




Tony **Bland**

Coming off an outstanding inaugural season, Bland looks to join the ranks of the nation's elite players this year... One of the nation's most versatile players... Has triple-double potential... Became the first player in Mountain West Conference history to rank in the league's top 10 in scoring and assists and top 20 in rebounding in the same season... Earned honorable mention all-conference honors last season from the coaches and he becomes the Aztecs' first returning all-league selection since Anthony Watson in 1985-86... Has one of

the best mid-range games in the country, possessing the ability to create space off the dribble... Enters his senior campaign with 875 points, 227 rebounds and 218 assists... Played in 97 games and has logged 65 starts... A proven winner who has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in each of his three collegiate seasons... His three college squads have posted an amazing 69-30 record and have reached the 20-win plateau each season... Has the ability to play both guard positions equally effective... Brings a level of enthusiasm and leadership that has endeared him to Aztec fans... Left

Syracuse University following his sophomore season to be closer to his family, in Los Angeles.

As A Junior (2001-02)

MWC Rankings: 4th in assists (3.39), 7th in scoring (15.7), 8th in assist/turnover ratio (1.18), 13th in free throw percentage (.710), 20th in rebounding (4.0).

Named honorable mention all-Mountain West Conference by the league coaches... Became the first player in Mountain West Conference history to rank among the top 10 in scoring and assists and the top 20 in rebounding... Led San Diego State in minutes played (1,140), minutes per game (34.5), free-throws made (120), free-throw attempts (169) and assists (112)... Was second on the squad in points per game (15.7), points (519), steals (34), free-throw percentage (.710) and three-point field goals made (29)... His 519 points in 2001-02 was the 13th highest single-season total in SDSU history... Scored in double figures in 29-of-33 contests... Led the team in scoring nine times, in rebounding five times and in assists a team-best 14 times... Saw action in all 33 games, making 32 starts (his lone non-start was Senior Night when Steve Fisher started five seniors)... His 1,140 minutes played were the most since the statistic started being kept at San Diego State in 1978-79... It broke the old mark of 1,070 held by Michael Cage (1982-83)... Helped lead the Aztecs to their first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1985, and made the third NCAA Tournament appearance of his career (went while playing at Syracuse in 1998-99 and 1999-00)... Earned Mountain West Conference Player of the Week honors on Dec. 3 after scoring 20 points against UC San Diego (11-27-01) and 22 points versus Cal State Northridge (12-1-01)... Was the Aztec nominee for the conference's weekly award five times... Scored a career-high 33 points on 12-of-19 shooting from the field and added six rebounds and five assists in a victory over Houston (1-29-02)... His 33-point effort represents the most points scored by an Aztec player during the Steve Fisher era... Had his highest Mountain West Conference scoring output in Fort Collins, Colo., when he tallied 23 points, connecting on 10-of-

14 attempts from the field as the Aztecs claimed their first win at Colorado State (2-16-02) in 20 years... At one point scored in double figures in 15 consecutive games and had 20-plus points in six consecutive contests... Had a San Diego State season-best nine assists, along with 24 points, against Norfolk State (11-21-02)... Scored 20 or more points in six consecutive games, becoming the first Aztec player to accomplish the feat since the 1985-86 season when Anthony Watson put together a seven-game streak... Played 31 or more minutes in 31-of-33 games (the two games he played less than 30 minutes in were SDSU blowouts vs. UC San Diego (98-53) and Eastern Washington (86-58))... Despite compiling major playing time in his two seasons at Syracuse (played in 63 games and logged 1,171 minutes), he posted better numbers as a junior than his first two collegiate seasons combined in points (519 vs. 356), rebounds (131 vs. 96), and assists (112-106)... Also had career season-best numbers recorded in steals and blocked shots... Named the Mountain West Conference Newcomer of the Year by the media prior to the season and also earned a spot on the Ford Red Raider Classic All-Tournament Team for his performance in games against Northern

Iowa and Texas Tech to open the 2001-02 season.

As A Soph. at Syracuse (1999-00)

Was one of three Orangemen to start all 32 games... Syracuse reached the "Sweet 16" before falling to eventual national champion Michigan State in Auburn Hills... The Orangemen were co-Big East Conference champions and ended the season with a 26-6 record, 13-3 in league action... Averaged 6.7 points, 1.6 rebounds and 1.7 assists as a sophomore... Set a career best with a 22-point outing vs. West Virginia... Scoring average prorated over 40 minutes was 12.8 points... Made four three-point field goals (in nine attempts) in a home game against Notre Dame... Also had six assists vs. Notre Dame... Had 11 double-digit scoring games... Canned 20 of his 32 free-throw attempts on the season... Posted no turnovers in 11 games during the 1999-2000 campaign, including the first three games of the season against Princeton, Wisconsin and Florida Atlantic.

As A Fr. at Syracuse (1998-99 Season)

Played in 32 of 33 games for an NCAA tournament team... Orangemen lost in the first round of the 1999 NCAA Tournament to Oklahoma State... Syracuse ended the season 21-12 overall and 10-8 in Big East play... Averaged 4.4

points, 1.4 rebounds, 1.6 assists and 15.7 minutes per contest... Had 27 steals and 51 assists as a frosh... Actually attempted eight more free throws (40) as a freshman than he did as a sophomore, despite seeing less playing time... Made first career start vs. St. Bonaventure on Dec. 27... Scored in double figures five times, including a season-high 15 points against Chaminade (11-23-98).

High School

A two-time high school All-American at Westchester High in Los Angeles... Lettered four years, all-section pick four years, all-city selection three years and team captain three years... Led Westchester to the state championship and a number three national ranking his senior season.

Born Jan. 27, 1980, in Los Angeles... Son of Anthony Bland... Has two sisters, Aujia and Meshone... Majoring in sociology... Wears a tattoo on his right bicep of a cross with a rose running through it and a scroll of names and dates of deceased family members... Played pickup basketball in Green Meadows Park against the likes of Michael Cooper, Norm Nixon, Baron Davis, Paul Pierce, Andre Miller and Larry Drew, among others.



1,000 Points in 24 Months

Only two of the 19 members of San Diego State's 1,000-point club were able to accomplish the feat in just two seasons. Kim Goetz scored 1,005 points in 54 games during the 1978-79 seasons, while Randy Holcomb compiled 1,002 points in 61 games during the 2001-02 campaigns. Through his first season as an Aztec, Tony Bland is on pace to become the third San Diego State player to do it. Bland has 519 points.



The most decorated basketball recruit ever to attend San Diego State, Burns was ranked as one of the 20 best high school prospects by five major recruiting publications... He is the first McDonald's All-American to enroll at San Diego State and the eighth such player to be inked by head coach Steve Fisher.

High School

Averaged 22.7 points and 10.5 rebounds as a senior for coach Harvey Kitani while leading Fairfax to the Los Angeles city finals... In addition to earning prep All-American honors, he was a third-team *Parade* All-America selection, all-state selection, *Los Angeles Times* Central City Player of the Year and was nominated for California Mr. Basketball... Participated in the McDonald's High School All-American game at Madison Square Garden in New York City (4-4-02) and the Jordan Capital Classic at the MCI Center in Washington D.C. (4-11-02)... Started for the West squad in the McDonald's game, scoring 11 points in the contest... Entering his senior campaign, Burns was named a third-team All-American and first-team Los Angeles All-Metro by *Street & Smith's*, the number three small forward in the nation by *Athlon*, the number 10 player in the country by *Basketball News*, the number 11 player nationally by *Hoop Scoop*, 12th-ranked player nationally by *Lindy's*, the 13th-ranked player by theInsider.com, the 14th-rated player by *The Sporting News* and the 17th-top prospect by *All-Star Report*... As a junior in 2000-01, Burns averaged 23.5 points, 8.3 rebounds, 3.1 assists and 2.1 blocked shots a game.







High School



His three-year career totals (including his freshman campaign at Vanderbilt) have yielded some impressive numbers including 86 games, 51 starts, 2,081 minutes played, 295 assists and 385 points... Has a career assist-to-turnover ratio of 2.03-to-1.

As A Junior (2001-02 Season)

One of six players to see action in all 33 games, he made 19 starts during the season (fifth-highest total on the squad)... Started the first eight games of the season and 12 of the final 14 games... The Aztecs were 13-6 in games in which Moore started... Was second on the team in assists (93), second in three-point field goal percentage (39.0), third in three-point field goals made (39.0 percent), fourth in steals (33) and fifth in scoring (119 points/3.6 ppg)... Led San Diego State in assists 10 times (second on the squad) and has now done so in 27 games

in his two-year Aztec career... His 829 minutes were fourth highest on the team, despite overcoming shin splints in the opening half of the season that not only limited his playing time, but also his practice time... When he was completely healthy, he proved to be as good as any point guard in the league... Ended the season by committing just three turnovers in the final six games covering 187 minutes (one turnover every 31.2 minutes)... Scored a season-high 13 points against







A great rebounder whose offensive skills have continued to improve... His per-minute productivity has been outstanding his first two seasons and he will likely see his overall numbers improve as his playing time increases... A natural power forward who has the ability to step outside and hit the mid-range jumper... As aggressive on the offensive glass as any player in the MWC... With 44 career blocked shots, he will likely begin climbing the school's career chart this season... He tied for fifth on the squad in rebounds last season despite playing the ninth-most minutes on the squad... Averaged 11.2 boards per 40 minutes of action.

As A Sophomore (2001-02 Season)

MWC Rankings: 7th in blocked shots (0.88).

One of six players to see action in all 33 games... San Diego State team rank-

ings: second in blocked shots (29), tied for fifth in rebounding (102/3.1 per game), tied for seventh in steals (16), eighth in scoring (81/2.5 per game) and ninth in minutes played (364/11.0 per game)... Connected on 37-of-66 field goal attempts for 56.1 percent... That figure would have not only led the team but would have ranked second in the Mountain West Conference had he qualified...
