STORYLINES

▶It's Homecoming at San Diego State and the Aztecs have won 13 of their last 15 games in front of the alumni. However, one of those two losses came against New Mexico in 1999.

▶The last five games between the Lobos and the Aztecs have been nailbiters with no game decided by more than seven points. SDSU leads the series by a 20-9 count.

▶SDSU linebackers Kirk Morrison and Matt McCoy are second and third respectively on the Mountain West Conference tackle charts.

▶SDSU sports the nation's 16th-ranked defense and the top-rated defensive unit in the Mountain West.

▶Next Up: The Aztecs will remain in Qualcomm Stadium to host Wyoming in the annual Hall of Fame game.

Game Time

The San Diego State Aztecs, now 3-4 on the season and 0-2 in the Mountain West Conference, return home to Qualcomm Stadium this week when they host the New Mexico Lobos in a 6:07 p.m. Homecoming contest. San Diego State has dropped three straight since opening the season at 3-1. New Mexico enters the contest on a two-game winning streak and 3-3 overall. The Lobos are 0-1 in conference play after losing a 10-7 decision to Brigham Young on Sept. 13th. The Lobos are coming off an open week following a 34-7 win over Utah State.

This Is It

San Diego State's postseason hopes rest squarely on the next two games. The Aztecs follow up Saturday's game with New Mexico with another home game against Wyoming and then head into their only open week of the season. The Aztec-New Mexico series has been extremely tight despite the 20-9 SDSU advantage in the series. The Aztecs have won their last four games against the Cowboys. A sweep of the homestand would put SDSU at 5-4 overall and 2-2 in the league heading into the open week. It would also mean that SDSU would need two wins in its final three games (with two of the three at home) to become bowl eligible.

Media Watch

Channel 4 San Diego will carry SportsWest's production of the game live beginning at 6 p.m. The game will also be televised live in Albuquerque.

Aztecs And Lobos

San Diego State leads the series with the Lobos by a 20-9 count. It is the biggest series lead for the Aztecs over a Mountain West Conference school. In San Diego, the Aztecs hold a 10-5 advantage. However, New Mexico has won its last three games at Qualcomm Stadium and two straight in the series overall. New Mexico's two wins at Qualcomm since the Mountain West was formed in 1999 have come by a combined eight points.

Close Calls

The last five meetings between the Aztecs and Lobos have been down-to-the-wire affairs. Those five games have been decided by a total of 19 points, including a one-point game (17-16 SDSU in 2000) and an overtime game (36-33 SDSU in 1998).

Last Year In Albuquerque

New Mexico knocked off San Diego State in Albuquerque for the first time since 1983 in a hard-fought 15-8 decision. The contest was played in constant 40-miles-per-hour winds in the only game of the season in which the Aztecs failed to score a touchdown. SDSU managed just 183 yards of total offense and got just six points off of four possessions inside New Mexico territory. SDSU held an 8-7 lead at the half. New Mexico generated just 237 yards of total offense. The game ended with SDSU inside the Lobos 20, needing a touchdown and conversion for overtime. Adam Hall was 18-of-35 for 153 yards in the game. Both squads recorded a safety in the contest.

The Lobos

New Mexico is 3-3 on the season and 0-1 in the Mountain West after a 10-7 loss to Brigham Young on Sept. 13th. The Lobos are coming off a 7-7 season (5-2 in the Mountain West) that included an appearance in the Las Vegas Bowl. It was just the second bowl appearance for New Mexico since 1961. All-conference running back DonTrell Moore averages 86 rushing yards per game and veteran quarterback Casey Kelly is passing for 194 yards per contest. As a team, New Mexico is scoring 29.7 points per game and generating 390.2 yards of offense per outing. New Mexico was picked to finish second in the 2003 Mountain West race by the league's coaches and media.

Bye-Ing Wins

New Mexico enters Saturday's game coming off a bye week. That usually means good news for the Lobos. New Mexico is 6-0 under Rocky Long when coming off an open week and has won nine straight after open weeks overall.

In Salt Lake...

San Diego State dominated Utah in the first half but nursed just a 6-0 lead at halftime. At intermission, the Utes had generated just 84 yards of offense and never dented the Aztec 40-yard line. However, in the second half, Utah scored on five straight possessions to pick up a 27-6 victory and avenge a 36-17 loss to San Diego State in 2002. The Aztecs' longest drive of the second half covered just seven plays.

Conference Starts

San Diego State will be looking to avoid the bad kind of history when it hits the field Saturday night. The Aztecs will be trying to avoid their first 0-3 conference start since the 1994 season. In fact, that 1994 season marks the only time in the post-Don Coryell era that the Aztecs have started a league season 0-3.

Inspiration

If the Aztecs are feeling down over a three-game losing streak, they need look no further than the opposing sideline for inspiration. Last season, New Mexico got off the deck following a 2-4 start to reach the Las Vegas Bowl. Included in the early-season setbacks were losses to New Mexico State and Utah State. The Lobos regrouped to post a 5-2 conference record. On the home front, San Diego State's last bowl team (1998) started the season at 0-3 before rallying for seven wins in eight games to earn the trip to Las Vegas against North Carolina.

CRAFT FILE

▶ Former San Diego State quarterback Tom Craft is in his second season as the team's head football coach. The SDSU alum (Class of 1977) provided Aztec fans with with optimism for the future in his first year on the job:

▶ The Aztecs, despite being picked to finish last in the league in a preseason MWC media poll, placed third in the Mountain West with a 4-3 record. It was SDSU's best finish in the league since it was formed in time for the 1999 season.

▶ Craft's first offense was ranked 29th in the country with an average of 403 yards per game. Just one year earlier, SDSU was 89th in total offense.

▶ The Aztecs had the nation's most improved passing offense in 2002, finishing fifth nationally at 330 yards per game.

▶ Under Craft, SDSU receivers J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood became the prolific teammates in NCAA history when they combined for 236 catches and 3,337 yards in 2002.

The Bottom Line(s)

Through four-plus seasons, SDSU is 12-18 in the Mountain West. SDSU has at least one win over every league school and at least one loss to every league school excluding Wyoming. SDSU is 8-7 in conference road games and 4-11 in conference home games. San Diego State is 5-5 in its last 10 conference games but has dropped its last two at Qualcomm Stadium.

Crafting Home Success

Under Tom Craft, SDSU is 4-4 in games played at Qualcomm Stadium. Prior to Craft, SDSU had gone 2-9 in its previous 11 home games. Also under the second-year head coach, San Diego State is 2-2 in Mountain West home games. In the previous three seasons, SDSU was 2-9 in Mountain West home games with both wins coming over Wyoming.

Coming Home

San Diego State University will celebrate Homecoming this week. The Aztecs are 43-19-2 all-time in Homecoming games, including last season's 31-21 win over the UNLV Rebels. SDSU has won 13 of its last 15 Homecoming games but one of the losses came in 1999 when New Mexico left town with a 24-21 victory.

Loving Lobos

San Diego State assistant head coach and defensive line coach Jim House is a close friend of New Mexico head coach Rocky Long. So close, in fact, that the Long and his wife, Debby, are the Godparents of House's son, J.D. House and Long worked together on the coaching staff at Wyoming in the '80s. San Diego State secondary coach Fred Bleil spent 1992-1995 on the Lobos sideline as New Mexico's defensive coordinator. He also served a stint as head coach and athletic director at New Mexico Highlands.

Foli's Journey

One of the most inspirational stories of the season in the SDSU camp is the return of Anthony Foli. The Newbury Park senior spent three years as a key player in the Aztec defensive line before being moved to the offensive side last spring. In the last scrimmage of the spring, the new offensive lineman suffered a traumatic knee injury. Early indications were that Foli would miss at least the first eight games of the season and many feared his career was over. On Saturday night in Salt Lake, Foli made his first-ever start on the offensive line, playing approximately 55 snaps against the Utes.

The Dark Lord

San Diego State linebacker Kirk Morrison continues to turn in what might be the best season in the Mountain West Conference to date. Morrison is second in the Mountain West Conference in tackles with 70. He is fifth in the league in sacks (3.5) and first in tackles for losses (13). He is eighth in fumbles forced (2). He leads SDSU in each of those categories.

Kirk Has Company

San Diego State's ringleader on defense is Kirk Morrison. But there is room for sharing at the top of the defensive charts. Aztec sophomore linebacker Matt McCoy (Tustin HS) is coming off a career game. In Salt Lake, McCoy recorded a career-best 15 tackles, including a tackle for a loss and a 25-yard fumble return. McCoy has 65 tackles this season, second only to Morrison on the team.

Encore?

Chart Watching

San Diego State remains entrenched among the nation's top 20 defenses after seven games. SDSU enters the New Mexico contest No. 16 nationally, allowing 296.29 yards per game.

Total Defense

San Diego State continues to lead the Mountain West in total defense, allowing 296.29 yards per game. SDSU has never led any conference in which it has been a member in total defense. Currently, Brigham Young is second in the Mountain West, allowing 318.1 yards per game.

Adam's Back

Adam Hall has shown no rust in his return from an ankle injury that caused him to miss most of the Eastern Washington game and all of the Aztec contests against Ohio State, UTEP, Samford and UCLA. Hall has completed 51.2 percent of his passes for 609 yards. Barring injury, he will enter SDSU's career top 10 in passing and total offense this week against New Mexico.

Youthful Glow

The mini-revival that seems to be growing under Tom Craft is being led by a young squad. San Diego State has 12 first-year starters (including kickers) in the lineup, including the quarterback for four games, all of the starting receivers, running back and tight end. In short, SDSU's entire "skills position" corps is in its first year in the starting lineup. In addition, 32 players off of SDSU's top 44 (two-deep) will return in 2003.

Rushing To Judgement

The ability to run the football has greatly enhanced the Air Craft attack as it develops with a youthful "skills position" posse. In 2003, SDSU is averaging 119.3 rushing yards per game after running for just 72.9 yards of offense last season. The Aztecs are also averaging 3.7 yards per rush after running for just 2.6 yards per attempt a year ago. San Diego State has run for eight touchdowns this season after running for just nine scores in 13 games a year ago. As a team, San Diego State ran for just 948 yards in 2002. The 2003 version of Aztec football has rushed for 835 yards with five games remaining.

Lynell Leads The Way

The rushing improvement certainly was rejuvenated with the arrival of true freshman running back Lynell Hamilton, the Mountain West Conference's highest-rated recruit last February. Hamilton has already rushed for 719 yards this season. James Truvillion led San Diego State last season with 392 rushing yards. Hamilton is averaging 4.7 yards per rush. He is the only true freshman in Aztec history to run for 100 yards in a season opener and joins Marshall Faulk as the only freshmen to run for more than 200 yards in a game (221 yards on 31 carries vs. Samford).

Hamilton Stacks Up

Lynell Hamilton heads into the New Mexico contest second in the Mountain West and 22nd nationally with an average of 102.7 rushing yards per game. Hamilton is trying to become the first Aztec freshman to rush for 1,000 yards since Marshall Faulk ran for 1,429 yards in 1991. Hamilton needs just 281 yards to reach four digits.

Jacob And Jeff

San Diego State's starting cornerback duo of Jeff Shoate and Jacob Elimimian continue to rank first and second in the Mountain West Conference in passes defended. Shoate, the steady senior, leads the league with 10 passes defended (1.43 per game). Elimimian, the sophomore in his first year as a starter, is second in the league in passes defended with nine and fourth with three interceptions.

Did You Know?

Heading into the 2003 season, San Diego State's official all-time winning percentage of .572 ranks No. 45 in the country, according to the NCAA. Ten times in its history San Diego State has won at least nine games and seven Aztec squads have posted 10 wins in a single season. On four occasions, the Aztecs have gone undefeated.

Seth Sez

San Diego State senior Seth Santoro has provided quick help for a team looking to replace three-year punter Brian Simnjanvoski. Santoro has punted 45 times this season for an average of 41.8 yards with a long of 64. Thirteen of his punts have been downed inside the 20 with only four touchbacks. Thanks to Santoro, the Aztecs are 20th nationally in net punting (39.22) and the opposition has a total of 117 punt-return yards on the season.

Three-Point Range

Senior walkon kicker J.C. Mejia is 11-of-14 on field goals this season, including a 47-yarder at Ohio State that brought the Aztecs to within 16-13 in the fourth quarter. Last season, two kickers combined to go 17-of-27 on three-pointers. Mejia has just one miss from inside 50 yards. The Ohio State game marked the first time since Nov. 18, 1989, that the Aztecs booted two field goals over 45 yards in the same game. In '89, Andy Trakas turned the trick against another top 10 team when SDSU faced No. 7 Miami, Fla. Trakas booted field goals of 49 and 50 yards against the Hurricanes.

The Aztec Family

San Diego State is continuing a long tradition this season; it is the tradition of the Aztec Family and the immediate family. Once more SDSU will have a handful of roster members that are connected to former Aztec football players. Safety Josh Dean is the son of former Aztec and Washington Redskin Vernon Dean. Safety Shane Russell is the brother of former Aztec safety and current Minnesota Viking Brian Russell. Safety Marcus Demps is the younger brother of former Aztec safety and current Baltimore Raven Will Demps. Receiver Devin Pitts is the younger brother of former Aztec and current Houston Texan Chester Pitts. Freshman receiver Brian Spinks and frosh running back Lynell Hamilton are cousins. In 1999, SDSU had two brothers start in the same game when Kabeer and Akbar Gbaja Biamila lined up in the defensive front against Kansas.

Watch Lists

A pair of Aztecs have garnered some preseason notoriety. Junior linebacker Kirk Morrison is on the watch list for the Bronko Nagurski Award, the Lombardi Award and the Butkus Award. He currently leads the Mountain West in tackles and tackles for losses. Senior quarterback Adam Hall, meanwhile, is on the watch list for the Dave O'Brien National Quarterback Award Watch and the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award. He has played less than a half this season due to an ankle injury.

Right On, Schedule

The San Diego State schedule, through seven games of 2003, is rated as the 25th most difficult. Past opposition has a 19-13 record (I-A opponents). Future opponents are a 24-12 and the cumulative record of Aztec opponents is 43-31.



SAN DIEGO - The San Diego State football team opened its season with a victory for the first time since 1999, defeating Eastern Washington, 19-9, behind freshman Lynell Hamilton's 113 yards rushing and pair of touchdowns at Qualcomm Stadium.

The Aztecs snapped a seven-game losing skid to non-conference opponents, including an 0-6 mark in 2002 under then first-year head coach Tom Craft.

SDSU was able to successfully move the ball on the ground in the second half, breaking an otherwise lackluster offensive performance by both teams, as each lost their starting quarterbacks in the first half due to injury.

The two sides combined for just nine points and 243 yards of total offense through the first 30 minutes. Aztec kicker J.C. Mejia converted on his first two career field goals from 35 and 22 yards to give SDSU a 6-3 lead at the break.

The Aztecs were finally able to distance themselves when Hamilton notched the first touchdown of the game from a yard out at the 6:45 mark of the third quarter. The score was set-up by a 22-yard punt return by Kyle Conerly to the Eastern Washington 32-yard line.

SDSU continued its momentum with another Hamilton touchdown on its next possession. The freshman's 15-yard run capped the team's longest drive of the game, spanning 13 plays, 71 yards and 4:54.

Eastern Washington responded with a 14-play, 68-yard drive of its own to pull within 10 points at 19-9 on a 13-yard touchdown catch by Eric Kimble with 1:20 remaining in the game.

The Aztecs successfully recovered the ensuing onside kick to secure the 19-9 victory.

Hamilton completed the game with the most rushing yards by a true Aztec freshman in a season opener. SDSU Sophomore quarterback Matt Dlugolecki finished 11-of-19 for 97 yards in his collegiate debut in relief of injured starter Adam Hall.

The Aztec defense, meanwhile, surrendered just 217 yards of total offense, the lowest by an Aztec opponent since 2001.

COLUMBUS, Ohio - A young San Diego State football team showed that it could play with the best, as the Aztecs gave defending national champion and No. 2 ranked Ohio State a scare before falling 16-13 in front of 104,433 at Ohio Stadium.

The SDSU defense shined for the second straight game, limiting the Buckeyes to only 196 yards of total offense, including 70 yards through the air. The high-powered Ohio State offense managed just 10 first downs, five pass completions and was 1-for-14 on third down conversions.

Turnovers, however, proved to be the key as the Buckeyes turned three Aztec miscues into 13 of their 16 points.

San Diego State began the day with a takeaway of its own, as sophomore cornerback Jacob Elimimian intercepted OSU quarterback Craig Krenzel's pass on the game's first play from scrimmage. The Aztecs quickly capitalized on an 11-yard touchdown strike from Matt Dlugolecki to Wesley Williams for a 7-0 lead.

After an Ohio State field goal made the score 7-3, SDSU drove 76 yards with the help of two Buckeye penalties and an 18-yard run by Lynell Hamilton, setting up a first-and-goal situation at the Ohio State four-yard line.

The Aztecs' first try at the end zone, however, came back the other way as a tipped Dlugolecki pass fell into the arms of Ohio State strong safety Will Allen, who ran the interception back 100 yards for a touchdown and a 13-7 advantage.

SDSU cut the deficit to three points twice in the second half on two field goals by J.C. Mejia from 47 and 46-yards out.

The OSU offense, meanwhile, was limited to just three points - a 35-yard field goal - in the final three quarters.

With time winding down, the Aztecs' last chance to score came to an end at the Ohio State 46-yard line when Dlugolecki was unable to connect with receiver Devin Pitts on 4th-and-10.

The Buckeyes ran down the final 2:49 with the help of its first successful third down conversion of the game.

Dlugolecki, making his first collegiate start, finished 23-for-39 with 189 yards passing. Hamilton led the Aztecs on the ground for the second straight game with 69 yards rushing on 17 carries.

EL PASO, Texas - The San Diego State defense continued to stonewall its opponents as the Aztecs moved to 2-1 for the first time since 1996, with a 34-0 shutout of Texas-El Paso in front of 18,195 at the Sun Bowl.

The Aztec defense forced six Miner turnovers and held its second straight opponent without an offensive touchdown, giving SDSU its first non-conference road win since 1999. The shutout was also the school's first since October 7, 2000, a span of 33 games.

San Diego State put points on the board in each of the four quarters, taking the early lead in the first on a 26-yard field goal by J.C. Mejia, his fifth straight in as many opportunities to start the season.

The Aztecs were unable to notch their first-ever win over the Bruins in 19 tries, but still finished their non-conference schedule with a 3-2 record, the team's best start since the 1996 campaign.

Neither teams' offense was able to find much success in the first half, as the two sides combined for just six points and were both held to under 150 yards of total offense.

The Bruin defense notched another takeaway on the Aztecs' next possession when C.J. Niusulu grabbed his team's second interception at the SDSU 20-yard line.

Three plays and one penalty later, the Bruins put the game out of reach with its second touchdown of the night to go up 20-3.

The Aztecs would narrow the margin to 10 points on a seven-yard touchdown run by Michael Franklin, but were unable to overcome the deficit, eventually falling 20-10.

Hamilton finished the game with 87 yards rushing on 20 carries, while Dlugolecki was unable to find his throwing touch against the Bruins, finishing 19-for-37 for only 110 yards.

SAN DIEGO - If there's one thing to expect in an SDSU-BYU football game it's excitement and this season's meeting was no different. The two sides combined for 80 points with the Cougars using a 24-point outburst in the second quarter to defeat the Aztecs 44-36 in front of 32,137 fans at Qualcomm Stadium.

The game had been billed as a clash between two of the nation's top defenses, but turned out to be a high-scoring affair in which the schools combined for over 800 yards of total offense.

The night started out with its first hint of what was to come as SDSU's Brook Miller returned a fumble 44 yards for a touchdown, just 54 seconds into the game.

BYU quarterback John Beck made up for his fumble with a four-yard touchdown run to tie the score at 7-7. The rushing touchdown was the first allowed by SDSU in 2003.

Webb finished the game with 10 receptions for 253 yards, the eighth best single-game total in Aztec history.

Hall, making his first appearance since missing the previous four games due to injury, finished the night 18-for-34 for 352 yards.

SALT LAKE CITY - Utah scored 27 unanswered points in the second half to hand San Diego State its third straight defeat, as the Aztecs fell below the .500 mark for the first time in 2003 with a 27-6 loss. SDSU dropped to 0-2 to open conference play for just the first time since 1999, following the game in front of 39,132 at Rice-Eccles Stadium.

The evening proved to be a tale of two halves as SDSU had a 6-0 shutout in the first 30 minutes, only to be kept off the scoreboard in the final two quarters.

The Aztecs opened the game by scoring on their first possession when J.C. Mejia kicked a 34-yard field goal. Mejia's field goal was the end of a 14-play, 63-yard drive, which included a 19-yard reception by Devin Pitts and a 15-yard Utah pass interference penalty.

SDSU increased its lead to 6-0 with another Mejia field goal in the second quarter, which was set-up

by a fumble recovery by Matt McCoy at the Utah 15-yard line.

The Aztec defense held the Ute offense in check the entire first half, as Utah managed 84 yards in total offense and crossed into SDSU territory only twice.

The Utes, unfortunately, broke out of their offensive slump in the second 30 minutes, driving 65 yards in 1:49 to take a 7-6 lead on its opening possession of the half.

Utah then tacked on a pair of third-quarter field goals and two more touchdown passes to put the game out of reach.

San Diego State's only real offensive threat in the second half came with a little over six minutes remaining and the Aztecs already trailing by 21 points. Quarterback Adam Hall completed four straight passes to get SDSU to the Utah two-yard line only to have his fifth pass of the drive intercepted in the end zone.

The Utes then ran out the remaining 5:22 to finish with the 27-6 victory.

Hall, playing in just his second full game of the season, finished 19-for-36 passing for 203 yards, while freshman running back Lynell Hamilton carried 17 times for 49 yards.
