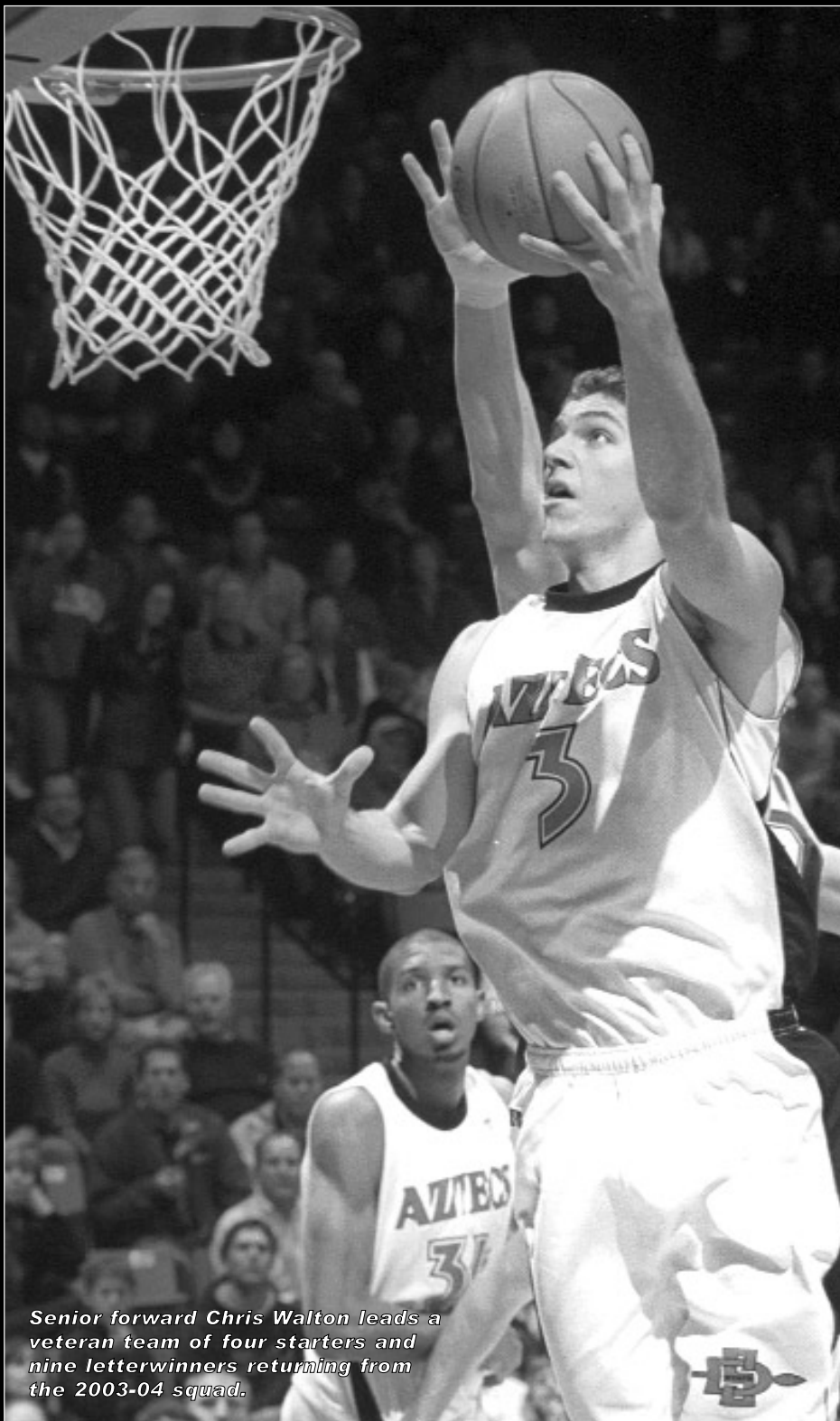

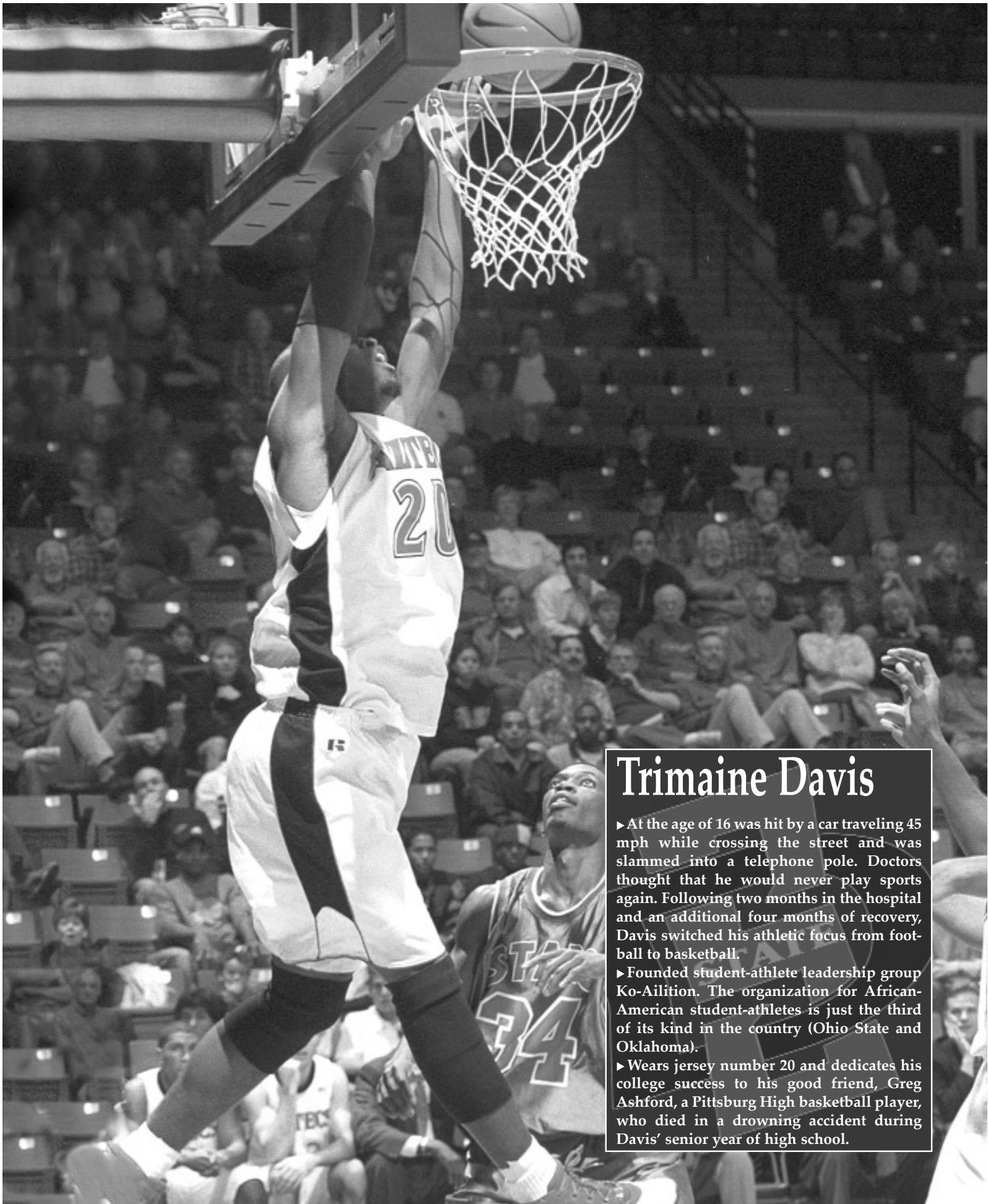

Trimaine Davis

- ▶ At the age of 16 was hit by a car traveling 45 mph while crossing the street and was slammed into a telephone pole. Doctors thought that he would never play sports again. Following two months in the hospital and an additional four months of recovery, Davis switched his athletic focus from football to basketball.
- ▶ Founded student-athlete leadership group Ko-Ailition. The organization for African-American student-athletes is just the third of its kind in the country (Ohio State and Oklahoma).
- ▶ Wears jersey number 20 and dedicates his college success to his good friend, Greg Ashford, a Pittsburg High basketball player, who died in a drowning accident during Davis' senior year of high school.

An athletic fourth-year junior who will be relied upon to provide depth on the front line... Possesses the ability to make athletic plays, both with his quickness as well as his ability to play well above the rim... Picked up competitive basketball relatively late and continues to gain court knowledge with experience... Brings great energy and enthusiasm off the bench... Continues to work on his offensive skills and developing a mid-range jumper... Only one current player has been in the program longer than Davis (Chris Walton)... Second tallest returning player on the team (behind 7-0 Chris Manker)... Among re-

turning players, he possesses the best vertical jump (27 inches) and widest arm span (seven feet).

As A Sophomore (2003-04)

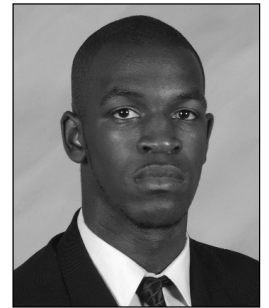
Played in 17 games, including 11 Mountain West Conference contests after missing the first eight games of the season due to knee surgery on Nov. 21 (the day of the season opener) to remove two bone fragments in his right knee... The injury occurred during practice, two days before the opener and head coach Steve Fisher gave Davis the option of delaying the surgery to accompany the team to Maui for the EA Sports Maui Invitational... Davis declined the offer so the surgery could occur as soon as possible... He played in 17-of-22 contests after his return... Although he saw limited action, he made the most of his opportunities, scoring 26 points, and adding 17 rebounds in 89 minutes of action... Had four blocked shots on the season to tie him for the fourth highest total on the squad... Averages per 40 minutes of action: 11.7 points, 7.6 rebounds and 1.8 blocks... Had an impressive score in the efficiency rating (NBA formula for determine overall value) of 0.371 points per minute played... That value was third best on the team behind all-Mountain West Conference honorees Aerick Sanders and Marcus Sluaghter... Played 10 or more minutes twice during the season (15 at Saint Mary's (1-6-04) and 11 at

Colorado State (1-24-04))... Had a career high eight points and tied a career-best with four rebounds at New Mexico (2-28-04)... Did his damage against the Lobos in just nine minutes of action... Also graded out with the best hockey plus-minus in the game at New Mexico scoring a +5 (Aztecs outscored the Lobos by five points while he was in the game)... Sealed the victory against Brigham Young (1-12-04) with a dunk with 12 seconds remaining after coming off the bench to replace Aerick Sanders, who fouled out... Played in his first contest of the season against Cal Poly (12-18-03) and registered a career high four rebounds, along with four points on two-of-two shooting in seven minutes... Went 4-for-6 from the field at Cox Arena in 2003-04... Pulled down two rebounds and blocked a shot in two minutes of action against Eastern Washington (12-20-03)... Aggressive and unrelenting, Davis blocked four shots in 89 minutes of action and ended the season by blocking three shots in his last 26 minutes of action in 2003-04.

As A Freshman (2002-03)

One of the most productive freshmen in the Mountain West Conference, Davis ranked second in the league among first-year players in field-goal percentage (min. 20 FGA) connecting on 16-of-26 attempts (61.5 percent)... Played in 24 of 30 games during the campaign, including the first 12 of the season... Provided depth in the post position early when the Aztecs were without Evan Burns, Travis Hanour and Chris Manker... Averaged 6.9 minutes per contest and was one of four key freshmen contributors to see major minutes in their first season (Evan Burns 582 minutes, Steve Sir 438 minutes, John Sharper 236 minutes, Trimaine Davis 166 minutes)... Was one of only four post players on the active roster joining Mike Mackell, Aerick Sanders and Chris Manker... Played at least 10 minutes in the first six games of the season and eight minutes in 24 games... Never went more than two games without seeing court time... Connected on 15-of-24 attempts from the field in the regular season (62.5 percent) after hitting all 15 of his field goal attempts during the exhibition games... Made his final five attempts from the field and did not miss a field goal attempt after Dec. 30, 2002... Had three points and a rebound in 16 minutes against IPFW (12-30-02)... Scored three

points and had a monster dunk in five minutes of action against Florida Atlantic (12-28-02)... Scored 10 points and pulled down three rebounds in games against UC San Diego and Arizona (30 minutes of action)... Went 3-for-3 from the field and scored a career-high six points in 19 minutes against UC San Diego (12-2-02)... Came off the bench to score four points in 11 minutes against top-ranked Arizona (12-7-02)... Saw eight minutes of action in the Aztecs' second-round NIT game at Texas Tech (3-21-03), scoring two points and adding a career-high-tying three rebounds.

As a Redshirt (2001-02)

Worked hard on and off the court to develop his game and get stronger... Redshirted along with former Aztec shooting guard Steve Sir because the Aztecs were deep at both positions... An enthusiastic player who was the Aztecs' biggest supporter on the bench while red-shirting.

High School

Averaged 20.6 points, 14.7 rebounds and 5.7 blocks for Pittsburg High as a senior... Was the first player to sign with SDSU during the spring 2001 signing period... Earned most valuable player honors in the Bay Valley Athletic League and was named to the *San Francisco Chronicle* all-metro boys team... Selected to the *NorCalPreps.com* all-NorCal third team... His prep team had a 24-2 regular-season record, the best in school history, and shared the conference title... Four-year letterwinner for the Pirates... Played for coach Darrick Domineeli.

Born April 14, 1983, in Pittsburg, Calif... Son of Vearis Calomee... Majoring in African American studies... Men's basketball representative on the SDSU student-athlete advisory board... Served as master of ceremonies for the student-athlete welcome back dinner this past fall... Founder of the student-athlete group Ko-Ailition, an organization of African-American student-athletes... The organization is just the third of its kind in the country (Oklahoma and Ohio State are the other two schools).

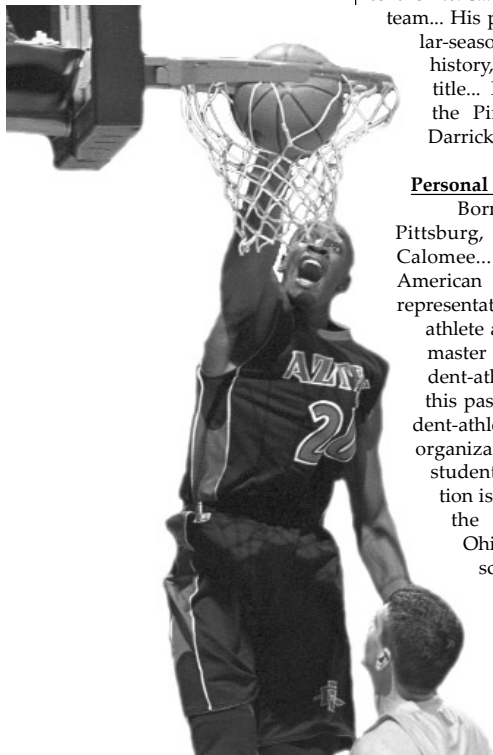

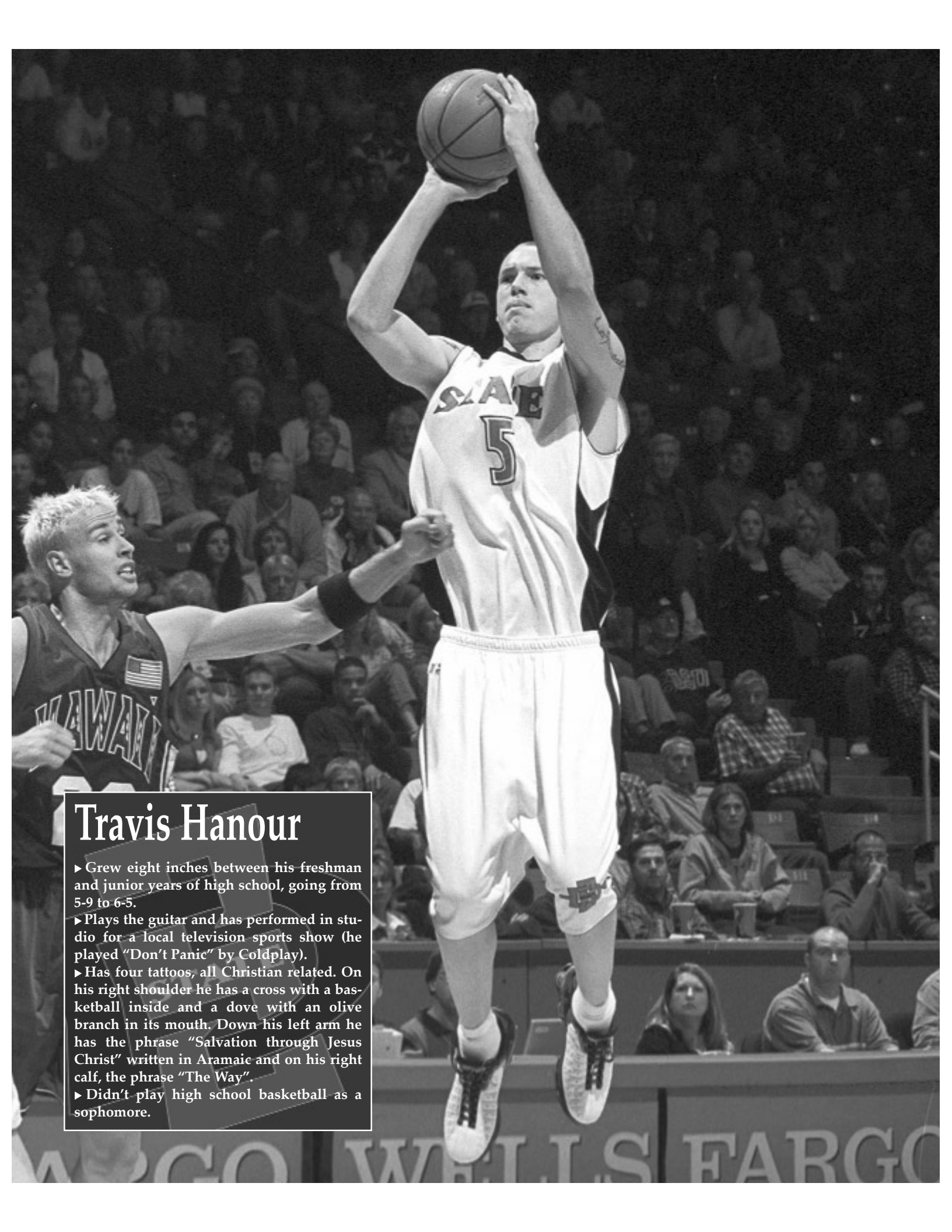

Hanour Tidbits

► During the 2002-03 season, San Diego State posted an 11-7 record in games in which Hanour played and a 7-9 record when he was unable to go.

► The Aztecs are 9-5 in games in which Hanour scores.

► Hanour enters the 2004-05 season having missed 35 consecutive San Diego State games due to injury. His last action came on March 1, 2003, in SDSU's 86-73 victory at Wyoming.

Those around the program hope Hanour will have his first injury-free season at San Diego State... Entering his third season on The Mesa, Hanour has played in just 18 games in his two seasons at SDSU and has had two knee surgeries since he last saw action in a game... Although his three-year stats aren't exactly eye-popping, the medical and coaching staffs hope that off-season surgery will allow Hanour to go through a season healthy for the first time and he will finally be able to show why he was a projected starter for the Arizona Wildcats before transferring prior to the 2001-02 season... An athletic, intelligent performer, Hanour was the Aztecs' best player during the first month of practice prior to the 2002-03 season, but difficulty with tendinitis in both knees limited his playing time and productivity.

Summer Update (2004)

Had surgery on his right knee on April 7th to alleviate chronic tendinitis... This is the same surgery Hanour had performed on his left

knee last spring (exactly 51 weeks earlier to the day)... The surgery has relegated Hanour to the weight room, and will likely keep him off the court until October... He is not expected to miss any practice time due to the surgery.

As A Junior (2003-04)

Continued to be plagued by injuries, missing the entire season due to a variety of ailments... Underwent left knee surgery on April 14th to eliminate chronic tendinitis... That surgery kept him off the court during the summer... Played his first fullcourt pick-up game on Sept. 25... While not able to play, Hanour spent quality time in the weight room and added considerable muscle to his upper body... Was unable to participate in preseason conditioning because of the surgery, but started practicing with the team in October... Suffered a bulging disc and did not practice with the team from Nov. 2-Dec. 28... Practiced with the team for 30 minutes on Dec. 29 and was practicing every day since, until suffering a sprained ankle which forced him to miss games during January... After sitting out a couple of weeks, Hanour reaggravated the ankle injury and that put him on the shelf for the remainder of the season... Had already used his redshirt season (when he transferred) and can not request a medical redshirt season or sixth year from the NCAA until his eligibility has expired, hence the 2003-04 season counts against his four years.

As A Sophomore (2002-03)

Played in 18 games and drew the starting assignment eight times... Missed the first six games of the season per the NCAA's 4-2-4 transfer rule, but played in 18 of the next 19 games before missing the final five games of

the season due to tendinitis... His eight starts tied him for the fifth highest total on the team and second among returning players... Had four rebounds and an assist in 10 minutes at Brigham Young (2-17-03)... Drew the start and posted three points and two rebounds in seven minutes of play at Utah (2-15-03)... Left the game against the Utes with a sprained ankle and was doubtful for the contest against the Cougars before seeing 10 minutes of action... Had a strong performance with three points and three rebounds in 13 minutes vs. UNLV (2-11-03)... Played only six minutes vs. Wyoming (2-3-03), but pulled down three rebounds and dished out an assist... Had a tough shooting night against the Rams when he connected on 1-of-11 from the field, including 1-of-7 from three-point range... Despite the cold shooting night, Hanour played well, recording five points, four rebounds and two assists in 26 minutes of action... Connected on 1-of-2 field goal attempts against New Mexico... Prior to that game, he suffered his first scoreless game as a member of the Aztecs, grabbing one rebound in 14 minutes of action against Brigham Young (1-20-03)... Had a career-best 35 minutes against Utah (1-18-03) which resulted in four points and a career-high seven rebounds against the Utes... Scored three points and added six rebounds in 20 minutes of action against San Diego... Returned from a one-game hiatus due to the flu with a solid performance against Texas Tech (1-6-03)... Played 22 minutes, with five points, two rebounds, two steals, one assist and two blocked shots against the Red Raiders... In his first three games at San Diego State his playing time increased (16-18-21), his point production increased (4-6-11) and his rebound total increased (2-4-4)... That trend changed slightly

in the Aztecs' blowout victory against IPFW (12-30-02), when he scored three points, tied a career-high with five rebounds and added two assists in 19 minutes of action... Scored 11 points in 21 minutes of action against Florida Atlantic (12-28-02), tying a career-high point total... Played 16 minutes in his debut against Hawai'i (12-14-02) and scored four points while adding two rebounds and two assists... As an example of his all-around abilities, Hanour recorded a basket, a rebound, an assist and a blocked shot in his first 100 seconds on the court.

As A Freshman at Arizona (2000-01)

One of three freshmen to play for an Arizona squad that finished 28-8 overall and 15-3 in the Pac-10... The Wildcats finished second in the conference and advanced to the NCAA championship game before falling to Duke... Saw action in 20 games, the most by any freshman on the team and the 10th highest total on the squad... Connected on 18-of-20 attempts (90.0 percent) from the free-throw line... Best percentage on the squad if he had enough attempts to qualify... Saw action in Arizona's national semifinal victory over Michigan State (3-31-01)... Scored a career-high 11 points at Oregon State (2-3-01), connecting on 4-of-5 attempts from the floor, including 3-of-4 from bonus distance... Pushed Arizona over the century mark by connecting on a trey vs. Eastern Illinois in the first round of the NCAA Tournament (3-16-01)... Scored 15 of his 54 points in two games at Oregon and Oregon State... Totaled four points, two boards and an assist at USC (2-17-02)... Tallied four points, three rebounds and a career-high three assists against Washington State (2-10-02)... Logged a career-best 24 minutes against Saint Mary's (12-2-02), responding with nine points on the strength of 4-for-4 free-throw shooting... Averaged 13.9 points per 40 minutes of action.

High School

Prepped at Laguna Beach High in Laguna Beach, Calif... As a senior, averaged 25.7 points, 9.7 rebounds and 5.4 assists per game for coach Bret Fleming... Shot 40 percent from the three-point arc... A first-team all-California Interscholastic Federation selection... Named the Pacific Coast League's Most Valuable Player... All-state and all-county selection... Team finished 19-7... As a junior, the Breakers went 21-6, with Hanour averaging 19.0 points, 8.0 rebounds, 5.0 assists, 3.0 steals and 3.0 blocks.

Born on Aug. 14, 1981, in Denton, Texas... Son of David Hanour and Robin Parrino... High school teammate of Chris Manker... Plays the guitar as a hobby, specializing in the music of Eric Clapton and Bob Dylan... Eligible in 2002-03 because of the NCAA's policy regarding 4-2-4 transfers (graduated from Irvine Valley College in spring of '02)... Majoring in sociology.

► San Diego State has posted an 11-7 record in games in which Johnson has started.

► Johnson has played in 39 games in which the Aztecs have won, the second most of any active SDSU player.

► Johnson enters his senior season ranked 25th on the school's career three-point field goal chart with 39.

► Johnson is one of just two Aztec players to wear the number zero jersey, joining Jim Roban.

A fourth-year player who joins Chris Walton as the only members of this season's senior class to sign with San Diego State out of high school... Will have an opportunity for greater playing time this season... Will be looked upon to provide leadership... Has the ability to score but is looking to add the threat of a consistent jumper to his arsenal... Lefty who ranked as a top 100 prospect out of high school... Has a flair for the big moment and has the uncanny ability to come off the bench and make an immediate impact... Known as a slasher, who can finish at the basket, but has proven to be an effective outside shooter as well... Enters his senior season ranked 25th on the school's all-time three-point field goal chart.

As a Junior (2003-04)

Played in 29 of 30 games during the season, missing only the UC San Diego game (12-6-03) due to a shoulder injury... Made 11 starts during the campaign, the sixth highest total on the squad... Averaged 4.0 points, 1.9 rebounds and 17.6 minutes per contest... Recorded three double-digit scoring games, including a career high 18 points on 7-of-10 shooting against Troy State (11-30-03)... Played 10 or more minutes 24 times, 20 or more

minutes 12 times and tallied 30 or more minutes twice... Scored in 22 of the 29 games in which he played... Had the best hockey plus/minus rating a team-high three of the final 12 games of the season... Totaled nine points on three-of-five shooting from the floor against Air Force (3-1-04), including his first three-pointer in nine games... Tied a season high with five rebounds in 19 minutes against Wyoming (2-21-04)... Played 29 minutes at Brigham Young (2-7-04), scoring eight points, which were his most minutes and second most points in a game since Dec. 3, 2003... Made six of eight shots and played a combined 40 minutes vs. Wyoming and Air Force... Scored nine points vs. Wyoming (1-26-04), his highest scoring output in 12 games, as he was a perfect 3-of-3 from the field... Also pulled down four rebounds in 22 minutes of action... Started the first 11 games that he played... Missed the UCSD (12-6-03) game due to a shoulder injury... That ended a streak of 21 consecutive games in which he had played dating back to the previous season... That was the longest streak of his career but has a current stretch of 23 consecutive games... Hit double figures in scoring for the third time in four games with 10 points at San Diego (12-3-03)... Has eight double-figure scoring games in his career... Recorded a career-high four steals vs. Troy State... Posted a stretch of a blocked shot in five

of six games earlier in the year... Had a three-point field goal in five straight games, the longest streak of his career, snapped at Texas Tech (12-13-03)... Owns game-high plus-minus honors a team-best three times in the final 12 games (at Wyoming (1-26-04), vs. Air Force (1-31-04) and vs. Utah (3-11-04).

As a Sophomore (2002-03)

Played in 28-of-30 games, playing 10 or more minutes in each of the last 12 games, including consecutive career highs in the category with 28 minutes at Utah (2-15-03) and 29 minutes at Brigham Young (2-17-03)... Played 20 or more minutes in each of the last three games, tying a career mark in that category... Started seven games during the campaign, including six straight from Dec. 14 to Jan. 6... In 28 games he produced far more statistically than in his freshman campaign (sophomore vs. freshman seasons: points: 156-31, rebounds: 72-18, assists: 49-7, minutes played: 474-120)... Posted strong numbers in his final three games: 32 points, 10 rebounds, five assists while connecting on 11-of-19 field goals in 68 minutes of action... Made a three-point field goal in 12 of his last 21 games and connected on 10 of his last 19 attempts (52.6 percent) from bonus distance... Connected on 21-of-29 (72.4 percent) free-throw attempts after hitting 1-of-4 all of last season... Had 10 points, including a

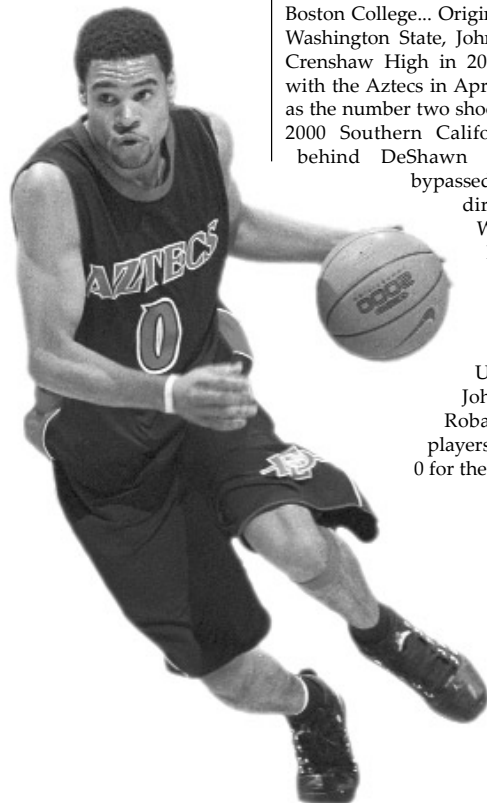

Manker Tidbits

► The Aztecs are 7-1 and have won seven consecutive games in which Manker has blocked a shot. Including his time at Oregon State, teams Manker has played on have posted a 10-2 mark when he records at least one block.

► Manker connected on 44.8 percent (13-of-29) of his three-point field goal attempts on the road last season, the highest percentage on the team.

► In five games against Wyoming, Manker is 12-of-22 (54.5 percent) from three-point range and has 38 points.

The tallest player on the Aztec squad, Manker is capable of playing both the power forward and center positions... A match-up nightmare for the opposition, Manker has two-guard shooting skills in a 7-0 body... A legitimate outside threat, he can consistently connect from three-point range... Has the ability to post-up as well as play facing the basket... Continuing to get physically stronger which will improve his inside game... Has improved at defending the post... 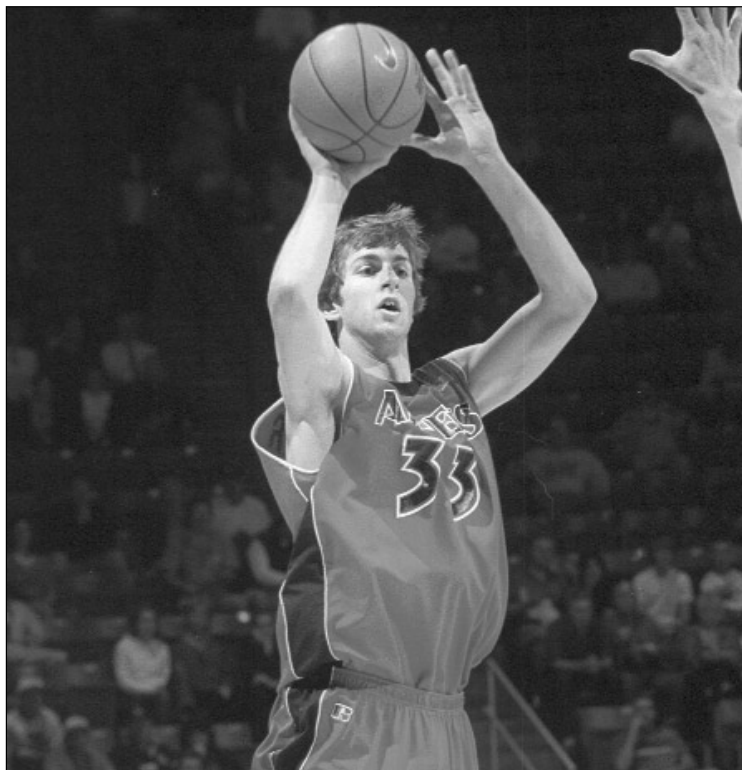

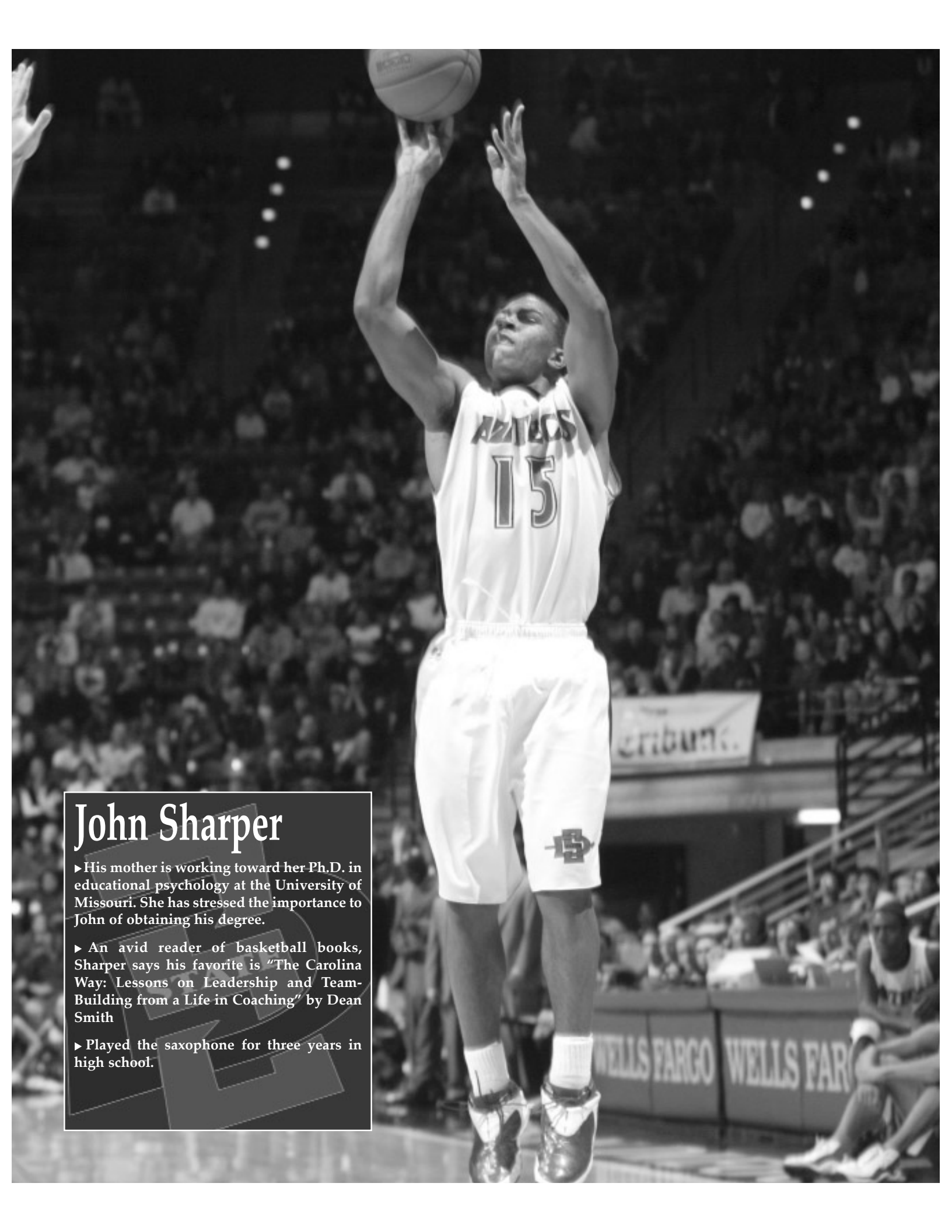

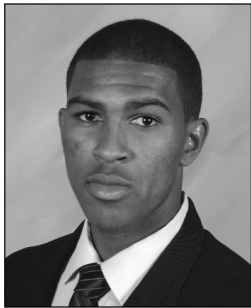

Sharper Tidbits

► Connected on 40 percent of his three-point field goal attempts at home (16-40) and in road/neutral games (14-35) in 2003-04.

► San Diego State went 7-4 last season in games in which Sharper connected on multiple treys.

► The Aztecs were 4-2 last season and 7-2 in Sharper's tenure when he tallied two or more assists.

► In 2003-04, when Sharper scored four or more points, San Diego State went 9-5.

Initially a walk-on at San Diego State, Sharper has become a solid option at the point-guard position and the team's most consistent three-pointer shooter... The best spot-up shooter on the squad, he has connected on 41 percent of his three-point field goal attempts in his first two seasons with the Aztecs... A solid ball-handler with poise beyond his years, he averaged one turnover every 27.3 minutes last season and has more three-point field goals than turnovers in his SDSU career... Continues to work on his ability to breakdown defenses.... His versatility at playing either guard position, plus his performance, will ensure that he logs significant playing time this season.

As A Sophomore (2003-04 Season)

MWC Rankings: 14th in three-point field goal percentage

Saw action in 29 of 30 games, with his lone did not play coming against UC San Diego (12-6-03)... Ended the 2003-04 campaign having played in 23 consecutive games... Made five starts, including the home finale against Utah (3-6-04)... Averaged 4.1 points, 0.9 rebounds, 0.9 apg, 0.9 spg and 17.9 mpg in his 29 appearances... Most remarkable was what he didn't do - turn the ball over... Despite splitting time between the two guard positions, Sharper had just 19 turnovers in 520 minutes of action for an astounding average of one turnover every 27.4 minutes of action... Connected on 38 treys to post a remarkable

2-to-1 three-point field goal-to-turnover ratio... Also had 26 steals... Had 18 games in which he did not commit a turnover... His three-point field goal percentage of 40.0 was not only tops on the team, but the 11th-best single-season mark in school history and the fourth-best figure in Steve Fisher's five seasons on The Mesa... His 30 treys were the 29th highest single-season total... Went five consecutive games without a turnover from Dec. 31, 2003 to Jan. 17, 2004 (broken Jan. 24, 2004, at Colorado State), covering a span of 114 minutes... Scored eight points vs. Wyoming (2-21-04), his sixth game of the year with at least eight points... Scored eight points in 20 minutes at Brigham Young (2-7-04)... Was a perfect 2-for-2 from the field and scored seven points in a win over New Mexico (2-2-04)... Earned the fifth start of his career against Utah (3-6-04)... Also started against Air Force (1-31-04) and the last three games of the non-conference schedule... Tied a career-high with nine points on 3-of-4 shooting in a career-high 34 minutes in his return home to the Bay Area at Saint Mary's (1-7-04)... Played at least 10 minutes in 27 of his 29 games he played in the '03-'04 season, including 12 games with at least 20 minutes... 75 of his 97 field goal attempts were from three-point range, including 30 of his 38 makes... Made seven of his first nine attempts (77.8 percent) from three-point range... Earned his first career start and played 25 minutes against Portland (12-31-03)... Saw 20 minutes of action at Arizona (12-22-03) where he dished out a career-best four assists... Ended a cold streak from behind the arc (1-for-7) by hitting three-of-four from deep against Cal Poly (12-18-03), to give him a career-high nine points and also tallied three assists... 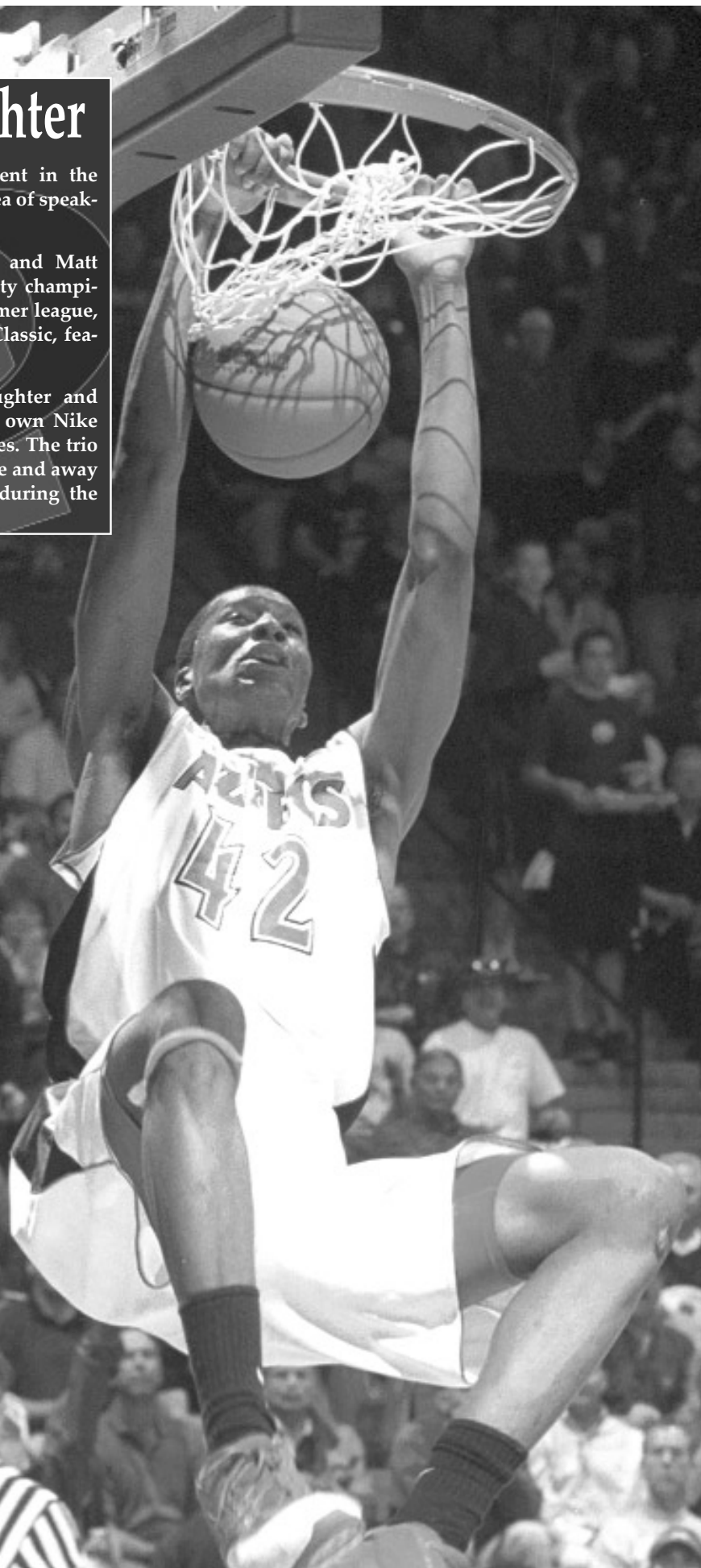

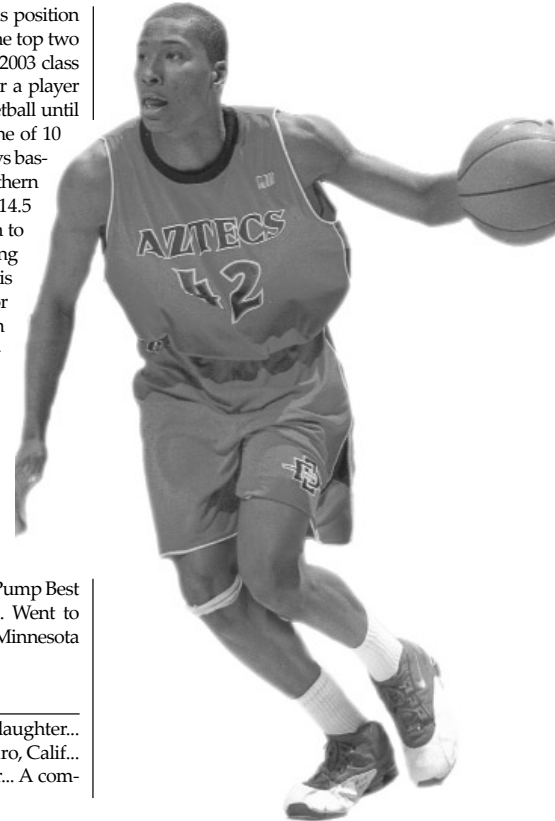

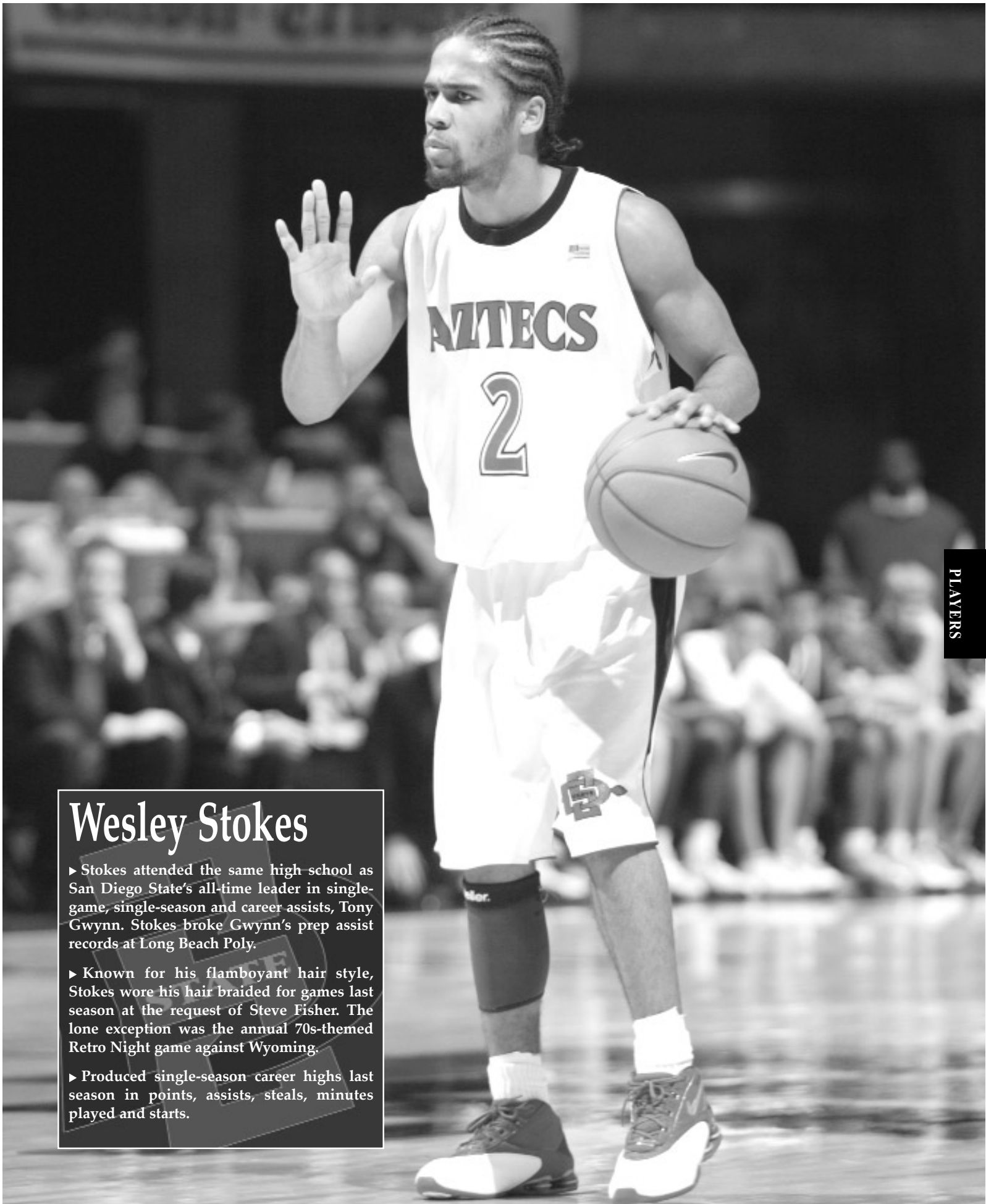

▶ When Wesley Stokes combined for 20 points-rebounds and assists, SDSU was 11-4. When he did not reach that figure the Aztecs were 3-12.

▶ The Aztecs were 8-3 last season when Stokes connected on multiple treys.

▶ Stokes teams are 5-1 when he plays 30 minutes or more and commits one or fewer turnovers.

▶ In Aztec victories last season, Stokes averaged 14.7 points (second on team) and connected on 28-of-68 from three-point range (41.2 percent).

A big-time point guard with a wealth of experience under his belt... Enters his senior season having played in 99 games and 2,497 minutes, scored 784 points and dished out 389 assists... A staple in the Missouri lineup for two seasons, Stokes started 28 games for the Aztecs last season and his minutes played total was the 15th-highest in SDSU recorded history... An all-conference honorable mention honoree as announced by the league and as voted upon by the coaches and the media... Of the 29 players honored by the conference, he was just one of 19 non-seniors honored... Enjoyed one of the best debut seasons in Aztec history, leading the team in games played (30), assists (175), steals (49) and free-throw percentage (72.5)... Was second on the squad in minutes played (1,014/33.8 mpg) and three-point field goals (41), and third in games started (28), scoring (363/12.1 ppg) and free throws made (74)... Ranked among the top 15 in six different Mountain West Conference statistical categories, leading the league in steals and ranking second among conference players in assists... Was 25th nationally in assists per contest and was 15th among non-seniors... 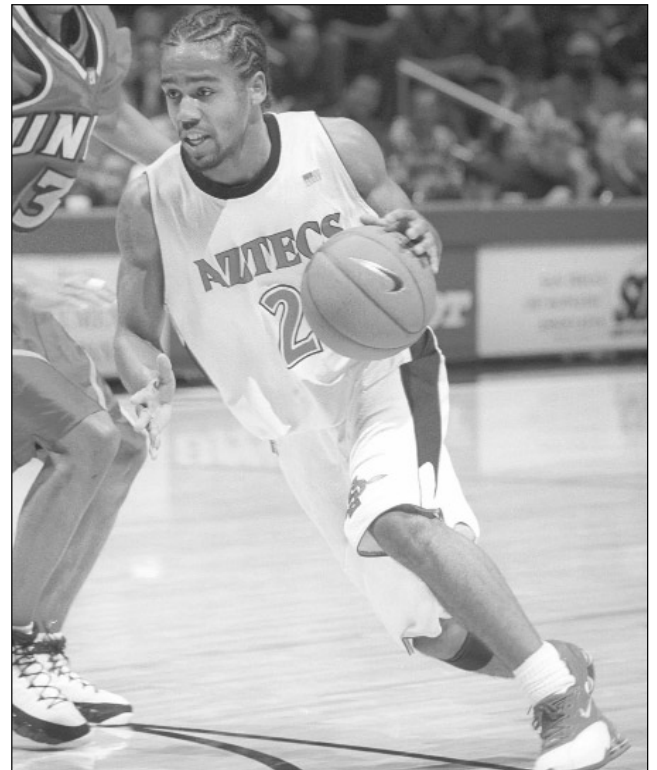

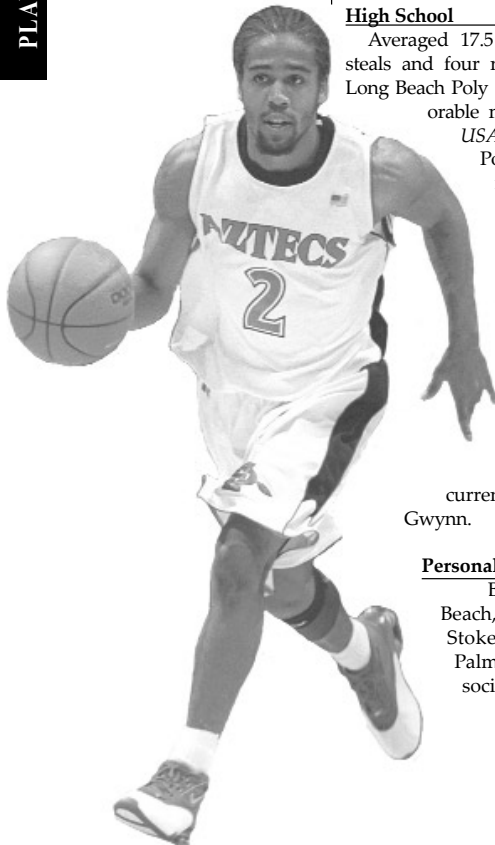

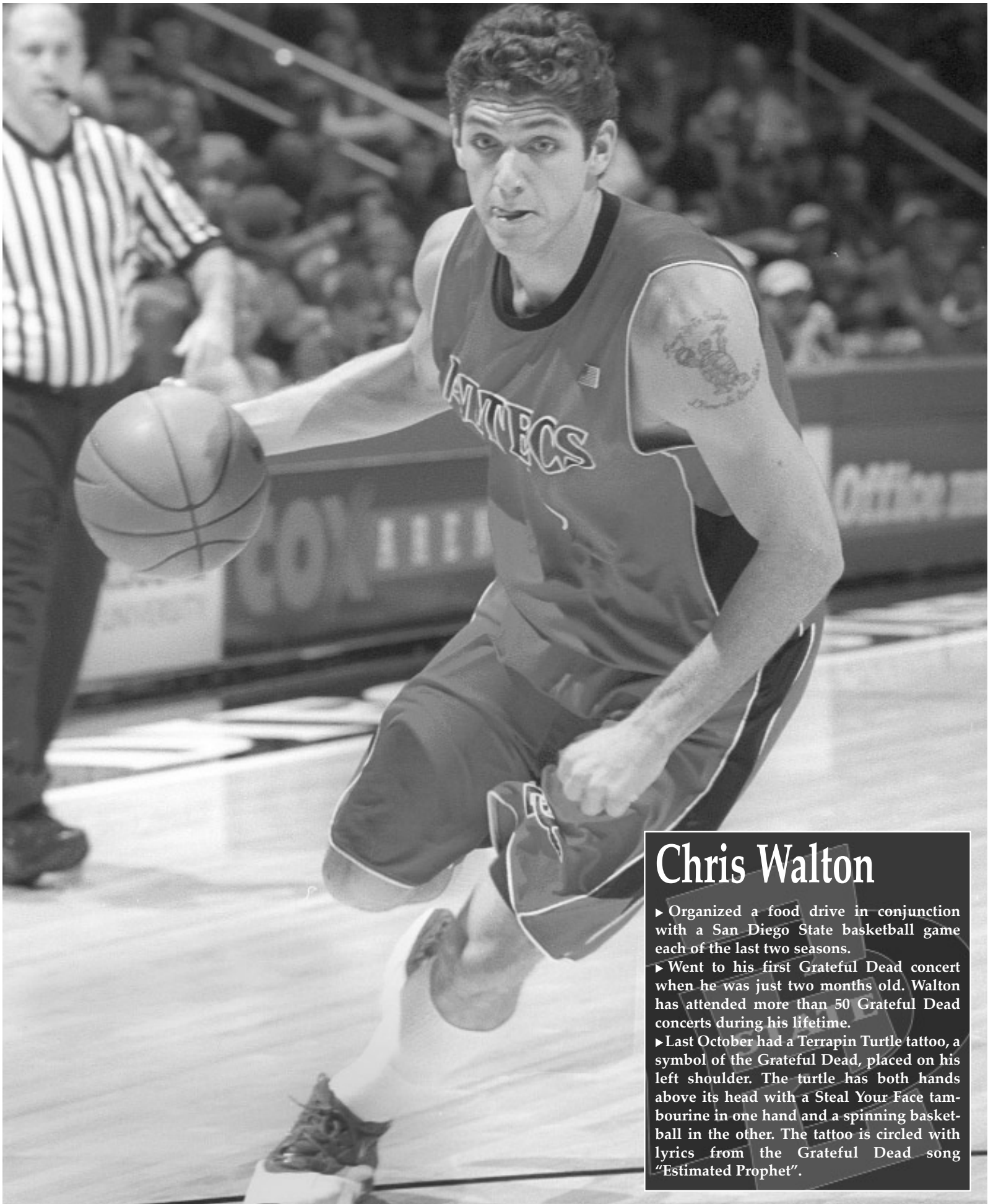

Walton Tidbits

▶ Chris Walton enters the season having started a team-high 30 consecutive games.

▶ The Aztecs were 5-0 last season when Walton attempted at least four free throws. The Aztecs have won eight straight games when Walton gets to the line at least four times.

▶ In the 2003-04 season, Walton averaged 2.79 free throw attempts in Aztec wins and 1.19 free throw attempts in SDSU losses.

▶ Since the 1975-76 season, Walton enters his senior campaign ranked 14th in career wins, having played in 49 Aztec victories.

Has played in all 91 games in the three seasons that he has been in uniform for the Aztecs... Averaged 8.7 points, 4.9 rebounds, 2.3 assists in 29.8 minutes of action per contest... Second on the team in assists (69), third on the team in rebounding (148/4.9) and blocked shots (13)... 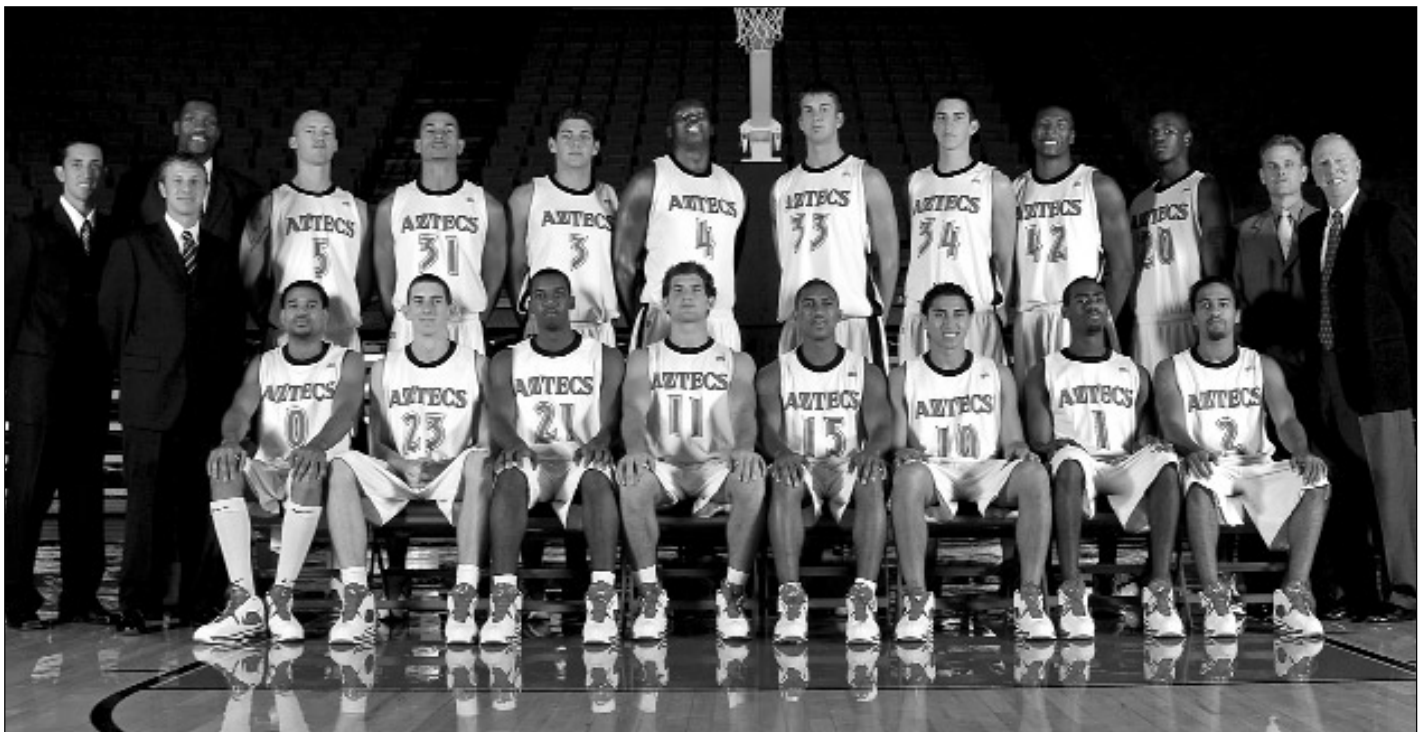
