COUGARS HEAD TO SAN DIEGO FOR FIRST ROAD GAME

BYU is coming off a wild 51-50 loss against TCU and now heads to San Diego State to play the Aztecs for its first road game of the season. The Cougars are currently 1-2 overall and 0-1 in the Mountain West Conference, while the Aztecs are 1-3 overall and 0-1 in the conference. Against TCU, BYU's offense exploded for 21 first-quarter points and finished with 50. John Beck threw for career-highs of 517 yards (an MWC record) and five touchdowns (tied an MWC record) while completing 30-of-51 pass attempts. Todd Watkins caught a career-best three touchdowns and had 176 yards on seven receptions.

A LOOK AT THE AZTECS

The Aztecs have have started 1-3 overall and are 0-1 in the conference in 2005. Before its 52-21 win over San Jose State, San Diego State had lost three in a row to start the season with defeats coming against UCLA, Air Force and No. 9 Ohio State. Against San Jose State, the Aztecs racked up 210 rushing yards while Kevin O'Connell threw for 271 yards and four touchdowns. Jeff Webb was his top target as he caught eight passes for 133 yards. San Jose State stuck with San Diego State before the Aztecs broke it open by scoring 24-consecutive points to put the game out of reach. For the season, O'Connell has thrown for 215.2 yards per game and seven touchdowns while completing just over 70 percent of his passes. Lynell Hamilton is the Aztecs' top rusher with 229 yards while scoring four touchdowns. Webb is the top receiver on the team with 315 yards and two touchdown receptions on 25 catches.

SERIES INFORMATION

Saturday's game will be the 30th meeting between BYU and San Diego State. The Cougars lead the overall series 22-6-1 and hold a 9-4-1 advantage in San Diego. The Cougars have won the last four meetings and have averaged 46.5 points in those meetings. Last season, BYU defeated the Aztecs 49-16 in Provo. The Cougars scored 36 second-half points and Curtis Brown ran for 106 yards and a touchdown, while John Beck threw for 313 yards and three touchdowns, completing 15-of-25 passes.

HIGHEST SCORING GAME

BYU and TCU combined for 101 points in the Horned Frogs' 51-50 victory over the Cougars, making it the highest scoring game between Division I-A opponents this season. Texas Tech defeated Sam Houston State, a Division I-AA team, 80-21, on Sept. 17. The combined 101 points was also an MWC record for most points scored in a conference game.



CAREER HIGHS AND SINGLE-GAME RECORDS

When John Beck completed a 37-yard pass to Jonny Harline against TCU, he had 420 passing yards, surpassing his career high of 390, which came against Boise State in 2004. He finished the day with a Mountain West single-game record 517 yards. Beck also set a new career high and tied a MWC record for touchdown passes with five when he completed a 25-yard scoring strike to Todd Watkins in overtime. His previous high was four against Air Force in 2004 when the Cougars won 41-24. Watkins finished with 176 yards and an MWC record three touchdowns.

MWC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

John Beck was named the Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Week after posting a MWC record 517 yards passing in BYU's 51-50 loss to TCU. He completed 30-of-51 (.588) attempts, and became just the third player in league history to pass for over 500 yards in a game. Beck also tied a MWC single-game record with five touchdown passes. His third-quarter strike found wide receiver Todd Watkins for a 67-yard touchdown, marking the Cougars' longest score of the season. On the first play of the overtime period, Beck went to the corner of the end zone to find Watkins for the 25-yard touchdown, giving BYU a 50-44 lead in overtime.

IN GOOD COMPANY

Through his freshman and sophomore years, John Beck compiled 3,427 yards passing. Only two BYU quarterbacks passed for more yards in their first two years of college football. Heisman trophy winner Ty Detmer recorded 5,812 yards in 1988-89, including 4,560 in 1989 as a sophomore. John Walsh had 4,678 yards from 1991-93, including 3,727 as a sophomore in 1993. He threw for 857 in 1992 before going down with a shoulder injury and being granted a medical redshirt. Three games into his junior season, Beck has thrown for 4,529 yards, including 1,102 yards this season. Following lists each players total yards through three games as a junior.

BECK NOTES:

- John Beck's 517-yard performance against TCU marked the most passing yardage by a BYU quarterback since Bret Engemann totaled 447 yards in the Cougars' 38-35 win at Virginia during the 2000 season.
- With 517 yards passing against TCU, Beck has totaled six career 300-yard games.
- With 4,529 career yards, Beck needs just 644 yards to move into fifth place on the Mountain West Conference career passing list.
- With 28 career touchdown passes, Beck needs seven more to move into fifth place on the Mountain West Conference career touchdown completions list.
- With 517 yards on Saturday, Beck became only the third player in league history to pass for over 500 yards in a game.

STAT WATCH

After putting up big numbers that last two games, John Beck and the Cougar offense are among national and conference leaders. Beck currently ranks third in passing yards per game (367.3 p/g) and is tenth in total passing yards (1,102). He leads the Mountain West Conference in both categories. BYU's passing offense is fourth in the nation and first in the conference while its total offense average of 461.0 yards per game is first in the conference and 21st in the nation. The Cougars also lead the conference with the least first downs allowed (56) and in time of possession (33:02). Beck leads the conference and is fourth nationally in total offense (357.0 yards p/g) while Curtis Brown is second in the conference and 50th nationally in all-purpose yards (125.7 p/g). Todd Watkins currently leads the conference and is 29th nationally in scoring (10.0 points p/g). Jared McLaughlin leads the conference in kicking points per game (8.7) and in field goals per game (1.67).

LONGEST SCORE AND ONE-PLAY DRIVES

John Beck's 39-yard touchdown pass to Todd Watkins in the first quarter against TCU was the longest scoring play of the season for the Cougars. Later in the third quarter, Beck hit Watkins for a 67-yard score on the first play of the drive. In overtime, Beck found Watkins for a 25-yard touchdown on the first play. All of Watkins' scores came on one-play drives.

LONGEST GAME

BYU's game versus TCU lasted four and 42 minutes, the longest in Cougar football history since 2001 when the Cougars played at Hawai'i and lost 72-45. That game lasted four hours and 24 minutes. Following is a list of some of BYU's longest games:

ALL IN THE FAMILY

When Zac Collie caught a seven-yard touchdown pass from John Beck on BYU's first drive of the day, it was the 13th touchdown scored by the Collie family for the Cougars. Zac's father, Scott Collie, scored four TD's when he played for the Cougars from 1979-82 and his brother Austin scored eight as a freshman in 2004. Zac added the 14th for the family later in the first quarter on a 37-yard reception from Beck to put BYU up 21-10. It was the second two-game touchdown for a member of the Collie family. Austin scored two against San Diego State in 2004.

FIRST DRIVE SHUTOUTS

The Cougar defense has shutout its opponents on their opening drive for 17-consecutive games, including last Saturday against the Horned Frogs. The last team to score on its opening drive was UNLV, Oct. 25, 2003 when the Rebels managed a field goal to open the game. The last team to score a touchdown on its opening drive against the Cougars was Colorado State on Oct. 9, 2003. It has now been 19 games since BYU has allowed its opponents to score a touchdown on its opening drive.

WHERE'S THE BEEF?

The BYU offensive line doesn't order salads when it goes out to eat. Each starter weighs over 300 pounds for an average of 325 and a total of 1,625. They will be going up against a San Diego State defensive line that weighs an average of 262.5 pounds. The Aztec offensive line weighs on average of 292 pounds while BYU's defensive line weighs an average of 317.3.

ROOKIE HEAD COACHES

Bronco Mendenhall became BYU's 14th head coach, the 13th man to hold the job, on Dec. 13, 2004. The coaches have had varied levels of success in their first year at the helm. Four head coaches have enjoyed winning records at the beginning of their tenures, including twice by Eddie Kimball. Two coaches won half of their games while the rest had losing seasons. In their debut games, rookie coaches are 7-7. It is interesting to note that both Bronco Mendenhall and LaVell Edwards started 1-2. Edwards went on to finish 7-4 in his first campaign. BRONCO MENDENHALL



After 16 seasons as an assistant coach, including the past two years as the defensive coordinator for the Cougars, Bronco Mendenhall was promoted to head football coach at Brigham Young University on December 13, 2004. Mendenhall becomes the 14th head coach since the University first officially recognized football as an intercollegiate sport in 1922.

Mendenhall (38)--one of the youngest NCAA Division I-A head coaches in the country--has served the past two seasons as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach for the Cougars. During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

In 2004, the Cougars ranked third in the Mountain West in rushing defense, allowing 149.3 yards per game. The Cougars also ranked second in the league, with 34 sacks for a combined loss of 232 yards.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many

accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to the former Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons: Cutter (5), Breaker (3) and Raeder (18 mo.).

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

The BYU coaching staff leads the Mountain West Conference with five members of its coaching staff who have played football in the National Football League or the old USFL. Associate Head Coach and running backs coach Lance Reynolds was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978 and also played for Philadelphia. Offensive coordinator Robert Anae was drafted in the third round by the New Jersey Generals of the USFL. Quarterbacks coach Brandon Doman was drafted by the San Francisco 49'ers in 2002 and also played with the Washington Redskins. Cornerbacks coach Brian Mitchell was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons where he played for three seasons. He also played for the Dallas Cowboys.

SOMEBODY'S WATCHING YOU...

Six members of the 2005 BYU football team - John Beck, Curtis Brown, Daniel Coats, Cameron Jensen, Jake Kuresa, Lance Reynolds and Todd Watkins - have been named to various "watch lists" for postseason awards.

John Beck, 6-2, 210, Quarterback: John Beck has been selected to the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award watch list, which honors the nation's best quarterback. Beck started 10 of 11 games his sophomore year and threw for 2,563 yards and 15 touchdowns. He averaged an MWC best 261.0 yards per game against league opponents. Beck earned second-team All-MWC honors as a sophomore.

Manaia Brown, 6-4, 310, Defensive Line: Manaia Brown has been named to the Lombardi Award watch list. Brown started eight of 11 games in 2004, registering 26 tackles, nine for a loss of 48 yards. He also registered 4.5 sacks. He was named All-MWC Honorable Mention.

Curtis Brown, 6-0, 210, Running Back: Curtis Brown has been named a Doak Walker Award candidate. In 2004, Brown had over 100 yards in four-straight games, including a season-high 159 against Wyoming. Against the Cowboys, he threw a 40-yard touchdown pass and ran for the score that put the Cougars ahead for good. He is only the fourth BYU player to crack the 1,000-yard rushing mark during his sophomore year.

Daniel Coats, 6-3, 250, Tight End: Daniel Coats has been selected to the John Mackey Award watch list. He played all 11 games for BYU as a sophomore, catching 13 passes for 160 yards. He had a season-best four receptions for 42 yards against Air Force. As a freshman in 2003, Coats earned freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News.

Jake Kuresa, 6-5, 330, Offensive Line: Jake Kuresa has been named to the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award watch lists. He has started every game (23) in his two year career. As a freshman, he played both guard and tackle and played exclusively at tackle as a sophomore. Kuresa helped anchor an offensive unit that averaged 24.3 points, 105.8 yards rushing and 279.5 yards passing per game in 2004.

Cameron Jensen, 6-5, 330, Linebacker: Cameron Jensen has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Butkus Award and Lombardi Award watch lists. He started all 11 games in 2004 and led the team in total tackles with 103, solo tackles with 49 and assisted tackles with 54. His 12.0 tackles for loss and two fumble recoveries tied him for first on the team and he added two interceptions, one of which he returned for a touchdown against UNLV.

Lance Reynolds, 6-3, 293, Offensive Line: Lance Reynolds has been named to the Rimington Trophy watch list. He started every game in 2004 at center. He helped anchor an offensive unit that averaged 24.3 points, 105.8 yards rushing and 279.5 yards passing per game in 2004.

Todd Watkins, 6-3, 194, Wide Receiver: Todd Watkins has been named to the Biletnikoff watch list. He led the Mountain West Conference with 1,042 yards receiving in 2004 and set a league single-season record, averaging 94.7 yards per contest. He also caught 52 passes and six touchdowns, four of which were for 68, 69, 70 and 79 yards.

GOING DEEP

Jared McLaughlin's career-long 47-yard field goal in the third quarter against TCU put the Cougars up 27-16. His previous long was 35 yards against Boston College in the season opener. Junior Derek McLaughlin also got into the action, booting a 60-yard punt in the second quarter, his longest punt since joining the Cougars. While at the University of Washington, McLaughlin had a school-record 74-yarder against the University of California.

QUITE AN ENTRANCE

Freshman Luke Ashworth caught the first pass of his career on BYU's opening drive against TCU. John Beck found him open on the left side of the field for a 34-yard gain.

OVERTIME

Before Saturday's loss to TCU, BYU was 5-0 in overtime games since it was implemented in 1996. BYU's last overtime game was a 27-20 victory at UNLV in 2003.

COUGARS SPORT TRADITIONAL UNIFORMS



Beginning with the 2005 season, the Cougars will wear the uniform that still remains the visible icon of the great football tradition at BYU. The home uniform will feature a dark-blue jersey with white pants, while the road uniform will include the white jersey with dark-blue pants. Both the home and road uniforms will be trimmed with "Northwestern" style stripes on the sleeves, as well as down the sides of the pants. In addition, the Cougars will wear white helmets with the traditional helmet logo and blue stripes.

While there have been three uniform changes in the past six years, Mendenhall said the new, traditional uniform is back to stay. Mendenhall also said the names of the players will also be displayed on the back of the uniforms, and players will receive "cougar head" helmet decals for notable performances both on and off the field.

Since 1999, when BYU changed its official school colors, the Cougars have had three different uniforms. BYU unveiled a new uniform in 1999, followed by a revision in 2000. Last season the Cougars sported a new look that featured the "UCLA" insert over the shoulder.

FROM ENDZONE TO ENDZONE

Following Beck's 39-yard touchdown pass to Todd Watkins in the first quarter against TCU to put BYU up 14-0, Cory Rodgers returned Jared McLaughlin's kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown. It was the first time since BYU played Stanford in 2004 that an opposing team returned a kickoff for a score.

FIRST TIME IN A LONG TIME

The Cougar offense exploded for 21 points in the first quarter against TCU behind the passing of John Beck. It was the first time BYU scored 21 points in the opening frame since a 56-34 win over Colorado State Nov. 1, 2001.

STARTING WITH A TD

When Zac Collie caught a seven-yard touchdown pass from John Beck on BYU's first possession, it was the second-consecutive game the Cougars scored on their opening drive. Curtis Brown scored on a one-yard run to open the game against Eastern Illinois.

NOT GONNA GET THESE GUYS OFF THE FIELD

BYU has 18 players with seven or more career starts. Paul Walkenhorst leads with 35 while Justin Luetgerodt has seven. Walkenhorst started 33 from 2000-02 before injuries derailed him. He has started three games in 2005. Fahu Tah'i's first starts date back further than anyone on the team as he started seven games as a freshman in 1999. Dallas, a freshman, was heavily recruited out of high school and joined the Cougars this season after serving an LDS mission in Seattle, Washington.



ON THE AIR

The exclusive radio home of BYU Football and flagship of the Cougar Sports Network is KSL NEWSRADIO (1160 AM and 102.7 FM) in Salt Lake City. The "Voice of the Cougars" is Greg Wrubell, now in his 5th season as play-by-play commentator. A BYU alum, Wrubell joined the broadcast crew in 1992 as the sideline/locker-room reporter. He began calling BYU basketball games in 1996.

Joining Wrubell is game analyst and former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons. Lyons is a 24-year veteran of Cougar football broadcasts and co-host of the midweek "Bronco Mendenhall Show." A pair of BYU greats join the KSL Broadcast team this season, with two-time all-conference kick returner James Dye reporting from the sidelines and locker-room, and three-time NFL Pro-Bowl selection Chad Lewis joining Lyons and Dye on the pregame "Cougar Countdown Show." The gameday studio host is KSL's Scott Haws, a former BYU student-athlete and all-conference pitcher for the baseball Cougars.

Chief Engineer John Dehnel returns for his 21st season, while veteran statistician Ralph Sokolowsky and spotter Doug Martin complete the lineup in the booth.

KSL's game day coverage begins two hours prior to kickoff with the "Cougar Countdown Show." The "Cougar Pregame Scoreboard Show" starts the broadcast's second hour, with the "Cougar Pregame Coach's Show" 35 minutes prior to kickoff, followed by the "Cougar Kickoff Show."

After the game, KSL presents the "Cougar Postgame Scoreboard Show," followed by the "Cougar Locker Room Show," "Cougar Postgame Coach's Show," "Cougar Call-In Show" and "IFA Country Store Replay."

BIG-TIME YARDS

The BYU offense racked up 614 yards of total offense, including 97 on the ground and 517 in the air. It was the first time BYU had over 600 yard total offense since the Cougars had 615 yards against Syracuse in 2002. It was the first time since 1999 BYU had over 500 passing yards when Kevin Feterik had 501 against Washington. Saturday's game was the first time a quarterback had three-or-more touchdown passes since 2004 against San Diego State when Beck had three. Three of those touchdowns went to Todd Watkins, making it the first time since 2001 when Doug Jolley had three against Air Force. One of his scores was a 67-yard grab, the first time BYU scored on a 50-yard-or-more passing play since Austin Collie caught an 82-yarder against San Diego State in 2004. Watkins' 176 yards was the first time a receiver had 150-or-more yards since he had 153 against Air Force in 2004.



SLOW START, GOOD FINISH

While BYU fell 20-3 in its season opener to Boston College, historical trends indicate the Cougars should still have a successful season. Since 1974, BYU has opened 12 seasons with a loss. In those 12 seasons, the Cougars had winning records in 11 and were .500 in the other. The last time BYU opened the season with a loss and had a losing record was 1973 when the team finished 5-6. On the other hand, BYU opened with a win from 2002-04 and finished with a losing record. The following is a list of the 12 seasons since 1974 BYU opened with a loss:

While the Cougars are off to a slow start in Bronco Mendenhall's first season at 1-2, legendary coach LaVell Edwards also started his first season at 1-2 and went on to finish 7-4.

TOP 40s

When Curtis Brown punched the ball in from one yard out in the fourth quarter against TCU, BYU hit the 40-point mark for the second-straight game. The last time the Cougars had back-to-back 40-point games was in 2004 when they put up 41 against Air Force and 49 on San Diego State. The Cougars finished the game with 50 points, marking the first time BYU has scored 50 points in a game since Nov. 1, 2001 against Colorado State. The Cougars defeated CSU, 56-34.

CAREER 300-YARD GAMES

BYU has traditionally focused on the pass, leading to 19 different Cougars throwing for 300 yards in at least one game for a combined 174 games. Junior John Beck has made a contribution of six games to that list. He entered the 2005 season with four but threw for 330 yards against No. 22 Boston College and 517 against TCU, giving him six. Beck has now taken sole possession of 10th place. Ty Detmer tops the list with an astronomical 34. Cougars with 300-yard passing games:

SURPASSING THE CENTURY MARK

With six 100-yard rushing games to his credit, junior Curtis Brown is already tied for fifth in Cougars history for the most career 100-yard rushing games. Against Eastern Illinois, he ran 18 times for 110 yards and scored one touchdown. THE RANKED TEAMS

With BYU's loss to No. 22 Boston College, the Cougars are now 0-11 against ranked teams since defeating No. 23 Colorado State, 34-13, on Sept. 16, 1999. During that streak BYU is 0-3 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. BYU has not defeated a ranked opponent on the road since beating Arizona State, 13-10, on Sept. 20, 1997.

PARTY LIKE ITS 1999 ... or 98

Several Cougars started their BYU football careers before the start of the 21st century, including Spencer White, Fahu Tahī, Nate Soelberg, Brian Sanders, Chris Hale and Matt Berry, who joined the team in 1999 before serving missions. But they aren't the oldest Cougars. That honor belongs to T.J. Sitake, who redshirted in 1998. Hale and Tahī both made big impacts in 1999. Hale caught four pass for 55 yards, including the game-winning 38-yard touchdown reception in the season opener against Washington at home. Tahī led the team in rushing yards that season, totaling 445 on 102 carries. To put in perspective how long these players have been associated with the program, the newcomers straight out of high school were 11 or 12-years old and still playing pickup football in their backyards.

CALLED TO SERVE

There are currently 62 returned missionaries (59 percent) on the BYU roster who have served full-time, two-year missions for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in over 21 different countries around the world. All totaled members of this year's team have served missions in Australia, Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Norway, Panama, Philippines, Portugal, Russia, Samoa, Spain, Tonga, United States and Uruguay. Members of this year's team can communicate fluently in at least 12 different languages.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints operates more than 330 missions around the world with approximately 56,000 missionaries. There are four lettermen from last year's team who are currently serving missions, including Matt Bauman (Harrisburg, Pa.), R.J. Willing (Albuquerque, N.M.), Dennis Pitta (Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic) and Freshman All-American receiver Austin Collie (Buenos Aires, Argentina).

ON THE BOARD FIRST

When the No. 22 Boston College Eagles scored with 30 seconds left in the first quarter on Quinton Porters' 14-yard pass to Chris Miller, it was only the third time in 12 games an opponent scored before BYU. In 2004, the Cougars scored first in 9-of-11 games. BYU scored on its first drives against Eastern Illinois and TCU and has now scored first in 11-of-14 games.
