STORYLINES

► San Diego State freshman Lynell Hamilton saw his impressive season end in the fourth quarter at UNLV with a broken ankle. He ends the season with 1,087 rushing yards on 234 carries.

► Hamilton is currently 17th nationally in rushing yards, averaging 108.7 yards per game.

► San Diego State will be trying to win its third straight game in Fort Collins when it visits CSU this weekend.

► The Aztecs need to sweep their final two games to become bowl eligible for the first time since the 1998 season.

► Next up: San Diego State wraps up the regular season by hosting the Air Force Falcons at 6 p.m. at Qualcomm Stadium. The Aztecs won last year's thriller in Colorado Springs, 38-34.

Final Road Trip

The San Diego State Aztecs hit the road for the final time in 2003 when they visit the Colorado State Rams Saturday afternoon in Fort Collins. Kickoff is set for 1:05 p.m. Mountain. San Diego State and Colorado State enter the game with identical records at 5-5 overall and 2-3 in league play. The Aztecs have won two straight while CSU has dropped two straight nailbiters, both on the road.

It's A Plus

The game at Colorado State will be televised regionally (and on Channel 4 San Diego) by ESPN+Plus. The contest will also be available on ESPN Gameplan. In the booth will be Gary Bender (play-by-play) and J.C. Pearson (analyst) with Anne Marie Anderson on the sidelines. That crew was on hand for Saturday's win at UNLV.

The Drive For .500

With the win at UNLV, San Diego State improved to .500 on the season at 5-5. It marks the first time that San Diego State has been .500 or better after 10 games since 1998 when SDSU was 6-4. The 1998 squad went on to post a 7-5 season that included an appearance in the Las Vegas Bowl. The win also assured that in a worst-case scenario, the Aztecs will be hosting Air Force in the season finale with a chance to finish at .500. SDSU has now won five games in a season for the first time since the 5-6 record of 1999.

The Drive For .500, Part II

The win over the Rebels also improved SDSU to 6-6 in Mountain West Conference play under Tom Craft. While attaining a break-even mark in conference play may not stop the presses, keep in mind that State's three-year Mountain West record prior to Craft's arrival was 8-13. SDSU is also 4-4 in Mountain West home games under Craft after a previous three-year home mark of 2-9 against league foes with both wins coming over Wyoming.

Going Higher

The wins over Wyoming and UNLV give the Aztecs consecutive conference victories for just the third time since the league was formed in time for the 1999 season. San Diego State opened conference play 3-0 last season and closed the 1999 campaign with two straight victories.

Three Feats

A victory at Colorado State would mark San Diego State's second three-game conference winning streak in two years. Last season, SDSU began Mountain West play with victories over Utah, Wyoming and UNLV. That run marked the Aztecs' longest conference winning streak since the 1998 team reeled off four win a row. Since 1990, San Diego State has had four winning streaks in conference play reach at least three games, including a six-game winning streak in 1991 when SDSU finished 6-1-1 in the Western Athletic Conference.

Bowl Talk, For The Record

San Diego State enters week 11 still chasing bowl eligibility. The Aztecs need to win both games (Colorado State and Air Force) to become bowl eligible because two of their wins have come against I-AA opponents. However, reaching seven wins does not guarantee a bowl berth. League schools Utah, Air Force and New Mexico are already bowl eligible and Colorado State would become bowl eligible with a win over San Diego State. It should also be noted that bowls with Mountain West ties have a pecking order of choice and are not necessarily tied to selections based on conference finishes.

The Series

The San Diego State-Colorado State series dates back to 1978 with 22 all-time meetings. San Diego State leads the series by a 12-10 margin. The squads have split their last four games. The visiting team has won the last five games. In Fort Collins, San Diego State is 5-4 all-time, including two straight victories.

Road Work

San Diego State enters the Colorado State game as one of the league's top road teams in conference play. Only Colorado State, Brigham Young, Utah and San Diego State are over .500 when playing Mountain West road games, dating back to the league's inception in 1999. The Aztecs have a victory in every league stadium except Utah and a pair of victories at Colorado State, Wyoming and UNLV.

Road Work, Part II

Since the formation of the Mountain West Conference (1999 season), San Diego State is 2-0 in Fort Collins against the Rams. Colorado State has lost just four conference home games since 1999 with two losses coming against the Aztecs. Under Sonny Lubick, the Rams are 19-6 at home since 1999.

Rocky Mountain Highs

Despite the mild (some say perfect) climate in San Diego, the Aztecs have turned into a effective team when descending into the eastern edge of the Rocky Mountains and its weather with attitude (altitude?). The Aztecs have won their last two games at Colorado State, their last two games at Wyoming and their last visit to the Air Force Academy.

Last Year In San Diego

The 17th-ranked Rams ran up 533 yards of total offense, ended the season of Aztec quarterback Adam Hall with a second-quarter concussion, and cruised to a 49-21 win at Qualcomm Stadium. Hall was 11-of-15 for 120 yards and a touchdown when he left the game with SDSU trailing by a 14-7 count. Colorado State's offense scored on four of its first five possessions. Quarterback Bradlee Van Pelt ran for two scores and threw for a pair in the CSU win.

CRAFT FILE

▶ Former San Diego State quarterback Tom Craft is in his second season as the team's head football coach. The SDSU alum (Class of 1977) provided Aztec fans with with optimism for the future in his first year on the job:

▶ The Aztecs, despite being picked to finish last in the league in a preseason MWC media poll, placed third in the Mountain West with a 4-3 record. It was SDSU's best finish in the league since it was formed in time for the 1999 season.

▶ Craft's first offense was ranked 29th in the country with an average of 403 yards per game. Just one year earlier, SDSU was 89th in total offense.

▶ The Aztecs had the nation's most improved passing offense in 2002, finishing fifth nationally at 330 yards per game.

▶ Under Craft, SDSU receivers J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood became the prolific teammates in NCAA history when they combined for 236 catches and 3,337 yards in 2002.

Last Time In Fort Collins

SDSU used a blue-collar effort on Sept. 22, 2001, to pull out a 14-7 win over Colorado State on the Aztecs' last visit to Fort Collins. Larry Ned carried the ball 40 times for 177 yards and the San Diego State defense limited Colorado State to just 212 yards of total offense. The Aztecs were cruising with a 14-0 lead in the fourth quarter when Bradlee Van Pelt was summoned from the bench and produced a 48-yard touchdown pass. He also led CSU on another late drive before the Aztecs sacked him to end the game. SDSU had 370 yards of offense and held the ball for 35:47 in its second straight victory in Fort Collins.

Opposites Attract On Saturday

San Diego State and Colorado State will enter Saturday's game with identical marks of 5-5 overall and 2-3 in conference play. However, the two teams have arrived at the intersection from vastly different directions.

▶ The Aztecs were picked to finish seventh in the preseason league poll and Colorado State was picked to win the league.

▶ The Rams are seeking to become bowl eligible for the 10 straight year while SDSU is trying to accomplish that feat for the first time since 1998.

▶ Colorado State could have the league's offensive player of the year in quarterback Bradlee Van Pelt while San Diego State could have the league's defensive player of the year in Kirk Morrison.

▶ San Diego State has won two straight after an 0-3 conference start while Colorado State has dropped two straight after a 2-1 league start.

▶ Colorado State scores over 31 points per game while SDSU is scoring 19.4.

▶ San Diego State allows just 18.3 points per game while CSU gives up 25.4 ppg.

No. 1 vs. No. 1

When San Diego State visits Fort Collins on Saturday, the game will feature a matchup of the league's best offense against the league's best defense. Colorado State leads the league and is 14th nationally with an average of 459.80 yards of total offense per game. San Diego State's defense is 12th nationally and tops the MWC, allowing 286.70 yards of total offense. In the other battle, it's No. 6 vs. No. 7. The Aztec offense is sixth in the conference, averaging 335.10 yards per game. CSU's defense is seventh in the Mountain West, allowing 376.2 yards per game.

Scouting Colorado State

Colorado State is 5-5 overall and 2-3 entering Saturday's game with the Aztecs. The Rams have lost four games by a touchdown or less, including setbacks the last two weeks to Wyoming (35-28) and New Mexico (37-34). Both of those losses came on the road. Quarterback Bradlee Van Pelt leads the Mountain West in total offense (312 yards per game) and passing efficiency (162.88). He also rushes for 73 yards per game. Dexter Wynn leads the MWC and is ninth nationally in kickoff returns (28.06) and is 22nd nationally in punt returns (12.66 yards).

Healthy Choices

The weapons at Tom Craft's disposal this week are still to be determined. The Aztecs lost their leading receiver, leading rusher and starting quarterback in the win at UNLV. The status of signal caller Adam Hall (ankle) and receiver Jeff Webb (shoulder) are still to be determined. What is known is that the freshman season of running back Lynell Hamilton has ended with a broken ankle.

Fresh Numbers

Lynell Hamilton's first season in the red and back was impressive. He is currently 17th nationally with 1,087 yards and he will end his season with an average of 108.7 rushing yards per game. He is the first Aztec freshman since Marshall Faulk to rush for 1,000 yards and his season total is the 11th best in SDSU history. Entering the 2003 season, only 58 freshmen in the history of NCAA Div. I-A had rushed for 1,000 yards.

Hamilton ran for over 100 yards on four occasions and had 94 yards when injured at UNLV. He also had a pair of 200-yard rushing games (220 vs. Samford and 218 against Wyoming).

Fielding The Position

One constant barometer for Aztec success this season is field position. In every win this season, San Diego State has enjoyed better average field position than the opponent. In every loss this season, the opponent has enjoyed better field position than the Aztecs. Against UNLV, SDSU's average starting field position was its 35-yard line.

The Bottom Line(s)

Through four-plus seasons, SDSU is 14-19 in the Mountain West. SDSU has at least one win over every league school and at least one loss to every league school excluding Wyoming. SDSU is 9-7 in conference road games and 5-12 in conference home games. San Diego State is 7-6 in its last 13 conference games.

UNLV Rewind

San Diego State is coming off a 7-0 win over UNLV in a game that saw the Aztecs limit the Rebels to just 175 yards of total offense. UNLV suffered its first shutout since 1999. The Aztecs won the turnover battle against a UNLV team that was sixth nationally in that category entering the contest. UNLV had just 80 yards of total offense through three periods. SDSU lost several chances to put the game out of reach, including a blocked field goal, a dropped pass at the UNLV 2, a fumble at the UNLV 8 and an interception at the Rebel 31. The Aztecs' final possession ended on the UNLV 8 when the game ended.

Picking Up The Load

San Diego State has had a turnover turnaround over the last two games and not surprisingly the squad has two wins to show for it. The Aztecs are a combined plus-3 on turnovers in the two wins over Wyoming and UNLV after entering the two-game stretch minus-4 for the season. And in the red zone, SDSU has allowed just six points in its opponents' last five trips.

INT-eresting

After intercepting just one pass in its previous five games, San Diego State's defense has picked off six passes the last two weeks. The six picks have come from six different players with Kirk Morrison, Jacob Elimimian and Brandon Rager intercepting passes against Wyoming. Against UNLV, the pickoffs came from Josh Dean, Marviel Underwood and Jeff Shoate. The six picks in two games represent the best total by the Aztecs since 2001 when SDSU defenders intercepted Wyoming's Casey Bramlet six times in the same game.

Encore?

One season after SDSU's passing offense became the most improved in the country, the Aztec defense is trying to turn the trick. SDSU's defense is currently ranked 12th nationally just one season after the Aztecs finished 95th in total defense. The inset (right) illustrates the SDSU defense in two seasons under Tom Craft.

The Dark Side Defense

San Diego State continues to lead the Mountain West in total defense. SDSU has never led any conference in which it has been a member in total defense (for league games). Currently, Brigham Young is second in the Mountain West, allowing 310.4 yards per game. SDSU led the Mountain West in total defense for all games (304.5 yards per contest) in 1999.

Chart Watching

San Diego State enters the Colorado State game ranked No. 12 nationally in total defense, allowing 286.70 yards per game. San Diego State is the highest rated non-BCS school in the country. San Diego State also ranks 10th nationally in pass defense (167.20 ypg), and 20th nationally in scoring defense (18.30 ppg).

Historically Speaking

The San Diego State defense has a chance to be one of the best in Aztec history. If San Diego State ends the season allowing its current 286.70 yards per game, it would be the best mark by Aztec defenders since the 1976 team allowed 267.3 yards per game. In fact, SDSU's 2003 "Dark Side" defense figures to be at least the second best defense, statistically speaking, since 1976. The '99 squad allowed 304 yards per game. The 2003 squad is the first to register two shutouts in a season since the 1975 squad. The Aztecs have allowed just four rushing touchdowns this season.

Conference Talk

Entering the Colorado State game, San Diego State leads the Mountain West in total defense (286.70 yards per game), pass-efficiency defense (102.54 rating), pass defense (167.20 yards per game), scoring defense (18.30 points per game) and red-zone defense.

First And Fourth

San Diego State linebacker Kirk Morrison, an all-conference selection as a sophomore in 2002, continues to lead the Mountain West Conference in tackles with an average of 9.8 per game. Morrison also leads the conference with 16 tackles for losses (30th nationally). Ranking fourth on the tackle chart is Aztec sophomore Matt McCoy, who averages 9.7 tackles per game. McCoy is third in the conference with three forced fumbles. SDSU's Jacob Elimimian leads the league with 1.3 passes defended per game and SDSU's Jeff Shoate is second (1.2 per game).

J.C. And Lou Groza

SDSU walkon placekicker J.C. Mejia' Cinderella story continues. The San Diego State student who joined the team for this, his only season, has been named a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award, presented to the nation's top placekicker. Mejia etched his name into the Aztec record book against Wyoming when he tied a school record with four field goals in a game. Mejia connected from 35, 44, 36 and 21 yards in the win. He became the sixth Aztec to accomplish the feat. The record has now been tied twice in the last 11 games. Tommy Kirovski had four field goals in the 2002 season finale at Hawai'i. Mejia is three field goals from the tying the Aztec single-season record of 18. He heads to Fort Collins having connected on 15 of his 21 field-goal tries this season with two of his six misses have come from beyond 50 yards. Inside the 40, Mejia is 10-of-12 on the season. Andy Trakas hold the Aztec single-season record with 18 field goals in 1990.

Darby Doing It

San Diego State senior offensive lineman Brendan Darby has now started 35 straight games for the Aztecs. It is the longest starting streak on the squad and ranks 24th nationally for consecutive starts by an offensive lineman. The Aztec record is 45 straight starts by defensive lineman Jerome Haywood.

Did You Know?

Heading into the 2003 season, San Diego State's official all-time winning percentage of .572 ranks No. 45 in the country, according to the NCAA. Ten times in its history San Diego State has won at least nine games and seven Aztec squads have posted 10 wins in a single season. On four occasions, the Aztecs have gone undefeated.

Seth Sez

San Diego State senior Seth Santoro has provided quick help for a team looking to replace three-year punter Brian Simjanvoski. Santoro has punted 58 times this season for an average of 42.1 yards with a long of 64. Seventeen of his punts have been downed inside the 20 with only six touchbacks. Thanks to Santoro, the Aztecs are 24th nationally in net punting (37.85) and the opposition has a total of 175 punt-return yards. Santoro's final punt at UNLV pinned the Rebels at their own five on their final possession of the game.

The Aztec Family

San Diego State is continuing a long tradition this season; it is the tradition of the Aztec Family and the immediate family. Once more SDSU will have a handful of roster members that are connected to former Aztec football players. Safety Josh Dean is the son of former Aztec and Washington Redskin Vernon Dean. Safety Shane Russell is the brother of former Aztec safety and current Minnesota Viking Brian Russell. Safety Marcus Demps is the younger brother of former Aztec safety and current Baltimore Raven Will Demps. Receiver Devin Pitts is the younger brother of former Aztec and current Houston Texan Chester Pitts. Freshman receiver Brian Spinks and frosh running back Lynell Hamilton are cousins. In 1999, SDSU had two brothers start in the same game when Kabeer and Akbar Gbaja Biamila lined up in the defensive front against Kansas.

SAN DIEGO - The San Diego State football team opened its season with a victory for the first time since 1999, defeating Eastern Washington, 19-9, behind freshman Lynell Hamilton's 113 yards rushing and pair of touchdowns at Qualcomm Stadium.

The Aztecs snapped a seven-game losing skid to non-conference opponents, including an 0-6 mark in 2002 under then first-year head coach Tom Craft.

SDSU was able to successfully move the ball on the ground in the second half, breaking an otherwise lackluster offensive performance by both teams, as each lost their starting quarterbacks in the first half due to injury.

The two sides combined for just nine points and 243 yards of total offense through the first 30 minutes. Aztec kicker J.C. Mejia converted on his first two career field goals from 35 and 22 yards to give SDSU a 6-3 lead at the break.

The Aztecs were finally able to distance themselves when Hamilton notched the first touchdown of the game from a yard out at the 6:45 mark of the third quarter. The score was set-up by a 22-yard punt return by Kyle Conerly to the Eastern Washington 32-yard line.

SDSU continued its momentum with another Hamilton touchdown on its next possession. The freshman's 15-yard run capped the team's longest drive of the game, spanning 13 plays, 71 yards and 4:54.

Eastern Washington responded with a 14-play, 68-yard drive of its own to pull within 10 points at 19-9 on a 13-yard touchdown catch by Eric Kimble with 1:20 remaining in the game.

The Aztecs successfully recovered the ensuing onside kick to secure the 19-9 victory.

Hamilton completed the game with the most rushing yards by a true Aztec freshman in a season opener. SDSU Sophomore quarterback Matt Dlugolecki finished 11-of-19 for 97 yards in his collegiate debut in relief of injured starter Adam Hall.

The Aztec defense, meanwhile, surrendered just 217 yards of total offense, the lowest by an Aztec opponent since 2001.

COLUMBUS, Ohio - A young San Diego State football team showed that it could play with the best, as the Aztecs gave defending national champion and No. 2 ranked Ohio State a scare before falling 16-13 in front of 104,433 at Ohio Stadium.

The SDSU defense shined for the second straight game, limiting the Buckeyes to only 196 yards of total offense, including 70 yards through the air. The high-powered Ohio State offense managed just 10 first downs, five pass completions and was 1-for-14 on third down conversions.

Turnovers, however, proved to be the key as the Buckeyes turned three Aztec miscues into 13 of their 16 points.

San Diego State began the day with a takeaway of its own, as sophomore cornerback Jacob Elimimian intercepted OSU quarterback Craig Krenzle's pass on the game's first play from scrimmage. The Aztecs quickly capitalized on an 11-yard touchdown strike from Matt Dlugolecki to Wesley Williams for a 7-0 lead.

After an Ohio State field goal made the score 7-3, SDSU drove 76 yards with the help of two Buckeye penalties and an 18-yard run by Lynell Hamilton, setting up a first-and-goal situation at the Ohio State four-yard line.

The Aztecs' first try at the end zone, however, came back the other way as a tipped Dlugolecki pass fell into the arms of Ohio State strong safety Will Allen, who ran the interception back 100 yards for a touchdown and a 13-7 advantage.

SDSU cut the deficit to three points twice in the second half on two field goals by J.C. Mejia from 47 and 46-yards out.

The OSU offense, meanwhile, was limited to just three points - a 35-yard field goal - in the final three quarters.

With time winding down, the Aztecs' last chance to score came to an end at the Ohio State 46-yard line when Dlugolecki was unable to connect with receiver Devin Pitts on 4th-and-10.

The Buckeyes ran down the final 2:49 with the help of its first successful third down conversion of the game.

Dlugolecki, making his first collegiate start, finished 23-for-39 with 189 yards passing. Hamilton led the Aztecs on the ground for the second straight game with 69 yards rushing on 17 carries.

EL PASO, Texas - The San Diego State defense continued to stonewall its opponents as the Aztecs moved to 2-1 for the first time since 1996, with a 34-0 shutout of Texas-El Paso in front of 18,195 at the Sun Bowl.

The Aztec defense forced six Miner turnovers and held its second straight opponent without an offensive touchdown, giving SDSU its first non-conference road win since 1999. The shutout was also the school's first since October 7, 2000, a span of 33 games.

San Diego State put points on the board in each of the four quarters, taking the early lead in the first on a 26-yard field goal by J.C. Mejia, his fifth straight in as many opportunities to start the season.

Aztec sophomore cornerback Jacob Elimimian notched his first of two interceptions on the day by picking off Miner quarterback Orlando Cruz's pass and returning it 85 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the second quarter.

SDSU would tack on another seven points to go up 17-0 on a two-yard run by Fale Poumele with 2:54 remaining in the half.

The Miner offense, meanwhile, was within the SDSU 40-yard line five times, but ended with no points after missing a field goal to finish out the first 30 minutes of play.

Four of UTEP's six turnovers came in the second half, with the Aztecs converting them into 10 of their 17 second-half points.

SDSU senior running back DeAngelo Nedd made good on his first two career carries, scoring in both the third and fourth quarters from three and 28 yards out.

The Aztec defense remained stingy, as UTEP had the ball on the SDSU 15 (turnover on downs) and 20-yard line (fumble) but was unable to convert.

Mejia rounded out the game with a 41-yard field goal to give the Aztecs a 34-0 victory.

SDSU freshman Lynell Hamilton recorded his second career 100-yard rushing game in just his third collegiate appearance, carrying 22 times for 107 yards.

Aztec quarterback Matt Dlugolecki, making his second consecutive start, finished 18-for-28 through the air with no interceptions before being taken out mid-way through the fourth quarter.

SAN DIEGO - Freshman Lynell Hamilton stirred memories of great Aztec running backs past with his 220 yards on the ground, carrying San Diego State to its third win of the season, 37-17, over Samford at Qualcomm Stadium.

The Aztecs, who moved to 3-1 for the first time since 1996, used a balanced offense, accumulating a season best 528 yards of total offense in their second win over a NCAA I-AA school in 2003.

Hamilton carried 31 times and became just the second freshman in SDSU history to run for more than 200 yards in a game, joining All-American Marshall Faulk, who accomplished the feat twice his first year on The Mesa in 1991.

The Aztecs began the day by picking up two scores in the first quarter on a pair of touchdown strikes from Matt Dlugolecki to DeAngelo Nedd (9 yards) and Devin Pitts (33 yards).

Samford answered in the second quarter, becoming the first team to record an offensive touchdown against the Aztec defense since the season-opening win over Eastern Washington (nine quarters).

After the two sides traded field goals, Samford took advantage of the game's first turnover as Cortland Finnegan returned a Hamilton fumble 51 yards to knot the score at 17-17.

A surprised SDSU squad played nearly flawless football over the remaining quarter and a half.

The Aztecs put together their longest drive of the season on their next possession, covering 78 yards to set up the first of two Hamilton touchdowns, taking the lead for good at 24-17.

Less than three minutes later, SDSU opened the final period with another six points, as Hamilton caught an 8-yard TD pass from Dlugolecki.

The Aztec defense, meanwhile, held Samford to just 16 yards and one first down the rest of the way. The special teams also did their job, blocking a punt to set up SDSU's final score of the night.

PASADENA, Calif. - An upset-minded San Diego State football team left empty handed as the Aztecs fell to the UCLA Bruins, 20-10, in front of 48,690 at the Rose Bowl.

The Aztecs were unable to notch their first-ever win over the Bruins in 19 tries, but still finished their non-conference schedule with a 3-2 record, the team's best start since the 1996 campaign.

Neither teams' offense was able to find much success in the first half, as the two sides combined for just six points and were both held to under 150 yards of total offense.

SDSU struck first on a 25-yard field goal by J.C. Mejia with 12:32 left in the second quarter, marking the seven straight game in which the Aztecs have been the first team to score.

UCLA responded with a field goal of its own, coming from 27 yards out to knot the game at 3-3 heading into halftime.

The Bruins jumped ahead with the first touchdown of the evening on its second possession of the second half when quarterback Drew Olson hit Junior Taylor for 41 yards and a 10-7 lead.

San Diego State had a chance to respond later in the quarter when Robert Miller recovered a fumble on the UCLA 29-yard line.

A personal foul and a sack sent the Aztecs back near midfield, however, a Bruin penalty breathed new life into the drive with a first down at the UCLA 26.

A three-yard gain by Lynell Hamilton got SDSU to the 23, but two plays later UCLA's Spencer Havner intercepted a Matt Dlugolecki pass and returned it 50 yards to set up a 24-yard field goal by Justin Medlock.

The Bruin defense notched another takeaway on the Aztecs' next possession when C.J. Niusulu grabbed his team's second interception at the SDSU 20-yard line.

Three plays and one penalty later, the Bruins put the game out of reach with its second touchdown of the night to go up 20-3.

The Aztecs would narrow the margin to 10 points on a seven-yard touchdown run by Michael Franklin, but were unable to overcome the deficit, eventually falling 20-10.

Hamilton finished the game with 87 yards rushing on 20 carries, while Dlugolecki was unable to find his throwing touch against the Bruins, finishing 19-for-37 for only 110 yards.

SAN DIEGO - If there's one thing to expect in an SDSU-BYU football game it's excitement and this season's meeting was no different. The two sides combined for 80 points with the Cougars using a 24-point outburst in the second quarter to defeat the Aztecs 44-36 in front of 32,137 fans at Qualcomm Stadium.

The game had been billed as a clash between two of the nation's top defenses, but turned out to be a high-scoring affair in which the schools combined for over 800 yards of total offense.

The night started out with its first hint of what was to come as SDSU's Brook Miller returned a fumble 44 yards for a touchdown, just 54 seconds into the game.

BYU quarterback John Beck made up for his fumble with a four-yard touchdown run to tie the score at 7-7. The rushing touchdown was the first allowed by SDSU in 2003.

The Aztecs jumped back ahead one offensive play later when quarterback Adam Hall connected with Jeff Webb on a 70-yard touchdown pass, the first of three TDs between the duo on the night.

The 14-7 lead, however, would be SDSU's last as the Cougars outscored the Aztecs 24-10 in the second quarter to head into the locker room up 31-24.

BYU extended its lead in the second half to 41-24, before SDSU responded with two touchdowns to close the gap to five points at 41-36 in the fourth quarter.

Just as the Aztecs got back within striking distance, a Cougar field goal with 2:18 left sealed the 44-36 BYU victory.

Webb finished the game with 10 receptions for 253 yards, the eighth best single-game total in Aztec history.

Hall, making his first appearance since missing the previous four games due to injury, finished the night 18-for-34 for 352 yards.

SALT LAKE CITY - Utah scored 27 unanswered points in the second half to hand San Diego State its third straight defeat, as the Aztecs fell below the .500 mark for the first time in 2003 with a 27-6 loss. SDSU dropped to 0-2 to open conference play for just the first time since 1999, following the game in front of 39,132 at Rice-Eccles Stadium.

The evening proved to be a tale of two halves as SDSU had a 6-0 shutout in the first 30 minutes, only to be kept off the scoreboard in the final two quarters.

The Aztecs opened the game by scoring on their first possession when J.C. Mejia kicked a 34-yard field goal. Mejia's field goal was the end of a 14-play, 63-yard drive, which included a 19-yard reception by Devin Pitts and a 15-yard Utah pass interference penalty.

SDSU increased its lead to 6-0 with another Mejia field goal in the second quarter, which was set-up by a fumble recovery by Matt McCoy at the Utah 15-yard line.

The Aztec defense held the Ute offense in check the entire first half, as Utah managed 84 yards in total offense and crossed into SDSU territory only twice.

The Utes, unfortunately, broke out of their offensive slump in the second 30 minutes, driving 65 yards in 1:49 to take a 7-6 lead on its opening possession of the half.

Utah then tacked on a pair of third-quarter field goals and two more touchdown passes to put the game out of reach.

San Diego State's only real offensive threat in the second half came with a little over six minutes remaining and the Aztecs already trailing by 21 points. Quarterback Adam Hall completed four straight passes to get SDSU to the Utah two-yard line only to have his fifth pass of the drive intercepted in the end zone.

The Utes then ran out the remaining 5:22 to finish with the 27-6 victory.

Hall, playing in just his second full game of the season, finished 19-for-36 passing for 203 yards, while freshman running back Lynell Hamilton carried 17 times for 49 yards.

SAN DIEGO - In some games numbers tell everything, while in others they don't, which was the case in both respects as San Diego State fell to New Mexico, 30-7, in front of a homecoming crowd of 22,011 at Qualcomm Stadium.

The Aztecs outgained the Lobos, 393-326, including 274 yards of total offense in the first half alone, but were only able to muster seven points. New Mexico, meanwhile, took advantage of six SDSU turnovers and a blocked punt to score 20 of its 30 points.

San Diego State started the game by putting together an impressive 11-play, 75 yard drive, but was unable to convert in its first trip to the red zone when J.C. Mejia's 22-yard field goal went wide right.

After the Aztec defense forced a New Mexico punt, SDSU began its second drive of the game from its own 28-yard line. Three plays later, quarterback Adam Hall's pass was intercepted by Brandon Ratcliff, setting up the Lobos' first score and an early 7-0 lead.

Another miscue in the second quarter led to a 14-point deficit when New Mexico's Billy Strother returned a blocked SDSU punt for a touchdown.

The Aztecs were able to respond on their next possession with their second of five, 60-plus yard drives on the night. Freshman running back Lynell Hamilton scored from one yard out, which was set up by two critical pass completions on fourth and nine and third and 17.

After a New Mexico field goal ended the first half, the Lobos put the game out of reach with 10 points in the third quarter and three in the fourth, eventually winning, 30-7.

Hall finished the game with season highs for both attempts (48) and completions (25), throwing for 291 yards before giving way to Matt Dlugolecki in the fourth quarter.

Sophomore Robert Ortiz posted a career high 10 receptions for 89 yards, as one of 11 different Aztecs to catch at least one pass.

SAN DIEGO - Behind freshman Lynell Hamilton's 218 yards rushing, San Diego State claimed its first Mountain West Conference victory of the season, ending a four-game skid by defeating Wyoming 25-20.

The Aztecs used four, first-half field goals and followed that with two touchdowns in the final 30 minutes to beat the Cowboys for the fifth straight time.

The game began as a battle of field goals with the two sides combining for five in the first half alone. After having to punt on its first possession, SDSU put points on the board on its next three as senior kicker J.C. Mejia connected from 35, 44 and 36 yards out to give SDSU an early 9-0 lead.

The two sides then traded field goals with Cowboy Deric Yaussin notching his team's first points of the night with a 21-yarder in the second quarter.

The Aztecs recovered the three points on the final play of the first half as Mejia put his record-tying fourth field goal of the game through the uprights, capping a 10-play 43-yard drive in just 1:23.

SDSU's first turnover of the night, a fumble by Hamilton, led to the sixth and final field goal of the night when Yaussi connected from 26 yards out to make the score 12-6 with 10:05 remaining in the third quarter.

Wyoming wasn't the only team to capitalize on its opponent's turnovers, as interceptions by Aztecs Kirk Morrison and Brandon Rager each led to touchdowns and a 25-6 SDSU lead.

The Cowboys tried to rally in the fourth quarter when Casey Bramlet tossed a pair of touchdown passes to close the gap to 25-20.

San Diego State, however, recovered the ensuing onside kick and ran out the final 3:39 to preserve the 25-20 victory.

Aztec Adam Hall finished the game 14-for-26 for 191 yards and his first career rushing touchdown. Ten of Hall's 14 completions went to Jeff Webb, who logged his second career game with over 100 yards receiving and also added one touchdown.

LAS VEGAS - Aztec quarterback Adam Hall's first-quarter touchdown pass to Robert Ortiz proved to be the game-winner, as San Diego State shutout host UNLV, 7-0, in front of 20,896 at Sam Boyd Stadium.

SDSU once again showed why it has the conference's top defense, limiting the Rebels to just 175 yards of total offense, including only 80 yards through the first three quarters of action. The Aztecs posted their second shutout of the season and their second in MWC play since the conference began in 1999.

San Diego State started the game by grabbing interceptions on UNLV's first two possessions, the first by safety Josh Dean, leading to the game's only score at the 9:02 mark of the first quarter.

The Aztecs had their chances to extend the lead in the first half, but a blocked field goal, an interception and a fumble on the Rebel eight-yard line left the score at 7-0 heading into locker room.

After UNLV was forced to punt on its first possession of the second half, the Aztecs ate up the clock with a 14-play, 65-yard drive, covering 8:14. The impressive drive, however, ended at the Rebel 33-yard line with the Aztecs unable to convert on fourth down and Hall suffering a game-ending ankle injury.

Hall, unfortunately, wasn't the only Aztec to leave the game prematurely, as leading rusher Lynell Hamilton, who had gained 94 yards on 24 carries, and leading receiver Jeff Webb both went down with injuries.

Playing without its top three offensive threats, the Aztec defense took over, ending UNLV's best scoring opportunity with an impressive goal-line stand in the fourth quarter.

The Rebels looked to equalize by driving 72 yards for a first-and-goal at the Aztec five-yard line. UNLV had four chances at the end zone, but three of them, including the last one ended in an incomplete pass.

Pinned deep in its own territory, SDSU got out of trouble when backup quarterback Matt Dlugolecki completed a critical third-down play with a 37-yard pass to Kyle Conerly.

The Aztecs' third interception of the game, this time by cornerback Jeff Shoate, put an end to the Rebels' final drive as SDSU ran out the final 2:29 to preserve the 7-0 victory.

Hall finished the game 10-for-22 passing for 89 yards and one touchdown, before giving way to Dlugolecki, who was a perfect 3-for-3 for 69 yards.
