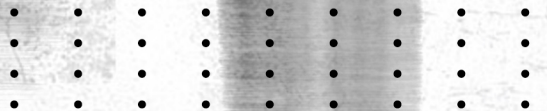

## CREDENTIALS

All requests for working credentials (press, radio, television, scouting) should be directed to Ben Pearson at least 24 hours prior to tip-off. Credentials will not be mailed. They may be picked up at the media entrance at Viejas Arena (lower level) 90 minutes prior to the start of all home games.

## CAMPUS PARKING

Media desiring to cover Aztec practices on campus can park in P7 and obtain a special parking pass from the Aztec media relations office. Media parking (via permit) will be provided for all home games in P12, adjacent to Viejas Arena.

## DIRECTIONS TO VIEJAS ARENA

Take I-8 East to the College Avenue exit. Take College Avenue south towards SDSU. Turn right on Montezuma Road. Turn right on 55th Street. Viejas Arena is on the right-hand side.

## PRACTICE AND INTERVIEWS

Media wishing to attend practice should contact the Aztec media relations department at least one day in advance.

Head coach Stacie Terry and the players are generally available to meet with the media following each workout, as requested. Coaches and players are also available to conduct television and radio interviews, which must be set up through the media relations office at 619-594-5547.

Please request all interviews with a minimum of 24 hours notice. San Diego State players and coaches will not be available for interviews on game days until postgame.

## GAMEDAY SERVICES

The Aztec media relations office furnishes game programs, pregame notes and media guides prior to each game in the media room at Viejas Arena. Play-by-play accounts, halftime and final statistics and shot charts are also provided.

# PARTING WITH THE PAST, GAZING TO THE FUTURE

Ideally, there would be five seniors with multiple skill sets, seasoned veterans who know the arduous demands of travel in the Mountain West.

Ideally, there would be a wealth of depth, of practiced players in reserve roles whose contributions routinely prove critical to team success.

Ideally, there would be offensive numbers that make the eyes pop and defensive numbers that drain the flush from opponents' faces.

Of course, not everyone's interpretation of ideal is necessarily identical.

Consider San Diego State women's basketball coach Stacie Terry, whose squad does not feature an overabundance of any of the aforementioned traits.

Said Terry: "I'm having more fun coaching this team than I've had in years."

Further proof that, with Terry, the glass is never in danger of being deemed half full.

As she enters her sixth season at SDSU, Terry does so with two seniors, three new staff members and an outlook that borders somewhere between fervent and fascinated.

"I think we're better right now than we were last year," Terry said of a team that includes a combined seven freshmen and sophomores. "That said, we have a long way to go, but this group is really competing hard. We're so young, but they're tough and they're gritty and we haven't always had that type of team. Maybe it's their youth, and the fact that they don't know any other way, but I've been really pleased with them."

To suggest the Aztecs have some holes to fill is to say the sky is high. In McKynzie Fort, Geena Gomez, Lexy Thorderson, Khalia Lark and Cheyenne Greenhouse, Terry lost five players who combined to average nearly 10.0 points apiece and more than 26.0 minutes per game.

The most notable loss is Fort, an all-Mountain West selection who started all 29 games last season while averaging 16.4 points and 34.9 minutes. The only other player who averaged double figures for SDSU last season was Gomez (11.0 points per game).

"We've had a lot of conversations as a staff and with our team about doing things by committee," Terry said. "We don't have the kind of dynamic scorers like we had last year in McKynzie and Geena. We've been focusing on a mantra of team over everything, because we're going to have to have four or five kids scoring 10 points, as opposed to two scoring 18 and 16."

"Our plan is to distribute the points differently than we've had in the past, and I think that's going to make us a tougher guard. We don't have just one or two players now who can score; we have a lot of kids that can put the ball in the basket. We're excited about that, but it's going to have to be done by committee. We don't have that type of player yet who can just go get us a bucket, but I'm really interested in seeing who evolves into becoming that type of player."

An early candidate could be sophomore guard Najé Murray, the team's third-leading scorer last season with an average of 9.3 points per game. Murray, who was named to the Mountain West All-Freshmen team, led all freshmen in the league with an average of 1.8 made three-pointers per game. In 16 starts last season, she finished second on the team in three-point field goals (53) and steals (30).

Murray, who scored in double figures 16 times last season, is likely to be joined in the backcourt by fellow sophomore Téa Adams. Considered the 22nd-best point guard in the nation by ESPN as a senior at Juanita High in Kirkland, Wash., Adams appeared in 29 games as a freshman last season, averaging 16.6 minutes and 4.6 points.

"Najé is a natural leader, just because she's such a perfectionist," Terry said. "She wants to do her best every time she's on the floor. She could be (the successor to Fort). She has the scoring capability, but they're different types of players. Najé is a better shooter than McKynzie was, but McKynzie was more of a slasher who could get to the rim. Najé has the capability to put up the same type of numbers, but I'm not going to put any kind of pressure on her. Our success is going to depend on our ability to play as a unit. Najé may have games where she has really high numbers, but I also think there are going to be people surrounding her who have the capability of putting up those same numbers. The key for us is sharing the ball; we have to share the ball."

"With Téa, there aren't many people who can guard her when she gets going downhill. When she's determined to get to the rim, you

better get out of her way, because she's most likely going to score and draw a foul. She's been playing a lot at the point for us and has become a good distributor of the ball, something she's added to her game. Our goal is get her assists up, because of the playmakers we lost. We're going to have to manufacture those (missing) points, but you also need to find somebody who can create for others. We think Téa is going to be that person for us."

If the Aztecs are not overly experienced on the perimeter, such is not the case inside, where senior Arantxa Gómez Ferrer, juniors Baylee Vanderdoes and Monique Terry, sophomore Kiara Edwards and redshirt sophomore Naomi Edwedike combined to give SDSU one of the top offensive rebounding teams in the league in 2017-18. That production is expected to be augmented by the arrival of 6-3 redshirt junior Zayn Dornstauder, a native of Regina, Saskatchewan, who joins the Aztecs after redshirting last season at Ball State. Dornstauder spent her first two seasons at the University of San Francisco, where she was a member of a West Coast Conference championship and NCAA Tournament team.

"Our rebounding has never been where I really want it to be, but I think everyone is going to be very surprised by how much better our post play is," Terry said. "I expect Baylee Vanderdoes to become more consistent, not only in terms of the minutes she plays, but also in terms of her offensive production and her defense. The rest of our post crew has all been working really hard and I've been very pleased with them."

"Zayn is a great defender and has a skill set that I don't think she quite understands yet. She has very good moves. Now we need to focus on her ability to finish those moves. I just don't think she knows how good she can be. She's obviously at a bit of a disadvantage because she wasn't with us during the summer (Dornstauder officially signed with the Aztecs in late July), so we're just getting her acclimated to our system. But once we get her up to speed, I expect big things out of her."

"We may put a bigger lineup on the floor than people became used to seeing in years past. We may put two post players on the floor as opposed to playing four guards, and I think (our post players) have earned that. If they continue to work like they have been, there's a good chance we could go with a bigger lineup. We're going to play a lot more inside-out, as opposed to just being guard-driven."

Terry believes one of the major factors in regrouping following the exit of a senior-laden squad has been the new NCAA rule that allows teams to begin practicing six weeks before their first game and gives coaches four hours each week with players over the summer.

"It's been crazy what a difference it's made," she said. "We've been able to put some of our offensive schemes in already, which is crazy when I think that when I played you couldn't start until Oct. 16."

"We're so far ahead of where we normally are, and because of that I think my expectations are higher. I find myself thinking, 'We should already know this, we've already been through it,' instead of being grateful that we've had the extra time. We have our full-court man-to-man defense in, we have our transition offense and defense in, we have our sideline out-of-bounds in, we're really ahead of the game. I'm sure that's not unique to San Diego State, but I think it speaks to how productive your freshmen can be with the practices they've already had."

The newcomers include a trio of perimeter players in Sophia Ramos, Mallory Adams and Jayden Perez.

Ramos is a product of Incarnate Word High in San Antonio, where she scored for more than 2,000 career points and was considered a four-star prospect by Prospects Nation. She was a four-time Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools all-state and all-district first-team selection.

The 6-foot Adams (no relation to Téa), who also scored over 2,000 points in high school, drew interest from the likes of Alabama, Kansas, SMU and Houston. She was deemed the 14th-best wing in the nation by ESPN after averaging 22.8 points and 10.3 rebounds as a senior at Lone Star High in Frisco, Texas, where she helped lead her team to an overall mark of 34-5 and 14-0 in district play.

Perez, meanwhile, was a three-time all-state pick at Onate High in Las Cruces, N.M. Despite missing her senior season due to injury, she still amassed 1,586 career points, and averaged 20.0 points and 5.8 rebounds as a junior.

"Sophia, as a point guard, has the potential to play significant minutes," Terry said. "She's a very high IQ kid who understands the game. She's not overly dynamic like McKynzie was, but she's a very

cerebral player who knows where she needs to be and what she needs to do. She can knock down the open jumper and is probably one of the best passers on our team right now. She never gets too high or too low. The fact that she's so even-keeled is great for us, because we've got some emotional kids. She keeps us steady. Jayden also gives us depth at that position and plays hard every time she's on the floor."

"Mallory just does the intangibles, the things that fill up a stat sheet. You see her in practice and all of the sudden you look up and she has eight points and eight rebounds just out of nowhere. For us, she's going to be that utility player, sort of like Jalen McDaniels was last year for the men's team. She can do a little bit of everything. One of her best qualities is her toughness and her ability to go get a rebound. She may be a little undersized — she's playing the four spot for us right now — but when we go to that lineup, we'll have four guards and a big who can play. We also have the option of moving Mallory to the three spot and bringing in Arantxa or Baylee."

"It's going to be fun to play around with these lineups, because we have a lot of options."

And new staff members to assist in the implementation.

New assistant coach Kevin Morrison, who has worked under four NCAA Final Four head coaches, spent the last three seasons at Georgia Tech after stops at Washington and Cal. Prior to joining the college ranks, Morrison was president and head coach of the West Coast Elite AAU program, which produced 74 Division I players and 19 McDonald's All-Americans.

Sheila Boykin, who will serve as a graduate assistant to Terry, spent last year as an assistant at Warren High in Downey after playing professionally for two years in Europe. Boykin played under Terry during her college career at LSU, when the latter was an assistant on the Tigers' staff (2011-13).

New director of player development Mercedes Riggs was a point guard at Duke who has spent the past two years as an assistant at Salt Lake Community College.

"Kevin is a phenomenal recruiter who is known throughout the West, especially the Pacific Northwest," Terry said. "He brings a little more attention and spotlight to San Diego State."

"Sheila has been a huge addition who really serves as a mentor to our current players. She's played overseas and she's played at the highest level of college basketball having been in the SEC at LSU."

"I recruited Mercedes out of junior college. It broke my heart, because it came down to (LSU) and Duke. I've been trying to hire her as a (graduate assistant), but when this position came open she finally accepted. She's another person who has played at the highest level collegiately and understands what it looks like. All of our new coaches have taken to this team and the kids have taken to them. It's nice to have them as mentors."

It's also nice to have a player like Taylor Kalmer waiting in the wings. Kalmer, a transfer from Oregon State who must sit out this season per NCAA rules, was part of a Beavers team that earned a berth in the NCAA tournament all three years during her time at the school. OSU also made a Final Four run in 2016.

"She's really helped raise the level of practice, just because she plays at such a great tempo," Terry said. "That's been huge for us, because she's a player who's been to a Final Four. She knows what it's like to play on a championship team in the Pac-12. I wish we had her this year, because she really raises our level. You never want to look past the season at-hand, but it's fun to think about what she'll bring, especially with our young players having another year of growing up."

A process that occasionally may test Terry's patience, but one she's also anxious to observe.

"Obviously, we signed a really good class two years ago with Najé, Téa, Kennedy (Villa) and Kiara," Terry said. "And this year's freshmen class, when you watch them play, you'd think they've been here with us for a long time. I see them as being a great addition to what we've already started. Our recruiting classes have gotten better every year, and I think people will see that in the quality of the player we're putting on the floor."

"We're young, and it's maddening and it's crazy and it's hectic, and I'm going to have my share of anxiety, but these kids are playing their tails off. We're far from being perfect, but what excites me and my staff is they've bought in to what we're selling. That was our recruiting pitch to our freshmen last year. We knew we had a big senior class and we wanted them to know that they were going to be the ones taking over. Now's their time, and they'll have the opportunity. We'll find out what they do with it."

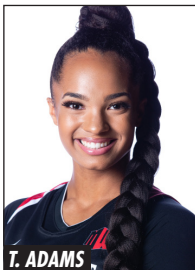

San Diego State held a grand-opening ceremony for the 23,500-square foot Jeff Jacobs JAM Center on Sunday, Aug. 23, 2015. The event marked the official opening of the Aztecs' on-campus basketball performance center, which broke ground on Aug. 27, 2014.

Speaking before the ceremonial ribbon cutting was former SDSU president Elliot Hirshman, former men's basketball head coach Steve Fisher and former women's hoops senior guard Ahjalee Harvey.

Preliminary site work started in July 2014, just south of the Fowler Athletics Center and east of the football practice fields. The facility, which will support the continued growth and development of the SDSU men's and women's basketball teams, includes two full-length courts, eight baskets, locker rooms, film room, team lounges, athletic training room and coaches locker rooms.

Hundreds of supporters contributed to the effort to make the Jeff Jacobs JAM Center a reality. In addition to the naming gift from Jeff Jacobs, Hal and Debby Jacobs, Steve and Lisa Altman and Jim Morris, creating the name "JAM" Center, sizeable donations were made from the Manna Charitable Foundation and the Walter and Betty Zable Foundation. The total cost of the project was \$15 million.

The project was designed by JCY Architecture and was built by The Hunt Construction Group.

San Diego native Stacie Terry is entering her sixth year at the helm of the Aztec women's basketball team after she was named the eighth head coach in program history on May 15, 2013.

The 2018-19 campaign will feature the 60th-ranked recruiting class in the country according to Prospects Nation. It is the second consecutive year the Aztecs have had a nationally-ranked recruiting class after not having one since 2010-11.

In 2017-18, the Aztecs once again were an elite three-point shooting team. For the second straight year, SDSU hit at least 200 three-pointers, the top two totals in program history. Additionally, the team's 33.7 three-point field goal percentage was the best since the 2009-10 campaign.

Under Terry's guidance, McKynzie Fort became the Aztecs' third-leading scorer in program history with 1,708 points. Fort was an all-Mountain West honoree in 2017-18 and was also named to the conference's all-defensive team. Najé Murray also was recognized by the conference, making the MW all-freshman team. The Aztecs have now picked up a conference nod each of the last 19 seasons.

The 2017-18 campaign was a banner year for Aztec community support. SDSU drew 22,069 fans over their 16 games for an average of 1,379. This broke the total and average attendance records set in 2007-08, when the Aztecs welcomed 14,730 fans for an average of 1,133 per game.

During her first season on Montezuma Mesa, Terry was saddled with the unenviable task of replacing four senior starters who accounted for nearly 64 percent of the team's scoring offense from the previous year, as well as overcoming the loss of two key players to injuries prior to conference play.

Despite those obstacles and a demanding schedule featuring nine games against teams that eventually advanced to postseason competition, Terry's squad flashed its resiliency during the 2013-14 campaign. The Aztecs led the league in rebounding margin and rebounding defense while ranking second in field-goal percentage.

Individually, Terry also oversaw the progress of senior center Cierra Warren, who became the fifth SDSU player in a six-year span to receive first-team all-MW recognition.

Prior to her arrival on The Mesa, Terry gained a wealth of experience as an assistant coach at the Division I level for 14 years, including five under head coach Nikki (Caldwell) Fargas, who transformed UCLA into a powerhouse before restoring LSU to national prominence.

During Terry's two seasons at LSU, the Lady Tigers compiled a 45-23 overall record and earned two NCAA tournament bids, including a Sweet 16 appearance during the 2012-13 campaign. During that season, the Lady Tigers also posted six victories against ranked opponents and finished with their second-highest scoring average (69.0) in the last seven years. Under Terry's guidance, forward LaShondra Barrett garnered first-team all-Southeastern Conference accolades and received honorable mention All-America distinction in 2012 before becoming a first-round draft choice of the WNBA's Washington Mystics.

Prior to her appointment at LSU, Terry served as an assistant under Fargas at UCLA from 2008-11, helping the Bruins gain national acclaim with a pair of NCAA tournament appearances. During Terry's tenure, UCLA posted 72 overall victories, as the 2010-11 squad finished with a 28-5 record, setting a school record for fewest losses in a single season to go with a No. 7 national ranking. In addition, the Bruins signed the fourth-ranked recruiting class that season, according to ESPN HoopGurlz, while Terry helped mentor first-team all-Pac-10 performers in Doreena Campbell, Darxia Morris and Jasmine Dixon, a 2012 honorable mention AP All-America selection, as well as all-conference freshman honorees Atonye Nyingifa and Markel Walker.

Terry spent the 2007-08 campaign at Southern Mississippi, as the Golden Eagles posted a 21-14 record and earned a postseason berth in the Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT). While at Southern Miss, Terry spearheaded the development and coordination of the Lady Eagle recruiting campaign. Her responsibilities also included working with the perimeter players, scouting opponents and film breakdown, as well as coordinating all of the team's community service events.

Terry also coached for three seasons from 2004-07 as an assistant under Hall of Fame head coach Theresa Greutz at Illinois, where the Fighting Illini had three straight recruiting classes ranked among the top 25 in the nation, according to Blue Star Basketball, and made three consecutive trips to the WNIT. Her primary duties included defensive instruction and working with the perimeter players.

In addition, Terry coached at Dayton during the 2003-04 season following a three-year stint at Louisville from 2000-03. With the Cardinals, Terry's responsibilities encompassed recruiting, scouting, player development, summer camps and serving as a liaison for the program's community service outreach. Louisville captured the Conference USA regular-season title and earned a trip to the NCAA tournament in 2001 before making a WNIT appearance in 2002. She also assisted in signing the nation's 21st-ranked recruiting class in 2002-03, according to All-Star Girls Report. Terry recruited and coached all-Conference USA honoree Lori Nero, a draft choice of the WNBA's Houston Comets, as well as Sara Nord, who finished her collegiate career as the Cardinals' all-time assist leader and ranks among the top 15 scorers in school history.

Terry enjoyed a successful collegiate playing career at the University of Texas at Arlington, winning four varsity letters from 1994-98 under head coach Mike Dean. She earned first-team all-Southland Conference honors after leading the Mavericks in scoring with 17.4 points per

game as a senior in 1997-98. Terry scored 1,169 points during her career at UTA and still ranks among the school's top 10 in 3-point field goals made (third), assists (t-sixth), steals (eighth) and free-throw percentage (10th). She is just one of 17 players in Maverick history to surpass the 1,000-point plateau, while her .421 career 3-point field-goal percentage ranks second in the Southland Conference.

Terry played one season of professional basketball in Warsaw, Poland, averaging 12.0 points and 6.0 assists with the Polonia Phoenix, before returning to UT Arlington to begin her coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1999.

Terry prepped at El Capitan High and held the Vaqueros' career scoring record for three years following her graduation. She was inducted into the school's athletic hall of fame in 2008.

# KEVIN MORRISON

San Diego State women's basketball head coach Stacie Terry announced the addition of Kevin Morrison to her staff as an assistant coach on June 18, 2018. Morrison, who has 11 years of Division-I coaching experience, spent the last three years as an assistant coach at Georgia Tech after stops at Washington (2011-15) and California (2007-11).

In his career, Morrison has coached with four head coaches who have reached the NCAA Final Four.

"Kevin is a huge addition to our staff," head coach Stacie Terry said. "The experience he brings after spending the last 10-plus years at three very successful programs will be invaluable. He also has an exceptional track record in recruiting, especially on the West Coast. I am very excited about the future of our program and the qualities Kevin will bring in."

"I want to thank coach Terry for this great opportunity," Morrison said. "I am very excited to come back to the West Coast and I can't wait to work with the amazing student-athletes and staff here at San Diego State."

While at Georgia Tech, he worked under head coach MaChelle Joseph, the school's all-time winningest coach. During his time at GT, he helped lead the Yellow Jackets to three consecutive 20-win seasons and three trips to the WNIT. Along with the staff at GT, he oversaw the development of All-American Aaliyah Whiteside, 2017 ACC Freshman of the Year Francesca Pan and 2018 ACC Sixth Player of the Year Zaire O'Neil.

Before Georgia Tech, Morrison spent four seasons at Washington, the final two as the associate head coach. He aided Washington to a 23-10 record in the 2014-15, which was the most wins in a season for

the Huskies since 2002-03. He was instrumental in the development of Aminah Williams who finished her career as the school's all-time rebounding leader. A notable recruiter, Morrison helped UW sign three McDonald's All-Americans in four years, including the NCAA's career leader in points, Kelsey Plum. Over his four seasons at UW, the Huskies had three top-25 recruiting classes, including a top-10 class in 2013.

Morrison got his start in collegiate women's basketball at California, serving as an assistant coach for four years under Joanne Boyle. He helped guide the program to the postseason in each of his four seasons, including a trip to the Sweet Sixteen in 2009 and a WNIT Championship in 2010. Cal also had back-to-back 27-win seasons in the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons, which was a school record at the time.

Morrison displayed his recruiting acumen at Berkeley by helping the Golden Bears bring in three straight top-10 recruiting classes from 2009-11, including the nation's top-ranked class in 2009.

Prior to joining the college ranks, Morrison was the president and head coach of the West Coast Elite AAU program, where he helped 74 players sign with Division I teams, including 19 McDonald's All-Americans, six Gatorade State Players of the Year and one Gatorade National Player of the Year.

Morrison is a 1994 graduate of Cal Poly Pomona with a degree in social work. He spent over nine years as a social worker and high school guidance counselor as well as a varsity girls' basketball coach.

Kevin and his wife Heather have four children: sons Jayce, Jaylen, Myles and daughter Mya.

Ciara Carl joined the Aztec basketball staff as an assistant coach on July 15, 2013. Carl directs the Aztecs' scouting efforts, works with the team's guards, and recruits.

Carl assisted in the signing of the 60th-ranked 2018 recruiting class in the country according to Prospects Nation. It is the second consecutive year the Aztecs have had a nationally ranked recruiting class after not having one since 2010-11.

In 2017-18, the Aztecs once again were an elite three-point shooting team. For the second straight year, SDSU hit at least 200 three-pointers, the top two totals in program history. Additionally, the team's 33.7 three-point field goal percentage was the best since the 2009-10 campaign.

Carl helped McKynzie Fort climb the scoring charts to become the Aztecs' third-leading scorer (1,708 points) in program history. Fort was an all-Mountain West honoree in 2017-18 and was also named to the conference's all-defensive team. Najé Murray also was recognized by the conference, making the MW all-freshman team. Since Carl began serving on SDSU's coaching staff, the Aztecs collected at least one all-MW honor each season.

Carl was instrumental in the development of Geena Gomez, who finished her career with a three-point field-goal percentage of .361 (115-319), the third best in school history.

During her one season at Metro State, Carl helped coach the Roadrunners to 21 victories and a spot in the NCAA Division II tournament, where they advanced to the second round. Under her tutelage, five Metro State players garnered all-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference accolades, including Kristin Valencia, who was named the league's defensive player of the year. As a team, the

Roadrunners led the RMAC in scoring defense (51.2 ppg) and limited opponents to a league-worst .350 field-goal percentage.

Carl also witnessed success during her tenure at Cal Poly Pomona from 2010-12, as the Broncos compiled a two-year mark of 47-14 (.770) and made a pair of NCAA DII tournament appearances, including a berth in the Elite Eight in 2011. During that season, Carl assisted in the development of senior guard Reyana Colson, who earned All-America honors after capturing the California Collegiate Athletic Association's Most Valuable Player award.

Prior to arrival at CPP, Carl gained valuable coaching experience during stops with the San Diego Sol, the San Diego Super 60 League, as well as her prep alma mater, Saint Mary's School in Raleigh, N.C.

As a collegian, Carl starred at point guard for PLNU, helping the Sea Lions compile an 83-27 overall record in her final three seasons. During that stretch, PLNU made three consecutive trips to the NAIA tournament, capped by a Final Four appearance in 2005. She still holds the school's career record with 647 assists and ranks second with 277 steals.

Carl received her undergraduate degree in exercise science from PLNU in 2005 and earned her master's of science degree from California University (Pa.) in 2006 with an emphasis in performance enhancement and injury prevention. She later completed an internship at North Carolina State, working with the Wolfpack's strength and conditioning program.

A native of Los Angeles, Carl was raised in Cary, N.C., before graduating from Saint Mary's School in 2000. In addition to earning all-state honors in basketball as a senior, Carl also lettered in volleyball and golf during her prep career.







# NICK GRANT

**Assistant Coach | Fifth Year at SDSU  
Baylor (2010), Dallas Baptist (2015)**

Nick Grant was hired as an assistant coach on August 4, 2014. Grant, SDSU's recruiting coordinator, primarily works with the Aztecs' guards while also coaching the defensive side of the ball.

As recruiting coordinator, Grant has helped bring in two straight top-75 recruiting classes, including the 2017 class, which was ranked No. 21 nationally.

In 2017-18, the Aztecs were deadly from three-point territory, hitting at least 200 three-pointers for the second straight season (the top two totals in program history). Additionally, the team's 33.7 three-point field goal percentage was the best since the 2009-10 campaign.

Grant also helped McKynzie Fort climb the scoring charts to become the Aztecs' third-leading scorer (1,708 points) in school history. Fort was an all-Mountain West honoree in 2017-18 and was also named to the conference's all-defensive team. Najé Murray also was recognized by the conference, making the MW all-freshman team. Since Grant began serving on SDSU's coaching staff, he has helped one of his position players collect all-MW honors each season (Fort & Murray).

Grant, an Arlington, Texas, native arrived on Montezuma Mesa after spending three seasons at Texas A&M, including the final two as video coordinator.



During his tenure with the Aggies, Grant was part of a program that made three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, highlighted by a run to the Elite Eight in 2014. In addition to the recording, breakdown, and analysis of all practices and games, Grant's responsibilities included serving as a liaison between the players and coaching staff.

Prior to his appointment as video coordinator, Grant served as a strength and conditioning intern with the Texas A&M athletic department for the 2011-12 season, working full-time with the women's basketball team. He also aided the Aggies' recruiting efforts in the summer of 2012, evaluating women's basketball talent at the AAU level.

Grant received his Bachelor of Arts degree in communication from Baylor in 2010. While on the Waco campus, he served as a team manager with the women's basketball squad from 2006-08, assisting with guards on fundamentals and skill work. During those two seasons, the Lady Bears amassed 53 victories and twice reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Upon graduation, Grant remained at Baylor, working with seven scholarship programs in the weight room as an athletic performance intern during the 2010-11 campaign.

# JON SILVER

Director of Basketball Operations | Third Year at SDSU  
UCLA (2009), LSU (2017)

Jon Silver was named the San Diego State women's basketball director of operations on May 12, 2016.

In his role, Silver is involved with all facets of the program. Entering his 12th season working with Division I women's basketball, he coordinates practice and game schedules, non-conference scheduling, team travel, equipment, community service, fundraising and oversees student managers and male practice team members. Silver also serves as the program liaison within the athletic department.

Prior to the 2017-18 season, Silver reformatted the program's booster club, Full Court Press, and introduced the country's first women's basketball-specific customizable benefits package. Silver is also responsible for bringing "Field Trip Day", "High School Night", and "Stacie's Squad" to San Diego State which has helped the Aztecs triple their attendance in just two seasons. In collaboration with marketing and ticketing, Silver helped the Aztecs shatter both the all-time season attendance records (22,069 up from 7,789) and all-time average game attendance (1,379 up from 480). Additionally, Silver is also responsible for advanced analytics for the team

including lineup analysis, plus/minus charts, substitution patterns and offensive/defensive efficiencies.

Silver arrived on Montezuma Mesa after spending the 2015-16 campaign as an assistant coach at the University of Vermont. A Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) "Thirty under 30" honoree, the Catamounts nearly doubled its win total from a year prior during his tenure.

While at Vermont, Silver also oversaw the administration and contract negotiations for the program's TD Bank Thanksgiving Tournament and was the team's main liaison with UVM senior staff and administration. He is highly regarded for the strong recruiting ties he established in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Massachusetts.

Silver arrived at Vermont after four seasons on staff at LSU, working for head coach Nikki (Caldwell) Fargas. He was involved with all facets of the LSU Women's Basketball program as director of basketball operations. Silver coordinated practice and game scheduling, team travel, fundraising, equipment, the student-manager program, community service initiatives. His four years in Baton Rouge were highlighted by four consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament, including back-to-back Sweet 16 runs in 2013 and 2014. During Silver's tenure, the Lady Tigers sent four players to the WNBA and 12 players overseas to compete professionally.

Silver executed the non-conference game scheduling for the Lady Tigers since Coach Fargas' arrival in Baton Rouge in 2011. LSU's 2013-14 overall schedule was rated the nation's toughest by the NCAA as the Lady Tigers played 28 of their 34 games against RPI Top 100 opponents. The non-conference portion of the schedule ranked No. 2 in the nation and the team's non-conference RPI rank was fourth. Over Silver's four seasons with LSU, the Lady Tigers faced a top-30 schedule each year.

Silver joined the Lady Tigers after serving dual roles at UCLA as video coordinator and staff associate during the 2010-11 campaign. With Fargas and Terry on the same Bruin coaching staff, Silver oversaw all video-related operations, including film exchange, pregame and postgame film breakdowns, capturing live games and creating weekly highlight tapes.

Silver graduated from UCLA in 2009 with Phi Beta Kappa honors and spent three seasons as a practice player with the Bruin women's hoops squad, including one season as head manager and scout team captain. Silver received his master's degree in liberal arts from LSU in May 2017.

Mercedes Riggs was hired as the Aztecs' director of player development in the summer of 2018. A former point guard at Duke, Riggs spent the past two years as an assistant coach and video coordinator at Salt Lake Community College in Utah.

"I am thankful for the opportunity to be a part of the Aztecs women's basketball program and am excited to help this team reach success in every possible way I can," Riggs stated.

In her role, Riggs will coordinate film exchange, edit game and practice film and develop team highlight videos. She will assist in the Aztecs' recruiting efforts and oversee the team's student managers. Additionally, she will lend support to Jon Silver, SDSU's director of basketball operations, in the planning and preparation of all team events.

Eddie Padilla enters his fourth season as the strength and conditioning coach for the Aztec women's basketball team and sixth overall at San Diego State.

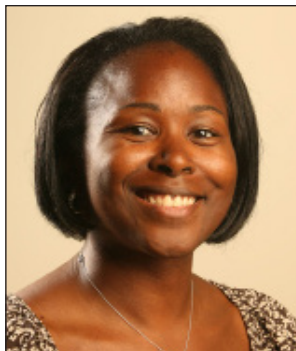

**SALT LAKE CITY** - SDSU used a 16-point performance from tournament MVP Christina Murguia to claim the 1994 WAC championship, 51-47, over Colorado State.

The Aztecs shot just over 33 percent from the field, but Murguia's basket with 1:01 remaining gave her team a four-point lead at 49-45. An offensive rebound by Falisha Wright with 15 seconds left and two game-icing free throws by her sister Lakeysya Wright with 8.2 seconds secured the Aztec victory.

SDSU trailed by just one at the break, but then fell behind the Rams 35-32 in the opening part of the second half. Murguia, however, provided the spark off the bench, turning a one-point Aztec deficit into the lead with consecutive jumpers from the top of the key, followed by a steal, which led to a layup by teammate Tammy Blackburn.

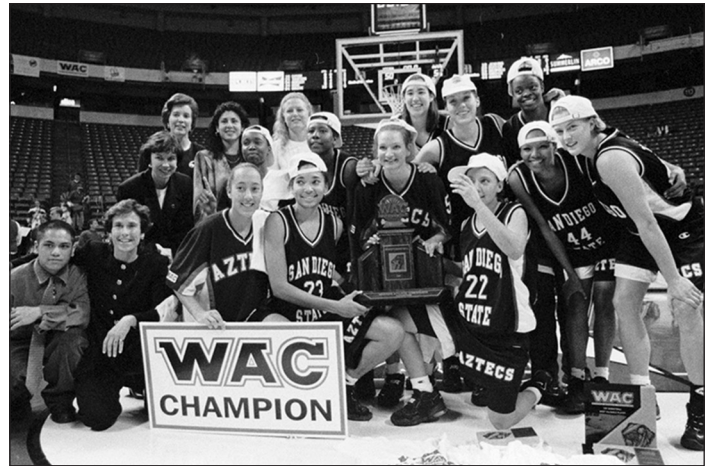

**LAS VEGAS** - San Diego State outscored Utah 12-2 in overtime to cap a dramatic rally, giving the Aztecs their first Mountain West tournament title with a 70-60 victory at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas. SDSU claimed the league's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament, improving to 21-10 overall and avenging last year's loss to the Utes in the same MW championship contest.

Aztec seniors Jené Morris and Quenese Davis combined to score 43 of the team's 70 points, including 16 of the final 22, and also chipped in 12 assists and five steals together. Junior Paris Johnson had 10 points and a team-best seven rebounds and three blocks and classmate Coco Davis tallied three steals.

San Diego State got off to a quick start, jumping ahead by nine points twice, including at the 14:31 mark. Utah would eventually catch up and take its first advantage of the afternoon only four minutes later at 17-16. Five ties and six lead changes later, the Utes headed into the locker room up 34-33 on a last-second 3-point heave by Kalee Whipple.

Utah was up by as many as eight points in the second half, including at 56-48 with four minutes left. From there, the SDSU defense proved stifling, limiting the Utes to only two points - both from the free throw line - as the Aztecs tied the game at 58 on a basket by Coco Davis with 1:04 remaining to send the game into overtime.

San Diego State dominated the extra time, scoring first on a rebound basket by Allison Duffy and forcing Utah into four turnovers and four missed shots from the field. The Aztecs converted two of those giveaways into points and went on to outscore the Utes 12-2 to come away with the win.

**LAS VEGAS** - San Diego State claimed its second Mountain West championship and earned its third trip to the NCAA tournament in the last four years with a 57-43 victory over New Mexico at the Thomas & Mack Center. The Aztecs moved to 25-6 overall with the win, while the seventh-seeded Lobos concluded their season with an 11-20 mark.

SDSU was led by Courtney Clements, who scored a game-high 16 points and added six rebounds and two assists, while Chelsea Hopkins recorded 14 points, four assists and four steals in 29 minutes to capture MVP honors. Malia Nahinu, who joined Clements and Hopkins on the all-tournament squad, grabbed a game-best eight boards and blocked four shots.

Neither side shot well most of the afternoon, as the sides combined for just 16 points through the first 10 minutes of the game. UNM scored the first basket of the game, but then never led again, as the Aztecs were up by as many as 15 points at 19-4 by the 7:06 mark. The Lobos used a 6-0 run to cut into their deficit and only trailed by seven at the break.

New Mexico came out strong out of the locker room, narrowing the gap to just four points at 26-22 on a Lauren Taylor three-point play, but the Aztecs countered immediately with a triple from freshman Ahjalee Harvey and were eventually back up by double-figures with 12 minutes remaining in the championship.

SDSU received six points from Desi Culberson during a key 10-1 spurt to build its largest lead at 41-25 and eventually went on to claim the title by a 14-point margin at 57-43.

The Aztecs shot 48 percent from the field and 90 percent at the line in the second half and dominated the glass by a 45-29 margin. The victory was the first in seven chances at the Mountain West tournament over the Lobos.

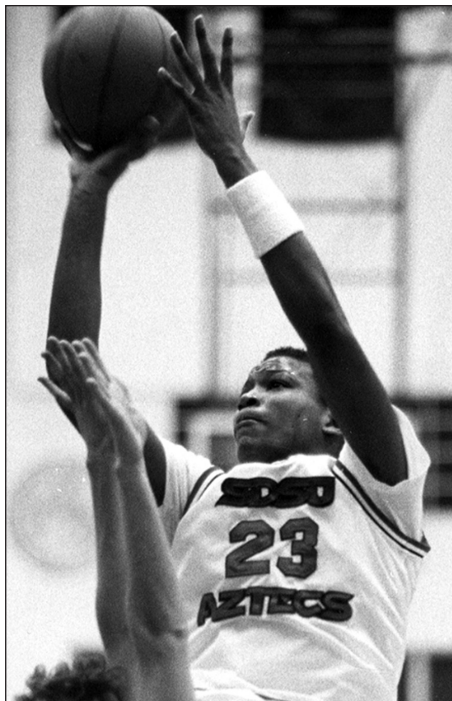

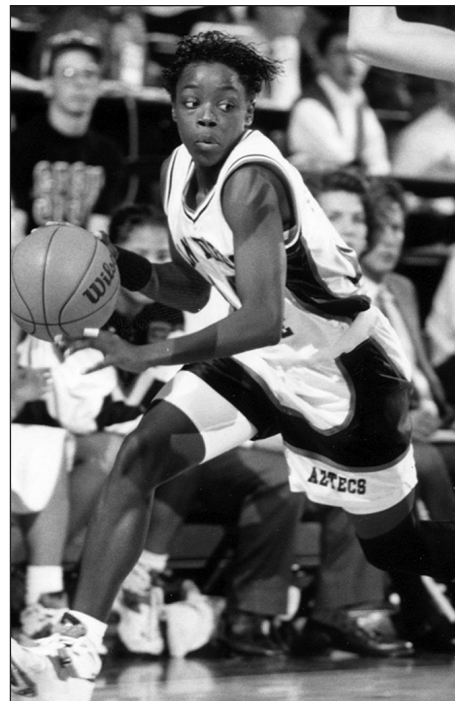

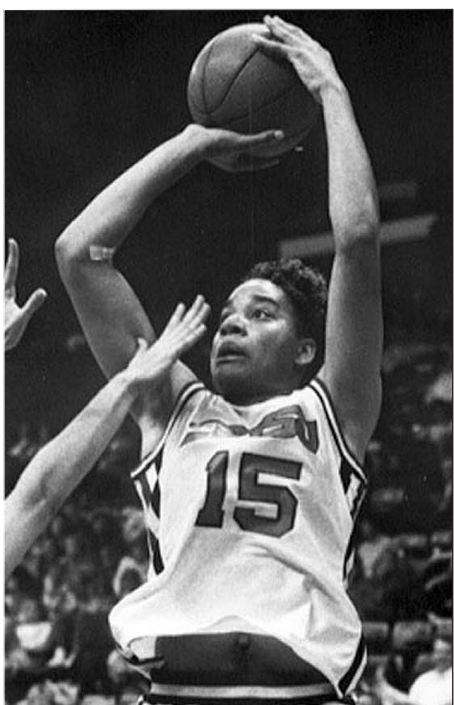

San Diego State University has grown and developed through its 121-year history into one of the nation's major public research institutions. Our 36,000 students and over 400,000 alumni are proud to live the ethos "Leadership Starts Here."

The university offers bachelor's degrees in 95 areas, master's degrees in 78 areas and doctorates in 22 areas.

SDSU is committed to diversity and to excellence. Over 54 percent of our undergraduate students are students of color, and the university is nationally recognized for sending 88 students abroad as Fulbright Scholars since 2005, as well as its programs that serve nearly 3,700 military-affiliated students.

Students from all backgrounds have opportunities for transformative educational experiences such as undergraduate research, study abroad, internships and entrepreneurship training.

Classified as a high-research university, SDSU received \$134 million in research funding during the 2016-17 fiscal year. Our researchers focus on real-world challenges, and our students benefit from access to cutting-edge technology and engaging in research alongside mentors who are leaders in their fields.

SDSU faculty, staff and students lead the way in fields such as understanding and treating heart disease; engineering brain-controlled robotic devices and alternative energy solutions; studying health issues such as autism, fetal alcohol syndrome and childhood obesity; and learning more about bacteriophages – viruses that kill bacteria and hold important keys to human health problems.

SDSU leverages its strategic location on the Pacific Rim and the border of Latin America to advance international study and research. The university has nearly 400 education programs in 65 countries and is among the nation's leaders in the number of students who study abroad.

Led by our Lavin Entrepreneurship Center and our Zahn Innovation Center, SDSU is recognized as one of the top universities in the nation for entrepreneurship.

SDSU engages our greater community by hosting more than 300 on-campus arts events annually and fielding nationally recognized athletics teams.

The university's first comprehensive fundraising campaign helped fuel this academic and research excellence. The recently concluded Campaign for SDSU raised over \$815 million for scholarships, faculty and staff support, and innovative programs. Generous donors established a culture of philanthropy that will continue and ensure that San Diego State will thrive throughout this century and beyond.

# UNIVERSITY DISTINCTIONS



## ACADEMIC STRENGTH

- SDSU continues to gain recognition as a leader in higher education. It is currently ranked as one of the top 70 public universities in the nation, according to U.S. News & World Report's annual ranking of America's Best Colleges.
- SDSU's undergraduate international business program is ranked No. 12 in the nation. The undergraduate business and engineering programs also rank among the top 100, while several graduate programs are standouts in their fields, according to U.S. News and World Report. These graduate programs include clinical psychology, public health, audiology, rehabilitation counseling and speech language pathology.
- SDSU is a hub of student invention and innovation, led by the Lavin Entrepreneurship Center and our ZIP Launchpad. Forbes magazine ranked SDSU No. 23 on its list of America's Most Entrepreneurial Universities, while U.S. News and World Report ranked SDSU's entrepreneurship program No. 21 among the nation's public universities and Fortune ranked the university among the top 25 most entrepreneurial in the nation.
- SDSU's campus includes more than 1,200 students enrolled in the Susan and Stephen Weber Honors College and a growing number of SDSU Merit Scholars—students with a minimum high school GPA of 4.0 and SAT scores of at least 1400.

## A CULTURE OF ENGAGEMENT

- More than 74,000 alumni, faculty, staff, students and friends contributed to The Campaign for SDSU—the university's first comprehensive fundraising campaign—which raised over \$815 million to support the growth and development of San Diego State University. More than 10 percent of the total came from faculty and staff gifts.
- SDSU is one of only a handful of universities nationwide to be recognized for five consecutive years by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) for the sustained excellence of its fundraising program.
- "Building on Excellence" is SDSU's broadly consultative strategic plan establishing the direction and priorities of the university and focusing on three areas: student success, research and creative endeavors, and community and communication.
- SDSU engages its alumni and encourages them to share their professional expertise and experience with current students through programs such as the Aztec Mentor Program and Aztecs Hiring Aztecs.

## COMMUNITY ROOTS

- The Price Community Scholars program provides financial support for local, first-generation students with track records of strong academic achievement and leadership in high school. They, in turn, mentor neighborhood middle school students who aspire to earn college degrees.
- Associated Students confronted the significant challenges of hunger and food insecurity in our community by raising more than 590,000 pounds of food in the Aztecs Rock Hunger drive during fall 2017. AS and SDSU also support the College Area Community Garden, which unites the university and its neighbors in cultivating an urban space for growing fruits and vegetables.
- SDSU's Guardian Scholars program is a unique opportunity for students leaving the foster care system. Young men and women accepted into the program receive full scholarships, year-round housing and academic mentoring to support them in becoming active community members.
- Each year, SDSU partners with one of 23 local governments in a university initiative known as the Sage Project, through which students engage in real-world urban planning that contributes to the sustainability and quality of life in the San Diego region.

## A DIVERSE CAMPUS

- SDSU was selected for the fourth consecutive year as a recipient of the INSIGHT Into Diversity Higher Education Excellence in Diversity Award. The national honor recognizes U.S. colleges and universities that demonstrate outstanding commitment to diversity and inclusion.

- U.S. News and World Report ranked SDSU in the top 25 nationally for ethnic diversity—a point of pride for the university, where students from all backgrounds are achieving academic excellence.
- Arts Alive SDSU integrates arts events and arts practices into the curriculum and recognizes art as a campus-wide value on par with research and international study. With nearly 300 events scheduled each year, Arts Alive reaches an audience of more than 125,000 annually.
- SDSU is consistently recognized by CampusPride.org as among the top 25 LGBT-friendly campuses in the nation. The university's Pride Center is an inclusive, safe, and affirming gathering space and organizes programs and events for persons of all sexual and gender identities and their allies.

## AN INTERNATIONAL PERSPECTIVE

- San Diego State University ranked No. 8 in the nation for the number of students studying abroad in the latest Institute for International Education's Open Doors report. More than 3,000 students have international experiences each year, choosing from nearly 400 programs in 65 countries.
- SDSU has been named a Gilman International Scholarship Top Producing Institution by the U.S. Department of State. The university tied for 14th in the nation among large colleges and universities for the number of students sent abroad through the Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program
- Each year, SDSU welcomes more than 2,300 international students from dozens of countries, including China, India, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, South Korea, Japan and several European nations. They are enrolled as fully matriculated students or as part of the American Language Institute (ALI), of which SDSU's affiliate is one of the largest in the country

## RESEARCH ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- San Diego State University faculty continue to win significant research funding. In fiscal 2016-17, they secured \$134 million in public and private funding—a total of 783 awards—up from \$130 million the previous year and \$120.6 million in 2014-15
- In cutting-edge facilities like the privately funded Donald P. Shiley BioScience Center, San Diego State researchers are developing novel treatments for healing hearts with stem cells and studying the role of inflammation in heart disease.
- To further support research, SDSU has built an Engineering and Interdisciplinary Science Complex, where researchers are developing collaborative projects to turn discoveries into real-world applications. The EIS Complex enhances the university's teaching and research capacities and help attract the best and brightest faculty, graduate and undergraduate students.
- SDSU's Center for Sensorimotor Neural Engineering, funded by the National Science Foundation, is partnering with MIT and the University of Washington in an \$18.5-million project to perfect brain-controlled robotic devices that interact seamlessly with the human body to improve and restore muscle function and movement.
- The Student Research Symposium is an annual forum for SDSU's graduate and undergraduate students to present their faculty-mentored research. More than 500 undergraduate, graduate and doctoral students across 70 majors and disciplines participated in 2018.

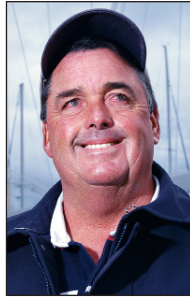
## MOVING FORWARD

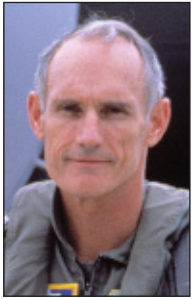

**ADELA DE LA TORRE**

**University President**  
Entering First Year at SDSU

**D**r. Adela de la Torre was recently appointed by the California State University Board of Trustees as the new president of San Diego State University.

Arriving on campus in June 2018, Dr. de la Torre is the ninth permanent president of SDSU and the first woman to serve in that role. She brings with her 30 years of service in leadership roles at institutions of higher education, including the California State University system, the University of Arizona and the University of California, Davis.

Prior to her appointment as President, Dr. de la Torre worked in a variety of leadership positions at UC Davis, culminating in her role as vice chancellor for student affairs and campus diversity, where she oversaw a division encompassing 28 departments and units that provide services and facilities to foster academic success, student development and campus community. In addition, she spent 14 years from 2004-18 directing the UC Davis Center for Transnational Health and served a two-year stint (2009-11) as chair of the UC Davis Chicana/Chicana Studies Department, after becoming the first Latina to receive the rank of distinguished professor.

During her tenure at Arizona from 1996-2002, Dr. de la Torre was the director of the Mexican American Studies and Research Center, successfully developing the first graduate program in Mexican American Studies. She also founded the College of Medicine's first federally funded Hispanic Center of

Excellence.

Dr. de la Torre was also a professor at California State University, Long Beach, serving as chair of the department of Chicano/Latino Studies. She was additionally selected by members of the California State University system to serve a one-year appointment (1995-96) as a management fellow, which involved systemwide strategic planning, higher education legislative initiatives, enrollment and growth planning, as well as systemwide presidential and board of trustee meetings.

Dr. de la Torre's research focuses on aspects of Latino community health – an area where SDSU is a national leader. Her research was previously recognized by the American Society of Hispanic Economists in 2016, when it honored her with its biennial Academic Achievement Award.

Dr. de la Torre's grandparents immigrated to the Central Valley from Mexico. She grew up in the Bay Area, where her grandmother and mother taught her important cultural traditions – the importance of family, the value of hard work and the power of education. Her mother attended both Modesto Community College and the University of California, Berkeley and was a public school teacher for 40 years.

Dr. de la Torre earned a bachelor of science degree in the political economy of natural resources and a master of science and Ph.D. in agricultural and resource economics all from Cal.

# DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



John David Wicker was introduced as San Diego State University's new Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on Oct. 24, 2016.

"It feels great to be back on the Mesa," Wicker said. "I loved my four years here with the coaches, the staff and all the student athletes. I'm thrilled with this opportunity and I am looking forward to helping SDSU Athletics move to next level of success."

Wicker was SDSU's Deputy Athletic Director from 2011 until leaving for Georgia Tech in July 2015. During his first term at SDSU, he was responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Aztecs athletics department, overseeing business operations, human resources, events and facilities, capital projects, strength and conditioning, academics, video and sport oversight for football, rowing, and men's and women's basketball.

"When we began this search, we envisioned a person who cares about our student athletes, whose integrity is paramount and whose competitive fire inspires greatness. In short, someone who embodies our ideal of 'winning it right.' John David Wicker is that person," said then-SDSU President Elliot Hirshman.

Prior to his time at SDSU, he was the Associate Athletic Director for Event and Facility Operations

at Washington State from 2001-11. While at Washington State, he was responsible for event planning and game day responsibilities for all home athletic events, conference tournaments and NCAA championships, day-to-day oversight and operations of all athletic facilities, and the liaison for the athletic department on capital projects.

From 1999 to 2001 Wicker served as Director of Event and Facility Operations at Southern Miss. At USM, he oversaw regular season and championship event operations, coordinated day-to-day maintenance of facilities, and was the liaison to the university on all capital projects. He also oversaw the design and initial construction of USM's \$11 million Athletic Center, which houses administrative and coaching offices, football locker room, weight room and training area.

Wicker also spent three years at Georgia from (1996-99), where he also worked for the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games in preparation for the 1996 Summer Olympics as the venue logistics manager for Sanford Stadium, home to the medal rounds for men's and women's soccer.

Wicker took over an athletic department that has enjoyed great success in recent years. The football team, which has posted three consecutive 10-win seasons, made its eighth consecutive bowl

game appearance in 2017. Men's basketball has been to the postseason in 12 out of the last 13 years. Teams, from women's track and field to men's and women's golf, to baseball and softball, have combined for 41 team conference championships since the beginning of the 2012-13 school year.

"One of our top priorities will be to generate more excitement about Aztec Athletics on campus, in the community, and with our close to 300,000 alumni across the nation," Wicker said. "People around the country know what an incredible atmosphere Viejas Arena is. And that is in no small part because of the fans. There is no reason why we can't have a similar atmosphere at our football games, at Tony Gwynn Stadium for baseball, on the Sports Deck for soccer games and more."

Wicker graduated from Mississippi State in 1992 with a bachelor's degree in professional accountancy. He received his master's degree in education with an emphasis in sports management from Georgia in 1997.

Wicker resides in Santee, Calif., with and his wife Rachel and daughters Scarlett Anne and Waverly Lily.

One of the premier on-campus basketball arenas in all of America, Viejas Arena at Aztec Bowl provides a 12,414-seat, state-of-the-art venue while keeping fans close to the floor and part of the action. It serves as the home of SDSU men's and women's basketball.

Opened in 1997, the facility is the home of San Diego State basketball and provides a venue for university functions, cultural events, concerts and other special-event programming. It features a unique open-air concourse design that allows fans to enjoy the excellent San Diego climate and adds a new experience to attending arena-type events. Prior to the 2015-16 season, the hardwood was named Steve Fisher Court.

The arena is built on the site of the old Aztec Bowl stadium which hosted San Diego State football games as well as other athletic, entertainment and cultural events from the time of its construction in 1936 until 1967.

Built directly into a canyon hillside, Viejas Arena encloses one end of the old horseshoe-shaped Aztec Bowl. Two sections of the stadium's original concrete bleachers and cobblestone walls frame each side of the arena's north entrance. In addition, the university's 10-ton granite boulder, a California landmark commemorating President John F. Kennedy's 1963 commencement address at Aztec Bowl, has also been placed in this area.

In addition SDSU hoops, Viejas Arena has played host to concerts by such artists as Cher, Eric Clapton, Britney Spears, No Doubt, Barry Manilow and Aerosmith. In 2001, Billy Joel and Elton John opened their world tour with a sold-out show at Viejas.

Viejas Arena seats 12,414 for basketball games. Seating includes 240 ADA accessible and companion seats in Row 36, form-fitted bench seats in rows 30-35 with the remaining being stadium seats. For special events and concerts, the venue can become intimate down to 3,000 seats and, depending on configuration, accommodate as many as 13,500.

The facility features a \$2.3-million center-hung Daktronics scoreboard with modern features including up-to-the minute statistical information on individual players.

In addition, the venue offers six locker rooms, two team rooms, a green room, which includes three individual dressing rooms and a common area, a training room, and a work room.

Concessions are provided by Aztec Shops and include a traditional sports-themed menu as well as specialty foods. In addition, catering is provided by Aztec Shops and includes a wide-ranging menu with various levels of service.

The Mezzanine Level houses a VIP Room for banquets, pre- and post-game functions, and other formal and informal gatherings. The room consists of a 2,200-square-foot space that can be divided into

two rooms of 800- and 1,400-square feet. The 800-square foot area can also serve as an interview room for sporting events.

After serving as host to the first and second rounds of the NCAA men's basketball championship in 2001, the venue was the home of the 2001 NCAA women's volleyball national championship. In 2006, it played host to the NCAA men's basketball first and second rounds, along with the McDonald's All-American High School basketball games.

In 2009, the NCAA women's basketball first and second rounds graced the Viejas Arena floor and in 2014 the NCAA men's basketball second and third rounds had a return visit. This past March, the arena, once again, played host to the 2018 NCAA men's basketball first and second rounds. The March Madness event is set to return to San Diego State's on-campus venue in 2022.

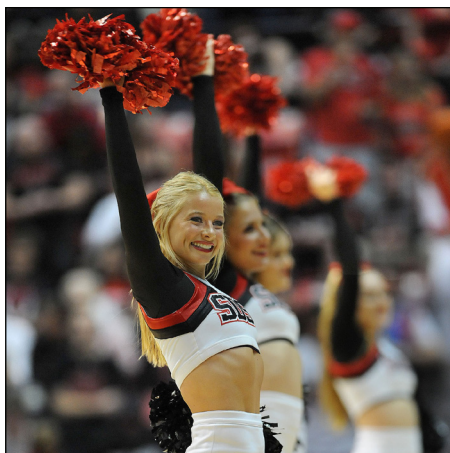

The dual role of student and athlete can be a daunting challenge for any person at the Division I level. Recognizing that academic challenge, the Student Athlete Academic Support Services program has been developed at San Diego State to assist all student-athletes in achieving academic excellence.

It is a source of pride within San Diego State athletics that the department has developed one of the most comprehensive academic support programs in the country.

#### THE STAFF

The SAASS staff includes a director, a learning specialist, four academic advisors, the department's director of compliance, an eligibility coordinator, a financial aid coordinator as well as a recruitment coordinator.

In addition to the full-time staff, the department employs more than 20 mentors and tutors.

Collectively, they operate a program that enhances each student's satisfactory progress toward graduation.

#### THE SERVICES

Throughout the academic year, advisors offer a variety of services to aid individuals in the development of their personal goals and the blueprint for pursuing those goals.

All new student-athletes are invited to an orientation that helps lay the foundation for future successes. Each advisor teaches a section of the University's Freshman Success course (General Studies 100), which deals with specific transition issues for student-athletes. Topics include time management, study skills and test taking. The course also introduces new students to services such as the Love Library, University Advising Center, Career Services, Health Services and the counseling center.

#### THE RESOURCES

In the fall of 2001, the academic unit joined the rest of the athletic department in moving into the \$30 million, 130,000-square-foot

Aztec Athletics Center. The academic staff is located on the third floor of the complex and includes a new 40-station computer lab, individual study rooms and two lecture rooms.

#### THE COMMITMENT

SDSU's annual Scholar-Athlete Awards Banquet honors students with at least a 3.0 cumulative or a 3.2 semester GPA during a calendar year. In the spring of 2018, a University record 336 scholar-athletes and athletic training students were honored for their work in the classroom.

#### LIFE SKILLS

To further increase the opportunities for success, San Diego State is part of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The curriculum of Aztec Pride (Promoting Responsibility, Integrity, Diversity, Education) offers a wide range of programs and activities that enhance the educational experience. Special emphasis is placed on the areas of personal development, community service and career development.

In conjunction with SAAC, the Life Skills Program represents SDSU's total commitment to enhancing the quality of each student's experience.

Another program geared towards helping student-athletes after graduation is "Aztecs Going Pro." The goal of this learning community is to provide student-athletes with a four-year program that fosters academic, social and personal success. Each year, student-athletes will receive programming in a classroom setting that enhances their academic preparedness, furthers personal growth, and creates a greater understanding and appreciation of the social connections that are available at SDSU. Due to the time demands of practice and competition, student-athletes typically are not afforded the opportunity to access the various resources of the general campus community. This program creates opportunities for student-athletes to understand themselves and others and to facilitate academic and social success in a supportive and inclusive learning environment.

# LIFE SKILLS



Part of being an Aztec means giving back to the community as well as developing as an individual.

The Life Skills Program at San Diego State University offers student-athletes a wide range of off-the-court experiences in the areas of personal development, community service and career development.

To ensure success in all three areas, the NCAA Life Skills program began at San Diego State in the fall of 1999. The program provides leadership and community service opportunities, encourages personal and social responsibility and utilizes athletics as preparation for success in life.

The personal development section of Life Skills covers a wide variety of areas, including personal health and drug awareness programs, as well as financial planning, ethics and integrity, and public-speaking opportunities.

The Life Skills Program brings in experts in each field to discuss the topics with each team in an open-forum setting that promotes interaction by those in attendance. In the area of community service, the Life Skills program matches students and teams to specific groups in the community, providing athletes with the opportunity to play a meaningful role in community involvement.

The San Diego State women's basketball team has embraced this section of the program since its inception. Last year, the Aztecs volunteered their time with the California State Games, Saving Horses and at La Presa Middle School.

Previous Aztec basketball service projects included a skills clinic with the San Diego Senior Women's Basketball Association (SWBA), a beach cleanup with San Diego Coastkeeper, delivering goods to Rachel's Women's Shelter during the holiday season, building a house with Habitat for Humanity and serving as volunteers at the Special Olympics.

In the past, the team has also promoted literacy by reading to kids at various elementary schools and libraries in the region, taken part in the San Diego Breast Cancer Awareness Walk, and made visits to San Diego's Children's Hospital.

The team has also hosted basketball clinics at the

Boys and Girls Club of San Diego, providing young girls with the opportunity to learn the fundamentals of basketball and enjoy one-on-one time with the players.

Previously, the women's basketball team has helped celebrate National Girls and Women in Sports Day by inviting 200 young women from STAR/PAL to Take A Girl to the Game. In addition to receiving free admission to the game, participants were provided with an individual autograph session with the team following the game. Annually, the team participates in National Girls and Women in Sports Day, dedicating one of its games to promoting girls and women in sport.

The Life Skills Program also assists student-athletes with post-graduate career development planning, offering résumé writing and interview workshops while working closely with mentors and career placement services.

The Life Skills Program at SDSU continues to evolve, striving to fit the needs of student-athlete, while benefiting the San Diego community at large.

# PROGRAM HISTORY

## 40 YEARS AND COUNTING

The 2018-19 season is the 43rd in Aztec women's basketball history. Since beginning basketball operations in 1976-77, San Diego State has posted a 651-592 (.524) record.

## AZTECS IN THE POSTSEASON

The Aztecs have made 12 postseason appearances since achieving varsity status, including nine berths in the NCAA tournament.

SDSU last punched its ticket to the big dance in 2012, when it lost to LSU in the first round by a 64-56 count. Ironically, Stacie Terry was in her first season as an assistant coach with the Lady Tiger staff.

In 2010, the Aztecs advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the first time in program history since the tournament was expanded to 64 teams. SDSU knocked off a pair of ranked foes in No. 17 Texas on the Longhorns' home floor, and then upset No. 10 West Virginia before falling to No. 6 Duke, despite trailing by only a point at halftime, in the regional round.

The Aztecs also earned an at-large berth to the 2009 NCAA tournament, defeating DePaul, 76-70, in the first round for what was the program's first postseason victory in 14 years.

Prior to 2009, the Aztecs most recent trip to the NAAs occurred in 1997, when San Diego State squared off against Oregon in the NCAA Midwest Regional in Knoxville, Tenn.

## TOPPING 20

The Aztecs have finished 15 seasons with 20 victories or more in the 41 years of the program, including a school-record 27-win campaign in 2012-13, when SDSU reeled off a 17-game unbeaten streak en route to claiming its second consecutive MW regular-season championship.

## AZTECS AND THE MOUNTAIN WEST

SDSU enters the 20th year of conference play in the Mountain West after spending the previous nine in the WAC. The Aztecs captured two straight regular-season conference titles in 2012 and 2013, while sharing the top spot in 2009.

In the final six years of San Diego State's competition in the Western Athletic Conference, the Aztecs won three regular-season

conference championships, including back-to-back titles in 1994 and 1995. SDSU also captured conference tournament titles in 1994 and 1997.

## 1,000-POINT CLUB

San Diego State's top 21 scorers have all recorded in excess of 1,000 points, including the Aztecs' all-time leader, Judy Porter, who tallied an amazing 2,318 points from 1980-83.

McKynzie Fort became the most recent member of the 1,000-point club during the 2016-17 season. She reached the career 1,000-point mark at San José State on Jan. 11, 2017, becoming just the eighth SDSU third-year to accomplish the feat. She finished her career third all-time in scoring (1,708 points).

In the past eight years, SDSU had five star players finish among the top 10 scorers in school history, including McKynzie Fort (3rd - 1,708 points), Paris Johnson (4th - 1,598 points), Jené Morris (5th - 1,499 points), Courtney Clements (6th - 1,495 points) and Quenese Davis (9th - 1,370 points).

## ALL-CONFERENCE HONORS

The Aztecs have garnered first-team all-conference accolades on 28 occasions in program history, including two apiece by Chelsea Hopkins and Courtney Clements. In all, SDSU has produced three Western Collegiate Athletic Association honorees, four all-Big West selections 12 all-Western Athletic Conference choices and nine all-MW picks.

## ALL-AMERICA ACCOLADES

San Diego State players have garnered nine All-America accolades in school history, including Courtney Clements, who collected three certificates during her illustrious career on The Mesa. Clements received honorable mention recognition from the Associated Press in 2012 and twice earned the same distinction from the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) in back-to-back seasons in 2012-13.

In addition, Chelsea Hopkins was a WBCA honorable mention choice in 2013, giving the Scarlet and Black two All-Americans in the same season for the first time ever.

Jené Morris became the second Aztec to earn All-America recognition twice in her career after landing on the State Farm/WBCA honorable mention squad in 2009 and 2010.

Prior to Morris, another Aztec standout Falisha Wright was a two-time honorable mention choice in both 1993 and 1994.

Chana Perry (1989) was the program's first All-American. She was a two-time first-team Big West selection in 1988 and 1989 and ranks sixth on SDSU's all-time scoring list with 1,445 career points. Perry was also the Big West's player of the year in each of her final two seasons.

## WADE HONOREE

The Aztecs' all-time leading scorer Judy Porter was a finalist for the Wade Trophy in 1982. Porter averaged 19.7 points per game as a junior in 1982-83, and 22.6 points per outing as a senior.

During the 2012-13 campaign, Chelsea Hopkins was named to the mid-season watch list for the Wade Trophy en route to receiving honorable mention All-America recognition. Hopkins wound up leading the nation with a whopping four triple-doubles and ranked seventh in assists.

Prior to the 2009-10 campaign, Jené Morris was selected to the preseason watch list for the Wade Trophy, as well as the John R. Wooden Award and Naismith Trophy, becoming the first Aztec so honored.

The Wade Trophy honors the NCAA Division I player of the year and was first presented in 1978.

## FABULOUS FRESHMAN

San Diego State has produced some of the top freshman performances in NCAA history. Tina Hutchinson owns the Division I scoring record for a freshman for both points (899) and points per game (29.9), which she recorded in 1984. In addition, Michelle Suman's 66.7 field-goal percentage in her first season on The Mesa (1992) still ranks fifth in the record books.

## TOUGH ON D

The 1996-97 Aztecs led the nation in scoring defense with a 52.0 points per game average en route to a 23-7 overall record. The mark was third-best all-time and is currently tied for 20th in NCAA Division I history.

In addition, San Diego State established a program record during the 2012-13 campaign by limiting opponents to a .337 field-goal percentage, which ranked seventh in the nation. The Aztecs also finished ninth in the country that season with 5.6 blocked shots per game.

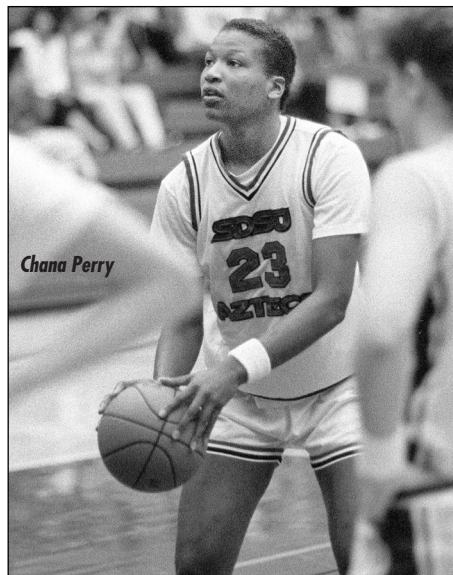
## AZTECS IN THE PROS

Courtney Clements played in the WNBA championship finals for two straight years (2013-2014), as her Chicago Sky club fell to the Phoenix Mercury in three games.

After completing her senior campaign at SDSU, Clements began her professional career as a rookie free agent with the Dream in 2013. Clements played in 30 games for Atlanta, including a WNBA finals appearance against the Minnesota Lynx. Former Aztec teammate Chelsea Hopkins was a late-season pickup in 2013 by the San Antonio Silver Stars. She has also played for the Atlanta Dream, New York Liberty and most recently with the Chicago Sky, where she averaged 14.5 minutes per game in four starts.

Not to be outdone, Jené Morris was the first-ever Aztec selected in the WNBA Draft, going in the first round with the 11th overall pick to the Indiana Fever in 2010.

Morris made her pro debut with the Fever on May 15, 2010, vs. the Washington Mystics and went on to play in 25 games overall during her rookie campaign. After the WNBA season, she went to

Europe to compete for CCC Polkowice in Poland before returning to the WNBA for a one-year stint in 2012 with the Tulsa Shock.

Falisha Wright, a member of the Aztec Hall of Fame, also played professionally with both the Portland Power and the Nashville Noise of the American Basketball League (ABL).

In addition, Cierra Warren, a first-team all-MW selection in 2014, signed a contract to play professionally in Europe with the Haskovo 2012 club based in Bulgaria.

## PLAYERS OF THE YEAR

San Diego State boasted the Mountain West Player of the Year for two years in a row as point guard Chelsea Hopkins captured the award after guiding the Aztecs to their second consecutive conference regular-season title in 2012-13. Hopkins topped the MW in assists and finished among the top five in scoring, rebounding and steals.

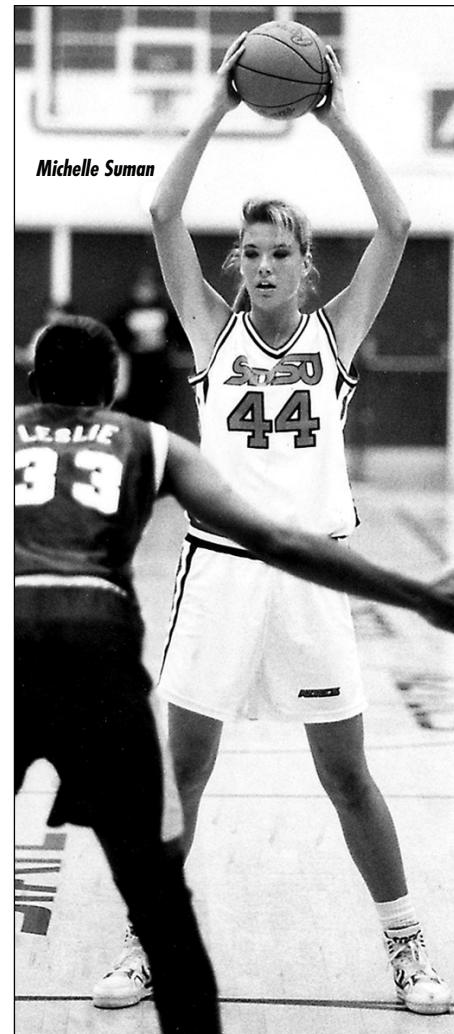
Meanwhile, Hopkins' backcourt mate Courtney Clements was tabbed the MW Player of the Year in 2011-12, after leading the league with 17.4 points per game overall, which included 13 performances of 20 points or higher.

SDSU also produced a pair of conference players of the year during its affiliation with the WAC in Christina Murguia (1995) and Kieishsha Garnes (1991). An honorable mention all-WAC selection in 1994, Murguia ranks 14th in points (1,237), eighth in rebounds (692) and 10th in steals (191) on the Aztecs all-time career charts.

## ACADEMICS JOB NO. 1

Over the past 19 seasons, SDSU basketball players have earned all-academic honors from the Mountain West Conference 50 times, thus proving that athletic and academic success can go hand-in-hand.

The academic accolades also go back to the program's early years as two-year letterwinner Susan Shue was a first team Academic All-American in 1980.

## This is the Mountain West

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its 20th year, the MW has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements during its first 19 years, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system, and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games, winning three. In the inaugural year of the new College Football Playoff system, Boise State earned the automatic slot into a New Year's Six bowl game as the highest-ranked champion from the Group of Five 5 conferences. The Broncos defeated then 10th-ranked Arizona 38-30 in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl. In 2011-12, the Mountain West was among the first conferences to implement a league-wide state-of-the-art basketball instant replay system.

Changes in the NCAA governance structure set the table for another Conference first, when two members of the MW Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) were included in the June 2014 meeting of the Mountain West Board of Directors. New Mexico track and field athlete Kendall Spencer, the national chair of the 2014-15 NCAA Division I Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, and Air Force Academy volleyball player Emma Dridge joined the BOD members in this historic meeting to advance the discussion on student-athlete involvement in the NCAA and MW governance structure. During the last two academic years, MW student-athletes participated on monthly membership calls and have joined MW administrators in the annual Joint Council Spring Meetings in Arizona.

The Mountain West is well-represented within the new NCAA governance structure, including individuals who were appointed to serve on committees tasked with managing the day-to-day business of Division I athletics. Colorado State President Tony Frank currently sits on the DI Board of Directors, while MW Commissioner Craig Thompson and Fresno State Faculty Athletics Representative Dawn Lewis are members of the DI Council. Kendall Spencer, the former chair of the DI Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and UNM track & field athlete, was the first student-athlete in the history of the organization to serve on the Division I Board.

Additionally, the Mountain West was the first conference to have a member institution with No. 1 overall picks in both the NFL and NBA drafts in the same year (Utah's Alex Smith and Andrew Bogut, respectively in 2005). With UNLV's Anthony Bennett claiming the No. 1 pick in the 2013 NBA Draft, the Mountain West is one of three conferences to have multiple No. 1 NBA draft selections since 2000. Also, with San Diego State's Stephen Strasburg earning the No. 1 pick in the 2009 MLB Draft, the Mountain West is one of two conferences to have the No. 1 selection in each of the NFL, NBA and MLB drafts since the MW was founded in 1999.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, respectively, while Fresno State, San Diego State and San Jose State add a West coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean, while the addition of the women's soccer program at Colorado College gives the MW an additional presence in the Rocky Mountains.

## History

The Mountain West was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference. The split from a former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Three of the MW's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV and TCU entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MW in 1999. TCU re-joined the group with its first year of competition in the Mountain West in 2005-06. With conference realignment sweeping the nation in recent years, the MW has been proactive in addressing membership changes. Boise State joined the Mountain West in 2011-12, followed by Fresno State and Nevada on July 1, 2012. Also on July 1, 2012, Hawai'i became a football-only member of the Conference. On July 1, 2013, the Mountain West further expanded when San José State and Utah State joined the Conference, bringing to 11 the number of full-time member institutions and 12 football-playing members. On July 1, 2014, the Colorado College women's soccer program became the first non-football affiliate member of the Mountain West, expanding that sport to 12 Conference participants.

Entering the 2018 season, the MW has agreements with seven different bowl games that will generate at least five guaranteed postseason opportunities for its member institutions. These include primary positions with the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, Gildan New Mexico Bowl, NOVA® Home Loans Arizona Bowl, Las Vegas Bowl and Hawai'i Bowl - and secondary positions with the Cactus Bowl and the Foster Farms Bowl.

An innovator in the postseason bowl structure, the MW engineered many "firsts," as league teams have participated in six inaugural bowl games (2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans, 2002 San Francisco (Emerald), 2005 Poinsettia, 2006 New Mexico, 2015 Arizona), as well as placing the first non-automatic-qualifying FBS team into a BCS bowl game with Utah's appearance in the 2005 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and into the College Football Playoff (CFP) with Boise State's selection to the 2014 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

## 2017-18 Review

From the gridiron to the diamond, Mountain West teams enjoyed a strong year in 2017-18. In football, the fifth annual MW Football Championship Game took place on December 2, 2017 at Albertsons Stadium in Boise, Idaho. The Broncos, champions of the Mountain Division, hosted three-time defending West Division champion Fresno State, with the Broncos claiming their second Conference title in four

years, 17-14.

For the fifth straight season, the Mountain West sent six or more teams into postseason bowl games. The league has earned 90 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 49-41 (.544) all-time record. The 2017 bowl season marked the 11th consecutive year the MW sent at least five teams to bowls and the 14th time overall since the league's inception.

## Opportunity

The Mountain West provides a first-class athletic and academic experience for more than 5,100 student-athletes each year. Over the past 19 years, 42 Mountain West student-athletes have earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships, and since the league's inception in 1999, an additional 38 student-athletes have been named MW Scholar-Athlete of the Year and awarded league-sponsored postgraduate scholarships. Four Mountain West student-athletes have earned distinction as Rhodes Scholars (Jessica Mellinger, Wyoming and Delavane Diaz, Brittany Morreale and Rebecca Esselstein, Air Force).

Conference student-athletes are also given a voice regarding pertinent issues within the MW and NCAA governance structure through representation on the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC). The Mountain West SAAC consists of 24 representatives; two student-athletes from each full member institution, the MW representative to the Division I National SAAC and one faculty athletics representative. The committee reviews and reacts to legislation and to other topics referred by the Conference constituent groups or committees related to the student-athlete experience. Since the inclusion of two SAAC members at the June 2014 meeting of the MW Board of Directors, the Conference maintains its commitment to the participation of student-athletes in its governance structure, consistent with the Mountain West's focus on enhancing the student-athlete experience.

## Achievement

The MW has produced 1,149 All-America selections among its 18 sponsored sports (men's swimming was discontinued as a Conference sport following the 2010-11 season) in the last 19 years, including a league-record 103 All-America honorees in 2016-17. A total of 200 MW student-athletes have also earned Academic All-America accolades in that span. The Mountain West has sent at least 25 teams to NCAA postseason events in each of the past 19 years, capturing five team national championships in women's cross country and producing 47 individual national champions in the sports of men's golf, men's cross country, women's diving, and men's and women's indoor track & field and outdoor track & field.

Mountain West members have participated in 90 bowl games under the league umbrella, including four appearances in BCS games and one CFP game. The MW has earned 82 postseason bids in men's basketball, with six Sweet 16 appearances, as well as three NIT Final Four berths. MW women's basketball has tallied 76 postseason slots, including 37 NCAA bids, five Sweet 16 appearances and one Elite Eight berth since 2000. Wyoming won the MW's first WNIT championship in 2007 with a win over Wisconsin. In women's volleyball, the MW has had 43 NCAA bids with nine Sweet 16 berths and one Elite Eight appearance. Women's soccer has earned 32 NCAA bids since 1999, with two Sweet 16 berths and one Elite Eight appearance. Mountain West men's golf has sent at least three teams to the NCAA Men's Golf Regionals in each of its 19 years, while women's golf has had at least three teams participate in NCAA Regionals 15 of the last 19 years.

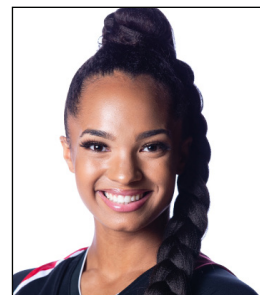

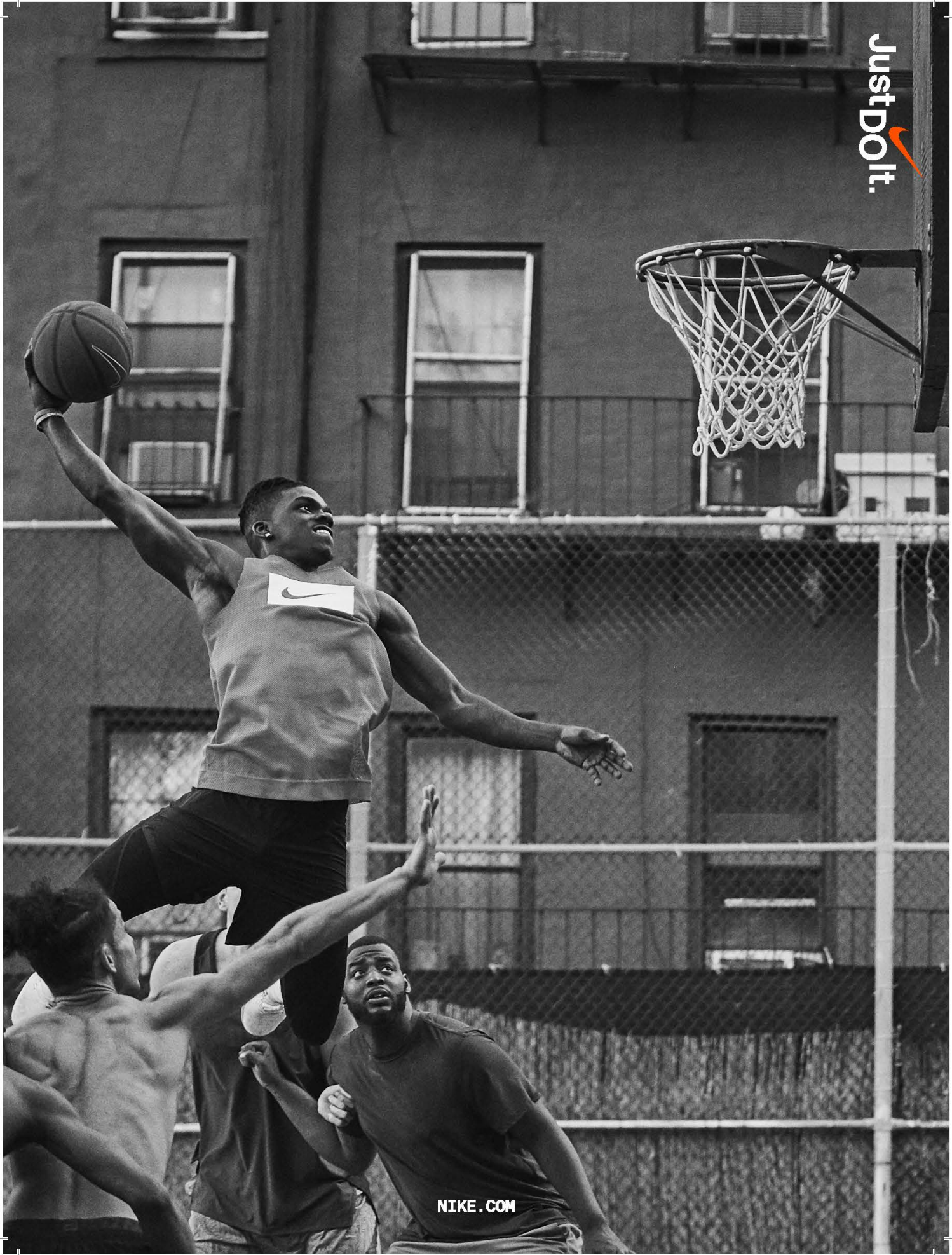
