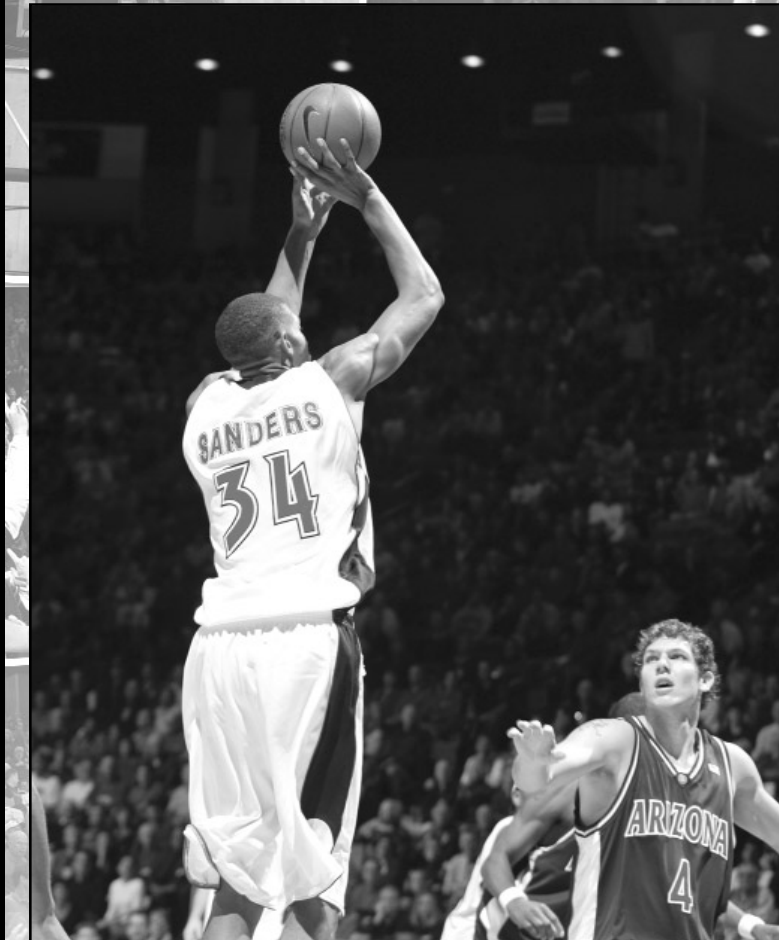

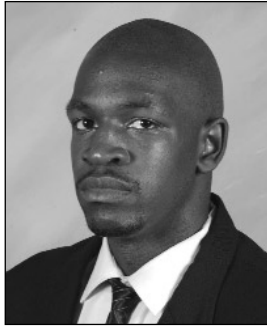

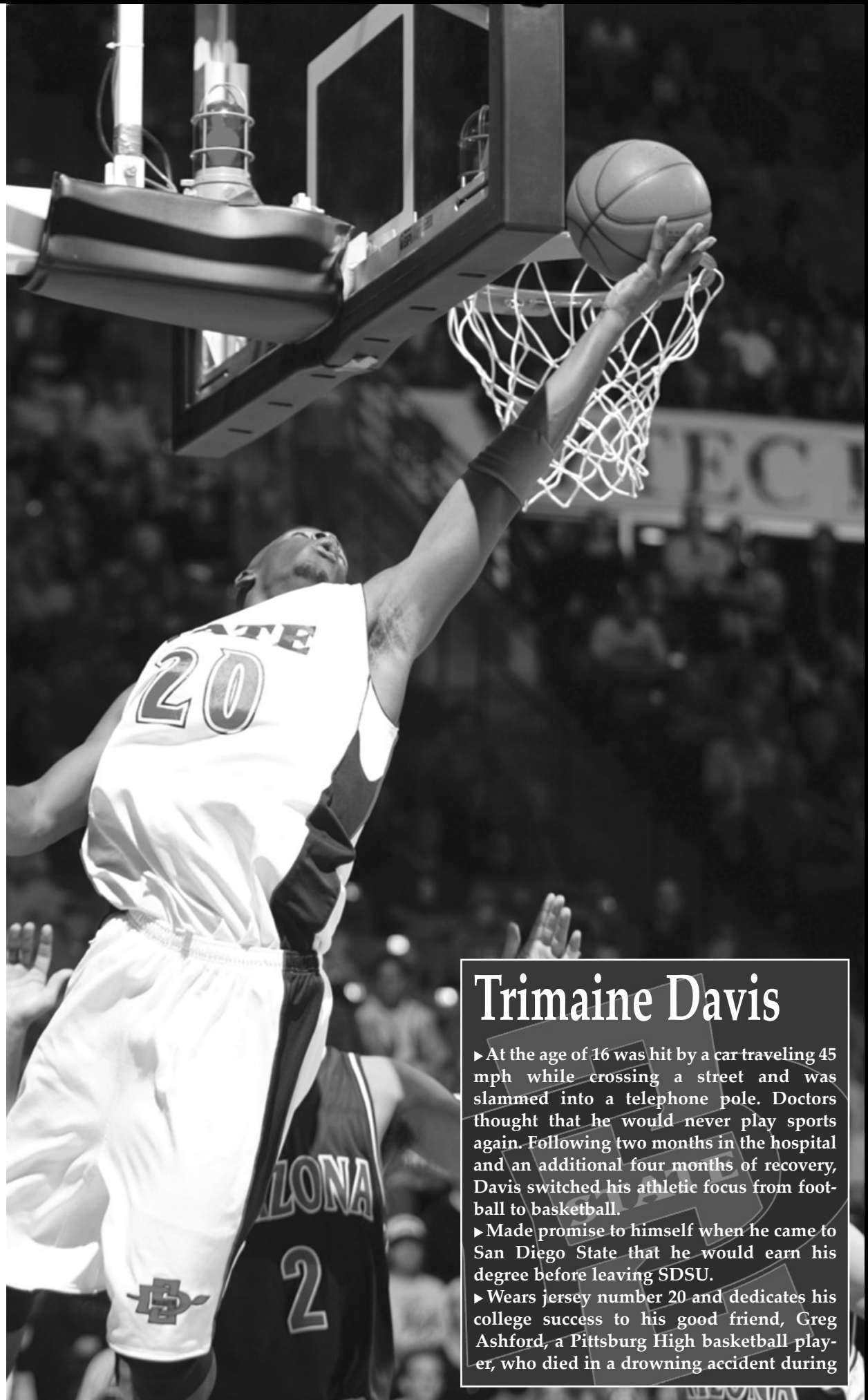

► At the age of 16 was hit by a car traveling 45 mph while crossing a street and was slammed into a telephone pole. Doctors thought that he would never play sports again. Following two months in the hospital and an additional four months of recovery, Davis switched his athletic focus from football to basketball.

► Made promise to himself when he came to San Diego State that he would earn his degree before leaving SDSU.

► Wears jersey number 20 and dedicates his college success to his good friend, Greg Ashford, a Pittsburg High basketball player, who died in a drowning accident during

current scholarship players have been in the program longer than Davis (Aerick Sanders and Chris Walton).

As A Freshman (2002-03)

One of the most productive freshmen in the Mountain West Conference, Davis ranked second in the league among first-year players in field-goal percentage (min. 20 FGA) connecting on 16-of-26 attempts (61.5 percent)... Played in 24 of 30 games during the campaign, including the first 12 of the season... Provided depth in the post position early when the Aztecs were without Evan Burns, Travis Hanour and Chris Manker... Averaged 6.9 minutes per contest and was one of four key freshmen contributors to see major minutes in their first season (Evan Burns 582 minutes, Steve Sir 438 minutes, John Sharper 236, Trimaime Davis 166 minutes)... Was one of only four post players on the active roster joining Mike Mackell, Aerick Sanders and Chris

Manker... Played at least 10 minutes in the first six games of the season and eight minutes in 24 games... Never went more than two games without seeing court time... Connected on 15-of-24 attempts from the field in the regular season (62.5 percent) after hitting all 15 of his field goal attempts during the exhibition games... Made his final five attempts from the field and did not miss a field goal attempt after Dec. 30, 2002... Had three points and a rebound in 16 minutes against IPFW (12-30-02)... Scored three points and had a monster dunk in five minutes of action against Florida Atlantic (12-28-02)... Scored 10 points and pulled down three rebounds in games against UC San Diego and Arizona (30 minutes of action)... Went 3-for-3 from the field and scored a career-high six points in 19 minutes against UC San Diego (12-2-02)... Came off the bench to score four points in 11 minutes against top-ranked Arizona (12-7-02)... Saw eight minutes of action in the Aztecs' second-round NIT game at Texas Tech (3-21-03), scoring two points and adding a career-high-tying three rebounds.

As a Redshirt (2001-02)

Worked hard on and off the court to developed his game and get stronger... Redshirted along with two-guard Steve Sir because the Aztecs were deep at both positions... An enthusiastic player who was the Aztecs' biggest cheerleader on the bench while redshirting.

High School

Averaged 20.6 points, 14.7 rebounds and 5.7 blocks for Pittsburg High as a senior... Was the first player to sign with SDSU during the spring 2001 signing period... Earned most valuable player honors in the Bay Valley Athletic League and was named to the *San Francisco Chronicle* all-metro boys team... Selected to the *NorCalPreps.com* all-NorCal third team... His prep team had a 24-2 regular-season record, the best in school history, and shared the conference title... Four-year letterwinner for the Pirates... Played for coach Darrick Domineeli.

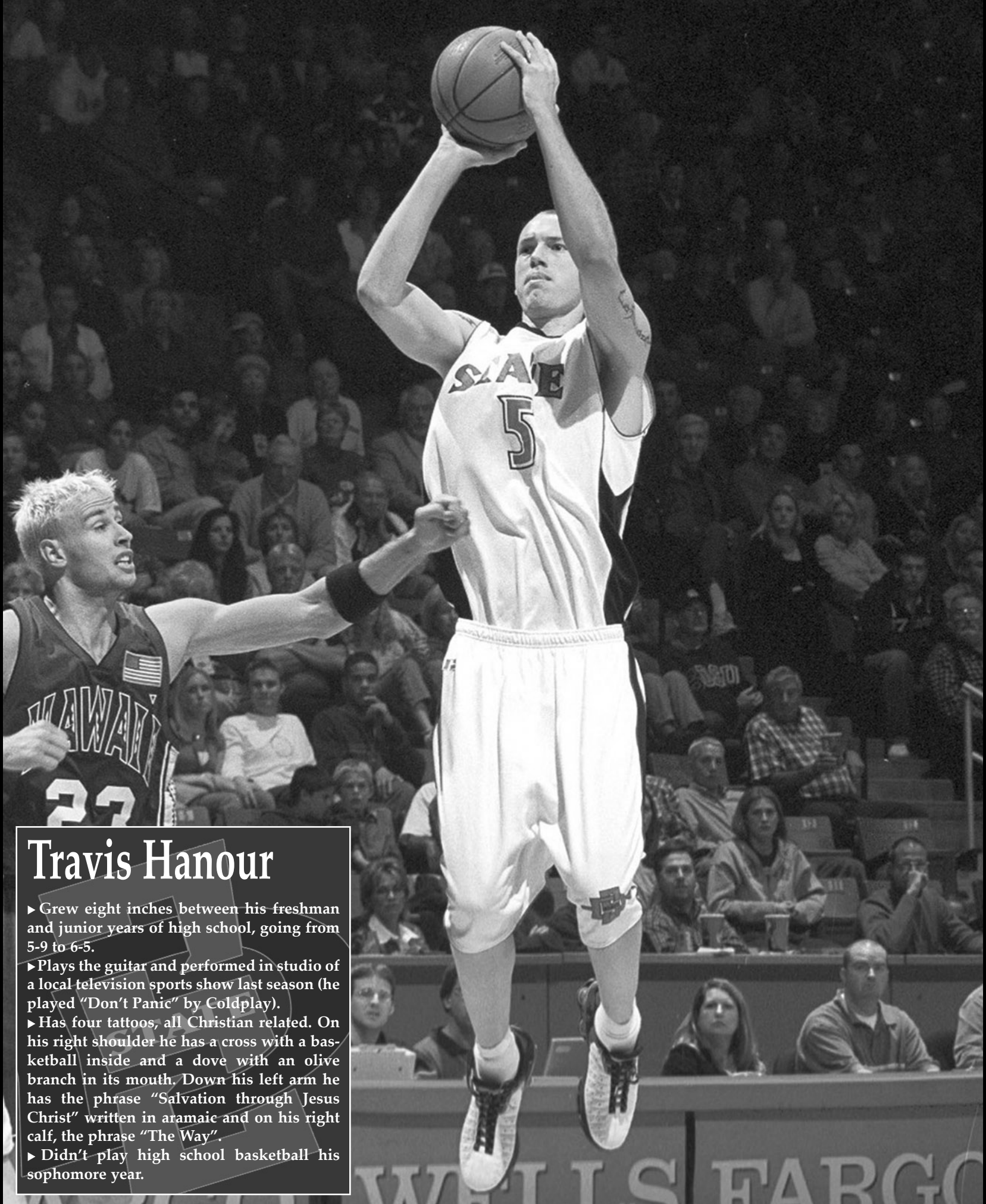

Travis Hanour

- ▶ Grew eight inches between his freshman and junior years of high school, going from 5-9 to 6-5.
- ▶ Plays the guitar and performed in studio of a local television sports show last season (he played "Don't Panic" by Coldplay).
- ▶ Has four tattoos, all Christian related. On his right shoulder he has a cross with a basketball inside and a dove with an olive branch in its mouth. Down his left arm he has the phrase "Salvation through Jesus Christ" written in aramaic and on his right calf, the phrase "The Way".
- ▶ Didn't play high school basketball his sophomore year.

Aztec Players

Possibly the biggest question mark for the Aztecs entering the 2003-04 season will be the health of Travis Hanour... A transfer from Arizona, Hanour was the Aztecs' best player during the first month of practice last season, but difficulty with tendinitis in both knees limited his playing time and productivity... Although his two-year stats aren't exactly eye-popping, the medical and coaching staffs hope that off-season surgery will allow Hanour to go through a season healthy for the first time and he will finally be able to show why he was

a projected starter for the Wildcats before transferring prior to the 2001-02 season.

Summer/Fall Update (2003)

Underwent knee surgery on April 14th to eliminate chronic tendinitis... That surgery kept him off the court during the summer... Played his first fullcourt pick-up game on Sept. 25... While not able to play, Hanour spent quality time in the weight room and added considerable muscle to his upper body.

As A Sophomore (2002-03)

Played in 18 games and drew the starting assignment eight times... Missed the six first games of the season per the NCAA's 4-2-4 transfer rule, but played in 18 of the next 19 games before missing the final five games of the season due to tendinitis... His eight starts tied for the fifth highest total on the team and are tied for second among returning players... Had four rebounds and an assist in 10 minutes at Brigham Young (2-17-03)... Drew the start and posted three points and two rebounds in seven minutes of play at Utah (2-15-03)... Left the game against the Utes with a sprained ankle and was doubtful for the contest against the Cougars before seeing 10 minutes of action... Had a strong performance with three points and three rebounds in 13 minutes vs. UNLV (2-11-03)... Played only six minutes vs. Wyoming (2-3-03),

but pulled down three rebounds and dished out an assist... Had a tough shooting night against the Rams when he connected on 1-of-11 from the field, including 1-of-7 from three-point range... Despite the cold shooting night, Hanour played well, recording five points, four rebounds and two assists in 26 minutes of action... Connected on 1-of-2 field goal attempts against New Mexico... Prior to that game, he suffered his first scoreless game as a member of the Aztecs, grabbing one rebound in 14 minutes of action against Brigham Young (1-20-03)... Had a career-best 35 minutes against Utah (1-18-03) which resulted in four points and a career-high seven rebounds against the Utes... Scored three points and added six rebounds in 20 minutes of action against San Diego... Returned from a one-game hiatus due to the flu with a strong performance against Texas Tech (1-6-03)... Played 22 minutes, with five points, two rebounds, two steals, one assist and two blocked shots against the Red Raiders... In his first three games at San Diego State his playing time increased (16-18-21), his point production increased (4-6-11) and his rebound total increased (2-4-4)... That trend changed slightly in the Aztecs' blowout victory against IPFW (12-30-02), when he scored three points, tied a career-high with five rebounds and added two assists in 19 minutes of action... Scored 11 points in 21 minutes of action against Florida Atlantic (12-28-02), tying a career-high point total... Played 16 minutes in his debut against Hawai'i (12-14-02) and scored four points while adding two rebounds and two assists... As an example of his all-around abilities, Hanour recorded a basket, a rebound, an assist and a blocked shot in his first 100 seconds on the court.

As A Freshman at Arizona (2000-01)

One of three freshmen to play for an Arizona squad that finished 28-8 overall and 15-3 in the Pac-10... The Wildcats finished second in the conference and advanced to the NCAA championship game before falling to Duke... Saw action in 20 games, the most by any freshman on the squad and the 10th highest total on the squad... Connected on 18-of-20 attempts (90.0 percent) from the free-throw line... Best percentage on the squad if he had enough attempts to qualify... Saw action in Arizona's national semifinal victory over Michigan State (3-31-01)... Scored a career-high 11 points at

Oregon State (2-3-01), connecting on 4-of-5 attempts from the floor, including 3-of-4 from bonus distance... Pushed Arizona over the century mark by connecting on a trey vs. Eastern Illinois in the first round of the NCAA Tournament (3-16-01)... Scored 15 of his 54 points in two games at Oregon and Oregon State... Totaled four points, two boards and an assist at USC (2-17-02)... Tallied four points, three rebounds and a career-high three assists against Washington State (2-10-02)... Logged a career-best 24 minutes against Saint Mary's (12-2-02), responding with nine points on the strength of 4-for-4 free-throw shooting... Averaged 13.9 points per 40 minutes of action.

High School

Prepped at Laguna Beach High in Laguna Beach, Calif... As a senior, averaged 25.7 points, 9.7 rebounds and 5.4 assists per game for coach Bret Fleming... Shot 40 percent from the three-point arc... A first-team all-California Interscholastic Federation selection... Named the Pacific Coast League's Most Valuable Player... All-state and all-county selection... Team finished 19-7... As a junior, the Breakers went 21-6, with Hanour averaging 19.0 points, 8.0 rebounds, 5.0 assists, 3.0 steals and 3.0 blocks.

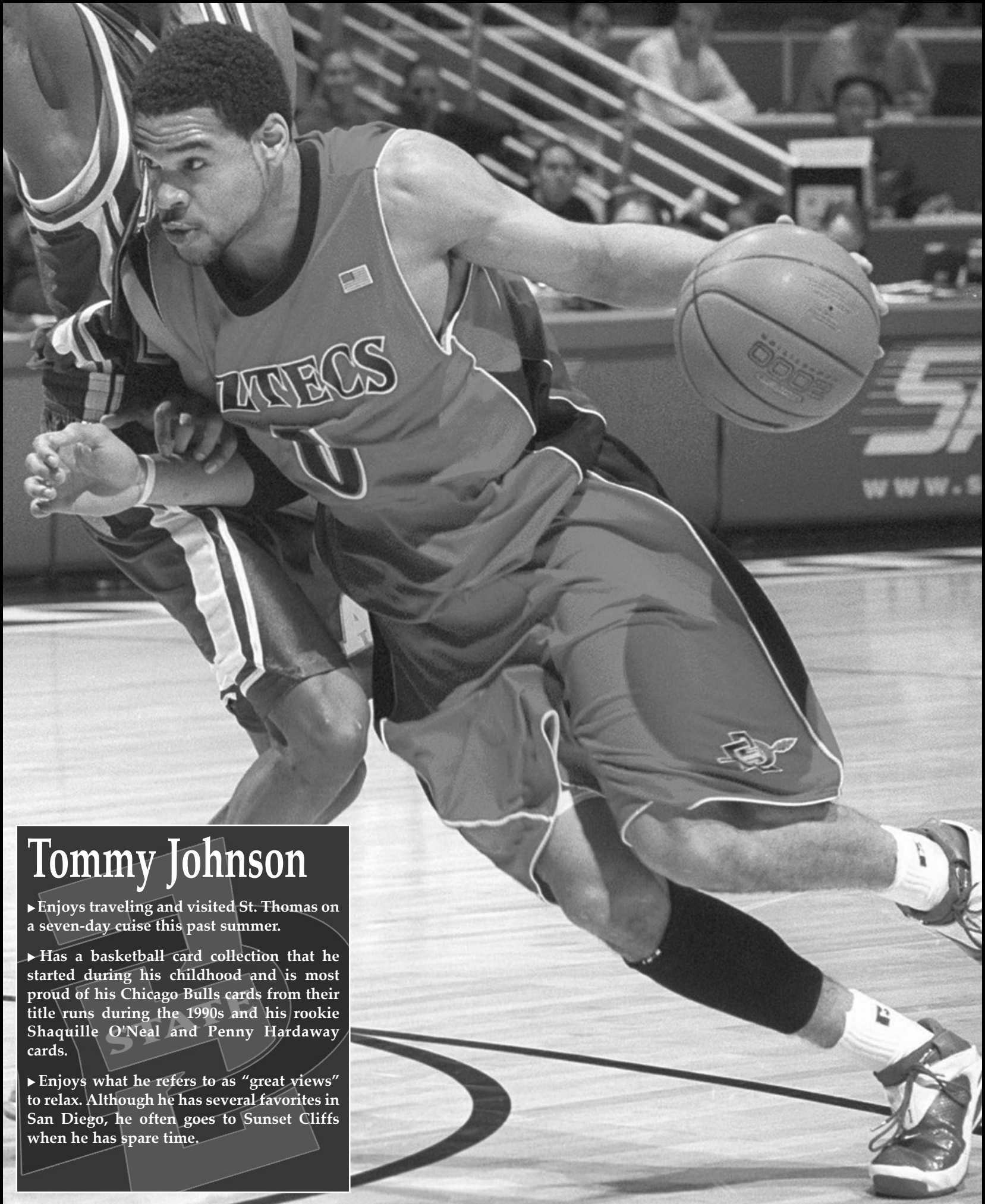

Crenshaw High

A legitimate scorer who has improved the rest of his game to become a solid all-around performer... Will likely see his opportunity for playing time increase with the departure of Tony Bland at the off-guard position... Has the ability to score but is looking to add the threat of a consistent jumper to his arsenal... Lefty who ranked as a top 100 prospect out of high school.

As a Sophomore (2002-03)

Played in 28 of 30 games, playing 10 or more minutes in each of the last 12 games, including consecutive career highs in the category with 28 minutes at Utah (2-15-03) and 29 minutes at Brigham Young (2-17-03)... Played 20 or more minutes in each of the last three games, tying a career mark in that category... Started seven games during the campaign, including six straight from Dec. 14 to Jan. 6... In 28 games he produced far more statistically than in his freshman campaign (sophomore vs. freshman seasons: points: 156-31, rebounds: 72-18, assists: 49-7, minutes played: 474-120)... Posted strong numbers in his his final three games: 32 points, 10 rebounds, five assists while connecting on 11-of-19 field goals in 68 minutes of action... Made a three-point field goal in 12 of his last 21 games and connected on 10 of his last 19 attempts (52.6 percent) from bonus distance... Connected on 21-of-29 (72.4 percent) free-throw attempts this season after hitting 1-of-4 all of last season... Had 10 points, including a big three-point field goal, and added four rebounds in 25 minutes vs. UC Santa Barbara (3-19-03)... Tied a career-high with 13 points on 5-of-8 shooting from the floor in the game at

UNLV (3-13-03)... Pulled down a career-high seven rebounds and added eight points in 18 minutes against IPFW (12-30-02)... Had seven points, two rebounds and three assists in 13 minutes of action against New Mexico (2-24-03)... Tied a career high with three steals in 17 minutes against Air Force (2-22-03)... Made his seventh start of the season at BYU, and first since the Texas Tech (1-6-03) game... Had five points, five rebounds and three assists at Utah and followed that up with eight points, three rebounds and two assists at Brigham Young... Played 12 minutes against UNLV (2-11-03) with three points and two rebounds... Saw 10 minutes of action, contributing two points and one rebound vs. Wyoming (2-3-03)... Prior to that game, he played one minute vs. Colorado State (2-1-03), the fewest minutes he has logged in any game he has played after seeing 12 minutes of action at New Mexico (1-25-03)... Had four points, three rebounds and a team-high four assists against the Lobos... 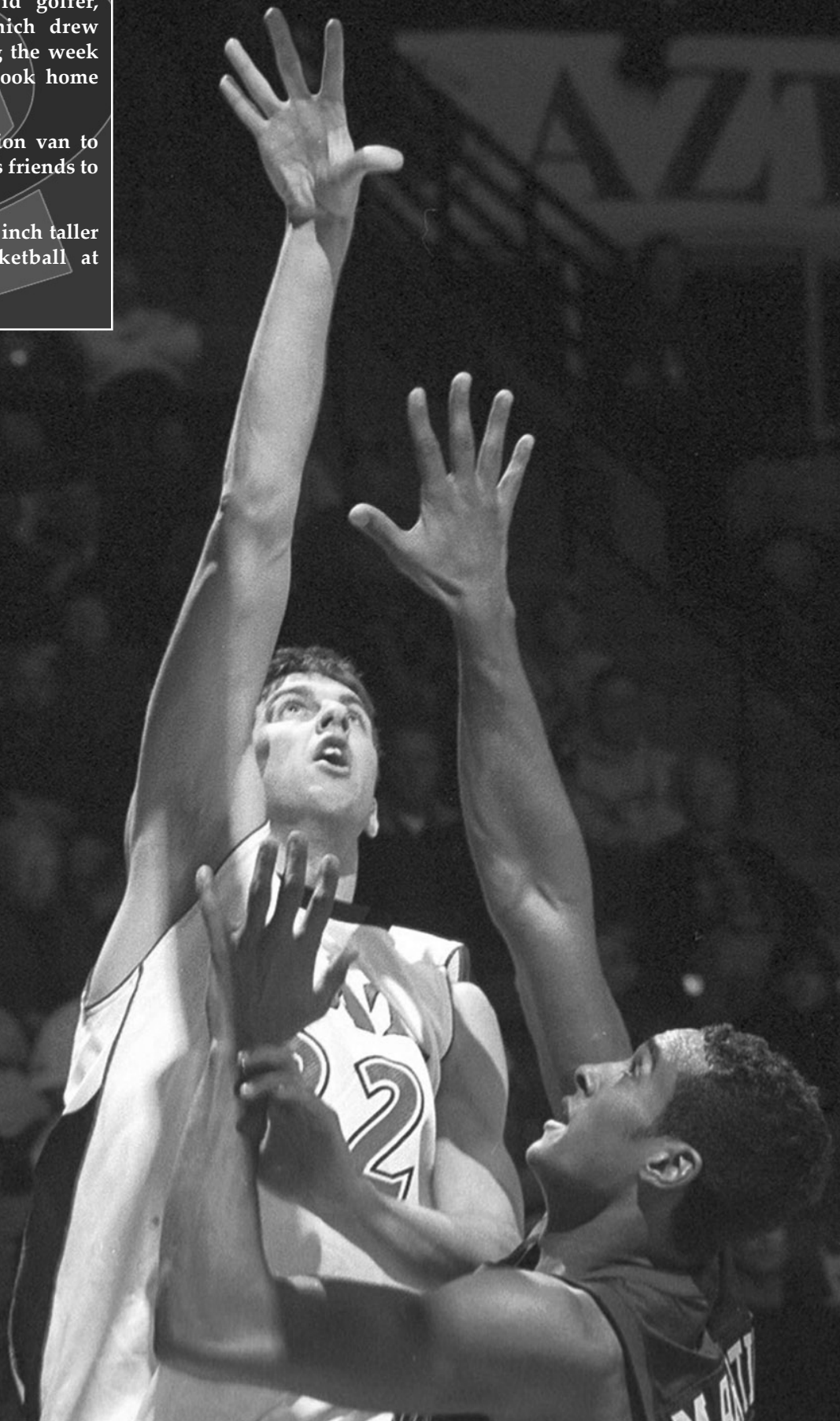

Has the ability to post-up as well as play facing the basket... Continuing to get physically stronger which will improve his inside game... Will be counted on in the inside as the Aztecs have no other player taller than 6-10 on the roster.

Summer/Fall Update (2003)

Underwent arthroscopic knee surgery on April 11th... Has made a full recovery and played this summer... Worked

hard in the weight room to add bulk to his 7-1 frame.

As A Sophomore (2002-03)

Played in 25 of the 26 games he was eligible to compete in after missing the first four games of the season per the NCAA's 4-2-4 transfer rule... Averaged 2.9 ppg, 1.2 rpg while playing 199 minutes (8.0 mpg)... His production per minutes played was impressive as he averaged 14.7 points and 6.0 rebounds per 40 minutes of action... Tallest player on the roster at 7-0 (now listed at 7-1)... His 16 three-point field goals ranked fifth on the team and third among non-seniors... Posted a six-point performance in eight minutes of action versus Utah (1-18-03)... Made his first start with the Aztecs and his third career start against

San Diego (1-8-03)... Played a season-high 22 minutes against the Toreros with nine points, two rebounds and two steals... Had 13 minutes against Texas Tech (1-6-03), scoring four points and adding four rebounds against the Red Raiders... Connected on a three-point field goal in eight minutes of action against Loyola Marymount (1-3-03)... Saw 13 minutes of action against IPFW (12-30-02), the most since playing 13 minutes against Arizona... Had five points and four rebounds against the Mastodons... Played in his first contest at SDSU against Arizona (12-7-02) and responded with five points and career-highs with five rebounds and two assists in 13 minutes of action... 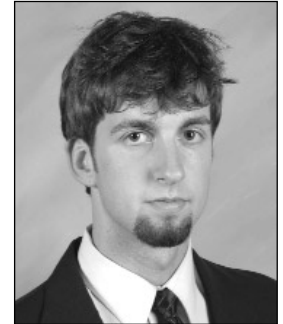
As A Fresh. at Oregon State (2000-01)

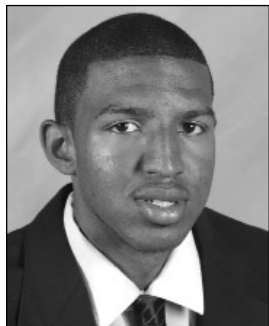

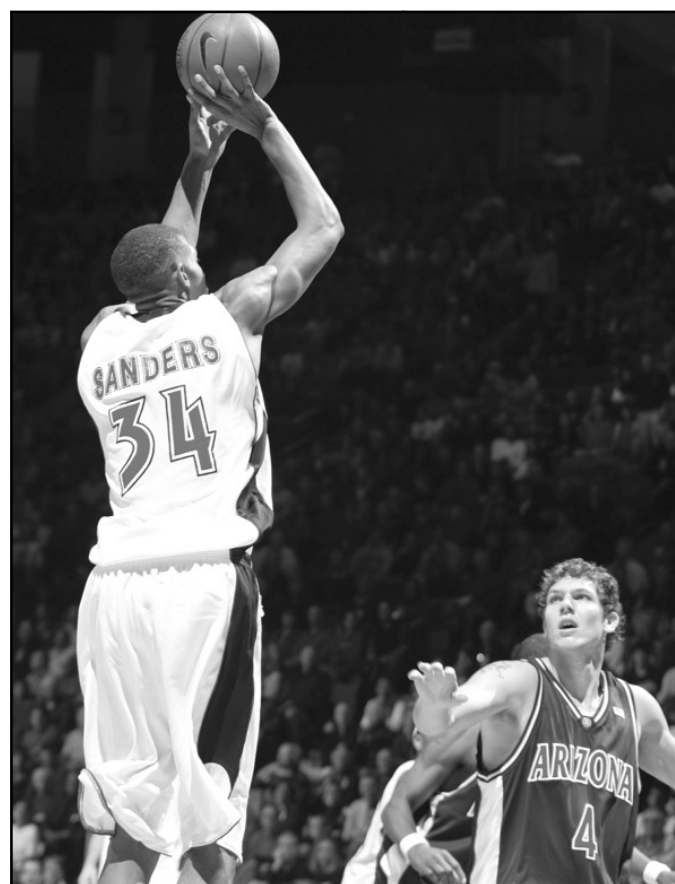

One of six players to see action in all 33 games... San Diego State team rankings: second in blocked shots (29), tied for fifth in rebounding (102/3.1 per game), tied for seventh in steals (16), eighth in scoring (81/2.5 per game) and ninth in minutes played (364/11.0 per game)... Connected on 37-of-66 field goal attempts for 56.1 percent... That figure would have not only led the team but would have ranked second in the Mountain West Conference had he qualified... 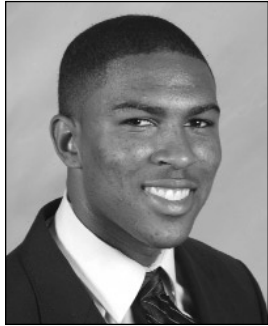

There may have been no bigger surprise for the Aztecs during the 2002-03 season than the impact of John Sharper... A recruited walk-on who is now on scholarship, he is a good ball-handler with poise beyond his years Sharper proved to be a solid back-up at the point position and emerged as a player with the ability to play the two-guard spot as well.

Summer/Fall Update (2003)

Fractured his third metacarpal in his right hand while playing basketball in early summer... Wore a cast and missed more than a month recovering from the injury... Worked on his left-hand ball skills during the recovery process... Was awarded a scholarship during the summer.

As A Freshman (2002-03 Season)

Played in 28 of 30 games for the Aztecs and logged 236 minutes - the ninth highest total on the team, sixth among non-seniors... Averaged 1.9 points, 0.8 rebounds and 0.6 assists per game... His averages per 40 minutes were 8.8 points, 3.9 rebounds and 2.7 assists... Despite playing a majority of his minutes at the point guard position, he committed a mere 12 turnovers during the 2002-03 campaign (one turnover every 19.7 minutes of action)... 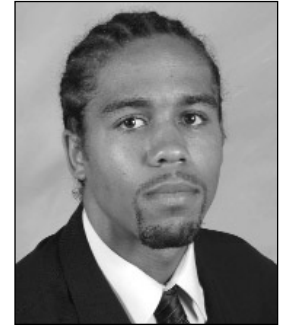

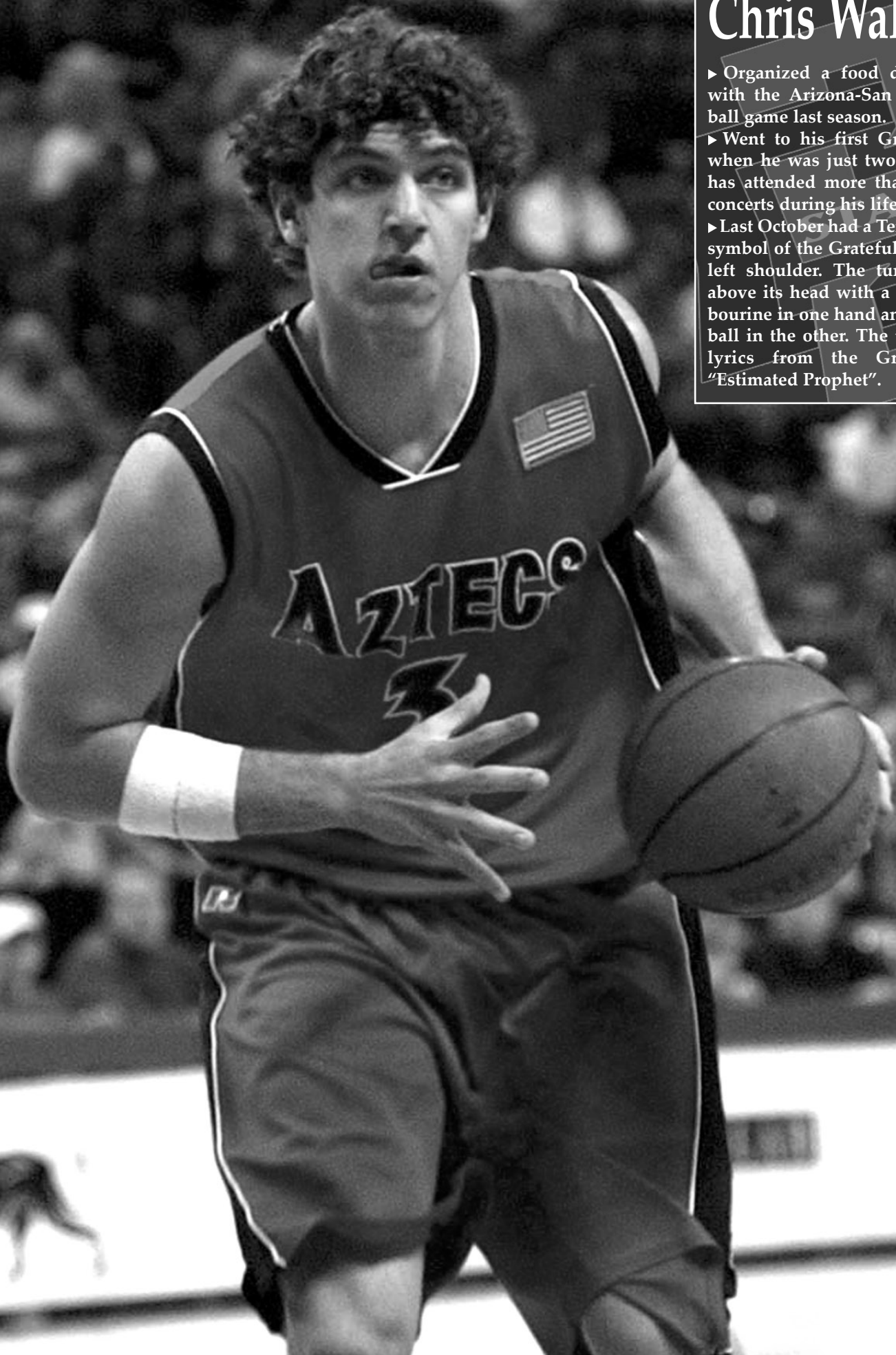

The turtle has both hands above its head with a Steal Your Face tambourine in one hand and a spinning basketball in the other. The tattoo is circled with lyrics from the Grateful Dead song "Estimated Prophet".

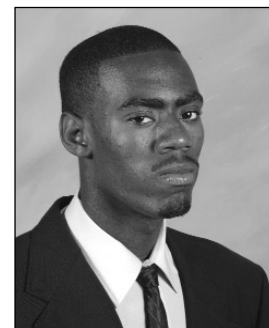
