The Records: San Diego State enters the contest at 2-5 overall and 2-0 in league play while UNLV is 3-4 and 1-1.

The Rankings: Neither team is ranked.

SDSU Coach Tom Craft: Tom Craft is 2-5 in his first season at San Diego State and overall.

UNLV Coach John Robinson: Former USC head coach John Robinson is in his fourth year as head football coach at UNLV. He is 18-24 at UNLV and 122-59-4 overall in his 16th season. He is 2-1 vs. SDSU with wins in the last two seasons.

The Series: UNLV holds the series lead, 6-5, thanks to wins in the last two meetings. The series is 3-3 in San Diego. The Rebels have scored 31 points in each of the last two games against San Diego State.

Homecoming On The Hill

The San Diego State Aztecs (2-5/2-0), winners of two straight and both Mountain West Conference games this season, return to Qualcomm Stadium Saturday afternoon for a Homecoming contest against MWC foe UNLV. Kickoff is set for 4:05 p.m. There is no television for the Aztecs-Rebels contest. Following the UNLV contest, the Aztecs will be back in Mission Valley for just one more home date this season. SDSU hosts Colorado State on Nov. 16th.

Happy Alumni

Saturday's game has been designated as Homecoming on the San Diego State campus. The Aztecs are 42-19-2 all-time in Homecoming contests, including last season's 40-7 win over Eastern Illinois. San Diego State has won 12 of its last 14 Homecoming games overall, but has dropped its last two when facing a Mountain West foe.

Stat Glance

A quick look at the national statistics finds the Aztec air headliners still high on the charts. J.R. Tolver still leads America with 152.14 receiving yards per game. He ranks second in catches per game with 10. Kassim Osgood is third in that category with 8.57 catches per game. Osgood is also third in receiving yards per game with 126.29. Quarterback Adam Hall is fourth in total offense with 337.71 yards per game. Tolver is 20th in all-purpose yards (152.57) and punter Brian Simjanovski is 21st in yards per punt with an average of 42.38.

Team Stuff

The Aztecs enter the UNLV contest fifth in the country in passing offense with 351.14 yards per game and 25th nationally in total offense with 419.71 yards per game.

The Aztecs And Rebels

UNLV leads the brief series with San Diego State, 6-5, including a 3-3 mark in Qualcomm Stadium. The Rebels have won the last two meetings, including last season's 31-3 romp in Las Vegas in the first start of Adam Hall's career. The series only dates back to 1977 and the squads have only met five times since 1984.

World Wide Web: All San Diego State releases, results, statistics, box scores, schedules, rosters and coach and player information is available on the Internet at www.goaztecs.com. Game recaps and statistics are updated after each game.

Weekly Release: The media relations office will be e-mailing its releases this season on Sunday afternoons. Fax versions of the update will be sent by request only. The release will also be available Sunday evenings on www.goaztecs.com.

Practices: Unless noted, all practices are open to both the media and public and will be staffed by a member of the Aztec Media Relations office. Electronic media wishing to shoot video during practice are asked to tape during the first 30 minutes of workouts only. Requested coaches and players will be made available for interviews following each practice.

Interview Opportunities

Sundays: Coach Tom Craft meets with members of the media at 3 p.m. in the Aztec Athletics Center on Sundays during the season. Media should contact the media relations office to confirm.

Tuesdays: Coach Tom Craft is available via phone as part of the Mountain West Conference teleconference. Craft is scheduled on the conference call at 10:42 a.m.

Wednesdays: By arrangement and post-practice.

Thursdays: By arrangement and post-practice.

Fridays: Following walk-through at game site.

Saturdays: Postgame only.

Practice Policies: San Diego State practices are generally open unless otherwise noted. Media should contact the media relations office to confirm practice times and parking arrangements. Practices are generally at 3:40 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Mondays are off days for the players and interview opportunities are limited on Fridays as well. Requested players and coaches are usually available after practice. Due to schedule constraints player requests are generally limited to post-practice.

Postgame Policies: Once the team and coaching staff arrive in the lockerroom following the game, there will be a 10-minute cooling off period. At which time, Tom Craft will meet with members of the media at a predetermined location and the lockerroom will be opened to credentialed media.

Last Year In Las Vegas

It was a forgettable day for the Aztecs. The Aztecs trailed by the final score of 31-3 by halftime. The Rebels got 14 points off of SDSU's punt team and they limited Larry Ned to just 46 rushing yards. Adam Hall, in his first and only start of the season, was just 7-of-15 for 51 yards. The Rebels outgained the Aztecs, 427-160.

Scouting The Rebels

UNLV will come to town with confidence in tow. The Rebels got their first conference win on Saturday, picking up a stunning 24-3 victory at Brigham Young just a week after dropping a home game to New Mexico. UNLV is 1-1 in Mountain West play and 3-4 overall. The Rebels scored three touchdowns as a result of Cougar turnovers and UNLV leads the Mountain West with 19 quarterback sacks, two better than the Aztecs. Individually, UNLV's Tyrone Tucker and Adam Seward are third and fourth respectively in tackles in the league and Jamaal Brimmer is second in the conference with 5.5 quarterback sacks.

Wyoming Recap

The Aztecs are coming off a tight squeeze in Laramie as SDSU escaped with a 24-20 win over the upset-minded Cowboys. The Aztecs rallied from a 7-3 halftime deficit marking the first time SDSU has picked up a win when trailing at the half since Nov. 4, 2000, when San Diego State overcame a 16-0 New Mexico lead at the half to post a 17-16 win. San Diego State attempted a season-low 33 passes but still reached the 300-yard mark through the air for the fourth time this season.

Streak Busters

San Diego State's victory over Wyoming ended a couple of losing streaks for the Aztecs. The win ended a six-game road losing streak, dating back to last season's victory at Colorado State and it ended a three-game conference road losing streak. The win also improved SDSU to 10-13 all-time in the Mountain West. The win improved the Aztecs to 7-4 all-time in Mountain West road games, including two wins in Laramie and two wins at Colorado State.

Very Special Teams

San Diego State had a breakout special-teams performance at Laramie. The Aztecs blocked a Wyoming field-goal attempt and a Cowboy extra point and blocked a punt that was recovered for a touchdown. The game marked the first time since last season's Homecoming win over Eastern Illinois that the Aztecs blocked a punt and a field goal in the same game. It also marked the first time since Oct. 24, 1998, that SDSU scored on a blocked punt. In that game, Sheldon Pope blocked a Utah punt and Kevin Burton returned it 23 yards for a touchdown. Also against Wyoming, the Aztecs got a career-long 48-yard field goal from Tommy Kirovski and the lone punt of the day by Brian Simnjanovski covered 46 yards with a negative two-yard return.

Here's How To Score

San Diego State threw some variety into the attack at Wyoming. The Aztecs scored their traditional way, a 61-yard touchdown strike from Adam Hall to Kassim Osgood, marking the fifth straight game San Diego State has scored through the air. The Aztecs scored on a field-goal, SDSU got a touchdown on a blocked punt (for the first time since 1998) and the defense got into the act for the second straight week as Kirk Morrison returned an interception 34 yards for his first career touchdown.

The Drive

San Diego State's win at Wyoming was keyed by the final possession of the day. San Diego State took control of the ball with 11:22 remaining in the fourth quarter on its own 27. The Aztecs were nursing a 24-20 lead. Incredibly, San Diego State would keep the ball the rest of the game. The Aztecs drove to a first and goal just inches from a touchdown before taking a knee on the final snaps of the game. Along the way, the Aztecs faced eight third and fourth-down situations. J.R. Tolver had a 12-yard reception on a third and eight on the Aztec 41. He also caught a 15-yard pass on a third-and-13 giving SDSU a first down on the Cowboy 35. Another senior,

running back James Truvillion, was just as big. He had a 10-yard catch-and-run on a fourth-and-six that allowed SDSU to keep possession on the Wyoming 31 with just over three minutes remaining. He also rushed for four yards on a third-and-four that gave SDSU a new set of downs on the Cowboy 15. The last first down of the marathon drive came courtesy of running back Fred Collins. He had three straight carries that went for two, four and four yards with the last tote giving SDSU a first-and-goal just inches from the goal. Adam Hall was 3-of-4 through the air for 37 yards on the march that covered 54 yards and an astounding 20 plays.

First Timers

San Diego State had some first-time stats by some new faces on Saturday. The Aztecs blocked their first field-goal of the season and the first in the career of Jeff Shoate. Lineman Anthony Foli blocked an extra point for the first time and redshirt freshman Freddie Keiaho blocked a punt for the first time. Shane Johnson recovered the blocked punt in the end zone for his first touchdown and Kirk Morrison's interception return marked his first touchdown.

Back-To-Back

San Diego State has returned an interception for a touchdown in consecutive games for the first time since the seventh and eighth games of the 2000 season. Against Utah, it was Ricky Sharpe returning an interception 29 yards for a score, followed by Kirk Morrison's 34-yard game-winning return at Wyoming. Incidentally, Sharpe was also involved the last time the SDSU defense scored in consecutive weeks. The senior corner had a 57-yard interception return for a touchdown against Colorado State on Oct. 28, 2000. The next week Will Demps had a 43-yard interception return for a touchdown, launching SDSU's rally from a 16-0 deficit to a 17-16 win at New Mexico on Nov. 4, 2000.

Offense As Promised

There is no denying that the offense is back on Montezuma Mesa. The Aztecs enter the Wyoming contest 28th in the country in total offense and fifth nationally in passing offense. Quarterback Adam Hall is fourth in the country in total offense and he is throwing to perhaps the nation's best receiving tandem. Secondary Thoughts

The Aztecs have now intercepted five passes over the last two games after intercepting just one pass through the first five games of the season. The five INTs over the last eight quarters have led to 24 SDSU points.

Sophomore Power

San Diego State's talented sophomore class showed up in SDSU's first road win of the season. A trio of sophomore defenders, Kirk Morrison, Heath Farwell and Josh Dean, combined for 18 tackles, a quarterback hit that caused an interception, an interception return for a touchdown and three passes broken up. And behind that class is more talent. Redshirt freshman linebacker Matt McCoy was credited with eight tackles, a tackle for a four-yard loss and a quarterback sack. He has started the last three games at outside linebacker.

The Record Holder

Senior receiver J.R. Tolver officially became SDSU's all-time leading receiver on Saturday at Wyoming when he passed Will Blackwell's career mark of 197. Tolver had seven catches for 133 yards against Wyoming to raise the SDSU career standard to 204.

Receiver U.

The streak lives on. San Diego State has had at least one 100-yard receiver in each game this season and in two games the Aztecs have had a pair of 100-yard receivers. The amazing wideout seasons being produced by J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood are detailed more fully on page seven of this update. The duo is competing for conference and national honors as they look to become the best single-season tandem ever.

Tolver Honored

Prior to the Wyoming contest, J.R. Tolver was named as a first-team mid-season All-American by cnsi.com. Tolver and Michigan State's Charles Rogers were the wideouts on the squad.

Fred's Friends

J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood have been added to the Biletnikoff Award watch list. The honor is presented annually to the nation's top receiver by the Tallahassee Quarterback Club.

1,000-Club

With his 133-yard receiving effort against Wyoming, J.R. Tolver became San Diego State's first 1,000-yard receiver since 1996 when Will Blackwell, whom Tolver just removed from the career receiving record, achieved the feat. Tolver now has 1,065 receiving yards this season. He needs just 85 yards to move onto the single-season receiving chart with a full six games remaining.

Shake, Rattle and Rowe

Incidentally, San Diego State's single-season receiving mark is held by Patrick Rowe who caught 1,372 yards worth of passes during the 1990 season. Will Blackwell shares the single-season record for catches (86) with Dwight McDonald, who caught his 86 during the 1974 season.

The Club Is Growing

J.R. Tolver's partner, Kassim Osgood, is also on track to reach 1,000 yards. He enters the UNLV contest with 884 yards. If he cracks four digits, it would mark the first time since 1995 that two Aztecs would have reached 1,000 receiving yards. That season, Will Blackwell had 1,207 yards and Az Hakim had 1,022 yards.

Home Streak

SDSU has not been a strong home team since the formation of the Mountain West. In fact, the Aztecs have not won two straight at home since closing 1998 with a win over Texas-El Paso and opening 1999 with a win over South Florida. The last time the Aztecs won two straight at home in the same season was also 1998.

Three In A Row

San Diego State has now won three straight conference games when adding in last season's 38-16 win over Wyoming in the season finale. The three-game winning streak is the longest for SDSU in conference play since the two-game winning streak to close 1999 season and the 2000 conference-opening win over Wyoming. The Aztecs with two Mountain West wins in 2002, have already matched last season's conference win total achieved during a 2-5 campaign.

Four In A Row

San Diego State will be looking for a 3-0 league start when it hosts UNLV on Saturday. The Aztecs have not won three straight league games in the same season since winning their final three regular-season games against Western Athletic Conference competition. A win over UNLV would be four straight league wins overall (including the 2001 season finale). SDSU last won four conference games in a row when it started 1998 at 4-0 on its way to the Pacific Division title of the WAC.

Perfect In The League

SDSU has played just two conference games, but the Aztecs are already just one of three teams in the Mountain West Conference that are undefeated in league play. Air Force is 3-0, including a road win at Utah. Colorado State is 2-0, which also includes a road win at Utah. The Aztecs are 2-0 including a home win over Utah and last week's road win at Wyoming. The Aztecs need one more Mountain West win to equal their best mark (3-4) since the league was formed.

The Mountain West

The Aztecs are 10-13 in league games in the fourth year of the Mountain West Conference. San Diego State has been the league's mystery team to date:

- ▶ San Diego State has a league win over every conference foe except Air Force.
- ▶ The Aztecs have gone 2-1 against a Colorado State team that has won or shared two titles and finished second last year. The Rams are 1-2 vs. San Diego State and 16-3 vs. the rest of the league.
- ▶ Colorado State is 9-2 in MWC home games with both losses coming against San Diego State.
- ▶ San Diego State is 27-20 in conference games over the last six seasons.

San Diego State's strength of schedule continues to be high. Through Saturday's Wyoming contest, SDSU's schedule was rated as the 36th toughest in America by Jeff Sagarin. SDSU's five non-conference opponents are currently 9-4 in league play. Three of the five non-conference losses are to teams currently ranked or receiving votes in the coaches poll.

Driving For Dough


San Diego State has a reputation for the quick strike and with 15 plays over 30 yards this season that reputation may be deserved. However, SDSU's ability to grind it out has been equally impressive. San Diego State has 16 scoring drives that have covered at least 64 yards, including nine that have gone for at least 80 yards.

New Guys Start Here

More newcomers are making their presence felt in the SDSU lineup with 20 players on San Diego State's 44-man two-deep now a member of the true freshman, redshirt freshman or sophomore class. On defense, the only senior starter for SDSU among the back seven is corner Ricky Sharpe. The following is a quick look at the SDSU youth movement.

- ▶ Freshman running back Frederick Collins saw his first action of the season against UCLA and he ran for 47 yards on 11 carries. He also had three carries in the final drive vs. Wyoming.
- ▶ Another freshman, redshirt linebacker Matt McCoy, got his first start against UCLA, although he has played extensively in each game. He was credited with five tackle against the Bruins. He had eight stops against Wyoming.
- ▶ True freshman safety Keith Ellison continues to increase his playing time and draws good reviews from the coaching staff.
- ▶ Redshirt freshman Jasper Harvey now looks to be firmly entrenched as a starter in the offensive line.
- ▶ Redshirt frosh Michael Franklin has either played or started in all five games at running back and has become SDSU's punt returner.
- ▶ The Aztecs start a pair of sophomore safeties in Josh Dean and Marvel Underwood, backed up by true freshman Keith Ellison and redshirt freshman Marcus Demps.
- ▶ San Diego State's impressive two-deep linebacking corps includes four players that are either freshmen or sophomores and just one senior (a non-starter).

Tom Craft – Head Coach

A San Diego State graduate, a former Aztec quarterback and a former offensive coordinator on The Mesa, Craft was introduced as San Diego State's 15th head football coach on Dec. 6, 2001.

As a player, Craft was the starting quarterback and team captain for the Aztecs in 1976 and led San Diego State to a 10-1 record while completing 69 percent of his passes. In fact, during Craft's two years on the San Diego State campus, the Aztecs posted a cumulative mark of 18-4.

The success he tasted as a player became a way of life for Craft as a coach. As a coordinator at San Diego State (1994-1996), Craft led the Aztecs to their three best offensive years in the post-Marshall Faulk era. Each of his units averaged more than 30 points per game, including an eye-popping 38.9-point average his final year as coordinator in 1996. During his last two seasons on campus, San Diego State was ranked among the nation's top 10 teams in scoring and total offense.

Under Craft's tutelage, San Diego State saw some of its greatest individual achievements. Quarterback Billie Blanton, receiver Will Blackwell and running back George Jones etched their names in the Aztec record books.

Blanton's 169.6 passing rating in 1996 is still the best ever by an Aztec and is the fourth best mark in NCAA history. Will Blackwell caught a school-record 86 passes in 1995 and ended his career as SDSU's all-time leading receiver. And if you think Craft's attack is one dimensional, keep in mind that George Jones set the Aztec single-season rushing mark of 1,842 yards in 1995, Craft's second year as offensive coordinator.

Craft's stint as offensive coordinator ended with a pair of eight-win seasons in 1995 and '96. The 1995 San Diego State team was the first in NCAA history with a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,500-yard rusher and a pair of 1,000-yard receivers.

As head coach at Palomar College, Craft's stint can only be referred to as an "era". After serving as an assistant coach at the school from 1977 to 1982, he took over head-coaching duties in 1983. By all accounts, Palomar College football was considered to be on its last legs.

After a pair of 4-6 seasons, the Comets' fortunes began to improve. By the time Craft left the San Marcos school for the Aztec coordinator's job, Palomar was coming off of a three-year stretch of 31-2 and had an offense ranked among the nation's top five for five consecutive years. The Comets had also claimed two national titles in three years.

After three years at San Diego State, Craft returned to Palomar and spent five more seasons at the school, producing another eight-win, 10-win and 11-win season and his final national championship in 1998.

Overall, Craft's stay at Palomar College included a record of 115-56-1. Five of his teams won at least 10 games and he won three national championships and three state championships. He was voted as the state coach of the year five times and was honored as the Mission Conference coach of the year nine times. His squads posted a 9-3 record in bowl games and won nine conference titles in his last 10 years as head coach. During his three-year hiatus from the school, Palomar made just one bowl appearance. Eight members of Craft's 1998 national championship team would go on to sign contracts with NFL teams.

His impact in three seasons at San Diego State was nearly as dramatic. Craft's last two seasons on the Aztec staff represent the last two eight-win seasons on The Mesa. The final two offenses that he coordinated at San Diego State both scored over 400 points. San Diego State has accomplished that feat just twice in eight years, both when Craft was on staff.

Craft is one of three members of the 1976 Aztec squad to take a new coaching job in the last two years. He joins his former teammates Herman Edwards, now the head coach of the New York Jets, and John Fox, the new head coach of the Carolina Panthers.





Tolver needs 379 receiving yards (**63.2** over the next six games) to join the NCAA Division IA top 25 single-season club. He must average **165.8** receiving yards per game to break the NCAA record. He is currently averaging **152.1** receiving yards per game. 





FRESNO, Calif. - Tom Craft's first game as head coach at San Diego State was an eye-opener and a heartbreaker.

The Aztecs opened slowly, fell behind by nine points midway through the fourth quarter and then rallied to put themselves in position to win the game on the final play, only to have a chip-shot field goal blocked.

San Diego State fell behind the home-standing and heavily-favored Fresno State Bulldogs 10-0 at halftime and if not for heroic efforts by the Aztec defense, things could have been worse. San Diego State had just 19 yards of total offense at the half and ran just 21 plays. But San Diego State's defense kept things close and gave the "no-huddle" its chance.

The Aztecs responded as quarterback Adam Hall passed for 219 yards in the second half and J.R. Tolver stamped himself as an All-America candidate at receiver. In the end, it was just yards short.

San Diego State drove 54 yards on its first possession of the second half only to miss a field goal. But beginning with the third possession after intermission, things got interesting.

Hall found Tolver for 45 yards and James Truvillion capped off a stunning 96-yard touchdown drive for the Aztecs' first score of the year. San

Diego State then turned the ball over on two straight possessions, but the defense limited Fresno State to just a field goal during that stretch. The Bulldog lead stood at 16-7 with 8:26 remaining in the game.

San Diego State then got busy again. The Aztecs drove 81 yards for their second score and again it was Adam Hall to Tolver, this time for a 31-yard scoring strike.

The Aztec defense, which came up with three quarterback sacks, eight tackles behind the line of scrimmage, five pass deflections and a turnover, gave the Aztecs another chance. Trying to protect their lead, the Bulldogs moved the ball just 16 yards before being forced to punt.

The Aztecs took over on their own 35 and moved to the Fresno State 14 before the blocked field goal ended the game.

BOULDER, Colo. - The score may have followed prognostications but San Diego State more than held its own for more than three quarters against 17th-ranked Colorado. In the end, the Buffaloes made fewer mistakes and held off three Aztec scoring drives in the 34-14 win.

Colorado struck early, scoring 14 points on its first two possessions. But the youthful Aztecs recovered quickly. On its second possession, San Diego State marched 80 yards for a score, converting four third-downs into new sets. Overall the scoring march covered 80 yards and was capped by Garric Simmons' four-yard run.

After Colorado struck for a 75-yard score on its second possession, the Aztecs once again retaliated with a 45-yard march following a Colorado punt. Redshirt freshman Michael Franklin broke free on a 31-yard touchdown run to even the game at 14.

It looked like the teams would enter the locker room even, but a fumble on a punt return was picked up by the Buffaloes and toted in for the score and a 21-14 lead at the break.

Colorado scored again in the third quarter on a two-play drive that was set up by a Jeremy Bloom's 31-yard punt return.

San Diego State threatened early and often in the second half with three drives stalling inside the CU 35. The Aztecs also came up wide right on a pair of field-goal tries. Overall, five of SDSU's six second-half possessions ended inside the Colorado 40.

Colorado capped the scoring and clinched the win with a 38-yard touchdown run.

Adam Hall officially stamped himself as a threat at quarterback as he passed for 359 yards with 14 of those connections going to Kassim Osgood.

The two teams ended the game with 401 yards of total offense each.

SAN DIEGO - In this case, the numbers lie - a lot.

San Diego State rolled up 574 yards of total offense, including 320 passing yards, by HALFTIME, but still fell to the Arizona State Sun Devils, 39-28, in the home opener at Qualcomm Stadium.

The Aztecs got a game for the record books from receiver J.R. Tolver and quarterback Adam Hall. Tolver caught 12 passes for 296 yards and a touchdown in the 13th best receiving game in NCAA history. Hall passed for 516 yards and three touchdowns in the loss. It was the sixth best day in Aztec history. However, the records were not enough.

San Diego State dominated the early going and led the game 22-0 in the second quarter. The scoring came courtesy of three Adam Hall touchdown passes, one each to Tolver, Kassim Osgood and Ronnie Davenport. But Arizona State responded.

Trailing 22-0, ASU inserted Andrew Walter at quarterback. His first two passes were touchdown strikes to Shaun McDonald, covering 72 and 33 yards and the game was on.

San Diego State still led 22-14 at halftime. But in the second half, a handful of plays decided the outcome. Arizona State blocked a punt and recovered it for a touchdown and when San Diego State fumbled another punt, ASU took advantage with a brief 18-yard touchdown drive.

The Aztecs ended the game with three straight turnovers after the game had been tied at 25 on a 41-yard field goal by Tommy Kirovski.

For the game, SDSU had five turnovers to go with the blocked punt. SDSU won the total offense battle 574-365 and had a seven-minute advantage in time of possession. San Diego State ran 95 plays to Arizona State's 62.

MOSCOW, Idaho - When you play inside a 16,000-seat facility with goal posts mounted on the wall, you might expect points. And you would be right.

For the second straight game San Diego State wasted a 500-yard passing effort by Adam Hall, a sterling receiving effort by J.R. Tolver and a multiple-touchdown lead. Idaho erased a 24-10 Aztec advantage by scoring on six straight possessions to upset San Diego State, 48-38.

Hall tossed five touchdown passes, including three to Tolver and a 70-yard strike to Kassim Osgood, but Idaho proved up to the task in the noise-laded Kibbie Dome.

When Idaho scored a touchdown with one second remaining in the second quarter, the Aztecs headed to the locker room with a 24-17 lead. The second half, however, was all Idaho. The Vandals ripped up the Aztec defense for 31 points after intermission, including 17 in the decisive fourth quarter. Although the Vandals were out-gained by the Aztecs, Idaho became the first team since Air Force in 2000 to go over 500 yards in total offense against SDSU.

San Diego State was flagged for a season-high seven penalties, but committed just one turnover. San Diego State had the ball for just 11 minutes in the second half when the game titled toward the Vandals.

Tolver ended the game with 14 catches, tying him with teammate Kassim Osgood for the second most catches in the country this season. He also caught three touchdowns after entering the game with just seven career touchdown receptions. A fourth touchdown reception was thwarted by a Vandal pass interference late in the game.

SAN DIEGO - It may be that the UCLA Bruins are just that much better than the San Diego State Aztecs. However, SDSU made things so easy for the visitors that a true measuring stick is hard to gauge.

The Bruins took advantage of early San Diego State miscues to post the first 23 points of the football game while generating a total of 58 yards of offense. It was the deciding stretch in a game that saw UCLA remain unbeaten against the Aztecs with a sound 43-7 win.

While the Aztec defense appeared to bounce back from a bewildering performance at Idaho, San Diego State's offense found the going tough against the talented Bruins.

UCLA struck first when an Adam Hall pass ricocheted off of tight end Tyson Thompson and into the arms of UCLA's Marcus Reese, setting up a brief seven-yard touchdown drive by UCLA.

The big plays continued for UCLA when Craig Bragg got behind the Aztec defense on a third-and-28 for a stunning 37-yard touchdown. The onslaught was complete when a snap sailed over Simjanovski's head on a punt, resulting in two more UCLA points.

San Diego State's lone touchdown completed an 80-yard drive when Hall found Kassim Osgood 10 yards out to pull SDSU to 23-7.

Any hopes for an Aztec comeback, however, were squelched when Bruin quarterback Cory Paus found tight end Mike Seidman for a 79-yard score.

Osgood topped SDSU's offensive performance with a 10-catch, 145-yard effort. The game also featured the debut of true freshman running back Frederick Collins, who ran for 47 yards on 11 carries.

The loss to UCLA left the Aztecs 0-5 for the first time ever.

SAN DIEGO - A month of frustration came to an end on Saturday night as the Aztecs ran past Utah, 36-17, in the Mountain West opener for San Diego State.

Receiver J.R. Tolver continued to write chapters in his dream season with 16 catches for 185 yards and a touchdown. The total was the second best in school history, a Mountain West record and tied him with Will Blackwell for the all-time school record with 197.

Tolver ended the game with 16 catches for 185 yards and his 16-yard TD catch in the third quarter put SDSU in control, 20-10.

The Aztecs came from behind to pick up the first victory of the season. After spotting Utah a 3-0 and 10-3 lead, SDSU came to life in the second period. The Aztecs got a 36-yard touchdown pass from Adam Hall to Kassim Osgood for a score and then put together a 56-yard march that culminated with a Tommy Kirovski field goal on the final play before intermission. SDSU led at the break, 13-10.

The second half belonged to the Aztecs. San Diego State scored 17 points on three straight possessions and the Aztec defense made its own statement. SDSU picked off four passes and forced a fumble. Ricky Sharpe had two picks in the second half and returned the last one for 29-yard touchdown.

The Utes ended the game with just 308 yards of total offense, including 156 yards after San Diego State extended its lead in the fourth quarter to 31-10.

As a team, SDSU had its best rushing day of the season 116 yards, including 67 by Michael Franklin.

Tommy Kirovski booted three field goals as SDSU won its conference opener for the third time in four years of Mountain West play. The win was the first for SDSU under Tom Craft and ended a three-game losing streak against Utah.

LARAMIE - At an elevation of over 7,000 feet a lot of things can happen. And luckily for San Diego State, a lot of things did.

San Diego State got another 300-yard passing effort Adam Hall and another 100-yard receiving effort from J.R. Tolver and another long touch-down reception by Kassim Osgood. It took all of that and more to escape with a 24-20 win over Wyoming.

The victory improved San Diego State to 2-0 in Mountain West Conference play and 2-5 on the season heading into a Homecoming battle with UNLV.

The Aztecs trailed 7-3 at halftime after a rather indifferent first half with the only SDSU points coming on Tommy Kirovski's career-best 48-yard

field goal. Things got more interesting after the break. San Diego State's Freddie Keiaho and Jacob Elimimian teamed up to block a punt on Wyoming first's possession with Shane Johnson recovering for a touchdown.

The Cowboys, however, would dominate the time of possession battle in the second half. Wyoming marched down the field to take a 13-10 lead on an 11-play drive. San Diego State's Anthony Foli blocked the extra point and Aztec Jeff Shoate would block a field goal in the game to go with the blocked punt.

Trailing 13-10 after the Cowboys' 80-yard march, the Aztecs struck quickly with a four-play, 72-yard drive. The big strike came on a Hall-to-Osgood 61-yard touchdown play that began with a deflected pass.

After Wyoming regained the lead again, this time on a 20-play, 80-yard march early in the fourth quarter the Aztecs looked to be on the ropes. But linebacker Heath Farwell nailed UW quarterback Casey Bramlet as attempted a pass and another Aztec linebacker, Kirk Morrison, intercepted the pass and returned it 34 yards for the game's final points.

Wyoming would have the ball just once more and be limited to three plays and out. San Diego State then took over with 11:22 remaining in the game and holding a 24-20 lead. The Aztecs then put together drive for the ages, using all 11:22 to cover 54 yards on 20 plays. SDSU faced eight third and fourth-down situations to keep the ball away from the dangerous Cowboys.

San Diego State improved to 2-0 in league play for the first time since 1998 in winning its fourth straight over the Cowboys.
