STORYLINES

▶ San Diego State enters its season finale on Saturday looking to clinch its first .500 season since 1998 and just its third .500 season or better since 1994.

▶ It will be Senior Night at San Diego State with 20 Aztecs playing in their final game.

▶ San Diego State will be trying to defeat Air Force in consecutive seasons for the first time ever. The Aztecs won last year's game, 38-34, in Colorado Springs.

▶ San Diego State leads the Mountain West in scoring defense while Air Force ranks second in the league in that category.

▶ The San Diego State strength of schedule is 35th entering the final weekend of the regular season.

▶ The Mountain West Conference has a new tackles leader. It's SDSU sophomore linebacker Matt McCoy.

The Finale

The San Diego State Aztecs close the 2003 season Saturday night when they host the Air Force Falcons at Qualcomm Stadium. Kickoff is set for 6:07 p.m. The game marks the close of the regular season for both squads. San Diego State enters the game at 5-6 overall and 2-4 in the Mountain West. Air Force is 7-4 overall and 3-3 in the Mountain West.

Television Talk

The game against the Air Force Academy will be televised locally and in Colorado by SportsWest (Channel 4 San Diego). Calling the action will be San Diegans Eddie Doucette (play-by-play) and KNSD-TV sports director Jim Laslavic. The game will also be available via ESPN GamePlan.

So Long Seniors

The San Diego State football program will bid farewell to 20 seniors Saturday night. The senior class includes offensive lineman Brendan Darby, offensive lineman Zach Barnes, offensive lineman Shawn Dickie, tight end Jason Dion, offensive lineman Anthony Foli, quarterback Adam Hall, defensive end Ryan Iata, defensive back Shane Johnson, defensive back Phouthai Keoveunxay, tight end Mike Lynch, running back DeAngelo Nedd, linebacker Adam Nyssen, kicker J.C. Mejia, defensive lineman Brook Miller, receiver Jermaine Moore, defensive end Brandon Rager, defensive back LaVance Ray, punter Seth Santoro, defensive back Jeff Shoate, and offensive lineman Gerald Sykes.

Starting Seniority

San Diego State's starting 24 players (including kickers) features 10 seniors, including offensive linemen Shawn Dickie, Brendan Darby and Gerald Sykes. Another, senior, Anthony Foli, is a part-time starter up front. Receiver Jermaine Moore has become a starter due to Jeff Webb's injury. The defensive starters from the senior class include linemen Ryan Iata, Brook Miller, Brandon Rager, and cornerback Jeff Shoate.

Stable Seniors

Easily the most consistent member of the 2003 Aztec senior class is offensive tackle Brendan Darby. He has made 41 career starts, including 37 straight. Only 12 offensive linemen in the country have more career starts than Darby and only 12 have a longer streak of consecutive starts. Another steady member of the class is defensive back Jeff Shoate, who has 33 career starts under his belt, including 20 straight.

Special Night

Not only will the Air Force game be Senior Night, but it also marks the first home game for the Aztecs since San Diego County was ravaged by wildfires. SDSU has been in the process of distributing tickets to fire victims and firefighters. Other special events planned around the game include a visit by the Air Force Academy's "Wings of Blue" Parachute team. They should enter Qualcomm Stadium at approximately 5:40 p.m. The Academy's "Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps" will also perform at halftime, as will the Marching Aztecs.

Time Change

Due to Tuesday's basketball Tipoff Luncheon at the Town and Country Hotel, the weekly media luncheon with Tom Craft has been moved up 30 minutes. Craft will meet with the media at 11 a.m., followed by lunch. Players will be available at 11:30. The Tipoff Luncheon begins at noon.

The Drive For .500

A victory by the Aztecs over the Air Force Academy on Saturday night would clinch San Diego State's first .500 season since 1998 and mark a significant step for Tom Craft in his second year as the Aztec head coach. SDSU has had just three winning seasons since 1994 and won a total of six games in 2000 and 2001, the last two years before Craft's arrival.

The Drive For .500, Part II

A win over the Academy would also improve San Diego State to 7-7 in Mountain West play under Tom Craft. San Diego State was 5-9 in league play the two years before Craft's arrival and last year's 4-3 league mark is SDSU's best in conference play.

Home Turf

San Diego State defeated Wyoming, 25-20, in its last appearance at Qualcomm Stadium. The Aztecs, however, have had trouble sustaining home-field advantage since the Mountain West was formed. In conference play, SDSU has won two straight conference home games (in the same season) just once. Last year, the Aztecs defeated Utah and UNLV at Qualcomm Stadium in consecutive appearances.

The Series

The San Diego State-Air Force rivalry only dates back to 1980, but it has been a hotly-contested series with some great finishes. The Falcons hold a 15-6 lead after 21 all-time meetings. Air Force has won four of the last five meetings overall and four of the last five meetings in San Diego. The Aztecs are 3-6 all-time against the Academy when playing in San Diego. San Diego State won last year's game in Colorado Springs, 38-34, thanks to a 21-point fourth quarter. SDSU has never beaten Air Force in consecutive seasons.

Number Crunching

In the history of the series between San Diego State and Air Force (21 games), 10 games have been decided by seven points or less. Eight of the last 10 meetings have been decided by seven points or less, including an overtime game in 1997. Over the last 11 games, the total points scored: Air Force 290, San Diego State 279.

Last Year In Colorado Springs

The Aztecs, in front of the ESPN2 cameras, got off the deck to score 21 fourth-quarter points in a dramatic 38-34 victory in Colorado Springs. With Adam Hall out with a concussion, Lon Sheriff directed SDSU to its highest-scoring quarter (21 points in the fourth period) in seven years. Both J.R. Tolver (13-126) and Kassim Osgood (12-123) had 100-

▶ Former San Diego State quarterback Tom Craft is in his second season as the team's head football coach. The SDSU alum (Class of 1977) provided Aztec fans with with optimism for the future in his first year on the job:

▶ The Aztecs, despite being picked to finish last in the league in a preseason MWC media poll, placed third in the Mountain West with a 4-3 record. It was SDSU's best finish in the league since it was formed in time for the 1999 season.

▶ Craft's first offense was ranked 29th in the country with an average of 403 yards per game. Just one year earlier, SDSU was 89th in total offense.

▶ The Aztecs had the nation's most improved passing offense in 2002, finishing fifth nationally at 330 yards per game.

▶ Under Craft, SDSU receivers J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood became the prolific teammates in NCAA history when they combined for 236 catches and 3,337 yards in 2002.

yard receiving games. San Diego State scored on four of its last five possessions, the last coming with just 58 seconds left in the game. The Aztecs had 398 yards of total offense but gave up 538. The win was the first for San Diego State over Air Force since the Mountain West Conference was formed in time for the 1999 season.

Last Time In San Diego

San Diego State was a gracious host on Sept. 29, 2001, when the Air Force Academy last made a visit to Qualcomm Stadium. The Aztecs coughed up four turnovers and Air Force took advantage for a 45-21 victory. Air Force enjoyed just a slight advantage in total offense (427-403), but the Falcons scored on five possessions enveloping halftime. SDSU's Larry Ned rushed for 178 yards. Of the current skilled-position Aztecs, only Adam Hall saw significant playing time and he was just 2-of-7 passing for five yards. SDSU held a 14-7 lead before Air Force scored 35 straight points.

Familiar Faces

San Diego State's new athletic director, Mike Bohn, and new senior associate athletic director, Steve Becvar, are former athletic administrators at the Air Force Academy. Bohn is a graduate of Boulder High School and also worked at Colorado State.

Scouting Air Force

The Air Force Academy enters Saturday's game at 7-4 overall and 3-3 in conference play. The Falcons will be looking to break a three-game losing streak in conference play, following losses at Colorado State, an overtime home loss to Utah and Saturday's 24-12 setback at New Mexico. Air Force began the season 5-0. The Falcons are third nationally in rushing offense, (288.73 ypg). The Falcons are also third nationally in net punting, averaging 42.54 yards per possession exchange.

Fielding The Position

One constant barometer for Aztec success this season is field position. In every win this season, San Diego State has enjoyed better average field position than the opponent. In every loss this season, the opponent has enjoyed better field position than the Aztecs. Colorado State had a 3.6-yard advantage in average starting field position.

The Bottom Line(s)

Through four-plus seasons, SDSU is 14-20 in the Mountain West. SDSU has at least one win over every league school and at least one loss to every league school excluding Wyoming. SDSU is 9-8 in conference road games and 5-12 in conference home games. San Diego State is 7-7 in its last 14 conference games. SDSU is 1-3 vs. Air Force in Mountain West play.

Colorado State Rewind

The Aztecs dropped a disheartening 21-6 decision at Colorado State on Saturday, ending SDSU's hopes for its first bowl appearance since 1998. SDSU outgained CSU (345-324) and held the Ram offense off the scoreboard until the fourth quarter. SDSU trailed 7-3 at halftime with the lone CSU points coming off a Ben Stratton 35-yard interception return for a score and by a 7-6 count entering the fourth period. The Rams, who entered the game leading the league in total offense (459.8 yards per game) were limited to just 324 yards on Saturday with 109 yards of that coming on two fourth-quarter plays. SDSU got 105 rushing yards from Michael Franklin, subbing for the injured Lynell Hamilton. SDSU lost starting quarterback Adam Hall in the third period to a finger injury. As a result, SDSU was trying to pull out a road victory against the defending league champion without its starting quarterback, leading rusher and leading receiver (Jeff Webb).

Fresh Numbers

Lynell Hamilton's first season in the red and back was impressive. He still ranks 17th nationally with 108.7 yards rushing per game, tops among America's freshmen. He is the first Aztec freshman since Marshall Faulk to rush for 1,000 yards and his season total is the 11th best in SDSU history. Entering the 2003 season, only 58 freshmen in the history of NCAA Div. I-A had rushed for 1,000 yards. Hamilton ran for over 100 yards on four occasions and had 94 yards when injured at UNLV. He also had a pair of 200-yard rushing games (220 vs. Samford and 218 against Wyoming). His season ended with a broken ankle against the Rebels.

Hall's Marks

The finger injury Adam Hall suffered at Colorado State likely ended the career of the Austin, Texas, senior. His injury-plagued senior season will limit his climb on the career charts, but Hall still stacks up well among SDSU's all-time greats. He is seventh all-time at SDSU with 5,173 passing yards and seventh all-time with 5,017 yards of total offense. Hall ranks sixth all-time with 423 career completions. Hall and Dan McGwire are the only two Aztecs to record two 500-yard games during their careers.

Triple Threat-less

San Diego State's year of nagging injuries have caught up with the Aztecs. SDSU enters the Air Force game without its starting quarterback (Adam Hall lost to finger injury vs. CSU), and its leading rusher (Lynell Hamilton lost to broken ankle vs. UNLV). Leading receiver Jeff Webb (lost to shoulder injury due at UNLV) is doubtful. He missed the Colorado State game, and most of the UNLV contest.

Playing The Best

As the Aztecs head into the season finale, they can rest assured knowing that a .500 season, should they accomplish it, would be well-earned. The Aztecs have faced the nation's 35th toughest schedule. San Diego State's 2003 opponents have a combined record of 51-44 entering this weekend.

Most Improved...

San Diego State's defense is the nation's most improved when considering the jump in ratings. The Aztecs have improved 84 places from No. 95 to No. 11 in total defense. When it comes to yards allowed, SDSU's per game improvement of 120.76 yards is second only to Eastern Michigan's 122.65. EMU, however, is still allowing 397 yards per game. EMU was 117 in total defense last year and is 78th this season.

The Dark Side Defense

With one game remaining in the season, a sneak peak at the historical significance of The Dark Side is relevant. The squad is tops in the Mountain West and No. 11 nationally in total defense, allowing just 290.1 yards per game. Statistically, the 2003 defense is the best at San Diego State in a generation. The last Aztec team to allow less than 300 yards per game for a season came in 1976 (267 ypg).

2003 Significance

The Aztecs went seven quarters in Mountain West play (UNLV game plus three quarters at Colorado State) without allowing a touchdown, a first for SDSU since the Mountain West was formed. Six Aztec opponents have been held below 300 yards of total offense. Three opponents, including defending national champion Ohio State, have been held without an offensive touchdown. Eight of San Diego State's 11 opponents were held below their season average in total offense when they faced the Aztecs.

Firing Blanks

The Aztecs have recorded two shutouts in 2003 (34-0 over UTEP and 7-0 over UNLV). It marks the first time for Aztec an defense to record two shutouts in the same season since 1975 when SDSU blanked Oregon State (25-0) and Fresno State (29-0) in a pair of road shutouts. Across America in 2003, only Nebraska, Southern California, Florida State and Virginia have two shutouts this season.

Red Out

San Diego State's Red Zone defense is beginning to register some eye-popping numbers. The last nine times opponents have penetrated SDSU's Red Zone, they have come away with no touchdowns and just a total of 12 points. In the two road games at UNLV and Colorado State, the Red Zone was penetrated three times, resulting in zero points.

Chart Watching

San Diego State enters the Air Force game No. 11 nationally in total defense, allowing 290.1 yards per game. San Diego State is the highest rated non-BCS school in the country. San Diego State also ranks 10th nationally in pass defense (167.20 ypg), and 20th nationally in scoring defense (18.30 ppg).

Historically Speaking

The San Diego State defense has a chance to be one of the best in Aztec history. If San Diego State ends the season allowing its current 286.70 yards per game, it would be the best mark by Aztec defenders since the 1976 team allowed 267.3 yards per game. In fact, SDSU's 2003 "Dark Side" defense figures to be at least the second best defense, statisti-

Welcome, Matt

San Diego State sophomore linebacker Matt McCoy will make it hard for the media and coaches to keep him off the all-conference team, along with running mate Kirk Morrison. He is now the Mountain West Conference's leading tackler following his 16-stop effort at Colorado State. McCoy averages 10.3 stops per game and is the only player in the league in double figures in tackles average. McCoy is also fifth in tackles for loss (1.05 per game), and sixth in fumbles caused (0.27). How rare are sophomore all-league linebackers, Morrison was one of just four who earned the honor last season nation wide. McCoy's 67 solo tackles represent the eighth best season mark in SDSU history.

Morrison's Resume

San Diego State linebacker Kirk Morrison continues to put up "All" numbers. Morrison who figures to earn all-league recognition for the third time in his career, is all over the conference stat sheet. He is fourth in the league in tackles (9.5 per game), first in tackles for loss (1.27 per game), sixth in fumbles caused (0.27) and ninth in recovered fumbles (0.18). Morrison's 271 career tackles rank 10th all-time San Diego State and his 30 tackles behind the line of scrimmage also rank 10th all-time on Montezuma Mesa.

The Aztec Family

San Diego State is continuing a long tradition this season; it is the tradition of the Aztec Family and the immediate family. Once more SDSU will have a handful of roster members that are connected to former Aztec football players. Safety Josh Dean is the son of former Aztec and Washington Redskin Vernon Dean. Safety Shane Russell is the brother of former Aztec safety and current Minnesota Viking Brian Russell. Safety Marcus Demps is the younger brother of former Aztec safety and current Baltimore Raven Will Demps. Receiver Devin Pitts is the younger brother of former Aztec and current Houston Texan Chester Pitts. Freshman receiver Brian Spinks and frosh running back Lynell Hamilton are cousins. In 1999, SDSU had two brothers start in the same game when Kabeer and Akbar Gbaja Biamila lined up in the defensive front against Kansas.

INT-eresting

After intercepting just one pass in five games, San Diego State's defense picked off six passes against Wyoming and UNLV. The six picks came from six different players with Kirk Morrison, Jacob Elimimian and Brandon Rager intercepting passes against Wyoming. Against UNLV, the pickoffs came from Josh Dean, Marviel Underwood and Jeff Shoate.

SAN DIEGO - The San Diego State football team opened its season with a victory for the first time since 1999, defeating Eastern Washington, 19-9, behind freshman Lynell Hamilton's 113 yards rushing and pair of touchdowns at Qualcomm Stadium.

The Aztecs snapped a seven-game losing skid to non-conference opponents, including an 0-6 mark in 2002 under then first-year head coach Tom Craft.

SDSU was able to successfully move the ball on the ground in the second half, breaking an otherwise lackluster offensive performance by both teams, as each lost their starting quarterbacks in the first half due to injury.

The two sides combined for just nine points and 243 yards of total offense through the first 30 minutes. Aztec kicker J.C. Mejia converted on his first two career field goals from 35 and 22 yards to give SDSU a 6-3 lead at the break.

The Aztecs were finally able to distance themselves when Hamilton notched the first touchdown of the game from a yard out at the 6:45 mark of the third quarter. The score was set-up by a 22-yard punt return by Kyle Conerly to the Eastern Washington 32-yard line.

SDSU continued its momentum with another Hamilton touchdown on its next possession. The freshman's 15-yard run capped the team's longest drive of the game, spanning 13 plays, 71 yards and 4:54.

Eastern Washington responded with a 14-play, 68-yard drive of its own to pull within 10 points at 19-9 on a 13-yard touchdown catch by Eric Kimble with 1:20 remaining in the game.

The Aztecs successfully recovered the ensuing onside kick to secure the 19-9 victory.

Hamilton completed the game with the most rushing yards by a true Aztec freshman in a season opener. SDSU Sophomore quarterback Matt Dlugolecki finished 11-of-19 for 97 yards in his collegiate debut in relief of injured starter Adam Hall.

The Aztec defense, meanwhile, surrendered just 217 yards of total offense, the lowest by an Aztec opponent since 2001.

COLUMBUS, Ohio - A young San Diego State football team showed that it could play with the best, as the Aztecs gave defending national champion and No. 2 ranked Ohio State a scare before falling 16-13 in front of 104,433 at Ohio Stadium.

The SDSU defense shined for the second straight game, limiting the Buckeyes to only 196 yards of total offense, including 70 yards through the air. The high-powered Ohio State offense managed just 10 first downs, five pass completions and was 1-for-14 on third down conversions.

Turnovers, however, proved to be the key as the Buckeyes turned three Aztec miscues into 13 of their 16 points.

San Diego State began the day with a takeaway of its own, as sophomore cornerback Jacob Elimimian intercepted OSU quarterback Craig Krenzel's pass on the game's first play from scrimmage. The Aztecs quickly capitalized on an 11-yard touchdown strike from Matt Dlugolecki to Wesley Williams for a 7-0 lead.

After an Ohio State field goal made the score 7-3, SDSU drove 76 yards with the help of two Buckeye penalties and an 18-yard run by Lynell Hamilton, setting up a first-and-goal situation at the Ohio State four-yard line.

The Aztecs' first try at the end zone, however, came back the other way as a tipped Dlugolecki pass fell into the arms of Ohio State strong safety Will Allen, who ran the interception back 100 yards for a touchdown and a 13-7 advantage.

SDSU cut the deficit to three points twice in the second half on two field goals by J.C. Mejia from 47 and 46-yards out.

The OSU offense, meanwhile, was limited to just three points - a 35-yard field goal - in the final three quarters.

With time winding down, the Aztecs' last chance to score came to an end at the Ohio State 46-yard line when Dlugolecki was unable to connect with receiver Devin Pitts on 4th-and-10.

The Buckeyes ran down the final 2:49 with the help of its first successful third down conversion of the game.

Dlugolecki, making his first collegiate start, finished 23-for-39 with 189 yards passing. Hamilton led the Aztecs on the ground for the second straight game with 69 yards rushing on 17 carries.

EL PASO, Texas - The San Diego State defense continued to stonewall its opponents as the Aztecs moved to 2-1 for the first time since 1996, with a 34-0 shutout of Texas-El Paso in front of 18,195 at the Sun Bowl.

The Aztec defense forced six Miner turnovers and held its second straight opponent without an offensive touchdown, giving SDSU its first non-conference road win since 1999. The shutout was also the school's first since October 7, 2000, a span of 33 games.

San Diego State put points on the board in each of the four quarters, taking the early lead in the first on a 26-yard field goal by J.C. Mejia, his fifth straight in as many opportunities to start the season.

SDSU senior running back DeAngelo Nedd made good on his first two career carries, scoring in both the third and fourth quarters from three and 28 yards out.

The Aztec defense remained stingy, as UTEP had the ball on the SDSU 15 (turnover on downs) and 20-yard line (fumble) but was unable to convert.

Mejia rounded out the game with a 41-yard field goal to give the Aztecs a 34-0 victory.

SDSU freshman Lynell Hamilton recorded his second career 100-yard rushing game in just his third collegiate appearance, carrying 22 times for 107 yards.

Aztec quarterback Matt Dlugolecki, making his second consecutive start, finished 18-for-28 through the air with no interceptions before being taken out mid-way through the fourth quarter.

SAN DIEGO - Freshman Lynell Hamilton stirred memories of great Aztec running backs past with his 220 yards on the ground, carrying San Diego State to its third win of the season, 37-17, over Samford at Qualcomm Stadium.

The Aztecs, who moved to 3-1 for the first time since 1996, used a balanced offense, accumulating a season best 528 yards of total offense in their second win over a NCAA I-AA school in 2003.

PASADENA, Calif. - An upset-minded San Diego State football team left empty handed as the Aztecs fell to the UCLA Bruins, 20-10, in front of 48,690 at the Rose Bowl.

The Aztecs were unable to notch their first-ever win over the Bruins in 19 tries, but still finished their non-conference schedule with a 3-2 record, the team's best start since the 1996 campaign.

Neither teams' offense was able to find much success in the first half, as the two sides combined for just six points and were both held to under 150 yards of total offense.

SDSU struck first on a 25-yard field goal by J.C. Mejia with 12:32 left in the second quarter, marking the seven straight game in which the Aztecs have been the first team to score.

UCLA responded with a field goal of its own, coming from 27 yards out to knot the game at 3-3 heading into halftime.

The Bruins jumped ahead with the first touchdown of the evening on its second possession of the second half when quarterback Drew Olson hit Junior Taylor for 41 yards and a 10-7 lead.

San Diego State had a chance to respond later in the quarter when Robert Miller recovered a fumble on the UCLA 29-yard line.

A personal foul and a sack sent the Aztecs back near midfield, however, a Bruin penalty breathed new life into the drive with a first down at the UCLA 26.

A three-yard gain by Lynell Hamilton got SDSU to the 23, but two plays later UCLA's Spencer Havner intercepted a Matt Dlugolecki pass and returned it 50 yards to set up a 24-yard field goal by Justin Medlock.

The Bruin defense notched another takeaway on the Aztecs' next possession when C.J. Niusulu grabbed his team's second interception at the SDSU 20-yard line.

Three plays and one penalty later, the Bruins put the game out of reach with its second touchdown of the night to go up 20-3.

The Aztecs would narrow the margin to 10 points on a seven-yard touchdown run by Michael Franklin, but were unable to overcome the deficit, eventually falling 20-10.

Hamilton finished the game with 87 yards rushing on 20 carries, while Dlugolecki was unable to find his throwing touch against the Bruins, finishing 19-for-37 for only 110 yards.

SAN DIEGO - If there's one thing to expect in an SDSU-BYU football game it's excitement and this season's meeting was no different. The two sides combined for 80 points with the Cougars using a 24-point outburst in the second quarter to defeat the Aztecs 44-36 in front of 32,137 fans at Qualcomm Stadium.

The game had been billed as a clash between two of the nation's top defenses, but turned out to be a high-scoring affair in which the schools combined for over 800 yards of total offense.

The night started out with its first hint of what was to come as SDSU's Brook Miller returned a fumble 44 yards for a touchdown, just 54 seconds into the game.

BYU quarterback John Beck made up for his fumble with a four-yard touchdown run to tie the score at 7-7. The rushing touchdown was the first allowed by SDSU in 2003.

The Aztecs jumped back ahead one offensive play later when quarterback Adam Hall connected with Jeff Webb on a 70-yard touchdown pass, the first of three TDs between the duo on the night.

The 14-7 lead, however, would be SDSU's last as the Cougars outscored the Aztecs 24-10 in the second quarter to head into the locker room up 31-24.

BYU extended its lead in the second half to 41-24, before SDSU responded with two touchdowns to close the gap to five points at 41-36 in the fourth quarter.

Just as the Aztecs got back within striking distance, a Cougar field goal with 2:18 left sealed the 44-36 BYU victory.

Webb finished the game with 10 receptions for 253 yards, the eighth best single-game total in Aztec history.

Hall, making his first appearance since missing the previous four games due to injury, finished the night 18-for-34 for 352 yards.

SALT LAKE CITY - Utah scored 27 unanswered points in the second half to hand San Diego State its third straight defeat, as the Aztecs fell below the .500 mark for the first time in 2003 with a 27-6 loss. The Aztecs outgained the Lobos, 393-326, including 274 yards of total offense in the first half alone, but were only able to muster seven points. New Mexico, meanwhile, took advantage of six SDSU turnovers and a blocked punt to score 20 of its 30 points.

After a New Mexico field goal ended the first half, the Lobos put the game out of reach with 10 points in the third quarter and three in the fourth, eventually winning, 30-7.

Hall finished the game with season highs for both attempts (48) and completions (25), throwing for 291 yards before giving way to Matt Dlugolecki in the fourth quarter.

The two sides then traded field goals with Cowboy Deric Yaussi notching his team's first points of the night with a 21-yarder in the second quarter.

The Aztecs recovered the three points on the final play of the first half as Mejia put his record-tying fourth field goal of the game through the uprights, capping a 10-play 43-yard drive in just 1:23.

SDSU's first turnover of the night, a fumble by Hamilton, led to the sixth and final field goal of the night when Yaussi connected from 26 yards out to make the score 12-6 with 10:05 remaining in the third quarter.

Wyoming wasn't the only team to capitalize on its opponent's turnovers, as interceptions by Aztecs Kirk Morrison and Brandon Rager each led to touchdowns and a 25-6 SDSU lead.

The Cowboys tried to rally in the fourth quarter when Casey Bramlet tossed a pair of touchdown passes to close the gap to 25-20.

San Diego State, however, recovered the ensuing inside kick and ran out the final 3:39 to preserve the 25-20 victory.

Aztec Adam Hall finished the game 14-for-26 for 191 yards and his first career rushing touchdown. Ten of Hall's 14 completions went to Jeff Webb, who logged his second career game with over 100 yards receiving and also added one touchdown.

LAS VEGAS - Aztec quarterback Adam Hall's first-quarter touchdown pass to Robert Ortiz proved to be the game-winner, as San Diego State shutout host UNLV, 7-0, in front of 20,896 at Sam Boyd Stadium.

SDSU once again showed why it has the conference's top defense, limiting the Rebels to just 175 yards of total offense, including only 80 yards through the first three quarters of action. The Aztecs posted their second shutout of the season and their second in MWC play since the conference began in 1999.

San Diego State started the game by grabbing interceptions on UNLV's first two possessions, the first by safety Josh Dean, leading to the game's only score at the 9:02 mark of the first quarter.

The Aztecs had their chances to extend the lead in the first half, but a blocked field goal, an interception and a fumble on the Rebel eight-yard line left the score at 7-0 heading into locker room.

Hall, unfortunately, wasn't the only Aztec to leave the game prematurely, as leading rusher Lynell Hamilton, who had gained 94 yards on 24 carries, and leading receiver Jeff Webb both went down with injuries.

Playing without its top three offensive threats, the Aztec defense took over, ending UNLV's best scoring opportunity with an impressive goal-line stand in the fourth quarter.

The Rebels looked to equalize by driving 72 yards for a first-and-goal at the Aztec five-yard line. UNLV had four chances at the end zone, but three of them, including the last one ended in an incomplete pass.

Pinned deep in its own territory, SDSU got out of trouble when backup quarterback Matt Dlugolecki completed a critical third-down play with a 37-yard pass to Kyle Conerly.

The Aztecs' third interception of the game, this time by cornerback Jeff Shoate, put an end to the Rebels' final drive as SDSU ran out the final 2:29 to preserve the 7-0 victory.

Hall finished the game 10-for-22 passing for 89 yards and one touchdown, before giving way to Dlugolecki, who was a perfect 3-for-3 for 69 yards.

FORT COLLINS, Colo. - With the visiting school winning each of the last five meetings, the San Diego State football team hoped history would be on its side as it traveled to Colorado State without its leading rusher and receiver.

Unfortunately for the Aztecs, the trend came to an end in 2003, as the Rams scored a pair of touchdowns in the fourth quarter to pull out a 21-6 victory in front of 29,127 at Hughes Stadium.

The day, for the most part, was a defensive struggle as both squads failed to capitalize on their scoring opportunities, combining to miss five of the game's seven field-goal attempts.

Colorado State took the early lead on the first play of the second quarter when Ben Stratton intercepted an Adam Hall pass and ran it back 35 yards for a touchdown.

SDSU would get three of those points back later in the quarter on J.C. Mejia's career long 51-yard field goal at the 12-minute mark.

The Aztecs appeared poised to get even closer, but Mejia missed a 42-yard attempt wide left as SDSU trailed 7-3 at the half, despite outgaining its opponent 207-128.

The Rams' lead was cut to one point in the third quarter when Mejia converted from 41 yards out at the 9:41 mark.

The one-point deficit, however, would be as close as the Aztecs would get as CSU's Bradlee Van Pelt threw a 67-yard touchdown pass to Eric Hill with 9:06 remaining in the game. The score was the first offensive touchdown allowed by the SDSU defense in seven quarters.

The Rams added some insurance points on a 42-yard run by Jimmy Green to give the Rams a 21-6 lead.

SDSU's final drive of the game came to an end with just a little over a minute to play when Adam Lancisero intercepted Matt Dlugolecki's pass at the Rams' 35-yard line.

Aztec sophomore running back Michael Franklin, starting in relief of the injured Lynell Hamilton, had a career best 105 yards rushing on 18 attempts.

Hall was 13-for-26 for 140 yards before leaving the game just two plays into the third quarter due to injury. Dlugolecki finished the day 10-for-22 for 97 yards, while SDSU's leading receiver Robert Ortiz had 10 catches for 88 yards.
