The Winner's Circle

The San Diego State Aztecs (1-5/1-0), coming off their first win of the season and their first ever under head coach Tom Craft, will travel to Laramie this weekend for a Mountain West Conference game with the Wyoming Cowboys. Kickoff is set for 1 p.m. (Mountain). The Cowboys enter the game also at 1-5 after dropping their league opener vs. Colorado State, 44-36, on Saturday.

Road Streak

San Diego State will be hitting the road for the first time in Mountain West Conference play. Over the first three seasons, SDSU has been among the best road teams in the league, despite three second-division finishes. The Aztecs are 6-4 in Mountain West road games, including wins at Wyoming, UNLV, New Mexico, Brigham Young and Colorado State over the past three years.

Road Stops

Only Brigham Young (nine) and Colorado State (eight) have more Mountain West road victories than San Diego State. In fact, Colorado

State has lost just two home games in league play and both are to the Aztecs. Brigham Young's lone MWC home loss over the past two seasons was against the Aztecs.

Receiver U

The streak lives on. San Diego State has had a 100-yard receiver in every game this season (and twice have had two 100-yard receivers in the same game). The amazing wideout seasons being registered by J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood are detailed more fully on page seven as they continue to chase NCAA history and audition for national honors.

Fred's Friends

Receivers J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood have both been added to the Biletnikoff Award watch list. The award is presented annually to the nation's top receiver. It is sponsored by the Tallahassee (Fla.) Quarterback Club Foundation.

With his 16 receptions on Saturday against Utah (the second best single-game total in SDSU history, a

Media Information

World Wide Web: All San Diego State releases, results, statistics, box scores, schedules, rosters and coach and player information is available on the Internet at www.goaztecs.com. Game recaps and statistics are updated after each game.

Weekly Release: The media relations office will be e-mailing its releases this season on Sunday afternoons. Fax versions of the update will be sent by request only. The release will also be available Sunday evenings on www.goaztecs.com.

Practices: Unless noted, all practices are open to both the media and public and will be staffed by a member of the Aztec Media Relations office. Electronic media wishing to shoot video during practice are asked to tape during the first 30 minutes of workouts only. Requested coaches and players will be made available for interviews following each practice.

Interview Opportunities

Sundays: Coach Tom Craft meets with members of the media at 3 p.m. in the Aztec Athletics Center on Sundays during the season. Media should contact the media relations office to confirm.

Tuesdays: Coach Tom Craft is available via phone as part of the Mountain West Conference teleconference. Craft is scheduled on the conference call at 10:42 a.m.

Wednesdays: By arrangement and post-practice.

Thursdays: By arrangement and post-practice.

Fridays: Following walk-through at game site.

Saturdays: Postgame only.

Practice Policies: San Diego State practices are generally open unless otherwise noted. Media should contact the media relations office to confirm practice times and parking arrangements. Practices are generally at 3:40 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Mondays are off days for the players and interview opportunities are limited on Fridays as well. Requested players and coaches are usually available after practice. Due to schedule constraints player requests are generally limited to post-practice.

Postgame Policies: Once the team and coaching staff arrive in the lockerroom following the game, there will be a 10-minute cooling off period. At which time, Tom Craft will meet with members of the media at a predetermined location and the lockerroom will be opened to credentialed media.

Mountain West Conference record and tied for the most in a college game this season), J.R. Tolver moved alongside former Aztec Will Blackwell atop the career receiving chart at SDSU. Both players have 197 career receptions. Tolver has also matched his 63 catches for all of last season and his 932 receiving yards have also passed the 2002 totals.

1,000-Yard Man (Men)

J.R. Tolver enters the Wyoming game with 932 receiving yards in 2002. He will be looking to become SDSU's first 1,000-yard receiver since Will Blackwell in 1996. Kassim Osgood is just 189 yards shy of 1,000. San Diego State has not had two 1,000-yard receivers on the same team since 1995 when Will Blackwell (1,207 yards) and Az Hakim (1,022) each reached the 1,000-yard mark.

The League Race

San Diego State is 1-0 in the Mountain West Conference after opening the league slate with an impressive 36-17 win over Utah, considered one of the league favorites entering the 2002 season. Utah had suffered narrow losses at Arizona, at Michigan and a last-second loss to top 25 foe Air Force (all by a total of 13 points). San Diego State is 1-0 for the third time in four seasons of Mountain West play. However, the Aztecs have never opened the MWC with a 2-0 start.

These Things Go Away

The victory over Utah ended several negative streaks for the Aztecs:

- ▶ First and foremost, San Diego State ended its five-game losing streak to start the 2002 season. San Diego State ended a two-game home losing streak and picked up its first-ever Mountain West home win over an opponent other than Wyoming.
- ▶ The win over the Utes was the first for San Diego State over Utah since the formation of the Mountain West, leaving Air Force as the only MWC foe SDSU has not defeated since the league was formed in 1999.
- ▶ The game also ended a three-game overall losing streak to Utah, dating back to the 1998 overtime win.

The Good Streaks

San Diego State, after closing 2001 with a 38-16 win over Wyoming, has won two straight league games for the first time since ending 1999 with wins over UNLV and Wyoming. The Aztecs have also won two straight conference home games for the first time since joining the Mountain West and the 36 points represent SDSU's third highest point total in league play since joining the league.

Turnover Turnaround

SDSU entered Mountain West Conference play 113th nationally in turnover ratio. However, the Aztecs intercepted four Utah passes and forced a fumble while giving the ball up just once. And in the all-important points-off-turnovers categories, SDSU picked up 17. For the record, the Aztecs are now 87th in turnover margin at -1.00 per game.

A Different Kind of TO

San Diego State's plus-four turnover margin against Utah marked SDSU's first advantage in the takeaway department since last season's finale vs. Wyoming when the Cowboys gave up the ball nine times. Coupled with the Wyoming game last season, San Diego State has now picked off 10 passes in its last two Mountain West Conference games.

Secondary Strikes Back

The Aztec defense entered the Utah game with just one interception. SDSU's four picks against Utah, including two by Ricky Sharpe, were the most by the Aztecs in a game since the 2001 season finale when SDSU picked off six Wyoming passes. The interceptions included the first two of the season for Ricky Sharpe, the first of the season for Jeff Shoate and the second in the career of sophomore linebacker Kirk Morrison.

More On The Defense

San Diego State allowed Utah 159 yards and 10 points on the Utes' first three possessions. Another 118 yards of Utah offense came after SDSU had extended its lead to 36-10. During the decisive period of the game, Utah had eight possessions that resulted in a total of 88 yards, no points, four punts and three interceptions.

Passing Fancy

San Diego State expected to be more effective throwing the ball during the "Air Craft" era. However, what has happened through six games might have been hard to predict. San Diego State has passed it passing yardage total for all of the 2001 season with 2,123 yards in six games. A year ago SDSU had just five touchdown passes and 12 are already in the book this season. And perhaps even more importantly, the Aztecs have thrown just five interceptions in 285 attempts. Last season SDSU tossed 15 interceptions in 333 attempts.

Catching On

San Diego State has grown into the no-huddle offense. Check out San Diego State's offensive numbers through the first two games of the season as compared to the numbers over the past four games.

Offense Has Promised

There is no denying that the offense is back on Montezuma Mesa. The Aztecs enter the Wyoming contest 28th in the country in total offense and fifth nationally in passing offense. Quarterback Adam Hall is fourth in the country in total offense and he is throwing to perhaps the nation's best receiving tandem. Aztecs And Cowboys

Wyoming leads the series with San Diego State, 13-10. However, the Aztecs have won the last three meetings by a combined score of 111-23. SDSU's current winning streak is its longest in the series. In fact, the Aztecs had never won two straight against the Cowboys until 1999 and 2000.

Last Year At Qualcomm

The Aztecs played with emotion in Ted Tollner's last game and picked up a 38-16 victory on Nov. 17, 2001. Larry Ned ran for 209 yards as SDSU ended a five-game losing streak. The Aztecs were the beneficiaries of nine Wyoming turnovers, including five in the first half. The Wyoming contest provided SDSU fans with their longest look at quarterback Adam Hall. He came off the bench early to relieve Lon Sheriff and finished the day with 183 yards on a 12-of-22 effort. The Aztecs got two interceptions and a fumble recovery from safety Garret Pavelko.

Last Time In Laramie

It was another end to a losing streak when San Diego State picked up its first win of the season on Oct. 7, 2000. Before an ABC regional audience, the Aztecs rolled up a 34-0 win behind the 317-yard passing effort of Lon Sheriff. The game ranks as SDSU's last shutout. SDSU's offense scored on four of its first five possessions and the San Diego State defense limited Wyoming to 184 total yards.

San Diego State and Laramie

The trip to the high country hasn't been too pleasant for the Aztecs. San Diego State is just 3-8 all-time in Laramie. The victory at Wyoming in 2000 was the first for SDSU since 1984 and ended a six-game losing streak in Laramie. The Aztecs did, however, register shutouts in Laramie in 1984 and in 2000, marking the only two times during that span that Wyoming failed to score in a home game. Only once in its history has San Diego State won two straight games in Laramie.

Scouting The Cowboys

Wyoming is 1-5 this season with its victory coming over The Citadel. However, the Cowboys are coming off a tough loss against Colorado State, 44-36. Wyoming has scored 70 points over the last two weeks.

House Comes Home

The game at Laramie marks a return home for San Diego State assistant head coach and defensive line coach Jim House. House is native of Laramie and was a four-year letterwinner for the Cowboys. He was a two-time all-conference player and a former Wyoming team captain. He played on two bowl teams for the Cowboys and earned honorable mention All-America honors. House was a Wyoming assistant coach from 1974 to 1985. He

is in his first year at San Diego State.

The Mountain West

The Aztecs are 9-13 in league games in the fourth year of the Mountain West Conference. San Diego State has been the league's mystery team to date:

- ▶ San Diego State has a league win over every conference foe except Air Force.
- ▶ The Aztecs have gone 2-1 against a Colorado State team that has won or shared two titles and finished second last year. The Rams are 1-2 vs. San Diego State and 15-3 vs. the rest of the league.
- ▶ Colorado State is 8-2 in MWC home games with both losses coming against San Diego State.
- ▶ Brigham Young is 6-1 vs. MWC in home games over the last two years with the lone loss coming to San Diego State.

More On The League

San Diego State is 26-20 in conference games over the last six seasons, including the 1998 championship of the WAC's Pacific Division. San Diego State is coming off a 2-5 league record. San Diego State closed the 2001 campaign with a 38-16 win over Wyoming. A win over Wyoming on Saturday would give SDSU three straight conference wins for the first time since 1998 when SDSU won its final three games against Western Athletic Conference competition.

That Special Feeling

After a very slow start, San Diego State kicker Tommy Kirovski is returning to form for the Aztecs. He missed his first four attempts but has since made seven straight field goals, including three in the win over Utah.

Opposition With A Capital O

San Diego State strength of schedule continues to be high. Through Saturday's Utah contest, SDSU's schedule was rated as the 14th toughest in America by Jeff Sagarin. SDSU's five non-conference opponent are currently 7-2 in league play. Four of the five non-conference losses are to teams currently ranked or receiving votes in the coaches poll.

Driving For Dough

San Diego State has a reputation for the quick strike and with 12 plays over 30 yards this season that reputation may be deserved. However, SDSU's ability to grind it out has been equally impressive. San Diego State has 15 scoring drives that have covered at least 64 yards, including nine that have gone for at least 80 yards.

New Guys Start Here

More newcomers are making their presence felt in the SDSU lineup with 20 players on San Diego State's 44-man two-deep now a member of the true freshman, redshirt freshman or sophomore class. On defense, the only senior starter for SDSU among the back seven is corner Ricky Sharpe. The following is a quick look at the SDSU youth movement.

- ▶ Freshman running back Frederick Collins saw his first action of the season against UCLA and he ran for 47 yards on 11 carries.
- ▶ Another freshman, redshirt linebacker Matt McCoy, got his first start against UCLA, although he has played extensively in each game. He was credited with five tackle against the Bruins.
- ▶ True freshman safety Keith Ellison continues to increase his playing time and draws good reviews from the coaching staff.
- ▶ Redshirt freshman Jasper Harvey now looks to be firmly entrenched as a starter in the offensive line.
- ▶ Redshirt frosh Michael Franklin has either played or started in all five games at running back and has become SDSU's punt returner.
- ▶ The Aztecs start a pair of sophomore safeties in Josh Dean and Marvel Underwood, backed up by true freshman Keith Ellison and redshirt freshman Marcus Demps.
- ▶ San Diego State's impressive two-deep linebacking corps includes four players that are either freshmen or sophomores and just one senior (a non-starter).

Returned from a staph infection to make his first start of the season against Utah...Has moved into the guard spot and provided stability up front for the Aztecs...One of SDSU's most experienced offensive linemen.

► Running Back Michael Franklin

Leads SDSU with 243 rushing yards and a hefty 5.4-yard average...Had San Diego State's two longest runs from scrimmage this season, a 37-yarder at Idaho and a 38-yarder vs. Utah...Has averaged 8.2 yards on 18 punt returns.

► Kicker Tommy Kirovski

Missed his first four field-goal attempts this season but has regained his form and now has hit on seven straight, including all three attempts against Utah...Is second on the team with 35 points this season.

► Linebacker Matt McCoy

San Diego State's newest starter on defense with two under his belt...Has been impressive all season and was credited with two tackles for losses against Utah.

► Linebacker Kirk Morrison

Got his second career interception against Utah and his second in his last two Mountain West games with the other coming in the 2001 season finale vs. Wyoming...Leads the Aztecs with 44 tackles...Is one of five Aztecs to recover a fumble this season.

► Defensive Back Ricky Sharpe

Became the first Aztec in two years to return an interception for a score when he romped 29 yards against Utah in the fourth quarter...It was his second INT of the game and his first two picks of the season...Was also credited with 9.5 tackles and given credit for a pass break up against the Utes.

Defensive Back Jeff Shoate

Another secondary player coming off a good outing against Utah...Picked off his first pass of the season, deflected three other passes and was credited with five tackles on the game, including one behind the line of scrimmage.

Tom Craft – Head Coach

A San Diego State graduate, a former Aztec quarterback and a former offensive coordinator on The Mesa, Craft was introduced as San Diego State's 15th head football coach on Dec. 6, 2001.

As a player, Craft was the starting quarterback and team captain for the Aztecs in 1976 and led San Diego State to a 10-1 record while completing 69 percent of his passes. In fact, during Craft's two years on the San Diego State campus, the Aztecs posted a cumulative mark of 18-4.

The success he tasted as a player became a way of life for Craft as a coach. As a coordinator at San Diego State (1994-1996), Craft led the Aztecs to their three best offensive years in the post-Marshall Faulk era. Each of his units averaged more than 30 points per game, including an eye-popping 38.9-point average his final year as coordinator in 1996. During his last two seasons on campus, San Diego State was ranked among the nation's top 10 teams in scoring and total offense.

Under Craft's tutelage, San Diego State saw some of its greatest individual achievements. Quarterback Billie Blanton, receiver Will Blackwell and running back George Jones etched their names in the Aztec record books.

Blanton's 169.6 passing rating in 1996 is still the best ever by an Aztec and is the fourth best mark in NCAA history. Will Blackwell caught a school-record 86 passes in 1995 and ended his career as SDSU's all-time leading receiver. And if you think Craft's attack is one dimensional, keep in mind that George Jones set the Aztec single-season rushing mark of 1,842 yards in 1995, Craft's second year as offensive coordinator.

Craft's stint as offensive coordinator ended with a pair of eight-win seasons in 1995 and '96. The 1995 San Diego State team was the first in NCAA history with a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,500-yard rusher and a pair of 1,000-yard receivers.

As head coach at Palomar College, Craft's stint can only be referred to as an "era". After serving as an assistant coach at the school from 1977 to 1982, he took over head-coaching duties in 1983. By all accounts, Palomar College football was considered to be on its last legs.

After a pair of 4-6 seasons, the Comets' fortunes began to improve. By the time Craft left the San Marcos school for the Aztec coordinator's job, Palomar was coming off of a three-year stretch of 31-2 and had an offense ranked among the nation's top five for five consecutive years. The Comets had also claimed two national titles in three years.

After three years at San Diego State, Craft returned to Palomar and spent five more seasons at the school, producing another eight-win, 10-win and 11-win season and his final national championship in 1998.

Overall, Craft's stay at Palomar College included a record of 115-56-1. Five of his teams won at least 10 games and he won three national championships and three state championships. He was voted as the state coach of the year five times and was honored as the Mission Conference coach of the year nine times. His squads posted a 9-3 record in bowl games and won nine conference titles in his last 10 years as head coach. During his three-year hiatus from the school, Palomar made just one bowl appearance. Eight members of Craft's 1998 national championship team would go on to sign contracts with NFL teams.

His impact in three seasons at San Diego State was nearly as dramatic. Craft's last two seasons on the Aztec staff represent the last two eight-win seasons on The Mesa. The final two offenses that he coordinated at San Diego State both scored over 400 points. San Diego State has accomplished that feat just twice in eight years, both when Craft was on staff.

Craft is one of three members of the 1976 Aztec squad to take a new coaching job in the last two years. He joins his former teammates Herman Edwards, now the head coach of the New York Jets, and John Fox, the new head coach of the Carolina Panthers.

FRESNO, Calif. - Tom Craft's first game as head coach at San Diego State was an eye-opener and a heartbreaker.

The Aztecs opened slowly, fell behind by nine points midway through the fourth quarter and then rallied to put themselves in position to win the game on the final play, only to have a chip-shot field goal blocked.

San Diego State fell behind the home-standing and heavily-favored Fresno State Bulldogs 10-0 at halftime and if not for heroic efforts by the Aztec defense, things could have been worse. San Diego State had just 19 yards of total offense at the half and ran just 21 plays. But San Diego State's defense kept things close and gave the "no-huddle" its chance.

The Aztecs responded as quarterback Adam Hall passed for 219 yards in the second half and J.R. Tolver stamped himself as an All-America candidate at receiver. In the end, it was just yards short.

San Diego State drove 54 yards on its first possession of the second half only to miss a field goal. But beginning with the third possession after intermission, things got interesting.

Hall found Tolver for 45 yards and James Truvillion capped off a stunning 96-yard touchdown drive for the Aztecs' first score of the year. San

Diego State then turned the ball over on two straight possessions, but the defense limited Fresno State to just a field goal during that stretch. The Bulldog lead stood at 16-7 with 8:26 remaining in the game.

San Diego State then got busy again. The Aztecs drove 81 yards for their second score and again it was Adam Hall to Tolver, this time for a 31-yard scoring strike.

The Aztec defense, which came up with three quarterback sacks, eight tackles behind the line of scrimmage, five pass deflections and a turnover, gave the Aztecs another chance. Trying to protect their lead, the Bulldogs moved the ball just 16 yards before being forced to punt.

The Aztecs took over on their own 35 and moved to the Fresno State 14 before the blocked field goal ended the game.

BOULDER, Colo. - The score may have followed prognostications but San Diego State more than held its own for more than three quarters against 17th-ranked Colorado. In the end, the Buffaloes made fewer mistakes and held off three Aztec scoring drives in the 34-14 win.

Colorado struck early, scoring 14 points on its first two possessions. But the youthful Aztecs recovered quickly. On its second possession, San Diego State marched 80 yards for a score, converting four third-downs into new sets. Overall the scoring march covered 80 yards and was capped by Garric Simmons' four-yard run.

After Colorado struck for a 75-yard score on its second possession, the Aztecs once again retaliated with a 45-yard march following a Colorado punt. Redshirt freshman Michael Franklin broke free on a 31-yard touchdown run to even the game at 14.

It looked like the teams would enter the locker room even, but a fumble on a punt return was picked up by the Buffaloes and toted in for the score and a 21-14 lead at the break.

Colorado scored again in the third quarter on a two-play drive that was set up by a Jeremy Bloom's 31-yard punt return.

San Diego State threatened early and often in the second half with three drives stalling inside the CU 35. The Aztecs also came up wide right on a pair of field-goal tries. Overall, five of SDSU's six second-half possessions ended inside the Colorado 40.

Colorado capped the scoring and clinched the win with a 38-yard touchdown run.

Adam Hall officially stamped himself as a threat at quarterback as he passed for 359 yards with 14 of those connections going to Kassim Osgood.

The two teams ended the game with 401 yards of total offense each.

The Aztecs got a game for the record books from receiver J.R. Tolver and quarterback Adam Hall. Tolver caught 12 passes for 296 yards and a touchdown in the 13th best receiving game in NCAA history. Hall passed for 516 yards and three touchdowns in the loss. It was the sixth best day in Aztec history. However, the records were not enough.

San Diego State dominated the early going and led the game 22-0 in the second quarter. The scoring came courtesy of three Adam Hall touchdown passes, one each to Tolver, Kassim Osgood and Ronnie Davenport. But Arizona State responded.

Trailing 22-0, ASU inserted Andrew Walter at quarterback. His first two passes were touchdown strikes to Shaun McDonald, covering 72 and 33 yards and the game was on.

San Diego State still led 22-14 at halftime. But in the second half, a handful of plays decided the outcome. Arizona State blocked a punt and recovered it for a touchdown and when San Diego State fumbled another punt, ASU took advantage with a brief 18-yard touchdown drive.

The Aztecs ended the game with three straight turnovers after the game had been tied at 25 on a 41-yard field goal by Tommy Kirovski.

For the game, SDSU had five turnovers to go with the blocked punt. SDSU won the total offense battle 574-365 and had a seven-minute advantage in time of possession. San Diego State ran 95 plays to Arizona State's 62.

MOSCOW, Idaho - When you play inside a 16,000-seat facility with goal posts mounted on the wall, you might expect points. And you would be right.

For the second straight game San Diego State wasted a 500-yard passing effort by Adam Hall, a sterling receiving effort by J.R. Tolver and a multiple-touchdown lead. Idaho erased a 24-10 Aztec advantage by scoring on six straight possessions to upset San Diego State, 48-38.

Hall tossed five touchdown passes, including three to Tolver and a 70-yard strike to Kassim Osgood, but Idaho proved up to the task in the noise-laded Kibbie Dome.

When Idaho scored a touchdown with one second remaining in the second quarter, the Aztecs headed to the locker room with a 24-17 lead. The second half, however, was all Idaho. The Vandals ripped up the Aztec defense for 31 points after intermission, including 17 in the decisive fourth quarter. Although the Vandals were out-gained by the Aztecs, Idaho became the first team since Air Force in 2000 to go over 500 yards in total offense against SDSU.

San Diego State was flagged for a season-high seven penalties, but committed just one turnover. San Diego State had the ball for just 11 minutes in the second half when the game titled toward the Vandals.

Tolver ended the game with 14 catches, tying him with teammate Kassim Osgood for the second most catches in the country this season. He also caught three touchdowns after entering the game with just seven career touchdown receptions. A fourth touchdown reception was thwarted by a Vandal pass interference late in the game.

Any hopes for an Aztec comeback, however, were squelched when Bruin quarterback Cory Paus found tight end Mike Seidman for a 79-yard score.

Osgood topped SDSU's offensive performance with a 10-catch, 145-yard effort. The game also featured the debut of true freshman running back Frederick Collins, who ran for 47 yards on 11 carries.

The loss to UCLA left the Aztecs 0-5 for the first time ever.

SAN DIEGO - A month of frustration came to an end on Saturday night as the Aztecs ran past Utah, 36-17, in the Mountain West opener for San Diego State.

Receiver J.R. Tolver continued to write chapters in his dream season with 16 catches for 185 yards and a touchdown. The total was the second best in school history, a Mountain West record and tied him with Will Blackwell for the all-time school record with 197.

Tolver ended the game with 16 catches for 185 yards and his 16-yard TD catch in the third quarter put SDSU in control, 20-10.

The Aztecs came from behind to pick up the first victory of the season. After spotting Utah a 3-0 and 10-3 lead, SDSU came to life in the second period. The Aztecs got a 36-yard touchdown pass from Adam Hall to Kassim Osgood for a score and then put together a 56-yard march that

culminated with a Tommy Kirovski field goal on the final play before intermission. SDSU led at the break, 13-10.

The second half belonged to the Aztecs. San Diego State scored 17 points on three straight possessions and the Aztec defense made its own statement. SDSU picked off four passes and forced a fumble. Ricky Sharpe had two picks in the second half and returned the last one for 29-yard touchdown.

The Utes ended the game with just 308 yards of total offense, including 156 yards after San Diego State extended its lead in the fourth quarter to 31-10.

As a team, SDSU had its best rushing day of the season 116 yards, including 67 by Michael Franklin.

Tommy Kirovski booted three field goals as SDSU won its conference opener for the third time in four years of Mountain West play. The win was the first for SDSU under Tom Craft and ended a three-game losing streak against Utah.
