Stacie Terry was named the eighth head coach in the history of the San Diego State women's basketball program on May 15, 2013. A native of San Diego, Terry gained a wealth of experience as an assistant coach at the Division I level over the past 13 years, including the last five under head coach Nikki Caldwell, who transformed UCLA into a powerhouse before restoring LSU to national prominence.

During Terry's two seasons at LSU, the Lady Tigers compiled a 45-23 overall record and earned two NCAA tournament bids, including a Sweet 16 appearance during the 2012-13 campaign. This past season, the Lady Tigers also posted six victories against ranked opponents and finished with their second-highest scoring average (69.0) in the last seven years. Under Terry's guidance, forward LaShondra Barrett garnered first-team all-Southeastern Conference accolades and received honorable mention All-America distinction in 2012, before becoming a first-round draft choice of the WNBA's Washington Mystics.

"I am honored and humbled to be the next head coach at San Diego State University," Terry said. "I want to thank Jim (Sterk) and his staff for this amazing opportunity. This is such a special place for me. Not only is this my dream job, but it is home. SDSU is a first-class university that has all the resources in place to be successful. I am so eager to get started and confident that we can continue the winning tradition that Aztec supporters have become accustomed to both on and off the court."

Prior to her arrival at LSU, Terry served as an assistant under Caldwell at UCLA from 2008-11, helping the Bruins gain national acclaim with a pair of NCAA tournament appearances. During Terry's tenure, UCLA posted 72 overall victories, as the 2010-11 squad finished with a 28-5 record, setting a school record for fewest losses in a single season to go with a No. 7 national ranking. In addition, the Bruins signed the fourth-ranked recruiting class that season, according to ESPN HoopGurlz, while Terry helped mentor first-team all-Pac-10 performers in Doreena Campbell, Darxia Morris and Jasmine Dixon, a 2012 honorable mention AP All-America selection, as well as all-conference freshman honorees Atonye Nyingifa and Markel Walker.

Terry spent the 2007-08 campaign at Southern Mississippi, as the Golden Eagles posted a 21-13 record and earned a postseason berth in the Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT). While at Southern Miss, Terry spearheaded the development and coordination of the Lady Eagle recruiting campaign. Her responsibilities also included working with the perimeter players, scouting opponents and film breakdown, as well as coordinating all of the team's community service events.

Terry also coached for three seasons from 2004-07 as an assistant under Hall of Fame head coach Theresa Grentz at Illinois, where the Fighting Illini had three straight recruiting classes ranked among the top 25 in the nation, according to Blue Star Basketball, and made three consecutive trips to the WNIT. Her primary duties included defensive instruction and working with the perimeter players.

In addition, Terry coached at Dayton during the 2003-04 season following a three-year stint at Louisville from 2000-03. With the Cardinals, Terry's responsibilities encompassed

recruiting, scouting, player development, summer camps and serving as a liaison for the program's community service outreach. Louisville captured the Conference USA regular-season title and earned a trip to the NCAA tournament in 2001 before making a WNIT appearance in 2002. She also assisted in signing the nation's 21st-ranked recruiting class in 2002-03, according to All-Star Girls Report. Terry recruited and coached all-Conference USA honoree Lori Nero, a draft choice of the WNBA's Houston Comets, as well as Sara Nord, who finished her collegiate career as the Cardinals' all-time assist leader and ranks among the top 15 scorers in school history.

Terry enjoyed a successful collegiate playing career at Texas-Arlington, winning four varsity letters from 1994-98 under head coach Mike Dean. She earned first-team all-Southland Conference honors after leading the Mavericks in scoring with 17.4 points per game as a senior in 1997-98. Terry scored 1,169 points during her career at UTA and still ranks among the school's top 10 in three-point field goals made (third), assists (sixth), steals (seventh) and free-throw percentage (10th). She is just one of 17 players in Maverick history to surpass the 1,000-point plateau, while her .335 career three-point field-goal percentage is also a school and Southland Conference career record.

Terry played one season of professional basketball in Warsaw, Poland, averaging 12.0 points and 6.0 assists with the Polonia Phoenix, before returning to Texas-Arlington to begin her coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1999.

Terry prepped at El Capitan High and held the Vaqueros' career scoring record for three years following her graduation. She was inducted into the school's athletic hall of fame in 2008.

Jesse Clark became head coach Stacie Terry's first hire when he was brought on board as an assistant coach on June 10, 2013.

Clark brings over 15 years of experience with him to Montezuma Mesa, including a six-year stint as an assistant at Saint Mary's College from 2007-13.

Clark will be involved with every phase of Aztec program, including the development of post players, as well as recruiting, scouting and opponent scheduling.

During Clark's tenure at SMC, the Gaels compiled 112 victories and made four consecutive trips to the Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT), including a quarterfinal appearance this past season. He coached five all-West Coast Conference performers, including Jackie Nared, who led the league in scoring during the 2012-13 campaign, as well as Louella Tomlinson, who collected back-to-back defensive player of the year awards in 2009-10. In addition, Jontelle Smith finished her career as the Gaels' all-time leader in three-point field goals and ranks fifth in scoring.

Prior to his arrival at SMC, Clark served as director of video operations at Stanford, where he was responsible for film exchange, game editing, scouting and analysis. Clark also spent two seasons at the University of San Francisco from 2003-05, where he coached two-time WCC defensive player of the year Toni Russell and helped recruit Dominique Carter, who was named the league's top newcomer in 2004.

Clark entered the coaching ranks in 1996 as an assistant at his alma mater Pacific Union College in Angwin, Calif., where he also doubled as assistant athletic director and sports information director. In 1997, he was elevated to head coach, leading the Pioneers to three California Pacific Conference tournament appearances in five seasons.



Clark then landed an assistant's role at CSU Bakersfield for the 2002-03 season, helping the Roadrunners capture the NCAA Division II West Region Championship and a berth in the Elite Eight series. Under Clark's guidance, CSU's Heather Garay was named California Collegiate Athletic Association player of the year and earned a spot on the Kodak DII All-America team.

A native of Tacoma, Wash., Clark received a bachelor of science degree in business education from Pacific Union in 2003. He played collegiately for the school from 1992-96 after prepping at Fresno Academy in Fresno, Calif.

Aisha Veasley returned to her southern California roots when she joined the Aztec coaching staff this past summer. A native of Los Angeles, Veasley has nine years of Division I coaching experience under her belt, having spent two productive stints as an assistant at Tulsa and Colorado following a successful playing career at UCLA.

During her tenure at Colorado from 2005-10, Veasley directed the Buffaloes' post players and served a pivotal role as the team's recruiting coordinator, helping to sign three top-40 classes, including the No. 26 class in 2006, according to ESPN HoopGuriz.

Veasley's recruiting successes featured future WNBA draft picks Brittany Spears, who finished her collegiate career as CU's all-time leading scorer, and Chucky Jeffery, who received honorable mention WBCA All-America recognition and first-team all-Pac-12 honors. In addition, Veasley coached and mentored two-time AP honorable mention All-American Jackie McFarland, who also collected three straight Academic All-America awards from *ESPN The Magazine*.

Prior to her arrival on the Boulder campus, Veasley coached for four seasons at Tulsa from 1999-2003, helping to transform the Golden Hurricane from a perennial cellar dweller to a competitive presence in the Western Athletic Conference. During her stint, TU racked up 53 victories after posting just 21 wins in the previous three seasons from 1996-99. Under Veasley's tutelage, Leela Farr emerged as the Hurricane's first all-WAC first-team performer, while Allison Curtin attained AP honorable mention All-America status and became the school's first-ever WNBA draft pick, going to the Houston Comets with the 12th overall selection in 2003.

Veasley was promoted to a full-time recruiting position at TU for the 2001-02 campaign. In addition to her coaching responsibilities, which concentrated on post player development, Veasley evaluated potential recruits, monitored student-athlete

affairs for the program, oversaw the Hurricane's travel arrangements and served as the team's community service coordinator.

In between her two collegiate coaching stops, Veasley played and coached one season for Everyone's Internet (EV1), an exhibition team based in Houston, Texas, that featured former collegians and WNBA players. With the EV1 squad in 2003-04, Veasley was responsible for the development of post players, as well as the coordination and budget management of team travel and player salaries.

Veasley won four varsity letters at UCLA under head coach Kathy Olivier from 1994-98. As a senior, she was voted team captain for the 1997-98 campaign, helping the Bruins advance to the second round of the NCAA tournament. Veasley also captured UCLA's Coaches Award that season and was named the squad's most inspirational player the previous year in 1997.

Veasley received her undergraduate degree in history with a specialization in business from UCLA in 1999. In addition, she served one season as head coach in the prep ranks at Boulder High School in 2010-11, guiding the Panthers to the second round of the Colorado state 5A tournament, before spending the last two years in private business in Westminster, Colo.

Head coach Stacie Terry filled her final staff vacancy when she announced the addition of Ciara Carl as assistant coach on July 15, 2013. A standout player at Point Loma Nazarene during her collegiate playing career, Carl returns to southern California after spending the 2012-13 campaign as an assistant at Metro State in Denver, Colo., following a two-year stint in the same capacity at Cal Poly Pomona.

During her one season at Metro State, Carl helped coach the Roadrunners to 21 victories and a spot in the NCAA Division II tournament, where they advanced to the second round. Under her tutelage, five Metro State players garnered all-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference accolades, including Kristin Valencia, who was named the league's Defensive Player of the Year. As a team, the Roadrunners led the RMAC in scoring defense (51.2 ppg) and limited opponents to a league-worst .350 field-goal percentage.

Carl also witnessed success during her tenure at Cal Poly Pomona from 2010-12, as the Broncos compiled a two-year mark of 47-14 (.770) and made a pair of NCAA DII tournament appearances, including a berth in the Elite Eight in 2011. During that season, Carl assisted in the development of senior guard Reyana Colson, who earned All-America honors after capturing the California Collegiate Athletic Association's Most Valuable Player award.

Prior to arrival at CPP, Carl gained valuable coaching experience during stops with the San Diego Sol, the San Diego Super 60 League, as well as her prep alma mater, Saint Mary's School in Raleigh, N.C.

As a collegian, Carl starred at point guard for PLNU, helping the Sea Lions compile an 83-27 overall record in her final three seasons. During that stretch, PLNU made three consecutive trips to the NAIA tournament, capped by a Final Four appearance in 2005. She still holds the school's career record with 647 assists and ranks second with 277 steals.

Carl received her undergraduate degree in exercise science from PLNU in 2005 and earned her master's of science degree from California University (Pa.) in 2006 with an emphasis in performance enhancement and injury prevention. She later completed an internship at North Carolina State, working with the Wolfpack's strength and conditioning program.

A native of Los Angeles, Carl was raised in Cary, N.C., before graduating from Saint Mary's School in 2000. In addition to earning all-state honors in basketball as a senior, Carl also lettered in volleyball and golf during her prep career.

An SDSU alumna, Arefi will be involved with all phases of the program relating to team travel, game day operations, fundraising, equipment and community service. In addition, she will work with the Aztec Club as the point person for the team's booster organization, the Full Court Press Club, while assisting with freshman orientation.

Arefi is no stranger to SDSU athletics, having held several roles in the department since November 2006. Most recently, she served as senior athletics coordinator, providing direct executive assistance in the day-to-day operations of the athletics director's office. Arefi was responsible for coordinating and scheduling meetings, public appearances and speaking engagements, while detailing complex travel arrangements and itineraries.

Arefi's endless duties also included assisting with ticket distribution at Mountain West and NCAA tournament games for the men's basketball squad, as well as supervision of interns in the athletic director's office and the oversight and planning of internal staff functions.

In addition, Arefi served as the athletics liaison for other campus departments, including the President's Office, University Relations and Development, Business Affairs and Student Affairs, among others.

Arefi received her bachelor of arts degree in communication from SDSU in 2005 and earned a master's in educational leadership in 2010.

Mike Bynum is in his fourth year as the Aztecs' director of player development.

Bynum's job duties include coordinating film exchange, editing game and practice film, developing team highlight videos and supervising student managers. He also assists director of basketball operations Fatema Arefi in the planning and setting up of all women's basketball events.

Over his last three seasons, the team has combined to win 64 games and captured two Mountain West Conference regular-season titles and one tournament crown, while also advancing to the 2012 NCAA championships.

Before returning to SDSU, Bynum was as an assistant varsity coach with the boys' team at Scripps Ranch High School under head coach Brian Keiser. Bynum was in charge of the Falcons' video editing, helped scout future opponents and on the court, worked with the squad's defense, which gave up the fewest points per game in San Diego. Scripps Ranch went 16-11 overall and won two tournaments during the 2009-10 campaign.

Bynum became a student manager for the Aztec men's basketball team in September 2004, and over the next five seasons helped with practice set-up, game statistics, summer camps and team travel. Bynum supervised other student managers and assisted the squad's video coordinator with opponent scout edits. SDSU boasted a 103-61 record during his five-year stint, recording four straight 20-win seasons and claiming the 2005-06 Mountain West Conference regular season and tournament championships.

In the summer of 2009, Bynum was a counselor at both the LeBron James King's Academy and the Steve Fisher Basketball Camp, where he supervised basketball players of various age groups, provided skill instruction and helped conduct drills.

Originally from Toronto, Bynum lived in San Francisco, Washington, D.C., and Dallas before moving to San Diego where he attended Scripps Ranch High School, graduating in 2004. He earned his bachelor's degree in communication from San Diego State in May 2009 and was a member of the Lambda Pi Eta Honor Society. His father Rod Bynum is the head assistant men's basketball coach at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario.

Randy Shelton is in his fourth season as the women's basketball team's strength and conditioning coach.

During his three years on Montezuma Mesa, the Aztecs have enjoyed one of the most successful runs in program history, thanks in large part to their effort in the weight room. Over the last three seasons, San Diego State has won 64 games, including a program-record 27 victories in 2012-13,

captured three Mountain West championships (two regular season, one tournament) and advanced to the 2012 NCAA tournament.

A 2000 graduate of San Diego State, Shelton is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association and is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS).

Shelton is married to the former Waleska Valle and the couple have two children, son Darren and daughter Farah.

Gabrielle Clark enters her first year as a graduate assistant on head coach Stacie Terry's staff. A four-year letterwinner at forward for the Aztecs, Clark was a member of two NCAA tournament squads in 2009 and 2012 and was a Mountain West all-defensive team selection in 2013, helping the Scarlet and Black capture its second straight regular-season conference title.

Clark also served as team co-captain for three seasons and was a three-time recipient of the Aztecs' Tammy Blackburn Coaches Award, which recognized her accomplishments both on the court and in the classroom.

In addition, Clark was one of just 50 student-athletes from across the nation selected to the prestigious WBCA "So You Want To Be A Coach" program last year and was nominated for the WBCA/Allstate Good Works team for her involvement in numerous community service events.

Clark received her bachelor's degree in sociology with a minor in child development last spring and is currently working toward her master's in educational leadership.

As the team's head athletic trainer, her primary responsibility is the overall health of the student-athletes, working closely with a team of physicians and other athletic trainers on staff to provide the best quality care. Whether it's the flu

or an ankle sprain, the Aztecs see her for all ailments. In addition, Soriano has state-of-the-art equipment at her disposal, including a SWIM-Ex Unit and Alter G anti-gravity treadmill to rehabilitate injuries and return the student-athletes to the court better than before.

A graduate of San Diego State, Soriano received her bachelor of science degree in kinesiology with an emphasis in athletics training in 2004. During her undergraduate studies, she worked as a student trainer for the Aztec football, women's tennis, women's soccer and water polo teams and became certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association in 2004.

Prior to her return to Montezuma Mesa, Soriano spent seven years at the University of New Mexico, including the last five as an assistant athletic trainer after receiving her master's degree in sports administration from the school in 2006.

Born in Manila, Philippines, Soriano prepped at Mount Miguel High School in nearby Spring Valley, where she competed for the basketball and volleyball teams.

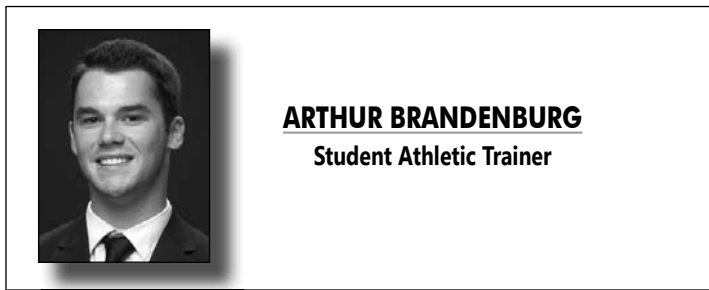

Dr. SaBrina "Bre" White is in her 19th year as a student-athlete support services professional and enters her 14th year at SDSU, where she is the assistant director of academic services. She works directly with the Aztec women's basketball team, as well as the football squad (offense),

men's and women's golf, and cross country and track and field teams. White is also in charge of the department's community service program and works with the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC).

Prior to coming to San Diego State, White was an academic coordinator at her alma mater Utah State University for six years (1994-2000). She started off her career as an interim academic coordinator at Utah State in 1994 right after graduation, and then was hired as a full-time academic coordinator in 1995. With the Aggies, she served as an advisor for the football, men's basketball, women's soccer, women's volleyball, men's golf, softball, gymnastics, men's and women's tennis, and track and field teams.

White earned her first degree from Utah State in liberal arts and science, and later went on to earn a second bachelor's degree in business.
