STORYLINES

The San Diego State Aztecs (2-2) enter the most critical three weeks of the season as they head to the high country to face the Wyoming Cowboys Saturday afternoon. The game is the Mountain West opener for both schools. SDSU and Wyoming are the last two schools to open MWC play.

San Diego State will be taking on a high-flying bunch of Cowboys when they visit Laramie. The Cowboys are 3-1, including two straight wins since dropping a game at Texas A&M.

The Aztecs have won all five games between the teams since the formation of the Mountain West Conference in time for the 1999 season.

Tom Craft is 2-0 against the Cowboys with the wins coming by a total of nine points.

After the trip to Wyoming, SDSU hosts Colorado State and travels to New Mexico before returning for Homecoming on Oct. 30th against Utah.

The Series

Wyoming leads, 13-12

Every game between the two schools has been a conference matchup in either the WAC or Mountain West. San Diego State's current five-game winning streak in the series is the longest by either team. Wyoming is the only member of the league that SDSU has not lost to since the beginning of Mountain West play in 1999. SDSU is 4-8 in Laramie with two of the wins coming on its last two visits.

TEAM NOTES

Mountain Climbing

The San Diego State Aztecs open the 2004 Mountain West season Saturday afternoon with a 1 p.m. MT game at Wyoming in front of an ESPN+Plus (Regional) audience (Channel 4 San Diego). The Aztecs are 2-2 with losses at Michigan and UCLA and wins over Idaho State and Nevada. The Cowboys are 3-1 and riding a two-game winning streak. Wyoming's lone setback came at Texas A&M. San Diego State will return home for an ABC regional game next week against Colorado State.

Conference Calls

San Diego State enters the 2004 conference race looking for its third consecutive upper-division finish in Mountain West play, all under Tom Craft. The Aztecs are 15-20 all-time in Mountain West play but 7-7 since Craft began his tenure in 2002. The Aztecs are 9-8 in conference road games since the league's inception. SDSU has a road win against every conference school, except Utah. Colorado State leads the league with 13 road wins in 18 tries.

Getting Even

A victory over Wyoming on Saturday would pull the Aztecs even in the all-time series at 13-13. It would also mean that San Diego State would be even or hold a series advantage against five of the eight members of the league. Surprisingly, the Aztecs and incoming Mountain West member Texas Christian have never met on the football field. They will begin their rivalry next season in San Diego.

Mountain West Momentum

The Aztecs enter 2004 league play with a little momentum against Mountain West schools. San Diego State closed the 2003 race by winning three of its final four league games, including a 25-20 victory over Wyoming. The Dark Side defense has allowed just two offensive touchdowns in its last 12 quarters of league play.

First Chapters

San Diego State is 3-2 in Mountain West openers with the two losses by a combined nine points. The Aztecs are 15-11 in league openers since joining the Western Athletic Conference in time for the 1978 season. San Diego State has opened league play against Wyoming just once. Back in 2000, the Aztecs were 34-0 winners in Laramie in the first league game of the season.

In Laramie

San Diego State is 4-8 all-time in Laramie, including its current two-game winning streak. Prior to the victories in 2000 and 2002, the Aztecs had not won in Laramie since 1984. SDSU has never won three straight at Wyoming.

Last Time In Wyoming

San Diego State last visited Laramie on Oct. 19, 2002, and escaped with a wild 24-20 victory. In the contest, SDSU blocked a punt and Shane Johnson recovered it for a touchdown. The Aztecs also blocked an extra point and Jeff Shoate, now with the Denver Broncos, blocked a field goal attempt. All-America linebacker Kirk Morrison scored the game's final points on a 34-yard interception return that was set up when linebacker Heath Farwell blindsided Cowboy quarterback Casey Bramlet. SDSU closed the game with a drive that milked the last 11:22 of the fourth quarter off the clock. The drive ended on the Wyoming one as time expired and covered 54 yards over 20 plays. SDSU converted eight third and fourth-down situations into first downs.

Last Year In San Diego

SDSU got four field goals from J.C. Mejia and 218 rushing yards from Lynell Hamilton in the 25-20 win at Qualcomm Stadium. Jeff Webb caught a 14-yard TD pass from Adam Hall as SDSU opened up a 25-6 lead. The Cowboys closed the scoring with two touchdowns in the last three minutes of the game. Webb finished with 10 catches and 139 receiving yards. SDSU held a 397-292 advantage in total offense.

Scouting The Cowboys

Wyoming is 3-1 as it prepares to host the Aztecs for Homecoming. The Cowboys will be looking for their first three-game winning streak since 1999. Wyoming's quarterback is Corey Bramlet, younger brother of Casey Bramlet, who led the Cowboy offense in past years. He leads an offense that ranks 49th nationally with 387 yards per game. Josh Barge is fourth nationally in punt returns, averaging 22.7 yards per return. Wyoming's only loss came at improving Texas A&M. Included in the three wins is a home victory over Ole Miss, marking Wyoming's first-ever win over an SEC foe.

House Call

The return to Laramie is a return home for former Cowboy player and assistant coach Jim House, who now heads up San Diego State's defensive line. House is a Laramie native, a two-time all-conference player for Wyoming and coached on the Cowboy staff from 1974 to 1985. During his playing days, (1966-68) Wyoming played in the Sun Bowl and the Sugar Bowl. He was on the coaching staff during the school's Fiesta Bowl appearance against Oklahoma.

The Streak

The Aztecs are riding a series-best five-game winning streak against the Cowboys. During the streak, the Aztecs have outscored the Cowboys by a combined total of 160-63 for an average score of 32-12.6. The last two games, however, have been decided by a total of nine points. The current five-game winning streak against Wyoming is the second longest ever for the Aztecs against a Mountain West school. From 1984 through 1996, San Diego State defeated New Mexico 13 straight times.

Musical Linemen

The Aztecs are an improved offensive bunch and that is an accomplishment since the Aztecs have not started the same group of offensive linemen in consecutive games this season. In fact, center Taylor Schmidt is the only offensive lineman who has opened all four games at the same position. SDSU opened the UCLA game with two redshirt freshmen, two junior-college transfers and first-year starter Patrick Justman. The only returning starter up front from a year ago, Mike Kracalik, missed the start with a sprained knee. His status for the Wyoming game will be determined mid week. Redshirt freshman Will Robinson has played four different positions in four games.

Star Search

The changes in the Aztec offense are not limited to the offensive line. Preseason prognostications for the Aztecs might not have been as lofty if the prophets had known SDSU would play the entire season without freshman All-America running back Lynell Hamilton, or a Rimington Award candidate in center Jasper Harvey. SDSU has also been missing returning starter Wesley Williams at wideout, who has missed the last three games with a hip injury. Outland Trophy Watch List member Mike Kracalik did not play at UCLA due to a knee sprain and freshman offensive lineman Brandyn Dombrowki, who won a starting job during fall camp, has been sidelined virtually all season with two ankle sprains.

Still Better

Despite the bevy of injury obstacles and influx of youth, San Diego State's offense is clearly improved from last year and enters the Wyoming game No. 25 nationally in total offense at 425.5 yards per game. SDSU needs just three touchdown passes to reach last year's 12-game total of 10. Last season, the Aztecs finished the year 88th in total offense and 60th in passing offense. Through four games of 2004, SDSU is 16th in passing offense.

One Less Weapon

The Aztecs will make the drive for their first bowl game since 1998 with one less weapon. Lynell Hamilton, the 2003 Freshman All-America (*The Sporting News, Rivals*), Mountain West freshman of the year and first-team all-league running back, will sit out this season as he continues to recover from the broken ankle that prematurely ended his 2003 season in game 10 at UNLV. Hamilton, who ran for 1,087 yards in less than 10 full games, would have been the nation's 10th leading returning rusher in 2004. He will return to the squad as a sophomore next season.

One More Weapon

Junior linebacker Matt McCoy was hardly an unknown commodity entering 2004 after he led the Mountain West in tackles as a sophomore. But after his 18-tackle effort in the near-upset of Michigan, the Tustin junior raised more eyebrows. Following his performance in Ann Arbor, he was named the national defensive player of the week by the Bronko Nagurski Award and added to that trophy's prestigious watch list. He joins teammate Kirk Morrison as a Butkus and Lombardi candidate.

Batting 300

Kirk Morrison has reached rare air in the Aztec uniform. With his career-best 15 tackles in the Nevada game, Morrison climbed over 300 tackles for his career. He is now fourth all-time at State, behind Whip Walton, Rico Curtis and Jason Moore in tackles. Morrison now has 36 tackles for loss in his career, to rank ninth all-time at State. Kabeer Gbaja Biamila (Green Bay Packers) has 67 career tackles for loss to lead SDSU's all-time chart in that category.

Double Figures

San Diego State's decorated linebacking corps continues to stockpile statistics. Kirk Morrison's 11-tackle effort against UCLA marked the ninth time in the last 11 games (dating back to last season) that an Aztec linebacker reached double figures in tackles. Morrison has accomplished the feat 14 times in his career and McCoy has reached double figures seven times.

Auxiliary Stats

Linebacker Heath Farwell is half of the two-headed monster (joining Stephen Larsen) that mans "the other" linebacking spot. And Farwell is carving his own niche. Farwell forced two more fumbles against Nevada giving him eight for his Aztec career, which has span 29 games. He also had three sacks against Nevada and one against UCLA and leads SDSU with five on the season. That's half of the Aztec total of 10.

Linebacker You, You, You and You

Forgive opponents if they feel the SDSU linebacking corps has been together forever. The foursome of Kirk Morrison, Matt McCoy, Heath Farwell and Stephen Larsen have combined to start 83 games during their Aztec careers and they have also combined for a total of 783 career tackles, 86.5 tackles behind the line of scrimmage, 31.5 quarterback sacks, 20 forced fumbles, 16 recovered fumbles, 28 pass break-ups and six interceptions.

They Know Butkus...And Nagurski

Two Aztec linebackers, Kirk Morrison and Matt McCoy, have been named to the 2004 Butkus Award preseason watch list. Morrison is a returning first-team All-America selection (*College Football News*) and is the reigning Mountain West defensive player of the year. McCoy, a second-team all-league pick last season, led the conference in 2003 with 125 tackles. Only eight schools have multiple players listed on the Butkus watch list. Both Morrison and McCoy are also on the Nagurski Watch List, presented to the nation's top defensive player. Morrison was the Nagurski national defensive player of the week after his 18 tackles in the 24-21 loss at Michigan.

The Nine Guys

SDSU's star-studded linebacking corps has been on a publicity roll over the last two years. The latest accolade came just prior to the start of the 2004 season when *ESPN.com* ranked SDSU's linebackers as the ninth best unit in the country. SDSU's linebacking group was the only Mountain West mention in the preseason unit rankings by the web site.

Webb Gems

The proud tradition of Aztec receivers is poised to add a new member. Junior Jeff Webb enters the Wyoming game with 30 catches for 347 yards with a pair of touchdowns. He has reached 100-receiving yards in two games this season (Michigan and Nevada) to become the first Aztec to accomplish that feat since teammates J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood finished 2002 with both players breaking the 100-yard receiving mark in the final two games of the season. Webb has caught a pass in each of the last 14 games in which he's played. He missed the last two games of the 2003 season with a shoulder injury. He enters the Wyoming game 10th in the country with 7.5 catches per game and 21st nationally in receiving yards (86.8 per game).

Countdown To 1,000

Jeff Webb needs to average 93.3 receiving yards over the final seven games of the season to reach 1,000 yards for the season. J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood were the last to accomplish the feat when both players broke the 1,000-yard mark in 2002.

Beginning To The End Zone

San Diego State has scored 12 touchdowns entering the Wyoming game with six players doing the damage. Those six players, Michael Franklin, Jeff, Webb, Wesley Williams, Brandon Bornes, Ramal Porter and Robert Ortiz had scored a combined 10 career touchdowns entering the season. Part of that new scoring success can be attributed to the development of quarterback Matt Dlugolecki. He has thrown five touchdown passes through four games this season, surpassing his four touchdown passes for all of last season (on 230 attempts).

Talking Turnovers

An early, promising trend for San Diego State is in the turnover category. The Aztecs have forced 11 turnovers in the first four games of the season. On that pace, SDSU would force 44 turnovers for the season. A year ago, despite its lofty rankings, The Dark Side forced just 28 turnovers.

INT-eresting

The Aztecs now have nine interceptions through four games this season after corraling just 12 all of last year. Six players have combined for the nine picks. And they are getting their hands on even more passes. The Aztecs have already broken up 31 passes in 2004. Last year, that season total in 12 games was 51 break-ups. SDSU is fifth nationally with nine interceptions. Kansas and Michigan are tied for the national lead in that category with 11.

Air Control

Josh Dean picked off his third pass of the season in the loss at UCLA. Dating back to last season, the Aztecs have now intercepted a pass in five straight games. Dean is fourth nationally with his three interceptions and has a pick in five of his last seven games. He did not have an interception in the first 26 games of his career.

First Things First

San Diego State has already scored 55 points in the first quarter this season. Last year, the Aztecs managed just 60 points in the first period for the entire 12-game season.

Bornes' Identity

Redshirt freshman running back Brandon Bornes continues to become a part of the Aztec attack. He is SDSU's leading return man on kickoffs with an average of 20.9 per attempt. He has rushed for 169 yards (on 28 carries) for an average of six yards per carry. He has also rushed for three touchdowns. Last season, Lynell Hamilton led SDSU with four rushing TDs. Bornes is also far from a short-yardage back. He has runs of 35 and 22 yards this season.

Franklin's Mint

Michael Franklin continues to fill just about every role for the Aztecs, including the role of starting running back with Lynell Hamilton heading to the redshirt list. Through four games, Franklin has rushed for 285 yards to average 71.2 yards per game. He has rushed for two touchdowns and thrown a TD

pass. His 67-yard TD run on the first play from scrimmage this season is SDSU's longest scoring play of 2004. Franklin has also returned seven punts and had a 29-yard return vs. Nevada. He has also returned three kickoffs for 50 yards. The New Orleans junior enters the Wyoming game with 1,002 career rushing yards. He is also 22nd nationally in all-purpose yards with 144.5 yards per game. Franklin is second on the team with 19 catches after catching 10 at UCLA.

Younger By The Day

San Diego State's promising early start is being led by a dramatic youth movement. In the first four games of the season consider the contributions by the underclassmen:

► The 2004 season has included the first career starts by offensive linemen Patrick Justman (sophomore), Taylor Schmidt (junior), Chris Pino (junior), Will Robinson (redshirt freshman) and redshirt freshman Mike Kravetz. Another redshirt freshman, Brandyn Dombrowski, won a starting job in the fall but has been slowed by an ankle sprain and saw his first action at Michigan off the bench. And sophomore receiver Ramal Porter has moved into the starting lineup.

► Redshirt freshman Antwan Applewhite had his first career interception against Michigan and his 75-yard interception return set up San Diego State's first score of the game. He also had his first career sack at Michigan.

► Redshirt freshman Brandon Bornes is a key in San Diego State's kickoff return game and has picked up the first carries from scrimmage of his career and has scored two TDs, including a 35-yard TD run vs. Nevada.

► New defensive end Martin Miller has quickly become a factor up front and is now a solid member of the defensive line rotation.

► Redshirt freshman Garret Palmer is SDSU's placekicker and freshmen Michael Hughes and Sean Henschel are battling for the team's punting chores. True freshman Tyler Schmitt is the team's deep snapper. Palmer connected on field goals of 50 and 43 yards against Nevada.

Also...

Consider this fact, San Diego State has completed 102 passes entering the Wyoming game. The senior class has accounted for just 14 of those catches and only one of San Diego State's seven touchdown receptions.

Butkus Voters Beware

Junior Matt McCoy showed why he's a Butkus Award candidate against Michigan. McCoy was credited with 18 tackles against Michigan, including an astounding 17 solo tackles. McCoy has now reached double figures in tackles five times in eight games and six times in his career. He has reached at least 15 tackles in a game four times. McCoy, somehow, was left off the Mountain West Conference first team last season, despite leading the league with 125 stops. McCoy's 18 tackles at Michigan were the most by an Aztec since Marv Underwood recorded 18 in the 2002 win over Air Force.

Another Dynamic Duo

It is too early to make comparisons to J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood, but the Aztecs may be on their way to producing another lethal receiving tandem. In 2002, Tolver (now of the Miami Dolphins) and Kassim Osgood (San Diego Chargers) set NCAA receiving records by two teammates with 236 catches and 3,337 yards. This year's junior duo of Jeff Webb and Robert Ortiz are not on record pace but they are becoming a dangerous tandem. In four games, Webb and Ortiz have combined for 48 catches for 622 yards and five touchdowns. They have five of the team's seven receiving touchdowns.

Century City

Jeff Webb (11-107-1) and Robert Ortiz (7-125-1) became the first Aztec teammates to record 100 receiving yards in the same game since Dec. 7, 2002, when they both went over 100 yards at Michigan. The last teammates to accomplish the feat were J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood. Tolver, now of the Miami Dolphins, had 283 receiving yards and Osgood, now a San Diego Charger, had 126 at Hawai'i. Last season, SDSU had just two 100-yard receiving games all season, both by Webb (vs. Brigham Young and Wyoming). Webb has two 100-yard receiving games this season.

And They're TV Friendly

Robert Ortiz and Jeff Webb aren't just about stats. They can be flashy as well. Both players pulled down one-handed grabs at Michigan and the two were teamed together in ESPN SportsCenter's Top 10 Plays of the day for September 18th.

Pass Is Back

The 2004 Aztecs look to be regaining the air prowess so cherished by the Aztec faithful and so evident in SDSU history. San Diego State is averaging 276 yards through the air and is completing 57.6 percent of its passes, including Matt Dlugolecki's 58.3 percentage. SDSU already has seven touchdown passes this season after recording just 10 in 12 games last season. Dlugolecki set a career high with 277 passing yards in Ann Arbor. The junior quarterback has passed for 987 yards this year after throwing for 1,248 yards last season. His per-game average last season was 138.7 yards per game while in four games of 2004 he is averaging 246.8 yards per game. SDSU is currently No. 16 nationally in passing and No. 25 in total offense.

Don't Cross This Line

Since the beginning of the 2003 season, San Diego State's opponents have started in Aztec territory 27 times and come away with points just 12 times, including a meager four touchdowns.

In 2004

This season, SDSU's defense has inherited an opposing drive in Aztec territory on six occasions and given up points just once (field goal). Those points came against UCLA when the Bruins began a drive on the SDSU 13. They netted eight yards before settling for a field goal.

Rising Expectations

After two seasons of surpassing the opinions of prognosticators, the Aztecs have a new challenge in 2004 - new-found respect. The Aztecs have been picked everywhere from first to third in the league race (including third by the Mountain West media) after successive seasons in which the Aztecs were picked seventh in the league race and responded with a pair of upper-division finishes. Nationally, the preseason polls have placed San Diego State at No. 38 (*SportsLine.com*) and No. 47 (*Sports Illustrated*). The Aztecs received votes in each of the first three coaches' polls.

Good Morning, Aztecs

San Diego State is likely the only program in the country that will practice in the mornings throughout the football season. Due to class conflicts in the afternoon, SDSU will have morning practices, beginning at 7 a.m., throughout the season. Players will return to the football offices for late afternoon film and meetings. Only the Friday walkthrough is scheduled for a traditional mid-afternoon time.

At The Box Office

SDSU has seen an increase at the ticket office in the first month of the season. An upswing of more than 4,000 in season tickets to just over 18,000 was validated with single-game tickets. The Aztecs set a single-game attendance record in the opener when 57,216 fans watched the Aztecs dismantle Idaho State, followed by the legendary KGB Sky Show. But perhaps even more impressive was a crowd of 33,429 fans on hand for the Nevada game.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

The Aztecs offense is off to an impressive start in the 2004 season showing improvement in all four major statistical categories over a year ago (scoring, total, passing and rushing)... The Aztecs scored a season-low 10 points at UCLA, but the 96 points through four games is the second highest scoring output to open a campaign in the last five years... San Diego State has scored 120 points in its last five games (24.0 ppg)... To date, the Aztecs are averaging 5.3 points and 85.6 yards over last year... Of the Aztecs 12 touchdowns this season, five have come following a turnover... SDSU is impressive in 2004, going 9-for-12 in the Red Zone (inside the opponent 20), including seven touchdowns... Through just four games, the Aztecs have 21 plays of 20 or more yards... San Diego State has six scoring drives of 73 or more yards and four touchdown drives of 80 or more yards... The Aztecs have shown impressive consistency in the passing game, throwing for 291 yards against Idaho State, 289 yards at Michigan, 262 yards vs. Nevada and 263 at UCLA... SDSU has 55 first-quarter points this season, last year the Aztecs had 60 first-quarter points in 12 games... With 21 points in the second half of the 2003 season finale (24-3 victory over Air Force), 38 points against Idaho State, 21 points at Michigan, 24 points vs. Nevada and 10 points at UCLA, the Aztecs have scored 117 points in their last 16 quarters... San Diego State has gone 66 games without being shutout (last time SDSU did not score was Oct. 29, 1998, a 0-13 loss at Brigham Young)... SDSU has not trailed in five of its last eight games... The Aztecs have had a 100-yard rusher in five of its last eight games... Six different Aztec backs have a rush of at least 21 yards in 2004... Michael Franklin has 1,002 career yards rushing on just 210 career carries (4.77 yards per rush)... Four different players have attempted and completed a pass for the Aztecs this season... 12 different SDSU players have caught a pass in a game this season... It would be hard to imagine a better season opener for the San Diego State offense... Against Idaho State, SDSU scored 38 points and had 581 yards of total offense with an incredibly balanced attack of 291 yards passing and 290 yards rushing... The Aztecs scored touchdowns on their first three offensive possessions of the season and SDSU's first five offensive possessions resulted in 24 points... San Diego State's 24 first-quarter points against Idaho State were the most in any stanza since Oct. 25, 1995 (at UTEP, 24 points in the second quarter) and five more points than SDSU averaged per game during the 2003 campaign... The 38 points were the most for the Aztecs since the 2002 season finale at Hawai'i (Dec. 7, 2002)... Michael Franklin scored on a 67-yard touchdown run on the first play from scrimmage and San Diego State had 14 points and 101 yards of total offense after four offensive plays... The Aztecs had 234 yards of total offense in the first quarter against Idaho State.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

After earning the distinction of being one of the nation's top defensive units a year ago, The Dark Side defense is off to another impressive start this season... San Diego State has held three of its four 2004 opponents well below their average scoring output: Idaho State (scored 21 points, averages 26.0 against non-SDSU opponents), Michigan (24, 32.0) and Nevada (10, 32.8) (exception was UCLA which averages 30.7 ppg and scored 33)... The four opponents to date combine to average 121.5 points per game (not-including SDSU contest), but against the Aztecs the four high-scoring teams scored just 88 points... SDSU has allowed 88 points this season but that is a bit misleading, Michigan scored seven points on a fumble return, Idaho State tallied 21 second-half points after the Aztecs had built a 38-0 lead and UCLA scored on an interception return and started a drive inside the Aztec 20... The defense has been sensational when put under pressure... Aztec opponents have started six drives on SDSU's side of the field and have scored a total of three points off the strong field position (the streak grows to eight straight without a touchdown when starting in Aztec territory dating back to last season)... Since the beginning of the 2003 season, opponents have started in SDSU territory 27 times but were able to come away with points on just 12 occasions and touchdowns just four times... During that time, opponents have just a 14.8 percent touchdown percentage when starting inside Aztec territory... The Aztecs defense has allowed just six touchdowns in 15 red zone trips by the opposition this season (a TD success rate of just 40.0 percent)... Through four games, The Dark Side has 28 tackles for loss, 10 sacks, nine interceptions and has forced 11 turnovers... The Aztecs have allowed just 112 points in their last seven games (16.0 ppg)... In addition, opponents have been able to cross the goal line in just 15 of their last 48 opportunities when inside the Aztec 20 (TD conversion percentage of just 31.3 percent)... The Aztecs have allowed just three rushing touchdowns this season... The 11 forced turnovers by SDSU rank as the 28th most nationally... SDSU is fifth nationally in interceptions with nine, trailing only Kansas (11), Michigan (11), Ohio (10), South Carolina (10)... The Dark Side is limiting opponents to just a stingy 3.6 yards per rush this season... The Aztecs have stopped 28 of 135 running plays behind the line of scrimmage... In four of the last eight games, SDSU opponents have failed to rush for more than 85 yards... Last year San Diego State allowed 17 offensive touchdowns, tied with co-national champion Louisiana State for the top figure in the country... In 2003, SDSU held four opponents to nine points or less marking the first time an Aztec squad had done that since 1977... Last season the Aztecs allowed 207 points, the fewest SDSU has allowed since 1977... In the 25 seasons between 1977 and 2003, the Aztecs allowed more than 300 points 14 times and more than 400 points twice... The Dark Side defense scored four touchdowns last season off turnover returns and helped the Aztec offense to five scores on drives of four yards or less setup by turnovers deep in opposition territory.



Game Notes

With the Aztec win: SDSU has claimed victories in two straight season-openers for the first time since claiming five straight from 1993-97 ... Aztecs have won 15 straight non-conference home games against teams from outside the BCS Conferences ... SDSU is 1-0 all-time against Idaho State and improves to a perfect 9-0 versus schools in the Big Sky Conference ... The Aztecs moved to 44-33-5 all-time (9-4-1 in last 14 years) in season openers and 2-1 under Tom Craft ... In home openers, SDSU is 27-7-1 in its last 35 home openers ... SDSU has won four of its last five games dating back to 2003 ... The Aztecs have won three straight home games for the first time since the 1998 squad won its final four contests at Qualcomm... **The announced attendance** of 57,216, is an SDSU record for a home game... **On the opening play** of the game, Aztec Michael Franklin ran 67 yards for a touchdown ...the 67-yard run was the longest by an SDSU player since Larry Ned ran for 77 yards at Utah on Oct. 23, 1999 ... the 67-yard run is the longest of Franklin's career, topping his previous high of 55 yards in 2002, at Hawaii'... **The Aztec defense** kept Idaho State off the scoreboard in the first quarter, marking the fifth straight game in which an SDSU opponent has failed to score in the first quarter. Aztec opponents have also gone scoreless in the first 15-minute period in six of the last seven and nine of the last 11 outings dating back to the 2003 campaign... **SDSU's Robert Miller** blocked Idaho State kicker Jaret Johnson's field-goal attempt to close out the first half. The block was the Aztecs' first since Jeff Shoate blocked kicker Scott Parker's 32-yard attempt at Wyoming on Oct.19, 2002. The block is Miller's first of his career.

SAN DIEGO - In front of a record crowd of 57,216, the 2004 Aztecs made a stirring debut as they systematically disposed of Idaho State, 38-21, at Qualcomm Stadium.

Aztec running back Michael Franklin scampered 67 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the season and San Diego State was on its way to a near-perfect first half. The Aztecs jumped to a 24-0 first quarter lead and extended the advantage to 31-0 at the break and eventually 38-0 before ISU dented the scoreboard. SDSU completed the first half without a turnover and without a penalty.

The first quarter was the prolific for SDSU since it scored 24 points in the second quarter of a 1995 romp over UTEP.

The game would last just over four hours, thanks in part to an Idaho State offense that attempted 69 passes while rushing for just 46 yards.

Junior Matt Dlugolecki won the fall camp quarterback derby and he was strong in his debut, completing 16 of his 27 attempts for 233 yards and two touchdowns, one each to Robert Ortiz and Wesley Williams.

The star of the game, however, was Franklin. He rushed for 101 yards, marking his third straight game over the 100-yard mark. He also led the Aztecs with 84 receiving yards. Franklin ended the game with 233 all-purpose yards despite seeing limited action in the second half.

The Dark Side was its dominating self in the first half when the game was being decided. The first 14 Idaho State possessions resulted in just one drive that lasted more than six plays. The Aztec defense forced four turnovers, including interceptions by Heath Farwell, Josh Dean and Donny Baker. Farwell was also credited with a quarterback sack and caused a fumble.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Kevin O'Connell saw his first collegiate action and found Robert Ortiz for a 32-yard touchown pass. Ortiz, who entered the game with two career TD grabs, had two more against the Bengals.

The home crowd was the largest in San Diego State history and the 20th largest crowd in college football on the first full Saturday of the weekend.

game 2 - No. 17 Michigan 24, San Diego State 21



Game Notes

For the second consecutive season San Diego State played a nationally-ranked Big Ten team to the final moments before losing... Last season, the Aztecs lost at second-ranked Ohio State, 16-13, on Sept. 9... This season, the Aztecs fall to 17th-ranked Michigan, 24-21... Two weeks after setting a school-record for home attendance with 57,216 vs. Idaho State at Qualcomm Stadium, San Diego State played in front of the largest crowd in school history. **Today's attendance** at Michigan Stadium of 109,432, eclipses the crowd of 104,433 that witnessed the Ohio State-SDSU game last season in Columbus... The Aztecs' last **two losses to nationally-ranked teams** (last season Ohio State and Michigan today) have been by a total of six points... San Diego State's **1-1 record** matches its best mark after two games in the last 10 seasons. The Aztecs have not opened 2-0 since victories over Navy and California to open the 1994 campaign... Despite the loss, SDSU has still **won four of its last six games** dating back to last season... Although not outgained by much 327-311, the Aztecs total yardage disadvantage of 16 yards, snaps a streak of six consecutive games in which SDSU has outgained its opponent... Prior to today, the last time an Aztec opponent had more total yardage was at Utah on Oct. 11, 2003... San Diego State's **Dark Side Defense** put on another impressive showing... Despite allowing 24 points, the defense yielded just one scoring drive of more than 51 yards on the afternoon... The defense also forced four turnovers, two of which set up short scoring drives for the Aztec offense (17 and 39 yard touchdown drives). The Aztecs had seven tackles for loss.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. - Another reigning Big Ten champion as an opponent resulted in another near miss for the San Diego State Aztecs Saturday afternoon.

With a national television audience watching (ESPN), SDSU and No. 17 Michigan went toe-to-toe for more than three hours before the Wolverines escaped The Big House with a 24-21 win over up and coming San Diego State.

In the process, SDSU appeared to show dramatic gains on offense and special teams and The Dark Side defense showed a new taste for creating turnovers.

Michigan shocked the Aztecs early, scoring on a 54-yard touchdown pass on its first play from scrimmage. Following an interception, the Wolverines looked to be in total control with possession deep in SDSU territory. However, safety Josh Dean flattened UM quarterback Chad Henne on a pass attempt and Antwan Applewhite picked the ball out of the air and returned it 75 yards, setting up a Michael Franklin TD.

Following a Michigan field goal, the Aztecs turned the ball over again when Lawrence Reid picked up a fumble and returned it five yards for a touchdown.

With SDSU trailing 17-7 and on the ropes, Robert Ortiz turned the game. His 61-yard reception set up a Jeff Webb touchdown and the 109,000 plus in Ann Arbor settled in for nailbiter.

By halftime, SDSU had taken the lead when Matt Dlugolecki found Ortiz for a 14-yard score. That drive was set up by a Kurt Kahui fumble recovery. In all, SDSU forced four turnovers after Michigan entered the game second nationally in turnover margin.

The final lead change of the day took place on the first drive of the second half as the Wolverines drove the field and registered the last lead change of the day.

It was SDSU's second three-point loss in two years to the reigning Big Ten champion. In 2003, SDSU was a 16-13 loser to No. 2 Ohio State.

Game Notes

With the SDSU victory: San Diego State has won five of its last seven games dating back to last season. That is the best seven-game mark for SDSU since posting a similar seven-game mark from Oct. 24, 1998 through Sept. 4, 1999 ...San Diego State is 2-0 at home this season and has won four straight games at Qualcomm Stadium. The four-game home field winning streak is the longest since claiming five straight in 1998-99 (last four home games of '98 and first game of '99). From the end of the five-game winning streak in 1999, until the current four-game winning streak, the Aztecs were 7-17 at Qualcomm ... San Diego State is 2-1 after the first three games of the season for the second consecutive season. The last time SDSU had a winning record after the first three games of consecutive seasons was 1993 and 1994... **With tonight's attendance** of 33,429, SDSU has surpassed the 30,000 mark in back-to-back home contests for the first time since the 1999 season. SDSU drew 30,508 versus New Mexico (Oct. 9, 1999) and 40,836 fans against Brigham Young (Nov. 6, 1999).... SDSU **linebacker Kirk Morrison** became just the fourth player in SDSU history to record more than 300 career tackles. Morrison, who tallied his 13th career game in double-figure tackles, now has 308 tackles in his career to rank fourth in the Aztec record books. Morrison's 15 tackles tonight matches his career high (15 vs. BYU in 2003, vs. Utah in 2001), while he had a career best for most solo tackles in a game with 10 (prev. nine at Hawai'i)... With nine catches for 101 yards tonight, SDSU's **Jeff Webb** has at least one reception in each of his last 13 outings and at least two catches in his last nine games. Webb also recorded his fourth career game with 100 or more yards .

SAN DIEGO - On a dangerous night against a dangerous opponent, San Diego State went to work in business-like fashion to dismiss Nevada, 27-10, Saturday night at Qualcomm Stadium in front of 33,429 fans.

A week before the UCLA game and a week after a near-miss at Michigan, the more than capable Wolf Pack were in a position to derail SDSU's early-season momentum. However, Michael Franklin rushed for 100 yards for the second time this season and The Dark Side kept the visitors out of the end zone until their final possession of the night to cruise to the win.

As they have all season, the Aztecs were effective in the first half. The Aztecs led 17-3 at intermission thanks to a 23-yard TD reception by Jeff Webb and a 35-yard touchdown run by Brandon Bornes.

Both of those scoring drives were of the cross-country variety, covering 79 and 81 yards with both taking 12 places to execute.

The youth movement continued for SDSU with sophomore Ramal Porter scoring his first career touchdown and redshirt freshman Brandon Bornes scoring on a career-best 35-yard touchdown run.

The Aztec special teams had a good night as well with Garrett Palmer connecting on field goals of 50 and 43 yards, and punt returns by Franklin and Kyle Conerly that covered 29 and 23 yards, respectively.

Senior linebacker Kirk Morrison reached a new milestone with his 15 tackles, pushing him over 300 for his career. In all, it was a strong night for The Dark Side with three quarterback sacks, two interceptions, 12 pass break-ups, and two forced fumbles. Senior playmaker Heath Farwell continued to show up in the stat column. He had all three Aztec sacks and forced both fumbles.

Game Notes

With his 45 yards on 11 carries, Aztec junior **Michael Franklin** reached the 1,000-yard plateau in career rushing with 1,002 yards. Franklin had 346 yards as a red-shirt freshman in 2002, 371 yards as a sophomore in 2003, and has 285 yards as a junior in 2004. Franklin also tallied a career game high in receptions with 10 (45 yards), besting his previous high of eight at Wyoming in 2002... Linebackers **Kirk Morrison** and **Matt McCoy** both reached double-figures in tackles tonight. Morrison had 11 tackles and reached double-figures for the second straight game and the 13th time in his career. Morrison's 11 tackles included eight solos and two tackles for loss. McCoy, meanwhile, had 10 tackles (6 solo) and reached double-figures for the second time this season, the fourth time in the last six games and the eighth time in his career.... With the 402 yards tonight, SDSU has reached the **400-yard mark** in total offense three times in four games in 2004... The **Aztecs were outgained** in total offense (410-402) for the second time this season and the second time on the road. But in those two games, SDSU has been outgained by just a total of 24 yards (vs. Michigan - outgained by 16 (327-311)) ... In the four games this season, SDSU has combined to outgain its opponents by 212 yards... **SDSU rushed** for 139 yards tonight, despite being tagged for -23 yards on the muffed punt in the first half... Seven players combined for the 139 yards and four accumulated at least 12 yards... The Aztecs ran for 137 of those yards in the second half after recording 2 net yards in the first half... With his 23 completions on 42 attempts for 215 yards, SDSU quarterback **Matt Dlugolecki** logged his third straight game with at least 23 completions and at least 40 attempts.

PASADENA - In 2002, UCLA generated 23 points off of Aztec miscues to blow out SDSU, 43-7. Last year it was a 3-3 game at the half when two interceptions helped the Bruins to a 20-10 victory.

Saturday night, Spencer Havner's 52-yard interception return for a touchdown gave the homestanding Bruins a 14-3 lead. And for good measure, SDSU dropped a snap on a punt inside its own 15 to provide the Bruins with three more points and an insurmountable 20-3 halftime lead. The Bruins would eventually win by a 33-10 count.

After UCLA scored on its first possession (64-yard drive), the Aztecs limited the Bruins to 62 yards of total offense on five possessions, before the two critical second-quarter mistakes.

Any hopes of an Aztec comeback ended on the first series of the third quarter when UCLA marched 65 yards for a touchdown that staked UCLA to a 27-3 lead.

Two more field goals would close the scoring for UCLA. SDSU grabbed some momentum with its own touchdown drive, covering 80 yards on seven plays and capped by Brandon Bornes' third rushing TD of the season. However, after holding UCLA on its next possession, SDSU gave up the ball on an interception and UCLA cruised through the final quarter to defeat SDSU for the 19th time in 20 all-time meetings.

Michael Franklin ran for 45 yards in the game and crossed the 1,000-yard rushing mark for his career.
