araiza kicked three field goals and the Aztecs defeated UCLA 23-14 for their first result over the Bruins. The difference in the game was time of possession and turnovers. The Aztecs controlled the ball for 38:16 and scored 10 points off a pair of UCLA turnovers.

UCLA took the early lead when Joshua Kelley ran into the end zone from five yards out, but SDSU answered on its next possession with a 14-play touchdown drive that lasted more than seven minutes. The Aztecs moved in front 10-7 during the final minute of the first quarter on a 43-yard field goal after a Bruin fumble. SDSU then took a 10-point lead with 12:50 remaining in the third quarter when Agnew tossed a 36-yard touchdown. That touchdown came two plays after the Aztecs recovered Dorian Thompson-Robinson's fumble.

UCLA tight end Greg Dulcich brought the Bruins within 17-14 midway through the third quarter when he caught a 20-yard scoring strike from Thompson-Robinson. That would be as close as they would get though, as Araiza added a pair of field goals. Thompson-Robinson completed 24 of 35 passes for 191 yards and a touchdown. Kelley had 57 yards and a touchdown on 14 carries.

TEAM NOTES

- UCLA is 46-10-2 in games played against teams that currently comprise the Mountain West Conference.
- UCLA ran 60 plays in its win against Coastal Carolina. That is the fewest number of plays in a game run by the Bruins since the 2021 team totaled 53 in a loss to Fresno State. UCLA had most recently run 60 plays or fewer and won a game in 2017 against Hawai'i (55 plays).
- UCLA has now won 11 straight games when giving up less than 100 yards rushing. The Bruins gave up 56 rushing yards to Coastal Carolina. The Bruins held five 2022 opponents to fewer than 100 yards rushing (California - 67, Washington - 65, Colorado - 51, Alabama State - 87 and Bowling Green - 37). The Bruins also held five opponents to fewer than 100 yards rushing in 2021 (Cal - 92, UW - 83, Stanford - 67, LSU - 49 and Hawai'i - 26).

• The following defensive players made their first career starts as Bruins in the season opener against CCU: OLB Laiatu Latu, S Kamari Ramsey and DL Keanu Williams. The following offensive players started for the first time as Bruins versus the Chanticleers: OG Josh Carlin, OT Bruno Fina, WR Kyle Ford (two at USC), OG Spencer Holstege (31 at Purdue), RB Carson Steele (19 at Ball State) and WR J.Michael Sturdivant (12 at California).

• One true freshman, QB Dante Moore, saw action in the opener against CCU.
 • Players who saw their first action as Bruins against CCU were RB Anthony Adkins, S Jordan Anderson, WR Kyle Ford, K Blake Glessner, DL Jake Heimlicher, OG Spencer Holstege, OT Khadere Kounta, TE Moliki Matavao, QB Dante Moore, LB Oluwafemi Oladejo, P Will Powers, RB Carson Steele, WR J.Michael Sturdivant, OG Jake Wiley and DL Keanu Williams.

• UCLA has advanced to secure a bowl bid in each of the past eight seasons it has opened with a win: 2022, 2021, 2017, 2015, 2014, 2013, 2012 and 2009.

• The Bruins have now won their past seven September games played since Sept. 25, 2021.

• After rushing for a total of 153 yards against CCU with no ground scores, UCLA has registered at least one rushing touchdown in 33 of its past 35 games. It also failed to record a rushing touchdown in 2022 against South Alabama, snapping a streak of 23 straight games with at least one rushing score. It went on to record a rushing score in the final 10 games of the 2022 season.

• The coaching staff features three former Bruin players: DeShaun Foster (associate head coach and running backs), Jerry Neuheisel (wide receivers) and Ken Norton Jr. (linebackers).

• Foster UCLA playing career highlights: led Pac-12 in rushing in 2001 ... first Bruin to reach 1,000-yard rushing mark in as few as seven games ... then-school record 301 rushing yards in game versus Washington in 2001 ... school-record tying 42 carries in win against Alabama in 2000 ... UCLA freshman-record 673 rushing yards in 1998.

• Neuheisel UCLA playing career highlights: led 2014 comeback win against Texas in AT&T Stadium.

• Norton UCLA playing career highlights: started at linebacker on 1984-87 UCLA teams that went 36-10-2 ... team's leading tackler in 1987 and 1986 ... team won four straight bowl games: 1987 Aloha Bowl, 1986 Freedom Bowl, 1986 Rose Bowl and 1985 Fiesta Bowl ... ranked eighth on all-time UCLA tackles list.

• UCLA had a fourth-quarter lead in all but two games last season: versus USC, a 48-45 loss; and at Oregon, a 45-30 loss.

• The Bruins rose as high as No. 9 in the 2022 AP Top 25 after beginning the season unranked. It marked UCLA's high point in the AP poll since 2015 when it peaked at No. 7.

• UCLA school records set in 2022: most offensive yards (6,547), highest offensive yards per game average (503.6), highest completion percentage (.695), fewest punts (27), most points (510) and most total first downs (334).

• UCLA reached the 6,000-yard mark in total offense for just the fourth time in school history in 2022. Its 6,531 yards in 2012 represented the old school record. It had most recently reached the 6,000-yard mark for a season in 2015 (6,055).

• UCLA (3,084) surpassed the 3,000-yard mark in rushing offense in 2022 for just the fifth time in school history. UCLA had most recently reached the 3,000-yard mark for a season in 1976 (3,978).

• The 2022 season was the seventh out of nine that a team with Chip Kelly at the helm has averaged better than 200 yards rushing for a season. It was the fourth time one of his head-coached teams has ranked among the top 10 rush offenses.

• UCLA led the Pac-12 in rushing in 2022 for the first time since 1976. The Bruins averaged 7.01 yards per play last season, the highest mark in school history.

• The 2022 Bruins finished with a spot in the AP Top 25 (No. 21) for the first time since 2014 (No. 10). UCLA was ranked each week during November, a program first since 2014.

• UCLA was listed No. 18 in the final College Football Playoff rankings Dec. 4, 2022. It was the program's 16th appearance in the rankings. The highest UCLA has ever been placed in the CFP rankings is No. 8 (Nov. 25, 2014).

• UCLA has earned a spot in a bowl game in each of the past 12 seasons in which it has won its first two games of a season: 2022, 2021, 2017, 2015, 2014, 2013, 2012, 2009, 2007, 2006, 2005 and 2002.

• This season will mark the seventh straight UCLA has opened Pac-12 play on the road (at Utah Sept. 23): won at Colorado in 2022, won at Stanford in 2021, lost at CU in 2020, won at WSU in 2019, lost at CU in 2018 and lost at Stanford in 2017.

• Next up: UCLA hosts North Carolina Central (1-0) which has won its past six games. The Eagles defeated Jackson State, coached by Deion "Coach Prime" Sanders, in 2022's Cricket Celebration Bowl to win their fourth HBCU national championship. NCCU defeated Winston-Salem State 47-21 to open the 2023 campaign.

ON OFFENSE

• WR J.Michael Sturdivant recorded his second career 100-yard receiving game, pulling down five catches for 136 yards, against Coastal Carolina. In 2022, while at California, he had 104 receiving yards on six catches against Washington. All five of Sturdivant's catches against CCU resulted in first downs and three were third-down receptions.

• Longest starting streaks on offense: C Duke Clemens has started the past 22 games; OT Garrett DiGiorgio is next at 14.

- WR Kyle Ford (USC transfer), WR J. Michael Sturdivant (Cal transfer), WR Ryan Cragun (three games in 2022) and RB Carson Steele (Ball State) each caught his first pass as a Bruin in the CCU game.
- WR Logan Loya leads UCLA pass catchers with a reception in seven consecutive games.
- Carsen Ryan, who played in five 2022 games as a true freshman, caught a 21-yard scoring toss from Ethan Garbers in the opening quarter against CCU for his first career touchdown.
- True-freshman signal caller Dante Moore threw scoring passes on two consecutive attempts against CCU – a 14-yard strike to Steele in the second quarter and a 62-yard toss to Sturdivant in the fourth quarter. The UCLA school record for most touchdown passes in a game by a true freshman is three, shared by Josh Rosen (2015 against Cal and Virginia) and Cade McNown (1995 against Kansas).
- RB Zach Charbonnet, now with the Seattle Seahawks, rushed for more than 1,000 yards in each of the past two seasons. UCLA most recently had a 1,000-yard rusher across at least three straight seasons in 1997 (Skip Hicks - 1,282), 1996 (Hicks - 1,034), 1995 (Karim Abdul-Jabbar - 1,571) and 1994 (Abdul-Jabbar - 1,227).
- Sturdivant ranked eighth in the Pac-12 in receptions per game (5.42) and 10th in reception yards per game (62.92) while at Cal in 2022. He made 65 catches with seven scoring grabs in 2022.
- Steele led the Mid-American Conference and ranked eighth nationally in rushing yards per game (129.7) at Ball State in 2022. He was ninth in the NCAA with 1,556 rushing yards (289 carries).
- UCLA compiled nine 200-yard rushing games in 2022, which was the most since the 1995 squad also produced nine.

ON DEFENSE

- UCLA held Coastal Carolina scoreless on the visitor's final six possessions of the game, including three forced turnovers — fumble, downs, interception, punt, missed field goal and interception.
- OLB Laiatu Latu tied his career high with three sacks (also last season at Colorado) in the opener against CCU. He also forced a fumble. Latu registered a total of 10.5 sacks in 2022. The UCLA player who most recently totaled 20 or more sacks over a two-season period was Anthony Barr, who logged 10 in 2013 and 13.5 in 2012. Latu recorded at least one sack in eight games during the 2022 campaign.
- Latu rated eighth in the NCAA with a 0.81 sacks-per-game average in 2022 and his total of 10.5 sacks for the season, was the most by a Bruin player since Anthony Barr was credited with 13.5 in 2012.
- CB Jaylin Davies made his first interception of the season and the fourth of his Bruin career in the third quarter. Davies led UCLA last season with three thefts.
- CB John Humphrey made his first career interception in the fourth quarter against CCU.
- LB Darius Muasau led the team with nine tackles against CCU. In 2022, he topped the Bruins in total tackles with 91 (10th in the Pac-12 with 7.0 per game). He had a season-high 14 stops in the Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl against Pittsburgh (also had 12 tackles at Arizona State and 10 against South Alabama). Muasau had 14 total games with 10 or more stops over his final two seasons playing for Hawai'i.
- Defensive trends ... Rushing Defense: 2023 - 56.0, 2022 - 130.3, 2021 - 124.2, 2020 - 135.7, 2019 - 145.5, 2018 - 199.4 and 2017 - 287.4; Rushing Yards Per Carry: 2023 - 1.6, 2022 - 3.8, 2021 - 3.8, 2020 - 3.6, 2019 - 4.3, 2018 - 4.6 and 2017 - 5.8; Yards Per Play: 2023 - 4.5, 2022 - 5.6, 2021 - 5.5, 2020 - 5.4, 2019 - 6.7, 2018 - 6.0 and 2017 - 6.3.
- Longest starting streaks on defense: LB Darius Muasau and DL Gabriel Murphy have each started the past 14 straight games. DL Jay Toia is next with nine consecutive starts.
- UCLA has won 45 straight games overall and 64 straight regular-season games in which it has held its opponent to fewer than 20 points. Its most recent loss came at the hands of BYU, 17-16, in the 2007 Las Vegas Bowl. Its most recent regular-season loss was a 16-14 decision at CU in 2003.
- UCLA has forced at least one turnover in 15 of its past 17 games and its past four contests. However, the Bruins forced a total of just two turnovers in their four 2022 losses while committing 11 in those games. UCLA is plus-27 turnovers in wins and minus-33 in losses overall under head coach Chip Kelly. In 2021, UCLA was plus-five in turnovers for the season, but committed seven of its 14 turnovers in its four 2021 losses. In its four 2020 losses, UCLA committed 12 of its 13 turnovers on the season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- R.J. Lopez connected on his first career field-goal attempt (31 yards) in the fourth quarter of UCLA's season opener to give the Bruins a 24-13 advantage against Coastal Carolina. He added a 47-yard kick later in the quarter. Lopez put all three extra points through the uprights.
- Blake Glessner (Montana St. transfer) registered four touchbacks on six kickoffs in his first appearance for the Bruins.
- Will Powers (Princeton transfer) averaged 48.5 yards per kick on his two punts, placing both inside the 20.
- UCLA's total of 27 punts in 2022 was the second-lowest mark by any team in the nation and the fewest in school history.
- UCLA has blocked 22 kicks (extra points, field goals or punts) since the start of the 2012 season.

Eleven of the UCLA Bruins are currently enrolled in the master's degree program in Transformative Coaching and Leadership — **Kenny Churchwell III, Duke Clemens, Ryan Cragun, Kyle Ford, Hudson Habermehl, Jake Heimlicher, Alex Johnson, Logan Loya, William Nimmo Jr., Jake Wiley** and **Colson Yankoff**.

Offered by UCLA's Department of Education, the master's degree in Transformative Coaching and Leadership prepares graduates for careers in coaching and sports leadership in professional and collegiate athletics, K-12 schools and community-based sports organizations. Inspired by the legendary John Wooden, the goals of the program include enabling prospective candidates to develop their own philosophy of coaching and leadership—and one that is premised on a holistic understanding of persons and sound principles of coaching, teaching and learning.

The degree program is also informed by an ethic of social justice, where teaching and coaching in various contexts—collegiate sports, professional sports, K-12 schools, Boys and Girls Clubs and other community sports programs—are analyzed through the lens of equity, access, diversity, and human dignity with the steadfast aim of contributing to the creation of a more just, equitable and humane society through enlightened and socially conscious sports education and leadership.

In addition, **Chase Griffin** has completed the Transformative Coaching and Leadership program and is now enrolled in the Master of Legal Studies program at UCLA Law. He is joined in that program by **Dovid Magna**.

THE STORY OF NO. 36

On Aug. 26, 2022, head coach Chip Kelly awarded Alex Johnson the No. 36 jersey in honor of Nick Pasquale, who wore the number for the Bruins in 2012 and 2013 before his death in a car accident.

Nick was a 5-7, 172-pound redshirt freshman walk-on receiver for the Bruins who had seen his first game action a week before his death in September of 2013. He was known for his passion for the game, his limitless determination and his high qualities as a teammate. Current UCLA coach Jerry Neuheisel was a teammate of Pasquale.

Johnson has carved out roles on special teams and as a reserve defensive back across his 42 games played entering 2023. Johnson follows in the footsteps of Ethan Fernea, who donned the number from 2019-2021. The 2019 season was the first that a Bruin had worn the No. 36 since the start of the 2013 campaign.

UCLA SIGNS DEAL WITH JORDAN/NIKE

UCLA's Alice and Nahum Lainer Family Director of Athletics Martin Jarmond forged a six-year agreement with Nike, Inc. to make Jordan Brand and Nike the Bruins' official athletic footwear, apparel and equipment providers beginning on July 1, 2021. Under the terms of the agreement, Nike supplies uniforms, footwear, apparel and equipment to 22 of UCLA's 25 varsity athletic teams, while Jordan Brand outfits the football and men's and women's basketball programs with "Jumpman" product. With this agreement, UCLA became the only school to wear the Jumpman in the Pac-12 Conference, and only the fifth university in the country to join forces with Jordan Brand on football, as well as both men's and women's basketball. The contract extends beyond outfitting some of the most iconic teams in collegiate athletics. Nike, Inc. also lends its support to UCLA Athletics' student-athlete development programs, offers two summer internships per calendar year to UCLA students and annually hosts a group of selected UCLA students at its headquarters for an educational experience.

BRUIN FRESHMEN OVER THE YEARS

UCLA true-freshman quarterbacks to start games over the years include: Dorian Thompson-Robinson in 2018 (eight games), Josh Rosen in 2015 (13), Matt Moore in 2002 (one), Drew Olson in 2002 (five), Cade McNown in 1995 (nine), Ryan Fien in 1992 (one); Tom Ramsey in 1979 (two) and Steve Bukich in 1974 (one). Rosen was the first Bruin true freshman signal caller to start a season opener (a 2015 win versus Virginia). Thompson-Robinson (currently with the Cleveland Browns), Rosen (Minnesota Vikings, Browns, Atlanta Falcons, San Francisco 49ers, Miami Dolphins and Arizona Cardinals), Moore (Kansas City Chiefs, Dolphins, Carolina Panthers and Dallas Cowboys), Olson (49ers, Panthers and Baltimore Ravens), McNown (49ers, Dolphins and Chicago Bears) and Ramsey (Indianapolis Colts and New England Patriots) each saw action in the NFL.

UCLA used 11 true freshmen in the 2022 season. Two true freshmen saw action in the 2022 opener against Bowling Green — RBs T.J. Harden and Carsen Ryan. Nine more saw the field in Game 2 versus Alabama State: P Chase Barry, WR Jady N Marshall, RB Jack Pedersen, WR Braden Pegan, DB Kamari Ramsey, WR Elijah Rodriguez, DB Clint Stephens, DB Croix Stewart and LB Jalen Woods.

WR Michael Ezeike saw his first action at Oklahoma. LB Bo Calvert and WR Delon Hurt saw action versus Fresno State. LB Elijah Wade played for the first time at Colorado. DB Alex Johnson hit the field at Oregon. WR Greg Dulcich, OL Alec Anderson and TE David Priebe were in action at Arizona State. OL Jon Gaines II played against Stanford.

In 2021, six true freshmen saw action. Five saw the field in the 2021 season-opener against Hawai'i: OL Garrett DiGiorgio, DB Devin Kirkwood, WR Keontez Lewis, DL Tiaoalii Savea and DL Jay Toia. Four Bruins saw action in the 2019 opener at Cincinnati: LB Carl Jones Jr., TE Mike Martinez, OT Sean Rhyan and LB Adam Cohen.

Three true freshmen saw action in the 2017 opener against Texas A&M in the Rose Bowl: DL Jaelan Phillips, DB Darnay Holmes and DB Mo Osling III. DL Martin Andrus Jr. saw action vs. Hawai'i and DB Quentin Lake saw his first action against CU. Moses Robinson-Carr took the field for the first time at Arizona. The Bruins played a total of 10 true freshmen in 2015. Five saw action in the 2015 season opener against Virginia. Nine true frosh took the field in the 2014 season, seven in that season's opener at Virginia.

The Bruins established a then-school mark in 2013 when guard Scott Quessenberry took the field at Oregon as the 18th true freshman to see action that season. A school-record 15 true freshmen saw action that season in the opener against Nevada, along with eight redshirt freshmen. UCLA played 12 true freshmen in 2012, including eight in the opener at Rice. One first-year player saw action in 2011. In 2010 and 2009, UCLA played 10 true freshmen each.

UCLA started a true-freshman quarterback, Josh Rosen, in the season opener of 2015. This marked a first in school history. In 2017, DL Jaelan Phillips and DB Darnay Holmes became the first true-freshman defensive tandem to start an opener.

UCLA MOURNS LOSS OF BILL MCGOVERN

Bill McGovern, a highly-decorated college football player and successful defensive football coach possessing almost 40 years of college and NFL experience, passed away May 30 at his California home surrounded by family, following a battle with cancer. He was 60.

McGovern joined Chip Kelly's coaching staff as UCLA's defensive coordinator in February 2022. An All-America selection at defensive back as a collegian at Holy Cross, McGovern spent eight of the previous nine years prior to coming to UCLA at the professional level with the Chicago Bears, Philadelphia Eagles and New York Giants, where he guided several highly rated defensive units. In addition to holding down the defensive coordinator position with the Bruins, he also served in that capacity with Boston College and the University of Massachusetts.

STATEMENT FROM THE MCGOVERN FAMILY: "Early this morning we said goodbye to our beloved father and husband Bill after his long and difficult battle with cancer came to an end and today, we would like to thank the entire UCLA community for all of the love and support you gave to Bill and our entire family during this very difficult struggle. In particular, the McGovern family would like to thank UCLA head football coach Chip Kelly and his wife Jill as well as all of the players, coaches, trainers, and support staff of the UCLA football program and their families. It was the honor of Bill's coaching career to be the defensive coordinator for the UCLA Bruins and this past season was one of the highlights of Bill's coaching career. We are so thankful for the opportunity to be a part of such a historic athletic tradition and, more importantly, we could not have made it through this past year without the love and prayers of our UCLA family. The McGovern family is so grateful and thankful to all of you for your help during this difficult time and we will be indebted to you all forever. Thank you so much and we will cherish the wonderful memories we have of UCLA and our UCLA football family for the rest of our lives."

COACH DONAHUE TO BE HONORED WITH STATUE AT ROSE BOWL

The winningest coach in UCLA football and Pac-12 Conference history, Terry Donahue, will be celebrated with a statue at the Rose Bowl Stadium this fall. The unveiling and dedication event, which is open to the public, will take place on Friday, October 27 at 3 p.m. PT at America's Stadium in Pasadena, Calif.

The statue of Coach Donahue will be surrounded by 151 bronze roses of varying shapes and sizes. As a gift by over 100 donors to the Rose Bowl Legacy Foundation, the non-profit that supports the preservation, protection and enhancement of the Stadium's future, each rose has been supported by an individual or family and honors one of the conference- and school-record 151 wins during Donahue's career.

Coach Donahue's statue will be the fourth on Rose Bowl property to represent key moments and people in the venue's history, joining Jackie Robinson (dedicated in 2017), the 1999 Team USA FIFA Women's World Cup Champions (dedicated 2019) and iconic broadcaster Keith Jackson (dedicated 2019). It will be the first, statue located inside the Stadium's gates with the other three located outside the venue's fence line near the Stadium's main entrance at Gate A. The statue's location will be adjacent to the Charles E. Young Locker Room and UCLA players and coaches will pass by the iconic coach before each home game.

Donahue won more games than any other coach in the school's and the Pac-12 Conference's history. He ended his career with a winning record against each of the conference's teams,

including the Bruins' crosstown rival, the University of Southern California Trojans. Overall, he won 151 games, and 98 of those victories were in the Pac-10 (as the conference was known before adding two teams in 2011). His eighth and final win in a bowl came in the 1991 John Hancock Bowl. Donahue's streak of bowl victories included Rose Bowl Game@ wins in 1983, 1984 and 1986. He was the first person to appear in the Rose Bowl Game@ as a player, an assistant coach and a coach.

ANDREA DONAHUE: "On behalf of the Terry Donahue family, we are humbled by this outpouring of support for the Terry Donahue Statue and 151 Roses. The Rose Bowl has always played a meaningful part in our lives and provided us many opportunities and great joy. We can't begin to express our gratitude for this iconic stadium and all the people that make it so special. It is a great honor to continue Coach Terry Donahue's legacy so that he may continue to impact the lives of others."

TROY AIKMAN: "Coach Donahue impacted thousands of young men from all over America, not just in football, but in life. As good as he was at coaching the game, his greatest gift was being an example for how to be better men. We all carry a part of him deep within us. I'm so proud to support this project at the Rose Bowl to honor Coach and his lasting impact on so many."

Chip Kelly was named UCLA's 17th head football coach Nov. 25, 2017. Kelly holds over 30 seasons of coaching experience at both the professional and collegiate levels, most recently serving as head coach of the San Francisco 49ers (2016) prior to coming to Westwood. He also worked as the head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles (2013-15) following four seasons as head coach at the University of Oregon (2009-12) where he posted a record of 46-7. At each stop, Kelly, as a head coach, has been the guiding force for some of the most productive offenses in the game, including seven seasons with NCAA top-25 ranked scoring offenses and seven with NCAA top-25 rushing offenses.

The 2022 Bruins posted nine regular-season wins and earned a bid to the Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl. UCLA achieved the highest total offense average in school history (503.6 yards per game), a mark which rated fourth in the nation. The Bruins led the Pac-12 in rushing average for the first time since 1976 (237.2 rushing yards per game, which ranked sixth nationally). It was the third straight season in which UCLA had averaged at least 200 yards rushing per contest and the first time the program had accomplished the feat since doing so from 1985-87. Quarterback Dorian Thompson-Robinson became the school's all-time leader in touchdown passes, passing yards, completions and total offense during the season while finishing his Bruin career ranked among the all-time top 10 in the Pac-12 in total offense and touchdown passes. The Bruins racked up more than 6,000 yards of total offense for just the fourth time in school history and set the school record for most points scored (510). Running back Zach Charbonnet led all Pac-12 players in 100-yard rushing games (eight) and owned the league's best per-game average at 135.9. He also led the nation in all-purpose yardage with an average of 168.0. The Bruin team finished the season with a national ranking (No. 21) in the polls for the first time since 2014. Charbonnet, Thompson-Robinson and offensive linemen Jon Gaines II and Antonio Mafi were selected in the 2023 NFL draft.

The 2021 season saw the Bruins record the program's most wins since 2015, at 8-4, finish tied for second in the Pac-12 South with a 6-3 conference mark and earn a bid to the San Diego Credit Union Holiday Bowl. UCLA paced the Pac-12 and ranked 12th nationally in scoring at 36.5 points per game. The Bruin rushing attack averaged 215.1 yards per contest to rate as the 14th-best unit in the NCAA. On the other side of the ball, the run defense rated second in the Pac-12 and 23rd nationally at 124.2 yards per game and UCLA ranked second in the conference in sacks. Wide receiver Kyle Phillips moved up among the top five at UCLA in career receptions after grabbing a Pac-12 best 10 scoring passes. Charbonnet led all Pac-12 running backs with seven 100-yard games during the year. Running back Britain Brown topped conference rushers with a 6.03 yards per carry mark. Thompson-Robinson ranked No. 1 in the league in passing efficiency (153.9). Tight end Greg Dulcich was a semifinalist for the John Mackey Award as the nation's top performer at his position. His 117-yard performance versus LSU marked the eighth straight season in which a Bruin tight end reached the century receiving yards mark in a game. UCLA topped the nation in punt return average (20.0) and was seventh in kickoff return average (27.4). Offensive lineman Sean Rhyhan, defensive lineman Otito Ogbornia and defensive back Quentin Lake joined Brown, Dulcich and Phillips as selections in the NFL draft.

In 2020, the Bruins led the Pac-12 in scoring (248 points) and touchdowns scored (31). Thompson-Robinson produced the school's best pass efficiency mark since 2005 (156.29) and became the first Bruin quarterback to record a 300-yard passing (303) and 100-yard rushing (109) game in the same contest (at Colorado). UCLA produced a team rushing average of over 200 yards per game for just the fourth time since 1990. The mark of 230.6 rushing yards per contest ranked 12th nationally. A Bruin team had not finished with a rushing yards per carry mark greater than 2020's 5.1 mark since 1976. Dulcich rated No. 2 among the nation's tight ends with both his 73.9 receiving yards per game average and 19.88 yards per catch mark. Demetric

Felton Jr. led the Pac-12 and ranked sixth in the NCAA in all-purpose yards (165.83). UCLA's defense showed improvement in all phases. The unit allowed almost 50 yards fewer in total offense (409.9) than the previous season, while reducing its rush defense average by almost 10 yards per game (135.7). It sliced almost half a yard off the rushing average per carry to 3.6, a mark which led the Pac-12. Per-game averages for tackles for loss (6.8) and sacks (3.3 - eighth nationally) both went up.

In Year 2 at UCLA, Thompson-Robinson finished among the top 10 at the school for a single season in completions (216 - ninth), total offense (2,899 - 10th) and touchdown passes (21 - 10th). He set a school mark with 564 yards of total offense in a win at Washington State while helping to orchestrate the second-largest comeback in school history (32 points). Running back Joshua Kelley became the eighth Bruin to post back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. Kelley finished second in the Pac-12 in rushing yards per game. Felton set a school mark for a running back with 55 receptions and added a school-record four scoring plays of 75 yards or more. UCLA produced five straight 200-yard rushing games for the first time since 1978. Phillips finished with the most catches ever by a Bruin freshman player and became the first redshirt freshman to lead the team in receptions since 2001. His 60 catches tied for 11th on the all-time school single season list and his total of two 10-plus catch games ranks third on the all-time school list. Five wide receivers made their first career scoring catches during the season. The rush defense knocked off almost 0.5 yards per carry from the average of the previous season and the number of quarterback sacks increased from 11 to 26 over a year's time. Special teams improved across the board and featured a punt and kickoff return for a touchdown. UCLA ranked second in the nation in punt return average (22.5 yards).

In his first season in Westwood, Kelly became just the fourth Bruin head coach to guide his team past USC in his initial meeting with the crosstown rival. Kelley racked up 289 rushing yards in the win against the Trojans, the most ever in the series. Kelley finished ninth in the nation in rushing (113.0 yards per game) and 18th nationally in all-purpose yards (130.55). It marked the fifth consecutive season in which Kelly had produced an NCAA top-10 rated rushing offense leader as a college head coach. A young Bruin team, which saw a school-record 21 true-freshman student-athletes take the field during the season, showed steady improvement and generated 432.9 yards of total offense per game over the last eight contests of the season, including a 528-yard effort in the season finale versus Stanford.

Kelly's lone season in San Francisco saw the 49ers improve from the league's 21st-ranked rushing attack in 2015 (1,544 yards) to the fourth-best ground game in 2016 (2,019 yards). Running back Carlos Hyde was the biggest beneficiary of the improvement, gaining 988 yards in just 13 contests (76.0 yards per game).

Over Kelly's three seasons in Philadelphia, the Eagles ranked third in the NFL in points per game (26.9) and total offense (392.8 yards per game), as well as fourth in rushing yards per game (131.3). Sixteen Pro Bowlers were selected from his teams, including eight in 2014. The Eagles won 10 games in each of his first two seasons, as his 2014 offense scored a franchise-record 474 points to surpass his 2013 team's previous-record total of 442.

The Eagles showed a marked improvement in Year 1 under Kelly, as their 10 wins followed a four-win 2012. He became just the second head coach in league history to win a division title in his first season in the NFL, as the Eagles captured an NFC East Division Championship. He was also named the Maxwell Club NFL Coach of the Year.

Kelly began his head coaching career at the University of Oregon in 2009, leading the Ducks to a 10-3 record and a trip to the Rose Bowl. He finished his time at Oregon with an overall record of 46-7 as head coach (2009-2012), including a 33-3 mark in conference play. In his four seasons in Eugene, the Ducks averaged 44.7 points per game. Kelly became the first coach in school history to guide the program to three consecutive undisputed conference championships (2009-2011) and its first three 12-win seasons (2010-12).

Oregon made an appearance in a BCS bowl game in each of Kelly's four seasons, including a trip to the National Championship Game following the 2010 campaign. Kelly was named the Pac-10 Coach of the Year in 2010 and 2009 and Associated Press Coach of the Year in 2010.

The 2012 Ducks finished second in the nation in scoring (49.6 points per game) and fifth in total offense (537.4 yards per game) with freshman quarterback Marcus Mariota under center. They would conclude the season with a Fiesta Bowl victory over Kansas State. A January bowl game was also the end result for Oregon the year prior, as the Ducks defeated Wisconsin in a Rose Bowl thriller, 45-38. Kelly's offense notched top-five finishes in points per game (46.1, third) and total offense (522.8 yards per game, fourth) in 2011.

In 2010, the Ducks led the nation both points per game (46.1) and total yardage (530.7 per game) en route to a BCS National Championship Game appearance. In addition to his Pac-10 Coach of the Year and Associated Press Coach of the Year awards, Kelly garnered Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year, Walter Camp Coach of the Year, The Sporting News Coach of the Year and American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Coach of the Year accolades.

Kelly's first season as a head coach (2009) culminated in a Rose Bowl appearance and the Pac-10 Coach of the Year award, as his offense ranked sixth in the country in both points per game (36.1) and rushing yards per game (231.7). He was promoted to the top spot after his offenses led the Pac-10 in a number of categories during his two seasons (2007 and 2008) as offensive coordinator under Mike Bellotti.

Kelly had spent the previous 13 years at his alma mater, the University of New Hampshire, before being named offensive coordinator at Oregon.

As offensive coordinator at UNH, Kelly protégée Ricky Santos earned the Walter Payton Award as the most outstanding player in FCS in 2006. The quarterback previously finished second in 2005. Kelly also coached the Wildcats' offensive line (1997 and 1998) and running backs (1992 and 1994-96). The New Hampshire offense averaged better than 400 yards of total offense per game in seven of his eight seasons on staff.

Kelly began his coaching career guiding defensive backs and special teams at Columbia University in 1990. He moved to outside linebackers and safeties in 1991 before his first stint at UNH as running backs coach in 1992. He also spent one season at Johns Hopkins University as defensive coordinator in 1993.

1st to 100 NCAA Championships

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships. The Bruins enter 2023-24 with 121 NCAA titles to their credit after winning the 2022 women's soccer championship and 2023 men's volleyball title last year.

Game No. 1 – Sept. 2, 2023 Rose Bowl Stadium (Pasadena, Calif.) UCLA 27, Coastal Carolina 13



UCLA used big plays on offense, defense, and special teams, and dominated the fourth quarter to hold off a pesky Coastal Carolina team for a 27-13 season-opening victory at the Rose Bowl. It marked the Bruins' third consecutive season-opening home win.

Redshirt junior quarterback Ethan Garbers got the starting nod, just the second of his career, and went 10-for-17 for 121 yards, with one touchdown and two interceptions. Freshman Dante Moore completed 7-of-12 passes for 143 yards with two touchdowns and one interception.

The Bruins outgained the Chanticleers, 417 to 345 in total yards of offense, thanks to 153 rushing yards, compared to just 56 by Coastal Carolina. Both sophomore T.J. Harden (11 carries) and junior Carson Steele (13 carries), rushed for 76 yards apiece. Steele also had four receptions for 20 yards and one touchdown.

Redshirt sophomore J. Michael Sturdivant had five catches for 136 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore Carsen Ryan had one catch for 21 yards that also went for a score.

Defensively, the Bruins racked up 10 tackles for loss, including three sacks by senior Laiatu Latu. Latu also forced one fumble that led to one of the Bruins' three takeaways. Redshirt junior Gabriel Murphy also had a sack. Redshirt senior Darius Muasau had a team-high nine total tackles (seven solo) and one tackle for loss.

SPIEKER FIELD AT THE ROSE BOWL: HOME OF BRUIN FOOTBALL

The nation's most famous college football stadium – the Rose Bowl – will be in its 42nd season as the home of the UCLA Bruins football team in 2023. The stadium is recognized as both a United States National Historic Landmark and a California Historic Civil Engineering landmark. Thanks to a generous donation in 2017 from prominent UCLA alum Tod Spieker and his family, the playing surface is called Spieker Field at the Rose Bowl.

The Rose Bowl was built specifically for football, but has been utilized as a venue for portions of the 1932 Olympic Games' cycling events and was the soccer site for the 1984 Olympics. The Rose Bowl has also played host to five NFL Super Bowls – XI in 1977, XIV in 1980, XVII in 1983, XXI in 1987 and XXVII in 1993. It was a venue for the 1994 World Cup and the 1999 Women's World Cup soccer tournaments, including the championship games. The USA women's soccer team victory over China in the 1999 event drew over 90,000 fans. In addition, the 1983 Army-Navy game was played in the Rose Bowl.

On Jan. 1, 2018 and Jan. 1, 2015, the Rose Bowl served as the site of one of the College Football Playoff semifinal games. In 2014, the Rose Bowl hosted the final BCS Championship contest. It had also played host to the BCS Championship game in 2002, 2006 and 2010.

Considered an ideal concert venue, the Rose Bowl has hosted shows by such groups and artists as Taylor Swift, Beyonce, Jay-Z, Kenny Chesney, Jason Aldean, One Direction, U2, 'N Sync, Eagles, Rolling Stones, Pink Floyd, Michael Jackson, Metallica, Guns and Roses, Depeche Mode and Journey.

The iconic stadium has put the final touches on a \$181 million dollar renovation, and now features a new video board, improved exiting, wider aisles in the end zones and the Terry Donahue Pavilion. The Pavilion area houses the press boxes, broadcast booths, premium seating, boxes and suites. In December of 2015, the radio and TV booths were renamed "The Keith Jackson Broadcast Center". Jackson, the former sportscaster, coined the phrase "The Granddaddy of Them All" for the Rose Bowl Game. Also added are field level entrances and exits, and



additional concession stands and restroom facilities.

Since 2007, UCLA and its opponents have dressed in new locker rooms located underneath the south concourse of the stadium. The locker area features all of the latest amenities to benefit the players, coaches, sports medicine and equipment staffs. In addition, a new media interview room and working press area were included in the upgrades. In 1998, new individual chairs were installed in the seating areas between the end zones. Also, improved seating areas for the physically challenged were installed, as well as a new sound system.

Completed in 1922 at a cost of \$272,198, the Rose Bowl was first used for the USC-California football game that year which was won by the Golden Bears 12-0. The stadium was originally horseshoe shaped and seated 57,000 persons when it hosted the 1923 Rose Bowl Game. The south end zone was enclosed prior to the 1929 game to increase seating capacity to 76,000.

Further enlargements took place in 1932 (83,677) and 1949 (100,807). A record crowd of 106,869 fans witnessed the 1973 Ohio State – USC Rose Bowl contest.

The Rose Bowl has many firsts in its vast history. On Jan. 1, 1927, radio stations across the nation were linked together for the first time in a coast-to-coast broadcast. On Jan. 1, 1954, The UCLA-Michigan State Rose Bowl Game was the first west-to-east color telecast on a nationwide connection.

The Rose Bowl has 77 rows of seats. It measures 880 feet from the north to south rims and 695 feet from east to west. Its circumference around the rim is 2,430 feet, compared to 1,350 feet at field level. It took 28 miles of lumber to provide the original seats. The square footage of the grass on the floor of the stadium is 79,156.
