### San Diego State Carries Two-Game Win Streak Into Home Contest Against BCS Contender No. 6/4 TCU

Having rallied from fourth-quarter deficits to win games in consecutive weeks for the first time since 1987 and owning its best eight-game record since 1998, San Diego State plays its second of three consecutive home games against No. 6/4 (Associated Press/USA Today Coaches' Poll) TCU.

Game time is set for 1 p.m. PT (kickoff is at 1:02 p.m. PT), with the Aztecs making their first appearance on Versus since Sept. 29, 2007. The contest will be broadcast in high definition, where available. The game can also be heard in Southern California on AM 600 KOGO.

Last week, the Aztecs ended a 23-game stretch without claiming consecutive wins by defeating New Mexico, 23-20, at Qualcomm Stadium. New Mexico enjoyed a slight edge in total offense (386 to 303), but SDSU committed just one turnover (fourth straight game with 1 TO or less) and Ray Guy Award candidate sophomore punter Brian Stahovich flipped the field on a number of occasions. Stahovich helped SDSU to a net average of 42.4 yards, with six punts pinning the Lobos inside their 20, including three times inside the 10. Stahovich earned MWC special teams player of the week honors for his efforts.

TCU owns the nation's fourth-longest win streak at 10 games. The Horned Frogs extended that streak with a 41-0 home win over UNLV last Saturday. TCU has outscored its last three opponents by a 123-13 margin.

- ▶ How much has **San Diego State improved** this season? In the four conference games in 2009, San Diego State has posted a 2-2 record and has been outscored by five points (107-112) after going 0-4 and being outscored by 121 points (63-184) against those same MWC opponents last season. The 116 total-point improvement averages out to 29.0 points per game.
- ▶ Of the 22 new coaches in the FBS this season, only three have already led their team to at least two more victories in 2009 than last season. They are **San Diego State's Brady Hoke** (2 to 4), Iowa State's Paul Rhodes (2 to 5) and Washington's Steve Sarkisian (0 to 3). Hoke has also helped the Aztecs, just eight games into the season, match or surpass their win total in seven of the last nine seasons.
- ▶ The **Aztec offense** has shown remarkable improvement over the last three games since the bye week. In the last three outings (against 18th-ranked Brigham Young, at Colorado State and vs. New Mexico), SDSU has scored 93 points and compiled 1,176 yards of total offense. **Lindley** is 72-for-114 for 1,010 yards, with 12 touchdowns and one interception (an efficiency rating of 170.6). Lindley has a current streak of 103 pass attempts without an interception. During the last three games, **Sampson** has 27 catches for 390 yards and seven touchdowns. - ▶ The **Aztec defense** continues to show remarkable improvement seven games into the Brady Hoke/Rocky Long regime. Of the 14 defensive statistical categories the NCAA keeps, the Aztecs have shown improvement in 11 categories. SDSU ranks 52nd in total defense this season after placing 113th last season. [See *Defense Makes Big Strides*, Pages 9]
- ▶ The Aztec defense also shows improvement, particularly in the fourth quarter. The defense has not allowed a touchdown in a drive that started in the fourth quarter in the last five-plus games. In the last 18 drives that started in the final quarter, nine have resulted in a punt, two on downs, two were ended by the quarter, three turnovers, a missed field goal and a field goal. Opponents have scored just three points in the last 18 fourth-quarter drives.
- ▶ TCU marks the highest nationally ranked opponent San Diego State has played since facing No. 2 Ohio State in Columbus on Sept. 6, 2003. This is the highest-ranked opponent the Aztecs have faced at Qualcomm since facing No. 1 Miami on Nov. 28, 1992.

## LAST TIME OUT

## San Diego State-New Mexico: The Recap

**SAN DIEGO** – No other holiday might have seemed more appropriate than Halloween for San Diego State to get rid of some demons, namely that of the New Mexico Lobos, that had haunted the team for the last nine years. Entering the night, SDSU hadn't beaten the Lobos since 2000, and the streak stretched even further back to 1995 in games played between the two sides in San Diego.

Luckily for the Aztecs, both streaks came to an end as the home team was able to scare up a 23-20 victory on Halloween night at Qualcomm Stadium. With the win, San Diego State improved to 4-4 on the year, marking the first time the program has been .500 or better this late in the season since 2003.

Getting the victory wasn't easy, however, despite the fact that the Lobos came in with an 0-7 record, having lost 11 straight overall. New Mexico grabbed the early 3-0 lead on a James Aho 35-yard field goal and then turned SDSU's first turnover in nearly two games, a Ryan Lindley fumble, into the first touchdown of the night for a 10-point advantage.

The Lobos tried to surprise the Aztecs on the ensuing kick-off, attempting an on-side kick, but the ball went out of bounds and instead gave the home squad great field position at the UNM 42-yard line.

Lindley and company took advantage of the short field, taking just three plays to find the end zone on an 18-yard TD reception by tight end Alston Umuolo to cut the deficit to just three at 10-7.

Later in the quarter, Aztec punter Brian Stahovich nailed one of his five kicks to drop inside the opponent 20-yard line on the night, pinning New Mexico at its own two-yard line. The poor field position led to a punting situation for the Lobos, however, Adam Miller fumbled the snap and was tackled for a safety by SDSU's Demetrius Barksdale.

The Aztecs ended the half on a high note, as the offense drove 80 yards in just 1:23 to take their first lead of the night at 16-10 on a seven-yard touchdown by wideout DeMarco Sampson.

Coming out of the break, it was New Mexico that reclaimed the momentum, posting a field goal and a touchdown on its opening two possessions of the third quarter to go up by four points at 20-16.

The SDSU offense was forced to punt on each of its first three drives of the second half, but finally woke up in the fourth quarter. Lindley completed five of six pass attempts and Sampson outjumped two Lobo defenders to grab his second touchdown of the night and put the home team back ahead for good, 23-20.

New Mexico's last and best threat came with a little more than two minutes left in the game, but Donovan Porterie's fourth-down pass to Bryan Williams was ruled incomplete and the Aztecs took over on downs to preserve the win.

Lindley ended the night completing 22 of his 38 pass attempts for 253 yards and three scores, while Sampson had seven catches for 56 yards and the two TDs. Defensively, senior Kwincy Edwards and junior Brandon Davis each had nine tackles.

## TEAM/SERIES NOTES

- ▶ San Diego State improved to 4-4, marking the first time the Aztecs have been .500 or better this late in the season since the Aztecs ended the 2003 campaign with a 6-6 record.
- ▶ Under Brady Hoke, SDSU has won four times in eight games (4-4). That is the same number of victories the Aztecs had in the 19 games prior to his arrival (4-15).
- ▶ San Diego State has won consecutive games for the first time since Nov. 3 and Nov. 10, 2007. The Aztecs went 23 games without winning consecutive games.
- ▶ San Diego State snapped an eight-game losing streak to New Mexico and a six-game losing streak at home to the Lobos. The Aztecs improved to 21-15 all-time against UNM.
- ▶ With four victories this season, San Diego State has matched or surpassed its win total of each of the last three seasons, four of the last five and seven of the last nine campaigns.
- ▶ San Diego State has defeated Colorado State and New Mexico in the same season for the first time since 1993.
- ▶ With Saturday's victory, SDSU has overcome double-digit deficits to win in consecutive games for the first time since 1993. The Aztecs trailed by 17 at Air Force on Sept. 18, and went on to win 38-31. The following week on Sept. 25, SDSU erased a 10-point deficit to beat Minnesota 48-17 at home.
- ▶ SDSU has overcome a fourth-quarter deficit in consecutive games to win for the first time since 1987, when the team rallied to beat Long Beach State on Oct. 24 (W, 52-42) and then defeated Hawai'i (W, 29-21) the next week. SDSU trailed by nine points against Long Beach State and was down by seven vs. the Rainbows in the fourth quarter.
- ▶ The Aztecs logged their third safety of the season, when linebacker Demetrius Barksdale tackled UNM punter Adam Miller in the end zone. SDSU also had a safety against Southern Utah and Air Force. Prior to this season, the Aztecs' last safety was at New Mexico in 2004.

## THE LAST TIME

- ▶ San Diego State snapped an eight-game losing streak to New Mexico, dating back to Nov. 4, 2000. The Aztecs also claimed their first victory over the Lobos in San Diego since Nov. 4, 1995.

## OFFENSIVE NOTES

- SDSU's fumble in the second quarter was the team's first turnover in its last 101 minutes and 11 seconds of action, dating back to the second quarter of the BYU game.
- With his second quarter touchdown to Alston Umuolo, Aztec signalcaller Ryan Lindley has thrown for at least one touchdown in each of the last 14 outings, dating back to the New Mexico game in 2008 (he missed the game prior vs. AFA due to injury).
- Alston Umuolo's 18-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter was his third consecutive catch for a touchdown. Umuolo had only one catch at Colorado State, a 60-yard TD, and his final of two receptions vs. BYU was a 6-yard TD catch. Umuolo has a TD in each of the last three outings and four for his career.
- Coming off a career game at CSU, senior wideout DeMarco Sampson caught his sixth and seventh touchdowns in the last three games. Over the last three outings, Sampson has 27 catches for 390 yards and seven TDs. Sampson has three consecutive multi-TD games.
- With his 253 yards passing on Saturday, SDSU quarterback Ryan Lindley surpassed the 2,000-yard mark this season. He is the first Aztec to throw for over 2,000 yards in consecutive seasons since Billy Blanton in 1995 and 1996. Lindley also tossed three TDs, giving him 12 in the last three contests, 20 on the season and 35 for his career.

## DEFENSIVE NOTES

- Aztec defensive back Kwincy Edwards recorded a career-best in tackles, beating his previous high of five stops on two occasions earlier this year. Brandon Davis matched his season and career high with nine stops to tie Edwards for the team lead.
- Linebacker Andrew Preston logged his first sack of the season in the second quarter and the third of his career. Defensive linemen Jerome Long and B.J. Williams combined for the team's second sack in the fourth quarter. SDSU has 15 sacks this year, exceeding last year's 12-game total of 13.

## OTHER NOTES

- Redshirt freshman Dominique Sandifer made his first career start at wide receiver. Sandifer is one of nine Aztec true or redshirt freshmen to earn a start in 2009 (4 redshirts; 5 true freshmen). Sandifer tallied a career-best in receptions tonight, besting his previous high of three catches for 48 yards last week at Colorado State.
- The Aztecs scored a touchdown for the 34th straight game.
- SDSU punter Brian Stahovich kicked his 12th and 13th punts of 50 or more yards this season against New Mexico. Stahovich's first four boots today all were inside the 20-yard line, as was his first one of the fourth quarter and his final one of the game (six on the night). He has had 10 kicks drop inside the 20 this season and 24 for his career.

## THIS WEEK'S OPPONENT

### SDSU-TCU: The Series

- Saturday will mark the fifth meeting between TCU and San Diego State. The Horned Frogs have won all four meetings - rallying for a 23-20 victory at Qualcomm Stadium in 2005, posting a 52-0 shutout in Fort Worth in 2006, rallying from a 17-0 deficit to claim a 45-33 victory in 2007 at Qualcomm Stadium and a 41-7 victory in Fort Worth last season.
- San Diego State and TCU are in the same conference for the second time. TCU previously competed in the Southwest Conference (1951-1995), Western Athletic Conference (1996-2000) and Conference USA (2001-04). San Diego State's previous Division I era conference stops include the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (1969-1975), Western Athletic Conference (1978-1998) and the Mountain West Conference (1999-present).
- The schools competed in the same league in 1996, 1997 and 1998, but never faced one another as the Aztecs competed in the Pacific Division and the Horned Frogs were in the Mountain Division of the WAC. In SDSU's final season in the league in the WAC, SDSU posted a 7-5 record and advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl, while TCU finished 7-5 and advanced to the Sun Bowl.
- This marks the 29th game for SDSU against current Division I-A teams from the state of Texas with the Aztecs owning an 18-10 record. The Aztecs are 18-4 against UTEP, 0-2 vs. Houston and 0-4 vs. TCU. On Sept. 13, 2003, San Diego State handed UTEP a 34-0 defeat in El Paso. That is the Aztecs most recent victory over a team from Texas as well as their most recent victory in the Lone Star State.

## Recent TCU-San Diego State Meetings

### ▶ 2008 MEETING: TCU 41, San Diego State 7 | Oct. 4, 2008 | Amon G. Carter Stadium

**FORT WORTH, Texas** – San Diego State was unable to overcome a first-half 20-point deficit as it dropped its Mountain West Conference opener to TCU, 41-7, at Amon Carter Stadium.

The Horned Frogs, who entered the game as the No. 1 team in the nation in rushing defense, held the Aztecs to minus 13 yards on the ground. The Scarlet and Black finished the evening with just four first downs and 85 yards of total offense.

San Diego State hung tough with the home team in the early going and trailed just 3-0 at the end of the opening quarter. The Horned Frogs got on the board when a 15-play, 55-yard drive that ate up seven minutes on the clock set up a 20-yard field goal by Ross Evans.

TCU added to its lead at the start of the second frame with another field goal from Evans, this time from 42 yards out. The Frogs then found the end zone on its final two drives of the half as Ryan Christian had a 10-yard touchdown run before Marcus Jackson completed a 3-yard TD pass to Shae Reagan to give TCU a 20-0 lead at the break.

The Aztecs got off to a good start in the third period when Russell Allen recovered a fumble by TCU quarterback Marcus Jackson at the Horned Frogs' 1-yard line. Mekell Wesley then ran the ball in from two yards out for the Scarlet and Black's lone touchdown of the evening. TCU would not let up, however, as it scored 21 unanswered points to close out the game.

Jackson led the Frogs' attack, finishing the evening 10-for-19 with 115 yards and one touchdown, while also racking up a game-high 131 yards and two TDs on the ground.

San Diego State struggled to find its rhythm on offense after starting quarterback Ryan Lindley (4-for-8, 37 yards) left the game in the second quarter with a shoulder injury. Backup Drew Westling finished the game completing 6-of-17 pass attempts for 61 yards. Vincent Brown led the SDSU receivers with 52 yards on six catches.

Four Aztecs ended up with double digits in tackles, led by Corey Boudreaux's game- and career-high 14 stops. Allen (11 tackles), B.J. Williams (10) and Luke Laolagi (10) were also among the SDSU defensive leaders.

### ▶ 2007 MEETING: TCU 45, San Diego State 33 | Nov. 24, 2007 | Qualcomm Stadium

**SAN DIEGO** – Aztec quarterback Kevin O'Connell threw for 366 yards and two touchdowns, but it wasn't enough as TCU compiled 694 yards of total offense and came back from a 17-0 first quarter deficit to defeat San Diego State, 45-33.

SDSU jumped out to an early lead with a 44-yard field goal by Garrett Palmer. The Aztecs then took advantage of a TCU fumble at the SDSU 1-yard line as O'Connell went on to complete a 97-yard pass play to Chaz Schilens for a TD.

TCU was unable to counter as Travis Crawford forced a fumble on the kickoff return and the Aztecs' Martrell Fantroy recovered the ball at the TCU 48-yard line. SDSU was quick to score, eating up only 35 seconds on the clock, as a 45-yard pass play from O'Connell to Brett Swain set up a 3-yard touchdown run by Davon Brown.

Trailing 17-0 at the start of the second quarter, TCU proceeded to go on a 21-0 run to take its first lead of the night. The Aztecs finally responded with 34 seconds remaining in the half, when Swain had a 6-yard touchdown reception, giving SDSU the 24-21 lead.

The Frogs regained the momentum after the break with two rushing scores by Joseph Turner from nine and 14 yards out. SDSU was able to stop the Frogs' 14-0 run with a 35-yard field goal by Palmer, but TCU quickly countered as Turner ran 41 yards for his fourth TD of the night.

Taking a 42-27 lead into the final 15 minutes of play, TCU tacked on three more points with a 33-yard field goal from Chris Manfredini. With less than two minutes to go, O'Connell ran 12 yards for his 17th career rushing TD.

O'Connell completed 26 of his 51 pass attempts, compiling 424 total yards, including 58 on the ground. Schilens recorded his second 100-yard receiving game with 174 yards on six catches. Defensively, three Aztecs hit double digits in tackles, led by linebacker Luke Laolagi's 13 stops.

► **2006 MEETING:** TCU 52, San Diego State 0 | Nov. 18, 2006 | Amon G. Carter Stadium

FORT WORTH, Texas - Coming off its second win of 2006, San Diego State traveled to Fort Worth, Texas, for the first time ever, taking on preseason MWC favorite TCU. The Aztecs, who fell to the Horned Frogs by just three points in 2005, were unable to match that effort, combining for just 87 yards of total offense, as TCU ran away with the game early and claimed a 52-0 victory.

After the SDSU defense forced a punt on TCU's first possession, quarterback Kevin O'Connell, making his first start since the opener, moved the Aztecs from the 13 to the 40-yard line with the help of a 15-yard pass to Robert Miller and a 10-yard toss to Brett Swain. O'Connell's fifth pass attempt of the afternoon, however, was intercepted by Marvin White and returned to the TCU 37-yard line.

The Frogs used that momentum and scored on its next six possessions, entering the half up 38-0, and piling up 361 yards of total offense in the first 30 minutes of action.

San Diego State moved into TCU territory just once in the game with the help of a 74-yard kickoff return by Ray Bass, who set two school single-game records for most kickoff returns (8) and kickoff return yardage (188). After O'Connell was sacked for a loss of 12 yards, Garrett Palmer's field goal missed wide left from 37 yards out, leaving the Aztecs scoreless.

The Horned Frogs tacked on two, second-half touchdowns before ending the afternoon with a 52-0 victory.

O'Connell and redshirt freshman quarterback Kevin Craft combined to complete just 11 of their 25 pass attempts, while the MWC's leading rusher Atiyah Henderson was limited to 22 yards on 12 carries.

Defensively, Aztec safety Brett Sturm came off the bench to record a team-high nine tackles and recovered a fumble in the fourth quarter.

► **2005 MEETING:** No. 20 TCU 23, San Diego State 20 | Oct. 29, 2005 | Qualcomm Stadium

SAN DIEGO - San Diego State played the nation's 20th-ranked team even for three quarters, but TCU scored 10 fourth-quarter points en route to a 23-20 win.

The final statistics showed how close the game was with the Horned Frogs owning a slight advantage in total offense (403-360) and first downs (24-20), but the Aztecs countered with a turnover advantage (3-2) against a team that entered the contest with the best turnover margin in the nation. San Diego State was partially done in by a missed 35-yard field goal and a red-zone interception in the fourth quarter.

The second quarter belonged to SDSU, as the Aztecs held the Horned Frogs to just 36 yards of offense in the frame and took the lead.

SDSU got on the board after Brett Sturm forced and recovered a TCU fumble, giving the offense the ball at the Frog 20-yard line. Four plays later, Garrett Palmer kicked a 37-yard field goal to cut the lead to 7-3.

The Aztecs went on top later in the quarter when Kevin O'Connell converted a third-and-six with a 26-yard scamper to give San Diego State a 10-7 lead. SDSU closed out a strong frame with a 36-yard Palmer field goal to put SDSU up 13-7.

TCU would strike midway through the third quarter, following a failed fourth down attempt by the Aztecs. After SDSU could not convert on fourth and three at the TCU 38, the Frogs drove 55 yards in six plays for a touchdown.

Cory Rodgers capped a 92-yard drive with a six-yard touchdown run to put TCU up 20-13. SDSU responded by driving 77 yards in 14 plays, but on third and goal at the Frog two-yard line, O'Connell's pass was intercepted in the end zone.

TCU cashed in with a 37-yard field goal by Chris Manfredini to go up 23-13 with 3:50 to play.

San Diego State cut the deficit to three points quickly, taking the ensuing kickoff and driving 65 yards in 90 seconds and pulling to within three points. But TCU was able to keep the ball the final 2:20, converting a critical fourth-and-one with 44 seconds remaining.

## OFFENSE STARTING TO CLICK

Despite playing the last two games without Biletnikoff Award semifinalist Vincent Brown, San Diego State's offense appears to be hitting full stride. Since the bye week of Oct. 10, San Diego State has posted three consecutive strong efforts after going through some growing pains during the first part of the season.

In the last three games - against some pretty good competition in 18th-ranked Brigham Young, at Colorado State and against New Mexico - the Aztecs have scored 93 points and compiled 1,176 yards of total offense.

Sophomore quarterback Ryan Lindley is 72-of-for-114 with 1,010 yards, 12 touchdowns and just one interception during that span. In addition, the sophomore has a current streak of 103 pass attempts without throwing an interception dating back to the second quarter of the Brigham Young game.

Senior wide receiver DeMarco Sampson has 27 catches for 390 yards and seven touchdowns in his past three games.

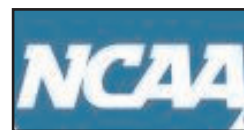

### LINDLEY STARTING TO CLIMB CHARTS

Sophomore Ryan Lindley has strung together three of his best games of the season since coming off the Oct. 10 bye week. A better understanding of offensive coordinator Al Borges' offense and better pass protection has led to the increase productivity for Lindley.

As previously noted, Lindley is 72-of-114 with 1,010 yards, 12 touchdowns and just one interception during that span. In addition, the sophomore has a current streak of 103 pass attempts without throwing an interception dating back to the second quarter of the Brigham Young game. During that three-game stretch, the sophomore has a passing rating of 170.6. He has now thrown 11 touchdown passes since his last interception.

Despite being in just his second season, Lindley is now 205 passing yards short of becoming the ninth quarterback in school history to reach 5,000 passing yards. His 36 career touchdown strikes rank ninth in school history, just three shy of Don Horn (1965-66), who currently occupies eighth place.

Lindley is currently 29th nationally in total offense, averaging 255.9 yards per game.

### SAMPSON COMING ON

After struggling with injuries each of the last two seasons, senior wide receiver DeMarco Sampson has jumped on the scene in a big way the last three weeks.

Sampson, who is second on the team in both receptions and receiving yards, has put together a three-game stretch that anyone in the country would be proud of. In the last three contests, the Chula Vista native has 27 catches for 390 yards and seven touchdowns. The steak is even more impressive when considering Vincent Brown has been sidelined with an injury during much of that time.

Sampson entered his senior year with 17 career catches for 171 yards and one touchdown. Prior to this three-game stretch, Sampson had 34 career receptions for 376 yards and one TD.

### RUNNING GAME IMPROVES

Much has been made of the Aztecs passing game the last three weeks and justifiably so. Nonetheless, the Aztecs remained committed to the run.

For example, in the game at Colorado State, San Diego State rushed 32 times, marking the third time this season that the Aztecs have logged at least 30 carries.

Last week against New Mexico, San Diego State rushed 29 times and gained 88 yards (does not include sacks in the yardage number).

Although the running game isn't what the staff would like it to be, San Diego State continues to make progress and appears to get better as the game goes on. Last week, the Aztecs had 24 of their 50 rushing yards came in the fourth quarter. The week before, SDSU got 32 of its 72 rushing yards in the fourth quarter. For the season, SDSU is averaging 3.2 yards per rush in the fourth quarter (2.3 average the first three quarters). Below is a look at the rushing numbers by quarter for the last two games as well as for the season.

### FOURTH QUARTER COMEBACKS

San Diego State rallied from a 20-16 fourth-quarter deficit to defeat New Mexico on Saturday. It marked the second consecutive week that the Aztecs have rallied from a fourth-quarter deficit to win a game.

That is the first time that has happened since SDSU did in 1987. That year, the team rallied to beat Long Beach State on Oct. 24 (W, 52-42) and then defeated Hawai'i (W, 29-21) the next week. SDSU trailed by nine points against Long Beach State and was down by seven vs. the Rainbows in the fourth quarter.

### CHANGE YOU CAN BELIEVE IN

How much of an impact has Brady Hoke and Co., had on the Aztecs? In less than one year, Hoke and his staff have led San Diego State to a 4-4 record, its best eight-game mark since 1998.

But that just starts to scratch the surface of what this staff has done.

In addition to going 2-2 against MWC opponents that the Aztecs posted an 0-4 record against last season, San Diego State has also shown a margin improvement of at least 13 points against all four conference foes they have faced. In fact, SDSU is averaging a margin bump of 29 points per game over last season.

Taking a look inside the scores of conference opponents in 2008 and 2009 starts to shed light on how much better the 2009 edition of the Aztecs are.

## FIRST YEAR COACH, BIG TIME IMPACT

Of the 22 coaches in their first season at their current school, only three have led their team to at least two victories than they had the previous season. They are San Diego State's Brady Hoke (2 to 4), Iowa State's Paul Rhodes (2 to 5) and Washington's Steve Sarkisian (0 to 3). Hoke has also helped the Aztecs in eight games this season, match or surpass their win total in seven of the last nine seasons.

## DEFENSE MAKES BIG STRIDES

Eight games into the Brady Hoke era, San Diego State has shown remarkable improvement on the defensive side of the ball. The Aztec defense, which ended the 2008 campaign ranked 118 in rushing defense, 113th in scoring defense and 113th in total defense, has looked much improved through the first eight games of the season.

Impressive numbers from the Aztec defense in the first eight games:

- San Diego State's national rankings in the 14 defensive statistics the NCAA keeps for both this season and last season are listed on page six. Of the 14 categories, SDSU is ranked higher in 11 of them. SDSU did not rank among the top 50 programs in any of the 14 categories last season. Right now, SDSU is ranked in the top 50 of four categories.
- San Diego State ranks 52nd in total defense this season after ranking 113th in the category last year. Last season, SDSU allowed an average of 460.75 yards per game. This year, the Aztec defense is allowing only 349.88 yards. That is an improvement of 110.87 yards per game.
- San Diego State has 15 sacks through the first eight games and ranks 64th nationally in the category. In 12 games last season, the Aztecs recorded 13 total sacks.
- The Aztecs have already picked off nine passes this season (two against UCLA, three versus Southern Utah, two against New Mexico State and two against Colorado State). The Aztecs are 40th nationally after ranking 85th a year ago when SDSU had nine interceptions the entire season. The nine interceptions this season are six more than SDSU had the final eight games of 2008 combined.
- San Diego State has jumped from 100th last season to 55th this year among NCAA teams in tackles for loss. The Aztecs have already accumulated 47 tackles behind the line of scrimmage. In 12 games a year ago, the Aztecs posted 57 such tackles, for an average of 4.75 per game.

### The numbers against UCLA:

- The San Diego State defense was flat-out impressive in the second half against UCLA, limiting the Bruins to 10 points (scored on two drives totaling eight yards), and allowing a total of 120 yards of total offense. After intermission, the Bruins rushed 22 times for a mere 45 yards and did not do much better through the air, going 8-for-15 for 75 yards with two interceptions.
- Against Southern Utah, SDSU limited the Thunderbirds to only 279 yards of total offense. The last time the Aztecs held an opponent under 300 yards was Nov. 3, 2007, when Wyoming only had 250 in a 27-24 SDSU home victory.

### The numbers against Air Force:

- San Diego State did not allow an offensive touchdown against Air Force, only the second time in the 28 all-time meetings. San Diego State also held an opponent without an offensive touchdown for just the 33rd time in the school's Division I era and the first time since Dec. 2, 2006.
- The Aztecs also held Air Force 100 yards below their national-leading rushing yardage per game. SDSU allowed 243 yards rushing to a Falcon team that entered the game averaging 344.33 yards per contest. In addition, Air Force had averaged 485 yards rushing in its previous two meetings with the Aztecs.

### The numbers against New Mexico State:

- SDSU held an opponent to under 300 yards of total offense for the second consecutive game and the third time in five games in 2009. The last time SDSU held consecutive opponents under the 300-yard mark was in 2004, when Colorado State managed only 196 yards (Oct. 16) and New Mexico had only 220 yards (Oct. 23).
- New Mexico State's 234 yards of total offense are the fewest SDSU has allowed since Sept. 24,

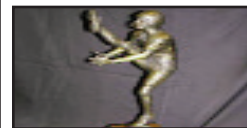

► Junior Dey Juan Hemmings scored his first touchdown in the second quarter when he returned a fumble 14 yards. It was SDSU's first fumble return for a TD since 2006, when T.J. McKay returned one 23 yards in a 27-24 loss at Wyoming on Nov. 4.

► The Aztec defense has contributed points in three of the team's five outings in 2009 (2 safeties, 1 TD).

► New Mexico State went 0-for-4 on fourth-down conversions. It marked the first time the Aztecs did not allow a fourth down to be converted when three or more were attempted since Sept. 16, 2006, at Wisconsin (Badgers were 0-for-3). ## SPECIAL TEAM MOMENTS

Through eight games this season, San Diego State has already produced more big special teams plays than all of last season.

► Lane Yoshida connected on two field goals of more than 40 yards against Idaho, marking the first time he has hit on two attempts of 40 more yards in the same game. He is 5-of-9 from 40 or more yards in his career.

► Against Southern Utah, true freshman Leon McFadden blocked an extra-point attempt and ran it back for a defensive two-point conversion. It marked the first time in the Mountain West Conference era that the Aztecs had a defensive PAT conversion. It also gave McFadden his second block of the season, surpassing the entire San Diego State team total of one from the 2008 campaign.

► McFadden also recorded a block on a UCLA extra point attempt. He joins Andrew Preston as the only active Aztecs to record a block.

► The San Diego State defense limited UCLA's punt return team to 25 yards on eight Aztec punts. Junior gunner Dey Juan Hemmings recorded a pair of special teams tackles.

► Aztec sophomore punter Brian Stahovich is averaging 45.3 yards per boot and already has 13 kicks for more than 50 yards this season. He is ranked fifth nationally in punt average. He earned MWC player of the week honors for his efforts against New Mexico last week.

## VINCENT BROWN REACHES MILESTONES

Junior wide receiver Vincent Brown continues to move up the San Diego State charts as well as flirt with the national lead in receiving yards. Brown has posted five 100-yard receiving games this season and has a touchdown in five of seven games this season.

► Brown posted a streak of five consecutive 100-yard receiving games, tying him for the third-longest streak in school history and the longest by an Aztec player since Tim Delaney did it in five straight games during the 1969 campaign.

► Brown has 100 yards or more receiving in six of his last eight games dating back to last season.

► Nationally, Brown ranks fifth in the country in receiving yards per game (111.14) and 25th in receptions per game (6.43).

► With seven career 100-yard receiving games, Brown now ranks 13th in school history in that category (J.R. Tolver is the all-time leader with 13).

► With 140 career receptions, Brown now ranks 10th in school history in that category, while his 1,758 career receiving yards place him just 376 away from entering the school's top 10 chart in that category.

► Brown entered this season with seven career touchdowns, but caught a TD pass in each of San Diego State's first five games of 2009. Prior to this streak, he had never caught a touchdown pass in consecutive games. Brown tied the longest Aztec streak of the past decade, which matched Kassim Osgood's five-game streak in 2002. Brown's five-game TD-streak, unfortunately, came to an end against BYU on Oct. 17.

► With 13 career touchdown catches, he is one short of moving onto the school's all-time top 10 chart.

► Earlier this season, Brown became the 24th Aztec receiver to post 100 career receptions. He

The Cathedral Catholic High graduate held New Mexico to only two punt returns for a combined minus-1 yard and did not record a touchback. Stahovich added to his season total of punts for 50 or more yards with a 59-yarder and a 50-yarder, raising his total to 13 in 2009.

The sophomore is currently tied for fifth nationally in punting average at 45.28, and the Aztecs are 10th in net punting (39.68) after ending up 100th in that category a year ago.

## LINDLEY ON MANNING WATCH LIST

San Diego State sophomore Ryan Lindley was named to the preseason watch list for the Manning Award on Aug. 17, presented by the Allstate Sugar Bowl to the nation's top collegiate quarterback. Lindley, who set the school and Mountain West Conference records last season for passing yards by a freshman, is one of 38 quarterbacks on the list and one of just six sophomores.

A native of Alpine, Calif., he earned team offensive most valuable player honors last season as a redshirt freshman. Lindley started 10 games, completing 242-of-427 passes for a 56.7 completion percentage with 16 touchdowns and 2,653 yards. He ended the season ranked 24th nationally in passing average, including second among freshmen, and 42nd in total offense (fourth among freshmen). He also had the seventh-best passing efficiency among all freshmen at 117.01. He also became just the second freshman in school history to start a season-opening game for the Aztecs, joining two-time All-American and the school's all-time career passing leader, Todd Santos.

Lindley is one of three MWC quarterbacks on the Manning Award Watch List along with TCU senior Andy Dalton and Brigham Young senior Max Hall. He is the first-ever Aztec named to the Manning Award Watch List.

The Manning Award was created by the Allstate Sugar Bowl in honor of the college football accomplishments of Archie, Peyton and Eli Manning. Ten finalists will be determined by a selected panel of national media covering college football, as well as each of the Mannings. That list will be released on Monday, Nov. 30. The winner will be announced on Thursday, Jan. 14.

## IOSEFA UP FOR RIMINGTON TROPHY

San Diego State junior Trask Iosefa was one of just 43 players named to the 2009 Fall Watch List for the Rimington Trophy, which is given out annually to the nation's top collegiate center. Iosefa was also tabbed to the award's spring watch list that was announced this past May by the Boomer Esiason Foundation.

A two-year starter, Iosefa has played and started in each of the last 24 games over the past two seasons. He is SDSU's most experienced offensive lineman entering the 2009 campaign, with his 24 starts ranking first among all Aztec offensive players and tying for the most on the team.

Iosefa came to San Diego State in the spring of 2006, before redshirting later that season. He was a first-team all-state selection and all-region pick by PrepStar Magazine while playing at Punahou High School.

The junior is one of three centers from the Mountain West Conference tabbed for this year's Fall Watch List and is the first Aztec since Jasper Harvey (2004-05) to be nominated for the award.

The Rimington Trophy committee bases the award on the four All-America teams chosen by the American Football Coaches Association, Walter Camp Foundation, the Sporting News and the Football Writers Association of America. The winner will be honored at a banquet in Lincoln, Neb., next January.

## BROWN A SEMIFINALIST FOR BILETNIKOFF AWARD

San Diego State junior Vincent Brown has been named a semifinalist for the 2009 Biletnikoff Award, the Tallahassee Quarterback Club Foundation announced Monday. Brown is one of 10 semifinalists for the award, given annually to the nation's top collegiate receiver.

Brown, one of five non-seniors on the list, is the first Aztec semifinalist since J.R. Tolver in 2002. Brown is the only receiver on the list from the Mountain West Conference and one of just two from non-automatic qualifying BCS teams. He is the third SDSU player named to a national list this season, joining quarterback Ryan Lindley (Manning Award Watch List) and center Trask Iosefa (Rimington Trophy Fall Watch List).

Despite not catching a pass and missing most of Saturday's game at Colorado State with an injury, the Rancho Cucamonga, Calif., native ranks sixth in the nation in receiving yards per game (111.14), 19th in all-purpose yards per game (148.71) and in a tie for 21st in receptions per game (6.43). Brown has 45 receptions for 778 yards (17.3 yards per catch) and six touchdowns this season.

Past winners of the award include Michael Crabtree (2007-08), Braylon Edwards (2004), Larry Fitzgerald (2003), Randy Moss (1997) and Bobby Engram (1994), among others. The three finalists will be voted on Nov. 19 and will be announced at a later date.

## STAHOVICH A CANDIDATE FOR RAY GUY AWARD

San Diego State sophomore punter Brian Stahovich (Solana Beach, Calif.) is one of 42 candidates for the 2009 Ray Guy Award, which is given annually to the nation's top collegiate punter, the Greater Augusta Sports Council announced Oct. 29. Stahovich is one of just 11 underclassmen on the list and two from the Mountain West Conference.

The sophomore is currently tied for fifth nationally in punting average at 45.28, and the Aztecs are 10th in net punting (39.68) after ending up 100th in that category a year ago.

He is the third Aztec to be a candidate for the Ray Guy Award, which was created in 2000 to honor NFL great Ray Guy. The late Brian Simnjanovski was named to the preseason list in 2003, while Michael Hughes received the honor in 2006 and 2007.

Past winners of the Ray Guy Award include current Pittsburgh Steeler Daniel Sepulveda (2004 & 2006), B.J. Sander (2003), Ryan Plackemeier (2005) and Matt Fodge (2008).

## SENIOR DUO TABBED 2009 CAPTAINS

San Diego State first-year head coach Brady Hoke announced the football team captains for the upcoming 2009 season. Senior tight end Tony DeMartinis and senior linebacker Jerry Milling were selected in a vote by their teammates at the conclusion of fall camp.

Milling enters his senior campaign as an impact player on defense. The Palmdale, Calif., native has appeared in 18 games for SDSU, starting two, but has been limited by injury the last two seasons. Milling recorded 28 tackles, one fumble recovery and a pass breakup in just four games last year. The linebacker has tallied double-digit stops in each of his career starts with 11 against Notre Dame and 10 at San Jose State. Milling has also made strides in the classroom, receiving a President's Award for Most Improved Scholastic Achievement in 2008.

DeMartinis has been a jack-of-all-trades for the Aztecs, playing both offense and defense during his time on campus. The Sun Valley, Calif., native has played in 23 games for SDSU, mainly on the defensive side of the ball. DeMartinis recorded four tackles in his redshirt freshman season and 10 tackles his sophomore campaign. In 2008, DeMartinis was the starter at defensive end in the team's opener with Cal Poly, recording his first career sack before his season was cut short due to a knee injury.

During 2009 spring camp, DeMartinis practiced exclusively at the tight end position. He is currently pursuing his master's degree in homeland security after obtaining his bachelor's degree in business this past spring.

## BROWN NAMED PRESEASON ALL-MWC

The San Diego State football team was picked to finish eighth in the Mountain West Conference preseason poll of MWC media members and junior wide receiver Vincent Brown became the first Aztec offensive player selected to the all-conference preseason team since 2005, the league announced at its annual media day in Las Vegas, Nev., on July 21.



The Aztecs, who return 17 starters and 46 letterwinners from last season, received 53 points. TCU (207 points) was selected to win the conference title, followed by Brigham Young (190) and defending conference champion Utah (179). All three teams received first-place votes. Air Force (130) was tabbed for fourth place, followed by UNLV (108), Colorado State (107), New Mexico (60), San Diego State and Wyoming (46).

The Aztecs hope that eighth place will continue to be good trend. Last season, Colorado State was selected to finish eighth in the preseason poll, but went on to finish 7-6 and posted a victory in the New Mexico Bowl. That marked the second time in the last five seasons that the preseason poll's eighth-place team posted a winning season and advanced to a bowl game. In 2004, Wyoming went 7-5 and won the Las Vegas Bowl after being plucked for eighth.

Brown was one of 12 players selected to the preseason all-conference offensive team. A native of Rancho Cucamonga, Calif., Brown has played in all 24 games and started 18 consecutive contests since arriving on campus. Last season, Brown led the team with 64 catches for 631 yards receiving. He is 20 yards short of 1,000 yards for his career and needs just five catches to become the 24th player in school history with 100 catches.

Brown becomes the first Aztec offensive player named to the preseason all-conference team since Lynell Hamilton earned the distinction prior to the 2005 campaign. Last year, linebacker Russell Allen earned preseason all-conference accolades en route to posting a 107-tackle season.

## THE AZTEC WEIGHT LOSS PLAN

One of the early goals by the new coaching staff was to change the body composition of the team. One of Brady Hoke's early hires was Aaron Wellman as the football strength and conditioning coach. Wellman, who has 14 years of experience at the Division I level and worked in the same capacity with Hoke at Ball State from 2004-08, quickly went to work and the results were nothing short of amazing.

Of the 14 offensive linemen that were weighed on Feb. 2, the first weight in under the new staff, and July 27, the group lost a combined 294 pounds or an average of 21 pounds per player. Five players - Nike Embernate, Alec Johnson, Erik Quinones, Tom Rische and Emilio Rivera - lost 29 or more pounds in the process.

- Ball State made its' first-ever appearance in the national polls a year ago, ranking as high as 12th by the Associated Press and 13th in the *USA Today* Coaches poll.
- Hoke led the Cardinals to back-to-back bowl game appearances (2007-08), the first time the feat has happened in school history. The 2008 team, which also advanced to its first MAC championship contest, earned an invitation to the GMAC Bowl in Alabama in early January.
- Ball State won its 12 games by an average of 21 points and scored a school-record 476 points, including a program-best 62 touchdowns with Hoke at the helm.
- A year ago, the Cardinals were 11th in the nation in total offense, averaging just over 450 yards per contest. They were also fifth in sacks allowed (0.92), sixth in passing efficiency (164.4) and first in fewest penalties per game (2.77) through their first 13 games.
- In 2007, Ball State made its first bowl game appearance in 11 years, earning a bid to the International Bowl in Toronto as MAC co-west division champions. The Cardinals finished with a 7-6 overall record, including a 5-2 mark in conference action, and had four players earn first-team all-league accolades.

## PLAYING EXPERIENCE:

- Hoke was a defensive standout for Ball State as a student-athlete, lettering four times from 1977-80, and serving as team captain as a senior.
- His junior campaign, Hoke posted 95 tackles and as a senior, he had a team-best 150 stops to rank sixth in the MAC and garner second-team all-league honors.
- As a sophomore, he ranked third on the team in tackles and helped the Cardinals to the 1978 MAC championship with an 8-0 record, the only other time Ball State finished a league campaign undefeated prior to 2008.
- Hoke earned his bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Ball State in 1982.

## PERSONAL:

- Hoke is married to the former Laura Homberger and the couple has a daughter, Kelly. His brother, Jon, was an assistant coach at San Diego State from 1987-88 under Denny Stolz, and is currently the defensive backs coach with the Chicago Bears.

# GAME 1 at UCLA

Sept. 5 • The Rose Bowl (55,761)

**PASADENA, Calif.** – The San Diego State football team scored on its first two possessions, but was unable to find the end zone the rest of the way, as the Aztecs dropped a 33-14 decision to host UCLA at the Rose Bowl in Brady Hoke's first game as head coach.

SDSU got on the board quickly, putting together an impressive 14-play, 69-yard drive that ended with a four-yard touchdown pass from Ryan Lindley to full back/tight end Matthew Kawulok to put the visitors ahead 7-0.

After UCLA responded with a 49-yard Kai Forbath field goal, the Aztecs once again found the end zone as Lindley unloaded a career-long 78-yard touchdown strike to Vincent Brown on a third-down play from his own 22-yard line.

San Diego State did not have much time to celebrate, as Bruin Terrence Austin returned the ensuing kickoff 47 yards to the Aztec 12-yard line. UCLA scored on the very next play to cut its deficit to 14-10.

Following a punt by both sides, the Aztecs tried a flea-flicker on their first offensive play of the second quarter, but Lindley's throw was intercepted by Rahim Moore at the UCLA 43-yard line and returned all the way to the SDSU 35.

The Aztecs defense held strong, however, as defensive end B.J. Williams recovered a Kevin Prince fumble at the SDSU 11-yard line.

The Bruins would once again take advantage of good field position, finally taking the lead at 16-14 on a 29-yard touchdown run by Derrick Coleman with 5:33 remaining until halftime. UCLA tacked on another TD before heading into the locker room up, 23-14.

After the break, the Aztec offense struggled to find its rhythm, as the team was forced to punt on its first three drives of the second half.

Now trailing 26-14 following another UCLA field goal, SDSU looked to be in good shape for a breakthrough, as senior linebacker Luke Laolagi intercepted a Prince pass and returned it to the Bruin 23-yard line.

After a five-yard gain on first down and two consecutive incomplete passes, Hoke sent on the Aztec field-goal unit for a 35-yard try, but the kick was blocked and UCLA Alterraun Verner scooped up the loose ball and rumbled 70 yards for the touchdown and the 33-14 advantage.

Neither team was stellar in the final quarter, combining for three interceptions, as UCLA won its 21st game in the two schools' 22 all-time meetings.

Aztec wideout Vincent Brown caught five passes for 139 yards and a touchdown to become the 24th player in school history to reach the 1,000-yard mark in career receiving yards. Lindley completed 18 of his 45 pass attempts for 238 yards and two TDs, but also threw three interceptions, including on each of the team's final possessions of the game.

Defensively, the Aztecs broke in their new 3-3-5 scheme by holding the Bruins to 359 yards of total offense with five UCLA drives starting in SDSU territory.

Prince completed 18 of his 29 passes for 176 yards and a TD, while wideout Taylor Embree had six catches for 97 yards to lead the Bruins.

# GAME 2 vs. Southern Utah

Sept. 12 • Qualcomm Stadium (42,137)

**SAN DIEGO** – After a wild first quarter that included a safety, a defensive extra point and four turnovers, the Aztec football team emerged with a 35-19 victory over visiting Southern Utah in front of over 42,000 fans at Qualcomm Stadium. The win was the first of the Brady Hoke era and evened San Diego State's record at 1-1.

Statistically, the Aztecs held a 436-279 advantage in total offensive yards, while also owning a six-minute edge in time of possession. SDSU's defense forced three turnovers and a safety, logged four sacks and got the Thunderbirds to turn the ball over on downs after four straight plays from inside the three-yard line.

After the opening kick off, the Aztecs got the ball back on Southern Utah's first play from scrimmage, as Nick Sandford recorded his first career interception. Four plays later, SDSU had first and goal from the four-yard line, but freshman running back Walter Kazee fumbled and the Thunderbirds recovered it.

Despite the turnover, the Aztecs managed to score two points anyway on the very next play, as SUU quarterback Cade Cooper stumbled in the end zone for a safety. SDSU added seven more points on a 12-yard pass from Ryan Lindley to Roberto Wallace, but the Thunderbirds answered after another Kazee fumble to get to within five at 9-6. The lead would have been just two, however, Aztec freshman Leon McFadden blocked Southern Utah's extra-point try and, after a lateral from teammate Jose Perez, returned it 57 yards for a five-point lead.

After a wild first 15 minutes, San Diego State settled down by outscoring Southern Utah 14-3 in the second quarter on a one-yard Lindley TD run on fourth and goal and a 22-yard strike from Lindley to Vincent Brown on the team's next drive.

The Aztec football team used that momentum coming out of the locker room by scoring on its first two possessions of the third quarter. Lane Yoshida kicked his first field goal of the year from 31 yards out and true freshman running back Anthony Miller scored his first collegiate TD on a nine-yard run to give the hosts an insurmountable, 35-9 lead.

Southern Utah would match SDSU's 10-point outburst with its own 10-point fourth quarter, but could get no closer, as the Aztecs' won the two schools' first-ever meeting, 35-19.

San Diego State's Vincent Brown ended up with six catches for 142 yards for his third consecutive 100-yard receiving game, while junior Brandon Sullivan logged his first career 100-yard rushing effort with 24 carries for 11 yards.

Defensively, junior Andrew Preston led the Aztecs in tackles with seven, and junior Jacob Tauanuu, making his first career start at defensive end, had two sacks and forced a fumble. Linebacker Luke Laolagi posted an interception for the third straight game in the fourth quarter to give the team five picks already in 2009.

## GAME 3 at Idaho

**MOSCOW, Idaho** – A pair of turnovers and some costly penalties proved to be the difference, as the San Diego State football team was unable to claim its second victory of the season, falling to host Idaho, 34-20, in front of just over 10,000 fans at the Kibbie Dome.

The Aztecs were forced to play from behind the entire afternoon, as the Vandals got on the board quickly just over three minutes into the first quarter when Jojo Dickson intercepted Ryan Lindley's pass and returned it 74 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 Idaho lead.

The host doubled its advantage on its next possession, extending its drive via an SDSU personal foul penalty on a third-down-and-22 at midfield. Six plays later, Vandal running back Deonte Jackson found the end zone on a four-yard rush for the 14-0 lead.

The Aztec offense would finally respond with an impressive drive of its own, going 50 yards on 10 plays to set up the first of Lane Yoshida's two field goals on the day, starting with a 47-yard effort a few minutes into the second quarter.

After Idaho was forced to punt, SDSU gave the ball right back when running back Brandon Sullivan fumbled on the handoff exchange from reserve quarterback Drew Westling. The Vandals recovered at the Aztec 19-yard line and restored their 14-point lead on a 29-yard field goal by Trey Farquhar.

Westling, who came in for an injured Lindley, looked to gain some momentum back for the visitors before the half. He completed three of his first four pass attempts to move the Aztecs down to the Idaho four-yard line. After recovering running back Davon Brown's fumble on first and goal, Westling avoided the rush on third down and found Roberto Wallace in the middle of the end zone for an 8-yard score, the first touchdown pass of his career.

With just under two minutes remaining in the half, Idaho made quick work and drove 52 yards to set up a 40-field goal as time expired for the 20-10 lead.

Lindley returned in the second half, getting San Diego State to within seven points on two occasions at 20-13 and again at 27-20 with just under five minutes left in the game. Each time the Aztecs got closer, however, the Vandals responded right back, outscoring SDSU 14-7 in the fourth quarter to secure the 34-20 victory.

On the bright side, Vincent Brown notched his fourth-straight 100-yard receiving game and his third of 2009, with his career-best 13 catches for 143 yards.

Aztec senior linebacker Jerry Milling had a team-high eight tackles, including three for a loss, while junior defensive back Martrell Fantroy added six stops. The defense, however, was able to force a turnover after netting six in the opening two outings.

Idaho was led by running back Jackson, who had 93 yards rushing and two touchdowns on just 11 carries. Quarterback Nathan Enderle also threw for 232 yards.

## GAME 4 at Air Force

Sept. 26 • Falcon Stadium (35,929)

**USAF ACADEMY, Colo.** – Six turnovers, including two returned for Falcon touchdowns, spoiled an outstanding effort by the Aztec defense, as visiting San Diego State fell 26-14 to the Air Force Academy at Falcon Stadium. With the loss, the Aztecs dropped their 2009 Mountain West Conference opener and moved to 1-3 on the year after the 28th all-time meeting between the two foes.

For the second straight week a turnover led to an early SDSU deficit as quarterback Ryan Lindley, trying to pick up yardage on a third and one, fumbled the ball, which was recovered and returned 47 yards by Falcon Reggie Rembert for a quick touchdown and a 7-0 advantage.

Air Force added to its lead on the first of four fields goals by place-kicker Erik Soderberg, this one from 21 yards away to go up 10-0. SDSU gave the ball right back two plays later when Lindley's pass was intercepted by Falcon Chris Thomas, resulting in Soderberg's second field goal.

San Diego State finally got on the board, but not by its own doing, as Air Force snapped the ball over the head of its punter and through the back of the end zone to provide the visitors with their first two points of the afternoon.

AFA increased its advantage to 16-2 heading into the locker room as they drove 66 yards on 10 plays, capped by a 20-yard field goal with one second left.

The SDSU offense looked to get back on track in the third quarter, but went three and out on its first two possessions, fumbled on its third drive and had an interception returned for a 47-yard touchdown on its fourth opportunity.

SDSU managed to keep its streak of consecutive games with a touchdown alive at 30 straight outings on its final two drives of the afternoon. Lindley completed seven straight passes to cover 69 yards in just 1:48, with the final one going to Vincent Brown on a three-yard touchdown with 3:26 left in the fourth quarter.

Lindley and Brown would connect again on the final play of the game, as Lindley heaved a 30-yard pass into a crowd in the end zone as time expired. The ball was batted around and Brown emerged with the catch for his second TD, but it was too late as the Falcons came away with the 26-14 victory.

The Aztec defense stymied the powerful Falcon offensive attack, which entered the afternoon averaging over 444 yards of total offense in 2009. SDSU held Air Force to just 294 yards, including only 51 through the air, and 12 first downs. Only three of the home team's 26 points did not come following Aztec turnovers and SDSU did not surrender an offensive touchdown for just the 33rd time in the school's entire Division I era.

Senior Jerry Milling led the SDSU defense with a career-best 12 tackles, while fellow linebacker Miles Burris also recorded his career-best with nine stops.

Vincent Brown managed to record his fifth consecutive 100-yard receiving game with the help of his 30-yard TD grab on the afternoon's final play, posting 10 receptions for 123 yards.

## vs. New Mexico State

**SAN DIEGO** – The Aztec defense stole the show in the team's final non-conference game of 2009, as San Diego State used a 17-point fourth quarter to outdistance visiting New Mexico State, 34-17, at Qualcomm Stadium in the first meeting between the two sides since 1975.

The SDSU defense held the New Mexico offense to only 234 yards, including just 88 on the ground, and forced four turnovers on the night. The effort made up for a lackluster performance by the Aztec offense, which compiled only 252 yards of total offense and 13 first downs.

Neither side was able to get on the board in the first 15 minutes of the game, as the schools had one drive each stopped by a turnover and combined for four punts and a missed field goal.

The Aggies were first to get things going, putting together a 11-play, 70-yard scoring drive, helped by a pair of SDSU interference penalties, to surge to a 7-0 lead on a two-yard Jeff Fleming touchdown pass to Kenny Evora.

After another punt, the Aztec defense took over the scoring duties when junior Dey Juan Hemmings, who picked off a pass earlier in the contest, recovered a fumble and ran it back 14 yards for his first career touchdown, tying the game at 7-7.

SDSU would later tack on a 23-yard Lane Yoshida field goal to head into the locker room up 10-7.

Midway through the third quarter, signalcaller Ryan Lindley finally got the Aztec passing game together, hitting Vincent Brown for a 50-yard catch and the ball at the NMSU 21-yard line. One play later, running back Davon Brown took the handoff and dropped back to pass, finding Vincent Brown again for a touchdown and the 17-7 advantage.

The Aggies remained resilient, however, tallying a 34-field goal and knotting the game at 17-17 on a 16-yard touchdown pass from Trevor Walls to Todd Lee to start the fourth quarter.

SDSU would get the ball back and score on each of its next three possessions, benefiting from two more New Mexico State turnovers, to come out with the 34-17 victory.

Aztec true freshman running back Walter Kazee ended the night with 101 of the team's 108 rushing yards and his first career touchdown on 22 carries. Lindley completed only seven of his 27 pass attempts for 123 yards and Vincent Brown saw his 100-yard receiving game streak come to an end at five.

Defensively, defensive back Martrell Fantroy had a team-high eight tackles, while Hemmings added six stops, a tackle for loss, the fumble return for a touchdown and an interception.

## GAME 6

Oct 17 • Qualcomm Stadium (30,258)

## vs. Brigham Young

**SAN DIEGO** – The 2009 contest between San Diego State and Brigham Young was no exception to the themes that have prevailed in the series that dates back to 1947. First off is the element of offense for which this year's game included a combined 854 yards and 64 points. Secondly, and unfortunately for the Aztecs, the Cougars' domination of the end result also continued, as BYU won for the 26th time in 34 opportunities, 38-28, in front of 30,258 fans at Qualcomm Stadium.

The victory wasn't an easy one for the visitors, however, as the San Diego State offense was able to nearly match the scoring prowess of the nation's 18th-ranked team. The Aztecs had 342 yards themselves, including a season-best 322 through the air, and trailed by only seven with just over eight minutes left in the game.

On the flip side, the SDSU defense, which had held two straight opponents to fewer than 300 yards, was unable to stop the well-oiled Cougar offense. BYU went 15-for-21 on third-down conversions, running 91 offense plays, surrendering no turnovers and boasting nearly a 2-to-1 advantage in possession time.

After the Aztecs went three and out to start the game, the Cougars drove 73 yards on 14 plays, eating up over five minutes on the clock before taking a 7-0 lead on a 1-yard touchdown run by Harvey Unga.

SDSU took less time to equalize the score, as a 27-yard pass from Ryan Lindley to Walter Kazee and a 45-yard toss from Lindley to Vincent Brown set up DeMarco Sampson's seven-yard TD reception at the 4:31 mark of the first quarter.

The Aztecs took the lead on their next series on a one-yard touchdown run by Brandon Sullivan, which was helped by a 24-yard pass play from tight end Alston Umuolo to Preston King.

Both of BYU's second-quarter possessions resulted in touchdowns, as the Cougars ate up over 11 of the 15 minutes to take a 21-14 lead into the locker room.

Coming out the break, the Aztec defense stepped up to thwart another BYU scoring drive that ended on a failed fourth-down conversion at the SDSU 23-yard line.

From there, Lindley led the home team down the field, successfully converting a 3rd-and-23 play with a 36-yard TD strike to Sampson to knot the contest at 21.

The tie was short lived as the Cougars once again went ahead by seven and later by 14 on the first play of the fourth quarter. The SDSU defense, however, held on another fourth-down Cougar try, which led to a successful Aztec fourth-down conversion to get back to within seven at 35-28 with just over eight minutes left.

That would be as close as the Aztecs could get, as a late Cougar field goal put them up by two scores, closing out the 38-28 BYU victory.

Lindley finished with 298 yards passing and three touchdowns, while Brown eclipsed the 100-yard receiving mark for the fifth time in 2009 with eight catches for 147 yards. Defensively, senior linebacker Jerry Milling had a career-best 13 stops.

BYU's Hall completed 27 of his 39 pass attempts for 346 and three touchdowns to go with his 14 carries for 47 yards and another score.

## at Colorado State

**FT. COLLINS, Colo.** – San Diego State put up 35 points in the second half, scoring touchdowns on five consecutive drives to erase a 14-point deficit and win its first road game since 2007, by defeating host Colorado State 42-28 at Hughes Stadium.

The Aztecs put on an offensive show, as quarterback Ryan Lindley completed 29 of his 43 pass attempts for 459 yards and a conference-record six touchdowns. Senior wideout DeMarco Sampson caught three of those six TDs, ending with 15 receptions for 257 yards, as he more than made up for the loss of leading receiver Vincent Brown, who left the game in the first half due to injury.

With a strong gust of wind in its face, the SDSU offense did not provide any glimpse into what was to come in the first quarter, as it stalled on its first two possessions and accounted for minus-10 yards.

Colorado State was the exact opposite, relying on the run game and a nifty one-handed, 40-yard TD catch to take a quick 14-0 lead just over 11 minutes into the contest.

The Aztecs finally got into an offensive rhythm on its third possession, driving 79 yards on 14 plays, capped by a seven-yard TD strike from Lindley to Sampson.

SDSU was in position to cut the deficit down to only four, but Lane Yoshida's 32-yard field goal missed wide left and Colorado State answered with an 80-yard touchdown drive to take a 21-7 advantage into the locker room.

While the Rams may have held the momentum going into the break, the Aztecs quickly made moves to shift it in their direction. Just over six minutes into the third quarter, SDSU had already tied the score at 21-21 on a pair of 33-yard touchdown passes with the latter one set up by a 29-yard interception return by Nick Sandford.

Colorado State would not allow SDSU to earn its first lead of the afternoon, however, as the Rams notched a touchdown of their own at the 6:52 mark to once again jump ahead, 28-21.

The CSU defense was unable to stop the Aztec pass attack as Lindley found freshman Preston King for a three-yard TD catch. The ensuing extra-point was blocked though, and the visitors still trailed by one at 27-28 heading into the fourth quarter.

After the Rams were forced to punt, Lindley took SDSU down the field for what would turn out to be the game-winning drive, as Sampson logged his third touchdown reception, this one for 38 yards, and the 35-28 lead. Lindley later hooked up with tight end Alston Umuolo for a 60-yard TD reception to clinch the game and the 42-28 victory.

San Diego State posted a season-high 531 yards of total offense and did not commit a turnover for the first time in 2009. After giving up 229 yards and 21 points in the first half, the Aztec defense held the Rams to only 127 yards and seven points after the break.

## vs. New Mexico

**SAN DIEGO** – No other holiday might have seemed more appropriate than Halloween for San Diego State to get rid of some demons, namely that of the New Mexico Lobos, that had haunted the team for the last nine years. Entering the night, SDSU hadn't beaten the Lobos since 2000, and the streak stretched even further back to 1995 in games played between the two sides in San Diego.

Luckily for the Aztecs, both streaks came to an end as the home team was able to scare up a 23-20 victory on Halloween night at Qualcomm Stadium. With the win, San Diego State improved to 4-4 on the year, marking the first time the program has been .500 or better this late in the season since 2003.

Getting the victory wasn't easy, however, despite the fact that the Lobos came in with an 0-7 record, having lost 11 straight overall. New Mexico grabbed the early 3-0 lead on a James Aho 35-yard field goal and then turned SDSU's first turnover in nearly two games, a Ryan Lindley fumble, into the first touchdown of the night for a 10-point advantage.

The Lobos tried to surprise the Aztecs on the ensuing kick-off, attempting an on-side kick, but the ball went out of bounds and instead gave the home squad great field position at the UNM 42-yard line.

Lindley and company took advantage of the short field, taking just three plays to find the endzone on an 18-yard TD reception by tight end Alston Umuolo to cut the deficit to just three at 10-7.

Later in the quarter, Aztec punter Brian Stahovich nailed one of his five kicks to drop inside the opponent 20-yard line on the night, pinning New Mexico at its own two-yard line. The poor field position led to a punting situation for the Lobos, however, Adam Miller fumbled the snap and was tackled for a safety by SDSU's Demetrius Barksdale.

The Aztecs ended the half on a high note, as the offense drove 80 yards in just 1:23 to take their first lead of the night at 16-10 on a seven-yard touchdown by wideout DeMarco Sampson.

Coming out of the break, it was New Mexico that reclaimed the momentum, posting a field goal and a touchdown on its opening two possessions of the third quarter to go up by four points at 20-16.

The SDSU offense was forced to punt on each of its first three drives of the second half, but finally woke up in the fourth quarter. Lindley completed five of six pass attempts and Sampson out jumped two Lobo defenders to grab his second touchdown of the night and put the home team back ahead for good, 23-20.

New Mexico's last and best threat came with a little more than two minutes left in the game, but Donovan Porterie's fourth-down pass to Bryan Williams was ruled incomplete and the Aztecs took over on downs to preserve the win.

Lindley ended the night completing 22 of his 38 pass attempts for 253 yards and three scores, while Sampson had seven catches for 56 yards and the two TDs. Defensively, senior Kwincy Edwards and junior Brandon Davis each had nine tackles.
