San Diego State University has grown and developed through its 120-year history into one of the nation's major public research institutions. Our 35,000 students and 290,000 alumni are proud to live the ethos "Leadership Starts Here."

The university offers bachelor's degrees in 91 areas, master's degrees in 78 areas and doctorates in 22 areas.

SDSU is committed to diversity and to excellence. Fifty-six percent of our students are students of color, and the university is nationally recognized for veterans' programs that serve more than 1,200 veterans and their families and for sending more than 65 students abroad as Fulbright Scholars since 2005.

Students from all backgrounds have opportunities for transformative educational experiences such as undergraduate research, study abroad, internships and entrepreneurship training.

Classified as a high-research university, SDSU received \$121 million in research funding last year. Our researchers focus on real-world challenges, and our students benefit from access to cutting-edge technology and engaging in research alongside mentors who are leaders in their fields.

SDSU faculty, staff and students lead the way in fields such as understanding and treating heart disease; engineering brain-controlled robotic devices and alternative energy solutions; studying health issues such as autism, fetal alcohol syndrome and childhood obesity; and learning more about bacteriophages – viruses that kill bacteria and hold important keys to human health problems.

SDSU leverages its strategic location on the Pacific Rim and the border of Latin America to advance international study and research. The university has nearly 400 education programs in 52 countries and is among the nation's leaders in the number of students who study abroad.

Led by our Lavin Entrepreneurship Center and our Zahn Innovation Center, SDSU is recognized as one of the top universities in the nation for entrepreneurship.

SDSU engages our greater community by hosting more than 350 on-campus arts events annually and fielding nationally recognized athletics teams.

Helping to fuel this academic and research excellence is the university's first comprehensive fundraising campaign. The Campaign for SDSU is raising \$750 million for student success and faculty and staff support. Generous donors are establishing a culture of philanthropy that ensures San Diego State will thrive throughout this century and beyond.





# Achievements and Distinctions



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## Academic Strength

- SDSU continues to gain recognition as a leader in higher education. It is currently ranked in the top 150 national universities and in the top 80 public universities, according to *U.S. News & World Report's* annual ranking of America's Best Colleges.
- SDSU's international business undergraduate program is ranked No. 10 in the nation and several graduate programs are standouts in their fields, according to *U.S. News and World Report*. They include rehabilitation counseling (No. 9), speech language pathology (No. 25), clinical psychology (No. 26), audiology (No. 27), nursing midwifery (No. 29) and public health (No. 30).
- SDSU is a hub of student invention and innovation, led by the Lavin Entrepreneurship Center and our ZIP Launchpad. *Forbes* magazine ranked SDSU No. 18 on its list of America's Most Entrepreneurial Universities.
- SDSU's diverse campus includes more than 750 students enrolled in the Susan and Stephen Weber Honors College and a growing number of Merit Scholars—students with a minimum high school GPA of 4.0 and SAT scores of at least 1400.

## A Culture of Engagement

- More than 49,000 alumni and friends have contributed to The Campaign for SDSU, the university's first comprehensive fundraising campaign, which is raising \$750 million to support students, faculty and academic programs.
- Fiscal year 2014 was the most successful year of private giving in SDSU's 118-year history and the year in which The Campaign for SDSU surpassed \$500 million.
- "Building on Excellence" is SDSU's broadly consultative strategic plan establishing the direction and priorities of the university for the next several years and focusing on three areas: student success, research and creative endeavors, and community and communication.
- SDSU engages its alumni and encourages them to share their professional expertise and experience with current students through programs such as the Aztec Mentor Program and Aztecs Hiring Aztecs.

## Community Roots

- The Price Community Scholars program provides financial support for local, first-generation students with track records of strong academic achievement and leadership in high school. They, in turn, mentor neighborhood middle school students who aspire to earn college degrees.
- Associated Students confronted the significant challenges of hunger and food insecurity in our community by raising more than 304,000 pounds of food in the Aztecs Rock Hunger drive during fall 2014. AS and SDSU also support the College Area Community Garden, which unites the university and its neighbors in cultivating an urban space for growing fruits and vegetables.
- SDSU's Guardian Scholars program is a unique opportunity for students leaving the foster care system. Young men and women accepted into the program receive full scholarships, year-round housing and academic mentoring to support them in becoming active community members.
- SDSU's Graduate School of Public Health, with researchers funded by the National Institutes for Health and the National Center for Disease Control, is a leader in research and outreach programs designed to combat childhood obesity, particularly in San Diego and Baja California.

## A Diverse Campus

- SDSU was selected for the second consecutive year as a recipient of the INSIGHT Into Diversity Higher Education Excellence in Diversity Award. The national honor recognizes U.S. colleges and universities that demonstrate outstanding commitment to diversity and inclusion.
- *U.S. News and World Report* ranked SDSU in the top 20 nationally for ethnic diversity—a point of pride for the university, where students from all backgrounds are achieving academic excellence.
- Arts Alive SDSU integrates arts events and arts practices into the curriculum and recognizes art as a campus-wide value on par with research and international study. With 350 events scheduled each year, Arts Alive reaches an audience of more than 100,000 annually.
- SDSU is consistently recognized by CampusPride.org as among the top 20 most LGBT-friendly campuses in the nation. In 2014, the university opened The Pride Center, an inclusive, safe, and affirming gathering space for persons of all sexual and gender identities and their allies.

## An International Perspective

- SDSU ranked No. 22 in the nation for the number of students studying abroad in the latest Institute for International Education's Open Doors report. More than 2,100 students have international experiences each year, choosing from nearly 400 programs in 52 countries.
- SDSU recently competed against leading national universities to win the largest grant in university history—\$30 million—to offer science and engineering degree programs in the nation of Georgia and build a unique partnership that enhances our international profile.
- The J. Keith Behner and Catherine M. Stiefel Program on Brazil is SDSU's first endowed academic program with an international focus. Over the next five years, through research collaborations with major Brazilian universities, SDSU will strengthen its global leadership in public health, environmental sciences, international business and urban development.
- Each year, SDSU welcomes more than 2,100 international students from dozens of countries, including China, India, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, South Korea, Japan and several European nations.

## Research Accomplishments

- SDSU is classified by the Carnegie Foundation as a doctoral-granting institution with high research activity funded by the National Institutes of Health and the National Science Foundation. Undergraduate students have many opportunities to work with faculty mentors on exciting projects in SDSU's campus labs and research centers.
- In cutting-edge facilities like the privately funded Donald P. Shiley BioScience Center, San Diego State researchers are developing novel treatments for healing hearts with stem cells and studying the role of inflammation in heart disease.
- SDSU's Center for Sensorimotor Neural Engineering, funded by the National Science Foundation, is partnering with MIT and the University of Washington in an \$18.5-million project to perfect brain-controlled robotic devices that interact seamlessly with the human body to improve and restore muscle function and movement.
- The Student Research Symposium is an annual forum for graduate and undergraduate students to present their faculty-mentored research to an academic audience and incorporate the evaluation into their work. More than 375 students from 86 majors participated in 2014.

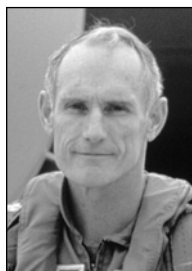

## SDSU's Aztec Heritage

From the early decades of its history, San Diego State has identified itself with the Aztecs, one of the most sophisticated and distinctive societies in the history of the Western Hemisphere. A fitting choice for a university committed to internationalism and diversity, the Aztec identity evokes great pride in Mexico, as well as among many people in the United States, and certainly within the SDSU community. Consequently, San Diego State strives to honor the Aztec people by enhancing awareness, understanding and appreciation of Aztec culture and achievements.

## Aztec History

Aztec civilization dates back to at least the 12th century A.D. The precise location is still debated by scholars, but tradition tells us of a place somewhere north of modern-day Mexico City known at that time as Aztlan, which meant "the place of the cranes" or "the place of the

herons." The people who lived in this land were called Azteca meaning "those of Aztlan."

The Azteca eventually left their homeland and became known as the Mexica. Native folklore attributes this name change to the instructions of the people's patron deity, Huitzilopochtli (Hummingbird on the Left).

Around 1325, the Mexica settled on an island in Lake Texcoco, an area that is now the heart of Mexico City, and named it Tenochtitlan or "the place of the fruit of the cactus." A century later, the Mexica and two other Nahuatl-speaking city-states, Texcoco and Tlacopan, combined to create an entity popularly known as the Aztec Empire.

Boasting a strong military force, this new alliance commanded a sphere of influence that stretched across much of present-day Mexico.

Tenochtitlan and its surrounding valley evolved into a highly sophisticated, multicultural and multilingual city-state of several million inhabitants. At this same time, major European

cities numbered only 30,000 to 40,000 in population. A cradle of innovation, the Aztec Empire developed advanced systems of trade, science, politics, religion, education and agriculture. The Aztecs also enjoyed sports and built grand ballcourts to accommodate team events.

## Aztecs and SDSU

San Diego State University first adopted the Aztec name in the 1920s as a nickname for the college's sports teams. In 1925, the student newspaper followed suit, changing its name from *The Paper Lantern* to *The Aztec*. Since that time, San Diego State's celebration of Aztec heritage has permeated the campus. In 1936, a Donald Hord sculpture of Montezuma II, the last Aztec emperor, became a welcoming campus icon. With the passing years, Aztec themes echoed in the names, colors and architectural elements of new campus buildings. And Aztec culture became the subject of more than a dozen university courses.

In 1941, Monty Montezuma, a character based on Montezuma II, debuted at San Diego State athletic events as a symbolic personification of the Aztecs. Over time, the Montezuma character's look and activities have evolved from a sports mascot into a more dignified and accurate representation of the historical emperor. Montezuma now serves as the university's ambassador of Aztec culture, charged with the responsibility of informing and educating the San Diego community about Aztec civilization. SDSU continues to take pride in its affiliation with Aztec culture and to celebrate the Aztec virtues of strength, valor and intellectual achievement.



# Dr. Elliot Hirshman

**Eighth President of SDSU**

**D**r. Elliot Hirshman has served as president of San Diego State University since 2011 – a period in which SDSU has raised its profile as a major public research university. SDSU ranks in the top 15 for students studying abroad and for ethnic and economic diversity; *Forbes*, *Fortune* and *U.S. News & World Report* rank it in the top 25 for entrepreneurship; and the university has produced 85 Fulbright student scholars in the past decade.

San Diego State's 35,000 students pursue real-world challenges under the guidance of internationally recognized mentors in innovative on-campus labs, entrepreneurship centers and business incubators. SDSU is a research university with high research activity and also has earned the Carnegie Community Engagement Classification.

President Hirshman is committed to ensuring that students from all backgrounds achieve excellence and go on to personal and professional success. The university is recognized nationally for increasing retention and graduation rates – rates that are equal across ethnic and racial groups. It is among the nation's leaders for graduating students of color.

Under President Hirshman's leadership, SDSU has implemented an integrated budget and financial strategy, created a new strategic plan, raised more than \$700 million in private philanthropy for scholarships

and new initiatives and programs, established and endowed its Honors College, and built and remodeled facilities across campus. The Campaign for SDSU's final phase is raising additional funds to endow scholarships, professorships, programs and research and to build a new Engineering and Interdisciplinary Sciences complex.

Dr. Hirshman oversaw the university's recently completed strategic planning process that identified initiatives, funding and implementation steps in the areas of student success, research and creative endeavors, and community and communication.

Dr. Hirshman is president of the SDSU Research Foundation Board and a member of the California State University's President's Commission for Education and Research in Biotechnology and of its Presidents' Council for the Council on Ocean Affairs, Science and Technology. He serves on the boards of the San Diego Economic Development Corporation and the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce. He also is a member of the executive committee of the Commission on Access, Diversity and Excellence for the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities and a member of the Distinguished Alumnus Award Search and Selection Committee for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

Prior to Dr. Hirshman's appoint-

ment at SDSU in 2011, he served as provost and senior vice president for academic affairs at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County. He also had been chief research officer at the George Washington University and chaired the Departments of Psychology there and at the University of Colorado at Denver. He began his academic career, rising to the rank of full professor, at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Dr. Hirshman earned his bachelor's degree summa cum laude in economics and mathematics from Yale and his master's degree and Ph.D. in cognitive psychology from UCLA.

He is a fellow of the American Psychological Association. His research and teaching focus on the psychopharmacology of human cognition, using an interdisciplinary approach that involves collaboration among psychologists, medical doctors and statisticians. Dr. Hirshman has served as associate editor of the *Journal of Experimental Psychology: Learning, Memory & Cognition* and *Psychonomic Bulletin & Review*.

Dr. Hirshman is married to Jeri Hirshman. Their daughter, Wendy, graduated from Muhlenberg College and is a logistics planner for General Atomics Aeronautical Systems. Their son, Nathan, is a student at the Duke University School of Medicine.





# Jenny Bramer



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Jenny Bramer was named interim director of athletics on Aug. 8, 2016, after serving as San Diego State's executive associate athletic director. Bramer has been a member of SDSU's athletic department since 2003.

In her previous position, Bramer oversaw the daily operations of women's soccer, baseball, volleyball, lacrosse, track and field, cross country and water polo. She also supervised the athletic training, sports medicine and information technology departments.

Bramer's other areas of responsibility during her time at SDSU include the oversight of six teams (women's basketball, women's golf, rowing, men's soccer, men's tennis, women's tennis), while spearheading risk management and gender equity efforts, along with leading the search for many of SDSU's current head coaches. Her other areas of supervision have included strength and conditioning, equipment services, compliance, financial aid and human resources. She has also served as tournament manager for numerous Mountain West and NCAA Championships.

On the national level, Bramer was the chair of the NCAA Women's Water Polo committee and served on the Postgraduate Scholarship committee. She has also been appointed to various National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic

Administrators (NACWAA) committees and been on the advisory board for San Diego's branch of Women in Sports and Events (WISE).

At San Diego State University, Bramer is highly involved within the campus community, leading the school's Gender and Minority Equity subcommittee, representing SDSU as its Deputy Title IX Coordinator and serving on its Sexual Violence Task Force. She was also a member of the SDSU Staff Awards committee.

In addition to her daily tasks, Bramer recently created the Aztecs' health educator position, which introduced the SDSU Wellness initiative, enhanced campus health relationships with various groups at San Diego State, coordinated opportunities for every student-athlete to receive sexual violence prevention training, created an assault policy and a culture to report incidents, and developed an administration internship program.

Bramer came to San Diego State in April 2003 as an assistant athletic director for compliance, a title she held until December 2004 before being named an associate athletic director. In February 2007, she received the senior woman administrator designation and has maintained it since. The SWA serves an influential role in the Mountain West structure. In July 2015, she was elevated to executive associate athletic director.

Bramer, prior to arriving on Montezuma Mesa, got her start in athletics at her alma mater, the University of Oklahoma. She was a development graduate assistant from August 1997 to June 1998 before assuming student-athlete advisory board advisor duties until August 1999. During that same time period as an advisor, she was also the department's career center coordinator.

Bramer was later elevated to OU's assistant director of compliance in August 1999. Following a two-year stint, Bramer was named director of compliance before her career took her to America's Finest City in April 2003.

An Omaha, Neb., native, Bramer received her bachelor's and master's degrees from Oklahoma. She was an All-American high jumper for the Sooners and competed in basketball for one season. Bramer excelled in the classroom as well, receiving OU's NCAA Woman of the Year award, earning Academic All-America honors and receiving the Big 12 Postgraduate Scholarship.

Bramer is married to Ken Schiermeyer. The couple has two children, Henry and John, and they live in El Cajon, Calif.

## Media Credentials

Credentials for SDSU home games are issued to working media only and should be requested as early as possible and at least 48 hours prior to tipoff. Requests should be emailed to Mike May.

Game credentials will be granted only to daily newspapers and television/radio stations that cover Aztec Basketball on a regular basis. Credentials will be issued on a space-available basis.

Membership in a writers' association does not automatically qualify an individual or outlet for credentials.

There is a limited amount of press seating available at Viejas Arena. Media agencies who would like to cover a SDSU men's basketball game need to contact the media relations office to request media seating.

To confirm receipt of credential requests or to check the status of a credential request, please contact the San Diego State Media Relations Office. All requests for credentials should be emailed to the media relations office at mmay@mail.sdsu.edu.

San Diego State reserves the right to deny media credentials to any individual who is not affiliated with an official news gathering organization.

## Scouting Tickets

Due to limited media seating at Viejas Arena, professional basketball scouts must purchase a ticket. Requests should be made to Mike May in the San Diego State Media Relations Office. Scouts are permitted access to the media work room for access to game notes and statistics.

## Parking

On game day, media parking is located on the first level of Parking Structure 12 (PS 12), just north of the arena. Game credentials provide admittance to the structure. A parking pass is required and can be obtained through the media relations office.

Do not park in the tunnel entrance lot (Lot 13) at any point on game days. Violators will be towed.

## Will Call/Media Entrance

Members of the media must enter through the loading dock doors of Viejas Arena located through the L Lot. This also serves as the media will call location.

## Media Room

The media room and all postgame activities will be conducted in rooms located underneath the arena seating. Media should exit the tunnel located beneath gate N.

## Photographers

Photographers are restricted to either designated areas along the baseline and are not permitted along court-side during the game.

## Media Seating

Media will be assigned seats along press row tables located behind the visitor's bench or in the upper portion of Section N. Please check the seating chart posted in the media work room.

Seating is extremely limited and a credential does not guarantee a seat in the press area.

## Postgame Interviews

**Home Games** - The San Diego State men's basketball locker room is closed to the media.

SDSU players and head coach Steve Fisher, following a short postgame radio session, will be available to the media in the postgame interview area on the mezzanine level of Viejas Arena. Typically, players are available

between five and 10 minutes following the departure of the team off the court, followed by Coach Fisher.

Only the television network broadcasting the game live may request coaches and players on the court following the game. Those requests must be made through Mike May.

**Opponent Interviews at Viejas Arena** - Typically, interviews of opposing players/coaches take place outside the visitor locker room. Contact the visiting sports information director for his or her policy prior to the game.

**Road Games** - The SDSU locker room is closed. Following a brief cooling off period, Aztec players are available for interviews. Fisher will meet with the media upon completion of his postgame radio interview.

## Weekly Interviews

**From I-15 (Heading South):** merge onto I-8 East, take College Avenue exit and go south. San Diego State University will be on your right.

**From I-8 (Heading West):** take College Avenue exit and go south. San Diego State University will be on your right.

Proceed past Canyon Crest Drive (the first stoplight) then make an immediate right turn to the green information booth for parking information. Ask the parking guard for directions as to where you may park.

## Directions to Viejas Arena

**To Viejas Arena:** From Interstate 8, take the College Avenue exit and go south. Turn right at Montezuma Road (second stop light at the top of the hill). Go to the second stop light (55th Street) and turn right. Viejas Arena is located one-half mile up on the right hand side.

**To Media Parking Lot:** Continue driving north on 55th Street past Viejas Arena and make a right at the stop light on to Aztec Circle Drive. Follow Aztec Circle Drive to the bottom of the hill and turn left into Parking Structure 4 (PS 4). Present your media credential to the attendant

and you will be directed on where to park. Parking passes obtained through the media relations office are required.

In each of the last four seasons, San Diego State has sold out its entire home slate prior to the start of the campaign. Entering 2016-17, the Aztecs have played in front of 72 straight regular-season sell-out crowds. After averaging 12,210 fans in 2015-16, SDSU led the state of California in attendance for the sixth straight year.

One of the premier on-campus basketball arenas in all of America, Viejas Arena at Aztec Bowl provides a 12,414-seat, state-of-the-art venue while keeping fans close to the floor and part of the action.

Opened in 1997, the facility is the home of San Diego State basketball and provides a venue for university functions, cultural events, concerts and other special-event programming. It features a unique open-air concourse design that allows fans to enjoy the excellent San Diego climate and adds a new experience to attending arena-type events. Prior to the 2015-16 season, the hardwood was named Steve Fisher Court.

The arena is built on the site of the old Aztec Bowl stadium which hosted San Diego State football games as well as other athletic, entertainment and cultural events from the time of its construction in 1936 until 1967.

Built directly into a canyon hillside, Viejas Arena encloses one end of the old horseshoe-shaped Aztec Bowl. Two sections of the stadium's original concrete bleachers and cobblestone walls frame each side of the arena's north

entrance. In addition, the university's 10-ton granite boulder, a California landmark commemorating President John F. Kennedy's 1963 commencement address at Aztec Bowl, has also been placed in this area.

In addition SDSU hoops, Viejas Arena has played host to concerts by such artists as Cher, Eric Clapton, Britney Spears, No Doubt, Barry Manilow and Aerosmith. In 2001, Billy Joel and Elton John opened their world tour with a sold-out show at Viejas.

Viejas Arena seats 12,414 for sporting events. The seating includes the top nine rows consisting of bench seats with the remaining areas as chairbacks. The total seating is approximately 3,935 bench seats and 8,065 chairs. In the special event/concert configuration there are approximately 11,500 seats. All seating configurations are flexible and can be adjusted.

The facility features a state-of-the-art videoboard with video-replay capabilities. The board also includes up-to-the-minute statistical information on individual players.

The arena also has seven locker rooms, two of which are complete with team rooms, equipment

rooms, and a shared training room.

The men's team lounge was recently renovated and now includes three large-screen television sets, individual leather recliners and track lighting.

The Mezzanine Level houses a VIP Room for banquets, pre- and post-game functions, and other formal and informal gatherings. The room consists of a 2,200 square-foot space that can be divided into two rooms of 800 and 1,400 square feet. The 800-square foot area can also serve as an interview room for sporting events.

After serving as host to the first and second rounds of the NCAA men's basketball championship in 2001, the venue was the home of the 2001 NCAA women's volleyball national championship. In 2006, it played host to the NCAA men's basketball first and second rounds, along with the McDonald's All-American High School basketball games. Then in 2009, Viejas Arena was the site for the first and second rounds of the NCAA women's basketball tournament. More recently, in March 2014, the NCAA men's basketball second and third rounds returned to Montezuma Mesa and will do so again in 2018.
