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

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

oming off its most successful season since the 2001-02 campaign, excitement is at an all-time high for the San Diego State swimming and diving team as it returns 11 letterwinners and welcomes a highly touted group of newcomers in 2008-09.

Second-year head coach Mike Shrader has laid the groundwork as he continues on his mission to build SDSU into a Mountain West Conference championship contender. Shrader, who has compiled an overall head coaching record of 97-16-1 over nine years, had a positive impact in his first season on The Mesa, leading the Scarlet and Black to an 8-4 mark in dual-meet competition. The Aztecs also had multiple all-MWC performers for the first time since 2004, while placing a program-record 10 student-ath-letes on the MWC all-academic team.

"I just want to get better every week and I feel like we have done that so far," Shrader said. "We simply need to continue to improve and have a phenomenal conference meet."

Despite losing its top five scorers from a year ago, the Scarlet and Black hopes to surpass last season's success with an experienced core of returnees and one of its best recruiting classes in recent history.

"Roughly 70 percent of the team is new, so we are definitely counting on some freshmen to step up this year," said Shrader. "I am excited because they are all first-class young ladies who are very good students and who are willing to push themselves to see how good they can be."

Leading a well-rounded group of swimmers this season will be tri-captains Noelle Holland, Jessica Morrill and Kyla Power.

Holland, a sophomore from Casa Grande, Ariz., will pace the butterfly specialists after swimming personal bests in the 100 and 200 fly last year. In addition to her success in the pool, she also excelled in the classroom, garnering MWC all-academic and scholar-athlete honors.

"Noelle had a good summer and is training really well right now," Shrader said. "She is showing excellent leadership skills."

Joining Holland in the fly events will be sophomore Allison Hall and freshmen Shannon Bray and Elisabeth Krueger.

Morrill will anchor a strong group of breaststrokers after earning her first MWC swimmer of the week award in 2008. The junior from Rio Vista, Calif., also owns the fifth-fastest 200 breast time in SDSU history. Newcomers Jeanette Engzell and Lisa Tompkins will add depth to the 100 and 200 breast events.

Morrill will also be expected to contribute in the individual medley, where she will be joined by Hall, Krueger, Tompkins and junior Nino Metsar.

Power, meanwhile, will spearhead a young contingent of distance swimmers. The two-time MWC scholar-athlete had a breakout sophomore campaign in which she established lifetime bests in the 200 and 500 free. Senior Jamie Vessey will also be counted on to provide leadership in the distance events, while freshmen Ashley Flynn and Bojana Duric are expected to make an immediate impact in their initial season on The Mesa.

"Kyla is doing a phenomenal job trainingwise and is an outstanding leader," Shrader said. "She had a great summer and we are looking forward to seeing what she can accomplish this year."

Senior Alexandra Rogers will guide the backstrokers this season after swimming the Aztecs' second-fastest times of the season in the 100 and 200 back last year. Rogers is looking to improve on those marks after a strong showing in training.

"Alexandra is light years ahead of where she was at this time last year," said Shrader. "She had some injuries in the past, but for the most part she is pretty healthy right now and is training at a very high level."

Also contributing in the backstroke will be sophomore Brooke Vessey and freshmen Kelsy

Diener, Alexis McCoy and Shaida Solimani.

Vessey and McCoy, along with sophomores Stephanie Henderson and Melissa Church will also be key factors in the freestyle sprint events.


"Stephanie has been training so much better than she did last year, so we are really excited about her in the sprint events," Shrader said. "Brooke is doing a great job in the sprints also. She will really help us in the 50 and 100 free."

Once again, the SDSU diving squad is shaping up to be one of the Aztecs' strongest areas. Senior Megan Flanagan and junior Caitlin Atkinson, who are both two-time NCAA Zone E Regional qualifiers, currently own the school record in the 3- and 1-meter diving events, respectively. Junior Amy Freeberg is also coming off a record-breaking season in which she established the Scarlet and Black's top mark on the platform en route to her first career all-MWC award. Joining the trio of returnees this year are transfers Alex Barstad and Dominique Campora.


"We have a solid group that is dedicated and committed to the sacrifice, hard training and focus of our season goal, which is to improve everyday, challenge for top spots in our conference meets and make a big mark on all three boards at the MWC championship," said seventh-year diving coach Jim Wynne.

After posting a 3-0 dual-meet record at the Aztec Aquaplex last year, SDSU will look to continue its success at home in its second season at its new on-campus facility as the Scarlet and Black is set to host five meets.

SDSU will open the 2008-09 campaign against Utah on Oct. 11, before returning to the Aquaplex two weeks later when it welcomes Air Force, Colorado State and New Mexico for a MWC quad meet (Oct. 25). After playing host to nonconference foes Fresno State (Nov. 1) and Cal State East Bay (Dec. 31), the Aztecs will close out its home schedule by entertaining Wyoming, UC San Diego and Northern Colorado on Jan. 31.

MIKE SHRADER

ntering his second year at the helm of the Aztec swimming and diving program, head coach Mike Shrader continues on his mission to build San Diego State into a championship contender.

In his first season on The Mesa, Shrader led the Scarlet and Black to its best season since 2001-02 with an 8-4 dual-meet record. SDSU also went undefeated (3-0) in its first year of competition at the Aztec Aquaplex.

"I am extremely excited to be part of the Aztec family," said Shrader. "San Diego State is a fantastic university with remarkable facilities and I look forward to building a program that will compete for championships and make fans proud."

Prior to his arrival in "America's Finest City," Shrader spent eight seasons as the head coach of the women's swimming and diving team at the University of Nevada, where he established an impressive 89-12-1 overall record while leading the Wolf Pack to four NCAA championship appearances.

Under his tutelage in 2007, UNR posted a perfect 18-0 mark and captured the program's first Western Athletic Conference championship. After the flawless season, Shrader was named the WAC swimming coach of the year for the second time in his career. He previously earned the honor in 2002.

Shrader made an immediate impact in his first year at Nevada in 1999-00, guiding the Wolf Pack to its fifth consecutive Big West Conference title and a 13th-place finish at the NCAA championships. That squad boasted two-time national champion and NCAA record holder Limin Liu, in addition to four other All-Americans.

After his initial season, Shrader and the Pack made a smooth transition into the nationally competitive Western Athletic Conference. With Shrader at the helm of the program, Nevada won 10 or more dual meets and placed in the top three at the conference championships in each of his last six seasons, including the aforementioned first-place finish in 2007, as well as second-place performances in 2002, 2003 and 2006.

Before his stint at Nevada, Shrader was an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Southern Methodist in Dallas, Texas. While at SMU,

Shrader helped the team place in the top 12 at the NCAA championships three times.


In the summer of 2005, Shrader served as an assistant coach with USA Swimming at the world championships that were held in Montreal, Canada. He coached the open water swim team to its best performance ever with the squad capturing a gold and two silver medals.

In recognition of his coaching accomplishments, Shrader was a guest of honor at the 2005 Golden Goggle Awards in New York. He also received the 2005 Glenn S. Hummer Award, which is given to a person for outstanding committee service and the advancement of open water swimming in the United States.

Shrader also had a stellar swimming career himself, as he was a junior college national champion and a seven-time All-American while leading Midland College to a second-place finish at the junior college national championships. He continued his collegiate career at Texas A&M, where he earned all-Southwest Conference honors and was a senior national qualifier.

Shrader earned his bachelor's degree in psychology from Texas A&M in 1981, before finishing a master's degree in exercise and sports science from West Texas A&M in 1991.

Shrader and his wife, Catherine, reside in La Mesa.

im Wynne enters his seventh season as the diving coach at San Diego State. A former diver at Niagara, Wynne has a solid back-

ground both as a competitor and coach in his specialty.

Last year, Wynne guided the Scarlet and Black to one of its best diving seasons in school history. SDSU's top three marks on the 1- and 3-meter boards as well as the platform were set during the 2007-08 campaign, while the Aztecs also had their first-ever diver earn all-MWC honors.

Before coming to San Diego State, Wynne was the head coach for men's and women's diving at Niagara from 1994 to 1997. During that time, he guid-

ed two divers to the conference championship and a placing in zones, and also produced a pair of academic All-Americans. In addition, Wynne was the founder of the Niagara Sunbirds, a community-based diving club comprised of novice and junior divers.

Wynne has also recently been working with the junior national team of the Mexican Federation at the Centro de Alto Rendimiento (CAR) in Tijuana, Mexico. During his stint as an instructor at the CAR, Wynne has worked alongside international coaches, including Wang Yu Ping, Andres Romo and Arnoldo Ramos-Mangana.

As an athlete, Wynne had top five finishes in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference three consecutive years and was a four-time Division I Zone A qualifi-





2007-08 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Aztecs won their final three dual meets to finish the season with an 8-4 record (.667), marking the program's best winning percentage since the 2001-02 campaign.
- Junior Megan Flanagan set a school record on the 3-meter board (300.83), while sophomore Caitlin Atkinson did the same in the 1-meter event (280.88). With their record-breaking scores, both Atkinson and Flanagan qualified for the NCAA Zone E Diving Regionals for the second straight year.
- Senior Katie Smith was an all-Mountain West Conference performer in the 100 backstroke for the second consecutive year as she finished sixth at the league title meet.
- Sophomore Amy Freeberg became the first diver in school history to earn all-MWC honors after placing fifth in the platform event with a school-record 207.05 at the championship meet.
- Atkinson (diver) and Jessica Morrill (swimmer) became the first duo in school history to sweep the MWC weekly awards (Jan. 9) before Flanagan (diver) and Brittany Daly (swimmer) repeated the feat on Feb. 6.
- The Aztecs placed a program record 10 student-athletes on the MWC all-academic team.

THE MOUNTAIN WEST CONFERENCE

This is the Mountain West

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West Conference has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. As the league celebrates its 10th anniversary in 2008-09, the MWC continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Over its nine-year history, the MWC has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The MWC is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within MWC boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas and the Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State. The southwestern flavor of New Mexico complements the western heritage and culture of Fort Worth, Texas, home of the MWC's newest member, TCU.

History

The MWC was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference.

The split from the former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Five of the MWC's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (BYU, Utah, New Mexico, Wyoming, Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV and TCU entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MWC in 1999. TCU rejoined the group with its first year of competition in the Mountain West in 2005-06, completing the Conference membership as it stands today.

Opportunity

The MWC provides a first-class athletic and academic experience for more than 4,000 student-athletes each year. Over the past nine years, 36 student-athletes from Mountain West institutions have earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships, and since the league's inception in 1999, an additional 18 student-athletes have been named MWC Student-Athlete of the Year and

awarded league-sponsored postgraduate scholarships. Two student-athletes have earned distinction as Rhodes Scholars (Jessica Mellinger, Wyoming and Delavane Diaz, Air Force).

Conference student-athletes are also given a voice regarding pertinent issues within the MWC and NCAA gov-

Conference student-athletes are also given a voice regarding pertinent issues within the MWC and NCAA governance structure through representation on the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC). The MWC SAAC consists of 10 representatives; one student-athlete from each member institution and one faculty athletics representative. The committee reviews and reacts to legislation and to other topics referred by the Conference constituent groups or committees related to the student-athlete experience.



Beginning its 112th academic year in fall 2008, San Diego State University can take pride in more than a century of achievement in education, research and service. With an enrollment of more than 34,000 students, SDSU has grown into the largest institution of higher education in the San Diego region and one of the largest in California.

Renowned for its academic excellence, the university is home to top-ranking programs in education, international business, social work, speech-language pathology, biology and public administration, to name just a few. Overall, San Diego State students can choose from 81 undergraduate majors, 74 master's programs and 16 doctoral degree programs.

SDSU produces thousands of graduates each year, 60 percent of whom stay in San Diego to pursue their careers, making San Diego State a primary educator of the region's work force, as well as a leader in expanding access to higher education. Committed to serving the richly diverse San Diego region, SDSU ranks among the top universities nationwide in terms of ethnic and racial diver-



sity among its student body.

Increasingly recognized for innovative research, San Diego State has achieved the prestigious designation of "Research University" with high research activity granted by the Carnegie Foundation. For the past two years, SDSU has been ranked the No. 1 Research University for those with 14 or fewer Ph.D. programs according to Academic Analytic's faculty-scholarly productivity index. Since 2000, SDSU faculty and staff have attracted more than \$1 billion in grants and contracts for research and program administration. SDSU ranks among the top 150 public universities nationwide in research expenditures, and SDSU's research funding has more than doubled from a decade ago.

Private giving to San Diego State has also risen sharply in recent years, reaching a record \$75 million in the 2007-2008 fiscal year. Because state funds and student fees provide only slightly more than half of the university's annual operating requirements, the support of alumni, friends and community partners is providing a crucial margin of excellence at San Diego State, enabling the university to fulfill its mission and expand its service to the San Diego region and beyond.

SDSU also plays an integral role in analyzing and resolving complex community problems. A prime example is the City Heights Educational Collaborative, an ongoing partnership with San Diego City Schools, the San Diego Education Association, teachers and parents. Funded with an \$18 million grant from Price Charities, the Collaborative is improving instruction for students and professional development for teachers in three inner-city schools managed by the university.

Another initiative to improve education in the San Diego region and beyond is the Qualcomm Institute for Innovation and Educational Success, launched in 2004 with a record \$14.5 million corporate gift from Qualcomm. The Institute supports programs that aim to enhance math and engineering education across the K-12 spectrum, and supports efforts to revitalize performance in urban school districts nationwide.

Perhaps the most visible evidence of SDSU's growth is in the physical additions to campus and

its continued commitment to providing a modern learning environment for students, faculty and staff. Over the past decade, the university has completed facilities totaling more than \$600 million in value, including Cuicacalli, a dining and residence complex; the Chemical Sciences Laboratory and BioScience Center; and the Aztec Athletics Center, housing coaches' offices, training facilities and the Wise Foundation Hall of Fame. Most recently, construction on the new Parma Payne Goodall Alumni Center has begun. The center will be a gateway for the community to access SDSU's rich assets. Not only will it serve as the first point of contact for alumni and friends visiting SDSU, but it will also be a place where academic and business leaders can collaborate on ventures to benefit our community and impact our future.

Beyond accolades and campus expansion, San Diego State University remains, as always, most proud of its alumni family, more than 200,000 strong. Among those who call SDSU their alma mater are Federal Trade Commission Chairman Timothy Muris, former Air Force Chief of Staff, Gen. Merrill A. "Tony" McPeak, San Diego County supervisors Greg Cox, Dianne Jacob, Pam Slater, Ron Roberts and Bill Horn; former San Diego Mayor Maureen O'Connor, San Diego city council members Ralph Inzunza, Charles Lewis and Jim Madaffer, National Teachers of the Year Janis Gabay (1990) and Sandra McBrayer (1994), astronaut Ellen Ochoa and Costco CEO and cofounder Jim Sinegal.

Aztec alumni also include entertainers Gregory Peck, Art Linkletter, Marion Ross, Julie Kavner and Kathy Najimy; Hollywood producer Kathleen Kennedy; golfers Lon Hinkle and Gene Littler; baseball players Tony Gwynn, Mark Grace, Travis Lee and Graig Nettles; football players Marshall Faulk, Brian Sipe, Fred Dryer and Kyle Turley; America's Cup skipper Dennis Conner; and basketball player Michael Cage.

The success of these individuals and thousands of other SDSU alumni attest eloquently to the success of their alma mater. From modest beginnings, San Diego State University has evolved into a premier center of learning, research and service.

tephen L. Weber, the seventh president of San Diego State University, provides dynamic leadership to an institution that ranks among the largest in the nation. Educated as a philosopher, President Weber began his tenure at SDSU in July 1996 and shortly afterward initiated a broad-based dialogue intended to set the course for the uni-

versity's future.

Under President Weber's guidance, students, faculty, staff, alumni, and community leaders participated in shaping this "Shared Vision." SDSU is now moving boldly ahead toward goals set by those discussions: reinforcing academic excellence, nurturing students, honoring diversity and social justice, carefully stewarding resources, and further developing global prog ams.

A champion of community involvement as well as academic excellence, President Weber has been an advocate for community service. Leading by example, he is a past chair of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities Board of Directors and cochair of Partners for K-12 School Reform. He also serves on the boards of governors of The Peres Center for Peace and the San Diego Foundation, and on the boards of directors of the San Diego Regional Economic Development Corporation and the San Diego Science and Technology Council. He co-chairs the College Presidents Forum of the San Diego County Policy Panel on Youth Access to Alcohol.

President Weber is a member of the international advisory board for the Foundation for Children of the Californias, the advisory council of the San Diego Performing Arts League, the Community Advisory Board of Union Bank of California, and the advisory board for San Diego Gas & Electric (SDG&E).

He serves on the National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) Division I Board of Directors and served on the Presidential Oversight Committee for the Bowl Championship Series. He is a member of the San Diego Rotary Club, an honorary director of the Japan Society of San Diego and Tijuana, and an honorary advisor to the Asia Desk of the San Diego World Trade Center.

Born in Boston, President Weber is a graduate of Bowling Green University with a B.A. in philosophy. He received his Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Notre Dame in 1969 and is the author of numerous articles on philosophy and higher education.

President Weber's many awards include an honorary degree from Beijing Capital Normal University, and distinguished alumnus at his alma mater, Bowling Green University. He was named among the 1997 Headliners of the Year by the San Diego Press Club. Also in 1997, the San Diego Mediation Center honored him with its Peacemaker Award. In 1999, President Weber received the Executive Director's Award from the San Diego Education Association and the Gold Key Award from the San Diego Hospitality Association. He was recognized as a Leader of Vision by the league of Women Voters of San Diego in 2000.

Before coming to San Diego State University, President Weber served as interim provost of the State University of New York (SUNY); he previously served seven years as president of the SUNY Oswego campus. Prior to that, he was vice president of academic affairs at St. Cloud State University in Minnesota, dean of arts and sciences at Fairfield University in Connecticut, and assistant to the president of the University of Maine. While a faculty member at the University of Maine, he was recognized as the outstanding professor in humanities.

President Weber is married to Susan Keim Weber, who shares his enthusiastic commitment to SDSU. They have two sons.

Jeff Schemmel, who has elevated San Diego State athletics to unparalleled success, enters his fourth season on Montezuma Mesa.

In 2007-08, SDSU posted its best-ever finish in the 15-year history of the Division I U.S. Academy Director's Cup for on-field broad based success. Aztec student-athletes

continued to excel in the classroom as well, with 218 student-athletes earning 3.0 cumulative or 3.2 semester grade-point averages in 2007.

Added evidence of the Aztecs' success across the board was demonstrated this past spring, when four San Diego State sports finished in the top 35 of their respective national championships, including a second straight top five finish for water polo and a 15th-place finish for men's golf. In June, Schemmel was also tabbed as the chair of the NCAA Championships and Sports Management Cabinet, which directly oversses nearly every NCAA Division I championship. The Cabinet is one of six committees that make up the NCAA Governance Structure.

Schemmel began his tenure at SDSU on July 6, 2005, and is recognized as one of the most accomplished sitting athletic directors in the country. He is a former practicing attorney, has directed a Final Four, served as a senior administrator at Big 10 and Big 12 schools, and played a part in what might be the biggest football turnaround in college athletics.

Schemmel arrived at San Diego State from Conference USA, where he had served as associate commissioner for governance and legal affairs since October of 2004. During his stay in Dallas, he helped the league negotiate television contracts with ESPN and College Sports Television that exceeded more than \$100 million in revenue, and he served as a member of the NCAA Division I Management Council.

From February to October of 2004, Schemmel was the senior vice president and executive director of development for the Arizona State University Foundation, where he oversaw that school's fundraising efforts while supervising 135 employees across the Tempe campus.

Schemmel was an administrator at the University of Minnesota from 1991 to 2003. During his stay in the Twin Cities, he advanced from associate athletic director for compliance to senior associate athletic director and chief operating officer for Gopher athletics. Along with his departmental duties, Schemmel directed the school's efforts in hosting NCAA Championship events, including the 2001 Final Four, one of America's fastest growing events. He also supervised and implemented a \$3 million capital improvement campaign, and was heavily involved in the hiring of Minnesota's head football and men's basketball coaches.

From 1988 to 1991, Schemmel was an administrator at his alma mater, Kansas State. He served as the school's assistant athletic director for development and later was the associate athletic director for compliance while supervising the school's Olympic sports.

Schemmel was part of the management team that hired Bill Snyder as the Wildcat head football coach. Under Snyder's direction, Kansas State executed what is considered one of the greatest turnarounds in college football history. K-State had made just one bowl appearance in its history prior to Snyder's arrival, did not win a single game in the two seasons before he took over in 1989, and had just three wins in the previous four seasons. Under Snyder, the Wildcats have been bowling 11 times and claimed their first-ever Big 12 title.

Schemmel was a decorated runner at Kansas State and was named the 1976 outstanding student-athlete at the school. As a Wildcat, he was a four-time track and field All-American, a five-time Big 8 Conference champion, was a member of a national champion distance medley relay team and won the Big 8 Conference Medallion.

After earning his undergraduate degree in political science, Schemmel earned his law degree at Washburn University in Topeka, Kan. He began his professional career as an attorney and later was a partner in his own firm, specializing in business and sports law.

Schemmel and his wife, Lori, have been married for 30 years. They have two sons, Justin, and Jon, who plays minor league baseball in the San Diego Padres organization.



he dual role of student and athlete can be a daunting challenge for any person at the Division I level. Recognizing that challenge, the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS) program has been developed at San Diego State to assist all student-athletes in achieving academic excellence.

It is a source of pride within San Diego State athletics that the department has developed one of the most comprehensive academic support programs in the country.

THE STAFF

The SAASS staff includes a learning specialist, four academic advisors, the department's director of compliance, an eligibility coordinator, a financial aid coordinator, as well as a recruitment coordinator.

In addition to the full-time staff, the department employs more than 20 mentors and tutors. Collectively, they operate a program that enhances each student's satisfactory progress toward graduation.



THE SERVICES

Throughout the academic year, advisors offer a variety of services to aid individuals in the development of their personal goals and the blueprint for pursuing those goals.

All new student-athletes are invited to an orientation that helps lay the foundation for future successes. Each advisor teaches a section of the University's Freshman Success course (General Studies 100), which deals with specific transition issues for student-athletes. Topics include time management, study skills and test taking. In addition, the course also introduces new students to services such as the Love Library, University Advising Center, Career Services, Health Services and the counseling center.

THE RESOURCES

In the fall of 2001, the academic unit joined the rest of the athletic department in moving into the \$30 million, 130,000-square-foot Aztec Athletics Center. The academic staff is located on the third floor of the complex and includes a 40-station computer lab, individual study rooms and two lecture rooms.

THE COMMITMENT

San Diego State's annual Scholar-Athlete Awards Banquet honors students with a grade-point average in excess of 3.2. In 2007, 218 student-athletes, more than one-third of the student-athlete body, were honored for their work in the classroom.

A new event was launched in 2005 with the inaugural Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) Awards. SDSU's student-athletes were treated to an awards banquet to recognize outstanding individual achievements throughout the athletic department.



LIFE SKILLS

To further increase the opportunities for success, San Diego State is part of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The curriculum of Aztec Pride (Promoting Responsibility, Integrity, Diversity, Education) offers a wide range of programs and activities that enhance the educational experience. Special emphasis is placed on the areas of personal development, community service and career development.

In conjunction with the SAAC, the Life Skills Program represents San Diego State's total commitment to enhancing the quality of each student's experience.

SDSU'S Aztec Heritage

From the early decades of its history, San Diego State has identified itself with the Aztecs, one of the most sophisticated and distinctive societies in the history of the Western Hemisphere. A fitting choice for a university committed to internationalism and diversity, the Aztec identity evokes great pride in Mexico, as well as among many people in the United States, and certainly within the SDSU community. Consequently, San Diego State strives to honor the Aztec people by enhancing awareness, understanding and appreciation of Aztec culture and achievements.

Aztec History


Aztec civilization dates back to at least the 12th century A.D. The precise location is still debated by scholars, but tradition tells us of a place somewhere north of modern-day Mexico City known at that time as Aztlan, which meant "the place of the cranes" or "the place of the herons." The people who lived in this land were called Azteca meaning "those of Aztlan."

The Azteca eventually left their homeland and became known as the Mexica. Native folklore attributes this name change to the instructions of the people's patron deity, Huitzilopochtli (Hummingbird on the Left).

Around 1325, the Mexica settled on an island in Lake Texcoco, an area that is now the heart of Mexico City, and named it Tenochtitlan or "the place of the fruit of the cactus." A century later, the Mexica and two other Nahuatlspeaking city-states, Texcoco and Tlacopan, combined to create an entity popularly known as the Aztec Empire.

Boasting a strong military force, this new alliance commanded a sphere of influence that stretched across much of present-day Mexico.

Tenochtitlan and its surrounding valley evolved into a highly sophisticated, multicultural and multilingual city-state of several million inhabitants. At



this same time, major European cities numbered only 30,000 to 40,000 in population. A cradle of innovation, the Aztec Empire developed advanced systems of trade, science, politics, religion, education and agriculture. The Aztecs also enjoyed sports and built grand ballcourts to accommodate team

events as a symbolic personification of the Aztecs. Over time, the Montezuma character's look and activities have evolved from a sports mascot into a more dignified and accurate representation of the historical emperor. Montezuma now serves as the university's ambassador of Aztec culture, charged with the responsibility of informing and educating the San Diego community about Aztec civilization. SDSU continues to take pride in its affiliation with Aztec culture and to celebrate the Aztec virtues of strength, valor and intellectual achievement.

ince the 1999-00 season, the San Diego State women's swimming and diving team called the Ray and Joan Kroc Community Center its home. But beginning in 2007, the squad made the transition from the Kroc Center to a state-of-the-art swimming facility on campus, the Aztec Aquaplex.

With its prime location, the long-awaited complex is the final piece of the puzzle for the San Diego State athletic department. The 112,000-square foot facility is nestled between Tony Gwynn Stadium, SDSU Softball Stadium, Aztec Tennis Center, three football practice fields and the SDSU Sports Deck. In addition, Cox Arena is well within walking distance, which truly makes the west side of campus the home for Aztec athletics. Moreover, the Aquaplex is situated behind the Aztec Athletics Center, which allows student-athletes easy access to some of the top training personnel and weightlifting facilities on the West Coast.

The Aztec Aquaplex features two pools, one for competition and another for recreation, and a hydrotherapy spa. The competition pool measures 50 meters in length and 25 yards in width. It also includes a movable stainless steel bulkhead, which allows a flexible water depth of anywhere between seven and 17 feet.

The pool can accommodate a multitude of competitive swimming events (25-yard short course, 25-meter short course, 50-meter long course); water polo games with floating cage courses of 25 yards, 25 meters and 30 meters, in addition to three 25-yard fixed cage courses; and diving competition with its one- and three-meter springboards, along with the option of expanding the platform to 10 meters. In just its second year of existence, the Aquaplex served as the host site for the 2008 Mountain Pacific Sports Federation women's water polo championship.

The facility's 7,300-square-foot recreation pool will be just as multi-dimensional as its counterpart. The pool, which is open to the public, maintains a water temperature of approximately 83 degrees and features a beach-style entrance on one side leading to a depth of five feet. It also includes four lanes for lap swimming and water aerobics, as well as an area for water basketball and volleyball, recreational swimming and floating lounges. Throw in a clover-leaf-shaped hydrotherapy spa and San Diego State has one of the leading aquatic facilities in the United States.

The nerve center of the Aztec Aquaplex lies in the 5,000 square-foot operations building, which contains showers, locker rooms, restrooms, administrative offices, guest services and storage. The facility is also equipped with an 8,000 square-foot solar water heating panel that doubles as a shading structure for the seating area, which can accommodate 500 spectators.

"Our facility is world-class," said San Diego State head coach Mike Shrader. "SDSU, the awesome city of San Diego and the Aztec Aquaplex make for one of the best college experiences anywhere in the world."

The completion of the Aztec Aquaplex proves that San Diego State University is committed to providing its student-athletes and the Aztec community with the highest quality facilities in America.
