

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

Rocky Long

n the 17-year history of the Mountain West, no football coach is more synonymous with success than Aztec head coach Rocky Lona.

Named San Diego State's 18th head coach on Jan. 12, 2011, he begins his sixth year at the helm of the Aztecs. He will also continue his role as the squad's defensive coordinator, a position that he has held when he first arrived on campus in 2009.

Long is the winningest head coach in the history of the Mountain West and has helped usher in two of the biggest turnarounds at MW schools - New Mexico and San Diego State.

Over the last seven seasons (two as defensive coordinator and five as head coach and defensive coordinator), Long helped institute a hard-nosed, blue-collar, physical-style of football on Montezuma Mesa that revitalized a program that had been struggling to find an identity for decades.

Now firmly established, that identity has taken the San Diego State football program to heights that would have been unthinkable just a decade ago. The Aztecs have been to a school-record six consecutive bowl games and has enjoyed its best five year run in nearly four decades.

This SDSU run has placed Aztec Football among the best in the state and in the nation.

Since 2010, San Diego State's 52-27 record (65.8 percent) is tied with USC and trails Stanford among the seven FBS schools in California in winning percentage, placing the Aztecs ahead of, among others, UCLA and Fresno State.

With six consecutive bowl appearances, San Diego State is one of just 25 FBS schools to advance to postseason play every season since 2010 and just one of three - Boise State and Northern Illinois - to make a bowl appearance each of the last six seasons from a Group of 5 conference.

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Long's sixth Aztec team is a veteran group that many have picked to be the favorite to win the West Division of the Mountain West.

→ <u>The Foundation</u>

In December 2008, Long was named defensive coordinator at San Diego State after serving as head coach at his alma mater, New Mexico, for 11 seasons.

He inherited one of the worst defensive units statistically in the country. The previous season (2008), the Aztecs went 2-10 and posted one victory over a FBS team. The team's defense allowed an average of 37.2 points, 460.8 yards, 247.5 rushing yards and had a passing efficiency defense rating of 151.5. San Diego State also ranked among the bottom eight nationally in all four of those categories, allowing 35 or more points in seven of its final eight games of the season.

Enter Long and his attacking 3-3-5 defense, and the improvement was immediate. Despite employing a drastically different style, Long, in his first year as SDSU's defensive coordinator in 2009, managed to shave more than a touchdown a game off the team's average points allowed and took more than 78 yards per outing off of the total offense allowed figure.

In 2010, Long built a top-40 defense that ceded 20 points or less six times, as the Aztecs posted a winning record for the first time in 12 years, claimed nine victories for the first time since 1977, and captured a bowl victory for the first time since 1969.

→ Building On Success

Following the departure of the previous head coach, Long took over the program entering the 2011 campaign, while continuing to serve as the defensive coordinator.

The 2011 campaign was no different, as he became the first Aztec head coach to lead the team to a bowl game in his debut season. SDSU compiled an 8-5 record, including its first 3-0 start in 30 years, while also snapping a 19-game losing streak against Pac-10/12 foes and a 23-game skid vs. schools from automatic-qualifying BCS conferences.

In 2012, Long garnered his second Mountain West Coach-ofthe-Year award after guiding the Aztecs to their first conference championship since 1998 and a third straight bowl appearance. Despite a modest fifth-place prediction in the MW preseason poll, Long and SDSU closed out the regular season by winning seven consecutive games, matching the program's longest victory streak since 1980-81.

During that stretch, the Aztecs ranked fifth in the nation in allowing 4.7 yards per play, while limiting the opposition to 19 points or less on five occasions.

In 2013, Long directed SDSU to an unprecedented fourth straight postseason appearance, capped by an impressive 49-24 victory over Buffalo in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

With Long at the controls, the 2013 Aztecs became just the 19th team out of 488 from 1980-2013 to advance to a bowl game after starting the season with an 0-3 record. The gritty SDSU squad flashed its mettle down the stretch, rallying from fourth-quarter deficits in five games and led the FBS Division with three victories when trailing by 14 points or more.

In 2014, San Diego State advanced to its fifth straight bowl game and finishing in a tie for first in the Western Division of the Mountain West. The Aztecs finished in the top 20 nationally in nearly every defensive category, including scoring defense (13th) and total defense (16th). In addition, SDSU posted a perfect 6-0 record at home during the regular season.

The 2015 Aztecs built on their success from a year prior. After opening the season with a 1-3 mark, SDSU ran the gamut with 10 straight wins and a blemish-free 8-0 mark against MW opponents. San Diego State earned its second Mountain West title since 2012, its first outright league championship since 1969 and the 20th conference crown in program history with a win in the MW Championship game against Air Force. The Aztecs matched a school record with their first 11-win campaign since 1969, defeating Cincinnati in the Hawai'i Bowl, 42-7, marking their sixth consecutive bowl game appearance.

→ The Background

Long had already made the transition from defensive coordinator to head coach once before, as he directed New Mexico to unparalleled success from 1998-2008. During those 11 years, Long compiled a 65-69 record, including seven seasons with six victories or more.

To put that accomplishment in perspective, consider that since 1984, the Lobos are 67-157 with only four six-plus win seasons in the 18 campaigns without Long at the helm.

At New Mexico, Long compiled a school-record 65 victories and led the Lobos to five bowl game appearances in his final seven seasons, despite inheriting a team that had only three winning seasons the previous 15 years. His teams were also bowl eligible in seven of his final eight campaigns.

Long, the 2002 Mountain West Coach of the Year, has earned a national reputation for producing one of the nation's stingiest defensive units. In his final nine campaigns in Albuquerque, Long's defensive units ranked among the top 30 in fewest yards allowed six times and among the top 40 nationally against the rush every year. In addition, six times his units were among the top 26 in fewest rushing yards allowed per game, including fifth-place finishes in both 2001 and 2003.

While at New Mexico, Long coached 13 players selected in the NFL Draft, 10 players who earned All-America honors and 44 first-team all-conference selections. In addition, four Lobos garnered

<u>Long Tidbits</u>

→ Long was one of four NCAA players that visited U.S. servicemen in Vietnam in the summer of 1971. Along with Johnny Musso (Alabama), Lydell Mitchell (Penn State) and Stan Mauldin (Texas), Long spent two weeks in the country going to different U.S. bases.

→ Long is a member of both the University of New Mexico Hall of Honor (inducted in 1996) and the New Mexico Sports Hall of Fame (inducted in 2011).

→ Long met his wife, Debby, while coaching the Pi Beta Phi sorority team in the spring of 1971. He guided the sorority to consecutive undefeated championship seasons in 1971 and 1972. Long's defense was not scored upon in any game in either year.

→ Bobby Knight paid Long a home visit and recruited the twosport athlete to play basketball at Army.

→ Long was a three-time academic all-conference selection, earned the WAC Scholar-Athlete Award (1970) and was an honorable mention Academic All-American in 1969. He earned a coveted NCAA postgraduate scholarship in 1974.

→ Long has been on the winning sideline of the San Diego State-New Mexico game in 13 stright meetings. He won the first eight meetings as the head coach at UNM and has been on the sidelines as the defensive coordinator or head coach in Aztec victories in 2009, 2010, 2011, 2013 and 2014.

→ Long was the starting quarterback at UNM when the Lobos posted consecutive winning seasons in 1970-71. That was the only time that occurred in the 33 seasons between 1964 and 1996.

→ At New Mexico, he left the program as the all-time leading rusher (2,071 yards) and threw just 23 interceptions in 30 career games.

→ Both of Rocky and Debby Long's children were Division I student-athletes and have coaching ties. Hannah, who was named the head women's volleyball coach at Division II Queens University in April 2016, earned five conference coach of the year nods and is Division III Southwestern University's winningest women's volleyball coach (.794). Collegiately, she was a two-sports athlete at Portland State. Roxanne, who played collegiately at Oklahoma, was a successful basketball coach at Rogers State University, before stepping down to pursue her Ph.D.

Academic All-America accolades five times during his tenure.


And Long does not mince words when describing what his vision for his San Diego State football program is.

"Everybody should anticipate that this program eventually will be competing for conference championships, year-in and year-out," Long said. "Now, how many you win is determined by a whole lot of factors, but we ought to be able to get to the point where we compete yearly for it."

Prior to accepting the head coaching position at New Mexico, Long served as defensive coordinator for 12 seasons at three different schools. He was the defensive coordinator for two years under Bob Toledo at UCLA in 1996-97, for five seasons at Oregon State from 1991-95, and for five campaigns at Wyoming from 1981-85.

He also served as an assistant coach at TCU and the CFL's British Columbia Lions after starting his career at New Mexico as a graduate assistant coach in 1972.

Originally a defensive back, Long became a three-year starter at quarterback for the Lobos from 1969-71. He earned team MVP honors three times and was the Western Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year as a senior. He is a 1974 graduate of New Mexico and was awarded an NCAA postgraduate scholarship.

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

→ Coaching Highlights

■ Was named the 18th head coach in Aztec football history in January 2011 and became the first San Diego State head coach to lead the team to a bowl game in his debut campaign.

Long has amassed the most victories of any Mountain West head coach since the league's inception in 1999.

■ Was named Mountain West Coach of the Year for the third time in his career in 2015. Last season, Long commandeered an Aztec team that won its final 10 games of the season en route to an 11-3 mark, the program's first 11-win season since 1969. SDSU produced a perfect 8-0 record in conference play, the 20th conference championship in program history and a win over Cincinnati in the Hawai'i Bowl.

Since his arrival on The Mesa, a total of 12 Aztecs have been chosen in the NFL Draft, including offensive lineman Terry Poole (fourth round) in May 2015.

San Diego State has had at least one player selected in each NFL Drafts from 2011-15.

■ Came to San Diego State to be the team's defensive coordinator in December 2008.

 Arrived at SDSU after serving as head coach at New Mexico from 1998-2008. He was tabbed the league's coach of the year in 2002.
 Compiled a New Mexico-record 65 victories and led the Lobos to five bowl game appearances in his final seven seasons. His teams were bowl eligible in seven of his last eight campaigns.

■ In his final nine seasons in Albuquerque, Long's defensive units ranked among the top 30 in fewest yards allowed six times and among the top 40 against the rush every year. In both 2001 and 2003, New Mexico's defense ranked fifth nationally in fewest rushing yards allowed per game.

Prior to accepting the head coaching position at New Mexico, he served as defensive coordinator for 12 seasons at three different schools. He was the defensive coordinator for two years under Bob Toledo at UCLA in 1996-97, for five seasons at Oregon State from 1991-95, and for five campaigns at Wyoming from 1981-85.

 Also served as an assistant coach at TCU, with the CFL's British Columbia Lions and started his career at New Mexico as a graduate assistant coach in 1972.

→ Playing Experience

■ Originally a defensive back, Long became a three-year starter at quarterback for the Lobos from 1969-71. He earned the team's most-valuable-player honors three times and was the Western Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year as a senior.

■ Long played professionally in the CFL with British Columbia in 1972-73 and 1975-76. He also competed in the World Football League with the Detroit Wheels in 1974.

■ He is a 1974 graduate of New Mexico with a bachelor's degree in secondary education and was awarded an NCAA postgraduate scholarship. Long was a three-time academic all-conference pick and received the WAC Scholar-Athlete Award in 1970.

→ <u>Personal</u>

Long and his wife, Debby, have two daughters, Roxanne and Hannah.

Both of Long's daughters have head coaching experience at the university level. From 2012-14, Roxanne was the head women's basketball coach at Rogers State University (NAIA) in Claremore, Okla., after four years in the same position at Texas Lutheran (NCAA Division III).

Hannah, meanwhile, was named the head volleyball coach at NCAA Division II Queens University in Charlotte, N.C. in April 2016. She served in the same role at Southwestern University, an NCAA Division III school in Georgetown, Texas, for 12 seasons, earning five conference coach of the year nods as the program's winningest coach (.794).

Prior to the 2015 season, Horton was promoted to associate head coach and offensive coordinator. He is entering his sixth season overseeing the running backs.

In his previous four seasons on The Mesa, he served as assistant head coach and running backs coach.

■ Since 2011, when Horton was named SDSU's running backs coach, San Diego State ranks 22nd nationally in average yards per carry (4.9), 18th in rushing yards per game (204.7) and 20th in rushing touchdowns (146).

■ The 2015 Aztecs made history, yielding the most rushing yards in school history (3,266) and producing two 1,000-yard rushers for the first time in program history. The team also had 10 straight games with at least 200 yards rushing to close the season.

Assisted Donnell Pumphrey in a junior season that resulted in Sports Illustrated honorable mention All-America and Mountain West Offensive Player-of-the-Year honors after leading the Aztecs in rushing yards and receptions, one of four players in the nation to accomplish the feat.

Under his guidance, SDSU ran for 2,000 yards as a team and produced a 1,000-yard rusher for the sixth year in a row in 2015.
 In his five years with San Diego State, Horton has coached each of his starting running backs to All-Mountain West honors, including current Denver Bronco Ronnie Hillman in 2011, Adam Muema in 2012 and 2013, and Donnel Pumphrey in 2014 and 2015.

In 2014, San Diego State set a school record for yards per carry, averaging 5.4 yards per rush. That figure ranked 13th nationally.
 Helped Ronnie Hillman receive All-America recognition from the Associated Press in 2011 after the Aztec running back rushed for a conference-record 1,711 yards, which ranked fourth nationally, and added 19 touchdowns. Hillman, who was one of 10 semifinalists for the Doak Walker Award that season, was selected in the third round of the NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos in April 2012.

→ <u>Previous Experience</u>

■ Came to The Mesa after spending the final five games of the 2010 campaign as the interim head coach at Minnesota. With Horton at the helm, the Gophers went 2-3 with victories over a pair of bowl-bound teams in Illinois and Iowa after beginning the year with a 1-6 mark.

■ As the co-offensive coordinator, the Gophers saw drastic improvements from 2009 in the NCAA rankings in total offense (+34 spots), rushing offense (+26), passing offense (+18), scoring offense (+11), turnovers (+82), time of possession (+82) and penalties (+21).

Prior to his time at Minnesota, he was the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions in 2009, working with No. 1 overall Draft pick Matthew Stafford. Stafford started 10 games and threw for more than 2,000 yards.

■ Was on the sidelines in six bowl games as the quarterbacks coach at Wisconsin from 1999-2005. The Badgers tallied four postseason victories and claimed the 2000 Big Ten championship.

 Coached Wisconsin signal-caller Brooks Bollinger to a 30-12 record over his four seasons as a starter. Bollinger and quarterback Jim Sorqi were picked in the NFL Draft during his time in Madison.

 Was the head coach at UNLV for five years. In 1994, he was named the Big West Coach of the Year after leading the Rebels to the conference title and a berth in the Las Vegas Bowl.

In 2013, he guided UNLV to its first winning season and first bowl game since 2000. That year, the Rebels advanced to the Heart of Dallas Bowl

■ In the last 30 seasons, only three head coaches have guided UNLV to a bowl game - Jeff Horton (twice), John Robinson and Hauck - and two of those coaches are currently on the Aztec staff (Hauck and Horton).

Danny Gonzales enters his sixth season with San Diego State and coaches the team's safeties. He has worked as part of Rocky Long's defensive staff since Long joined the Aztecs in 2011.

Coached Nat Berhe and Eric Pinkins, both of whom were selected in the 2014 NEL Draft. Berhe was a fifth-round selection of the New York Giants, while Pinkins went in the sixth round to the defending Super Bowl champion Seattle Seahawks.

Under his guidance, Berhe became the first Aztec safety in the Mountain West era (since 1999) to garner all-conference accolades three years in a row. Berhe, who landed on the 2013 preseason watch lists for the Jim Thorpe Award and Lott IMPACT Trophy, capped a brilliant collegiate career with first-team all-MW honors after leading the team with a career-high 99 tackles, including 60 solo stops.

■ In 2015, the Aztecs finished among the top 10 last season in the four main defensive categories, including fifth in total defense (287.3), seventh in scoring defense (16.4) and rushing defense (108.7) and 10th in passing defense (178.6).

San Diego State produced one of the best defensive efforts in school history in 2014, finishing in the top 20 nationally in nearly every defensive category, including scoring defense (13th) and total defense (16th).

As a team in 2012, helped the Aztec defense top the MW in rushing defense with 133.5 yards per game. SDSU also showed dramatic improvement in that statistic at the national level, climbing from the 78th spot in 2011 to the 28th position in 2012.

Mike Schmidt enters his fifth season as San Diego State's offensive line coach and his eighth as a member of the Aztec staff.

■ Has been influential in San Diego State establishing itself as one of the top rushing programs in the country. Since joining the staff as a full-time assistant coach in 2012, the Aztecs rank 20th nationally in rushing yardage per game (209.6), 25th in rushing yard per carry (4.9) and is tied for 22nd in rushing touchdowns (118).

■ Under his tutleage, Nico Siragusa and Pearce Slater earned All-Mountain West first-team honors, the first time in MW history that the Aztecs had two first-teamers on the offensive line and the first time in any league since 1998 (WAC - Pacific Division). It was also the fourth straight season multiple offensive linemen earned allconference honors.

■ The 2015 Aztecs finished fifth in the nation in red zone offense (94.1 pct.), 14th in rushing yards per game (233.3) and 17th in time of possession (32:43).

■ In 2014, San Diego State set a school record for yards per carry, averaging 5.4 yards per rush. That figure ranked 13th nationally.

Terry Poole (first team) and Darrell Greene (honorable mention) both earned all-conference accolades on the offensive line in 2014. It marked the third consecutive season that at least two Aztec o-lineman were honored by the league.

■ Under his guidance, SDSU ran for 2,000 yards as a team and produced a 1,000-yard rusher for the fifth year in a row in 2013.

■ In 2013, the Aztec offensive line helped pave the way for a rushing attack that totaled over 2,000 yards for the fourth consecutive year for the first time in school history.

Coached multiple all-Mountain West selections for the second year in a row in 2013 after tackle Bryce Quigley earned second-team distinction and guard Terry Poole received honorable mention.
 In his first year as assistant coach in 2012, the Aztec offensive line helped establish team rushing records with 2,869 yards in 578 attempts.

■ In 2012, had three players garner all-MW accolades that same season. Guard Nik Embernate signed a free agent contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers after collecting first-team honors; center Alec Johnson was a second-team selection for the second straight year, while Quigley landed on the honorable mention squad.



■ Tony White joined the Aztec coaching staff in January 2009 and is in charge of the team's cornerbacks for the eighth straight season. In 2011, he also added duties as San Diego State's recruiting coordinator.

■ In 2015, SDSU produced one of its best defensive years in program history. The Aztecs finished second nationally with 23 interceptions and 10th in passing efficiency defense (108.71).

■ Under White's direction, Damontae Kazee was named the 2015 Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year, a second-team All-American selection by USA Today, was an honorable-mention pick by Sports Illustrated and a first-team all-MW honoree. His eight interceptions were tied for second most nationally and tied for the most in SDSU's Division I era and in MW single-season history.

 Kazee and J.J. Whittaker (second team) earned All-Mountain West honors for the second consecutive season after earning spots on the 2014 team (Kazee - second team; Whittaker - second team).
 San Diego State intercepted 14 passes in 2014 which tied for 29th nationally. The Aztecs ranked third in 2014 in pass efficiency defense (112.1) and allowed just 10 touchdowns through the air (second among Mountain West schools).

■ Helped J.J. Whittaker receive all-Mountain West honorable mention accolades in his first year of collegiate play in 2013. Whittaker led the squad with 14 passes defended (3 interceptions, 11 pass breakups), which ranked fifth in the conference.

■ Under White's guidance, Leon McFadden became the fifth Aztec player in program history and the first since Kirk Morrison (2002-04) to garner first-team all-conference accolades in three consecutive seasons. McFadden, who owns the SDSU career record with 39 passes defended, was a third-round draft pick of the Cleveland Browns in the 2013 NFL Draft after setting career highs with 61 tackles and three interceptions, including two for touchdowns, during his senior campaign in 2012.

■ In 2011, both of the team's starting cornerbacks, McFadden and senior Larry Parker, earned first-team all-league honors. Parker, who was also tabbed an honorable mention All-American by *Sl.com*, led the Mountain West in interceptions with seven to tie for fourth nationally in his first campaign as a starter. His seven picks were the most by an Aztec since 1969, and are tied for third in program history.

■ Helped the Aztec defense improve substantially in the national rankings in 2010, climbing from 62nd to 10th in pass efficiency defense (113.4) and from 53rd to 39th in pass defense (205.0 ypg.). SDSU allowed less than 200 yards through the air in eight of 13 contests.

■ In 2010, he tutored McFadden to his initial first-team all-conference accolade, while the team's other starting corner, senior Jose Perez, received honorable mention all-league recognition. The pair both ranked in the top five in the MW in passes defended.


