## STORYLINES

For the second straight season, the San Diego State Aztecs will visit the defending Big Ten champion as they head to Ann Arbor to face the 17th-ranked Michigan Wolverines on Saturday, Sept. 18th. San Diego State lost a nailbiter, 16-13, against No. 2 Ohio State last season in Columbus. Michigan is No. 17 in both major national polls. SDSU received one vote in the *ESPN/USA Today* coaches poll after receiving 11 votes in that poll last week.

San Diego State and Michigan will be meeting on the grid iron for the first time ever, marking the second straight game in which SDSU is facing a first-time opponent. Following the trip to Michigan, SDSU returns home to meet Nevada, a team it has faced just three times in its history.

The Aztecs head to Ann Arbor in the unusual situation of coming off an open week after playing just one game. State will finish the season with 10 straight games.

Michigan Stadium is the largest in college football with official capacity listed at 107,501, but more than 112,000 watched the Wolverines host Ohio State last season.

## TEAM NOTES

### Road Test

San Diego State hits the road for the first time this season when it visits No. 17 Michigan Saturday afternoon in Ann Arbor. The game will be televised nationally by ESPN. The Aztecs are coming off an open week after disposing of Idaho State, 38-21, on Sept. 4th. Michigan is 1-1 with a home win over Miami, Ohio, and a road loss at Notre Dame.

### September Road Trips

San Diego State has not been shy about scheduling during the non-conference portion of the season. Under Tom Craft, the Aztecs are 1-6 in non-conference road games. However, it should be noted that Craft took on a rebuilding project in 2002. The following is a look at some of the opponents he faced on the road as he began his Aztec head coaching career.

### Starting Blocks

San Diego State is 1-0 for the second straight season and will be gunning for its first 2-0 getaway since opening 1994 with wins over Navy and Cal. The Aztecs did open last season 3-1, despite the loss of starting quarterback Adam Hall.

### Faces In The Crowds

San Diego State set a single-game home attendance record in the season opener. A crowd of 57,216 fans filed into Qualcomm Stadium to see the Aztecs pick up a 38-21 win over Idaho State. SDSU led 24-0 after the first quarter and 38-0 before ISU got on the board. It was the 20th largest crowd in the country for college football's opening Saturday. ### Full Big House

One game after setting a home attendance record, SDSU will likely play in front the largest crowd ever to see an Aztec game when it visits Ann Arbor. Michigan has led the nation in attendance for the past six seasons and 29 times in 30 years. Last year, the Wolverines averaged 110,918 fans for seven home games. To the right is a look at the largest crowds to witness an Aztec football game. Incidentally, during its years of dominating Division II football, SDSU set an NCAA record that still stands. The Aztecs averaged 41,030 fans in 1967, the NCAA record for Division II football.

## Big Ten Battles

Michigan will become the sixth team from the Big Ten Conference that the Aztecs have faced over the years. SDSU is 2-9 all-time in those meetings. The Aztecs have lost their last seven games against the Big Ten, dating back to a 48-17 win over Minnesota on Sept. 25, 1993. The Aztecs will return to Columbus next season to meet the Buckeyes.

## The Buckeye Experience

San Diego State may be more geared than most first-time visitors to Michigan Stadium after playing at Ohio State twice in the last three seasons. In fact, SDSU has represented itself quite well at Ohio State. In 2001, the Aztecs held a halftime lead before falling 27-12 ( thanks to five second-half turnovers). And last season, the defending national champs, ranked second at the time of the meeting with SDSU, held off State, 16-13.

## Last Year In Columbus

Heavy underdog San Diego State entered Ohio Stadium in 2003 as a heavy underdog, especially after having lost starting quarterback Adam Hall in the season opener. But the Aztecs responded with an effort that officially launched The Dark Side defense into the national spotlight. San Diego State limited the Buckeyes to 196 yards of total offense, no offensive touchdowns and a 1-of-13 effort on third-down conversion attempts. The key play of the game came with SDSU inside the Buckeye five and holding a 7-3 lead. Will Allen picked off a Matt Dlugolecki pass and returned it 100 yards for OSU's only touchdown of the game. It turned a potential 14-3 Aztec lead into a 10-7 Ohio State advantage. The start was the first of Dlugolecki's career. SDSU had a small total offense advantage of 216-196.

## Poll Sitters

San Diego State will be looking to break a 15-game losing streak against ranked opponents when it battles No. 17 Michigan on Saturday. The last victory came Nov. 6, 1996, when San Diego State edged No. 16 Wyoming, 28-24. During the losing streak against ranked foes, SDSU has had some close calls. SDSU dropped a 24-18 overtime decision to No. 25 Air Force in 1997. In 1999, the Aztecs were last-second losers to No. 17 USC and Carson Palmer, 24-21. And last year, SDSU dropped a 16-13 decision at Ohio State as the Aztecs tried to defeat a second-ranked team for the first time in their history.

## The Legends Stand Here

Two legendary Aztecs will be on the San Diego State sideline on the trip to Michigan. Don Coryell, who coached San Diego State to a 12-year record of 104-19-2 (.840), is part of the official travel party. He is joined by Aztec head baseball coach Tony Gwynn, who was a two-sport star at State before becoming the best major-league hitter of his generation with eight batting titles. Gwynn's number 19 was retired by the San Diego Padres on Sept. 4th. He is entering his third season as the Aztec baseball boss, along with serving as an analyst for ESPN's coverage of Major League Baseball.

## The Coryell Legacy

Don Coryell is considered the father of the modern passing game. His old Aztec staffs included the likes of John Madden, Joe Gibbs, Rod Dowhower, Jim Hanifan and Ernie Zampese. He is the only coach to win 100 games at the college and NFL levels. His heritage is evident on Montezuma Mesa today. Aztec head coach Tom Craft played for head coach Claude Gilbert at State. Gilbert followed Coryell as head coach and was himself a former Coryell assistant. Gilbert's former Aztec players included Craft, New York Jets head coach Herman Edwards and Carolina Panthers head coach John Fox. All three men played at SDSU at the same time and Edwards' son, Marcus, is a 2004 Aztec receiver. Former Aztecs who played for Coryell include Haven Moses, Willie Buchanon and Fred Dryer.

**Connections**

The University of Michigan preseason roster featured nine Californians, including three from San Diego County (defensive back Leon Hall from Vista, kicker Craig Moore from The Bishop's School and linebacker Jeremy Read from Rancho Bernardo). Aztec receiver Jeff Webb considers Pontiac, Mich., his hometown, even though he attended high school at La Quinta in the Palm Springs area. Michigan secondary coach Ron English spent two years tutoring Aztec defensive backs (1996 and 1997). His first year at San Diego State was the last year Tom Craft served as Ted Tollner's offensive coordinator.

**Quarterback Story**

Michigan quarterback Spencer Brinton began his collegiate career at San Diego State and late in his freshman season (1997) became the starting quarterback. He was injured early in his sophomore season and eventually left SDSU for his LDS mission. Aztec offensive line coach Damon Baldwin and secondary coach Fred Bleil were the only current SDSU staff members who were on Montezuma Mesa during Brinton's stay on campus.

**ISU Rewind**

The Aztecs started hot, got hotter and cruised to their season-opening victory over pass-happy Idaho State in a game that might look closer on the stat page than it was in reality. Michael Franklin went 67 yards for a score on the first play of the season and by the end of the first quarter SDSU led 24-0, and had a 234-49 advantage in total offense. Any thoughts of a competitive game were put to rest by half-time with SDSU up 31-0 and 323 yards of offense already in the books. In the first half, when the game was competitive and on the line, SDSU was penalty and turnover free. For a full Idaho State recap, see page 16 of this update.

**Mighty Mike**

Junior running back Michael Franklin may be one of the smallest Aztecs, but he was the biggest offensive performer in the win over the Bengals. Franklin, who started for the injured Lynell Hamilton, led the Aztecs in rushing yards, receiving yards and return yards in the 38-21 victory. On the first play of the game, he went 67 yards for a touchdown. He rushed for 101 yards on just 12 carries, marking his third straight 100-yard outing since Lynell Hamilton's ankle injury. He had 84 receiving yards on six catches to lead the Aztecs and 48 return yards for an all-purpose night of 233 yards. He is fourth in the country in all-purpose yardage (one game).

**Speaking Of Hamilton**

Lynell Hamilton, the freshman All-America and first-team all-Mountain West running back whose rookie season ended during the 10th game of the season, could make his season debut in Ann Arbor. He sat out the Idaho State game to allow more healing time. He did participate in nearly every workout in fall camp as he continues his comeback from the broke ankle he suffered at UNLV last season.

**Building Blocks**

San Diego State is trying to improve its win total for a third straight season. In 2001, San Diego State finished the season at 3-8. Under Tom Craft in 2002, the Aztecs went 4-9, including a 4-3 conference record. Last season, the Aztecs posted a 6-6 mark, the first non-losing season for the university since the 1998 Las Vegas Bowl squad.

**Building Blocks, Part II**

Tom Craft began his Aztec head-coaching career with five straight losses. Since that fifth loss, however, the Aztecs are 11-10 over their last 21 games heading into the Michigan contest. The .500 mark also extends to the league race. San Diego State is 7-7 under Tom Craft against Mountain West competition. The Aztecs were 8-13 in league play prior to Craft's arrival.

## Rising Expectations

After two seasons of surpassing the opinions of prognosticators, the Aztecs have a new challenge in 2004 - new-found respect. The Aztecs have been picked everywhere from first to third in the league race (including third by the Mountain West media) after successive seasons in which the Aztecs were picked seventh in the league race and responded with a pair of upper-division finishes. Nationally, the preseason polls have placed San Diego State at No. 38 (*SportsLine.com*) and No. 47 (*Sports Illustrated*). The Aztecs have received votes in each of the first three coaches' polls.

## The Buzz

The improvement on the field at San Diego State is resulting in improvement in other areas on Montezuma Mesa, primarily at the ticket office. Last season, San Diego State counted just 14,000 season ticket holders. In 2004, the season-ticket count has climbed to more than 18,000.

## Forever Young

San Diego State's improvement since Tom Craft was named head coach has been noticeable to everyone as evidenced by the preseason prognosticators. However, what might not be as obvious is the fact that San Diego State is still a very young team. In the season opener, seniors accounted for just 96 of the team's 290 rushing yards, no passing yards and just 62 of the team's 291 receiving yards. Three seniors were in the starting lineup on offense and five on defense.

## Good Morning, Aztecs

San Diego State is likely the only program in the country that will practice in the mornings throughout the football season. Due to class conflicts in the afternoon, SDSU will have morning practices, beginning at 7 a.m., throughout the season. Players will return to the football offices for late afternoon film and meetings. Only the Friday walkthrough is scheduled for a traditional mid-afternoon time.

## More On Less

San Diego State's 2004 game one depth chart featured just two players in the offensive line who were on the final 2003 two-deep (Mike Kracalik and Patrick Justman). Only five starters would be in place on offense from the 2003 finale when factoring in the absence of receiver Jeff Webb and running back Lynell Hamilton due to late season injuries in '03. Six starters from the last game of 2003 are in place on the defensive side. Once again, the turnover is primarily up front where only Jonathan Bailes is back among the starters. The final defensive line two-deep, however, did include returning players Derrick Durbin, Aloalii Lealofi, Blake Lobel and Robert Miller.

## Starting Streaks

The sign of a growing program can be found in experience and the Aztecs return several players who have held their position for multiple seasons. To the right is a look at the team's longest string of consecutive starts. The school record for consecutive starts is 45, set by former defensive lineman Jerome Haywood.

## Streaking Into The New Year

From a team standpoint, San Diego State's streaking news entering the Michigan game:

- San Diego State has outgained its last six opponents,
- San Diego State has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in six games.
- The 581 yards of total offense ended a string of eight straight games in which the Aztecs had been held below 400 yards of offense.
- The Aztecs scored 24 first-quarter points against Idaho State, their most prolific 15 minutes since they scored 24 in the second period of a 45-16 win over UTEP on Oct. 28, 1995.

## Linebacker You, You, You and You

Forgive opponents if they feel the SDSU linebacking corps has been together forever. The foursome of Kirk Morrison, Matt McCoy, Heath Farwell and Stephen Larsen have combined to start 77 games during their Aztec careers and they have combined for a total of 701 career tackles.

Two Aztec linebackers, Kirk Morrison and Matt McCoy, have been named to the 2004 Butkus Award preseason watch list. Morrison is a returning first-team All-America selection (*College Football News*) and is the reigning Mountain West defensive player of the year. McCoy, a second-team all-league pick last season, led the conference in 2003 with 125 tackles. Only eight schools have multiple players listed on the Butkus watch list.

## The Nine Guys

SDSU's star-studded linebacking corps has been on a publicity roll over the last two years. The latest accolade came just prior to the start of the 2004 season when *ESPN.com* ranked SDSU's linebackers as the ninth best unit in the country. SDSU's linebacking group was the only Mountain West mention in the preseason unit rankings by the web site.

San Diego State is breaking in a new set of, well almost everything, in regards to the special teams. Gone is placekicker J.C. Mejia, who led SDSU in scoring a year ago. Also gone is punter Seth Santoro, as well as snapper Casey Naylor. In their place is a green but talented group. In the punting game, it will be true freshman Tyler Schmitt snapping to a redshirt freshman in punter Michael Hughes. The placekicking duties are handled by another freshman, Garrett Palmer. The backup punter and placekicker is another true freshman, walkon Sean Henschel.

## BCS Watch

It is another big weekend for the Mountain West Conference as several league schools try to make a national impression against BCS opponents. The league already owns victories over Texas A&M, Arizona and Notre Dame, as well as near misses against Colorado and Washington State. This week, the league takes on Southern California, Minnesota and Oregon State, as well as SDSU's game at Michigan.

## Welcome Matt

Matt Dlugolecki held off a pair of challengers in fall camp to open the season as SDSU's starting quarterback, one year after subbing for the injured-Adam Hall. Dlugolecki is now 4-2 as SDSU's starting quarterback. In his last two games (including the season-ending 24-3 win over Air Force in 2003), he has 39-of-58 through the air for 459 yards and two touchdowns. He has thrown one interception during that span. Dlugoecki is 4-2 as San Diego State's starting quarterback with the two losses coming at Ohio State and UCLA, by a combined 13 points.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

It would be hard to imagine a better season opener for the San Diego State offense... The Aztecs scored 38 points and had 581 yards of total offense with an incredibly balanced attack of 291 yards passing and 290 yards rushing... The Aztecs scored touchdowns on their first three offensive possessions of the season and SDSU's first five offensive possessions resulted in 24 points... San Diego State's 24 first-quarter points were the most in any stanza since Oct. 25, 1995 (at UTEP, 24 points in the second quarter) and five more points than SDSU averaged per game during the 2003 campaign... The 38 points were the most for the Aztecs since the 2002 season finale at Hawai'i (Dec. 7, 2002)... Michael Franklin scored a 67-yard touchdown run on the first play from scrimmage and San Diego State had 14 points and 101 yards of total offense after four offensive plays... The Aztecs had 234 yards of total offense in the first quarter against Idaho State... SDSU benefited from a big-play offense against Idaho State, with five plays from scrimmage going for 32 or more yards and 11 plays of 20 or more yards in the contest... With 21 points in the second half of the 2003 season finale (24-3 victory over Air Force) and 38 points in the opener, the Aztecs have scored 62 points in their last six quarters... The 581 yards of total offense marked the first time the Aztecs had eclipsed the 500-yard mark in nine games... San Diego State has gone 63 games without being shutout (last time SDSU did not score was Oct. 29, 2001, 0-13 loss at Brigham Young)... The Aztecs have been behind on the scoreboard just 44:52 of the last five games (300 minutes)... SDSU has not trailed in four of its last five games.

STREAKS

**Michael Franklin** has rushed for more than 100 yards in three straight games, including the final two of the 2003 season... He is the first Aztecs to rush for the century mark in three straight contests since Larry Ned pulled the trick in 2001... During his last five games, Franklin has carried for 640 yards on 123 carries for 5.20 yards per carry and 128.0 yards per game... Against Idaho State, Franklin had 86 yards rushing in the first quarter and only logged three carries after intermission.

**DEFENSIVE NOTES**

Don't let the 21 points and 398 yards of total offense in the season opener fool you, the Aztecs' Dark Side defense was dominant early in the contest holding Idaho State to no points through its first 14 possessions (by that time the Aztecs were up 38-0)... San Diego State forced eight punts, four turnovers, one possession change by both downs and a missed field goal in the Broncos' first 14 possessions... In fact, ISU had just 76 yards of total offense in its first 29 plays (2.62 ypp)... The Aztecs have allowed just 45 points in their last four games (11.25 ppg)... With the Aztecs up by 38, Idaho State snapped SDSU's streak of not allowing a touchdown in 103:34 (the equivalent of nearly seven quarters)... San Diego State has not allowed an opponent to score twice in the first half in any of its last five games... During that stretch, SDSU has yielded 13 points in the last five first halves (2.6 ppg)... The Aztec defense has gone 15 straight games without allowing their opponent to score on a game-opening drive (dates back to Colorado State, Nov. 16, 2002)... In fact, only four of SDSU's last 13 opponents recorded a first down in their first offensive possession of the contest... The Aztec defense has proven to be tough when backed against the wall... Since the beginning of the 2003 season, opponents have started in SDSU territory 23 times but were able to come away with points on just 11 occasions and touchdowns just four times... Opponents had just a 17.4 percent touchdown percentage when starting inside Aztec territory... In addition, opponents have been able to cross the goal line in just 12 of their last 40 opportunities when inside the Aztec 20 (TD conversion percentage of just 30.0 percent)... In six non-conference games since the start of the 2003 season, including contests at Ohio State and UCLA, San Diego State allowed 83 points (13.8 ppg) and just six offensive touchdowns... In 2003, SDSU held four opponents to nine points or less marking the first time an Aztec squad had done that since 1977... Last season the Aztec allowed 207 points, the fewest SDSU has allowed since 1977... In the 25 seasons between 1977 and 2003, the Aztec allowed more than 300 points 14 times and more than 400 points twice... The Dark Side defense scored four touchdowns last season off turnover returns and helped the Aztec offense to five scores on drives of four yards or less setup by turnovers deep in opposition territory... The Aztecs held Idaho State to just 46 yards rushing (2.7 ypr).

**STREAKS**

San Diego State has gone six games without allowing a 100-yard rusher and five games without allowing an opposing player to carry for more than 70 yards.



## Game Notes

**With the Aztec win:** SDSU has claimed victories in two straight season-openers for the first time since claiming five straight from 1993-97 ... Aztecs have won 15 straight non-conference home games against teams from outside the BCS Conferences ... SDSU is 1-0 all-time against Idaho State and improves to a perfect 9-0 versus schools in the Big Sky Conference ... The Aztecs moved to 44-33-5 all-time (9-4-1 in last 14 years) in season openers and 2-1 under Tom Craft ... In home openers, SDSU is 27-7-1 in its last 35 home openers ... SDSU has won four of its last five games dating back to 2003 ... The Aztecs have won three straight home games for the first time since the 1998 squad won its final four contests at Qualcomm... **The announced attendance** of 57,216, is an SDSU record for a home game... **On the opening play** of the game, Aztec Michael Franklin ran 67 yards for a touchdown ...the 67-yard run was the longest by an SDSU player since Larry Ned ran for 77 yards at Utah on Oct. 23, 1999 ... the 67-yard run is the longest of Franklin's career, topping his previous high of 55 yards in 2002, at Hawaii'... **The Aztec defense** kept Idaho State off the scoreboard in the first quarter, marking the fifth straight game in which an SDSU opponent has failed to score in the first quarter. Aztec opponents have also gone scoreless in the first 15-minute period in six of the last seven and nine of the last 11 outings dating back to the 2003 campaign... **SDSU's Robert Miller** blocked Idaho State kicker Jaret Johnson's field-goal attempt to close out the first half. The block was the Aztecs' first since Jeff Shoate blocked kicker Scott Parker's 32-yard attempt at Wyoming on Oct.19, 2002. The block is Miller's first of his career.

**SAN DIEGO** - In front of a record crowd of 57,216, the 2004 Aztecs made a stirring debut as they systematically disposed of Idaho State, 38-21, at Qualcomm Stadium.

Aztec running back Michael Franklin scampered 67 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the season and San Diego State was on its way to a near-perfect first half. The Aztecs jumped to a 24-0 first quarter lead and extended the advantage to 31-0 at the break and eventually 38-0 before ISU dented the scoreboard. SDSU completed the first half without a turnover and without a penalty.

The first quarter was the prolific for SDSU since it scored 24 points in the second quarter of a 1995 romp over UTEP.

The game would last just over four hours, thanks in part to an Idaho State offense that attempted 69 passes while rushing for just 46 yards.

Junior Matt Dlugolecki won the fall camp quarterback derby and he was strong in his debut, completing 16 of his 27 attempts for 233 yards and two touchdowns, one each to Robert Ortiz and Wesley Williams.

The star of the game, however, was Franklin. He rushed for 101 yards, marking his third straight game over the 100-yard mark. He also led the Aztecs with 84 receiving yards. Franklin ended the game with 233 all-purpose yards despite seeing limited action in the second half.

The Dark Side was its dominating self in the first half when the game was being decided. The first 14 Idaho State possessions resulted in just one drive that lasted more than six plays. The Aztec defense forced four turnovers, including interceptions by Heath Farwell, Josh Dean and Donny Baker. Farwell was also credited with a quarterback sack and caused a fumble.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Kevin O'Connell saw his first collegiate action and found Robert Ortiz for a 32-yard touchown pass. Ortiz, who entered the game with two career TD grabs, had two more against the Bengals.

The home crowd was the largest in San Diego State history and the 20th largest crowd in college football on the first full Saturday of the weekend.
