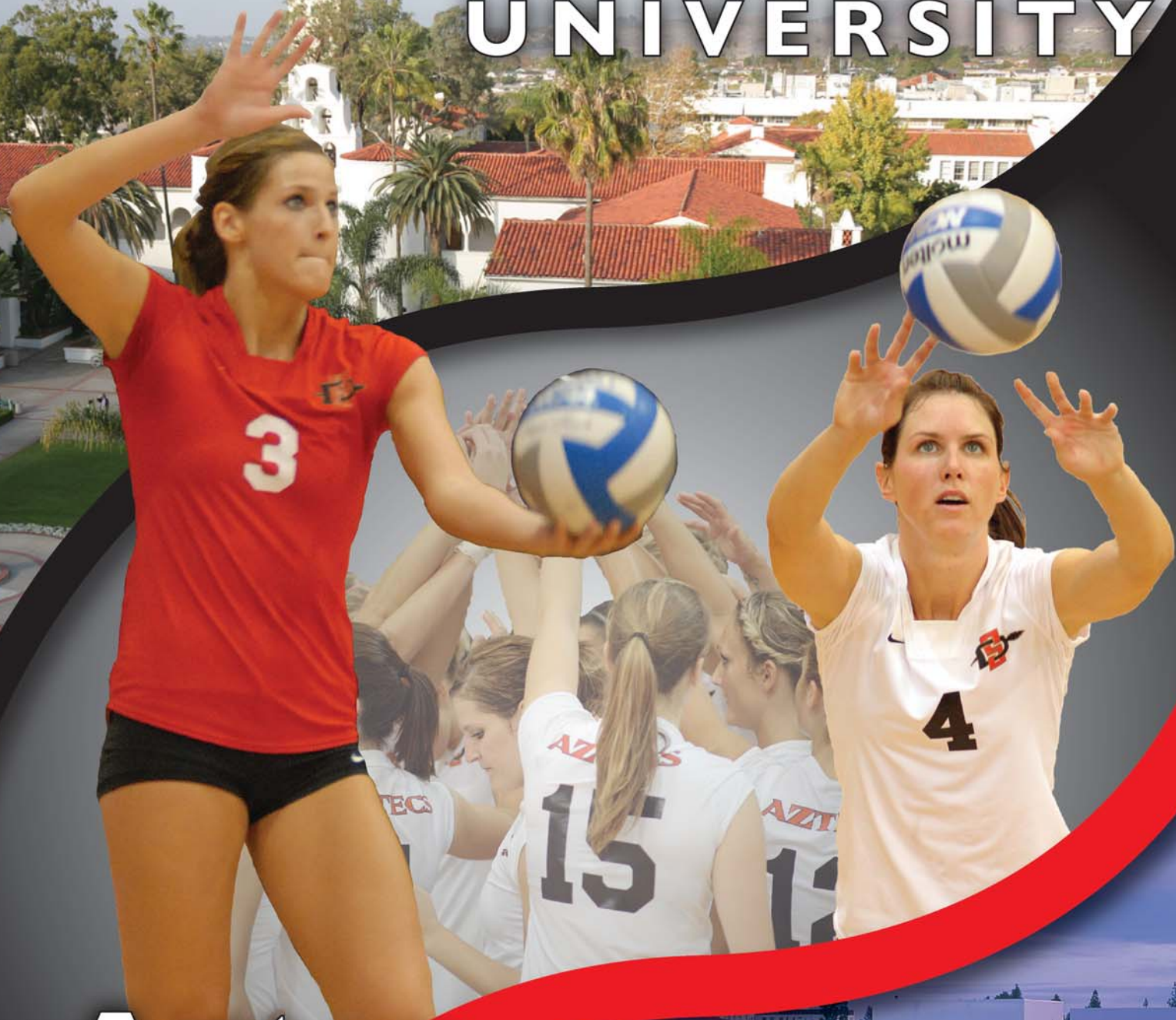

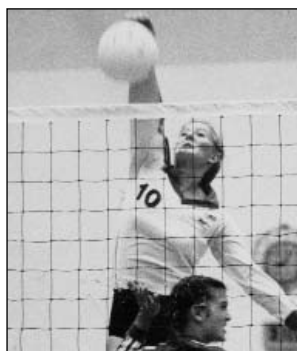
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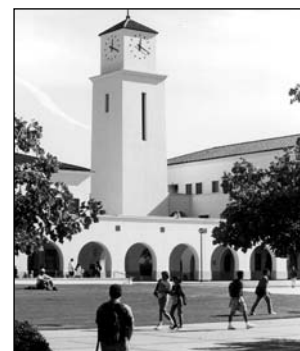

PRESS CREDENTIALS

Press credentials for SDSU's home volleyball matches are issued only to personnel from accredited media outlets whose role is to cover the game as a news event.

Requests should be made in writing on company letterhead and faxed at least two days prior to the match in question. Direct all requests to Dave Kuhn, San Diego State Athletic Media Relations, (619) 582-6541.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Credentials for sideline photographers will be issued to working press. San Diego State adheres to NCAA photography policies. Photographers are not permitted on the volleyball court and must remain inside the photography boxes located behind the official's tower on the court. Photographers are requested to remain on the side opposite the team benches.

Postgame interviews will take place outside of the Aztec locker rooms after a 10-minute cooling-off period at the end of the game. All postgame interview requests should be directed to Dave Kuhn prior to the end of the match.

Practices are usually open to media, but please keep interviews until the conclusion of practice. Alert Dave Kuhn of any requests for phone or practice interviews. All interviews of players and staff must be approved through the media relations office.

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DEITRE COLLINS-PARKER (HAWAI'I '95) HEAD COACH

Deitre Collins-Parker, a two-time national collegiate player of the year whose resume includes stints at a pair Division I schools the past 13 seasons, was named the head volleyball coach at San Diego State on Jan. 30, 2009. She becomes just the fourth head coach since the Aztecs began collegiate play in 1976. She replaces Mark Warner, who retired at the end of the 2008 campaign after 13 years at the helm of the women's program.

Collins-Parker comes to San Diego State after five seasons as the head coach at Cornell, where she led the Big Red to three Ivy League titles and two NCAA tournament appearances. Under her tutelage, the Big Red has seen seven players named first-team All-Ivy, including two-time Ivy League Player of the Year and honorable mention All-American, Elizabeth Bishop (2007).

Prior to taking over at Cornell in 2004, Collins-Parker spent the previous eight seasons as head coach at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, earning Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in 1998 after taking a dormant volleyball program and leading the Lady Rebels to a 23-8 record and a WAC tournament semifinal appearance.

Before her stint at UNLV, Collins-Parker served as an assistant coach at South Alabama, Northern Arizona and Houston for one year each. She also has plenty of international coaching

experience as well. She served as head coach of the 1998 U.S. junior national team, directing her squad to a gold medal in the national qualifier. She served in the same capacity during the summer of 2000 (silver medal) and 2001 (bronze medal).

A former member of the U.S. national team and a three-time AVCA All-American at the University of Hawaii, Collins-Parker was the starting middle blocker for the 1988 Olympic Team in Seoul, South Korea, and was an alternate for the 1992 team in Barcelona, Spain. She played in over 130 international matches and earned bronze medals at the 1986 Goodwill Games and the 1987 Pan-Am Games.

As a collegian, Collins-Parker was a two-time Broderick Award honoree as the national player of the year (1983, 1984) after leading the Rainbow Wahine to consecutive national titles and a 110-5 record in her final three seasons. Collins capped off her career by becoming the first volleyball player to be awarded the Broderick Cup recipient, given to the nation's best collegiate athlete in all sports.

She was twice named to the NCAA all-tournament team and still holds the record for solo blocks in one NCAA tournament (15 in 1982). She was one of six players named to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball 25th Anniversary Team in October 2005.

Collins-Parker went on to compete at the national level and played in the 1988 Seoul Olympic Games and was also an alternate for the 1992 games in Barcelona, Spain. She played in over 130 international matches and earned bronze medals at the 1986 Goodwill Games and 1987 Pan-Am Games. She played professionally in the Italian League (1988-89) and the French League (1989-91), capturing the French League Championship twice and the European Cup of Champions in 1990.

Collins-Parker was inducted into the AVCA Hall of Fame this past fall. She currently serves as a member of the AVCA Board of Directors and the chairperson on the AVCA Minority Coaches Committee. She currently has membership with the AVCA, Coaches Accreditation Program, Kaepa Gold Medal Clinics, Black Coaches Association, and Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Earlier this year, Collins-Parker received the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award during the 2009 NCAA Convention in Washington, D.C. The award honors former student-athletes who successfully completed collegiate careers in various sports and have excelled in their chosen professions on their 25th anniversary of completing their athletics eligibility.

A 1995 graduate of Hawaii with a bachelor of arts in broadcast communications, Collins-Parker is a member of the USA Volleyball Coaching Accreditation Program and is a CAP level III accredited coach.

Collins-Parker is married to Dale Parker who was an assistant coach for the Cornell women's basketball team the past three seasons and was recently named head coach at nearby Francis Parker High School.

ASSISTANT COACHES



BURT FULLER
(CHICO STATE '86)
ASSISTANT COACH

Burt Fuller enters his first season as a member of the San Diego State coaching staff. Fuller, who spent the previous three seasons as an assistant at Utah and was formerly the head coach at Utah State, brings a wealth of success and knowledge to the Aztec volleyball program.

In his first season with the Utes in 2006 he helped lead the Utes to a 28-4 record, which included a 16-0 conference slate and a second round NCAA Tournament appearance. Last year, he coached a Utah squad that went 26-6 overall, won the MWC title with a 14-2 mark and advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament.

While at Utah State, Fuller led his team to two NCAA Tournament appearances and guided the Aggies to an 82-70 mark. He chalked up two 20-win seasons in coaching two All-Americans (Erin Cartwright-Davis and Zuzana Cernianska) and 10 all-league selections. The Aggies turned in a 21-13 record in 2005, finishing second in the Western Athletic Conference. They also took second in the WAC Tournament and earned their second NCAA Tournament berth that year.

Utah State's other NCAA Tourney showing came in Fuller's first year at the helm. In 2001, the team recorded a 20-11 mark and went 12-6 in Big West play. The Aggies opened the NCAA Tournament with a 3-2 win over No. 19-ranked Brigham Young. The 2001 squad finished its campaign ranked No. 21 in the final AVCA poll. Fuller coached five all-league honorees that year, the most on one team in USU history.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experiences, Fuller coached the IVA High Performance team at the 2006 Global Challenge in Maribor, Slovenia.

Prior to Utah State, Fuller was a long-time assistant at national power UCLA. In his seven seasons in Westwood, Calif., the Bruins went to the NCAA Tournament six times. UCLA finished second in 1994 and made two appearances in the regional final. His 2000 team finished No. 7 in the country. While at UCLA, he helped coach 23 All-Pac-10 selections and five All-Americans.

Fuller's first head coaching job was with Los Angeles Pierce Junior College where he coached the women's team in 1992 and 1993. He was also an assistant on the men's team, helping them to a state title in 1992 and a runner-up finish in 1994. He also has stints as an assistant at Fresno State (1989) and Chico State (1985).

Other coaching endeavors for Fuller include two years at Los Altos (Calif.) High School where he was named Central Coast Section Coach of the Year in 1998. He was also head coach of the USA Maccabiah Team in 1997 that won the USA's first-ever gold medal in volleyball at the World Games. In 2005, he served as the Intermountain Region Youth Team coach, guiding it to a championship at the 2005 Global Challenge.

Fuller earned his recreation management degree from Chico State in 1986 and was a member of the men's volleyball program from 1984-85. Prior to that he obtained his associate of arts degree from Los Angeles Pierce Junior College in 1982. As a player at LA Pierce JC, he played middle blocker during the 1981 season and led his team to the state tournament in 1982 as an all-conference setter.



KELE EVELAND
(GEORGIA TECH '04)
ASSISTANT COACH

Kele Eveland, one of the most decorated female student-athletes in school history and the only first-team AVCA All-American in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference, joins the Aztec volleyball coaching staff after serving as a volunteer assistant coach at her alma mater, Georgia Tech, during the 2008 campaign.

Last season, Eveland assisted the Yellow Jacket staff with all aspects of coaching and provided valuable insight on head coach Bond Shymansky's offense after serving as his starting setter his first four years at Georgia Tech.

Eveland was the Yellow Jackets' starting setter from 2000-03, and finished her career ranked fourth in the NCAA record books with 6,464 assists. The 2003 ACC Player of the Year, 2000 Rookie of the Year and three-time all-ACC honoree averaged 13.38 assists per game and still ranks in the top-10 in the Tech career annals for digs and block assists. She holds the school record and three of the top seven marks in Yellow Jacket history, for assists in a season.

Following her graduation from Georgia Tech in 2004, Eveland spent four years playing professionally in Granada, Spain, before retiring in May, 2008.

Eveland was honored as the recipient of the Georgia Tech Total Person Award in 2004, recognizing the top Yellow Jacket student-athlete of the year. She also earned Academic All-America honors her senior year and was a recipient of NCAA and ACC Postgraduate Scholarships. Eveland became the first - and only - female in Georgia Tech history to have her jersey retired when the school did so in a pre-match ceremony at O'Keefe Gym September 9, 2005.

After receiving her degree from Georgia Tech in management in 2004, Eveland went on to earn a master's degree in organizational leadership from Gonzaga in 2006.

Eveland, 27, is one of five athletic children born to Jack and Jay Eveland. She is one of several women in her family to have played collegiate volleyball, including her mother (Central Michigan) and sisters Mya (George Washington) and Ki (Boise State).

Eveland's other sister, Breanna, was a three-time All-American pole vaulter at Kansas State who is now married to San Diego Charger Jeromey Clary. Her father played rugby at Central Michigan and her brother, Derik, is currently a baseball and basketball coach in Phoenix, Ariz.



MIKE TERRILL
(USC '06)
VOL. ASST. COACH

Mike Terrill begins his first season as a volunteer assistant coach with the Aztec volleyball program. His primary responsibilities with the Aztecs include the training of the libero and defensive specialist positions as well as the operation of the DataVolley/DataVideo systems and technical operations.

During the spring of 2009 he was the junior varsity head coach and assistant varsity coach for the boys' program at Claremont High School in Claremont, Calif. The varsity squad won the Pacific League title and advanced to the CIF quarterfinals. He also served as an assistant for the Ayala High School (Chino Hills, Calif.) girls team this past summer.

Prior to relocating to Southern California, the 25-year-old Terrill was an assistant coach at Cal State Monterey Bay where he specialized in defensive systems and worked with the team's liberos and middle blockers.

Terrill also has experience at the club level after coaching the boys 16-1 team with Club West in La Verne, Calif. In addition, he has spent his summers on the road coaching satellite volleyball camps for Gold Medal Squared.

As a player at USC, he played both outside hitter and libero. During his prep days he was a two-time all-Pacific League and 2002 league MVP at Claremont High School.

Terrill graduated from USC in 2006 and is currently pursuing a Masters degree in kinesiology with an emphasis in sports psychology at San Diego State.

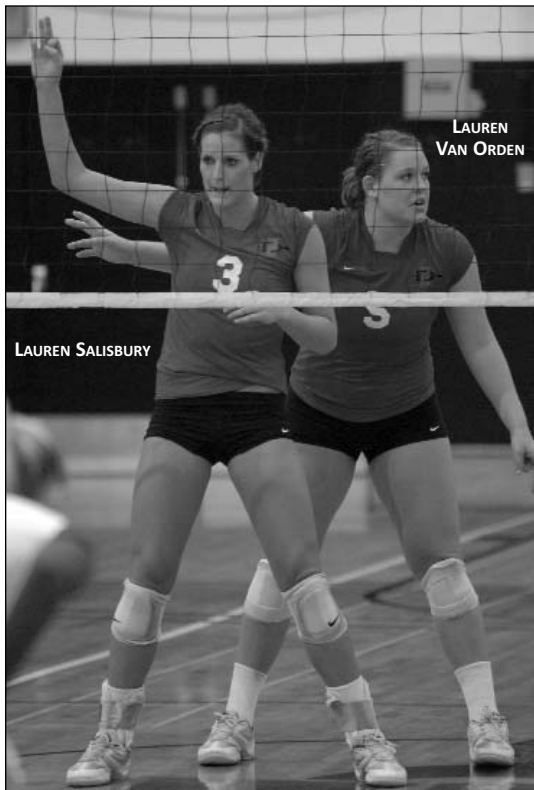

LAUREN SALISBURY

A new era in San Diego State volleyball begins this season as former All-American and U.S. Olympian Deitre Collins-Parker takes over the reins of the Aztec program. Collins-Parker, who has 13 years of previous head coaching experience at UNLV and Cornell, inherits a team that returns 15 players including 11 letterwinners and four starters.

In the early going, the coach has liked what she has seen of her squad.

"This is a really hardworking team and I've been impressed by their work ethic," said Collins-Parker. "It's definitely still a young team, but there are a number of good athletes. There's a lot of potential here, and both the coaching staff and the players are excited about the new season."

Among the returning starters is a pair of juniors in Lauren Salisbury and Bailee Hellwig along with sophomores Lauren Van Orden and Kyle Sexton. The former two have been regulars during their first two seasons at SDSU while the latter duo stepped into the starting rotation as freshmen a year ago.

Salisbury, an all-Mountain West Conference selection in 2008, has been tabbed as a preseason all-league honoree entering the 2009 campaign. Last season she finished among the top 10 in the MWC in hitting percentage, blocking and points per game and is currently among the top 10 on the Aztec career hitting percentage list.

Joining Salisbury at the middle blocker spot is Hellwig, who returned a year ago after redshirting in 2007. In her two seasons in a starting role, she is averaging over a block per set. Both Salisbury and Hellwig are expected to be major contributors this fall although both missed spring practice due to minor shoulder surgery.

Lauren Van Orden, a former state player of the year in Colorado, made the transition from the prep ranks to Division I as a starter in 2008. She was one of two setters in SDSU's 6-2 offense and also provided an attacking option at the net with an average of almost two kills per set. Van Orden will continue as the Aztecs' setter and is expected to get the bulk of playing time at her position.

Sexton, whose 2.53 kills per set ranked third on the squad last season, will likely continue in her role at one of the outside hitter positions. She started 17 times in her first year at SDSU and showed that she could become an offensive force for the Aztecs.

"We didn't have Lauren or Bailee in the spring, but both appear to be ready to go now," noted Collins-Parker. "Their absence caused us to move some players around during spring ball which gave us a chance to look at some players more closely. It showed we have some depth on this team and now that everybody is healthy we expect that to be one of our strengths."

SDSU's depth begins at outside hitter where five players return to vie for playing time. Included in that group are senior Caitlin McMillan along with junior Hannah Evans and sophomore Paije Pearson.

McMillan has appeared in over half SDSU's matches over the past three years averaging 1.20 digs and 1.65 digs per set. Evans will look to regain the form of her freshman campaign when she started 28 times with well over two kills and digs per set. Pearson arrived as a freshman in 2008 and showed flashes of her potential in limited action. The other candidate at the position is Kristen Beals, who redshirted in her first season a year ago.

In addition, junior Kelsey Manasco, who won all-tourney honors at the 2008 Aztec Invitational, is an outside hitter who recorded career bests in every category while appearing in over 90 percent of the team's games last fall.

At middle blocker, San Diego State recruited a pair of freshmen who could contribute immediately. That twosome includes Andrea Hannasch, an all-state player from Texas, along with Brooke Schlachter, who earned all-CIF and all-league accolades during her prep career.

Also in the mix here is 6-4 sophomore Jordan Burdick who saw action in just two matches in her first season as an Aztec.

The backup at the setter position is redshirt freshman Casey Klein, a four-year letterwinner in high school who was an all-league selection each season and an all-CIF nominee her final two years.

The list of candidates for the roles of libero/defensive specialist is made up of five athletes with plenty of talent but little in the way of match experience at San Diego State. With the graduation of Michelle Ferrer from last year's squad, a new face will emerge at the libero position.

Experience here comes in the form of sophomore Courtney Miller and senior Courtney

Lamphier. Miller saw action in half of SDSU's sets as a freshman primarily as a defensive specialist and on occasion at libero. Lamphier appeared in 23 games a year ago and both players averaged over 1.5 digs per set.

Depth here is provided by returnees Kate Ammerman and Kristi Jackels along with freshman Stacey Hallam. Ammerman has seen limited action the previous two seasons while Beals is back after redshirting in 2008. All three were all-league athletes in high school and could see action on the back line this fall.

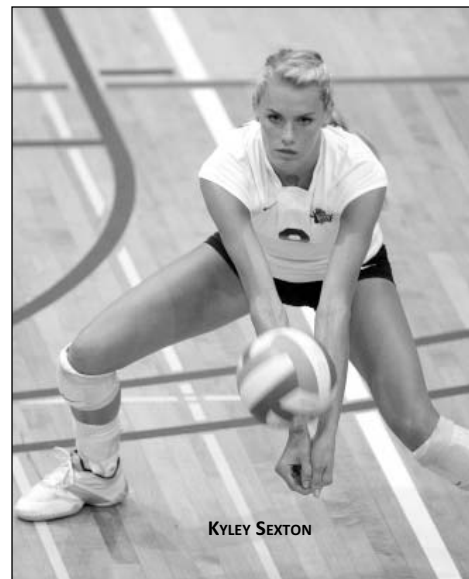
"This is a position where we have a number of options which has led to some good competition for the role of starter," said Collins-Parker. "In the spring we saw some excellent performances here from the four returnees plus we've added a freshman who could contribute right away."

The non-conference schedule should provide with Aztecs with a good gauge of where they are as it contains matches against a pair of teams ranked among the top 15 in the nation (Washington, San Diego) plus three others that received votes in the preseason poll (San Francisco, Rice, St. Mary's).

"I think the schedule gives up an opportunity to evaluate where we're at and what we need to do to move forward as a team," said Collins-Parker. "The pre-conference schedule is challenging, but I look for us to be competitive in every match. Those contests will help get us ready for league play."

The coach knows this season will be a transition year for both the staff and players as they become accustomed to each other over the course of the campaign. Playing in the strong Mountain West Conference, she has some modest goals as she begins her tenure with the Aztecs.

"I want to see us improve on last year and keep getting better as the season progresses," commented Collins-Parker. "It's going to be an adjustment period for them to get used to my style of coaching and playing. We still have a lot to learn about each other, but I'm excited because this team is going to be competitive and I think we could surprise some people."

THIS IS THE MOUNTAIN WEST

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West Conference has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Fresh off the celebration of its 10th anniversary in 2008-09, the MWC continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Over its 10-year history, the MWC has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West Conference is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Air Force, BYU, Colorado State and Utah). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet - the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West) and the Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State. The southwestern flavor of New Mexico complements the western heritage and culture of Fort Worth, Texas, home of the MWC's most recent member, TCU.

HISTORY

The Mountain West Conference was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions - Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming - decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference.

The split from the former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Five of the MWC's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (BYU, Utah, New Mexico, Wyoming, Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV and TCU entered the fold in 1996 and the Rebels continued as one of the original eight institutions that formed the MWC in 1999. TCU rejoined the group with its first year of competition in the Mountain West in 2005-06, completing the Conference membership as it stands today.

EXPOSURE

On Aug. 26, 2004, College Sports Television (CSTV) and the Mountain West Conference announced a visionary partnership that revolutionized the college sports landscape. The landmark agreement was the first NCAA Division I football and men's basketball conference-wide deal for CSTV and provided the network exclusive rights to all Conference events, including cable and satellite television coverage, national over-the-air and satellite radio, video-on-demand and online broadcast rights.

A succession of events since the fall of 2004 has improved the television model, including CSTV's joint venture with Comcast SportsNet to create The Mtn., and CBS Corporation's purchase of CSTV. CBS acquired CSTV in January 2006, and on Feb. 12,

2008, incorporated CSTV's cable, broadcast and online activities into its world-famous brand as the CBS College Sports Network (CBS C). The Mtn. is co-owned by CBS College Sports Network and Comcast SportNet.

The relationship with Comcast SportNet also delivered a new national broadcast partner in VER-SUS. The MWC was the first exclusive college programming provider for the Comcast-owned entity, with football and both men's and women's basketball games. The CBS C/MWC partnership has guaranteed greater levels of television exposure for all league sports and has resoundingly met the fundamental goals of more exposure and preferred start times and dates.

In the summer of 2006, the centerpiece of this historic relationship was realized with the launch of The Mtn. - the first sports network dedicated to serving a single collegiate athletic conference. The Mtn. provides sports fans blanket coverage of MWC athletics across multiple sports, including football, men's and women's basketball, and men's and women's Olympic sports. The Mtn. features more than just live games and has added its own original programming. Fans get a comprehensive array of news, features and analysis about their favorite MWC teams and players.

The MWC has remained steadfast in its mission to promote the league's athletic events to national and regional television audiences and will continue to grow its new TV model. Previously, ESPN served as the league's inaugural official television partner, while in-house productions guaranteed coverage for several MWC Olympic sports. Through the league's first 10 years, excluding institutional local packages, more than 1,350 football, volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball events have aired on television, with 225 football games and over 260 men's basketball contests broadcast nationally.

OPPORTUNITY

The MWC provides a first-class athletic and academic experience for more than 7,000 student-athletes each year. Over the past 10 years, 38 student-athletes from Mountain West institutions have earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships, and since the league's inception in 1999, an additional 20 student-athletes have been named MWC Student-Athlete of the Year and awarded league-sponsored postgraduate scholarships. Two student-athletes have earned distinction as Rhodes Scholars.

ACHIEVEMENT

The MWC has produced 539 All-America selections among its 19 sponsored sports in the last 10 years, including a league-record 53 All-America honorees in 2004-05. A total of 103 MWC student-athletes have also earned Academic All-America accolades in that span, while 29 MWC student-athletes have earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships. The MWC has sent at least 30 teams to NCAA postseason events each of the past 10 years. Mountain West institutions have captured seven NCAA team championships over that span

AZTEC ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME VOLLEYBALL INDUCTEES



LAUREL BRASSEY

SETTER, 1974 AND 1981 - HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 1988

Laurel Brassey made national headlines in 1974 when she became the first women to play in an NCAA sanctioned men's team sport as a member of the Aztec men's squad. A member of the U.S. women's national team from 1973 to 1980, she returned to San Diego State in 1981 and helped turned the women's program into a national power. Brassey led SDSU to a No. 3 national finish and was named a first-team All-American. She was named the MVP of the NCAA Regional, WCAA and SDSU. The top setter in the country for many years, she went on to become the head women's volleyball coach at the University of New Mexico and was a member of the U.S. team at the 1988 summer Olympics.



VICKI CANTRELL

OUTSIDE HITTER, 1980-83 - HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 1997

An All-America selection in 1982 and 1983, Vicki Cantrell left San Diego State as the school's career record holder in kills with 1,604. She helped lead the Aztecs to third-place national finishes at the NCAA Tournament in both 1981 and 1982. Her single-season kills totals in 1982 (552) and 1983 (510) still rank among the all-time top 10s at SDSU. In addition, she appears on the Aztec career charts in kills (5th - 1,604), total attacks (6th - 3,387) and hitting percentage (10th - .306). Cantrell was an all-WCAA selection as a junior and senior and was named to the NCAA Regional All-Tournament team in 1982. After leaving SDSU, she played in the World University Games in 1983 and went on to play pro volleyball.



MARY HOLLAND

MIDDLE BLOCKER, 1979-82 - HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 1999

Mary Holland was a three-time first-team all-WCAA selection and was named an All-American after her senior season in 1982. That same year, she was selected to the NCAA Final Four all-tournament team after helping San Diego State to a third-place national finish. Holland still ranks among the all-time Aztec career top 10s in kills (9th - 1,334), attacks (9th - 3,055), block solos (2nd - 215), blocking points (4th - 313) and service aces (7th - 151). She also holds spots in several single-season top 10s including hitting percentage, block solos and blocking points. She was an all-tourney selection at the 1981 NIVT and was a three-time all-SDSU Collegiate Classic honoree. Holland was also the recipient of an NCAA post-graduate scholarship.



ANGELA ROCK

OUTSIDE HITTER, 1981-84 - HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 1991

A first-team All-American in her senior year of 1984, Angela Rock still holds the Aztec record for kills in a season with 752. She was also an all-WCAA selection and NCAA Regional Tournament honoree in her final season at SDSU. Rock remains among the Aztecs' career top 10 leaders in kills (7th - 1,455), attacks (7th - 3,260) and service aces (6th - 174). Her kill average of 4.61 per game in 1984 is seventh best all-time for an Aztec, while her 400 digs that same season rank fourth. After graduation, she played for the U.S. national team and was named the MVP of the 1985 squad. She was also a member of the 1988 Olympic team.



WENDY WHEAT

SETTER, 1977-80 - HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 1998

Wendy Wheat was San Diego State's first renowned player during the early years of the school's Division I intercollegiate program. She earned All-America honors as a setter in both 1978 and 1979, and was an all-Western Collegiate Athletic Association honoree her final three seasons as an Aztec (1978 to 1980). Wheat was named to the all-tournament team at the SDSU Collegiate Classic in 1979 and 1980. In her final three years, she helped the Aztecs to fifth, seventh and sixth-place finishes at the AIAW national championships. During her collegiate career, she played in the National Sports Festival and for the U.S. Junior National Team at the Pacific Rim Tournament in Hawaii.

AZTECS AND SDSU

San Diego State University first adopted the Aztec name in the 1920s as a nickname for the college's sports teams. In 1925, the student newspaper followed suit, changing its name from The Paper Lantern to The Aztec. Since that time, San Diego State's celebration of Aztec heritage has permeated the campus. In 1936, a Donald Hord sculpture of Montezuma II, the last Aztec emperor, became a welcoming campus icon. With the passing years, Aztec themes echoed in the names, colors and architectural elements of new campus buildings. And Aztec culture became the subject of more than a dozen university courses.

In 1941, Monty Montezuma, a character based on Montezuma II, debuted at San Diego State athletic events as a symbolic personification of the Aztecs. Over time, the Montezuma character's look and activities have evolved from a sports mascot into a more dignified and accurate representation of the historical emperor. Montezuma now serves as the university's ambassador of Aztec culture, charged with the responsibility of informing and educating the San Diego community about Aztec civilization. SDSU continues to take pride in its affiliation with Aztec culture and to celebrate the Aztec virtues of strength, valor and intellectual achievement.

SDSU'S AZTEC HERITAGE

From the early decades of its history, San Diego State has identified itself with the Aztecs, one of the most sophisticated and distinctive societies in the history of the Western Hemisphere. A fitting choice for a university committed to internationalism and diversity, the Aztec identity evokes great pride in Mexico, as well as among many people in the United States, and certainly within the SDSU community. Consequently, San Diego State strives to honor the Aztec people by enhancing awareness, understanding and appreciation of Aztec culture and achievements.

AZTEC HISTORY

Aztec civilization dates back to at least the 12th century A.D. The precise location is still debated by scholars, but tradition tells us of a place somewhere north of modern-day Mexico City known at that time as Aztlan, which meant "the place of the cranes" or "the place of the herons." The people who lived in this land were called Azteca meaning "those of Aztlan."

The Azteca eventually left their homeland and became known as the Mexica. Native folklore attributes this name change to the instructions of the people's patron deity, Huitzilopochtli (Hummingbird on the Left).

Around 1325, the Mexica settled on an island in Lake Texcoco, an area that is now the heart of Mexico City, and named it Tenochtitlan or "the place of the fruit of the cactus." A century later, the Mexica and two other Nahuatl-speaking city-states, Texcoco and Tlacopan, combined to create an entity popularly known as the Aztec Empire.

Boasting a strong military force, this new alliance commanded a sphere of influence that stretched across much of present-day Mexico.

Tenochtitlan and its surrounding valley evolved into a highly sophisticated, multicultural and multilingual city-state of several million inhabitants. At this same time, major European cities numbered only 30,000 to 40,000 in population. A cradle of innovation, the Aztec Empire developed advanced systems of trade, science, politics, religion, education and agriculture. The Aztecs also enjoyed sports and built grand ballcourts to accommodate team events.





DR. STEPHEN L. WEBER
(BOWLING GREEN '64)
UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

Stephen L. Weber, the seventh president of San Diego State University, provides dynamic leadership to an institution that ranks among the largest in the nation. Educated as a philosopher, President Weber began his tenure at SDSU in July 1996 and shortly afterward initiated a broad-based dialogue intended to set the course for the university's future.

Under President Weber's guidance, students, faculty, staff, alumni, and community leaders participated in shaping this "Shared Vision." SDSU is now moving boldly ahead toward goals set by those discussions: reinforcing academic excellence, nurturing students, honoring diversity and social justice, carefully stewarding resources, and further developing global programs.

A champion of community involvement as well as academic excellence, President Weber has been an advocate for community service. Leading by example, he is a past chair of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities Board of Directors and co-chair of Partners for K-12 School Reform. He also serves on the boards of governors of The Peres Center for Peace and BIOCUM, and on the boards of directors of the San Diego Regional Economic Development Corporation and the San Diego Science and Technology Council. He co-chairs the College Presidents' Forum of the San Diego County Policy Panel on Youth Access to Alcohol.

President Weber is a member of the international advisory board for the Foundation for Children of the Californias, the advisory council of the San Diego Performing Arts League, the Community Advisory Board of Union Bank of California, and the advisory board for San Diego Gas & Electric (SDG&E).

He serves on the National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) Division I Board of Directors, the NCAA Executive Committee, and served on the Presidential Oversight Committee for the Bowl Championship Series. He is a member of the San Diego Rotary Club, an honorary director of the Japan Society of San Diego and Tijuana, and an honorary advisor to the Asia Desk of the San Diego World Trade Center.

Born in Boston, President Weber is a graduate of Bowling Green University with a B.A. in philosophy. He received his Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Notre Dame in 1969 and is the author of numerous articles on philosophy and higher education.

President Weber's many awards include an honorary degree from Beijing Capital Normal University, and distinguished alumnus at his alma mater, Bowling Green University. He was named among the 1997 Headliners of the Year by the San Diego Press Club. Also in 1997, the San Diego Mediation Center honored him with its Peacemaker Award. In 1999, President Weber received the Executive Director's Award from the San Diego Education Association and the Gold Key Award from the San Diego Hospitality Association. He was recognized as a Leader of Vision by the league of Women Voters of San Diego in 2000.

Before coming to San Diego State University, President Weber served as interim provost of the State University of New York (SUNY); he previously served seven years as president of the SUNY Oswego campus. Prior to that, he was vice president of academic affairs at St. Cloud State University in Minnesota, dean of arts and sciences at Fairfield University in Connecticut, and assistant to the president of the University of Maine. While a faculty member at the University of Maine, he was recognized as the outstanding professor in humanities.

President Weber is married to Susan Keim Weber, who shares his enthusiastic commitment to SDSU. They have two sons.



JEFF SCHEMSEL
(KANSAS STATE '76)
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Jeff Schemmel, who has elevated San Diego State athletics to unparalleled success, enters his fifth season on Montezuma Mesa.

In 2008-09, San Diego State posted its best-ever finish in the 16-year history of the Division I U.S. Academy Director's Cup for on-field broad based success. It marked the second consecutive academic year that SDSU set a school record in the standings. Also, Aztec student-athletes continued to excel in the classroom as well, with 229 student-athletes earning 3.0 cumulative or 3.2 semester grade-point averages in 2008.

In addition, SDSU is coming off one of the most successful final four months of anyone in the country, as six teams - women's basketball (NCAA), men's basketball (NIT), women's tennis (NCAA), men's golf (NCAA Regionals), softball (NCAA) and baseball (NCAA) - advanced to postseason play.

Schemmel was named San Diego State's athletic director on July 6, 2005, and is recognized as one of the most accomplished sitting athletic directors in the country. He is a former practicing attorney, has directed a Final Four, served as a senior administrator at Big 10 and Big 12 schools, and played a part in what might be the biggest football turnaround in the history of college athletics.

Schemmel arrived at San Diego State from Conference USA, where he had served as associate commissioner for governance and legal affairs since October of 2004. During his stay in Dallas, he helped the league negotiate television contracts with ESPN and College Sports Television that exceeded more than \$100 million in revenue, and he served as a member of the NCAA Division I Management Council.

From February of 2004 to October of 2004, Schemmel was the senior vice president and executive director of development for the Arizona State University Foundation, where he oversaw the school's fundraising efforts while supervising approximately 135 employees across the Tempe campus.

Schemmel was an administrator at the University of Minnesota from 1991 to 2003. During his stay in the Twin Cities, he advanced from associate athletic director for compliance to senior associate athletic director and chief operating officer for Gopher athletics. Along with his departmental duties, he directed the school's efforts in hosting NCAA Championship events, including the 2001 Final Four, one of America's fastest growing events.

He also supervised and implemented a \$3 million capital improvement campaign, and was heavily involved in the hiring of Minnesota's head football and men's basketball coaches.

From 1988 to 1991, Schemmel was an administrator at his alma mater, Kansas State. He served as the school's assistant athletic director for development and later was the associate athletic director for compliance while supervising the school's Olympic sports.

Schemmel was a decorated runner at Kansas State and was named the 1976 outstanding student-athlete at the school. As a Wildcat, he was a four-time track and field All-American, a five-time Big 8 Conference champion, was a member of a national champion distance medley relay team and won the Big 8 Conference Medallion.

He also served as an ABC Television and Time Magazine correspondent for the 1976 Summer Olympics in Montreal.

After earning his undergraduate degree in political science, Schemmel earned his law degree at Washburn University in Topeka, Kan. He began his professional career as an attorney and later was a partner in his own firm, specializing in business and sports law.

Schemmel and his wife, Lori, have been married for 32 years. They have two sons, Justin, and Jon.



Founded March 13, 1897, San Diego State University began as the San Diego Normal School, a training facility for elementary school teachers. Seven faculty and 91 students met in temporary quarters over a downtown drugstore before moving to a newly constructed 17-acre campus on Park Boulevard.

The curriculum was limited at first to English, history and mathematics, but course offerings broadened rapidly under the leadership of Samuel T. Black, who left his position as state superintendent of public instruction to become the new school's first president. Black served from 1898 to 1910.

From 1910 to 1935, President Edward L. Hardy headed a vigorous administration that oversaw major changes to the fledgling institution. In 1921, the Normal School became San Diego State Teachers College, a four-year public institution controlled by the state Board of Education. In that same year, the two-year San Diego Junior College, forerunner of today's local community colleges, became a branch of San Diego State, creating a union that lasted until 1946.

By the 1920s, San Diego State was already beginning to outgrow its Park Boulevard location, and San Diegans launched a campaign to build a new campus on the city's eastern border. In February 1931, students, faculty and staff moved into seven Mission-style buildings surrounding a common area still known as the Main Quad.

Four years later, the Legislature authorized expansion of degree programs beyond teacher education, and San Diego State Teachers College became San Diego State College. Also in 1935, Walter R. Hepner took the helm as president, beginning a 17-year tenure. The college continued to grow over time, reaching an enroll-

ment of more than 25,000 students during the administration of Malcolm A. Love, who served as president from 1952 to 1971.

In 1960, San Diego State became part of the newly created California State College system, now known as the California State University system. In the early 1970s, with legislative approval, San Diego State College became San Diego State University.

Leading the institution during the 1970s were Acting President Donald E. Walker (1971-1972), President Brage Golding (1972-1977), Acting President Trevor Colbourn (1977-1978) and President Thomas B. Day, whose tenure spanned from 1978 to 1996. In 1996, Stephen L. Weber became the university's seventh president.



Beginning its 113th academic year in fall 2009, SDSU can take pride in more than a century of achievement in education, research and service. With an enrollment of more than 34,000 students, SDSU has grown into the largest institution of higher education in the San Diego region and one of the largest in California.

Renowned for its academic excellence, the university is home to top-ranking programs in education, international business, social work, speech-language pathology, biology and public administration, to name just a few. Overall, SDSU students can choose from 81 undergraduate majors, 74 master's programs and 16 doctoral degree programs.

SDSU produces thousands of graduates each year, 60 percent of whom stay in San Diego to pursue their careers, making San Diego State a primary educator of the region's work force, as well as a leader in expanding access to higher education. Committed to serving the richly diverse San Diego region, SDSU ranks among the top universities nationwide in terms of ethnic and racial diversity among its student body, as well as the number of bachelor's degrees conferred upon students of color.

Increasingly recognized for innovative research, San Diego State has achieved the prestigious designation of "Research University" with high research activity granted by the Carnegie Foundation. For the past two years, SDSU has been ranked the No. 1 research university for those with 14 or fewer Ph.D. programs, according to Academic Analytic's faculty-scholarly productivity index. Since 2000, SDSU faculty and staff have attracted more than \$1 billion in grants and contracts for research and program administration. SDSU ranks among the top 150 public universities nationwide in research expenditures, and SDSU's research funding has more than doubled from a decade ago.

Private giving to San Diego State has also risen sharply in recent years, reaching a record \$65 million in the 2003-2004 fiscal year.

Because state funds and student fees provide only slightly more than half of the university's annual operating requirements, the support of alumni, friends and community partners is providing a crucial margin of excellence at SDSU, enabling the university to fulfill its mission and expand its service to the San Diego region and beyond.

SDSU also plays an integral role in analyzing and resolving complex community problems. A prime example is the City Heights Educational Collaborative, an ongoing partnership with San Diego City Schools, the San Diego Education Association, teachers and parents. Funded with an \$18 million grant from Price Charities, the Collaborative is improving instruction for students and professional development for teachers in three inner-city schools managed by the university.

Another initiative to improve education in the San Diego region and beyond is the QUALCOMM Institute for Innovation and Educational Success, launched in 2004 with a record \$14.5 million corporate gift from QUALCOMM. The Institute supports programs that aim to enhance math and engineering education across the K-12 spectrum, and supports efforts to revitalize performance in urban school districts nationwide.

Yet another example of San Diego State's innovative community engagement is SDSU Nurses Now, a program that over the years has partnered with more than 10 local hospitals and health organizations in an effort to alleviate the region's nursing shortage. With more than \$3 million in funding commitment from these health care partners secured so far, SDSU has increased its nursing faculty, enabling the university to educate more future nurses. To date the program has helped SDSU produce an additional 300 nurses.

Perhaps the most visible evidence of SDSU's growth is in the physical additions to campus and its continued commitment to providing a modern learning environment for students,



faculty and staff. Over the past decade, the university has completed facilities totaling more than \$600 million in value, including Cuicacalli, a dining and residence complex; the Chemical Sciences Laboratory and the BioScience Center; and the Aztec Athletics Center, housing coaches' offices, training facilities and the Wise Foundation Hall of Fame. Most recently, construction on the new Parma Payne Goodall Alumni Center has begun. The center will be a gateway for the community to access SDSU's rich assets. Not only will it serve as the first point of contact for alumni and friends visiting SDSU, but it will also be a place where academic and business leaders can collaborate on ventures to benefit our community and impact our future.

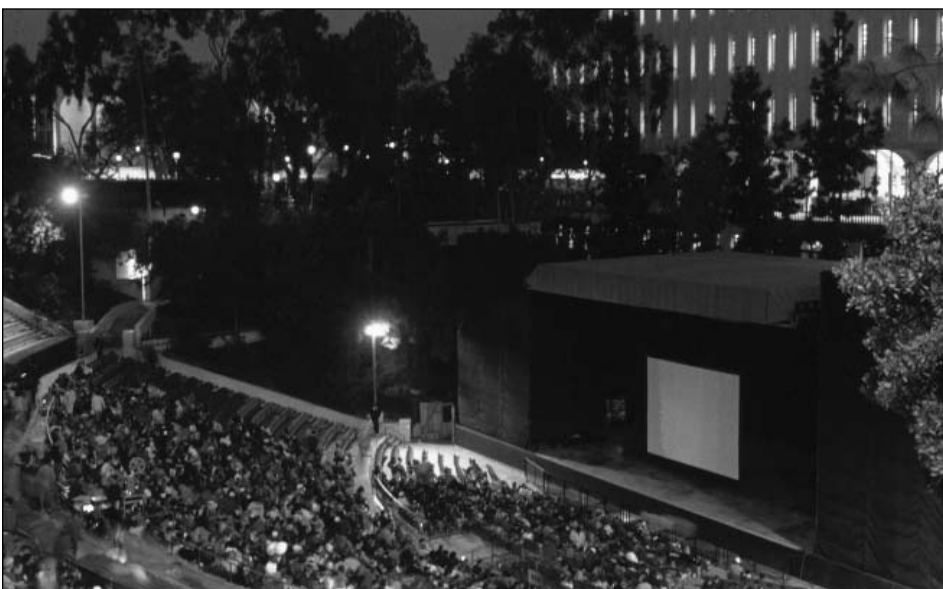
Future campus improvements set to take place include the renovation of Nasitir and Storm Halls, expansion of the International Student

Center and construction of a new student union building. In addition, SDSU's Campus Master Plan will include the addition of several facilities, including on-campus housing for an additional 3,000 students.

Beyond accolades and campus expansion, San Diego State University remains, as always, most proud of its alumni family, more than 200,000 strong. Lang, CEO of Jack In the Box restaurants; astronaut Ellen Ochoa and Costco CEO and co-founder Jim Sinegal.

Aztec alumni also include entertainers Gregory Peck, Art Linkletter, Marion Ross, Julie Kavner and Kathy Najimy; Hollywood producer Kathleen Kennedy; golfers Lon Hinkle and Gene Littler; baseball players Tony Gwynn, Mark Grace, Travis Lee and Graig Nettles; football players Marshall Faulk, Brian Sipe, Fred Dryer, Kyle Turley and Kirk Morrison; America's Cup skipper Dennis Conner; and basketball player Michael Cage.

The success of these individuals and thousands of other SDSU alumni attest eloquently to the success of their alma mater. From modest beginnings, SDSU has evolved into a premier center of learning, research and service.

- Since 2000, SDSU faculty and staff have attracted more than \$1 billion in grants and contracts for research and program administration.
- SDSU is the largest university in San Diego and the fifth largest in California.

- SDSU's undergraduate international business program ranks No. 15 in the nation, according to *U.S. News and World Report's* "America's Best Colleges 2008 Guide."
- SDSU's international business MSBA program ranks No. 21 in the nation, according to *U.S. News and World Report's* "America's Best Graduate Schools 2008 Guide."
- SDSU's rehabilitation counseling program ranks No. 9 in the nation according to *U.S. News and World Report's* "America's Best Graduate Schools 2008 Guide."
- SDSU's joint doctoral program in language and communicative disorders (with UCSD) ranked No. 1 in the country in the 2006-07 Faculty Scholarly Productivity Index rankings of best doctoral programs nationwide by Academic Analytics.
- The joint doctoral program in clinical psychology (with UCSD) was named No. 2 in the country in the 2006-07 Faculty Scholarly Productivity Index rankings of best doctoral programs nationwide by Academic Analytics.

- SDSU's College of Engineering ranks No. 4 in the nation among top graduate engineering programs for Hispanics – *Hispanic Business*, September 2005.

RESEARCH/SCIENCES

- SDSU faculty received nearly \$110 million in grants and contracts for research and administering programs during fiscal year 2006/2007, the most of any CSU campus. SDSU faculty members have received a total of more than \$1 billion in external funding since 2000.
- SDSU is ranked as the No. 1 most productive research university among schools with 14 or fewer Ph.D. programs based on the Faculty Scholarly Productivity Index for 2006-07.
- SDSU ranks in the top 150 colleges and universities in research and development expenditures, according to the latest data available from the National Science Foundation (2006).
- SDSU serves as host institution for CSUPERB, which is designed to channel resources from the entire California State University system and catalyze interdisciplinary, inter-campus, synergistic endeavors involving biology and chemistry departments (including biotechnology research and applications), as well as engineering, agriculture and computer science. CSUPERB also serves as the official liaison between the CSU and industry, government, the Congressional Biotechnology Caucus and the public arena in all biotechnological matters.
- SDSU's MS in regulatory affairs – a key area of the biotech industry – is one of only two programs of its kind in the country and is considered the most comprehensive.

INTERNATIONAL

- SDSU ranks No. 2 among universities of its type nationwide and No. 1 in California, for students studying abroad as part of their college experience. – Institute of International Education, November 2007.
- The International Business Program at SDSU is the largest undergraduate international business program in the country, serving nearly 1,100 students annually.
- SDSU is home to the first-ever MBA program in Global Entrepreneurship. As part of the program, students study at four universities worldwide, including the Indian Institute of Management, Lucknow (NOIDA campus); University of Hyderabad; United Arab Emirates Higher Colleges of Technology (HCT); American University of Beirut and is currently negotiating partnerships with universities in China.
- SDSU is the first U.S. university to offer a transnational triple degree program in International Business. In fact, SDSU has the only two such programs in the country. Undergraduate students earn degrees from SDSU and universities in Mexico and Canada in the CaMexUs program, or degrees from SDSU, Mexico and Chile in the PanAmerica program.
- SDSU and Universidad Autónoma de Baja California in Mexico offered the first transnational dual degree between the United States and Mexico, in 1994, through the Mexus/International Business program. SDSU's international business program also runs transnational dual degree programs with Brazil, Canada, Chile and Mexico.
- SDSU's American Language Institute is one of the largest university-based English as a Second Language (ESL) learning programs in the U.S.
- CIBER – the Center for International Business and Educational Research – is one of 28 federally funded centers in the U.S.
- SDSU's International Security and Conflict Resolution (ISCOR) major is the first of its kind in California.

The dual role of student and athlete can be a daunting challenge for any person at the Division I level. Recognizing that academic challenge, the Student Athlete Academic Support Services program has been developed at San Diego State to assist all student-athletes in achieving academic excellence.

It is a source of pride within San Diego State athletics that the department has developed one of the most comprehensive academic support programs in the country.

THE STAFF

The SAASS staff includes a director, a learning specialist, four academic advisors, the department's director of compliance, an eligibility coordinator, a financial aid coordinator as well as a recruitment coordinator.

In addition to the full-time staff, the department employs more than 20 mentors and tutors.

Collectively, they operate a program that enhances each student's satisfactory progress toward graduation.

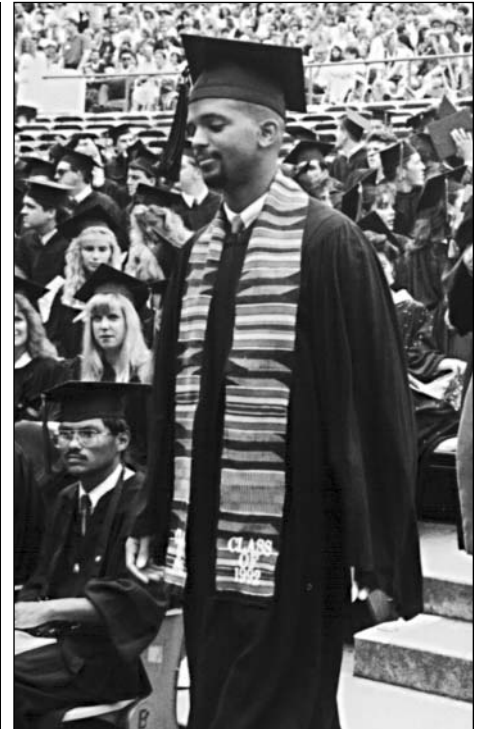
THE SERVICES

Throughout the academic year, advisors offer a variety of services to aid individuals in the development of their personal goals and the blueprint for pursuing those goals.

All new student-athletes are invited to an orientation that helps lay the foundation for future successes. Each advisor teaches a section of the University's Freshman Success course (General Studies 100), which deals with specific transition issues for student-athletes. Topics include time management, study skills and test taking. The course also introduces new students to services such as the Love Library, University Advising Center, Career Services, Health Services and the counseling center.

THE RESOURCES

In the fall of 2001, the academic unit joined the rest of the athletic department in moving into the new \$30 million, 130,000-square-foot Aztec Athletics Center. The academic staff is located on the third floor of the complex and includes a new 40-station computer lab, individual study rooms and two lecture rooms.



THE COMMITMENT

SDSU's annual Scholar-Athlete Awards Banquet honors students with at least a 3.0 cumulative or a 3.2 semester GPA during a calendar year. In 2008, 218 student-athletes, more than one-third of the student-athlete body, were honored for their work in the classroom.

LIFE SKILLS

To further increase the opportunities for success, San Diego State is part of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The curriculum of Aztec Pride (Promoting Responsibility, Integrity, Diversity, Education) offers a wide range of programs and activities that enhance the educational experience. Special emphasis is placed on the areas of personal development, community service and career development.

In conjunction with SAAC, the Life Skills Program represents SDSU's total commitment to enhancing the quality of each student's experience.

In place now on Montezuma Mesa are arguably some of the finest facilities in the United States, and San Diego State is certainly among the leaders on the West Coast.

The department is housed in the \$30 million, 130,000-square-foot Aztec Athletics Center. The centerpiece of the department, which was dedicated in February 2002, is located just across the street from Cox Arena and just east of Tony Gwynn Stadium.

The four-story athletics center provides state-of-the-art facilities along with tremendous logistical advantages and a great location for studying, workouts, treatment, academic support or just stopping by between classes.

On the south, the center is buffered by the Sports Deck, where both San Diego State's soccer squads, as well as the track and field team, compete.

On the north side, it is connected to Peterson Gym, the home of Aztec volleyball and a part-time practice facility for SDSU's basketball teams.

The west exit of the building opens onto three 120-yard practice fields. One of the fields is natural grass and two utilize field-turf, providing San Diego State daily options for its workouts.

All of SDSU's new facilities, including the athletics center, Cox Arena, Tony Gwynn Stadium, Aztec Tennis Center, SDSU Softball Stadium and the Sports Deck, have opened since 1997.

The buildings are not just sparkling new, but they are already postseason tested. Cox Arena, the 12,414-seat basketball facility, has twice served as a site for the NCAA Men's Basketball Division I Championship (first and second rounds) as well as the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball National Championship. In March 2006, Cox Arena also played host to the boy's and girl's McDonald's High School All-American Basketball games.

In May 2007, the Mountain West Conference track and field championships returned to the Sports Deck for the second time in the league's eight-year history. Tony Gwynn Stadium was the site of the 2001 MWC baseball tournament, while the 2005 MWC softball championship was held at SDSU Softball Stadium.

The final piece of the puzzle for San Diego State athletics is the new Aztec Aquaplex where the swimming and diving and water polo teams compete. The complex opened in March 2007 and features two pools, one for competition and one for recreation.

Besides all of the school's on-campus facilities, the football team plays at Qualcomm Stadium, home of the NFL's San Diego Chargers. Qualcomm Stadium also serves as host of the Holiday and Poinsettia Bowls and was the home of Super Bowl XXXVII in 2003.

Tony Gwynn Stadium, Aztec Tennis Center, SDSU Softball Stadium and the Aztec Athletics Center were constructed thanks to donations by San Diego Padres owners John and Becky Moores.

Peterson Gym, which opened in May of 1961, is located on 55th Street on the west side of the San Diego State campus. The arena is able to seat 3,668 spectators and serves as home to the SDSU women's volleyball squad. The facility has also served as a site of both NCAA volleyball and basketball tournaments. In addition, it served as the host site for the 2003 Mountain West Conference championship tournament. The facility is named after C.E. Peterson, who at various times during his 37-year Aztec career served as athletics director, football coach, track coach, basketball coach, Dean of Men and alumni executive secretary. He passed away in December of 1959.

The rich flavors and colors of this diverse population blends all ethnic groups and all walks of life to create an amazing quality of life that makes San Diego all things to all people.

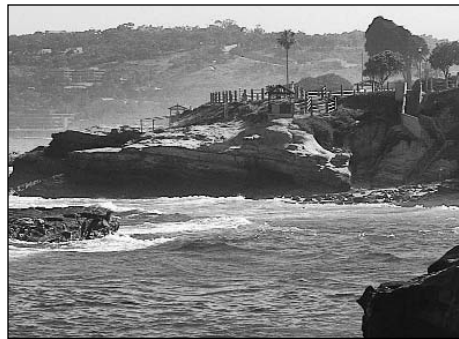
NATURAL BEAUTY
