

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San Diego State University



an Diego State University is the oldest and largest higher education institution in the San Diego region. Since it was founded in 1897, the university has grown to become a nationally ranked research university. Each year, SDSU provides approximately 30,000 students with the opportunity to participate in an academic curriculum distinguished by direct contact with faculty and an increasing international emphasis, preparing them for a global future.

Serving the San Diego region has always been a core part of SDSU's mission. Founded March 13, 1897, San Diego State University began as the San Diego Normal School, a training facility for elementary school teachers. Seven faculty and 91 students met in temporary quarters over a downtown drugstore before moving to a newly constructed 17-acre campus on Park Boulevard.

The curriculum was limited at first to English, history and mathematics, but course offerings broadened rapidly under the leadership of Samuel T. Black, who left his position as state superintendent of public instruction to become the new school's first president. Black served from 1898 to 1910.

From 1910 to 1935. President Edward L. Hardy headed a vigorous administration that oversaw major changes to the fledgling institution. In 1921, the Normal School became San Diego State Teachers College, a four-year public institution controlled by the state Board of Education. In that same year, the two-year San Diego Junior College, forerunner of today's local community colleges, became a branch of San Diego State, creating a union that lasted until 1946.

By the 1920s, San Diego State was already beginning to outgrow its Park Boulevard location, and San Diegans launched a campaign to build a new campus on the city's eastern border. In February 1931, students, faculty and staff moved into seven Mission-style buildings surrounding a common area still known as the Main Quad.

Four years later, the Legislature authorized expansion of degree programs beyond teacher education, and San Diego State Teachers College became San Diego State College. Also in 1935, Walter R. Hepner took the helm as president, beginning a 17-year tenure. The college continued to grow over time, reaching an enrollment of more than 25,000 students during the administration of Malcolm A. Love, who served as president from 1952 to 1971.

In 1960, San Diego State became part of the newly created California State College system, now known as the California State University system. In the early 1970s, with legislative approval, San Diego State College became San Diego State University.

Leading the institution during the 1970s were Acting President Donald E. Walker (1971-1972), President Brage Golding (1972-1977), Acting President Trevor Colbourn (1977-1978) and President Thomas B. Day, whose tenure spanned from 1978 to 1996. In 1996, Stephen



L. Weber became the university's seventh president. His 15-year tenure ended on July 5, 2011, and he was succeeded by Elliot Hirsh-

Beginning its 115th academic year in fall 2011, San Diego State University can take pride in more than a century of achievement in education, research and service. With an enrollment of approximately 30,000 students, SDSU has grown into the largest institution of higher education in the San Diego region and one of the largest in California. SDSU is increasingly becoming a top choice for undergraduates as evidenced by the record 62,271 undergraduate applications received for fall 2010.

Renowned for its academic excellence, the university is home to top-ranking programs in education, international business, social work, speech-language pathology, biology and public administration. Overall, San Diego State students can choose from 84 undergraduate majors, 76 master's programs and 18 joint doctoral degree programs and two independent doctoral degree programs.

SDSU produces thousands of graduates each year, 60 percent of whom stay in San Diego to pursue their careers, making San Diego State a primary educator of the region's work force, as well as a leader in expanding access to higher education. Committed to serving the richly diverse San Diego region, SDSU ranks among the top universities nationwide in terms of ethnic and racial diversity among its student body, as well as the number of bachelor's degrees conferred upon students of color.

Increasingly recognized for innovative research, San Diego State has achieved the prestigious designation of "Research University" with high research activity granted by the Carnegie Foundation. For the past four years, SDSU has ranked the No. 1 Research University for those with 14 or fewer Ph.D. programs according to Academic Analytic's faculty-scholarly productivity index. Since 2000, SDSU faculty and staff have attracted more than \$1 billion in grants and contracts for research and program administration. SDSU ranks among the top 150 public universities nationwide in research expenditures, and SDSU's research funding has more than doubled from a decade ago.

Founded in service. SDSU continues to be a leader in analyzing and resolving complex community problems. One example is the City Heights Educational Collaborative, an ongoing partnership with San Diego City Schools, the San Diego Education Association, teachers and parents. Funded with an \$18 million grant from Price Charities, the Collaborative is im-

proving instruction for students and professional development for teachers in three innercity schools managed by the university.

Another initiative to improve education in the San Diego region and beyond is the QUAL-COMM Institute for Innovation and Educational Success, launched in 2004 with a record \$14.5 million corporate gift from QUALCOMM. The Institute supports programs that aim to enhance math and engineering education across the K-12 spectrum, and supports efforts to revitalize performance in urban school districts nation-

Perhaps the most visible evidence of SDSU's growth is in the physical additions to campus and its continued commitment to providing a modern learning environment for students, faculty and staff. Over the past decade, the university has completed facilities totaling more than \$430 million in value. Most recently, the university opened the new Parma Payne Goodall Alumni Center. The center is a gateway for the community to access SDSU's rich assets. Not only does it serve as the first point of contact for alumni and friends visiting SDSU, but it is also a place where academic and business leaders can collaborate on ventures to benefit our community and impact our future.

Construction of a new student union building is underway, and future campus improvements set to take place include the renovation of Nasatir and Storm Halls. SDSU's Campus Master Plan will also include the addition of several facilities, including Plaza Linda Verde, a mixed-use retail and residential development and on-campus housing for approximately 1.600 additional students.

Beyond accolades and campus expansion, San Diego State University remains, as always, most proud of its alumni family, more than 200,000 strong. Among those who call SDSU their alma mater are former Federal Trade Commission Chairman Timothy Muris, former Air Force Chief of Staff, Gen. Merrill A. "Tony" Mc-Peak, San Diego County supervisors Greg Cox, Dianne Jacob, Pam Slater, Ron Roberts and Bill Horn; San Diego city council member Kevin Faulconer, National Teachers of the Year Janis Gabay (1990) and Sandra McBraver (1994). restaurant executives Ralph Rubio, co-founder of Rubio's Fresh Mexican Grill and Linda A. Lang, CEO of Jack In the Box restaurants; astronaut Ellen Ochoa and Costco CEO and cofounder Jim Sinegal.

Aztec alumni also include entertainers Marion Ross, Julie Kavner and Kathy Najimy; Hollywood producer Kathleen Kennedy; golfers Lon Hinkle and Gene Littler: baseball players Tony Gwynn, Mark Grace, Travis Lee and Graig Nettles and Stephen Strasburg; football players Marshall Faulk, Brian Sipe, Fred Dryer, Kyle Turley and Kirk Morrison; America's Cup skipper Dennis Conner; and basketball player Michael Cage.

The success of these individuals and thousands of other SDSU alumni attest eloquently to the success of their alma mater. From modest beginnings, San Diego State University has evolved into a premier center of learning, research and service.

- SDSU is the first U.S. university to offer a transnational triple degree program in international business. In fact, SDSU has the only two such programs in the country. Undergraduate students earn degrees from SDSU and universities in Mexico and Canada in the CaMexUs program, or degrees from SDSU, Mexico and Chile in the PanAmerica program.
- SDSU's International Security and Conflict Resolution (ISCOR) major is the first of its kind in California.



Aztec Culture



Aztecs and SDSU

San Diego State University first adopted the Aztec name in the 1920s as a nickname for the college's sports teams. In 1925, the student newspaper followed suit, changing its name from The Paper Lantern to The Aztec. Since that time, San Diego State's celebration of Aztec heritage has permeated the campus. In 1936, a Donald Hord sculpture of Montezuma II, the last Aztec emperor, became a welcoming campus icon. With the passing years, Aztec themes echoed in the names, colors and architectural elements of new campus buildings. And Aztec culture became the subject of more than a dozen university courses.

In 1941, Monty Montezuma, a character based on Montezuma II, debuted at San Diego State athletic events as a symbolic personification of the Aztecs. Over time, the Montezuma character's look and activities have evolved from a sports mascot into a more dignified and accurate representation of the historical emperor. Montezuma now serves as the university's ambassador of Aztec culture, charged with the responsibility of informing and educating the San Diego community about Aztec civilization. SDSU continues to take pride in its affiliation with Aztec culture and to celebrate the Aztec virtues of strength, valor and intellectual achievement.

SDSU's Aztec Heritage

From the early decades of its history, San Diego State has identified itself with the Aztecs, one of the most sophisticated and distinctive societies in the history of the Western Hemisphere. A fitting choice for a university committed to internationalism and diversity, the Aztec identity evokes great pride in Mexico, as well as among many people in the United States, and certainly within the SDSU community. Consequently, San Diego State strives to honor the Aztec people by enhancing awareness, understanding and appreciation of Aztec culture and achievements.

Aztec History

Aztec civilization dates back to at least the 12th century A.D. The precise location is still debated by scholars, but tradition tells us of a place somewhere north of modern-day Mexico City known at that time as Aztlan, which meant "the place of the cranes" or "the place of the herons." The people who lived in this land were called Azteca meaning "those of Aztlan."

The Azteca eventually left their homeland and became

known as the Mexica. Native folklore attributes this name change to the instructions of the people's patron deity, Huitzilopochtli (Hummingbird on the Left).

Around 1325, the Mexica settled on an island in Lake Texcoco, an area that is now the heart of Mexico City, and named it Tenochtitlan or "the place of the fruit of the cactus." A century later, the Mexica and two other Nahuatl-speaking city-states, Texcoco and Tlacopan, combined to create an entity popularly known as the Aztec Empire.

Boasting a strong military force, this new alliance commanded a sphere of influence that stretched across much of present-day Mexico.

Tenochtitlan and its surrounding valley evolved into a highly sophisticated, multicultural and multilingual city-state of several million inhabitants. At this same time, major European cities numbered only 30,000 to 40,000 in population. A cradle of innovation, the Aztec Empire developed advanced systems of trade, science, politics, religion, education and agriculture. The Aztecs also enjoyed sports and built grand ballcourts to accommodate team events.

University President First Year at SDSU

lliot Hirshman, the eighth president of San Diego State University, is in his first year on Montezuma Mesa following the retirement of long-time president Stephen L. Weber

Hirshman brings a broad foundation of experience to SDSU, which includes a career dedicated to excellence in teaching, research and

As provost and senior vice president for academic affairs at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, Dr. Hirshman was responsible for the delivery of the academic program, including instruction, research and academic support services; enrollment management, including admissions and financial aid; and the intercollegiate athletics program.

Dr. Hirshman oversaw the campus planning process, working with vice presidents and the planning leadership team to coordinate planning and budgeting for the campus.

Dr. Hirshman served as chief research officer

at George Washington University in Washington, D.C. Previously, he chaired the departments of psychology at George Washington (2002-05) and at the University of Colorado at Denver

He began his academic career at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (1989-2000), where he served as assistant, associate, and ultimately, full professor of psychology.

While in Chapel Hill, Dr. Hirshman was nominated for the American Council on Education Fellows Program, in which he participated as a fellow in the provost's office at Arizona State University.

Subsequently, he served as special assistant to the provost at UNC. He has chaired a number of major campus groups, including the University Task Force on Student Evaluation of Teaching at Chapel Hill and the Advisory Council on Research at George Washington.

Dr. Hirshman has a strong interdisciplinary background, having earned his undergraduate degree summa cum laude in economics and mathematics from Yale and his Ph.D. in cognitive psychology at UCLA.

His research and teaching focuses on the psychopharmacology of human cognition, exploring cognitive and quantitative models of memory, attention and visual perception, and the influence of individual drugs on specific cognitive processes. His interdisciplinary work involves collaboration among psychologists, medical doctors and statisticians.

A fellow of the American Psychological Association, Dr. Hirshman has served as the associate editor of the Journal of Experimental Psychology: Learning, Memory & Cognition (2000-2006) and Psychonomic Bulletin & Review (1998-2000).

Dr. Hirshman is married to Jeri Hirshman. His daughter, Wendy, attends Muhlenberg College in Pennsylvania. His son, Nathan, will attend the University of Virginia this fall.



Director of Athletics



im Sterk was announced as San Diego State University's Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on Feb. 10, 2010, by former SDSU President Stephen L. Weber.

Sterk was hired just in time to see the Aztecs experience one of the best seasons on the playing field and in the classroom in school history.

In fact, in Sterk's first 20 days at his new job, the San Diego State men's and women's basketball teams claimed the Mountain West Conference tournament championship. Then he watched both programs advance to the NCAA tournament and was on site when the women's program upset Texas and West Virginia en route to advancing to the Sweet 16 for the first time in school history.

In 2009-10, San Diego State set school records in the Learfield Directors' Cup, which rewards overall athletic success, by having eight sports earn points. The Aztecs finished 65th out of all Division I schools nationally.

In 2010-11, the Aztecs' successful run continued as the football team won the Poinsettia Bowl, while teams went deep into the postseason.

The men's hoops squad shared the MWC regular-season crown, claimed the MWC tournament championship and won its first-ever NCAA tournament game before eventually advancing to the Sweet 16. The men's golf program, meanwhile, captured its first Mountain West and NCAA Regional titles en route to a berth in the national championship.

In addition, the women's swimming and diving completed an undefeated dual-meet campaign and won its first-ever Mountain West title, softball advanced to the NCAA championship, women's golf qualified for the NCAA West Regionals, and the women's track and field squad scored at the national meet.

This past April a school-record 256 individuals were honored as scholar student-athletes at the year-end banquet. "Division I athletics is an important tradition at San Diego State and increasingly a big part of the SDSU student experience," said Sterk. "We are building on that tradition and reaching out to students, staff, alumni and the entire community."

Sterk, 55, came to SDSU from Washington State University where he served as athletic director since 2000. Prior to his hiring at WSU, he served as AD at Portland State University from 1995 to 2000. He brings 24 years of experience in athletics administration performing a variety of roles. His appointment followed a national search.

Sterk also has a solid reputation and the respect of his peers across the country. The NCAA recognized him in 2006 as the Division IA Athletic Directors' "Pro-

gram of Excellence."

Sterk oversaw a period of unparalleled suc-

Sterk oversaw a period of unparalleled success at Washington State with historic accomplishments both on and off the field.

Over his last three years at WSU, 13 Cougar teams competed in NCAA postseason tournaments, including back-to-back trips by the men's basketball team (2007 and 2008), while women's rowing earned five NCAA championship bids, including a fourth-place finish in 2006, the highest finish ever by a WSU women's team in NCAA competition

Academically, the graduation rate for those student-athletes who exhausted their eligibility at WSU was 92 percent over his final 10 years,

ranking second in the Pac-10 to Stanford.

WSU student-athletes maintained a 3.01 average cumulative GPA in 2008-09, and for 10 consecutive semesters, averaged at least a 3.00 cumulative GPA.

WSU Athletic Foundation membership doubled under Sterk, and annual gifts increased from just under \$3 million in 2000 to more than \$13 million in 2008.

Sterk, during his tenure at WSU, served as chair of the Pac-10 Athletic Directors committee and served on numerous other Pacific-10 Conference committees. Sterk was also a member of the prestigious NCAA championship/competition cabinet.

Sterk graduated from Western Washington University in 1980, where he earned four letters in football and one in basketball. He was credited with a school-record 164 tackles during the 1977 season, garnering first-team NAIA District I all-star accolades. He was named team captain and MVP helping the Vikings to the district championship game. On Feb. 6, 2010, Sterk was inducted into Western Washington's Athletics Hall of Fame for his success in football.

Sterk received his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University. His professional career has also included positions at North Carolina, Maine, Seattle Pacific, Tulane and Portland State, the latter as director of athletics for five years before joining the Washington State staff.

Sterk and his wife Debra have three children: Ashley (22), Amy (19), and Abby (16).

What Boosters Need to Know **About NCAA Rules and Regulations**

The support and loyalty of Aztec supporters are cornerstones of San Diego State University and Aztec Athletics. As dedicated supporters, we ask for your commitment to compliance with NCAA, conference and SDSU rules and regulations. The eligibility of SDSU studentathletes depends greatly upon your understanding of these rules.

Per NCAA regulations, the university is held responsible for the actions of our boosters. Boosters may not engage in any recruitment activities or provide benefits or privileges to prospective or enrolled student-athletes. The SDSU Department of Athletics is proud to have your loyal support and continued interest in our athletic programs. As we strive for excellence, we must always seek the highest standard of ethical conduct. With your assistance and cooperation, we believe these goals can be accomplished.

Who Are Representatives or Boosters?

You are considered a "representative of athletics interests" (i.e., booster) of San Diego State University if:

- You have made a financial contribution to Aztec Athletics including the Aztec Club. Director's Cabinet, Big 50, Big 64, RBI Club, or a sports specific varsity club.
- You are a corporate sponsor or courtesy car provider.
- You are a member of an organization that promotes an athletic team.
- You have assisted in the recruitment of a prospective student-athlete.
- You have employed a student-athlete.
- You have assisted a student-athlete in locating a job.
- You have provided assistance or a benefit to a student-athlete or their family.

Once you become an SDSU booster, you retain that status indefinitely.

Remember, As a Booster You May Not:

- · Be involved in the recruitment of a student-athlete.
- · Provide any benefit, inducement or arrangement such as cash, clothing, equipment, cars, transportation, gifts, or loans to a prospective or current student-athlete.
- Engage in any conversation more than a "hello" with prospective student-athletes or their parents or quardians.
- Make in-person recruiting contacts with prospects or their parents or guardians.
- · Make telephone calls or write letters to prospects or their parents or guardians.

Who Are Prospective Student-Athletes?

A prospect is:

- · Any student enrolled in the 9th grade or above.
- · Any student enrolled in a two-year college or prep school.
- Any student not vet enrolled or officially withdrawn from a four-year institution.
- · Any other individual who has been recruited by an SDSU staff member or booster.

Who Are Enrolled Student-Athletes?

An enrolled student-athlete:

- · Is a member of an NCAA intercollegiate athletic team.
- · May interact with boosters, but may not have relationships that include extra benefits.

Boosters and Job Programs

If you are interested in employing any student-athlete, you must first contact the Athletics Financial Aid Coordinator at 619-594-4152 to ensure proper employment. Your employment of student-athletes is a beneficial experience as they build a life outside of athletics. However, you must remember:

- · You may pay only for work actually performed.
- You may pay only the going rate in that locality for similar services.
- You may not provide transportation to or from the job site unless the employer transports all employees.

Extra Benefits

A staff member or booster may not offer or provide any benefits to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete, or their relatives or friends, other than those expressly permitted by NCAA legislation. An extra benefit is any special arrangement to provide a benefit which is not generally available to the general student body.

Examples of extra benefits include:

- · Arrangements of employment for relatives.
- · Gifts of clothing or equipment.
- · Co-signing of loans.
- · Loans to relatives or friends.
- Cash or like items.
- · Any tangible items, such as merchandise.
- Free or reduced-cost services, rentals or purchases.
- · Free or discounted meals at a restaurant.
- Free or reduced-cost housing.
- Use of an institution's athletics equipment.

This is the Mountain West

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MW continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its 13th year, the MW has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West has marked several achievements over its first 12 years of existence, most notably becoming the first to establish a sports television network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference (The Mtn.). The Mountain West also was the first to experiment with the coaches' challenge in the college football instant replay system, and was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games. winning three. Additionally, the Mountain West was the first conference to have a member institution with No. 1 overall picks in both the NFL and NBA drafts in the same year (Utah's Alex Smith and Andrew Bogut, respectively in 2005). With San Diego State's Stephen Strasburg claiming the No. 1 pick in the 2009 MLB Draft, the Mountain West is one of two conferences to have the No. 1 selection in each of the NFL. NBA and MLB drafts since the MW was founded in 1999. In 2011-12, the Mountain West will be among the first conferences to implement a league-wide state-of-the art basketball instant replay system.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders three MW institutions (Air Force, newest member Boise State and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West) and the Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State. The southwestern flavor of New Mexico complements the western heritage and culture of Fort Worth, Texas, home of TCU.

History

The Mountain West was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming —

decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference. The split from a former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Three of the MW's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV and TCU entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MW in 1999. TCU re-joined the group with its first year of competition in the Mountain West in 2005-06. Effective July 1, 2011, Boise State became the newest member. Fresno State and Nevada will ioin the Mountain West effective July 1, 2012. Also on July 1, 2012, Hawai'i will become a football-only member of the Conference.

When the Mountain West officially began operations on July 1, 1999, the new league had in place a seven-year contract with ESPN, giving the broadcaster exclusive national television rights to MW football and men's basketball, and three-year agreements to send the league's football champion to the Liberty Bowl and a second team to the Las Vegas Bowl. Commissioner Craig Thompson also arranged a third bowl tie-in each of the first three seasons (1999 Motor City, 2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans) before securing a four-year deal with the Emerald Bowl in San Francisco in 2002. Entering the 2011 season, the MW has four contracted bowl affiliations - the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas, San Diego Country Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, AdvoCare V100 Independence Bowl and Gildan New Mexico Bowl.

An innovator in the postseason bowl structure, the MW engineered many "firsts," as league teams have participated in five inaugural bowl games (2000 Silicon Valley, 2001 New Orleans, 2002 San Francisco (Emerald), 2005 Poinsettia, 2006 New Mexico), as well as placing the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS team into a BCS bowl game with Utah's appearance in the 2005 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

2010-11 Review

From the gridiron to the diamond, Mountain West teams enjoyed an outstanding year in 2010-11. For the third consecutive year, the MW sent a record five football teams to bowl games, posting the best win percentage among the 11 FBS conferences for the fourth time in seven years. The Mountain West finished with a 4-1 (.800) mark in postseason play and claimed the

2010-11 Bowl Challenge Cup, becoming the only conference to win the trophy four times since the award's inception in 2002-03. Two MW teams were ranked in the final BCS Standings and USA Today/ESPN Coaches polls for the third straight year. TCU's No. 3 BCS ranking marked the highest finish by a non-automatic-qualifying team in the final BCS Standings, surpassing the Horned Frogs' No. 4 ranking in 2009. The Horned Frogs' automatic bid to the Rose Bowl marked the MW's fourth BCS bowl game since 2004. The MW set a record for attendance with 1.86 million fans coming to football games in the 2010 season.

Opportunity

The Mountain West provides a first-class athletic and academic experience for more than 7,000 student-athletes each year. Over the past 12 years, 35 MW student-athletes have earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships, and since the league's inception in 1999, an additional 24 student-athletes have been named MW Scholar-Athlete of the Year and awarded league-sponsored postgraduate scholarships. Three student-athletes have earned distinction as Rhodes Scholars (Jessica Mellinger, Wyoming and Delavane Diaz and Brittany Morreale, Air Force).

Student-athletes are also given a voice regarding pertinent issues within the MW and NCAA governance structure through representation on the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC). The Mountain West SAAC consists of 17 representatives; two student-athletes from each member institution and one faculty athletics representative. The committee reviews and reacts to legislation and to other topics referred by the MW constituent groups or committees related to the student-athlete experience.

Sportsmanship

Named a Sports Ethics Fellow by the Institute for International Sport in 1998, Commissioner Thompson has been a driving force for sportsmanship within intercollegiate athletics. As part of its continuing growth and development, the Mountain West implemented an extensive Sportsmanship Initiative, endorsed by both the MW Joint Council and MW Board of Directors. The program is made up of several elements, which are both practical and philosophical in nature. While the MW has significant penalties in place to deal with violations, the Sportsmanship Initiative is primarily promotional and educational in nature. The goal is to develop an environment that fosters appropriate behavior from all Conference constituencies.

Qualcomm Stadium

n September 15, 1967, the San Diego State University football team first stepped onto the turf of what Sports Illustrated would later call the finest multi-purpose stadium in America - San Diego Stadium. That night, the Aztecs, led by head coach Don Coryell and players like Haven Moses, Fred Dryer, Tom Nettles and Nate Wright, defeated Tennessee State 16-8 in front of 45,822 fans.

In an effort to prepare the stadium for the next century, a \$66.4 million renovation project was undertaken in 1997, which increased seating to 71,400, added 31 luxury suites; created 7,600 club seats, and added a second Sony Jumbotron video board in the West end.

To help in financing of the renovation project, Qualcomm, a local communications company, agreed to provide \$18 million for the naming rights of the Stadium for the next 20 years. The Stadium is now known as Qualcomm Stadium. Qualcomm Stadium is located at the intersection of Interstates 8 and 15 in Mission Valley, less than five miles from the university. Indeed, San Diego State is one of the facility's two charter tenants, the other being the San Diego Chargers of the National Football League. In the 30 years since that opening night, some of the greatest names in Aztec football history have displayed their talents there - Dennis Shaw, Brian Sipe, Isaac Curtis, Willie Buchanon, Todd Santos, Webster Slaughter, Rob Awalt, Don Warren, Dan McGwire, Henry Allison, Claudie Minor, Jesse Freitas, Craig Penrose, David "Deacon" Turner, Darnay Scott and Marshall Faulk to name a few.

In addition to the Aztecs and Chargers, the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsetta Bowl and the Holiday Bowl have come to call it home. The Stadium has been the site of such renowned events as the Super Bowl, the World Series and baseball's All-Star Game.

Constructed at a cost of \$27 million, San Diego Stadium opened August 20, 1967, with an exhibition game between the Chargers and Detroit Lions. Since that game, the facility has been the stage for some of the most memorable events in San Diego State football history. A then-record attendance of 53,611 was on hand November 8, 1975, when the unbeaten Aztecs were involved in one of the most dramatic games ever played in San Diego, but the Arizona Wildcats prevailed, 31-24.

In 1975, average attendance for six home games was 42,040. In '77, a crowd of 50,453 saw the Aztecs hammer 15th-ranked Florida State, 41-16. On January 6, 1981, the name of the facility was changed officially to San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium. Murphy, a nationally-known columnist and the sports editor of the San Diego Union-Tribune, had led the campaign to have the stadium constructed. He had died in 1980.

In 1984, 49,220 fans nearly carried SDSU to an upset of UCLA, as the Bruins hung on to an 18-15 victory. The Aztecs clinched their first Western Athletic Conference championship and a berth in the Holiday Bowl with a 10-3 victory over Brigham Young on November 29, 1986, in front of a Stadium crowd of 45,062. SDSU then played host to lowa in one of the most memorable Holiday Bowls ever. The hometown Aztecs fought the perennial Big Ten power to a standstill before losing 39-38 on a last second Hawkeye field goal. A crowd of 59,473 witnessed that game on December 30, 1986, which was the largest crowd ever to see SDSU in San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium. State's large and vocal crowds have had much to cheer about through the years. As they await the 2010 season, the Aztecs' all time record in Mission Valley is 170-92-6 (.634).

The stadium underwent a major facelift in 1985. Built initially to seat 52,675 for football, the expansion project pushed capacity to 60,409, and current capacity is 70,561. Largely



as a result, the National Football League voted to hold the 1988 Super Bowl game in San Diego where the Washington Redskins defeated the Denver Broncos, 42-10. That national spectacle returned in 1998 to witness the Denver Broncos defeat the Green Bay Packers, 31-24. The most recent Super Bowl hosted by the Q was 2003, when the Tampa Bay Buccaneer's routed the Oakland Raiders, 48-21.

Prior to the stadium's opening, the Aztecs played their games in Aztec Bowl - a 13,000-seat facility on campus - and the 34,500-seat Balboa Stadium downtown. The team's record crowd had been the 35,342 fans who jammed Balboa Stadium to see the Aztecs meet North Dakota State in 1966. North Dakota State was the No. 1 small college team in the nation at the time, but the Aztecs won the game 36-0. The victory served as a springboard for San Diego State's national small college championships in 1966, '67 and '68 and a move to Division I-A following the end of the 1968 season.

San Diego State moved to what is now Qualcomm Stadium. From 1936-66, the Aztecs played most of their home games in Aztec Bowl on campus, where they had a record of 77-44-5 (.636).

From 1921-35, the team's home field alternated between Balboa Stadium (38-42-4) and Lane Field (12-12-4) with an occasional game played on the old Normal School campus at College Field (9-3-1). Two games were also played at Aztec Field, the old track and field stadium which was located north of the Aztec Center. Since 1973, nearly 75% of all Aztec football games have been played at night. The Aztecs played their first and San Diego's first night football game on September 25, 1930, at Lane Field against the San Diego Marine. IVs

Naming of the Stadium

The original name of the stadium was San Diego Stadium. When Jack Murphy died on September 24, 1980, then Mayor Pete Wilson and the City Council voted to rename it San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium. The voters officially approved the name change later that year.

After the 1997 renovation, the name changed again. Qualcomm, a local telecommunication company, agreed to pay the City \$18 million to complete the expansion project. In return the name changed to Qualcomm Stadium. The current naming rights deal expires in 2017.

After the first quarter, credentials may be picked up at the San Diego State Ticket Office (located at Gate E).

Members must have a valid form of government issued identification to obtain a credential.

Qualcomm Stadium is an open-press box facility. Please be aware that fall evenings in the San Diego area can be cool

Credentials

All requests for press and photo credentials should be submitted to the media relations office on official letterhead at least one week in advance of the game. Requests should be directed to Mike May and should be submitted by the sports editor or sports director of the media outlet.

Priority is given to daily newspapers, television stations and radio stations with sports programming.

If approved, credentials will be mailed only when specifically requested, and at the risk of the applicant. Those not delivered by mail, in person, or through the visiting director of media relations, will be left at the Qualcomm Stadium Press Entrance (Gate H) and will be available beginning two and a half hours prior to kickoff

Credentials will be issued to working media only. Family and friends are not allowed in the press area.

SEASON CREDENTIALS

A season credential form will be sent out in August to outlets which cover SDSU athletics on a regular basis. This season, any individual seeking a season credential will need to submit a photo for the credential.

Only those outlets which routinely cover Aztec practices and media conferences are eligible for season credentials.

SINGLE-GAME CREDENTIALS

Requests should be made for single-game credentials at least one week prior to the game. Any organization that requests a single-game credential and does not use it, may not be granted another pass for the remainder of the season. No credentials will be granted after Thursday of game week.

Qualcomm Stadium

Qualcomm Stadium is the home of the SDSU Aztecs and the San Diego Chargers, as well as the site of the Holiday Bowl and the Poinsettia Bowl. The stadium is located off Interstate 8, just west of Interstate 15. Enter from the north off of Friars Road.

The media entrance and media will call are at Gate H. The open-air press box can be reached by taking Elevator 4 (elevator closest to the press gate) to stadium level 2A.

GAME PARKING

Parking passes at Qualcomm Stadium are limited and will be prioritized similar to the way credentials are issued. Media parking is in the H1 lot and game credentials can be used to access the lot. Visiting media parking should be requested through the opponent's media relations office.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Working media will be provided with pregame notes, a game program, flip card, and quarterly and final sta-

tistics, including postgame notes and quotes. An inhouse television system provides updates and replays during the game. Video and audio of Rocky Long's postgame news conference will also be available. Postgame notes, quotes and final stats will also be available on GoAztecs.com following the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only accredited photographers on assignment will be issued sideline credentials for Aztec home games — per NCAA guidelines. The NCAA also specifies that photo shooting must take place outside the restraining line that encircles the playing field and outside of the team areas (25-yard line to 25-yard line).

TELEPHONES. FAXING AND INTERNET

The media relations office will provide four charge-percall phones in the visiting media's section of the press box for all home games. The phones are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Media requiring special service are urged to order individual phone lines through Gary Brashear at Qualcomm Stadium, (619) 281-1500. Those requiring their own phone instruments should make arrangements through their local AT&T representative. Phone lines for originating radio stations, as designated by the opposing athletic department, will be provided through the Mountain West co-op agreement.

Postgame faxing service is also available by contacting a member of the media relations office.

Wireless Internet is available, free of charge, in the main area of the press box.

POSTGAME POLICY

The Aztec locker room is closed. Head coach Rocky Long and selected players will be available at a postgame news conference in the interview room located just down the hall from the Aztec locker room. Video and audio from that news conference will be available in the press box. There is no formal postgame format involving the visiting coaches or players.

No postgame interviews will take place on the field without the prior approval of the media relations office.

For postgame purposes, the Aztec and visiting team locker rooms, and the postgame interview room at Qualcomm Stadium are located at the B2 level of the facility. That level can be reached via the press elevator and heading left.





On Aug. 26, 2004, College Sports Television (CSTV) and the Mountain West announced a visionary partnership that revolutionized the college sports landscape. The landmark agreement was the first NCAA Division I football and men's basketball conference-wide deal for CSTV. The advent of the new television model gave CSTV exclusive rights to all Conference events, including cable and satellite television coverage, national over-the-air and satellite radio, video-on-demand and online broadcast rights.
