Radio: All San Diego State football games can be heard live in southern California on XTRA Sports (690 AM). Lee Hamilton calls the action with former Aztec quarterback Mark Halda returning to the broadcasts to provide analysis. John Kentera reports from the sidelines. Mike McGregor is the producer.

The Records: San Diego State enters the contest 0-3 as is Idaho. The Vandals will be playing their first home game of the season.

The Rankings: Neither team is ranked.

SDSU Coach Tom Craft: Tom Craft is 0-3 in his first season at San Diego State and overall.

Idaho Coach Tom : Cable is 6-19 in his third season at his alma mater. He is a former San Diego State graduate assistant.

The Series: San Diego State has a victory in the only previous meeting between the two schools, 40-21, in 1996. The Aztecs are 13-2 against schools that currently have membership in the Sun Belt Conference.

Back To The Airport

The San Diego State Aztecs (0-3) hit the road for the third time in four weeks when they visit the Idaho Vandals Saturday afternoon in Moscow, Idaho. There is no television for the Aztecs-Vandals contest. The game is the home opener for Idaho. Kickoff is set for 2 p.m. in the Kibbie Dome.

Been There, Done That

While there will be no television cameras in the vicinity, Idaho and San Diego State are no strangers to the bright lights of the big time. Both teams have lined up against formidable gridiron opponents in the opening weeks of the 2002 season. San Diego State's first three opponents (Fresno State, Colorado and Arizona State) give the Aztecs the nation's 13th toughest schedule to date, according to Jeff Sagarin.

Yeah...So?

It is doubtful the Vandals will be impressed with SDSU's opposition. Idaho has faced off against Boise State, Washington State and Oregon in the first three weeks, all on the road. As a result, Idaho's

schedule is ranked as the second toughest in America. The Vandals will meet Washington on Sept. 28th to close their non-conference season.

And Then There's This

The bottom line in college football always has and always will be turnover margin. San Diego State and Idaho both enter Saturday's game winless and perhaps the one telling stat is turnovers. The two teams enter the tilt tied in the NCAA's turnover margin category at No. 100. Both teams are at -1.67 turnovers per game.

So This Is Idaho...

San Diego State will be playing its first game in the state of Idaho. The Aztecs have never faced Idaho State or Boise State and are meeting Idaho for just the second time with the first meeting coming in 1996 in Mission Valley.

Flashback 1996

The Aztecs and Vandals are meeting for just the second time ever. San Diego State won the first meeting in

Media Information

World Wide Web: All San Diego State releases, results, statistics, box scores, schedules, rosters and coach and player information is available on the Internet at www.goaztecs.com. Game recaps and statistics are updated after each game.

Weekly Release: The media relations office will be e-mailing its releases this season on Sunday afternoons. Fax versions of the update will be sent by request only. The release will also be available Sunday evenings on www.goaztecs.com.

Practices: Unless noted, all practices are open to both the media and public and will be staffed by a member of the Aztec Media Relations office. Electronic media wishing to shoot video during practice are asked to tape during the first 30 minutes of workouts only. Requested coaches and players will be made available for interviews following each practice.

Interview Opportunities

Sundays: Coach Tom Craft meets with members of the media at 3 p.m. in the Aztec Athletics Center on Sundays during the season. Media should contact the media relations office to confirm.

Tuesdays: Coach Tom Craft is available via phone as part of the Mountain West Conference teleconference. Craft is scheduled on the conference call at 10:42 a.m.

Wednesdays: By arrangement and post-practice.

Thursdays: By arrangement and post-practice.

Fridays: Following walk-through at game site.

Saturdays: Postgame only.

Practice Policies: San Diego State practices are generally open unless otherwise noted. Media should contact the media relations office to confirm practice times and parking arrangements. Practices are generally at 3:40 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Mondays are off days for the players and interview opportunities are limited on Fridays as well. Requested players and coaches are usually available after practice. Due to schedule constraints player requests are generally limited to post-practice.

Postgame Policies: Once the team and coaching staff arrive in the lockerroom following the game, there will be a 10-minute cooling off period. At which time, Tom Craft will meet with members of the media at a predetermined location and the lockerroom will be opened to credentialed media.

the 1996 season opener, 40-21. In that contest quarterback Billy Blanton passed for 306 yards with Az Hakim catching six passes for 174 yards, including a 67-yard touchdown reception. San Diego State jumped to a 20-3 lead and cruised to the win. Both teams ended the game with more than 400 yards of total offense (SDSU 476, Idaho 412).

Aztecs And The Sun Belt

San Diego State is 13-2 all-time against teams that currently compose the Sun Belt Conference. However, the 1996 game against the Vandals is the only meeting San Diego State has had against a Sun Belt opponent in the last 25 years, dating back to a 1976 season-opening win over Arkansas State.

Former Aztecs And Other Connections

There are several connections between the two teams this week. Idaho head coach Tom Cable was a graduate assistant at San Diego State in 1989 when SDSU went 6-5-1 in Al Luginbill's first season. Idaho offensive coordinator Bret Ingalls spent five years on the San Diego State sidelines, including stints as the offensive line coach, running backs coach and offensive coordinator. IU defensive line coach George Booker spent the past two seasons in the same position at San Diego State working for Ted Tollner. Idaho kicker/punter Mike Barrow attended Ventura's St. Bonaventure High School, as did Aztec wideout Adam Gray Hayward. Vandal defensive end Dennis Taeatafa attended nearby Patrick Henry High School.

Road Time

San Diego State will head to Moscow looking to end a five-game road losing streak, dating back to last year's 14-7 win at Colorado State. The Aztecs have also dropped their last five non-conference road games, dating back to a 1999 win at Kansas, 41-13. For the record, San Diego State is 154-154-11 all-time in road games.

The Rare Air

San Diego State will be playing its first "indoors" game since 1994 when it visits Moscow on Saturday. The Aztecs dropped a 40-17 decision at Minnesota in 1994 in game played in the Metrodome.

Scouting Idaho

Expect a long game Saturday afternoon at Idaho. Along with San Diego State's aerial attack, the Vandals will bring in the nation's 18th-ranked passing offense (273 yards per game). The Vandals' brutal schedule has contributed to some of their defensive numbers (117th in pass efficiency defense, 115th in scoring defense). Idaho's Josh Jeimberg is sixth nationally with more than six catches per game.

600 And Counting

San Diego State alum and former athletic department staffer Tom Ables will reach his own milestone on Saturday. He will see his 600th San Diego State football game. Ables was the school's first sports publicist and he served as sports editor of the Daily Aztec. For his contributions to SDSU through the years, he was inducted into the Aztec Hall of Fame in 1993. He writes a feature in *Aztec Saturday*, SDSU's game-day magazine, called *Looking Back*. To date, San Diego State has played 796 football games in its history.

record books after his stunning 12-catch, 296-yard effort against Arizona State. Tolver's day against the Sun Devils represents the 13th-best receiving game in NCAA history, the best in the history of the Mountain West and the second best in San Diego State's pass-happy history. Tolver now leads the nation with 177.67 receiving yards per game and is second nationally (to teammate Kassim Osgood) in catches per game with 10. See below for Tolver's various spots in history.

Big Plays For J.R.

J.R. Tolver was the impact player in the Arizona State game. Not only did he catch 12 passes for 296 yards, but he was involved in nine plays that covered at least 25 yards and six plays that went for more than 30 yards.

America's Best Team

There can be little argument through mid-September that the best receiving tandem in America plays at San Diego State. The Aztecs' J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood are all over the national statistics, including 1-2 in receptions per game. They combine for over 300 receiving yards per game. The following is a quick look at the two honors candidates in the NCAA statistics through Sept. 15th. Incidentally, San Diego State is the only team in America with two individuals leading the nation in a statistical category.

Other Interesting Receiving Things

The NCAA record for catches in a season by two players on the same team is 212, first set by Tulsa in 1965 and tied by Nevada in 1996. The current averages by J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood would put their totals at 273. Only 13 times in NCAA history has a school had a pair of 1,000-yard receivers on the same team. The last time one team had two receivers finish 1-2 in catches nationally was Houston in 1988. Osgood currently leads the country with 11 catches per game while Tolver is second with 10 grabs.

One More Trend

The NCAA record for receiving yards per game by two receivers on the same team is held by Nevada (2,774 receiving yards for an average of 213.4 yards per game set in 1999). Currently, Tolver and Osgood have accumulated 927 receiving yards for a combined average of 309 yards per game. The two need to combine for just 184.8 receiving yards over the final 10 games to break the NCAA record.

Just For Fun...

Should J.R. Tolver stay on his current pace, in a 13-game season, he would put the wraps on one of the great single-season performances in NCAA history. Over 13 games his numbers would include 130 receptions for a staggering 2,310 receiving yards. Patrick Rowe has the best receiving season in Aztec history with 1,372 receiving yards in 1990.

Playing With The Big Boys

Through three games under Tom Craft, the Aztecs have shown the ability to play with the elite of college football, despite an 0-3 record. In fact, SDSU is just a handful of plays from being perhaps the most surprising team in all of college football, lending credence to those who feel the Aztecs will be a major factor in the league race despite predictions of a last-place finish:

- ▶ Fresno State 16, SDSU 14: SDSU wins the total offense battle but has a 31-yard field goal blocked on the final play of the game. The Aztecs were 18-point underdogs.
- ▶ Colorado 34, SDSU 14: The final score is extremely misleading. SDSU and CU each totaled 401 yards of offense. Colorado ran a fumbled punt in for a score and scored again on its final snap from scrimmage.
- ▶ Arizona State 39, SDSU 28: San Diego State shredded the Sun Devil defense for 574 yards, but gave up 14 points in the kicking game, two one-play touchdown drives and committed five turnovers, including two in the fateful fourth quarter.

Passing Fancy

Tom Craft already has his stamp all over the SDSU record book as SDSU's offensive coordinator. However, it is doubtful that anyone could have forecast the offensive transformation at State in Craft's first season as head coach. The following is a glance at some of SDSU's 2001 final numbers and 2002 per-game averages on the offensive side.

This Is Offense

San Diego State generated 574 yards of total offense against Arizona State. It was the most by a San Diego State team (against a Division IA opponent) since the Aztecs posted 670 yards at UNLV on Nov. 12, 1996. San Diego State has gone over 400 yards (401 vs. Colorado last week) in consecutive games (against IA schools) for the first time since closing the 1999 season with 501 yards at UNLV and 478 against Wyoming in a pair of wins.

Hall Warms Up

With 1,115 passing yards in just three games, it is easy to forget that Adam Hall has just four career starts under his belt. His 516 passing yards (including 320 in the first half!) represent the fifth best passing day in SDSU's illustrious passing history. It was the best day by an Aztec quarterback since David Lowery set the single-game record with 568 passing yards against Brigham Young in 1991. It is also the best game in the country this season. Hall is third nationally in total offense (352.67 yards per game), and with him at the helm San Diego State is third nationally in passing offense and 29th in total offense.

More On Hall

Over the last two games Adam Hall has attempted 120 passes. He tied the school record with 60 attempts against ASU after 59 throws at Colorado. His 497 yards of total offense vs. ASU ranks eighth in school history. He has four touchdown passes this season after San Diego State had just five passing touchdowns in all of 2001.

Drive Time

San Diego State's offense recovery in 2002 is reflected in its marching numbers. San Diego State already has seven scoring drives that have covered at least 60 yards. Four of those drives have covered 80 yards with two drives covering more than 90 yards (96 at Fresno State and 91 vs. Arizona State).

Black Shirts Update

San Diego State's defenders enter the Idaho game ranked 55th nationally in total defense with Colorado's 401 yards the best by an opponent this season. Only nine of the opposition's snaps have resulted in a play over 20 yards. Of the opposition's 13 scoring drives this season, six have started in San Diego State territory.

Kicking The Habit

After an 0-for-5 start in field goals, San Diego State's placekicking duties seemed to regain its 2001 form vs. Arizona State. Tommy Kirovski hit three straight field goals to end the Arizona State game, including a 41-yarder in the fourth quarter.

The Big Play

Although the Aztecs have not gone the length of the field in a single play, San Diego State has put itself in scoring position several times. The Aztecs have covered at least 30 yards in a play 10 times.

Defensive Stands

San Diego State enters the Idaho game ranked 68th nationally in total defense, allowing 344.3 yards per game. However, the Aztecs have been more effective than the numbers might indicate. Nine times through three games opponents have started drives inside Aztec territory. Those drives have resulted in just 24 points for the opposition.

- ▶ The 401 yards of total offense represents CU's second lowest total at home since the 2000 season.
- ▶ Colorado cracked the 400-yard mark when Chris Brown ran 38 yards for a touchdown on Buffs' last play from scrimmage.
- ▶ Fresno State's 262 yards of total offense against SDSU are the fewest by the Bulldogs this season. The Bulldogs' other opponents are both ranked in the top 25 and the game against the Aztecs has been Fresno State's lone home game.

Another member of SDSU's youthful linebacking corps...Recovered a fumble against Arizona State and also credited with a tackle behind the line of scrimmage.


Ricky Sharpe

Tom Craft – Head Coach

A San Diego State graduate, a former Aztec quarterback and a former offensive coordinator on The Mesa, Craft was introduced as San Diego State's 15th head football coach on Dec. 6, 2001.

As a player, Craft was the starting quarterback and team captain for the Aztecs in 1976 and led San Diego State to a 10-1 record while completing 69 percent of his passes. In fact, during Craft's two years on the San Diego State campus, the Aztecs posted a cumulative mark of 18-4.

The success he tasted as a player became a way of life for Craft as a coach. As a coordinator at San Diego State (1994-1996), Craft led the Aztecs to their three best offensive years in the post-Marshall Faulk era. Each of his units averaged more than 30 points per game, including an eye-popping 38.9-point average his final year as coordinator in 1996. During his last two seasons on campus, San Diego State was ranked among the nation's top 10 teams in scoring and total offense.

Under Craft's tutelage, San Diego State saw some of its greatest individual achievements. Quarterback Billie Blanton, receiver Will Blackwell and running back George Jones etched their names in the Aztec record books.

Blanton's 169.6 passing rating in 1996 is still the best ever by an Aztec and is the fourth best mark in NCAA history. Will Blackwell caught a school-record 86 passes in 1995 and ended his career as SDSU's all-time leading receiver. And if you think Craft's attack is one dimensional, keep in mind that George Jones set the Aztec single-season rushing mark of 1,842 yards in 1995, Craft's second year as offensive coordinator.

Craft's stint as offensive coordinator ended with a pair of eight-win seasons in 1995 and '96. The 1995 San Diego State team was the first in NCAA history with a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,500-yard rusher and a pair of 1,000-yard receivers.

As head coach at Palomar College, Craft's stint can only be referred to as an "era". After serving as an assistant coach at the school from 1977 to 1982, he took over head-coaching duties in 1983. By all accounts, Palomar College football was considered to be on its last legs.

After a pair of 4-6 seasons, the Comets' fortunes began to improve. By the time Craft left the San Marcos school for the Aztec coordinator's job, Palomar was coming off of a three-year stretch of 31-2 and had an offense ranked among the nation's top five for five consecutive years. The Comets had also claimed two national titles in three years.

After three years at San Diego State, Craft returned to Palomar and spent five more seasons at the school, producing another eight-win, 10-win and 11-win season and his final national championship in 1998.

Overall, Craft's stay at Palomar College included a record of 115-56-1. Five of his teams won at least 10 games and he won three national championships and three state championships. He was voted as the state coach of the year five times and was honored as the Mission Conference coach of the year nine times. His squads posted a 9-3 record in bowl games and won nine conference titles in his last 10 years as head coach. During his three-year hiatus from the school, Palomar made just one bowl appearance. Eight members of Craft's 1998 national championship team would go on to sign contracts with NFL teams.

His impact in three seasons at San Diego State was nearly as dramatic. Craft's last two seasons on the Aztec staff represent the last two eight-win seasons on The Mesa. The final two offenses that he coordinated at San Diego State both scored over 400 points. San Diego State has accomplished that feat just twice in eight years, both when Craft was on staff.

Craft is one of three members of the 1976 Aztec squad to take a new coaching job in the last two years. He joins his former teammates Herman Edwards, now the head coach of the New York Jets, and John Fox, the new head coach of the Carolina Panthers.

The Only Meeting







FRESNO, Calif. - Tom Craft's first game as head coach at San Diego State was an eye-opener and a heartbreaker.

The Aztecs opened slowly, fell behind by nine points midway through the fourth quarter and then rallied to put themselves in position to win the game on the final play, only to have a chip-shot field goal blocked.

San Diego State fell behind the home-standing and heavily-favored Fresno State Bulldogs 10-0 at halftime and if not for heroic efforts by the Aztec defense, things could have been worse. San Diego State had just 19 yards of total offense at the half and ran just 21 plays. But San Diego State's defense kept things close and gave the "no-huddle" its chance.

The Aztecs responded as quarterback Adam Hall passed for 219 yards in the second half and J.R. Tolver stamped himself as an All-America candidate at receiver. In the end, it was just yards short.

San Diego State drove 54 yards on its first possession of the second half only to miss a field goal. But beginning with the third possession after intermission, things got interesting.

Hall found Tolver for 45 yards and James Truvillion capped off a stunning 96-yard touchdown drive for the Aztecs' first score of the year. San

Diego State then turned the ball over on two straight possessions, but the defense limited Fresno State to just a field goal during that stretch. The Bulldog lead stood at 16-7 with 8:26 remaining in the game.

San Diego State then got busy again. The Aztecs drove 81 yards for their second score and again it was Adam Hall to Tolver, this time for a 31-yard scoring strike.

The Aztec defense, which came up with three quarterback sacks, eight tackles behind the line of scrimmage, five pass deflections and a turnover, gave the Aztecs another chance. Trying to protect their lead, the Bulldogs moved the ball just 16 yards before being forced to punt.

The Aztecs took over on their own 35 and moved to the Fresno State 14 before the blocked field goal ended the game.

BOULDER, Colo. - The score may have followed prognostications but San Diego State more than held its own for more than three quarters against 17th-ranked Colorado. In the end, the Buffaloes made fewer mistakes and held off three Aztec scoring drives in the 34-14 win.

Colorado struck early, scoring 14 points on its first two possessions. But the youthful Aztecs recovered quickly. On its second possession, San Diego State marched 80 yards for a score, converting four third-downs into new sets. Overall the scoring march covered 80 yards and was capped by Garric Simmons' four-yard run.

After Colorado struck for a 75-yard score on its second possession, the Aztecs once again retaliated with a 45-yard march following a Colorado punt. Redshirt freshman Michael Franklin broke free on a 31-yard touchdown run to even the game at 14.

It looked like the teams would enter the locker room even, but a fumble on a punt return was picked up by the Buffaloes and toted in for the score and a 21-14 lead at the break.

Colorado scored again in the third quarter on a two-play drive that was set up by a Jeremy Bloom's 31-yard punt return.

San Diego State threatened early and often in the second half with three drives stalling inside the CU 35. The Aztecs also came up wide right on a pair of field-goal tries. Overall, five of SDSU's six second-half possessions ended inside the Colorado 40.

Colorado capped the scoring and clinched the win with a 38-yard touchdown run.

Adam Hall officially stamped himself as a threat at quarterback as he passed for 359 yards with 14 of those connections going to Kassim Osgood.

The two teams ended the game with 401 yards of total offense each.

SAN DIEGO - In this case, the numbers lie - a lot.

San Diego State rolled up 574 yards of total offense, including 320 passing yards, by HALFTIME, but still fell to the Arizona State Sun Devils, 39-28, in the home opener at Qualcomm Stadium.

The Aztecs got a game for the record books from receiver J.R. Tolver and quarterback Adam Hall. Tolver caught 12 passes for 296 yards and a touchdown in the 13th best receiving game in NCAA history. Hall passed for 516 yards and three touchdowns in the loss. It was the sixth best day in Aztec history. However, the records were not enough.

San Diego State dominated the early going and led the game 22-0 in the second quarter. The scoring came courtesy of three Adam Hall touchdown passes, one each to Tolver, Kassim Osgood and Ronnie Davenport. But Arizona State responded.

Trailing 22-0, ASU inserted Andrew Walter at quarterback. His first two passes were touchdown strikes to Shaun McDonald, covering 72 and 33 yards and the game was on.

San Diego State still led 22-14 at halftime. But in the second half, a handful of plays decided the outcome. Arizona State blocked a punt and recovered it for a touchdown and when San Diego State fumbled another punt, ASU took advantage with a brief 18-yard touchdown drive.

The Aztecs ended the game with three straight turnovers after the game had been tied at 25 on a 41-yard field goal by Tommy Kirovski.

For the game, SDSU had five turnovers to go with the blocked punt. SDSU won the total offense battle 574-365 and had a seven-minute advantage in time of possession. San Diego State ran 95 plays to Arizona State's 62.
