► **Inside The Numbers**

- ♦ The Aztecs went 17-4 with Abukar in the starting lineup, 9-1 when he committed one turnover or less in a game and 9-2 when he shot 50 percent or better from the field.
- ♦ Scored in double figures in 13 of his last 15 games, including a team-high 24 against Indiana in the NCAA Tournament. He averaged 15.6 ppg in the final 15 games of the season.
- ♦ Is San Diego State's second-leading returning scorer and rebounder.
- ♦ In conference games, he ranked third in free throw percentage (.857), fourth in field goal percentage (.537), ninth in scoring (15.2), 12th in offensive rebounding (1.81), tied for 16th in blocked shots (0.50) and 17th in rebounding (4.6).
- ♦ During the Mountain West Conference season, SDSU outscored its opponents by 132 points in the 474 minutes he was on the court. In the 171 minutes he was on the bench, SDSU was outscored by two points.





ABUKARtidbits

- ◆ Played on the USA Junior National Team in the summer of 2002 (other members of the squad included Carmelo Anthony and Dee Brown).
- ◆ As a prep athlete, he won the slam dunk contest and a three-point shooting contest at the same all-star high school event.
- ◆ Abukar was born on New Year's Day in 1985.

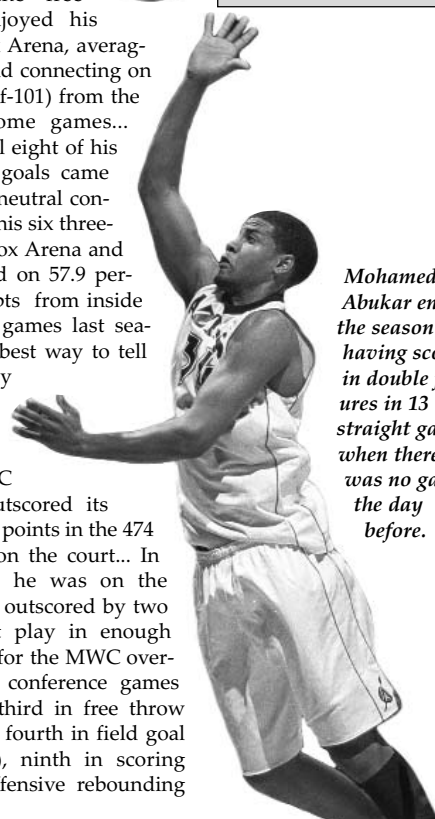
The catalyst for San Diego State's remarkable run last season, Abukar made a lasting impression despite not playing in a game until Dec. 27... After he became eligible last season (had to sit the first semester after transferring from Florida), the Aztecs went 18-5... One of the best perimeter players for his size anywhere in the country... Has the ability to consistently hit the 16-foot jumper and has 31 career three-point field goals... Very economical with his scoring, last season, he averaged 14.3 points on just 11.0 field goal attempts per game... He connected on 51.4 percent of his two-point field goal attempts in 2005-06 and is a career 52.0 per-

cent shooter from inside the arc... Extremely consistent player who produced 12 consecutive double-digit performances during the MWC regular season... His rebounding improved as the season progressed as he averaged just 3.7 boards during his first 13 games, but averaged 6.2 rebounds in his last nine games... He accomplished all of this despite not being 100 percent healthy as he spent the second half of the season battling a stress fracture.

As A Junior (2005-06 Season)

All-MWC second team selection... MWC preseason newcomer of the year... Sat out the first 10 games of the 2005-06 season due to NCAA transfer rules after transferring from the University of Florida the previous winter... Ended the season scoring in double-figures in 17 of his last 22 and in 13 of his last 15 games he played for San Diego State... In 16 Mountain West Conference regular season games, he went 95-for-177 from the field (53.8 percent) in 474

minutes... When he played at least 33 minutes, the Aztecs were 8-2... When he, Brandon Heath and Marcus Slaughter were in the starting lineup together, the team went 16-4... When inserted in the starting five, the Aztecs were 17-4... Was the team's third-leading scorer at 14.3 ppg and averaged 15.3 in MWC play... One of three Aztec players to shoot over 80 percent from the free throw line... Enjoyed his new home at Cox Arena, averaging 16.0 points and connecting on 54.5 percent (55-of-101) from the field in nine home games... Oddly enough, all eight of his three-point field goals came in either road or neutral contests... Factor out his six three-point misses at Cox Arena and Abukar connected on 57.9 percent of his attempts from inside the arc in home games last season... Maybe the best way to tell his value was by his hockey plus/minus rating in conference games... In MWC action, SDSU outscored its opponents by 132 points in the 474 minutes he was on the court... In the 171 minutes he was on the bench, SDSU was outscored by two points... Did not play in enough games to qualify for the MWC overall statistics... In conference games only, he ranked third in free throw percentage (.857), fourth in field goal percentage (.537), ninth in scoring (15.2), 12th in offensive rebounding

Owned the conference's top field goal percentage for a single game when he went 10-for-12 (.833) vs. Colorado State (1-4-06)... His 10 field goals were also tied for second most in an MWC game... Had at least six rebounds in six of his last nine games... Nearly recorded a double-double vs. Indiana in the first round of the NCAA Tournament (3-16-06) with 24 points and nine rebounds... Scored 13 points and had four rebounds vs. Colorado State (3-9-06) in the MWC quarterfinals... Posted a career-best 26 points on 9-of-15 shooting and connected on eight of his 10 free throw attempts vs. Wyoming (3-9-06)... Chipped in with 15 points and seven rebounds at New Mexico (2-25-06)... Had a game-high 20 points and six rebounds at BYU (2-22-06)... Was perfect from the line going 5-for-5, scoring 17 points and recording seven rebounds vs. TCU (2-18-06)... Grabbed a career-best

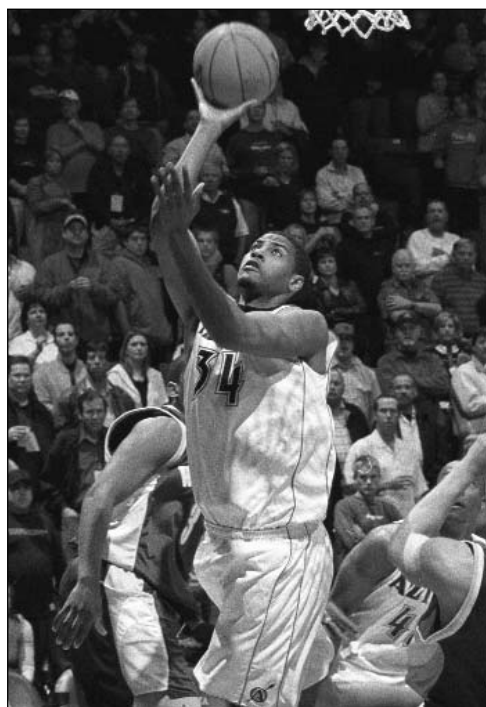

eight rebounds in addition to scoring 13 points at UNLV (2-16-06)... Put up 16 points vs. Utah (2-11-06)... Scored a game-high 18 points (8-for-12 FG) in a career-high 37 minutes of action against Air Force (2-8-06)... Shot 6-for-11 en route to 13 points at CSU (2-4-06)... Scored 17 points in the first half (19 points for the game) in the overtime road win over Wyoming (1-28-06)... In the game vs. New Mexico (1-25-06), he scored 12 points and had season highs of three assists and two blocks... Against BYU (1-21-06), he went 7-for-11 from the field en route to 15 points, five rebounds and a career-high tying three steals... Shot 7-for-12 from the field in the road victory at Utah (1-11-06) en route to 16 points... Also shared game-high honors with Kyle Spain after grabbing a career-high tying seven rebounds vs. the Utes... Battled the flu at Air Force and was limited to 13 minutes, but scored eight points on 3-of-4 shooting... Had his best game as an Aztec tying his career high with 22 points (10-for-12 FGs) against CSU (1-4-06)... Started against LMU (12-31-05) and

scored 10 points in addition to grabbing seven rebounds... Made season debut at Providence (12-27-05) and scored 10 points in 29 minutes of action.

As A Sophomore at Florida (2004-05 Season)

Played in the first seven games of the season before transferring to San Diego State following the 2004 fall semester... Averaged 5.0 points and 1.4 rebounds in 10.3 minutes of action... Connected on 46.2 percent of his field goal attempts, including an impressive 42.9 percent from beyond the arc... Shot 50 percent from the field inside the arc... Logged 10 or more minutes in four of his seven games, including a season-high 18 minutes against Florida Atlantic (11-23-04) and Florida A&M (11-30-04)... Scored a career-high 22 points, making 8-of-10 attempts in 18 minutes of action against the Rattlers... Scored 35 points in 72 minutes during the season, which equates to 19.4 points per 40 minutes of action... Committed just four turnovers in 72 minutes, for an

average of one turnover every 18.0 minutes... Did not have more than one turnover in any game and owns a streak of 28 consecutive games with one turnover or less... Gators were 5-2 during his time in Gainesville... Was one of only 10 players to see action in the first seven games of the season... Florida ended the campaign with a 24-8 record overall, a 12-4 conference record and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

As A Freshman at Florida (2003-04 Season)

Played in 30 of 31 games as a true freshman on a team that posted a 20-11 record, went 9-7 in the Southeastern Conference and advanced to the NCAA Tournament... His 402 minutes played during the season were the eighth highest total on the team... Averaged 2.7 points, 2.1 rebounds in 13.4 minutes per game... Scored eight or more points in five games (Montana State, Florida A&M, Louisville, West Virginia and Tennessee)... Scored a season-high 12 points against Florida A&M (11-27-03)... Was the first substitute off the bench a team-best 10 times... Did not foul out once during his 30 games and never reached the four foul mark in any game... The only game he missed was Florida's NCAA Tournament game against Manhattan (3-18-04) when a lower back ailment kept him sidelined... Attempted 64 three-point field goals, the third highest total on the team... Made quite a splash in his collegiate debut, scoring nine points and adding four rebounds against Montana State (11-25-03)... His nine three-point field goal attempts in that game were a freshman opening-day record... One of only two Gator players to score in double-figures at 25th-ranked Louisville (12-13-03)... Had five games with a career-high five rebounds (Florida A&M, Maryland, West Virginia,

Eastern Kentucky, Arkansas)... Played 11 or more minutes in 21 games and 20 or more minutes in eight games... Had three points and three rebounds in the SEC tournament game against Alabama (3-12-04)... He was a late addition to the Gators team, announcing his intention to attend Florida on May 15 after originally signing with Georgia.

High School

Averaged 28.7 points and 12.7 rebounds per game his senior year at Rancho Bernardo High... Was a mem-

ber of the USA Junior National Team in the summer of 2002, playing on the same team with Carmelo Anthony, Dee Brown and Chris Bosh... Was one of only three high school players on the roster... As a junior, averaged 20.0 points, 11.0 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 4.0 blocks.

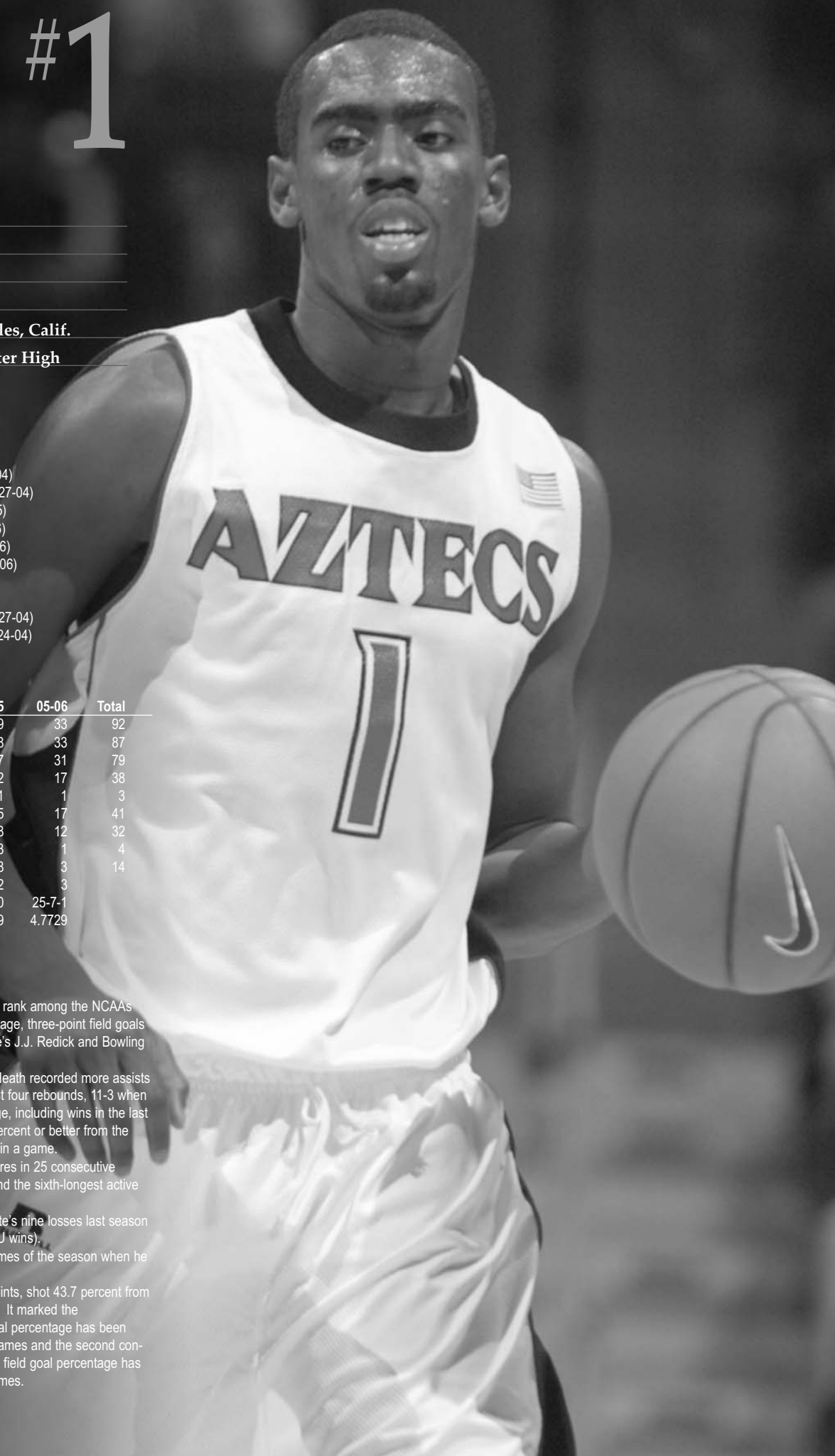

► **Inside The Numbers**

- ◆ Heath was one of three players in the nation to rank among the NCAA's top 75 in scoring and top 40 in free throw percentage, three-point field goals made and three-point field goal percentage (Duke's J.J. Redick and Bowling Green's Martin Samarco).
- ◆ In 2005-06, San Diego State went 16-5 when Heath recorded more assists than turnovers, 13-0 when he pulled down at least four rebounds, 11-3 when he shot 50 percent or better from three-point range, including wins in the last six occurrences, 8-2 when he connected on 50 percent or better from the field and 13-4 when he scored 20 or more points in a game.
- ◆ Ended the season having scored in double figures in 25 consecutive games, the fifth-longest streak in SDSU history and the sixth-longest active streak in the nation.
- ◆ Went to the line just 14 times in San Diego State's nine losses last season (1.6 FTA per game, compared to 4.4 FTA in SDSU wins).
- ◆ The Aztecs were 14-1 and won their last 11 games of the season when he attempted four or more free throws in a game.
- ◆ In 20 road/neutral games, he averaged 20.0 points, shot 43.7 percent from the field and 42.7 percent from three-point range. It marked the third consecutive season his road/neutral field goal percentage has been higher than the corresponding number in home games and the second consecutive year his scoring average and three-point field goal percentage has been higher in road/neutral games than home games.





HEATH tidbits

- ◆ Heath entered the fall semester needing just six units to earn his degree.
- ◆ His work ethic has reached legendary status. He averages an extra 10 hours of shooting a week outside of practice during the season.
- ◆ Has earned the A.I.M. Award (Academic Initiative Medal) and the Community Service Award during his time at San Diego State.

One of the most explosive scorers in the country, Heath enters his senior season needing just 295 points to surpass Michael Cage as the school's all-time leading scorer... Submitted his name to the NBA Draft last summer, but did not hire an agent and decided to return to San Diego State for his senior campaign... Has the uncanny ability to rise to the situation, frequently saving his best games for the biggest stages... Can score from anywhere on the court... Has the ability to shoot the three well beyond the arc and can drive in the paint and finish against taller opponents... He also has shown the ability to

truly take over a game (see page 66 later in his bio)... A complete player, he has etched his name onto nearly every school career chart in just three seasons... Had seven games with 26 or more points, including a season-high 37 points in SDSU's victory at UNLV (1-15-05)... Coupled with his 30-point performance at Texas Tech the previous season (12-13-03), Heath became just the eighth player in school history to record at least two 30-point games when he scored a Fisher-era best and an SDSU MWC-best 37 points against the Rebels, on 12-of-18 shooting and 12-of-12 from the free throw line... Heath Gives Aztecs First Road Win at USD Since 1975 (Dec. 3, 2003). Heath scored 27 points, including the Aztecs' final nine points and the final five points of the game, as SDSU won on the USD campus for the first time in 28 years. Heath put the Aztecs in front for good with a three-pointer with 1:39 to play. Final Score: SDSU 66, San Diego 63.

Heath Puts General Scare to Texas Tech (Dec. 13, 2003). Heath scored 30 points, making four three-point field goals and all 10 of his free throw attempts as SDSU lost to Bob Knight's Texas Tech squad. It marked the first 30-point game of Heath's career. Final Score: Texas Tech 78, SDSU 68.

Heath Goes for 37 Against Rebels (Jan. 15, 2005). Heath scored 23 second-half points and tallied 37 for the game as SDSU posted a rare victory in Las Vegas. He made 12-of-18 attempts from the field and connected on all 12 of his free throw attempts in the contest. Final Score: SDSU 81, UNLV 73.

Heath Helps Aid SDSU's Improbable Comeback (Jan. 7, 2006). Heath scored 13 consecutive SDSU points in 3:16 of the second half to help rally SDSU from a 13-point second half deficit against Air Force. SDSU lost by three, but Heath ended up with 21 points. Final Score: Air Force 65, SDSU 62.

Heath Lifts SDSU To Rare Win At Utah (Jan. 11, 2006). Heath scored 15 points, making all six shots attempts from the field, in a 6:51 span of the second half to help SDSU snap its 22-game losing streak at Utah. He scored 21 points and added eight assists - both game highs. Final Score: SDSU 72, Utah 67.

Heath's Makes Nine of First 10 Shots (Feb. 4, 2006). Heath made nine of his first 10 shots from the field, including his first five threes en route to 28 points on 13 field goal attempts. He added five assists and connected on 10-of-13 field goal attempts in the game. Final Score: SDSU 85, Colorado State 81.

Heath's Seven Assists and Five Threes Give Aztecs First Sweep of UNLV (Feb. 17, 2006). Heath hit three three-point field goals in a 2:59 stretch of the first half as SDSU built a 12-point lead en route to an 11-point win at UNLV. Heath had a game-high 25 points and added a team-best seven assists. Final Score: SDSU 81, UNLV 70.

Heath's Eight Threes Give Aztecs the MWC Title (Feb. 25, 2006). Heath scored 32 points and added a game-high six assists as SDSU clinched the MWC regular-season title by winning at The Pit for just the fifth time in school history. Heath made a career-high eight threes and scored 17 points in a 3:59 span early in the second half to break open a close game. Final Score: SDSU 73, New Mexico 66.

Heath's Trey Lifts SDSU to Championship Game (Mar. 10, 2006). Heath capped a 22-point night by nailing a spot-up three-point attempt to break a 60-all tie with 36 seconds to play. Final Score: SDSU 63, UNLV 60.

Heath Scores Six Points in Final 66 Seconds of OT to give MWC Tourney Title (Mar. 11, 2006). After struggling most of the game, Heath catches fire in the final minute of overtime to lift SDSU to victory over Wyoming. Heath made his patented running six-footer to tie the score at 62 with just over a minute to play. He followed that up with a sweet spin move in the lane to free himself for a 12-foot jumper to give the Aztecs a 64-63 lead with 35 seconds left. He gave SDSU a three-point advantage by sinking two free throws with 19 seconds left. Final Score: SDSU 69, Wyoming 64.

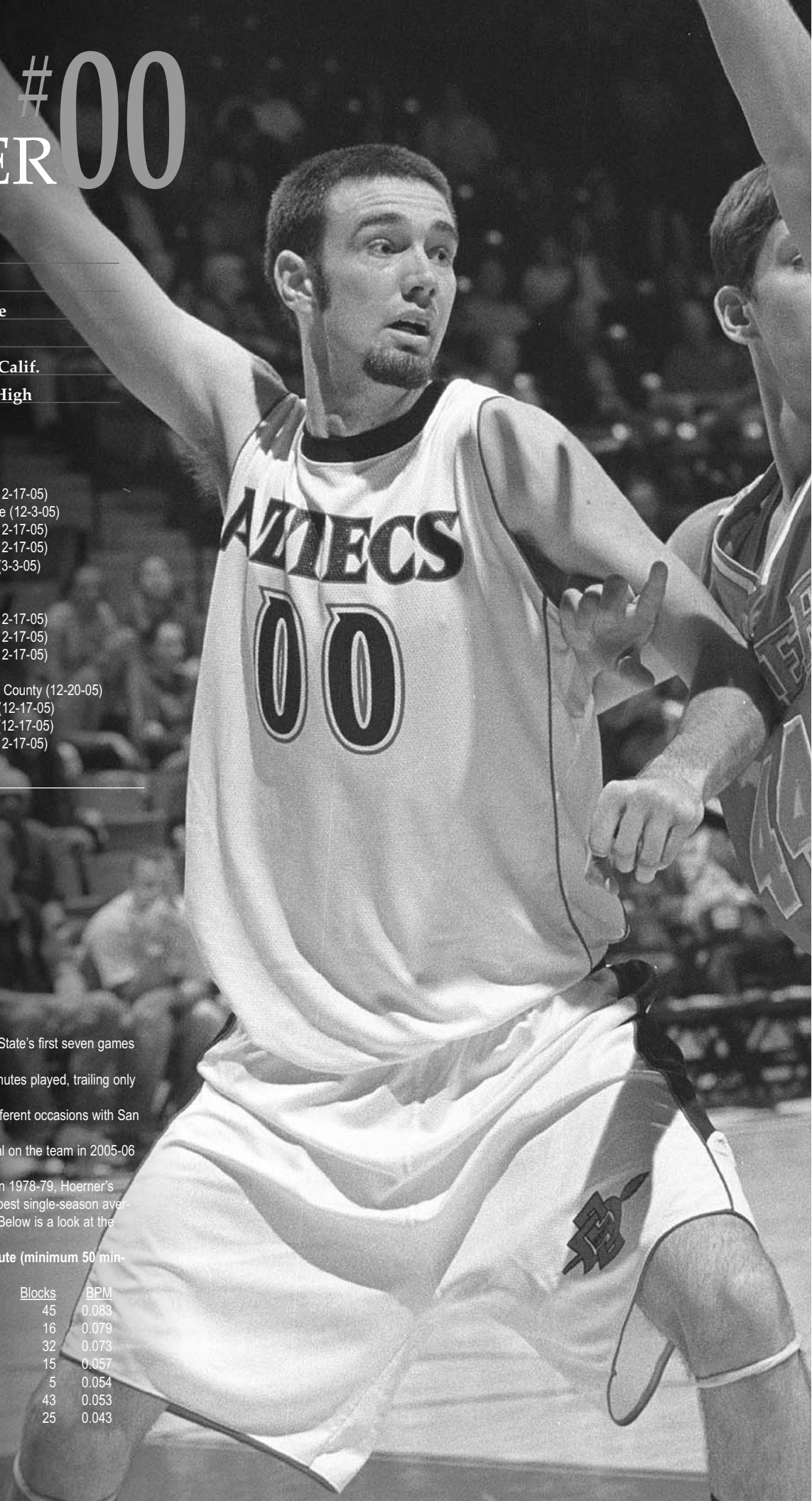

- ♦ Ranked third among the squad's freshmen in minutes played, trailing only Richie Williams and Kyle Spain.
- ♦ Played 10 or more minutes in a game on four different occasions with San Diego State winning all four of those games.
- ♦ His five blocked shots were the sixth-highest total on the team in 2005-06 and are third among returning players.
- ♦ Since blocked shots became an official statistic in 1978-79, Hoerner's 0.054 blocked shot per minute average is the fifth-best single-season average by a freshman (minimum 50 minutes played). Below is a look at the freshman leaders.

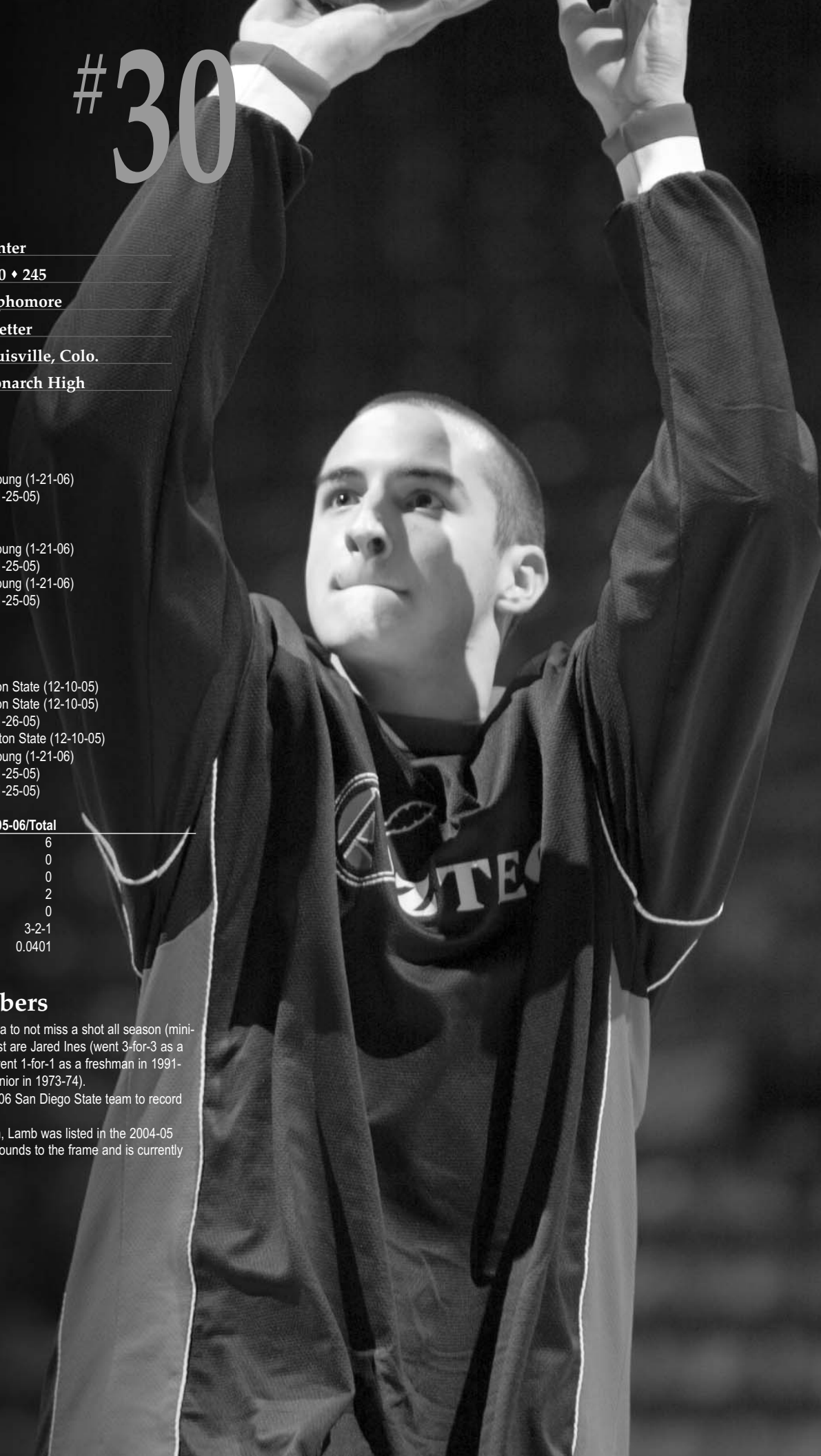

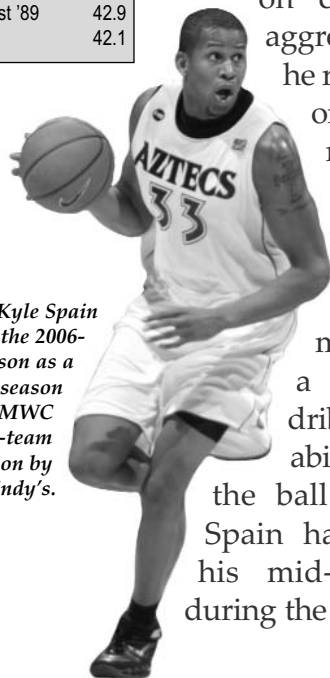

- ◆ Is fluent in sign language and communicates with both parents through signing.

Although much of the publicity went to the big three last season, Kyle Spain quietly put together one of the best freshman campaigns in school history... Spain exploded onto the scene in 2005, becoming a regular in the starting lineup in his first season on campus... An aggressive player, he ranked second on the team in rebounds and was third in free throw attempts as a true freshman... Always a force off the dribble with the ability to muscle the ball to the rim, Spain has developed his mid-range game during the off-season.

As A Freshman (2004-05 Season)

MWC Rankings: 8th in offensive rebounding, 11th in rebounding, 12th in defensive rebounding, 13th in steals

Became another in a long line of true freshmen to pay immediate dividends for the Aztecs and Coach Steve Fisher... Played in 28 of 33 games during the campaign, missing five contests while serving a team suspension... Started 25 games, the fourth highest total on the team, trailing only Brandon Heath, Marcus Slaughter and Richie Williams... Had the fourth-highest scoring average on the team (9.2 ppg) and was fifth among all players in total points... Ranked among the team leaders in nearly every category, including second in rebound average (5.6), fourth in games started (25), fourth in scoring average (9.2), fourth in steals (35) and fifth in blocked shots (10)... Despite being a true freshman, he ranked among the league leaders in rebounding (11th overall and eighth in offensive rebounding) and steals (13th)... MWC player of the week for the period ending Dec. 18... Was just the third freshman to earn the weekly award in MWC history, joining former Aztec Evan Burns and Utah's Andrew Bogut... Played 25 or more minutes in 21 games and was fourth on the team in total minutes... He was the third-leading freshman rebounder in the conference at the end of the regular season... Made 59 of his final 78 free throw attempts (75.6 percent) after opening his career 4-for-14 from the line... Had 13 double-digit scoring games as a freshman and posted three double-figure rebound games... SDSU was 11-2 when he scored 10 or more points... He was 90-of-182 from the floor (49.5 percent) and connected on 50 percent or better from the field in

15 games... The Aztecs were 10-5 when he shot 50 percent or better from the floor... Was 61-of-119 from the field (51.3 percent) in SDSU wins and 29-of-63 (46.0 percent) from the floor in Aztec losses... Spain also enjoyed the Cox Arena environment, making 45-of-85 (52.9 percent) field goal attempts and 6-of-12 (50.0 percent) from three-point range in the 13 games he played at home... Ranks as one of the top freshmen in San Diego State history as he finished the season ranked in the top 10 in six different SDSU freshmen categories (second in field goal percentage (.506), fifth in efficiency average (11.58), sixth in rebound average (5.7), seventh in rebounds (136) and efficiency points (278) and 10th in scoring average (9.5))... Made 15 of his 29 attempts from three-point range to become the only player in school history to make at least 15 treys and shoot above 50 percent from beyond the arc in a season... 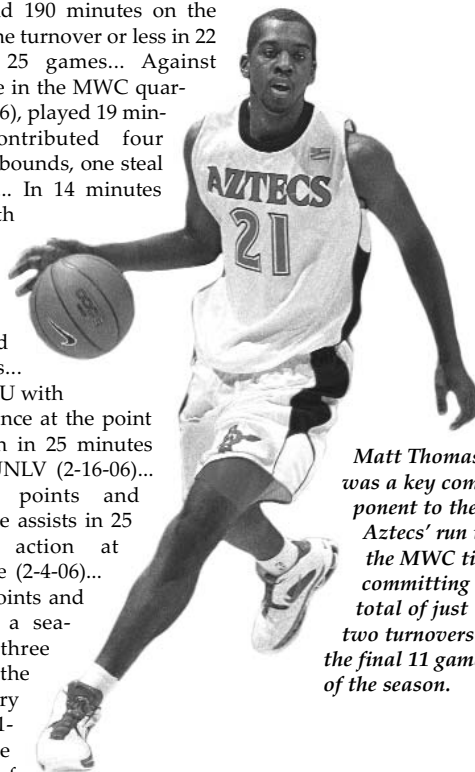
An honorable mention all-conference point guard as a freshman, Matt Thomas' productivity was limited last season due to back pain... Offseason surgery has limited his conditioning over the summer but will hopefully allow him to play pain free for the first time since his freshman campaign... One of the quickest point guards in the country, with the ability to break down defenses in transition or in the half-court setting... Despite being less than 100 percent last season, Thomas started a half-dozen games, leading San Diego State to victories in five of those six games... In his two

seasons, Thomas has proven to be one of the most secure point guards around, averaging one turnover every 17:11 of playing time.

As A Sophomore (2005-06 Season)

Played in 28 games while receiving the starting nod on six occasions despite battling a back injury all season... Played 13 or more minutes in 13 games... Logged double-digit minutes 15 times... Started a season-high five consecutive times in the absence of Kyle Spain... In games in which he started, the Aztecs were 5-1... The only loss was a two-point defeat vs. Utah (2-11-06)... His 28 games played were tied for the sixth-highest total on the team... His 31 assists were the fourth highest total on the squad despite ranking ninth in minutes played... Led San Diego State in assists on three occasions (vs. Southern Mississippi on Nov. 20, Maryland-Baltimore County on Dec. 20 and at Colorado State on Feb. 4)... The Aztecs won all three of those games... San Diego State went 12-3 in games in which he played 10 or more minutes... Started five consecutive games from Feb. 4-18, committing just one turnover in those five games (covered a span of 87 minutes)... Charged with two turnovers in his final 11 games of the season (covering a span of 121 minutes)... Ended the season with a streak of 17 consecutive

games without committing more than one turnover in a game... His role increased as the season progressed... Over the last 13 games of the season (from Feb. 4th on), he was seventh in playing time (12.2 minutes), sixth in games started (5) and fourth in assists (14)... Continued to keep his poise in hostile environments... Turned the ball over just 10 times in 17 road/neutral games and 190 minutes on the court... Had one turnover or less in 22 of his final 25 games... Against Colorado State in the MWC quarterfinals (3-9-06), played 19 minutes and contributed four points, four rebounds, one steal and an assist... In 14 minutes against South Dakota State (3-3-06), he had two points, four rebounds and three assists... Provided SDSU with a bigger presence at the point guard position in 25 minutes of action at UNLV (2-16-06)... Scored four points and dished out five assists in 25 minutes of action at Colorado State (2-4-06)... Scored four points and also grabbed a season-high three rebounds in the overtime victory at Wyoming (1-28-06)... Made his first start of the 2005-06 season vs. Maryland-Baltimore County

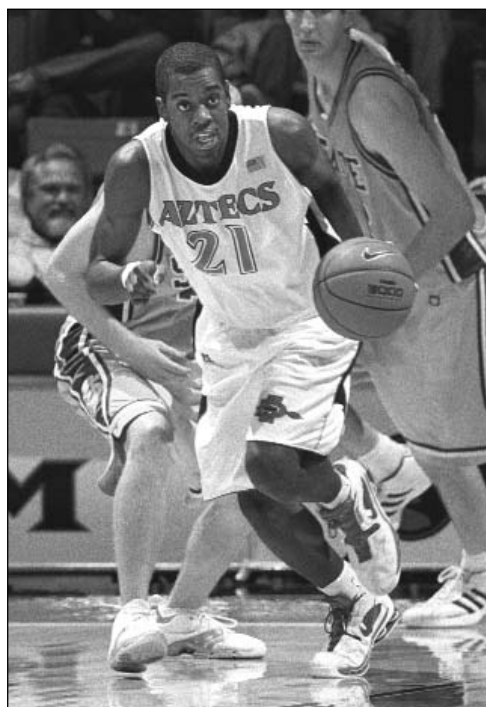

recognition... One of only two nominated players for MWC freshman of the year honors... Became the fourth Aztec freshman to earn a position on the honorable mention all-conference team in the last three years, following Evan Burns (2003), Brandon Heath (2004) and Marcus Slaughter (2004)... One of five Aztec players to see action in all 29 games last season and his 11 starts were the 6th highest total on the squad... Both numbers were also team highs among the freshman class... One of the nation's top transfers, Lorenzo Wade will make an immediate impact on an already talented Aztec team... In addition to being the most athletic player on the squad, Wade has the ability to play nearly any position on the floor at any given time... His eye-popping dunks (he won the team slam dunk contest at Midnight Madness on Oct. 13th) should not overshadow his complete game, including the ability to run the offense and stroke the three... He is a tremendous dribble-drive player... Could cause havoc with his athleticism on defense... He could have as big an impact as any player in the league this season.

Established himself as one of the top point guards on the West Coast in his first season with the Aztecs... A staple in the lineup, he was one of only three players to see action in all 33 games of SDSU's championship season... Team leader in both assists and steals, becoming just the fourth Aztec player in school history to lead the team in those two categories as a freshman... One of the quickest ball handlers on the team with an uncanny ability to break down defenses, Williams spent the summer improving his outside shooting... Can be deadly in the open court with the ability to transition from defense to offense... Has proven to be an effective floor leader.

As A Freshman (2005-06 Season)

MWC Rankings: 3rd in assists, 4th in steals, 4th in assist/turnover ratio

Made a huge impact as a true freshman, becoming a staple at the point guard position for the Aztecs... In addition to ranking among the top four in three different Mountain West Conference statistics (third in assists and fourth in steals and assist-to-turnover ratio), he ranked among the team leaders in nearly every category... He was one of just three players to start every game for the Aztecs in 2005-06 (joining Brandon Heath and John Sharper) and was second on the team in games started with 32... His 935 minutes were the third-highest total on the squad behind Brandon Heath and Marcus Slaughter... He led the squad in assists (127) and steals (58)... His 127 assists were 57 more than every player on the team other than Brandon Heath (114)... Ranked sixth on the team in both scoring (6.6 ppg) and rebounding (2.6 rpg)... Was just the ninth freshman to start a season-opening game for Steve Fisher (joining Juwan Howard, Jalen Rose, Chris Webber, Jerod Ward, Albert White, Bradley Jackson, Steve Sir and Brandon Heath)... Played 22 or more minutes in 28 games... Had 17 multiple steal games and led the team with 58 steals... First on the team in assists and dished out the second-most assists by a freshman in SDSU history... Since assists became an official stat in 1978-79, he became the sixth freshman to lead the team in that category joining Mark Delsman (1973-74), Jason Hamilton (1992-93), Chad Nelson (1993-94), Raymond King (1995-96) and Bradley Jackson (1999-00)... Only he, Jackson, King and Hamilton have led SDSU in both assists and steals as freshmen... Led

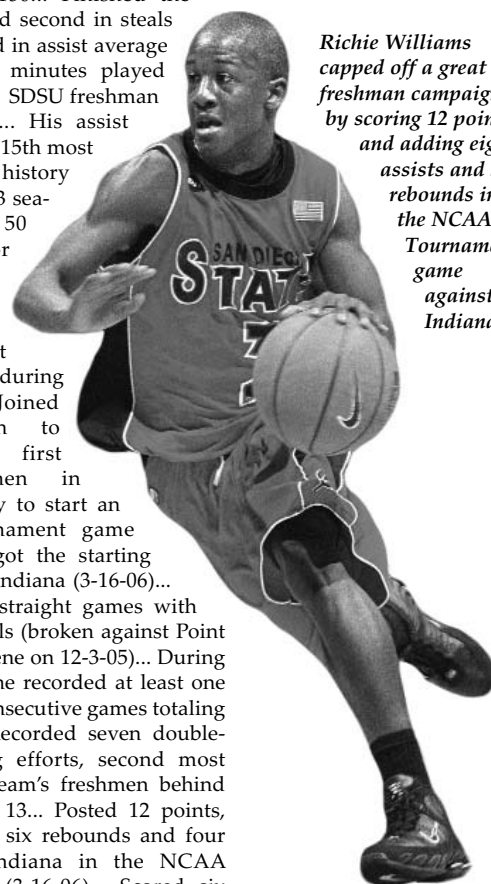
the Aztecs in assists 19 times this season... Led the team outright in assists in five consecutive games, becoming the first Aztec player to do that since Wesley Stokes did it in 2003-04... Dished out at least six assists 10 different times and had more assists than turnovers on 15 occasions... Ranked second among SDSU's all-time freshman assist leaders with 127, 23 short of Raymond King's school-best 150... Finished the season ranked second in steals (58) and third in assist average (3.8) and in minutes played (935) in the SDSU freshman record book... His assist total was the 15th most in program history (since 1972-73 season)... Shot 50 percent or better from the field in three straight games twice during the year... Joined Kyle Spain to become the first SDSU freshmen in school history to start an NCAA Tournament game when they got the starting nod against Indiana (3-16-06)... Posted four straight games with multiple steals (broken against Point Loma Nazarene on 12-3-05)... During one stretch, he recorded at least one steal in 12 consecutive games totaling 28 thefts... Recorded seven double-digit scoring efforts, second most among the team's freshmen behind Kyle Spain's 13... Posted 12 points, eight assists, six rebounds and four steals vs. Indiana in the NCAA Tournament (3-16-06)... Scored six
