Crawford

ntering her 13th season at the helm of San Diego State water polo, Carin Crawford continues on her mission to establish the Aztecs as a top contender in women's collegiate water polo.

Crawford has guided the Scarlet and Black to a top-11 national finish in each of her 12 years at San Diego State. During her tenure, the Aztecs have accumulated 23 All-America awards and 22 all-MPSF honors. In addition, her players have earned 45 all-MPSF academic selections and 43 ACWPC all-academic awards.

Last season, Crawford led San Diego State to a school-record fifth straight 20-win season, which culminated in two Aztecs earning All-America honorable mention accolades.

In 2009, Crawford coached the Aztecs to a 23-11 record. Among her three All-Amercians that year is current senior Sarah Brady.

In 2008, Crawford led the Scarlet and Black to a second consecutive NCAA water polo championship tournament. The Aztecs finished in fifth place to post its second straight top-five effort. For the second year in a row, Crawford's team finished their campaign with a school record for wins with 31. In addition, Crawford earned her 200th career victory with a win over Maryland at the UCSD Triton Invitational.

Crawford guided SDSU into the national spotlight in 2007, as the team earned its first-ever at-large bid to the NCAA water polo cham-

pionships. The Aztecs ended up placing fourth at the tournament and finished the campaign with a then-program record 29 victories.

Prior to water polo becoming an NCAA championship sport in 2001, the Aztecs advanced to the National Collegiate Water Polo Championship in Crawford's first two seasons, finishing fifth (1999) and sixth (2000). A year later, Crawford's Aztec team took second at the postseason National Collegiate Select Tournament.

Crawford's coaching and playing experience has provided the foundation from which she has built the Aztec women's water polo program. Prior to her arrival on Montezuma Mesa, Crawford served as head coach of the San Diego Mesa College women's water polo team from 1996-98 and guided them to a berth in the 1996 SoCal Championships, while coaching two players to All-America honors during her two sea-

As coach of the Sunset San Diego Girls water polo club, Crawford assisted in building one of the premier club programs in the nation. The Sunset Girls were perennial medalists in every age group at the National Junior Olympics Water Polo Tournament from 1996-98. As a player for the Sunset Senior Women's team, Crawford was a four-time All-American, helping her team win nine Senior National Championship titles.

While a member of the United States National Team from 1989 to

1992, Crawford participated in four U.S. Olympic Festivals, earning two gold medals, a silver and a bronze. Through her participation on the national team, she traveled to Hungary, Holland, Australia and New Zealand, accumulating international playing experience.

During her collegiate career, Crawford was a co-captain for UC San Diego and received All-America honors in 1988 and 1989. She graduated cum laude in 1989 and returned to earn her master's degree in U.S. history in 1992, while also competing on the U.S. National Team.

As a former athlete representative to USA Water Polo, Crawford has worked at the grassroots level to raise the status of women's water polo to an Olympic and NCAA championship sport. Her contributions paid off when women's water polo was included in the 2000 Olympics and was recognized as an NCAA championship sport in 2001.

A native of Albuquerque, N.M., Crawford attended Valley High School. She enjoys surfing, gardening and spending time with her husband, Jack, and two sons, Jackson and Shane. The family resides in San Diego.

llison Gregory enters her sixth year as an assistant coach at San Diego State after a two-year stint at UC San Diego. Gregory, with 13 years of coaching experience under her belt, returned to Montezuma Mesa after

earning three varsity letters in water polo from 1996-99.

During her time as an assistant coach, San Diego State has enjoyed a great amount of success. In her last five seasons, the Aztecs have won 21 or more games each year,

earned their first two trips to the NCAA Championships (2007, 2008) and recorded five consecutive top-9 finishes in the final national rankings.

Gregory finished her collegiate playing career in 1999 after appearing in 88 games and amassing 21 goals, nine assists and 67 steals.

Her best year came during her senior season when she played in 40 games, scored 11 goals and recorded six assists and 45 steals. That season, Gregory helped SDSU to a 23-19 record and a trip to the Collegiate National Championships where the Aztecs finished in fifth place.

In her three seasons, Gregory's teams went a combined 67-39 with a pair of third-place national finishes and 1999's fifth-place effort.

While still at SDSU, Gregory started coaching at Scripps Ranch High School in San Diego from 1997-2000.

After graduating from San Diego State in 2000, Gregory moved on to coach at another San Diego area high school, La Jolla High, from 2000, 05

Following her stint at La Jolla High, Gregory served as an assistant at UC San Diego for two seasons.

tephanie Lombardo begins her fifth year at San Diego State as a volunteer coach and works primarily with the team's goalkeepers

During her time on Montezuma Mesa, Lombardo helped Sarah Kilgore (2004-07) finish her career with 900 saves, which ranks second all-time in school history, and Heather Fenske (2005-08) end her time at San Diego State with 407 stops (No. 5 all-time). Just last year, Lombardo tutored Kelly Campoli to

her second consecutive All-America selection following a 337-save campaign, the third most in a single season at SDSU. Campoli's selection came on the heels of a 2009 freshman campaign during which the goalkeeper racked up 300 saves and All-America honors, becoming the first Aztec freshman to earn the award since 2001.

Lombardo comes to SDSU after coaching at Santana High School in Santee, Calif. She also played competitively at UC San Diego from 2002-04 after spending two years at Golden West College.

A former standout goalkeeper with the Tritons, Lombardo captured first-team Division II All-America honors as a senior in 2004 after blocking 238 shots, which is the

fourth-highest season total in UCSD history. That year, she also garnered first-team all-Western Water Polo Association accolades after helping the Tritons to a runner-up finish in the conference tournament.

Lombardo graduated in 2004 from UC San Diego with a bachelor's degree in human development.

fter a 2009 campaign that saw San Diego State enjoy yet another 20win season, the Aztecs entered 2010 in search of their identity. The senior trio of Erinn Greenwood, Anna Gonzales and Jenna Schuster was gone, and left in their departure was a young team full of potential.

Finding offense in unexpected places, the Scarlet and Black would go on to prove to the country that experience is not everything, finishing with a 21-15 record that led to a tie for ninth-place ranking in the final national poll.

Opening up at No. 7 in the national polls, San Diego State began its pursuit of an NCAA Tournament berth at the Michigan Kick-Off in Ann Arbor, Mich. The Aztecs earned its ninth-straight opening day victory as it dominated cross-town rival UC San Diego, 19-8, then followed it up by upsetting No. 3 UCLA in overtime later that afternoon, 7-6. The next day, SDSU took down Colorado State before finally being defeated, falling to tournament host No. 10 Michigan, 9-4. Senior Ronni Gautschi played a large role in the team's promising start, finding the back of the net nine times in the first three games.

The Aztecs returned to The Mesa with a 3-1 record and kept their foot on the gas, pounding Marist in the SDSU home-opener, 15-5. The team then traveled across town to the UC San Diego Triton Invitational in La Jolla, Calif., where a 12-3 victory over Redlands was spoiled by the news that Gautschi would be lost for the season due to injury.

Reeling from the loss of their teammate, the Aztecs trounced No. 18 Cal State Bakersfield behind Leanne Ford's five-goal outburst. The next day, the team would fall to No. 13 Hartwick, 12-11, before taking down No. 11 UC Irvine, 10-5.

Coincidentally, the Aztecs were scheduled to travel to Irvine the following week. This time, though, they were not as successful against their in-state opponent, falling 6-5. Despite the loss, SDSU discovered they could have the next big thing on their hands in the form of true freshman Amber Pezzolla. The Bonita High School standout had scored in each of the team's first 10 games, finding the back of the net a team-high 17 times. Junior Sarah Brady was also enjoying a breakout campaign with 13 goals, already tying her entire 2009 total.

SDSU would rebound nicely the following afternoon, going to Long Beach State and coming out with an 8-5 victory. The Aztecs would then take a two-week break until the UCI Invitational, held Feb. 27-28, in Newport Beach, Calif. SDSU produced less than desirable results on day one of the invite, dropping a rematch with No. 5 Michigan before coming up just short in an exhausting triple-overtime game against No. 14 UC Santa Barbara, 10-9. The Aztecs demonstrated resiliency on day two, however, coming back strong with consecutive wins over UC San Diego and No. 15 UC Davis. Pezzolla fueled the win over Davis with five goals, giving her 27 just under halfway through the season.

SDSU would then hit a wall as they entered conference play in March. Beginning with an 11-2 thumping at the hands of No. 2 Stanford, the Aztecs would fall into an early-season hole in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation standings as they lost at No. 7 San Jose State, 7-5.

Returning home for the annual Aztec Invitational, SDSU continued it struggles in conference play, being defeated by No. 3 California, 10-4, to drop the Aztecs to 10-8 on the year and 0-3 in MPSF matches. In desperate need of a win, the schedule eased up at the right time for the Aztecs, who defeated Wagner, Maryland and Cal State Bakersfield, in order, to close the invite with a restored sense of confidence.

Traveling to Los Angeles, Calif., for the LMU Invitational, SDSU continued its modest three-game win streak with a 13-4 win over Pomona-Pitzer. No. 9 Loyola Marymount would bring the Aztecs back to reality, though, as they handed the Scarlet and Black an 11-6 defeat. Once again proving its ability to rebound, SDSU came back the following day with wins against No. 20 Princeton, 10-8, and Colorado State, 11-1.

The following week marked the annual trip across the Pacific Ocean to Hawaii, where two more MPSF games awaited the Aztecs. The team was unable to find the win column, losing to No. 5 Hawai'i, 9-6. The Aztecs then traveled to Los Angeles and lost at No. 1 USC, 9-4.

A three-game home-stand awaited SDSU upon their return from its two-game MPSF road swing, as the Aztecs opened April by rebounding with wins over No. 20 Brown, 10-5, and Cal Baptitst, 10-9. SDSU's conference woes would then once again haunt them the following weekend, coming up two

goals short in a home affair with No. 4 UCLA. The Aztecs would instead save their best for last, traveling to Arizona State for the last regular-season MPSF match of the year and earning an 11-8 victory. The team's party was then crashed just hours later by No. 15 Indiana, who sent the Aztecs back to California with an 11-7 loss.

The last game of the regular season would be the annual Harper Cup match against UC San Diego, an event the Aztecs had never lost entering the ninth year of event. Playing at UCSD's campus, SDSU dominated throughout an 11-3 victory that gave the club 20 wins on the season. Meaghan Poland took home the game's MVP award following her three-goal performance.


Entering the MPSF Championships as the No. 7 seed, the Aztecs were quickly shot down by second-seeded USC, 15-5. It was a disappointing end to their NCAA Tournament dream, but they did not dwell on it long. Inspired by senior Melissa de Jonckheere's four goals, SDSU put together a 12-10 overtime win over No. 6 San Jose State in a consolation match. The Aztecs would conclude the 2010 season the following day, ending it with a tight loss at the hands of No. 5 Hawai'i, 7-6.

Crawford's team defied expectations throughout the season, coming up with timely victories in the face of adversity. While the squad once again waved goodbye to its senior class, it found solace in the knowledge that the 2010 season served as a stepping stone to future, brighter seasons.

Along the way, the Aztecs also discovered what they had in store for 2011. Sophomore Kelly Campoli had established herself as one of the nation's premier goalkeepers, racking up 337 saves en route to being named an Honorable Mention All-American, while junior Sarah Brady had a breakthrough campaign with 36 goals, 47 assists and 73 steals. Sophomores Leanne Ford and Meaghan Poland greatly benefitted from Brady's playmaking ability, contributing 44 goals and 40 goals, respectively, to set up a dynamic trio in 2011.

And then there was Pezzolla, the creative, unstoppable all-around player who glued it all together. Joining Campoli as an Honorable Mention All-American, the freshman did things no freshman has ever done before at SDSU, leading the Aztecs in shots (220), goals (54), assists (48), steals (78) and ejections drawn (59).

The future is bright on The Mesa for Crawford's team. Time will only tell what the 2011 campaign will bring for one of the most celebrated programs in collegiate water polo history.







ince the 2003 season, the San Diego State women's water polo team had called the Salvation Army Kroc Community Center its home. But beginning in 2007, the squad made the transition from the Kroc Center to a state-of-the-art swimming facility on campus, the Aztec Aquaplex.

With its prime location, the long-awaited complex is the final piece of the puzzle for the San Diego State athletic department. The 112,000 square-foot facility is nestled between Tony Gwynn Stadium, SDSU Softball Stadium, Aztec Tennis Center, three football practice fields and the SDSU Sports Deck. In addition,Viejas Arena is well within walking distance, which truly makes the west side of campus the home for Aztec athletics. Moreover, the Aquaplex is situated behind the Aztec Athletics Center, which allows student-athletes easy access to some of the top training personnel and weightlifting facilities on the West Coast.

The Aztec Aquaplex features two pools, one for competition and another for recreation, as well as a hydrotherapy spa. The competition pool measures 51 meters in length and 25 meters in width. It also includes a movable stainless steel bulkhead, which allows a flexible water depth of anywhere between seven and 17 feet.

The pool can accommodate a multitude of competitive swimming events (25-yard short course, 25-meter short course, 50-meter long course); water polo games with floating cage courses of 25 yards, 25 meters and 30 meters, in addition to three 25-yard fixed cage courses; and diving competition with its one- and three-meter springboards, along with the option of expanding the platform to 10 meters.

The facility's 7,300 square-foot recreation pool is just as multi-dimensional as its counterpart. The pool, which is open to the public, maintains a water temperature of approximately 83 degrees and features a beach-style entrance on one side leading to a depth of five feet. It also includes four lanes for lap swimming and water aerobics, as well as an area for water basketball and volleyball, recreational swimming and floating lounges. Throw in a clover leaf-shaped hydrotherapy spa and San Diego State has one of the leading aquatic facilities in the United States.

The nerve center of the Aztec Aquaplex lies in the 5,000 square-foot operations building, which contains showers, locker rooms, restrooms, administrative offices, guest services and storage. The facility is also equipped with an 8,000 square-foot solar water heating panel that doubles as a shading structure for the seating area, which can accommodate 500 spectators.

"We are thrilled to finally have a true home-pool advantage where our players have the opportunity to compete in front of friends, family and other Aztec athletes right here on campus," said SDSU head coach Carin Crawford.

The completion of the Aztec Aquaplex proves that San Diego State University is committed to providing its student-athletes and the Aztec community with the highest quality facilities in America.

"We are thrilled to finally have a true homepool advantage where our players have the opportunity to compete in front of friends, family and other Aztec athletes right here on campus."

n place now on Montezuma Mesa are arguably some of the finest facilities in the United States and San Diego State is certainly among the leaders on the west coast.

The athletic department is now housed in the \$30 million, 130,000-square-foot Aztec Athletics Center. The new centerpiece of the department, which was dedicated in February of 2002, is located just across the street from Viejas Arena and just east of Tony Gwynn Stadium.

The four-story Athletics Center provides stateof-the-art facilities coupled with tremendous logistical advantages and a great location for studying, workouts, treatment, academic support or just stopping by between classes.

On the south, the AAC is buffered by the Sports Deck, where San Diego State's track and field team, along with both soccer squads, compete.

On the north side, it is connected to Peterson Gym, the home of Aztec volleyball and a part-time practice facility for the Aztec basketball teams.

The west exit of the building opens onto three 100-yard practice fields. One of the fields is nat-

ural grass and two utilize field-turf, providing San Diego State daily options for its workouts.

A state-of-the-art weight room, encompassing more than 15,000 square feet, is located on the first floor of the building. It includes a running track for indoor timing.

The sports medicine center and equipment operations are also located on the first floor and help provide incredible convenience to the locker rooms, weight room and other practice facilities.

A first-floor auditorium that seats more than 200 has already been the site of major news conferences, watch parties and public forums.

Each varsity sport, with the exception of the baseball squad, which has a clubhouse at Tony Gwynn Stadium, has a plush locker room on the first floor of the building. The locker rooms include a lounge and television area and oak lockers.

The academic center, complete with two lecture halls, private tutorial rooms, and a new computer lab, is housed on the third floor. The computer lab and study areas are flanked by academic counselors, tutor offices and learning specialists.

The third floor is also home to the athletic administration and the men's and women's basket-ball staffs.

Women's water polo coaches offices and more administration offices are located on the fourth floor of the building, along with a recruiting lounge and a staff lunch room.

The Athletics Center also overlooks Tony Gwynn Stadium, Aztec Tennis Center, SDSU Softball Stadium, the Aztec Aquaplex and a pair of field-turf practice fields.

All of SDSU's facilities, including the athletics center, Viejas Arena, Tony Gwynn Stadium, the Sports Deck, the Aztec Tennis Center, the SDSU Softball Stadium and Aztec Aquaplex have opened since 1997.


The entrance lobby of the Aztec Athletics Center houses the 5,000-square-foot Aztec Hall of Fame, presented by the Wise Foundation. The museum is the first permanent home of the Hall of Fame and features displays, informative kiosks, interactive video trivia games and a plaque commemorating the induction of each Hall of Fame member.











n addition to everything the Aztec Athletics Center has to offer, San Diego State University has some of the finest athletic facilities west of the Mississippi River.

On the south, the Aztec Athletics Center is buffered by the SDSU Sports Deck, where San Diego State's track and field team, along with both men's and women's soccer squads com-

On the north side, it is connected to Peterson Gym, the home of Aztec volleyball.

The west exit of the building opens onto three 120-yard practice fields. One of the fields is natural grass and two utilize field-turf, providing San Diego State daily options for its workouts.

All of SDSU's new facilities, including the athletics center, Viejas Arena at Aztec Bowl, Tony Gwynn Stadium and the SDSU Sports Deck, have opened since 1997.

In spring 2005, San Diego State opened its new 12-court tennis complex complete with state-of-the art Plexicushion surfacing and a tennis operations center. Also opening in 2005 was the softball team's new stadium adjacent to Tony Gwynn Stadium.

The buildings are not just sparkling new, but they are already postseason tested. Viejas Arena

at Aztec Bowl (formerly Cox Arena), the 12,414seat basketball facility, has twice served as a site for the NCAA Men's Basketball Division I Championship (first and second rounds) as well as the NCAA Women's Volleyball Division I National Championship. In March 2006, Viejas Arena also played host to the McDonald's High School All-American Basketball game. Additionally, Viejas Arena was one of 16 sites to welcome the first and second rounds of the NCAA Women's Basketball Division I Championships in 2010.

The SDSU Sports Deck has already played host to the Mountain West Conference Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Tony Gwynn Stadium was the site of the Mountain West baseball tournament in 2001 and the SDSU Softball Stadium played host to the 2005 Mountain West Conference Softball Championship. Last season, the MWC Baseball Championships returned to Tony Gwynn Stadium and will do so again in 2011.

In the spring of 2007, the two-pool Aztec Aquaplex opened giving both the Aztec water polo and swimming and diving programs a new on-campus home. The aquatics center served as the site for the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation Women's Water Polo Championship in April of 2008 and the 2010 NCAA Women's Water

Polo Championships. In 2012, the national championship will return to SDSU.

In addition to all of the postseason events San Diego State has played host to, the facilities have also been the home to multiple in-season events. The SDSU track and field squad, along with the baseball, softball, volleyball and water polo teams all put on their own multiple-team events throughout the season. Every spring, professional football scouts and coaches gather at and utilize the Aztec weight room and then move to the practice fields for NFL Pro Timing Day to catch an up-close glimpse of SDSU graduating football seniors.

Besides all of the school's on-campus facilities, the San Diego State football team plays at Qualcomm Stadium, home of the National Football League's San Diego Chargers, in Mission Valley. Qualcomm Stadium is the host of the Holiday and Poinsettia Bowls and was the home of Super Bowl XXXVII in 2003.

Tony Gwynn Stadium, the Aztec Athletics Center and the Aztec Tennis Center were constructed thanks to donations by John and Becky Moores.





he dual role of student and athlete can be a daunting challenge for any person at the Division I level. Recognizing that academic challenge, the Student-Athlete Academic Support Services program has been developed at San Diego State to assist all student-athletes in achieving academic excellence.

It is a source of pride within San Diego State athletics that the department has developed one of the most comprehensive academic support programs in the country.

The Staff

The SAASS staff includes a director, a learning specialist, four academic advisors, the department's director of compliance, an eligibility coordinator, a financial aid coordinator as well as a recruitment coordinator.

In addition to the full-time staff, the department employs more than 20 mentors and tutors.

Collectively, they operate a program that enhances each student's satisfactory progress toward graduation.

The Services

Throughout the academic year, advisors offer a variety of services to aid individuals in the development of their personal goals and the blueprint for pursuing those goals.

All new student-athletes are invited to an orientation that helps lay the foundation for future successes. Each advisor teaches a section of the University's Freshman Success course (General Studies 100), which deals with specific transition issues for student-athletes. Topics include time management, study skills and test taking. In addition, the course also introduces new students to services such as the Love Library, University Advising Center, Career Services, Health Services and the counseling center.

The Resources

In the fall of 2001, the academic unit joined the rest of the athletic department in moving into

the Aztec Athletics Center. The academic staff is located on the third floor of the complex and includes a 40-station computer lab, individual study rooms and two lecture rooms.

The Commitment

San Diego State's annual Scholar-Athlete Awards Banquet honors students with a grade-point average in excess of 3.2. In 2010, a record 246 student-athletes, more than one-third of the student-athlete body, were honored for their work in the classroom.

A new event was launched in the spring of 2005 with the inaugural Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) Awards. In the spirit of the ESPY's, SDSU's student-athletes were treated to an awards banquet and ceremonies to recognize outstanding individual achievements throughout the athletic department.

Life Skills

To further increase the opportunities for success, San Diego State is part of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The curriculum of Aztec Pride (Promoting Responsibility, Integrity, Diversity, Education) offers a wide range of programs and activities that enhance the educational experience. Special emphasis is placed on the areas of personal development, community service and career development.

In conjunction with the Student Athlete Advisory Committee, the Life Skills Program represents San Diego State's total commitment to enhancing the quality of each student's experience.

tephen L. Weber, the seventh president of San Diego State University, provides dynamic leadership to an institution that ranks among the largest in the nation. Educated as a philosopher, President Weber assumed his administrative responsibilities at SDSU in July 1996 and shortly afterward initiated a campus/community dialogue intended to set the course for the university's future.

Guided by this "Shared Vision," SDSU has moved boldly ahead: reinforcing academic excellence, nurturing students, honoring diversity and social justice, carefully stewarding resources, and further developing global programs.

In the process, SDSU has become an increasingly popular and selective choice among college-bound students. For fall 2009, some 55,000 undergraduate applicants competed for approximately 7,000 vacancies. Not surprisingly, the overall academic quality of SDSU students is also rising. SAT scores have risen approximately 20 points and high school GPA's of incoming first-time freshmen are now over 3.4.

In addition, alumni involvement and private financial support of the university have never been stronger. Under President Weber's leadership, SDSU created The Campanile Foundation, the university fundraising auxiliary. Since The Campanile Foundation was established 10 years ago, SDSU has raised approximately \$520 million, 250 percent more than in the previous 102-year

history of the university.

SDSU is rapidly becoming one of the nation's top urban research universities, working for the diverse peoples of Southern California to address such issues as health and human services, poverty, public safety, and arts and culture. Since 2006, SDSU has been ranked the No. 1 most productive research university in the United States, among schools with 14 or fewer Ph.D. programs, based on the Faculty Scholarly Productivity Index. Last year, faculty and staff of SDSU successfully competed for more than \$133 million in grants and contracts.

A champion of community involvement, President Weber has been an advocate for community service. SDSU has been active in K-12 school reform, administering three inner-city schools enrolling more than 5,000 mostly low-income, highly diverse students and pioneering an often-copied "Compact for Success" working with California's largest and most diverse secondary school district. SDSU has also worked closely with area business and industry to pioneer programs such as Hospitality and Tourism Management, Bio/Pharmaceutical and Biodevice Development, Regulatory Affairs (biotech), and Global Entrepreneurship.

Leading by example, President Weber is the past chair of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities Board of Directors, and co-chaired Partners for K-12 School Reform. He also serves on

the board of governors of The Peres Center for Peace and on the board of directors of the San Diego Regional Economic Development Corporation. He also is a member of the international advisory board for the Foundation for Children of the Californias.

Born in Boston, President Weber is a graduate of Bowling Green State University with a B.A. in philosophy. He received his Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Notre Dame in 1969 and is the author of numerous articles on philosophy and higher education.

President Weber's many awards include an honorary degree from Beijing Capital Normal University and distinguished alumnus at his alma mater, Bowling Green State University. He was named among the 1997 Headliners of the Year by the San Diego Press Club. Also in 1997, the San Diego Mediation Center honored him with its Peacemaker Award. In 1999, President Weber received the Executive Direction.

tor's Award from the San Diego Education Association and the Gold Key Award from the San Diego Hospitality Association. He was recognized as a Leader of Vision by the league of Women Voters of San Diego in 2000. But the award he values most is one he earned many years ago as Outstanding Humanities Professor at the University of Maine.

Before coming to San Diego State University, President Weber served as interim provost of the State University of New York (SUNY) system; he previously served seven years as president of the SUNY Oswego campus. Prior to that, he was vice president of academic affairs at St. Cloud State University in Minnesota, dean of arts and sciences at Fairfield University in Connecticut, and assistant to the president of the University of Maine.

President Weber is married to Susan Keim Weber, who shares his enthusiastic commitment to SDSU. They have two adult sons.

im Sterk was announced as San Diego State University's new Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on February 10, 2010, by SDSU President Stephen L. Weber.

"I'm thrilled with this opportunity and looking forward to taking SDSU Athletics to the next level of success," said Sterk. "We want to build a program that the University, the community and all Aztecs fans can be proud of."

Sterk was hired just in time to see the Aztecs experience the best season on the playing field and in the classroom, in school history.

In fact, in Sterk's first 20 days on his new job, he watched the San Diego State men's and women's basketball teams claim the Mountain West Conference tournament championships, watched both programs advance to the NCAA Tournament, and was on site when the women's program upset Texas and West Virginia en route to advancing to the Sweet 16 for the first time in school history.

In 2009-10, San Diego State set school records in the Learfield Directors' Cup, which rewards overall athletic success, by having eight sports earn points. The Aztecs finished 65th out of all Division I schools nationally.

In addition, a school-record 246 individuals were honored as scholar student-athletes at the year-end banquet.

"Division I athletics is an important tradition at San Diego State and increasingly a big part of the SDSU student experience," said Sterk. "We are going to build on that tradition and reach out to students, staff, alumni and the entire community."

Sterk, 54, came to SDSU from Washington State University where he served as athletic director since 2000. Prior to his hiring at WSU, he served as AD at Portland State University from 1995 to 2000. He brings 24 years of experience in athletics administration performing a variety of roles. His appointment followed a national search.

Sterk also brings a solid reputation and the respect of his peers across the country with WSU having been recognized in 2006 as the Division IA Athletic Directors' "Program of Excellence."

Sterk oversaw a period of unparalleled succes at Washington State with historic accomplishments both on and off the field.

Over his last three years at WSU, 13 Cougar teams competed in NCAA postseason tournaments, including back-to-back trips to the NCAA tournament by the men's basketball team (2007 and 2008), while women's rowing earned five NCAA championship bids, including a fourth-place finish in 2006, the highest finish ever by a WSU women's team in NCAA competition

Academically, the graduation rate for those student-athletes who exhausted their eligibility at WSU was 92 percent over the past 10 years, ranking WSU second in the Pac-10 to Stanford.

WSU student-athletes maintained a 3.01 average cumulative GPA in 2008-09, and for 10 consec-

utive semesters, averaged at least a 3.00 cumulative GPA.

WSU Athletic Foundation membership doubled under Sterk, and annual gifts increased from just under \$3 million in 2000 to more than \$13 million in 2008.

Sterk, during his tenure at WSU, served as chair of the Pac-10 Athletic Directors committee and served on numerous other Pacific-10 Conference committees. Sterk was also a member of the prestigious NCAA Championship/Competition cabinet.


Sterk graduated from Western Washington University in 1980, where he earned four letters in football and one in basketball. He was credited with a school-record 164 tackles during the 1977 season,

garnering first-team NAIA District I all-star accolades and was named team captain and MVP, helping the Vikings to the district championship game. On Feb. 6, 2010, Sterk was inducted into Western Washington's Athletics Hall of Fame for his success in football.

Sterk received his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University. His professional career has included positions at North Carolina, Maine, Seattle Pacific, Tulane, and Portland State, the latter as director of athletics for five years before joining the Washington State staff.

Sterk and his wife Debra have three children: Ashley (21), Amy (18), and Abby (15).

San Diego State's Aztec Heritage


From the early decades of its history, San Diego State has identified itself with the Aztecs, one of the most sophisticated and distinctive societies in the history of the Western Hemisphere. A fitting choice for a university committed to internationalism and diversity, the Aztec identity evokes great pride in Mexico, as well as among many people in the United States, and certainly within the SDSU community. Consequently, San Diego State strives to honor the Aztec people by enhancing awareness, understanding and appreciation of Aztec culture and achievements.

Aztec History

Aztec civilization dates back at least to the 12th century A.D. The precise location is still debated by scholars, but tradition tells us of a place somewhere north of modern-day Mexico City known at that time as Aztlan, which meant "the place of the cranes" or "the place of the herons." The people who lived in this land were called Azteca, meaning "those of Aztlan."

The Azteca eventually left their homeland and became known as the Mexica. Native folklore attributes this name change to the instructions of the people's patron deity, Huitzilopochtli (Hummingbird on the Left).

Around 1325, the Mexica settled on an island in Lake Texcoco, an area that is now the heart of Mexico City, and named it Tenochtitlan or "the place of the fruit of the cactus." A century later, the Mexica and two other Nahuatl-speaking city-states, Texcoco and Tlacopan, combined to create an entity popularly known as the Aztec Empire. Boasting a strong military force, this new alliance commanded a sphere of influence that stretched across much of present-day Mexico. Tenochtitlan and its surrounding valley evolved into a highly sophisticated, multicultural and multilingual city-state of several million inhabitants. At this same time, major European cities numbered only 30,000 to 40,000 in population. A cradle of innovation, the Aztec Empire developed advanced systems of trade, science, politics, religion, education



and agriculture. The Aztecs also enjoyed sports and built grand ballcourts to accommodate team events.

Aztecs and San Diego State

San Diego State University first adopted the Aztec name in the 1920s as a nickname for the college's sports teams. In 1925, the student newspaper followed suit, changing its name from *The Paper Lantern* to *The Aztec*. Since that time, San Diego State's celebration of Aztec heritage has permeated the campus. In 1936, a Donald Hord sculpture of Montezuma II, the last Aztec emperor, became a welcoming campus icon. With the passing years, Aztec themes echoed in the names, colors and architectural elements of new campus buildings. And Aztec culture became the subject of more than a dozen university courses.

In 1941, Monty Montezuma, a character based on Montezuma II, debuted at San Diego State athletic events as a symbolic personification of the Aztecs. Over time, the Montezuma character's look and activities have evolved from a sports mascot into a more dignified and accurate representation of the historical emperor. Montezuma now serves as the university's ambassador of Aztec culture, charged with the responsibility of informing and educating the San Diego community about Aztec civilization. SDSU continues to take pride in its affiliation with Aztec culture and to celebrate the Aztec virtues of strength, valor and intellectual achievement.
