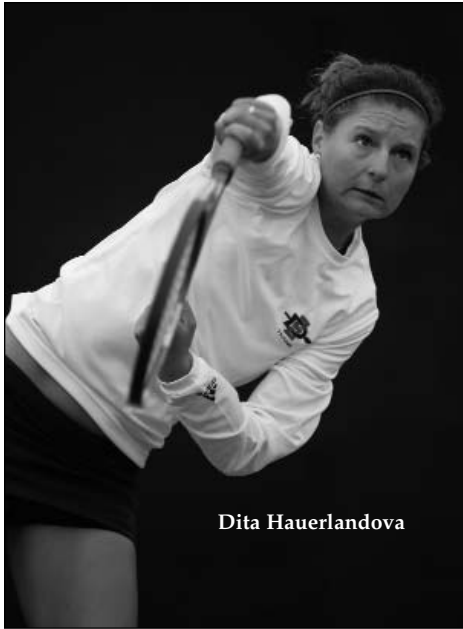

AZTEC SEASON OUTLOOK

2006 San Diego State Tennis

Experience is a trait that cannot be taught. It must be gained by going through different situations which only competition can provide.

The 2006 San Diego State women's tennis team can boast of having experience with over half of last year's NCAA tournament roster returning this season to go along with a decorated junior college transfer, one of the top junior tennis players in Southern California and one of the best prep Israeli players.

Included in the group of returning letter-winners from a 2005 team that finished 16-11 overall and earned a trip to its 18th postseason are top singles players senior Dita Hauerlandova and junior Alesya Vidov.

Hauerlandova enters her final season on Montezuma Mesa having been named to the all-Mountain West Conference singles team each of the last two years and the all-conference doubles squad a year ago. The native of Prague, Czech Republic, who has participated in a pair of NCAA tournaments, is coming off a 2005 season that saw her finish with a record of 15-11, including a 14-8 mark at No. 2 singles. This past fall, she picked up where she left off, claiming the 2005 Wilson/ITA West Region Championship consolation title en route to a team best 7-3 record.

Hauerlandova's doubles play was also outstanding this fall as she and Sisse Nielsen advanced to the semifinals of the ITA regional event, losing to the eventual champions. The pair posted a team-high four wins and finished the fall as the fifth-ranked doubles team in the west region.

The lone senior's fall performance has head coach Peter Mattera expecting a big season out of Hauerlandova entering her final semester at SDSU.

Dita is a great athlete and has had fantas-

tic results as a nationally-ranked singles and doubles player, Mattera said. She is a gamer. She loves the competition and loves to battle. She would really like to end her collegiate career on a very high note.

Dita is a leader by example and does everything well and it comes naturally. There is not a shot that she doesn't possess. We're really looking forward to a big senior season from Dita.

Vidov is the other Aztec veteran on the squad who played the majority of 2005 at No. 1 singles and the No. 2 doubles position. The junior from Russia has two full seasons of Division I college experience under her belt and is coming off an all-conference doubles campaign with Hauerlandova. The pair finished the season with an overall record of 15-8 (12-4 at No. 2) with four different winning streaks of at least three victories.

At times, Vidov struggled at the top singles spot, but Mattera is confident her talent and the experience she obtained last year will only help her this season.

Alesya started the year ranked No. 123 on the ITA computer and she certainly has the game to be anything she wants to be out there, Mattera said. She is a fantastic striker of the ball. She hits the ball big off both the forehand and the backhand and she has a great serve. Every year she has gotten better. Last year she primarily played at No. 1 singles and saw what it takes to have success up there. She will utilize that experience from last year to really take her game to a whole new level.

The team's two sophomores, Eliska Krausova and Sisse Nielsen, can also be considered seasoned and experienced veterans after playing a big role in helping the Aztecs reach the postseason in their first year on campus.

Krausova, from Prague, Czech Republic, turned in a solid performance last season going 12-9, playing at No. 3-6 singles. There were a number of occasions in which she had big wins, but none bigger than her three-set, clinching victory to upset 28th-ranked Michigan last year.

Fellow classmate Nielsen was also an integral part of last season's team and finished the year at 8-7 in singles play.

This past fall, the two competed in doubles together and impressed early and often. The pair won the doubles crown at the Rainbow Wahine Fall Invitational in Honolulu, Hawaii, by defeating three-straight doubles tandems from the University of Arizona.

The play from the sophomore class will be key as to how far this Aztec team will go. Coach Mattera understands this and is very confident that both will perform at a high level in their second season.

Eliska and Sisse were very successful on last year's NCAA tournament team, Mattera said. They have a year of Division I experience under their belts and if their fall performance is any indicator, they are really going to take off in their second season. They both have had terrific fall semesters, claiming the doubles title in Hawaii and had a couple of other big wins. Their singles play is a whole level up from where they were last year. Both of them are really eager, so I expect a fantastic season from those two in 2006.

New to the program this season are Yuki Hagiwara, Esther Cadua and Milana Yusupov.

Hagiwara (Nishinomiya City, Japan), a junior college transfer from nearby Grossmont College, comes to San Diego State as an accomplished junior college player.

While at Grossmont, she helped lead the Griffins to back-to-back state championships

and was the 2004 Pacific Coast Conference outstanding player.

Yuki brings a wealth of experience to our squad after being a state finalist in singles at Grossmont two years ago, Mattera said. She's gotten better everyday that she has been here since September. She will certainly add to our depth.

Cadua, a San Diego native, enters her first year at San Diego State as one of the top junior tennis players in Southern California.

Mattera believes she brings a certain toughness and an array of different strokes that point to her having a successful first season as an Aztec.

Esther is a local product and one of the best juniors in the Southern California region. She is very athletic and I believe she is going to have a super San Diego State career, Mattera said. She loves to battle and loves the competition. She's got every stroke that you need to have in order to be successful. Esther is an all-court player who loves to compete and is very comfortable at the net. She will help us significantly this season.

Rounding out the 2006 incoming class is Milana Yusupov from Holon, Israel. Yusupov is an Israeli national team member, who was the No. 2 ranked junior tennis player in the 18-and-under division in Israel. Mattera believes she will blossom into a great tennis player in her time on The Mesa.

Milana is really going to be a fine Division I player. She hits the ball big and has a lot of high-level experience in Israel. She was one of the top players in Israel and she is really looking forward to making a mark right away in Division I tennis. She has everything she needs to be very successful and really adds to this year's team.

With a strong roster in place, the Aztecs

will once again be faced with one of the toughest schedules in the nation.

This year, San Diego State will host a number of perennial powerhouses such as Pac-10 members Oregon and Southern California, Harvard, North Carolina State, San Diego and Wisconsin.

The Aztecs road schedule is just as tough with trips planned for California, Long Beach State, Pepperdine and Washington.

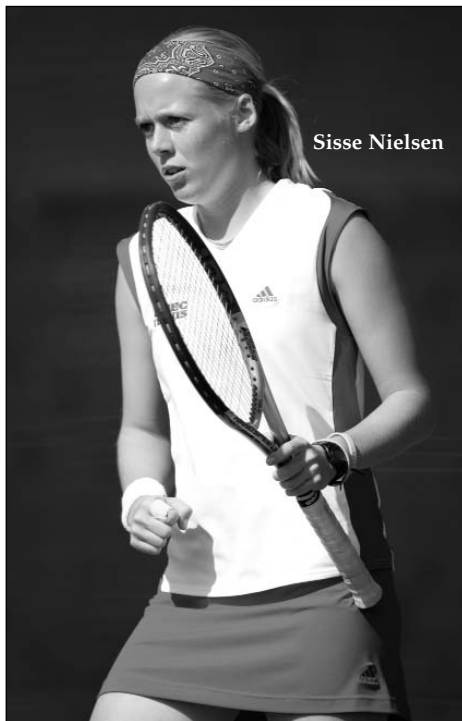
The Mountain West Conference looks to be as competitive as ever with at least five schools being ranked nationally when the dust settles.

When everything is put into perspective, Mattera believes the 2006 schedule sets the Aztecs up for another strong season.

We have a great non-conference schedule filled with a lot of nationally ranked teams. We have some of the best from a lot of different conferences, Mattera said. We have several of the great Pac-10 teams. We have Harvard, who was a sweet 16 team last year, coming out to San Diego State. We have Wisconsin, North Carolina State and Pepperdine.

We host a lot of teams here at our brand new tennis facility and that can only help. I think we have become very familiar and comfortable in our new surroundings. The fact that we have such a great home schedule this year really sets us up for the chance to do some great things.

Great things have occurred frequently on The Mesa as the women's tennis program ranks 11th nationally in all-time NCAA tournament appearances. This season, the expectations are high with the goal of reaching the postseason for a 12th time.

This program has a tradition of excellence in the time that I have been associated with it since 1981, Mattera said. We expect to go to the NCAA tournament. We expect to compete for a conference championship. I don't expect anything less than that from this year's squad.

We are deep. We have a little more seasoning than last year's team did. Most of these players have been to the (NCAA) tournament and the ones who have not certainly are going hear it from the rest of us about how that tastes. I really believe that with the experience we have on this team, we are going to be primed and ready.

Peter Mattera has become synonymous with the success of the San Diego State women's tennis program.

More than a decade into his tenure, his list of accomplishments places him among the most successful coaches in the nation.

In 12 seasons on Montezuma Mesa, Mattera has guided the Aztecs' smooth transition from the Western Athletic Conference into the competitive Mountain West Conference, all the while keeping the program in the national spotlight.

Since taking over in 1993, Mattera has guided San Diego State to 10 winning seasons and eight berths in the last 10 NCAA tournaments. His 187-115 record (61.9 winning percentage) is made all the more impressive by playing a schedule that is among the most difficult in the nation year in and year out.

"Being in San Diego allows us to play an unbelievable schedule and have some of the nation's top teams come here to play us," Mattera said. "The city is so attractive and our program is of such quality that it makes us a high-demand team to schedule."

Mattera, who has been coaching tennis at the Division I level for 24 years, was the assistant coach at SDSU for 12 years prior to taking over as the head coach in January of 1993.

During Mattera's tenure with the Aztecs, the women's tennis program has been one of the nation's best. Winners of 10 conference championships, SDSU has consistently been ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation.

"The tradition of national prominence and excellence in player development is one in which I am very proud to have played a part," Mattera said. "I fully intend to maintain San Diego State's position among the nation's elite programs."

The SDSU women's tennis program has produced 35 All-Americans and has received invitations to 18 NCAA tournaments. The 18 invites to the national championship rank the program among the top 11 nationally in NCAA Division I.

The Aztecs have also finished first or second in the conference 10 out of the last 14 years, including four league championships.

In 2003, Mattera earned conference coach-of-the-year honors after leading the Aztecs to a 22-6 record. The 22 victories represented the most wins in a single-season since San Diego State won 26 matches in 1985. SDSU also claimed the regular season and postseason MWC championships en route to the NCAA tournament.

Under Mattera the Aztecs are not only known for their strokes, but they boast one of the more intense conditioning programs in collegiate tennis. Distance running, weight training, on-court agility drills, plyometrics and several hours every week of one-on-one drilling makes the women's team among the most well-conditioned in Division I tennis.

"We are tremendously proud of our reputation for taking people who want to work and making them as good as they can be," Mattera said.

Known for his emphasis on the complete

student-athlete, Mattera's teams have had 26 players earn academic all-Mountain West Conference awards in the last six seasons. During his tenure in San Diego, Aztec women's tennis has produced an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipient and three Academic All-Americans.

"There is a real satisfaction in watching these young ladies come into the University and develop into such outstanding student-athletes," Mattera said. "The growth and maturity that takes place during four years of college is really enhanced by the athletic experience."

Mattera received his bachelor of arts degree in physical education at San Diego State in 1980 and master's in physical education from SDSU in 1991. In 1998, he was named the NCAA West Regional Coach of the Year.

Mattera is married to Beth Mattera. He has two step-daughters, Kayley and Torre.

Lindsey Hedberg enters her first season as the Aztecs assistant women's tennis coach. The former San Diego State standout became the sixth assistant coach in the program's 30-year history.

Hedberg, a native of Austin, Texas, joins the SDSU staff after spending the last two years as a tennis professional at Lomas Santa Fe Country Club in Solana Beach, Calif. Prior to working at Lomas Santa Fe CC, she taught tennis at the San Diego Tennis and Racquet Club.

I am very excited for Lindsey to rejoin our program in this capacity, said Mattera of the former team captain. She will bring energy, enthusiasm and lots of tennis expertise to what looks to be a very good 2005-06 SDSU tennis team.

A four-year letterwinner from 2000-03, Hedberg played on three NCAA tournament teams in 2000, 2002 and 2003. She also guided the Aztecs to a pair of Mountain West Conference regular season titles and a MWC championship crown in 2003.

Hedberg, a three-time all-MWC singles honoree, finished her SDSU career second all-time in singles victories with 78, second in school history with a singles winning percentage of .639 (78-44) (min. 75 decisions) and is eighth in Aztec history for most singles victories in a season with 23 back in 2000. In 2001, she achieved an ITA singles ranking of No. 96.

An all-MWC doubles pick in 2001, she also holds numerous doubles records including the school's top winning percentage (min. 20 decisions) since 1994. Hedberg and Julie Chidley compiled a record of 18-3 over the course of two seasons (2000, 2002) for a winning percentage of .857. While playing with Silvia Tornier, the two were ranked as high as No. 19 during the 2000-01 campaign. Hedberg is also on the all-time doubles charts for team victories in a career, team victories in a season and individual doubles wins in a career.

Larry Willens enters his eighth season as a volunteer assistant coach for the San Diego State women's tennis team. He assists the Aztecs at team practices, one-on-one drills, on-court coaching at matches and tournament seeding at the various fall tournaments San Diego State hosts.

"He is Mr. Tennis in San Diego," head coach Peter Mattera said. "He is a great on-court coach and his impact in the success of the program is immeasurable."

In addition to his tennis expertise, Willens is a trained sports psychologist and works with athletes on the mental aspect of the game.

In previous years, Willens has coached several professional tennis players including Gretchen Majors, Robin White and Kerry Reid. He also coached two professional World Team Tennis squads, the San Diego Friars and the Sacramento Capitols.

Willens received a bachelor's degree in physical education from San Jose State and a master's in physical education from San Diego State. Willens currently teaches in San Diego State's physical education department.

Willens has two sons: Richard, 35, and Alex, 21.

Singles Earned a 7-3 record in the fall season... After dropping her first match at the Wilson/ITA West Region Championship, she went on to defeat Heidi Kaloi of UC Irvine, 6-1, Long Beach State's Rachael Porsz, 6-0, 6-4, and Merve Asimgil of Pepperdine, 6-3, 6-3, to reach the quarterfinals of the backdraw... Doubles Posted a 4-3 record with Sisse Nielsen... The Wilson/ITA West Region Championship at Barnes Tennis Center represented the first time the two had played together... In their first match, the pair defeated Hu/Shih of UC Irvine, 8-3, to reach the round of 16, where they beat Long Beach State's Rocha/Williams, 8-1... Later that day in the quarterfinals, the tandem used an 8-4 effort to beat Southern California's DeVera/Anastasiu... In the semifinals, the two fell to eventual champions, Kosakowski/Asimgil of Pepperdine, 8-3... At the San Diego State Fall Tennis Classic, the pair claimed an 8-4 victory over Florida State's Mansour/Ebor.

Doubles Finished the year at 18-13 with Alesya Vidov and Indra Erichsen...
