Preseason Notes

WELCOME BACK

San Diego State returns four starters and nine letterwinners off the 2003-04 squad which finished with a 14-16 record overall and a 5-9 Mountain West Conference mark. In addition to returning four starters, the Aztecs have an experienced group with five seniors.

Three San Diego State players that received all-conference accolades last season are back. Senior point guard Wesley Stokes, sophomore guard Brandon Heath and sophomore forward Marcus Slaughter, all of whom earned all-league honorable mention honors for the Aztecs last season return. Also back as a fifth-year senior is forward Chris Walton.

In addition to the four starters, the Aztecs should have a wealth of seasoned veterans coming off the bench. It will start with three seniors. Chris Manker (7-0, 214 lbs.) will be counted on to spread the defense with his perimeter shooting, Tommy Johnson brings four solid years of experience to the team and Travis Hanour looks to rebound from two injury-plagued seasons to provide a spark off the bench.

As head coach Steve Fisher enters his sixth season, this marks the second time he has four starters back off a team he coached. The last time it happened was the 2001-02 campaign, when San Diego State posted a 21-12 record, won the Mountain West Conference postseason tournament and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 17 seasons.

8-FOR-8

Four starters returning have been a good trend for Aztec coach Steve Fisher. On eight occasions Fisher has returned at least three starters off a team he coached and on all eight occasions he has led that squad to the postseason (six NCAA Tournaments and two postseason NIT). Specifically when Fisher welcomes back four starters off a squad that he coached the previous season, he has guided his teams to four NCAA Tournaments, one NIT appearance and an average victory total of 23.4 wins on those five occasions.

TIDBITS

San Diego State survived the loss of four starters and the nation's 64th most difficult schedule (third toughest in the MWC) in 2003-04 to claim 14 victories marking the fourth straight season SDSU has won at least 14 games... Six of the Aztecs' 16 losses came by six points or less or in overtime... San Diego State defeated Brigham Young and UNLV at home in the same season for just the second time in school history. The Aztecs also disposed of the Rebels and Cougars during the 1981-82 campaign... San Diego State's 11-4 (.733) record marked the second best home winning percentage for an Aztec squad in the last 19 seasons (the 2001-02 team went 12-3 at home)... San Diego State averaged a school-record 8,305 fans per conference home game... In the 2003-04 season, the Aztecs averaged 6,701 per contest and eclipsed the 100,000 in total home attendance for the second time in school history... Of San Diego State's 30 games last season, a school-record 27 were televised either locally, regionally or nationally... San Diego State has won at least 14 games in four consecutive seasons for the first time since the 1981-82, 1982-83, 1983-84 and 1984-85 campaigns. The Aztecs won 14 or more games in a season just once in the 15 seasons between the two streaks... In the past three seasons, 74 of 93 games have appeared on television. In 1998-99, the year before Steve Fisher's arrival, San Diego State made nine appearances on television, eight of which were broadcast only in San Diego County... In the 84 seasons of Aztec basketball, three of the largest four and 13 of the largest 24 home crowds have occurred this decade. The three largest home attendance averages have come in the last three seasons... For the fourth straight season the Aztecs placed a player on the USBWA Team and for the third consecutive year the Aztecs were represented on the NABC Team... San Diego State won 65 games the last four seasons, making Aerick Sanders and Ben Wardrop the most victorious four-year players to leave the Aztec basketball program in 17 seasons.

IN 2004-05...

San Diego State returns players that accounted for 77.1 percent of the scoring, 68.7 percent of the rebounds, 91.7 percent of the assists and 82.1 percent of the total minutes played... San Diego State will return three players that received all-conference accolades in 2003-04 - Wesley Stokes, Brandon Heath and Marcus Slaughter... Brandon Heath and Marcus Slaughter were the second highest freshmen scoring duo in school history.

Steve Fisher

Entering 14th-Full Season • Entering 6th Season at SDSU • Illinois State, 1967

One of the nation's most distinguished coaches, Steve Fisher has guided San Diego State's transformation from a college basketball afterthought to one of the most visible programs in the country.

In five short seasons, Steve Fisher has changed the outlook, fortunes and expectations of San Diego State basketball. The Aztecs have been transformed from the ugly duckling that muddled through the first-ever Mountain West Conference campaign with an 0-14 record into a program that has produced three .500 or better campaigns in the last four seasons, advanced to postseason play twice in the last three years, claimed a conference championship and the first Division I postseason victory in school history.

It is a school that now regularly goes toe-to-toe with the west's best basketball programs on the court and in the recruiting wars. It may be the new program on the block but seniority rarely matters in the changing world of college athletics.

When Fisher arrived on the scene, he found a basketball program that wasn't good enough to be called average. The Aztecs had suffered through 13 losing seasons in 14 years. Members of the school's last NCAA team were in the early stages of middle age. The expectations were in place all right. The Aztecs were expected and expecting to lose. The year before his arrival San Diego State won just four games.

The hiring only dates back to March of 1999, so referring to the "Steve Fisher Era" at San Diego State might be considered a bit premature. But with the Aztec banner now flying over the Mountain West Conference, there is little doubt that San Diego State basketball has reached a new level.

On March 26, 1999, San Diego State announced its arrival on the basketball scene in the form of a news conference to introduce its new coach, Steve Fisher. Fresh from a stint with the Sacramento Kings and with three appearances in the Final Four and a national championship in his pocket, he rolled up his sleeves and went to work. And work was needed. It looked to be a daunting challenge and yet the man with one of the highest winning percentages in NCAA Tournament history had no reservations.

No head-coaching career, at any level, started quicker than that of Steve Fisher. Six games into his head-coaching career he was undefeated and sporting a national championship ring. And the success didn't stop with the national title.

Fisher's eight-plus seasons at the University of Michigan produced a 184-82 (.692) record, nine postseason tournament berths and three trips to the NCAA championship game, including the magical run to the 1989 national title.

Under Fisher, the Wolverines also claimed an NIT championship, won at least 20 games four times and finished among the top three in the powerful Big Ten Conference five times. In 1995, Michigan set a league record by holding opponents to just 39.4 percent shooting from the floor.

Fisher and Company raised the bar even higher in the postseason. His seven NCAA Tournament teams at Michigan combined for a 20-6 record, ranking him fourth among active coaches and ninth in NCAA history with a winning percentage of .769 in the national bracket. Only 13 coaches have taken more teams to the Final Four, including just five that are still active. He is one of three coaches to take three squads to the Final Four in the first five years of a head-coaching career, and one of just six coaches to lead a team to the championship of the NIT as well as the NCAA.

His accomplishments may be even greater at San Diego State. In 2001-02 he led the Aztecs to the postseason for the first time since 1985 and for just the fourth time ever. The 21 wins were second most for the school as a Division I program and the most since 1985. The fact that those numbers came after just three seasons signifies what is one of the great recent turnarounds in college basketball.

He followed that up with a third consecutive season with a .500 or better record in 2002-03 and led San Diego State back to the postseason for the second consecutive season for only the second time in the school's Division I history. In addition, SDSU claimed its first Division I postseason victory with a win in the NIT.

The Aztecs survived the loss of four starters and arguably the most difficult schedule in school history to post a 14-16 record in 2003-04. Highlights during the campaign included a third-place finish at the EA Sports Maui Invitational and home victories over Brigham Young and Utah.

The future looks even brighter. The Aztecs return four starters along with another nationally-ranked recruiting class; this combination has SDSU fans looking forward to the 2004-05 campaign.

An athletic fourth-year junior who will be relied upon to provide depth on the front line... Possesses the ability to make athletic plays both with his quickness as well as his ability to play well above the rim... Picked up competitive basketball relatively late and continues to gain court knowledge with experience... Brings great energy and enthusiasm off the bench... Continues to work on his offensive skills and developing a mid-range jumper... Only one current player has been in the program longer than Davis (Chris Walton).

As A Sophomore (2003-04)

Played in 17 games, including 11 Mountain West Conference contests after missing the first eight games of the season due to knee surgery on Nov. 21 (the day of the season opener) to remove two bone fragments in his right knee... The injury occurred during practice, two days before the opener and head coach Steve Fisher gave Davis the option of delaying the surgery to accompany the team to Maui for the EA Sports Maui Invitational... Davis declined the invitation so the surgery could occur as soon as possible... He played in 17 of 22 contests after his return... Although he saw limited action, he made the most of his opportunities, scoring 26 points, and adding 17 rebounds in 89 minutes of action... Had four blocked shots on the season to tie him for the fourth highest total on the squad... Played 10 or more minutes twice during the season (15 at Saint Mary's (1-6-04) and 11 at Colorado State (1-24-04))... Had a career high with eight points and tied a career-best with four rebounds at New Mexico (2-28-04)... Did his damage against the Lobos in just nine minutes of action... Sealed the victory against Brigham Young (1-12-04) with a dunk with 12 seconds remaining after coming off the bench to replace Aerick Sanders who fouled out... Tied career highs with six points and four rebounds at Saint Mary's (1-6-04), while playing a season high 15 minutes... Played in his first contest of the season against Cal Poly (12-18-03) and registered a career high four rebounds, along with four points on two-of-two shooting in seven minutes... Went 4-for-6 from the field at Cox Arena this season... Pulled down two rebounds and blocked a shot in two minutes of action against Eastern Washington (12-20-03).

As A Freshman (2002-03)

One of the most productive freshmen in the Mountain West Conference, Davis ranked second in the league among first-year players in field-goal percentage (min. 20 FGA) connecting on 16-of-26 attempts (61.5 percent)... Played in 24 of 30 games during the campaign, including the first 12 of the season... Provided depth in the post position early when the Aztecs were without Evan Burns, Travis Hanour and Chris Manker... Averaged 6.9 minutes per contest and was one of four key freshmen contributors to see major minutes in their first season (Evan Burns 582 minutes, Steve Sir 438 minutes, John Sharper 236, Trimaine Davis 166 minutes)... Was one of only four post players on the active roster joining Mike Mackell, Aerick Sanders and Chris Manker... Played at least 10 minutes in the first six games of the season and eight minutes in 24 games... Never went more than two games without seeing court time... Connected on 15-of-24 attempts from the field in the regular season (62.5 percent) after hitting all 15 of his field goal attempts during the exhibition games... Made his final five attempts from the field and did not miss a field goal attempt after Dec. 30, 2002... Had three points and a rebound in 16 minutes against IPFW (12-30-02)... Scored three points and had a monster dunk in five minutes of action against Florida Atlantic (12-28-02)... Scored 10 points and pulled down three rebounds in games against UC San Diego and Arizona (30 minutes of action)... Went 3-for-3 from the field and scored a career-high six points in 19 minutes against UC San Diego (12-2-02)... Came off the bench to score four points in 11 minutes against top-ranked Arizona (12-7-02)... Saw eight minutes of action in the Aztecs' second-round NIT game at Texas Tech (3-21-03), scoring two points and adding a career-high-tying three rebounds.

As a Redshirt (2001-02)

Worked hard on and off the court to develop his game and get stronger... Redshirted along with two-guard Steve Sir because the Aztecs were deep at both positions... An enthusiastic player who was the Aztecs' biggest cheerleader on the bench while redshirting.

High School

Averaged 20.6 points, 14.7 rebounds and 5.7 blocks for Pittsburg High as a senior... Was the first player to sign with SDSU during the spring 2001 signing period... Earned most valuable player honors in the Bay Valley Athletic League and was named to the *San Francisco Chronicle* all-metro boys team... Selected to the *NorCalPreps.com* all-NorCal third team... His prep team had a 24-2 regular-season record, the best in school history, and shared the conference title... Four-year letterwinner for the Pirates... Played for coach Darrick Domineeli.

Those around the program hope Hanour will have his first injury-free season at San Diego State... In his third season on The Mesa, Hanour has played in just 18 games in his two seasons at SDSU and has had two knee surgeries since he last saw action in a game... Although his three-year stats aren't exactly eye-popping, the medical and coaching staffs hope that off-season surgery will allow Hanour to go through a season healthy for the first time and he will finally be able to show why he was a projected starter for the Arizona Wildcats before transferring prior to the 2001-02 season... An athletic, intelligent performer, Hanour was the Aztecs' best player during the first month of practice prior to the 2002-03 season, but difficulty with tendinitis in both knees limited his playing time and productivity.

Summer Update (2004)

Had surgery on his right knee on April 7th to alleviate chronic tendinitis... This is the same surgery Hanour had performed on his left knee last spring (exactly 51 weeks earlier to the day)... The surgery has relegated Hanour to the weight room, and will likely keep him off the court until October... He is not expected to miss any practice time due to the surgery.

As A Junior (2003-04)

Continued to be plagued by injuries, missing the entire season due to a variety of ailments... Underwent left knee surgery on April 14th to eliminate chronic tendinitis... That surgery kept him off the court during the summer... Played his first fullcourt pick-up game on Sept. 25... While not able to play, Hanour spent quality time in the weight room and added considerable muscle to his upper body... Was unable to participate in pre-season conditioning because of the surgery, but started practicing with the team in October... Suffered a bulging disc and did not practice with the team from Nov. 2-Dec. 28... Practiced with the team for 30 minutes on Dec. 29 and was practicing every day since, until suffering a sprained ankle which forced him to miss games during January... After sitting out a couple of weeks, Hanour reagravated the ankle injury and that put him on the shelf for the remainder of the season... Had already used his redshirt season (when he transferred) and can not request a medical redshirt season or sixth year from the NCAA until his eligibility has expired, hence the 2003-04 season counts against his four years.

As A Sophomore (2002-03)

Played in 18 games and drew the starting assignment eight times... Missed the first six games of the season per the NCAA's 4-2-4 transfer rule, but played in 18 of the next 19 games before missing the final five games of the season due to tendinitis... His eight starts tied him for the fifth highest total on the team and second among returning players... Had four rebounds and an assist in 10 minutes at Brigham Young (2-17-03)... Drew the start and posted three points and two rebounds in seven minutes of play at Utah (2-15-03)... Left the game against the Utes with a sprained ankle and was doubtful for the contest against the Cougars before seeing 10 minutes of action... Had a strong performance with three points and three rebounds in 13 minutes vs. UNLV (2-11-03)... Played only six minutes vs. Wyoming (2-3-03), but pulled down three rebounds and dished out an assist... Had a tough shooting night against the Rams when he connected on 1-of-11 from the field, including 1-of-7 from three-point range... Despite the cold shooting night, Hanour played well, recording five points, four rebounds and two assists in 26 minutes of action... Connected on 1-of-2 field goal attempts against New Mexico... Prior to that game, he suffered his first scoreless game as a member of the Aztecs, grabbing one rebound in 14 minutes of action against Brigham Young (1-20-03)... Had a career-best 35 minutes against Utah (1-18-03) which resulted in four points and a career-high seven rebounds against the Utes... Scored three points and added six rebounds in 20 minutes of action against San Diego... Returned from a one-game hiatus due to the flu with a strong performance against Texas Tech (1-6-03)... Played 22 minutes, with five points, two rebounds, two steals, one assist and two blocked shots against the Red Raiders... In his first three games at San Diego State his playing time increased (16-18-21), his point production increased (4-6-11) and his rebound total increased (2-4-4)... That trend changed slightly in the Aztecs' blowout victory against IPFW (12-30-02), when he scored three points, tied a career-high with five rebounds and added two assists in 19 minutes of action... Scored 11 points in 21 minutes of action against Florida Atlantic (12-28-02), tying a career-high point total... Played 16 minutes in his debut against Hawai'i (12-14-02) and scored four points while adding two rebounds and two assists... As an example of his all-around abilities, Hanour recorded a basket, a rebound, an assist and a blocked shot in his first 100 seconds on the court.

As A Freshman at Arizona (2000-01)

One of three freshmen to play for an Arizona squad that finished 28-8 overall and 15-3 in the Pac-10... The Wildcats finished second in the conference and advanced to the NCAA championship game before falling to Duke... Saw action in 20 games, the most by any freshman on the squad and the 10th highest total on the squad... Connected on 18-of-20 attempts (90.0 percent) from the free-throw line... Best percentage on the squad if he had enough attempts to qualify... Saw action in Arizona's national semifinal victory over Michigan State (3-31-01)... Scored a career-high 11 points at Oregon State (2-3-01), connecting on 4-of-5 attempts from the floor, including 3-of-4 from bonus distance... Pushed Arizona over the century mark by connecting on a trey vs. Eastern Illinois in the first round of the NCAA Tournament (3-16-01)... Scored 15 of his 54 points in two games at Oregon and Oregon State... Totaled four points, two boards and an assist at USC (2-17-02)... Tallied four points, three rebounds and a career-high three assists against Washington State (2-10-02)... Logged a career-best 24 minutes against Saint Mary's (12-2-02), responding with nine points on the strength of 4-for-4 free-throw shooting... Averaged 13.9 points per 40 minutes of action.

An all-conference honorable mention honoree as announced by the league and as voted upon by the coaches and the media... One of only four freshman among the 29 players that earned recognition by the league, joining teammate Marcus Slaughter, Brigham Young's Andrew Bogut and Colorado State's Dwight Boatner... Enjoyed one of the best freshman campaigns in school history... Ranked among the league leaders in three categories, steals (6th), three-point field goals (7th) and in scoring (9th)... Led all league freshmen in all three of those categories... One of five Aztec players to see action in all 30 games and his 26 starts were the fourth highest total on the squad... Led the team in three-point field goals (48) and was second on the squad in scoring (13.8), steals (41), and free throws (77)... Became just the second freshman in San Diego State history to score 400 points in his inaugural season (Tony Ross 455 in 1986-87)... Led the team in scoring nine times and in assists on two occasions... Produced 21 double-digit scoring games, including a team-high tying nine 20-point performances... Produced four of the top six scoring performances by San Diego State players during the season... Had five games with four or more treys, including an SDSU season best five three-point field goals against Ohio State (11-24-03)...
