- ▶ Head coach Steve Fisher loses six letterwinners from last year's 34-3 Sweet 16 team, but also returns six letterwinners and three experienced newcomers.
- ▶ Despite returning just one starter in **Chase Tapley**, the Aztecs bring back three players with SDSU starting experience in **LaBradford Franklin**, **James Rahon** and **Tim Shelton**. This does not include newcomers **Garrett Green** and **Xavier Thames**, who started games at LSU and Washington State, respectively. Collectively, they have started 111 ballgames.

- ▶ The Aztecs boast one of the deepest guard rotations in the West starting with Chase Tapley and James Rahon. Combined, they have played in 136 games and made 71 starts. Rahon comes into the season with a 9.0 career scoring average, while Tapley has scored at an 8.1 clip for his career. At Santa Clara, Rahon was a primary scoring option as a true freshman and averaged 11.3 points in 2008-09. In two seasons at SDSU, Tapley deferred to scorers such as D.J. Gay, Kawhi Leonard, Malcolm Thomas and Billy White, and still averaged 7.6 points as a freshman and 8.6 a year ago. Together, they have also knocked down 188 three-point field goals. Rahon is a 41.9 percent career three-point shooter, while Tapley has a 37.8-percent success rate from beyond the arc.
- ▶ In addition to Tapley and Rahon, SDSU returns sophomore guards Jamaal Franklin, who played in 22 games last year and went for 13 points and 10 rebounds in 17 minutes vs. Utah, LaBradford Franklin, who saw action in 17 games, and transfer Xavier Thames. The latter played in 31 games (four starts) for Washington State as a true freshman in 2009-10. Thames redshirted last season and should fit right into the rotation in 2011-12.
- ▶ The frontcourt may look thin on paper, but it is a seasoned group. Tim Shelton is a fifth-year player, who is a presence on the block, while also being able to shoot from the perimeter. Garrett Green brings three years of SEC experience after earning his bachelor's degree from LSU in August. Deshawn Stephens played in 55 games at the JC level and averaged nearly a double-double (9.7 points, 8.0 rebounds) for his career. Alec Williams, meanwhile, has spent the past two seasons going up against what could be argued as the top frontcourt in the West.
- ▶ San Diego State has won 20 or more games and advanced to the postseason six straight years for the first time in school history (The previous record was four from 1939-42). SDSU has also won at least 25 games in each of the last three seasons (26 in 2008-09, 25 in 2009-10, 34 in 2010-11).

Team Notes

San Diego State

- ▶ San Diego State returns six letterwinners off a squad which...
 - Finished 34-3, shared the Mountain West regular-season title, won the MWC tournament for the second year in a row, and advanced to the school's second consecutive NCAA Tournament the program's sixth consecutive postseason tournament berth.
 - Won a school-record 34 games, two of which came in the NCAA Tournament, marking the first two Division I NCAA Tournament victories in school history.
 - Advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time in program history.
 - Won 20+ games for the sixth straight season, reaching the 20-win plateau for the seventh time during Steve Fisher's tenure and the ninth time in SDSU's Division I history.
 - Won at least 20 games for the sixth consecutive season for the first time in school history.
 - Won at least 25 games for the third season in a row, the first time it has been accomplished in program history.
 - Advanced to postseason play for the sixth consecutive season for the first time in school history.
 - Set school records for most victories in a two-year period (59), a three-year span (85) and four-year period (105).
 - Won a school-record 14 MWC games, marking the first time in school history that an SDSU team posted a winning league record in six straight seasons.
- ► San Diego State returns two-year starter **Chase Tapley**, one of the West Coast's top perimeter shooters in **James Rahon** and perhaps the West's most athletic wing in **Jamaal Franklin**, who earned valuable playing time down the stretch as the Aztecs were closing in on a pair of conference titles and a postseason berth.
- ▶ The team will also welcome Xavier Thames and Garrett Green, both of whom have Division I playing experience. Thames, a Washington State transfer guard, is a steady player who is a lights-out shooter. The Sacramento, Calif., native sat out last season and is expected to step in and contribute immediately. Green, meanwhile, is a 6-11 forward who arrived at San Diego State in August. A native of Woodland Hills, Calif., Green is taking advantage of a one-time transfer exception after obtaining his bachelor's degree from LSU in early August. The forward has seen his production increase in each of the last three seasons while playing in the Southeastern Conference.
- ▶ The Aztecs also return Tim Shelton, LaBradford Franklin, Deshawn Stephens and Alec Williams. Shelton is the team's elder statesman as he is entering his fifth season on Montezuma Mesa. The senior has proven to be a positive contributor when healthy and on the floor. A year ago, he played in 31 games, his most since his redshirt freshman campaign in 2008-09. Franklin is a sophomore guard who played in 17 games, with one start, as a true freshman. Despite playing limited minutes, the Temecula, Calif., native showed flashes of brilliance and finished with an assist-to-turnover ratio of 1.35. Stephens is the new kid on the block after his transfer from Santa Monica College. While at SMC, Stephens nearly averaged a double-double in his two-year stint and should provide the Aztecs with quality depth in the front court. Williams, meanwhile, is poised to see minutes after two years of practicing against one of the nation's top front courts the last two seasons. The forward will bring versatility to the floor as he can hold his own on the block and can bring his defender to the perimeter with his outside range.
- ▶ San Diego State returns three players from last year's team (five total with LSU transfer **Garrett Green** and Washington State transfer **Xavier Thames**) that have started a Division I basketball game over the course of their career. Overall, SDSU will have eight players on this season's squad with Division I experience with the addition of Green and Thames.
- ▶ As previously mentioned, **Thames** is eligible this season after sitting out the 2010-11 campaign following his transfer from Washington State. The Sacramento, Calif., native played in 31 games, starting four, and averaged 4.6 points, 1.5 rebounds and 1.2 assists for the Cougars as a true freshman in 2009-10. Joining Thames in the eligible-Division-I-transfer group is **Green**, who averaged 6.3 points and 5.1 rebounds as a junior at LSU. He brings career averages of 3.6 points and 3.2 rebounds, while playing in 87 games, including 17 starts. His scoring and rebounding averages have increased each season (Scoring: 1.8 in 2007-08, 2.1 in 2009-10, 6.3 in 2010-11; Rebounding: 1.6 in 2007-08, 2.5 in 2009-10, 5.1 in 2010-11).

- ▶ Returns as the team's leader in scoring, assists, steals, assist-to-turnover ratio, free-throw percentage, games started and minutes played.
- ▶ Is the team's second-leading returner in three-point field goals and three-point field-goal percentage.
- ▶ Enters season as the Mountain West's third-leading returner in steals.
- ▶ Scored in double figures 14 times last season, including a 24-point effort vs. Wyoming. For his career, he has 27 double-digit scoring performances.
- ▶ Led the team in scoring four times in 2010-11, rebounding once and assists on seven different occasions. For his career, he has led the squad in scoring six times, rebounding twice and assists 12 times.
- ▶ Had one turnover or less in 20 games in 2010-11 and committed zero turnovers eight times. For his career, he has 44 games with one turnover or less and 18 turnover-free outings.
- ▶ In 2010-11, he set personal bests in scoring, rebounding, steals, three-point field goals, three-point field-goal percentage, free-throw percentage, games played and minutes played.
- ▶ Ended the 2011 season by making 20 of his final 21 free-throw attempts.

- ▶ 7.0 ppg, 1.6 rpg, 0.8 apg, 43.4 3FG Pct., 21.6 mpg
- ▶ San Diego State's top returner in three-point field goals, three-point field-goal percentage and games played.
- ▶ Played in all 37 games in his first season at San Diego State after transferring from Santa Clara. Received the starting nod on six different occasions.
- ▶ Is the league's second-leading returner in three-point field-goal percentage (conference games only).
- ▶ Scored in double figures 11 times in his Aztec career. Led the team in scoring on two occasions in 2010-11.
- ▶ Knocked down multiple three-pointers 14 times in 2010-11 and 33 times in his career.
- ▶ Committed one turnover or less in 36 of 37 games a year ago. He had 20 turnover-free contests altogether.
- ▶ In just one season at San Diego State, he already ranks second in program history for the highest three-point field-goal percentage (min. 40 3FG). His 53 three-pointers last season, meanwhile, were the 15th-most in Aztec single-season history.

Steve Fisher

Entering 21st-Full Season • 13th Season at SDSU • Illinois St., 1967

Steve Fisher has guided the Aztec basketball program to unparalleled heights. In 12 seasons, he has taken a program that regularly missed out on the *conference* postseason tournament, to one which has become of the best programs on the West Coast and has the Aztecs routinely mentioned among the elite teams in the country.

The best news for SDSU fans is that the school exercised its contract option on Fisher prior to the 2011-12 season, which keeps the coach on Montezuma Mesa through 2014-15.

When Fisher arrived on the scene in March of 1999, he found a basketball program that wasn't good enough to be called average. The Aztecs had suffered through 13 losing seasons in 14 years. Members of the school's last NCAA team were in the early stages of middle age. The expectations were set. The Aztecs were expected to lose. The year before Fisher's arrival on campus, San Diego State won just four games.

Now those days are a distant memory. Fisher guided San Diego State to the NCAA Tournament in 2002, 2006, 2010 and 2011, the last of which culminated with a 34-3 record and an appearance in the Sweet 16. Fisher has also taken the Aztecs to the NIT in 2003, 2007, 2008 and 2009. In 2009, SDSU advance to the national semifinals. San Diego State has currently been to the postseason six straight years.

On March 26, 1999, San Diego State announced its arrival on the basketball scene in the form of a news conference to introduce its new coach, Steve Fisher. Fresh from a stint with the Sacramento Kings and with three appearances in the Final Four and a national championship in his pocket, he rolled up his sleeves and went to work. And work was needed. It looked to be a daunting challenge and yet the man with one of the highest winning percentages in NCAA Tournament history had no reservations.

No head-coaching career, at any level, started quicker than that of Steve Fisher. Six games into his head-coaching career he was undefeated and sporting a national championship ring. And the success didn't stop with the national title.

Fisher's eight-plus seasons at Michigan produced a 184-82 (.692) record, nine postseason tournament berths and three

trips to the NCAA championship game, including the magical run to the 1989 national title.

Under Fisher, the Wolverines also claimed an NIT championship, won at least 20 games four times and finished among the top three in the powerful Big Ten Conference five times. In 1995, Michigan set a league record by holding opponents to just 39.4 percent shooting from the floor.

Fisher and Co., raised the bar even higher in the postseason. His seven NCAA Tournament teams at Michigan combined for a 20-6 record, which put him fourth among active coaches and ninth in NCAA history with a winning percentage of .769 in the national bracket after his stint in Ann Arbor. Only 13 coaches have taken more teams to the Final Four, including just five that are still active. He is one of three coaches to take three squads to the Final Four in the first five years of a head-coaching career, and one of just six coaches to lead a team to a NIT title as well as the NCAA.

His accomplishments may be even greater at San Diego State. In 2001-02 he led the Aztecs to the postseason for the first time since 1985 and for just the fourth time ever. The 21 wins were second most for the school as a Division I program and the most since 1985. The fact that those numbers came after just three seasons signifies what is one of the great recent turnarounds in college basketball.

He followed that up with a third consecutive season with a .500 or better record in 2002-03 and led SDSU back to the post-season for the second consecutive season for only the second time in the school's Division I history. In addition, SDSU claimed its first Division I postseason victory with a win in the NIT.

In 2006-07, he led SDSU to the MWC regular season and tournament crowns and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. That team finished with a Division I then-school-record 24 wins. And the last five seasons, Fisher has led the Aztecs to five additional 20-win seasons and postseason appearances including a school-record 34 wins, both the MWC regular season and tournament championships, and a NCAA Sweet 16 berth in 2011.

Assistant Head Coach

One of Steve Fisher's first moves as head coach at San Diego State was to hire Brian

Dutcher as his top assistant. Dutcher, 51, was a regional scout for the Sacramento Kings before assuming the role of assistant head coach at SDSU.

When Fisher decides to retire, Dutcher will assume head coaching duties as he was anointed "head coach in waiting" in August of 2011.

Dutcher served as assistant coach and later associate head coach at Michigan under Fisher. He spent 10 seasons on the Wolverine staff, establishing himself as one of the nation's top assistant coaches. His first year in Ann Arbor was 1989 and resulted in a national title for Michigan as he assisted then-interim head coach Steve Fisher on the bench.

The Bloomington, Minn., native headed up UM's recruiting efforts in 1990-91 when the Wolverines inked Juwan Howard, Ray Jackson, Jimmy King, Jalen Rose and Chris Webber. The "Fab Five" is considered perhaps the best recruiting class in NCAA history. Dutcher helped lead that group to nearly 100 wins, two berths in the NCAA championship game and a regional final over a four-year period. He was also on the Michigan staff for an NIT championship and a Big Ten tournament title (1998).

Dutcher's recruiting prowess, however, was demonstrated by more than just the "Fab Five" haul. Michigan had the nation's top-ranked recruiting class in 1993-94 and in 1994-95, with a group that included Maurice Taylor and Jerod Ward. The accomplishment marked the first time that a university had the nation's top class in consecutive years, according to recruiting analyst Bob Gibbons.

His efforts at SDSU have quickly gained accolades as well. The first full-year recruiting effort by Fisher, Dutcher and Co., resulted in a class that was a consensus top-40 group. Their second resulted in a top-25 class without counting a pair of high-profile transfers. Eight seasons ago, Dutcher helped attract SDSU's first McDonald's All-American. In 2004, freshmen Brandon Heath and Marcus Slaughter earned starting spots and all-league recognition. Dutcher was also instrumental in the recruitment of Ryan Amoroso, who earned all-MWC honors in 2007, and the three most recent incoming classes.

Dutcher is firmly entrenched as one of the nation's top recruiters after showing that his rapport is as strong with potential student-athletes on the West Coast as it was in the vaunted Big Ten.

Dutcher was born Oct. 30, 1959, in Alpena, Mich. He attended Bloomington (Minn.) Jefferson High School and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in physical education from Minnesota in 1982. While an undergraduate, he worked for his father, then-Minnesota head coach Jim Dutcher. He then spent one season in the prep ranks at Apple Valley (Minn.) High School before becoming a graduate assistant at Illinois, where he earned his master's degree in physical education and athletic administration.

While in Champaign, Dutcher helped Lou Henson lead the Illini to a Big Ten title, two appearances in the Sweet 16 and one regional final.

Dutcher's first full-time coaching job came at South Dakota State, where he spent three seasons helping turn around the Division II program before departing in 1988 for Michigan.

His final season in Ann Arbor ended with the Wolverines claiming the first-ever Big Ten Tournament championship.

Mark Fisher enters his fifth season as assistant coach and 10th

overall at San Diego State. The son of 13th-year San Diego State head coach Steve Fisher, Mark Fisher has taken on assistant coach duties after being the program's director of operations the five prior seasons.

Fisher's responsibilities include on-court coaching and skill development with SDSU's post players, opponent scouting, player development and recruiting. Fisher also plays a huge role in the Aztecs' offensive concepts, such as ball screening, spacing and the like.

In his first four years of coaching at SDSU, Fisher helped the Aztecs to their sixth straight 20-win season and sixth consecutive appearance in the post-season, including last year's 34-3 record and Sweet 16 appearance.

When not on the practice court, Fisher can be found on the road in high school gyms around Ameria recruiting.

The fifth-year assistant helped secure the 2009-10 incoming group, which featured the California Player of the Year in Kawhi Leonard. The class was ranked No. 15 in the nation by The HOOP SCOOP Online and was rated as the No. 1 class among nonautomatic qualifying BCS schools by The HOOP SCOOP Online and Rivals.com. Meanwhile, ESPN.com slotted the Aztec incoming class at No. 4 in its "mid-major recruiting."

As the director of operations, Fisher handled many of the day-to-day operations, including scheduling, summer camps and organizing all aspects of team travel. He represented the basket-ball program with the athletic administration.

During his time supervising scheduling, the Aztecs have played high-profile games against Arizona, California, Providence, Iowa State, Washington and Washington State among others. In addition, he has arranged San Diego State to play in the BP Top of the World Classic in Fairbanks, Alaska, the Shamrock Invitational in Moraga, Calif., the World Vision Classic in Fresno, Calif., and the prestigious John R. Wooden Classic in past seasons.

In previous years, when San Diego State had two assistant coaches, Fisher officially took on coaching responsibilities, including conducting individual workouts and off-campus recruiting.

Fisher, the oldest of Steve Fisher's two sons, graduated from Michigan in December of 2001. A member of Psi Chi, a psychology honors fraternity, he graduated with a bachelor's degree in psychology.

Around basketball a majority of his life, Mark Fisher has amassed a variety of experience in a short period of time.

From 1998-2001, Fisher worked in a variety of capacities for Lincoln High School in Ann Arbor, Mich. He served as the varsity assistant head coach, head junior varsity coach and the head freshman coach during his tenure, assisting in all areas of the program.

He served as associate head coach for an Ann Arbor AAU team in the summer of 2001. Many of the players on that squad went on to play college basketball. He has also assisted in numerous camps, including the Steve Fisher Basketball Camps - both in Ann Arbor and in San Diego.



Tony BlandAssistant Coach
1st Season at SDSU
San Diego State '09

Tony Bland, a two-time all-Mountain West selection who

guided the Aztecs to a NCAA and postseason NIT appearance in his two seasons on The Mesa, enters his first season as an assistant coach at his alma mater.

Bland, 31, is the first San Diego State graduate to serve as a full-time assistant coach since the 1977-78 campaign. He also becomes the third former Steve Fisher-coached player to serve as a full-time member of the coaching staff at SDSU, following Gary Grant and Mark Hughes.

His duties as an assistant coach include on-court coaching, opponent scouting and recruiting.

Bland transferred to San Diego State after playing two seasons at Syracuse. A native of Los Angeles, Bland played college basketball for two national championship coaches in Jim Boeheim and Fisher and was part of teams that won 84 games and advanced to three NCAA Tournaments and a post-season NIT in his four seasons at the collegiate level.

As a college player at San Diego State and Syracuse, Bland recorded 1,368 points, 331 rebounds, 319 assists while playing in 127 games and making 95 starts.

Bland, a captain on the 2001-02 Aztec squad, led the team to its first Division I postseason victory in school history, a 67-62 overtime win over UC Santa Barbara in the NIT. That year, as a senior, Bland averaged a career-high 16.4 points, 3.5 rebounds and 3.4 assists. He earned second-team all-conference honors and was named a member of the NABC District 13 and USBWA District IX teams.

As a junior, Bland led San Diego State's magical run to a Mountain West tournament championship and the school's first NCAA Tournament berth since 1985. He averaged 15.7 points, 4.0 rebounds and 3.4 assists, in becoming the first player in the history of the MW to rank among the league's top-10 players in scoring and assists and top-20 players in rebounding

After college, Bland earned an invitation to take part in the Indiana Pacers training camp before playing in the United States Basketball League (USBL) where he played for former NBA player John Starks. During his stint in the USBL, Bland averaged 18.7 points, 5.1 rebounds and 5.7 assists en route to earning the league's Rookie of the Year award. From there, Bland participated in the Sacramento Kings' training camp in the fall of 2004 before signing a contract with the team. Following his stay with Sacramento, Bland played in Russia before moving on to the NBDL's Albuquerque Thunderbirds, where he played for two seasons for former NBA player Michael Cooper and won a championship in 2005-06. Shortly thereafter, Bland went overseas to play in Europe before returning to San Diego State prior to the 2008-09 campaign to serve as the team's head manager and ultimately finishing his degree. The last two seasons, Bland has been the personal trainer for Trevor Ariza, a forward for the New Orleans Hornets.




