The Cougars have won the last three meetings between the teams and eight of the last 10 games. SDSU's last victory over BYU came in 2000 when the Aztecs pulled out a come-from-behind 16-15 victory in Provo. Brigham Young holds a 12-2 advantage in Provo. The first meeting in the series came in 1947 with another the next year. The series did not resume until 1970.

# TEAM NOTES

## The Game

The San Diego State Aztecs, now 2-6 overall and 0-4 in the Mountain West Conference, will try to get their first league win Saturday when they travel to Utah to face the Brigham Young Cougars. The Aztecs have dropped five straight games since knocking off Nevada, 27-10. It is SDSU's longest losing streak since opening 2002 with an 0-5 record. Brigham Young is 4-4 overall and 3-1 in conference play. The Cougars are coming off an open week after winning at Air Force, 41-24, on Oct. 23rd.

## The Doldrums

The Aztecs head to Provo anxious for a victory. San Diego State has lost five straight games for the first time since dropping the first five games of the 2002 season. The Aztecs have lost four straight conference games for the first time since 2001 when they won their league opener over Colorado State and then lost five straight conference games before closing the season with a victory over Wyoming.

## Conference Stops And Starts

For the first time as a Division I program, San Diego State has opened league play with four straight losses. In 1960, while still in the small-college ranks, San Diego State went 0-5 in California Collegiate Athletic Association play.

## Aztecs and Cougars

Brigham Young holds a healthy 21-6-1 series lead over the Aztecs, including wins in the last three games and eight of the last nine. In Provo, San Diego State has just two wins in 14 visits. The most recent win at BYU came in 2000 when Nate Tandberg booted a field goal with one second left to help the Aztecs rally past the Cougars, 16-15. SDSU's only other win at Brigham Young came in 1992 when the Aztecs outscored the Cougars, 45-38.

## Aztecs And Cougars, Part II

San Diego State and Brigham Young provided the old Western Athletic Conference with some of its greatest offensive performances. Some of the more memorable matchups include the infamous 52-52 tie in 1991. That game can be seen on a semi-regular basis on ESPN Classic. In 1992, the Aztecs outscored the Cougars by a 45-38. The following year it was BYU with a 45-44 victory. The close calls continued for a fourth straight year when Brigham Young claimed a 35-28 win in 1994.

## Last Year In San Diego

It was par for the series as two of the league's best defenses gave way to the offensive-minded tradition of the series. The Cougars were 44-36 winners in San Diego in a game that featured more than 800 yards of offense. It was a big-play night with Brigham Young's Reynaldo Brathwaite ripping off a 95-yard touchdown run and San Diego State's Jeff Webb hauling in touchdown passes of 70 and 55 yards. The two teams also combined to lose five fumbles (the Aztecs returned two for touchdowns).

## Last Time In Provo

San Diego State's 3-0 conference start came to a screeching halt in a 34-10 loss. San Diego State played the game without its top two rushers (James Truvillion and Michael Franklin) and all-everything receiver J.R. Tolver was knocked out of the game early. He returned later but was a non-factor after sitting out nearly all of the first half. SDSU trailed 20-0 at halftime. While the high-flying Aztec offense struggled, the defense intercepted three passes, recovered a fumble and Freddie Keaiaho blocked a punt in the loss. SDSU managed just 246 yards of total offense.

## Scouting Brigham Young

The Cougars enter the San Diego State game with a 4-4 overall record and a 3-1 mark in conference play. Brigham Young was idle over the past weekend after knocking off Air Force on Oct. 23, 41-24. BYU's heavyweight non-conference schedule included a win over Notre Dame and losses at Stanford and Boise State. Former Grossmont College standout Todd Watkins leads the BYU receiving corps with 44 catches for 860 yards and four touchdowns. He averages 107.5 receiving yards per game.

## Webb And The Cougars

San Diego State's Jeff Webb has blossomed into one of the Mountain West Conference's top receivers. His coming-out party took place last season against Brigham Young. The then-sophomore had 10 catches for 253 yards and three touchdowns in the loss. It was the ninth-best receiving day by an Aztec.

## Webb Gems

Jeff Webb has evolved into San Diego State's most lethal offensive weapon during his junior year. Against Utah, he added another chapter to his highlight reel with his weekly one-handed reception (this one for a touchdown) to keep the Aztecs close to No. 9 Utah. He finished the game with nine catches for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Webb is now seventh nationally with 7.25 receptions per game. He ranks 17th in the country with his 91.5 receiving yards per game.

## Webb All-Time

The San Diego State receiving tradition includes the likes of Haven Moses, Darnay Scott, Webster Slaughter, Az Hakim, Isaac Curtis, Will Blackwell and Patrick Rowe. Going further back, the names of Tom Reynolds, Tom Nettles and Gary Garrison still dot the record book. More recently (2002), the dynamic duo of J.R. Tolver (Dolphins) and Kassim Osgood (Chargers) made waves when they set an NCAA record for catches (236) and receiving yards (3,337) by teammates in a season. Junior wide-out Jeff Webb is on the brink of joining that prestigious list. He is now tied for ninth all-time at San Diego State with 129 career receptions. Webb has 732 receiving yards this season after entering 2004 with 918 career receiving yards. He has six 100-yard receiving games in his career. That ties him for 12th all-time at State in that category.

## Receiver Review

Statistically speaking, two of the Mountain West Conference's top three receivers will be on display Saturday in Provo. San Diego State's Jeff Webb, Brigham Young's Todd Watkins and Colorado State's David Anderson lead the league in both receptions and receiving yards per game. Webb was a big winner in the head-to-head matchup with Anderson. Against Colorado State, Webb had seven catches for 129 yards and a touchdown. Anderson was limited to just three catches for 32 yards.

## Countdown To 1,000

Jeff Webb needs to average 89.3 receiving yards over the final three games of the season to reach 1,000 yards for the year. J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood were the last Aztecs to accomplish the feat when both players broke the 1,000-yard mark in 2002. Webb had a career-best 706 receiving yards last season. His year was cut short by a shoulder injury at UNLV, the same game in which the Aztecs lost Lynell Hamilton for the season (and for 2004 as it turned out). He has already passed last year's season total with his 732 receiving yards.

## Ortiz, Please

San Diego State's second-leading receiver is Robert Ortiz with 39 catches for 527 yards. His yardage total this season is already the best in his Aztec career and he has already surpassed his best season total for catches. Ortiz, who originally joined the program as a walk-on, has four touchdown catches in 2004. Ortiz now has 997 career receiving yards at San Diego State.

**Bornes' Identity**

How do you replace a freshman All-America running back, with another freshman of course. San Diego State has played 2004 without 1,000-yard rusher Lynell Hamilton, a first-team all-Mountain West selection and a first-team freshman All-American in 2003. On Saturday night against Utah, red-shirt freshman Brandon Bornes took some big steps, 112 to be exact, toward filling that void. Bornes ripped up Utah for 112 yards on just 17 carries, including a 41-yard run in the first half. He averaged 6.6 yards per rush and for the season is now averaging 5.2 yards per carry. Bornes had a 40-yard kickoff return against Colorado State. It was the longest return by the Aztecs since the 2001 season.

**Signing Day To Game Day**

For the past two seasons, San Diego State's recruiting classes have been ranked as the best in the Mountain West Conference. It's a good thing because, due to injury, many of the younger players on the squad now play very key roles. The Aztecs are playing no fewer than nine freshmen on offense (offensive linemen Brandyn Dombrowski, Mike Kravetz and Will Robinson, receivers Brett Swain and Chazeray Schilens, running back Brandon Bornes, quarterback Kevin O'Connell and tight ends Lance Louis and Eric Miclot). O'Connell has started the last two games, Bornes has led the team in rushing each of the past two weeks, Louis had his first career reception against Utah and all three offensive linemen have started at least one game this season. On defense, redshirt freshman linemen Antwan Applewhite and Nicholas Osborn have been the biggest contributors.

**Special Teams, Too**

However young the offense may be, its players still have seniority over the special teams crew. San Diego State's long snapper is true freshman Tyler Schmitt, its ranking punters are redshirt freshmen Garrett Palmer and Michael Hughes and true freshman Sean Henschel. Palmer handles the kickoff and placekicking duties and redshirt freshman Brandon Bornes is on the kickoff return team. Bornes is now second in the league in kickoff returns with an average of 19.6 yards.

**It Doesn't Seem Like 2-6**

The Aztecs head to Brigham Young with a 2-6 record. The season numbers, however, would lend themselves to a better record. For the season, San Diego State has bettered the opposition in first downs, rushing yards, passing yards and total offense.

**Utah Recap**

The Aztecs slugged it out with the Utes for a half, but a blocked punt in the final minute before the break was converted into a three-yard touchdown drive for Utah and broke open a tight game for an eventual 51-28 win for the nation's ninth-ranked team. The Utes set season-highs by an Aztec opponent in total offense (548 yards), first downs (29) and points (51). The game, in a nutshell, may have been decided on third downs. Utah converted on eight of its 14 third downs. The previous best against The Dark Side had been an 8-of-19 effort by UCLA. Entering the game, Aztec opponents were converting just 32 percent of their third downs into a new set of downs. San Diego State's 21 first-half points against Utah were the most allowed by the Utes in a half since Sept. 6, 2003, in their loss at Texas A&M.

**The Good News**

Despite the loss, the youthful Aztec offense showed signs of coming of age against Utah. With the backfield being manned by a pair of redshirt freshmen, the Aztecs carved out 414 yards of total offense. That total did not come in garbage time. When the Aztecs scored their touchdown on the second play of the fourth quarter to pull within 41-28, the up-to-the-minute total offense stood at 367 yards for Utah and 353 for the Aztecs. Against Utah, the Aztes set season highs versus Division I-A opponents for first downs, rushing yards and touchdown passes. The Aztecs generated two of their six longest plays of the season and 5-of-18. The 28 points scored by SDSU were its most in a conference game since the 36 scored against Brigham Young last season.

**Musical Linemen**

The Aztecs are an improved offensive bunch and that is an accomplishment since they have only started the same group of offensive linemen in consecutive games in weeks six and seven. That group changed again when freshman Brandyn

Dombrowski started his first game at right guard as an Aztec versus Utah. Three freshman have earned a start in the offensive front this season. The line could change again this week with the possible return of Chris Pino, who sat out the last two games due to injury. Center Taylor Schmidt, who began the season as a guard, remains the only offensive lineman to have started the same position all season. Redshirt freshman Will Robinson has played four of the five offensive-line positions this season, missing last Saturday's match-up with a shoulder injury.

### Butkus Please

San Diego State senior linebacker Kirk Morrison was named as one of 12 Butkus Award semifinalists on Oct. 14th when the watch list was trimmed from 68 names. The Butkus Award is presented annually to the nation's top linebacker. With his 10 tackles against Utah, Morrison reached double figures in tackles for the sixth straight game. Morrison was named Mountain West Conference defensive player of the week after his 14-tackle effort against Colorado State.

### They Know Nagurski

Kirk Morrison and Matt McCoy, perhaps the most productive linebacking duo in the America, have been named to the Bronko Nagurski Watch List, presented to the nation's top defensive player. McCoy was the Nagurski national defensive player of the week after his 18 tackles in the 24-21 loss at No. 17 Michigan.

### Semi-Good

Kirk Morrison's selection as a Butkus semifinalist marks the third time since 2001, that the Aztecs have had a semifinalist for a national honor. In 2001, Larry Ned's 1,549 rushing yards landed him on the Doak Walker Award semifinalist list. And in 2002, J.R. Tolver was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award, presented to the nation's top receiver. Tolver's year included 128 catches and 1,785 yards.

### Kirk's Climb

Kirk Morrison continues to climb SDSU's career tackle charts. Thanks to his sixth straight game in double-figure tackles, Morrison now has 363 for his career to rank second all-time at San Diego State behind Whip Walton (407). Morrison entered the season as America's No. 11 active tackler. Morrison leads the Mountain West Conference with an average of 10.2 tackles per game. Fellow Aztec Matt McCoy led the league last year with 10.6 tackles per game.

### Behind The Line, Too

Kirk Morrison now has 39.5 tackles for loss in his career. He is tied for seventh all-time at San Diego State in that category.

### The Other "All" Guy

Everyone knows of the all-conference and All-America numbers of Aztec linebackers Kirk Morrison and Matt McCoy. But another Aztec linebacker is stating his own case. Senior Heath Farwell enters the Brigham Young game leading the Mountain West Conference in quarterback sacks (6.0) and fumbles caused (3). He is just off the Mountain West chart with his seven tackles for loss and ranks fourth on the Aztec squad with his 39 tackles. He has also picked off a pass this season and recovered a fumble.

### Linebacker You, You, You and You

Forgive opponents if they feel the SDSU linebacking corps has been together forever. The foursome of Kirk Morrison, Matt McCoy, Heath Farwell and Stephen Larsen have combined to start 95 games during their Aztec careers and they have also combined for a total of 896 career tackles, 102.5 tackles behind the line of scrimmage, 38 quarterback sacks, 22 forced fumbles, 18 recovered fumbles, 30 pass break-ups and six interceptions.

### Don't Forget Blake

The years of play by the linebacking corps can overshadow the play of other members of The Dark

Side defense, including the exceptional season being turned in by tackle Blake Lobel. The senior tackle heads to Provo fourth in the Mountain West Conference with five quarterback sacks and 9.5 tackles for loss. He returned a fumble 19 yards for a touchdown against Utah and has also been credited with a pass break-up. Lobel entered his senior season with one career quarterback sack and four tackles behind the line of scrimmage.

### The Dark Side Vs. The Mountain West

Despite the 0-4 conference start, The Dark Side continues to hold its own against league foes. New Mexico became the fourth straight Mountain West offense, dating back to last season, limited to less than 300 yards by SDSU when it gained 220 yards against SDSU. Against Wyoming, the Aztecs allowed 264 total yards (98 yards fewer than the Cowboys generated last season vs. SDSU) and two touchdowns. One of the TDs came on a 29-yard drive. Four of SDSU's last eight MWC foes have been held below 250 yards.

### By The Numbers

SDSU would seem to be one of the least likely candidates to be off to an 0-4 Mountain West start when comparing the numbers. In its first three league games, SDSU had a sturdy statistical advantage over Wyoming, Colorado State and New Mexico. In those games, 24 of the MWC opposition's 60 points came on a TOTAL of 47 yards of offense.

### These Are Losses?

San Diego State enters the BYU game with a 2-6 record. No asterisks allowed. But if there were...In five of the losses suffered by the Aztecs, SDSU had outgained the opposition by a total of 171 yards and had four more first downs than Michigan, UCLA, Wyoming, CSU and New Mexico combined. However, SDSU did lose the turnover battle (-5 total).

### Star Search

The changes in the Aztec offense are not limited to the offensive line. Preseason prognostications for the Aztecs might not have been as lofty if the prophets had known SDSU would play the entire season without freshman All-America running back Lynell Hamilton or a Rimington Award candidate in center Jasper Harvey. SDSU has also missed returning starter Wesley Williams at wideout, who missed six games with a hip injury. Outland Trophy Watch List member Mike Kracalik did not play at UCLA due to a knee sprain and freshman offensive lineman Brandyn Dombrowski, who won a starting job during fall camp, was sidelined for virtually all of the first half of the season with two ankle sprains.

### One Less Weapon

Lynell Hamilton, the 2003 Freshman All-America (*The Sporting News, Rivals*), Mountain West freshman of the year and first-team all-league running back, will sit out this season as he continues to recover from the broken ankle that prematurely ended his 2003 season in game 10 at UNLV. Hamilton, who ran for 1,087 yards in less than 10 full games, would have been the nation's 10th leading returning rusher in 2004. He will return to the squad as a sophomore next season.

### Total Tallies

San Diego State has outgained the opposition in nine of its last 13 games and in 13 of 20 games since the start of the 2003 season. SDSU has lost six straight games in which it has been outgained in total yards, dating back to a 38-34 win at Air Force on Nov. 23, 2002.

### Double Figures

San Diego State's decorated linebacking corps continues to stockpile statistics. Kirk Morrison's 10-tackle effort against Utah marked the 13th time in the last 15 games (dating back to last season) that an Aztec linebacker reached double figures in tackles. Morrison has accomplished the feat 18 times in his career and Matt McCoy has reached double figures seven times. Morrison has reached double figures in tackles in six straight games, a career first for the Oakland senior.

### Beginning To The End Zone

San Diego State has scored 19 touchdowns entering the BYU game with eight players doing the damage. Those eight players, Brandon Bornes, Michael Franklin, Blake Lobel, Kevin O'Connell, Robert

## Our Turf

San Diego State's defense has inherited 19 drives this season in which the opposition was taking its first snap in Aztec territory. Those drives, however, have produced just a total of 37 points this season, four touchdowns and three field goals.

## INT-eresting

The Aztecs now have 10 interceptions through eight games this season after corraling just 12 all of last year. Seven players have combined for the picks with Reggie Grigsby becoming the latest to join the club. Grigsby's first career interception set up SDSU's go-ahead field goal in the fourth quarter against Colorado State.

## First Things First

San Diego State has already scored 61 points in the first quarter this season. Last year, the Aztecs managed just 60 points in the first period for the entire 12-game season.

## Good Morning, Aztecs

San Diego State is likely the only program in the country that will practice in the mornings throughout the football season. Due to class conflicts in the afternoon, SDSU will have morning practices, beginning at 7 a.m., throughout the season. Players will return to the football offices for late afternoon film and meetings. Only the Friday walkthrough is scheduled for a traditional mid-afternoon time.

## OFFENSIVE NOTES

San Diego State's rankings in all four major offensive categories is better or the same as a year ago, including a remarkable jump from 60th to 26th in passing and 88th to 59th in total offense... The Aztecs are coming off their most impressive offensive game since the season opener... Against No. 9/10 Utah, SDSU scored 28 points, had 414 yards of total offense and averaged 5.4 yards per play... The Aztecs set season highs against a Division IA opponent in first downs (23), rushing yards (162), total offense (414) and tied the high mark for touchdown passes (2)... The Aztecs had 242 total yards in the first 30 minutes of the game... San Diego State's 28 points were the most since scoring 38 points in the season opener and the most in a Mountain West Conference game since scoring 36 points on Oct. 4, 2003 (10 MWC games ago)... SDSU flexed its big-play muscle against the Utes, logging two of its six longest plays from scrimmage this season and logging five of the top 18 plays from scrimmage this season (five plays of 29 yards or more)... San Diego State has 12 touchdown drives of 60 or more yards this season, nine scoring drives of 71 or more yards and four touchdown drives of 80 or more yards... Through eight games, the Aztecs have 36 plays of 20 or more yards... San Diego State has shown remarkable consistency in the passing game, throwing for between 238 and 295 yards in seven of the eight games this season (165 yards at New Mexico falls outside the range)... SDSU has 61 first-quarter points this season, last year the Aztecs had 60 first-quarter points in 12 games... San Diego State has gone 70 games without being shutout (last time SDSU did not score was Oct. 29, 1998, a 0-13 loss at Brigham Young)... The Aztecs have had a 100-yard rusher in six of their last 12 games ... Seven different Aztec backs have a rush of at least 21 yards in 2004... Michael Franklin has 1,141 career yards rushing on just 248 career carries... Four different players have attempted and completed a pass for the Aztecs this season... 15 different SDSU players have caught a pass in a game this season... SDSU has outgained its opponent in seven of the last nine Mountain West games... It would be hard to imagine a better season opener for the San Diego State offense... Against Idaho State, SDSU scored 38 points and had 581 yards of total offense with an incredibly balanced attack of 291 yards passing and 290 yards rushing... The Aztecs scored touchdowns on their first three offensive possessions of the season and SDSU's first five offensive possessions resulted in 24 points... San Diego State's 24 first-quarter points against Idaho State were the most in any stanza since Oct. 25, 1995 (at UTEP, 24 points in the second quarter) and five more points than SDSU averaged per game during the 2003 campaign... The 38 points were the most for the Aztecs since the 2002 season finale at Hawai'i (Dec. 7, 2002)... Michael Franklin scored on a 67-yard touchdown run on the first play from scrimmage and San Diego State had 14 points and 101 yards of total offense after four offensive plays... The Aztecs had 234 yards of total offense in the first quarter against Idaho State.

**DEFENSIVE NOTES**

After earning the distinction of being one of the nation's top defensive units a year ago, The Dark Side defense is having an impressive 2004 as well... San Diego State has held six of its eight opponents at or below their season average for points... SDSU has allowed 199 points this season but that is a bit misleading, Idaho State tallied 21 second-half points after the Aztecs had built a 38-0 lead, Michigan scored seven points on a fumble return, UCLA scored on an interception return and started a drive inside the Aztec 20 that resulted in a field goal, Wyoming started five drives in Aztec territory and kicked a field goal following an eight-yard drive, Colorado State also had an interception return and started the game-winning drive at the SDSU 10-yard line and Utah had a three-yard touchdown drive set up by a blocked punt ... The defense has been sensational when put under pressure... Aztec opponents have started 19 drives on SDSU's side of the field and have scored a total of 37 points off the strong field position ... Since the beginning of the 2003 season, opponents have started in SDSU territory 40 times but were able to come away with points on just 18 occasions and touchdowns just eight times... During that time, opponents have just a 20.0 percent touchdown percentage when starting inside Aztec territory... Through eight games, The Dark Side has 65 tackles for loss, 24 sacks, 10 interceptions and has forced 15 turnovers... The Aztecs have allowed just 172 points in their last 10 games (17.2 ppg) before allowing 51 against Utah... In the past 11 games, the Aztecs have given up 223 points (20.3 ppg)... In addition, opponents have been able to cross the goal line in just 25 of their last 66 opportunities when at or inside the Aztec 20 (TD conversion percentage of just 37.9 percent) ... The Aztecs have allowed just six rushing touchdowns this season to rank 16th nationally... The Aztecs rank 27th nationally in rushing defense... Of the top 30 teams in that category, 28 have a .500 or better record (only Kansas joins SDSU below .500)... The other 29 teams in the top 30 of that category are a collective 170-66 (72.0 percent)... SDSU is 28th in the country in interceptions with 10... The Dark Side is limiting opponents to a stingy 3.0 yards (actually 2.996688 per rush this season... Last year San Diego State allowed 17 offensive touchdowns, tied with co-national champion Louisiana State for the best figure in the country... In 2003, SDSU held four opponents to nine points or less marking the first time an Aztec squad had done that since 1977... Last season the Aztecs allowed 207 points, the fewest SDSU has allowed since 1977... In the 25 seasons between 1977 and 2003, the Aztecs allowed more than 300 points 14 times and more than 400 points twice... The Dark Side defense scored four touchdowns last season off turnover returns and helped the Aztec offense to five scores on drives of four yards or less setup by turnovers deep in opposition territory.

# game 1 - San Diego State 35, Idaho State 21



## Game Notes

**With the Aztec win:** SDSU has claimed victories in two straight season-openers for the first time since claiming five straight from 1993-97 ... Aztecs have won 15 straight non-conference home games against teams from outside the BCS Conferences ... SDSU is 1-0 all-time against Idaho State and improves to a perfect 9-0 versus schools in the Big Sky Conference ... The Aztecs moved to 44-33-5 all-time (9-4-1 in last 14 years) in season openers and 2-1 under Tom Craft ... In home openers, SDSU is 27-7-1 in its last 35 home openers ... SDSU has won four of its last five games dating back to 2003 ... The Aztecs have won three straight home games for the first time since the 1998 squad won its final four contests at Qualcomm... **The announced attendance** of 57,216, is an SDSU record for a home game... **On the opening play** of the game, Aztec Michael Franklin ran 67 yards for a touchdown ...the 67-yard run was the longest by an SDSU player since Larry Ned ran for 77 yards at Utah on Oct. 23, 1999 ... the 67-yard run is the longest of Franklin's career, topping his previous high of 55 yards in 2002, at Hawaii'... **The Aztec defense** kept Idaho State off the scoreboard in the first quarter, marking the fifth straight game in which an SDSU opponent has failed to score in the first quarter. Aztec opponents have also gone scoreless in the first 15-minute period in six of the last seven and nine of the last 11 outings dating back to the 2003 campaign... **SDSU's Robert Miller** blocked Idaho State kicker Jaret Johnson's field-goal attempt to close out the first half. The block was the Aztecs' first since Jeff Shoate blocked kicker Scott Parker's 32-yard attempt at Wyoming on Oct.19, 2002. The block is Miller's first of his career.

**SAN DIEGO** - In front of a record crowd of 57,216, the 2004 Aztecs made a stirring debut as they systematically disposed of Idaho State, 38-21, at Qualcomm Stadium.

Aztec running back Michael Franklin scampered 67 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the season and San Diego State was on its way to a near-perfect first half. The Aztecs jumped to a 24-0 first quarter lead and extended the advantage to 31-0 at the break and eventually 38-0 before ISU dented the scoreboard. SDSU completed the first half without a turnover and without a penalty.

The first quarter was the prolific for SDSU since it scored 24 points in the second quarter of a 1995 romp over UTEP.

The game would last just over four hours, thanks in part to an Idaho State offense that attempted 69 passes while rushing for just 46 yards.

Junior Matt Dlugolecki won the fall camp quarterback derby and he was strong in his debut, completing 16 of his 27 attempts for 233 yards and two touchdowns, one each to Robert Ortiz and Wesley Williams.

The star of the game, however, was Franklin. He rushed for 101 yards, marking his third straight game over the 100-yard mark. He also led the Aztecs with 84 receiving yards. Franklin ended the game with 233 all-purpose yards despite seeing limited action in the second half.

The Dark Side was its dominating self in the first half when the game was being decided. The first 14 Idaho State possessions resulted in just one drive that lasted more than six plays. The Aztec defense forced four turnovers, including interceptions by Heath Farwell, Josh Dean and Donny Baker. Farwell was also credited with a quarterback sack and caused a fumble.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Kevin O'Connell saw his first collegiate action and found Robert Ortiz for a 32-yard touchown pass. Ortiz, who entered the game with two career TD grabs, had two more against the Bengals.

The home crowd was the largest in San Diego State history and the 20th largest crowd in college football on the first full Saturday of the weekend.

# game 2 - No. 17 Michigan 24, San Diego State 21



## Game Notes

### For the second consecutive season

San Diego State played a nationally-ranked Big Ten team to the final moments before losing... Last season, the Aztecs lost at second-ranked Ohio State, 16-13, on Sept. 9... This season, the Aztecs fall to 17th-ranked Michigan, 24-21... Two weeks after setting a school-record for home attendance with 57,216 vs. Idaho State at Qualcomm Stadium, San Diego State played in front of the largest crowd in school history.

**Today's attendance** at Michigan Stadium of 109,432, eclipses the crowd of 104,433 that witnessed the Ohio State-SDSU game last season in Columbus... The Aztecs' last **two losses to nationally-ranked teams** (last season Ohio State and Michigan today) have been by a total of six points... San Diego State's **1-1 record** matches its best mark after two games in the last 10 seasons. The Aztecs have not opened 2-0 since victories over Navy and California to open the 1994 campaign... Despite the loss, SDSU has still **won four of its last six games** dating back to last season... Although not outgained by much 327-311, the Aztecs total yardage disadvantage of 16 yards, snaps a streak of six consecutive games in which SDSU has outgained its opponent... Prior to today, the last time an Aztec opponent had more total yardage was at Utah on Oct. 11, 2003... San Diego State's **Dark Side Defense** put on another impressive showing... Despite allowing 24 points, the defense yielded just one scoring drive of more than 51 yards on the afternoon... The defense also forced four turnovers, two of which set up short scoring drives for the Aztec offense (17 and 39 yard touchdown drives). The Aztecs had seven tackles for loss.

**ANN ARBOR, Mich.** - Another reigning Big Ten champion as an opponent resulted in another near miss for the San Diego State Aztecs Saturday afternoon.

With a national television audience watching (ESPN), SDSU and No. 17 Michigan went toe-to-toe for more than three hours before the Wolverines escaped The Big House with a 24-21 win over up and coming San Diego State.

In the process, SDSU appeared to show dramatic gains on offense and special teams and The Dark Side defense showed a new taste for creating turnovers.

Michigan shocked the Aztecs early, scoring on a 54-yard touchdown pass on its first play from scrimmage. Following an interception, the Wolverines looked to be in total control with possession deep in SDSU territory. However, safety Josh Dean flattened UM quarterback Chad Henne on a pass attempt and Antwan Applewhite picked the ball out of the air and returned it 75 yards, setting up a Michael Franklin TD.

Following a Michigan field goal, the Aztecs turned the ball over again when Lawrence Reid picked up a fumble and returned it five yards for a touchdown.

With SDSU trailing 17-7 and on the ropes, Robert Ortiz turned the game. His 61-yard reception set up a Jeff Webb touchdown and the 109,000 plus in Ann Arbor settled in for nailbiter.

By halftime, SDSU had taken the lead when Matt Dlugolecki found Ortiz for a 14-yard score. That drive was set up by a Kurt Kahui fumble recovery. In all, SDSU forced four turnovers after Michigan entered the game second nationally in turnover margin.

The final lead change of the day took place on the first drive of the second half as the Wolverines drove the field and registered the last lead change of the day.

It was SDSU's second three-point loss in two years to the reigning Big Ten champion. In 2003, SDSU was a 16-13 loser to No. 2 Ohio State.

# game 3 - San Diego State 27, Nevada 10



## Game Notes

**With the SDSU victory:** San Diego State has won five of its last seven games dating back to last season. That is the best seven-game mark for SDSU since posting a similar seven-game mark from Oct. 24, 1998 through Sept. 4, 1999 ... San Diego State is 2-0 at home this season and has won four straight games at Qualcomm Stadium. The four-game home field winning streak is the longest since claiming five straight in 1998-99 (last four home games of '98 and first game of '99). From the end of the five-game winning streak in 1999, until the current four-game winning streak, the Aztecs were 7-17 at Qualcomm ... San Diego State is 2-1 after the first three games of the season for the second consecutive season. The last time SDSU had a winning record after the first three games of consecutive seasons was 1993 and 1994... **With tonight's attendance** of 33,429, SDSU has surpassed the 30,000 mark in back-to-back home contests for the first time since the 1999 season. SDSU drew 30,508 versus New Mexico (Oct. 9, 1999) and 40,836 fans against Brigham Young (Nov. 6, 1999)... **SDSU linebacker Kirk Morrison** became just the fourth player in SDSU history to record more than 300 career tackles. Morrison, who tallied his 13th career game in double-figure tackles, now has 308 tackles in his career to rank fourth in the Aztec record books. Morrison's 15 tackles tonight matches his career high (15 vs. BYU in 2003, vs. Utah in 2001), while he had a career best for most solo tackles in a game with 10 (prev. nine at Hawai'i)... With nine catches for 101 yards tonight, SDSU's **Jeff Webb** has at least one reception in each of his last 13 outings and at least two catches in his last nine games. Webb also recorded his fourth career game with 100 or more yards.

**SAN DIEGO** - On a dangerous night against a dangerous opponent, San Diego State went to work in business-like fashion to dismiss Nevada, 27-10, Saturday night at Qualcomm Stadium in front of 33,429 fans.

A week before the UCLA game and a week after a near-miss at Michigan, the more than capable Wolf Pack were in a position to derail SDSU's early-season momentum. However, Michael Franklin rushed for 100 yards for the second time this season and The Dark Side kept the visitors out of the end zone until their final possession of the night to cruise to the win.

As they have all season, the Aztecs were effective in the first half. The Aztecs led 17-3 at intermission thanks to a 23-yard TD reception by Jeff Webb and a 35-yard touchdown run by Brandon Bornes.

Both of those scoring drives were of the cross-country variety, covering 79 and 81 yards with both taking 12 places to execute.

The youth movement continued for SDSU with sophomore Ramal Porter scoring his first career touchdown and redshirt freshman Brandon Bornes scoring on a career-best 35-yard touchdown run.

The Aztec special teams had a good night as well with Garrett Palmer connecting on field goals of 50 and 43 yards, and punt returns by Franklin and Kyle Conerly that covered 29 and 23 yards, respectively.

Senior linebacker Kirk Morrison reached a new milestone with his 15 tackles, pushing him over 300 for his career. In all, it was a strong night for The Dark Side with three quarterback sacks, two interceptions, 12 pass break-ups, and two forced fumbles. Senior playmaker Heath Farwell continued to show up in the stat column. He had all three Aztec sacks and forced both fumbles.

# game 4 - UCLA 33, San Diego State 10



## Game Notes

With his 45 yards on 11 carries, Aztec junior **Michael Franklin** reached the 1,000-yard plateau in career rushing with 1,002 yards. Franklin had 346 yards as a red-shirt freshman in 2002, 371 yards as a sophomore in 2003, and has 285 yards as a junior in 2004. Franklin also tallied a career game high in receptions with 10 (45 yards), besting his previous high of eight at Wyoming in 2002... Linebackers **Kirk Morrison** and **Matt McCoy** both reached double-figures in tackles tonight. Morrison had 11 tackles and reached double-figures for the second straight game and the 13th time in his career. Morrison's 11 tackles included eight solos and two tackles for loss. McCoy, meanwhile, had 10 tackles (6 solo) and reached double-figures for the second time this season, the fourth time in the last six games and the eighth time in his career.... With the 402 yards tonight, SDSU has reached the **400-yard mark** in total offense three times in four games in 2004... The **Aztecs were outgained** in total offense (410-402) for the second time this season and the second time on the road. But in those two games, SDSU has been outgained by just a total of 24 yards (vs. Michigan - outgained by 16 (327-311)) ... In the four games this season, SDSU has combined to outgain its opponents by 212 yards... **SDSU rushed** for 139 yards tonight, despite being tagged for -23 yards on the muffed punt in the first half... Seven players combined for the 139 yards and four accumulated at least 12 yards... The Aztecs ran for 137 of those yards in the second half after recording 2 net yards in the first half... With his 23 completions on 42 attempts for 215 yards, SDSU quarterback **Matt Dlugolecki** logged his third straight game with at least 23 completions and at least 40 attempts.

**PASADENA** - In 2002, UCLA generated 23 points off of Aztec miscues to blow out SDSU, 43-7. Last year it was a 3-3 game at the half when two interceptions helped the Bruins to a 20-10 victory.

Saturday night, Spencer Havner's 52-yard interception return for a touchdown gave the homestanding Bruins a 14-3 lead. And for good measure, SDSU dropped a snap on a punt inside its own 15 to provide the Bruins with three more points and an insurmountable 20-3 halftime lead. The Bruins would eventually win by a 33-10 count.

After UCLA scored on its first possession (64-yard drive), the Aztecs limited the Bruins to 62 yards of total offense on five possessions, before the two critical second-quarter mis-takes.

Any hopes of an Aztec comeback ended on the first series of the third quarter when UCLA marched 65 yards for a touchdown that staked UCLA to a 27-3 lead.

Two more field goals would close the scoring for UCLA. SDSU grabbed some momentum with its own touchdown drive, covering 80 yards on seven plays and capped by Brandon Bornes' third rushing TD of the season. However, after holding UCLA on its next possession, SDSU gave up the ball on an interception and UCLA cruised through the final quarter to defeat SDSU for the 19th time in 20 all-time meetings.

Michael Franklin ran for 45 yards in the game and crossed the 1,000-yard rushing mark for his career.

# game 5 - Wyoming 20, San Diego State 10



## Game Notes

With his seven receptions today, junior wide receiver **Jeff Webb** has now caught at least one pass in 15 straight games... The **Matt Dlugolecki** to Jeff Webb 47-yard TD play was the longest scoring pass of the season. The longest play through the air was the 61-yarder from Dlugolecki to **Robert Ortiz** at Michigan... The game featured the fifth different offensive line combination to start a game this season... Wide receiver **Devin Pitts'** six receptions for 60 yards were both season highs... With the loss, San Diego State had its five game winning streak snapped, including two consecutive in Laramie. SDSU has never won three in a row at War Memorial Stadium... The Aztecs are now 4-9 all-time in Laramie... San Diego State falls to 3-3 in Mountain West openers and 1-2 in conference openers under head coach Tom Craft.

**LARAMIE, Wyo.** - San Diego State's five-year domination of Wyoming came to a screeching halt Saturday afternoon in Laramie.

The Aztecs found a way to lose a game in which their quarterback set a career high in completions and passing yards, the opposition was limited to just 264 yards of total offense, a full 99 shy of SDSU's total, and the opposition was just 3-of-16 on third-down conversions.

Here is how it happened. The Aztecs suffered four meltdowns in the kicking game, some red-zone misfires and eventually wilted in the fourth quarter to fall to the Cowboys by a 20-10 count in the Mountain West opener for both schools.

SDSU held a 10-3 lead at halftime, thanks to a 47-yard touchdown pass from Matt Dlugolecki to Jeff Webb. The TD pass was the only exclamation point in a game that saw SDSU hold a tiny advantage in total offense, 161-126 at the break. At intermission, the two teams had combined for 45 rushing yards.

In the third quarter, the Aztec wheels came off in a most unconventional fashion. On the first possession of the third period, SDSU's three-and-out offensive possession was followed by a 10-yard Sean Henschel punt. One play later, Wyoming had a 29-yard touchdown pass to draw even in the game and wipe out SDSU's halftime advantage.

SDSU's second possession lasted just one play as SDSU suffered its first turnover on a fumble. This time, The Dark Side limited the Cowboys to a missed field goal.

But the quarter wasn't over. Another three-and-out by SDSU was followed by a seven-yard punt to set up the Cowboys at the SDSU 33.

Wyoming managed just eight yards but was close enough to result in a field goal and suddenly SDSU was down 13-10 despite virtually no offense by the opposition.

SDSU turned the ball over again on an interception on its next possession but the Cowboys again found the going tough and was forced to punt.

SDSU's next possession resulted in just an eight-yard punt by stand-in Adam Gray-Hayward, who punted for the first time.

SDSU was trailing 20-10 midway through the fourth quarter when the offense found its rhythm for the first time. A 37-yard field goal attempt by Garrett Palmer, however, missed to the right. It ended SDSU's 74-yard drive and effectively killed the Aztecs' chances to win the game.

SDSU would penetrate the red zone again late in the game but was held on downs.

# game 6 - Colorado State 21, San Diego State 17



## Game Notes

Colorado State defeated SDSU for the fifth straight time in San Diego ... the Aztecs suffered their first loss at home this season and their first in their last five opportunities in San Diego ... SDSU's three home games in 2004 have each exceeded the 30,000-mark in attendance ... The last time the Aztecs had three straight home games with 30,000 or more fans was in 1999 ... SDSU limited Colorado State to a season-low 196 yards of total offense, the second straight game in which the Aztecs have kept their opponent to under 300 yards ... The 196 yards by CSU is the fewest allowed by SDSU since the 2003 UNLV game, when the Rebels had just 175 yards ... With a 366-196 advantage in total offense, SDSU has outgained its opponent by more than 90 yards three times this year ... This was the seventh straight MWC game in which the Aztecs have owned an advantage in total offense ... The Aztecs converted their first two-point conversion opportunity of the year (first conversion since 2002) ... SDSU linebacker Kirk Morrison recorded double-figure tackles (14) for the fourth straight game and the 15th time in his career ... Aztec Jeff Webb has caught at least one pass in each of his last 16 games and has at least three catches in each of his last 11 outings. Webb went over 100 yards receiving (7 catches, 129 yards) for the third time this season and the fifth time in his career .... the 58-yard TD is the Aztecs' longest scoring pass of the season ... SDSU's Garrett Palmer connected on a pair of 48-yard field goals in the first half, marking the second straight season in which an Aztec kicker has converted on two, 45+-yard field goals in one game ... Brandon Bornes' 40-yard kick-off return is the Aztecs' longest since 2001 ... SDSU had a season high 15 tackles for loss and six sacks.

**SAN DIEGO** - For two teams in dire need of a victory, Saturday's San Diego State-Colorado State match-up seemed like a good place to start for the Aztecs.

After all, SDSU had claimed both of its wins in 2004 by easy margins in the safe confines of Qualcomm Stadium and had come out victorious in each of its last four home conference match-ups. Plus, traditional MWC power Colorado State also found itself in a similar place in its season, dropping four of its first five games.

Saturday, however, would not be the start of a new chapter for SDSU in 2004, as the Aztecs rallied from an eight-point, fourth-quarter deficit to surge ahead, 17-14, only to have the win fall out of their grasp in the final minutes.

Following Garrett Palmer's third field goal of the night which gave SDSU the lead, the Aztec defense held firm, forcing a Colorado State punt from its own 44-yard line with only 2:13 left in the game. The SDSU offense then took over with the mission of keeping the ball safe, gaining a first down and running out the clock. On its second play of the drive, however, CSU recovered a fumble at the Aztec 10-yard line.

Two plays later, the Rams took advantage of the fumble as Jimmy Green scored from one-yard out and just 1:10 remaining in the game. A stunned SDSU offense was forced to try to go 79 yards to get the win back, but was only able to get as far as the Colorado State 45-yard line as quarterback Kevin O'Connell's final desperation heave into the end zone fell to the ground.

SDSU opened the game with a 3-0 lead on one of two 48-yard Palmer field goals on the day. The lead would last only a tad over four minutes, as CSU's Luke Adkins intercepted SDSU quarterback Matt Dlugolecki's pass and ran it back for a touchdown. The interception return marked the second straight season in which the Rams had returned one for a score against the Aztecs.

Palmer had his second field-goal chance of the day blocked, but made up for it with another 48-yarder on the team's next drive to draw the Aztecs to within one point, 7-6, at the 7:52 mark of the second quarter.

Colorado State back-up quarterback Caleb Hanie, playing for injured starter Justin Holland, then engineered a 12-play, 80-yard drive capped by a four-yard pass to Joel Dreessen to increase the Ram lead to 14-6 entering the half.

After a scoreless third, O'Connell hit Jeff Webb on a 58-yard touchdown pass on the first play of the fourth quarter and then tacked on the two-point conversion on another O'Connell pass, this time to Robert Ortiz, to knot the score at 14-14.

An interception by Reggie Grigsby set up the go-ahead Palmer field goal from 27 yards out and 5:36 left on the clock.

# game 7 - New Mexico 19, San Diego State 9



## Game Notes

Both teams recorded a safety in the game, marking a first for the Aztecs and their opponent in two years, since SDSU last visited New Mexico...Kirk Morrison had 10 tackles, marking his fifth straight game in double figures in tackles...Kevin O'Connell became the first freshman to start at quarterback at San Diego State since Spencer Britton started the final five games of the 1997 season...New Mexico became the fourth consecutive Mountain West opponent to be held to less than 300 yards of total offense...Lobos running back DonTrell Moore was limited to 70 yards rushing after entering the game with an average of 101 yards per game...Robert Ortiz caught seven passes to give him 35 for the season, one year after he caught 33 passes in 12 games...Eight freshmen saw action on the offensive side of the ball, including three linemen...SDSU has now scored just two touchdowns in the last 15 quarters of play against New Mexico.

**ALBUQUERQUE** - In a battle of swarming defenses, the New Mexico Lobos held off San Diego State, 19-9, before 37,287 fans at University Stadium.

The Lobos struck first with an impressive 65-yard opening drive, capped off by a 21-yard touchdown pass from Kole McKamey to DonTrell Moore.

Kevin O'Connell got his first start as the Aztec quarterback and his first effort was impressive but did not result in any points. The Aztecs drove 58 yards on nine plays with their first possession. However, a missed field-goal attempt by Garrett Palmer ended SDSU's best chance at first-half points.

The Lobos added 10 points in the second quarter to take control of the game. Those points were set up in part by field position. San Diego State twice started drives inside its own five. New Mexico, after gaining possession in Aztec territory, picked up a field goal on a drive that covered just 15 yards. However, the Lobos also covered 80 yards for a score, capped by a McKamey run.

The 17-point lead seemed safe as SDSU struggled with the aggressive Lobos defense. But momentum changed just a bit when Matt McCoy nailed DonTrell Moore for a 14-yard loss and an Aztec safety to get SDSU on the board.

In the fourth quarter, O'Connell got the Aztecs serious about a comeback. The freshman supervised a 10-play drive that covered 51 yards in the fourth period. It ended with the quarterback finding receiver Robert Ortiz for a 14-yard touchdown pass on a fourth-down play.

That score, with 8:02 remaining in the game, drew the Aztecs to within 10 at 19-9. The ensuing defensive possession kept Aztec hopes alive when New Mexico was forced to punt from deep in its own territory.

The Aztecs took over on the New Mexico 28 following a Kyle Conerly punt return and after a first-down scramble by O'Connell for nine yards, the Aztecs came up empty on three straight snaps.

The final play saw O'Connell throw a pass to Devin Pitts in the end zone that went off the senior's fingertips and squelched SDSU's comeback hopes.

The Lobos, although limited to a total of just 220 yards, managed to milk the final 5:53 off the clock to clinch the victory.

The Aztecs managed just 146 yards of total offense and were held to minus-19 rushing yards.

# game 8 - No. 9/10 Utah 51, San Diego State 28



## Game Notes

With the Utah win, SDSU fell to 11-12-1 all-time versus the Utes ... SDSU still has a 6-5-1 advantage in games played in San Diego .. With the attendance of 32,683, each of SDSU's four home games this season have exceeded the 30,000-mark. The last time the Aztecs had four straight home games with 30,000 or more fans was in 1994 ... With his 10 tackles, SDSU linebacker **Kirk Morrison** recorded double-figure tackles for the sixth straight game and the 17th time in his career. He now has 363 career tackles to move from third to second in the Aztec record books, passing Rico Curtis, who had 355 tackles. Morrison still trails Whip Walton (407), the school record-holder ... Jeff Webb went over 100 yards receiving (9 catches, 138 yards) for the fourth time this season and the sixth time in his career ... Webb moved into the Aztec career top 10 for catches with 129. Webb jumped past Darius Durham (127) for 10th place and tied Craig Scoggins (129) for ninth place ... Brandon Bornes recorded career highs for both carries (17) and rushing yards (112). He also had a career long 41-yard run in the first quarter. The run was SDSU's second-longest of the year behind Michael Franklin's 67-yarder in the season-opener with Idaho State .. Bornes' 112 rushing yards is an Aztec season high. He becomes the second Aztec to rush for 100 or more yards in a game this season .. Blake Lobel's fumble return for a touchdown was the Aztecs' first defensive TD this season .. The 21 first-half SDSU points are the most allowed by Utah since also giving up 21 in the first half of a 28-26 loss at Texas A&M Sept. 6, 2003 (a span of 17 games) ... Quarterback Kevin O'Connell threw for 252 yards, completing 21 of his 43 passes - all career bests. O'Connell logged his first career rushing TD in the second quarter.

**SAN DIEGO** - San Diego State entered its game with Utah knowing a mistake-free effort would be required to upset the nation's ninth-ranked team. And it probably would have.

San Diego State slugged it out with the Utes for all of the first half and appeared headed to the locker room down by a 27-21. But the Utes blocked a punt and turned it into a three-yard touchdown drive in the final seconds before intermission. It turned out to be the deciding series as Utah cruised to a 51-28 victory at Qualcomm Stadium.

San Diego State displayed new strength on the offensive side of the ball behind 112 rushing yards by freshman Brandon Bornes and 414 yards of total offense. The Aztecs scored 21 points in the second period to stay within striking distance of Utah and trailed just 41-28 in the fourth period with only a 14-yard difference in total offense.

However, Utah's run-pass mixture and big-play ability kept San Diego State at bay and allowed the Utes to scoot away at the end as they improved to 8-0 on the season.

The Aztecs got another flashy effort from receiver Jeff Webb, who had nine catches for 138 yards and a stunning one-handed touchdown grab for SDSU's last score of the game.

Kevin O'Connell continued to make the transition into the starting quarterback role as he passed for 252 yards and a pair of touchdowns and ran for another score.

The firepower of Utah was too much, however, as the visitors scored in every quarter and accumulated 548 yards of total offense.
