STORYLINES

Two teams desperate for a Mountain West Conference victory will take to the field Saturday afternoon when the San Diego State Aztecs (2-3/0-1) host the Colorado State Rams (1-4/0-1) in a critical league game. The game begins at 4:05 and will be televised on a regional basis by ABC-TV. The game marks SDSU's fifth appearance on ABC since the start of the 1999 season and the first since 2001. The game marks the second time in four years that the Aztecs-Rams showdown has been televised by ABC. SDSU will be making its 12th ABC appearance since 1990. SDSU is 6-4-1 in those games.

SDSU enters the contest 0-1 in league play after Saturday's 20-10 loss at Wyoming. The Rams are 1-4 overall and 0-1 in league play. Colorado State is coming off an open week and hasn't played since a 31-21 loss to Brigham Young on Oct. 2nd. CSU has played a heavyweight schedule, including Colorado, USC and Minnesota.

Colorado State was picked to finish second in the Mountain West in the preseason league poll while the Aztecs were tabbed for third.

The Series

San Diego State leads, 12-11

The series dates back to 1978 when the Aztecs entered the WAC. Colorado State has won the last two games, and seven of the last nine. SDSU holds an 8-5 series advantage when playing in San Diego. However, the Rams have won the last four games in Mission Valley, dating back to a 30-3 Aztec victory in 1993. The road team has won five of the last six games between the schools.

TEAM NOTES

The Game

San Diego State's strong September has been, at least temporarily, derailed, due in part to massive injuries in the offensive line. As a result, the Aztecs have reached a critical week of play when they host the Colorado State Rams on Saturday. CSU, picked to finish second in the league, and SDSU, tabbed for third, will play in what amounts to an elimination game Saturday afternoon. SDSU is coming off its first loss to Wyoming since the formation of the Mountain West Conference in time for the 1999 season. CSU lost its league opener to Brigham Young, in Fort Collins, on Oct. 2nd.

Conference Calls

In the 2004 conference race, San Diego State is looking for its third consecutive upper-division finish in Mountain West play, all under Tom Craft. The Aztecs are 15-22 all-time in Mountain West play but 7-8 since Craft began his tenure in 2002. SDSU is 0-2 vs. Colorado State under Craft.

Ram Tough

Colorado State will be looking to knock off the Aztecs in San Diego for the fifth straight time, dating back to a 1993 win by San Diego State (30-3). Prior to the current four-game winning streak by CSU (in San Diego), the Aztecs had won eight of the nine previous meetings between the teams in Mission Valley.

Last Year In Fort Collins

In the first game that SDSU played without freshman running back sensation Lynell Hamilton, the Aztecs also lost starting quarterback Adam Hall to a season-ending injury in an eventual 21-6 loss to Colorado State. In a game in which the Aztecs outgained the Rams by a 345-324 count, Colorado State got a first-half defensive touchdown on an interception return. The CSU lead stood at 7-6 entering the fourth quarter before a pair of touchdowns in the last 10 minutes iced the game. SDSU's last two wins in the series have come in Fort Collins (1999 and 2001).

Statistically Speaking In Fort Collins

Aztec running back Michael Franklin had his coming out party last year against Colorado State with the first of three straight 100-yard rushing games. He had 105 yards on 18 carries in his first effort as Lynell Hamilton's replacement in the starting lineup. Matt Dlugolecki was 10-of-22 through the air with an interception. He came off the bench to replace Adam Hall, who was lost for the rest of the season with a finger laceration. Robert Ortiz had 10 catches for 88 receiving yards. SDSU's points were limited to a pair of first-half field goals by J.C. Mejia.

Starting Up

Of the 22 Aztecs that are expected to be in the starting lineup Saturday, 11 started last year's game against Colorado State, including Michael Franklin, who was starting for the injured Lynell Hamilton for the first time. The biggest turnover is in the offensive line, where Mike Kracalik is the only returning starter from last year's game against CSU.

Last Time In San Diego

On their last visit to Qualcomm Stadium, the Colorado State Rams made themselves at home with a 49-21 win. CSU was ranked No. 17 at the time and generated 533 yards of total offense on a much different Aztec defense. SDSU got 378 yards from its attack but never threatened after falling behind 28-7.

The Dark Side Vs. The Mountain West

Despite the 0-1 conference start, the Mountain West Conference looks like it will once again have its hands full with The Dark Side defense. Against Wyoming, the Aztecs allowed 264 total yards (98 yards fewer than the Cowboys generated last season) and two touchdowns. One of the TDs came on a 29-

yard drive. Over the last five conference games, San Diego State's defense has limited Mountain West opponents to an average of just 268.2 yards of total offense. To put that number in perspective, consider SDSU allowed 289 yards of total offense per game to rank eighth in the nation in that category. Last season, San Diego State has allowed just four offensive touchdowns in its last 16 quarters of league play, including the 29-yard drive last week at Wyoming, and a touchdown by Colorado State with 1:25 remaining in last season's game. The total offense allowed Saturday at Wyoming (264) was the lowest total allowed by SDSU since last year's 7-0 win over UNLV when SDSU gave up just 175 yards.

More Darkness

Wyoming generated 264 yards of total offense in its 20-10 win. That low number could have been even lower. The Cowboys got 96 yards on three plays, although those big plays led to just three total points. As a result, the other 60 plays generated just 168 yards of offense, 2.8 yards per play. SDSU had 11 tackles for loss and seven pass break-ups. Nine of the Cowboys' 15 possessions lasted three or fewer plays. Eight drives netted eight yards or less. The Cowboys were 3-of-16 on third-down conversions.

Weird Wyoming

Weird things happen in Wyoming. It is the only way to explain a game that saw SDSU hold a nearly 100-yard advantage in total offense, have its quarterback set a career high in passing yards, limit the opposition to just 264 yards of total offense, and still lose 20-10 after leading 10-3 at halftime. The weird things included three Aztec punts that covered a TOTAL of 25 yards in the third period. Those punts meant that in the third quarter each team had five possessions. SDSU started, as an average, on its own 19. Wyoming started, as an average, on the Aztec 34-yard line. Incredibly, the Cowboys got just 10 points out of those possessions. Wyoming started five straight drives in SDSU territory but only netted 40 yards.

Weird, Part II

After a first half without a turnover, SDSU was victimized by three second-half turnovers, to go with the punting woes. The Aztecs lost two fumbles and tossed an interception. It also marked the first time this season that the Aztecs failed to force a miscue by the opponent. The bottom line, the turnovers and punting woes, in essence, provided Wyoming with six turnovers instead of the official three.

These Are Losses?

San Diego State enters the Colorado State game with a 2-3 record. No asterisks allowed. But if there were...In the three losses suffered by the Aztecs, they have outgained the opposition by a total of 75 yards, have three more first downs than Michigan, UCLA and Wyoming combined. However, SDSU did lose the turnover battle (-3 total) and the opposition fumbled just once in those games.

Strange Streak

San Diego State has lost its last two football games by a combined score of 53-20 at UCLA and at Wyoming. While it may not be Ripley's Believe It Or Not!, it would appear the Aztecs deserved a better fate. When combining totals from the last two games, SDSU has a healthy statistical advantage. SDSU generated 765 yards of total offense the last two weeks while UCLA and Wyoming combined to generate 674 yards of total offense, meaning SDSU has a 91-yard advantage over the last two weeks. SDSU has carved out 41 first downs over the last two games compared to 33 for the UCLA-Wyoming offenses.

Total Tallies

San Diego State has outgained the opposition in eight of its last 10 games and in 12 of 17 games since the start of the 2003 season. SDSU has lost five straight games in which it has been outgained in total yards, dating back to a 38-34 win at Air Force on Nov. 23, 2002. SDSU is 8-5 when outgaining the opposition during that same time frame.

Let's Talk Field Position

In the SDSU-Wyoming game, the Cowboys had an average field position advantage of 15 yards per possession. It was the third largest negative discrepancy in the Tom Craft era. It has been an important stat for the Aztecs. In the 30 games played under Tom Craft, SDSU and its opponent are 10-0 when enjoying at least a nine-yard advantage in average field position. SDSU holds a 5-0 record when enjoying at least a six-yard advantage in the category and 0-6 when the opponent has at least a nine-yard field position advantage.

Scouting The Rams

Colorado State will arrive in San Diego with a deceiving 1-4 record. The Rams have faced top-ranked USC, as well as Minnesota, Colorado and Brigham Young. Since the formation of the league, Colorado State has the best conference record with a cumulative mark of 26-10. The Rams have won or shared three of the five Mountain West titles. The 2004 CSU team is led by quarterback Justin Holland, who is passing for 321 yards per game. CSU also sports one of the nation's top receivers in David Anderson. He has 39 receptions and averages 133 receiving yards per game to rank second in the nation in that category. He is the fourth leading receiver in CSU history. CSU is No. 5 nationally in passing offense (322 yards per game). The Rams are 100th in total defense, allowing 436.40 yards per game and 113th in turnover margin (-1.80 per game).

Colorado Aztecs

Aztec quarterbacks coach Brian Stark is a University of Colorado and Fort Morgan High School graduate. He is a former coach at Brighton High School. As an undergraduate, he worked on the CU football staff for then head coach Rick Neuheisel and was briefly a member of Neuheisel's staff at Washington before moving to San Diego State as director of football operations in 2000. Aztec safety Brett Sturm was a quarterback at Heritage High School in Littleton. Sturm's father, Jerry, was a long-time NFL player and a former Denver Bronco.

California Rams

The preseason Colorado State roster listed 29 players from California, including three players from San Diego County (Mira Mesa's Jair Brown, La Jolla's Jimmy Green and Rancho Bernardo's Nick Allotta).

The Competition

The Aztecs are 2-3 this season with the three losses coming at Michigan, at UCLA and at Wyoming. The three teams now have a combined record of 13-3 through Oct. 9th. The Bruins' only loss came to No. 15 and unbeaten Oklahoma State and Wyoming's only setback came at once-beaten Texas A&M. Michigan's lone defeat came at Notre Dame.

Musical Linemen

The Aztecs are an improved offensive bunch and that is an accomplishment since the Aztecs have not started the same group of offensive linemen in consecutive games this season. In fact, center Taylor Schmidt is the only offensive lineman who has opened all four games at the same position. SDSU opened the UCLA game with two redshirt freshmen, two junior-college transfers and first-year starter Patrick Justman. The only returning starter up front from a year ago, Mike Kracalik, missed the start with a sprained knee. He returned to the starting lineup against Wyoming. Not only has SDSU not started the same lineup two consecutive games, five different combinations have started the five games. Redshirt freshman Will Robinson has been forced to play four different positions up front (everywhere but center).

Star Search

The changes in the Aztec offense are not limited to the offensive line. Preseason prognostications for the Aztecs might not have been as lofty if the prophets had known SDSU would play the entire season without freshman All-America running back Lynell Hamilton, or a Rimington Award candidate in center Jasper Harvey. SDSU has also been missing returning starter Wesley Williams at wideout, who has missed the last four games with a hip injury. Outland Trophy Watch List member Mike Kracalik did not play at UCLA due to a knee sprain and freshman offensive lineman Brandyn Dombrowki, who won a starting job during fall camp, has been sidelined virtually all season with two ankle sprains. Returning starter Devin Pitts returned from injury to catch six passes in Laramie.

Still Better

Despite the bevy of injury obstacles and influx of youth, San Diego State's offense is clearly improved from last year and enters the Wyoming game No. 29 nationally in total offense at 413.0 yards per game. SDSU needs just two touchdown passes to reach last year's 12-game total of 10. Last season, the Aztecs finished the year 88th in total offense and 60th in passing offense. Through five games of 2004, SDSU is 14th in passing offense.

One Less Weapon

The Aztecs will make the drive for their first bowl game since 1998 with one less weapon. Lynell Hamilton, the 2003 Freshman All-America (*The Sporting News, Rivals*), Mountain West freshman of the year and first-team all-league running back, will sit out this season as he continues to recover from the broken ankle that prematurely ended his 2003 season in game 10 at UNLV. Hamilton, who ran for 1,087 yards in less than 10 full games, would have been the nation's 10th leading returning rusher in 2004. He will return to the squad as a sophomore next season.

One More Weapon

Junior linebacker Matt McCoy was hardly an unknown commodity entering 2004 after he led the Mountain West in tackles as a sophomore. But after his 18-tackle effort in the near-upset of Michigan, the Tustin junior raised more eyebrows. Following his performance in Ann Arbor, he was named the national defensive player of the week by the Bronko Nagurski Award and added to that trophy's prestigious watch list. He joins teammate Kirk Morrison as a Butkus and Lombardi candidate.

Devin Help Us

One of the rash of injuries suffered by San Diego State in the early going was an injury that sidelined senior receiver Devin Pitts. He missed the entire Nevada game and did not record a stat in a brief appearance at UCLA. Pitts responded at Wyoming with a career-best six receptions, doubling his season total. He had 60 receiving yards against the Cowboys after entering the game with 45.

Kirk's Climb

Kirk Morrison continues to climb SDSU's career tackle charts. Thanks to his third straight game in which he reached double figures in tackles, Morrison now has 329 for his career, to rank third all-time at San Diego State, behind Whip Walton (407) and Rico Curtis (355). Morrison entered the season as America's No. 11 active tackler.

Behind The Line, Too

Kirk Morrison is eighth all-time at San Diego State in tackles for loss with 37 in his career. He is one-half tackle from Mike Hooper in seventh place.

Double Figures

San Diego State's decorated linebacking corps continues to stockpile statistics. Kirk Morrison's 10-tackle effort against Wyoming marked the 10th time in the last 12 games (dating back to last season) that an Aztec linebacker reached double figures in tackles. Morrison has accomplished the feat 15 times in his career and Matt McCoy has reached double figures seven times. Morrison has reached double figures in tackles in three straight games.

Auxiliary Stats

Linebacker Heath Farwell is half of the two-headed monster (joining Stephen Larsen) that mans "the other" linebacking spot. And Farwell is carving his own niche. Farwell forced two more fumbles against Nevada giving him eight for his Aztec career, which has span 30 games. He also had three sacks against Nevada and one against UCLA and leads SDSU with five on the season.

Linebacker You, You, You and You

Forgive opponents if they feel the SDSU linebacking corps has been together forever. The foursome of Kirk Morrison, Matt McCoy, Heath Farwell and Stephen Larsen have combined to start 86 games during their Aztec careers and they have also combined for a total of 807 career tackles, 89.5 tackles

behind the line of scrimmage, 32.5 quarterback sacks, 20 forced fumbles, 16 recovered fumbles, 28 pass break-ups and six interceptions.

They Know Butkus...And Nagurski

Two Aztec linebackers, Kirk Morrison and Matt McCoy, have been named to the 2004 Butkus Award preseason watch list. Morrison is a returning first-team All-America selection (*College Football News*) and is the reigning Mountain West defensive player of the year. McCoy, a second-team all-league pick last season, led the conference in 2003 with 125 tackles. Only eight schools have multiple players listed on the Butkus watch list. Both Morrison and McCoy are also on the Nagurski Watch List, presented to the nation's top defensive player. Morrison was the Nagurski national defensive player of the week after his 18 tackles in the 24-21 loss at Michigan.

Webb Gems

The proud tradition of Aztec receivers is poised to add a new member. Junior Jeff Webb enters the Colorado State game with 37 catches for 434 yards and three touchdowns of the team's total of eight. He has reached 100-receiving yards in two games this season (Michigan and Nevada) to become the first Aztec to accomplish that feat since teammates J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood finished 2002 with both players breaking the 100-yard receiving mark in the final two games of the season. Webb has caught a pass in each of the last 15 games in which he's played. He missed the last two games of the 2003 season with a shoulder injury.

Countdown To 1,000

Jeff Webb needs to average 94.2 receiving yards over the final six games of the season to reach 1,000 yards for the season. J.R. Tolver and Kassim Osgood were the last to accomplish the feat when both players broke the 1,000-yard mark in 2002.

Beginning To The End Zone

San Diego State has scored 13 touchdowns entering the Colorado State game with six players doing the damage. Those six players, Michael Franklin, Jeff, Webb, Wesley Williams, Brandon Bornes, Ramal Porter and Robert Ortiz had scored a combined 10 career touchdowns entering the season. Part of that new scoring success can be attributed to the development of quarterback Matt Dlugolecki. He has thrown six touchdown passes through five games this season, surpassing his four touchdown passes for all of last season (on 230 attempts). Dlugolecki passed for a career-high 281 passing yards in Laramie.

INT-eresting

The Aztecs now have nine interceptions through five games this season after corraling just 12 all of last year. Six players have combined for the nine picks. And they are getting their hands on even more passes. The Aztecs have already broken up 38 passes in 2004. Last year, that season total in 12 games was 51 break-ups. Safety Josh Dean is fifth nationally in interceptions with three.

First Things First

San Diego State has already scored 58 points in the first quarter this season. Last year, the Aztecs managed just 60 points in the first period for the entire 12-game season.

Younger By The Day

San Diego State's promising early start is being led by a dramatic youth movement. In the first four games of the season consider the contributions by the underclassmen:

► The 2004 season has included the first career starts by offensive linemen Patrick Justman (sophomore), Taylor Schmidt (junior), Chris Pino (junior), Will Robinson (redshirt freshman) and redshirt freshman Mike Kravetz. Another redshirt freshman, Brandyn Dombrowski, won a starting job in the fall but has been slowed by an ankle sprain and saw his first action at Michigan off the bench. And sophomore receiver Ramal Porter has moved into the starting lineup.

► Redshirt freshman Antwan Applewhite had his first career interception against Michigan and his 75-yard interception return set up San Diego State's first score of the game. He also had his first career sack at Michigan.

► Redshirt freshman Brandon Bornes is a key in San Diego State's kickoff return game and has picked up the first carries from scrimmage of his career and has scored two TDs, including a 35-yard TD run

▶ New defensive end Martin Miller has quickly become a factor up front and is now a solid member of the defensive line rotation. The same can be said for redshirt freshman defensive lineman Nick Osborn, who was slowed early by an elbow injury.

▶ Redshirt freshman Garrett Palmer is SDSU's placekicker and freshmen Michael Hughes and Sean Henschel are battling for the team's punting chores. True freshman Tyler Schmitt is the team's deep snapper. Palmer connected on field goals of 50 and 43 yards against Nevada.

Also...

Consider this fact, San Diego State has completed 130 passes entering the Colorado State game. The senior class has accounted for just 22 of those catches and only one of San Diego State's eight touchdown receptions. The senior class has also accounted for just 77 rushing yards (of 665) and six points of SDSU's 106. On The Dark Side, however, seniors represent four of SDSU's top five tacklers.

Butkus Voters Beware

Junior Matt McCoy showed why he's a Butkus Award candidate against Michigan. McCoy was credited with 18 tackles against Michigan, including an astounding 17 solo tackles. McCoy has now reached double figures in tackles five times in nine games and six times in his career. He has reached at least 15 tackles in a game four times. McCoy, somehow, was left off the Mountain West Conference first team last season, despite leading the league with 125 stops. McCoy's 18 tackles at Michigan were the most by an Aztec since Marv Underwood recorded 18 in the 2002 win over Air Force.

Pass Is Back

The 2004 Aztecs look to be regaining the air prowess so cherished by the Aztec faithful and so evident in SDSU history. San Diego State is averaging 280 yards through the air and is completing 58.6 percent of its passes, including Matt Dlugolecki's 61.2 percentage. SDSU already has eight touchdown passes this season after recording just 10 in 12 games last season. Dlugolecki set a career high with 281 passing yards in Laramie, marking his second career-best performance in four games. The junior quarterback has passed for 1,268 yards this year after throwing for 1,248 yards last season. His per-game average last season was 138.7 yards per game while in 2004 he is averaging 253.6 yards per game.

Don't Cross This Line

Since the beginning of the 2003 season, San Diego State's opponents have started in Aztec territory 32 times and come away with points just 14 times, including a meager five touchdowns.

In 2004

This season, SDSU's defense has inherited an opposing drive in Aztec territory on 11 occasions and given up points just three times (one touchdown). Those points came against UCLA when the Bruins began a drive on the SDSU 13, and at Wyoming when the Cowboys mounted a 29-yard "touchdown drive."

Rising Expectations

After two seasons of surpassing the opinions of prognosticators, the Aztecs have a new challenge in 2004 - new-found respect. The Aztecs have been picked everywhere from first to third in the league race (including third by the Mountain West media) after successive seasons in which the Aztecs were picked seventh in the league race and responded with a pair of upper-division finishes. Nationally, the preseason polls have placed San Diego State at No. 38 (*SportsLine.com*) and No. 47 (*Sports Illustrated*). The Aztecs received votes in each of the first three coaches' polls.

Good Morning, Aztecs

San Diego State is likely the only program in the country that will practice in the mornings throughout the football season. Due to class conflicts in the afternoon, SDSU will have morning practices, beginning at 7 a.m., throughout the season. Players will return to the football offices for late afternoon film and meetings. Only the Friday walkthrough is scheduled for a traditional mid-afternoon time.



OFFENSIVE NOTES

The Aztecs offense is off to an impressive start in the 2004 season showing improvement in all four major statistical categories over a year ago (scoring, total, passing and rushing)... Despite scoring a season-low 10 points in each of the last two games, the Aztecs are just seven points behind last season's five-game total... San Diego State has scored 130 points in its last six games (21.7 ppg)... To date, the Aztecs are averaging 2.5 points and 73.1 yards more than last year... Of the Aztecs 13 touchdowns this season, five have come following a turnover... SDSU is impressive in 2004, going 10-for-15 in the Red Zone (inside the opponent 20), including seven touchdowns... Through just five games, the Aztecs have 24 plays of 20 or more yards... San Diego State has seven scoring drives of 71 or more yards and four touchdown drives of 80 or more yards... The Aztecs have shown impressive consistency in the passing game, throwing for 291 yards against Idaho State, 289 yards at Michigan, 262 yards vs. Nevada, 263 at UCLA and 295 against Wyoming... SDSU has 58 first-quarter points this season, last year the Aztecs had 60 first-quarter points in 12 games... With 21 points in the second half of the 2003 season finale (24-3 victory over Air Force), 38 points against Idaho State, 21 points at Michigan, 24 points vs. Nevada, 10 points at UCLA and 10 points at Wyoming, the Aztecs have scored 127 points in their last 20 quarters (25.4 ppg)... San Diego State has gone 67 games without being shutout (last time SDSU did not score was Oct. 29, 1998, a 0-13 loss at Brigham Young)... The Aztecs have had a 100-yard rusher in five of their last nine games... Six different Aztec backs have a rush of at least 21 yards in 2004... Michael Franklin has 1,051 career yards rushing on just 225 career carries (4.67 yards per rush)... Four different players have attempted and completed a pass for the Aztecs this season... 13 different SDSU players have caught a pass in a game this season... It would be hard to imagine a better season opener for the San Diego State offense... Against Idaho State, SDSU scored 38 points and had 581 yards of total offense with an incredibly balanced attack of 291 yards passing and 290 yards rushing... The Aztecs scored touchdowns on their first three offensive possessions of the season and SDSU's first five offensive possessions resulted in 24 points... San Diego State's 24 first-quarter points against Idaho State were the most in any stanza since Oct. 25, 1995 (at UTEP, 24 points in the second quarter) and five more points than SDSU averaged per game during the 2003 campaign... The 38 points were the most for the Aztecs since the 2002 season finale at Hawai'i (Dec. 7, 2002)... Michael Franklin scored on a 67-yard touchdown run on the first play from scrimmage and San Diego State had 14 points and 101 yards of total offense after four offensive plays... The Aztecs had 234 yards of total offense in the first quarter against Idaho State.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

After earning the distinction of being one of the nation's top defensive units a year ago, The Dark Side defense is off to another impressive start this season... San Diego State has held four of its five 2004 opponents well below their average scoring output: Idaho State (scored 21 points, averages 25.2 against non-SDSU opponents), Michigan (24, 31.0), Nevada (10, 31.4) and Wyoming (20, 30.3) (exception was UCLA which averages 32.3 ppg and scored 33)... The five opponents to date combine to average 150.2 points per game (not-including SDSU contest), but against the Aztecs the five high-scoring teams scored just 108 points... SDSU has allowed 108 points this season but that is a bit misleading, Idaho State tallied 21 second-half points after the Aztecs had built a 38-0 lead, Michigan scored seven points on a fumble return, UCLA scored on an interception return and started a drive inside the Aztec 20 that resulted in a field goal and Wyoming started five drives in Aztec territory and kicked field goal following an eight-yard drive... The defense has been sensational when put under pressure... Aztec opponents have started 11 drives on SDSU's side of the field and have scored a total of 13 points off the strong field position (the streak grows to one touchdown in 13 possessions when starting in Aztec territory dating back to last season)... Since the beginning of the 2003 season, opponents have started in SDSU territory 32 times but were able to come away with points on just 14 occasions and touchdowns just five times... During that time, opponents have just a 15.6 percent touchdown percentage when starting inside Aztec territory... The Aztecs defense has allowed just seven touchdowns in 19 red zone trips by the opposition this season (a TD success rate of just 36.8 percent)... Through five games, The Dark Side has 40 tackles for loss, 12 sacks, nine interceptions and has forced 11 turnovers... The Aztecs have allowed just 132 points in their last eight games (16.5 ppg)... In addition, opponents have been able to cross the goal line in just 16 of their last 52 opportunities when inside the Aztec 20 (TD conversion percentage of just 30.8 percent)... The Aztecs have allowed just three rushing touchdowns this season to rank 11th nationally... SDSU is ninth in the country in interceptions with nine... The Dark Side is limiting opponents to just a stingy 3.3 yards per rush this season... The Aztecs have stopped 40 of 169 running plays behind the line of scrimmage (23.7 percent)... In five of the last nine games, SDSU opponents have failed to rush for more than 85 yards... Last year San Diego State allowed 17 offensive touchdowns, tied with co-national champion Louisiana State for the best figure in the country... In 2003, SDSU held four opponents to nine points or less marking the first time an Aztec squad had done that since 1977... Last season the Aztecs allowed 207 points, the fewest SDSU has allowed since 1977... In the 25 seasons between 1977 and 2003, the Aztecs allowed more than 300 points 14 times and more than 400 points twice... The Dark Side defense scored four touchdowns last season off turnover returns and helped the Aztec offense to five scores on drives of four yards or less setup by turnovers deep in opposition territory.



Game Notes

With the Aztec win: SDSU has claimed victories in two straight season-openers for the first time since claiming five straight from 1993-97 ... Aztecs have won 15 straight non-conference home games against teams from outside the BCS Conferences ... SDSU is 1-0 all-time against Idaho State and improves to a perfect 9-0 versus schools in the Big Sky Conference ... The Aztecs moved to 44-33-5 all-time (9-4-1 in last 14 years) in season openers and 2-1 under Tom Craft ... In home openers, SDSU is 27-7-1 in its last 35 home openers ... SDSU has won four of its last five games dating back to 2003 ... The Aztecs have won three straight home games for the first time since the 1998 squad won its final four contests at Qualcomm... **The announced attendance** of 57,216, is an SDSU record for a home game... **On the opening play** of the game, Aztec Michael Franklin ran 67 yards for a touchdown ...the 67-yard run was the longest by an SDSU player since Larry Ned ran for 77 yards at Utah on Oct. 23, 1999 ... the 67-yard run is the longest of Franklin's career, topping his previous high of 55 yards in 2002, at Hawaii'... **The Aztec defense** kept Idaho State off the scoreboard in the first quarter, marking the fifth straight game in which an SDSU opponent has failed to score in the first quarter. Aztec opponents have also gone scoreless in the first 15-minute period in six of the last seven and nine of the last 11 outings dating back to the 2003 campaign... **SDSU's Robert Miller** blocked Idaho State kicker Jaret Johnson's field-goal attempt to close out the first half. The block was the Aztecs' first since Jeff Shoate blocked kicker Scott Parker's 32-yard attempt at Wyoming on Oct.19, 2002. The block is Miller's first of his career.

SAN DIEGO - In front of a record crowd of 57,216, the 2004 Aztecs made a stirring debut as they systematically disposed of Idaho State, 38-21, at Qualcomm Stadium.

Aztec running back Michael Franklin scampered 67 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the season and San Diego State was on its way to a near-perfect first half. The Aztecs jumped to a 24-0 first quarter lead and extended the advantage to 31-0 at the break and eventually 38-0 before ISU dented the scoreboard. SDSU completed the first half without a turnover and without a penalty.

The first quarter was the prolific for SDSU since it scored 24 points in the second quarter of a 1995 romp over UTEP.

The game would last just over four hours, thanks in part to an Idaho State offense that attempted 69 passes while rushing for just 46 yards.

Junior Matt Dlugolecki won the fall camp quarterback derby and he was strong in his debut, completing 16 of his 27 attempts for 233 yards and two touchdowns, one each to Robert Ortiz and Wesley Williams.

The star of the game, however, was Franklin. He rushed for 101 yards, marking his third straight game over the 100-yard mark. He also led the Aztecs with 84 receiving yards. Franklin ended the game with 233 all-purpose yards despite seeing limited action in the second half.

The Dark Side was its dominating self in the first half when the game was being decided. The first 14 Idaho State possessions resulted in just one drive that lasted more than six plays. The Aztec defense forced four turnovers, including interceptions by Heath Farwell, Josh Dean and Donny Baker. Farwell was also credited with a quarterback sack and caused a fumble.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Kevin O'Connell saw his first collegiate action and found Robert Ortiz for a 32-yard touchown pass. Ortiz, who entered the game with two career TD grabs, had two more against the Bengals.

The home crowd was the largest in San Diego State history and the 20th largest crowd in college football on the first full Saturday of the weekend.

Game Notes

For the second consecutive season San Diego State played a nationally-ranked Big Ten team to the final moments before losing... Last season, the Aztecs lost at second-ranked Ohio State, 16-13, on Sept. 9... This season, the Aztecs fall to 17th-ranked Michigan, 24-21... Two weeks after setting a school-record for home attendance with 57,216 vs. Idaho State at Qualcomm Stadium, San Diego State played in front of the largest crowd in school history. **Today's attendance** at Michigan Stadium of 109,432, eclipses the crowd of 104,433 that witnessed the Ohio State-SDSU game last season in Columbus... The Aztecs' last **two losses to nationally-ranked teams** (last season Ohio State and Michigan today) have been by a total of six points... San Diego State's **1-1 record** matches its best mark after two games in the last 10 seasons. The Aztecs have not opened 2-0 since victories over Navy and California to open the 1994 campaign... Despite the loss, SDSU has still **won four of its last six games** dating back to last season... Although not outgained by much 327-311, the Aztecs total yardage disadvantage of 16 yards, snaps a streak of six consecutive games in which SDSU has outgained its opponent... Prior to today, the last time an Aztec opponent had more total yardage was at Utah on Oct. 11, 2003... San Diego State's **Dark Side Defense** put on another impressive showing... Despite allowing 24 points, the defense yielded just one scoring drive of more than 51 yards on the afternoon... The defense also forced four turnovers, two of which set up short scoring drives for the Aztec offense (17 and 39 yard touchdown drives). The Aztecs had seven tackles for loss.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. - Another reigning Big Ten champion as an opponent resulted in another near miss for the San Diego State Aztecs Saturday afternoon.

With a national television audience watching (ESPN), SDSU and No. 17 Michigan went toe-to-toe for more than three hours before the Wolverines escaped The Big House with a 24-21 win over up and coming San Diego State.

In the process, SDSU appeared to show dramatic gains on offense and special teams and The Dark Side defense showed a new taste for creating turnovers.

Michigan shocked the Aztecs early, scoring on a 54-yard touchdown pass on its first play from scrimmage. Following an interception, the Wolverines looked to be in total control with possession deep in SDSU territory. However, safety Josh Dean flattened UM quarterback Chad Henne on a pass attempt and Antwan Applewhite picked the ball out of the air and returned it 75 yards, setting up a Michael Franklin TD.

Following a Michigan field goal, the Aztecs turned the ball over again when Lawrence Reid picked up a fumble and returned it five yards for a touchdown.

With SDSU trailing 17-7 and on the ropes, Robert Ortiz turned the game. His 61-yard reception set up a Jeff Webb touchdown and the 109,000 plus in Ann Arbor settled in for nailbiter.

By halftime, SDSU had taken the lead when Matt Dlugolecki found Ortiz for a 14-yard score. That drive was set up by a Kurt Kahui fumble recovery. In all, SDSU forced four turnovers after Michigan entered the game second nationally in turnover margin.

The final lead change of the day took place on the first drive of the second half as the Wolverines drove the field and registered the last lead change of the day.

It was SDSU's second three-point loss in two years to the reigning Big Ten champion. In 2003, SDSU was a 16-13 loser to No. 2 Ohio State.

Game Notes

With the SDSU victory: San Diego State has won five of its last seven games dating back to last season. That is the best seven-game mark for SDSU since posting a similar seven-game mark from Oct. 24, 1998 through Sept. 4, 1999 ... San Diego State is 2-0 at home this season and has won four straight games at Qualcomm Stadium. The four-game home field winning streak is the longest since claiming five straight in 1998-99 (last four home games of '98 and first game of '99). From the end of the five-game winning streak in 1999, until the current four-game winning streak, the Aztecs were 7-17 at Qualcomm ... San Diego State is 2-1 after the first three games of the season for the second consecutive season. The last time SDSU had a winning record after the first three games of consecutive seasons was 1993 and 1994... **With tonight's attendance** of 33,429, SDSU has surpassed the 30,000 mark in back-to-back home contests for the first time since the 1999 season. SDSU drew 30,508 versus New Mexico (Oct. 9, 1999) and 40,836 fans against Brigham Young (Nov. 6, 1999)... **SDSU linebacker Kirk Morrison** became just the fourth player in SDSU history to record more than 300 career tackles. Morrison, who tallied his 13th career game in double-figure tackles, now has 308 tackles in his career to rank fourth in the Aztec record books. Morrison's 15 tackles tonight matches his career high (15 vs. BYU in 2003, vs. Utah in 2001), while he had a career best for most solo tackles in a game with 10 (prev. nine at Hawai'i)... With nine catches for 101 yards tonight, SDSU's **Jeff Webb** has at least one reception in each of his last 13 outings and at least two catches in his last nine games. Webb also recorded his fourth career game with 100 or more yards .

SAN DIEGO - On a dangerous night against a dangerous opponent, San Diego State went to work in business-like fashion to dismiss Nevada, 27-10, Saturday night at Qualcomm Stadium in front of 33,429 fans.

A week before the UCLA game and a week after a near-miss at Michigan, the more than capable Wolf Pack were in a position to derail SDSU's early-season momentum. However, Michael Franklin rushed for 100 yards for the second time this season and The Dark Side kept the visitors out of the end zone until their final possession of the night to cruise to the win.

As they have all season, the Aztecs were effective in the first half. The Aztecs led 17-3 at intermission thanks to a 23-yard TD reception by Jeff Webb and a 35-yard touchdown run by Brandon Bornes.

Both of those scoring drives were of the cross-country variety, covering 79 and 81 yards with both taking 12 places to execute.

The youth movement continued for SDSU with sophomore Ramal Porter scoring his first career touchdown and redshirt freshman Brandon Bornes scoring on a career-best 35-yard touchdown run.

The Aztec special teams had a good night as well with Garrett Palmer connecting on field goals of 50 and 43 yards, and punt returns by Franklin and Kyle Conerly that covered 29 and 23 yards, respectively.

Senior linebacker Kirk Morrison reached a new milestone with his 15 tackles, pushing him over 300 for his career. In all, it was a strong night for The Dark Side with three quarterback sacks, two interceptions, 12 pass break-ups, and two forced fumbles. Senior playmaker Heath Farwell continued to show up in the stat column. He had all three Aztec sacks and forced both fumbles.

Game Notes

With his 45 yards on 11 carries, Aztec junior **Michael Franklin** reached the 1,000-yard plateau in career rushing with 1,002 yards. Franklin had 346 yards as a red-shirt freshman in 2002, 371 yards as a sophomore in 2003, and has 285 yards as a junior in 2004. Franklin also tallied a career game high in receptions with 10 (45 yards), besting his previous high of eight at Wyoming in 2002... Linebackers **Kirk Morrison** and **Matt McCoy** both reached double-figures in tackles tonight. Morrison had 11 tackles and reached double-figures for the second straight game and the 13th time in his career. Morrison's 11 tackles included eight solos and two tackles for loss. McCoy, meanwhile, had 10 tackles (6 solo) and reached double-figures for the second time this season, the fourth time in the last six games and the eighth time in his career.... With the 402 yards tonight, SDSU has reached the **400-yard mark** in total offense three times in four games in 2004... The **Aztecs were outgained** in total offense (410-402) for the second time this season and the second time on the road. But in those two games, SDSU has been outgained by just a total of 24 yards (vs. Michigan - outgained by 16 (327-311)) ... In the four games this season, SDSU has combined to outgain its opponents by 212 yards... **SDSU rushed** for 139 yards tonight, despite being tagged for -23 yards on the muffed punt in the first half... Seven players combined for the 139 yards and four accumulated at least 12 yards... The Aztecs ran for 137 of those yards in the second half after recording 2 net yards in the first half... With his 23 completions on 42 attempts for 215 yards, SDSU quarterback **Matt Dlugolecki** logged his third straight game with at least 23 completions and at least 40 attempts.

PASADENA - In 2002, UCLA generated 23 points off of Aztec miscues to blow out SDSU, 43-7. Last year it was a 3-3 game at the half when two interceptions helped the Bruins to a 20-10 victory.

Saturday night, Spencer Havner's 52-yard interception return for a touchdown gave the homestanding Bruins a 14-3 lead. And for good measure, SDSU dropped a snap on a punt inside its own 15 to provide the Bruins with three more points and an insurmountable 20-3 halftime lead. The Bruins would eventually win by a 33-10 count.

After UCLA scored on its first possession (64-yard drive), the Aztecs limited the Bruins to 62 yards of total offense on five possessions, before the two critical second-quarter mis-takes.

Any hopes of an Aztec comeback ended on the first series of the third quarter when UCLA marched 65 yards for a touchdown that staked UCLA to a 27-3 lead.

Two more field goals would close the scoring for UCLA. SDSU grabbed some momentum with its own touchdown drive, covering 80 yards on seven plays and capped by Brandon Bornes' third rushing TD of the season. However, after holding UCLA on its next possession, SDSU gave up the ball on an interception and UCLA cruised through the final quarter to defeat SDSU for the 19th time in 20 all-time meetings.

Michael Franklin ran for 45 yards in the game and crossed the 1,000-yard rushing mark for his career.

With the loss, San Diego State had its five game winning streak snapped, including two consecutive in Laramie. SDSU has never won three in a row at War Memorial Stadium... The Aztecs are now 4-9 all-time in Laramie... San Diego State falls to 3-3 in Mountain West openers and 1-2 in conference openers under head coach Tom Craft.

LARAMIE, Wyo. - San Diego State's five-year domination of Wyoming came to a screeching halt Saturday afternoon in Laramie.

The Aztecs found a way to lose a game in which their quarterback set a career high in completions and passing yards, the opposition was limited to just 264 yards of total offense, a full 99 shy of SDSU's total, and the opposition was just 3-of-16 on third-down conversions.

Here is how it happened. The Aztecs suffered four meltdowns in the kicking game, some red-zone misfires and eventually wilted in the fourth quarter to fall to the Cowboys by a 20-10 count in the Mountain West opener for both schools.

SDSU held a 10-3 lead at halftime, thanks to a 47-yard touchdown pass from Matt Dlugolecki to Jeff Webb. The TD pass was the only exclamation point in a game that saw SDSU hold a tiny advantage in total offense, 161-126 at the break. At intermission, the two teams had combined for 45 rushing yards.

In the third quarter, the Aztec wheels came off in a most unconventional fashion. On the first possession of the third period, SDSU's three-and-out offensive possession was followed by a 10-yard Sean Henschel punt. One play later, Wyoming had a 29-yard touchdown pass to draw even in the game and wipe out SDSU's halftime advantage.

SDSU's second possession lasted just one play as SDSU suffered its first turnover on a fumble. This time, The Dark Side limited the Cowboys to a missed field goal.

But the quarter wasn't over. Another three-and-out by SDSU was followed by a seven-yard punt to set up the Cowboys at the SDSU 33.

Wyoming managed just eight yards but was close enough to result in a field goal and suddenly SDSU was down 13-10 despite virtually no offense by the opposition.

SDSU turned the ball over again on an interception on its next possession but the Cowboys again found the going tough and was forced to punt.

SDSU's next possession resulted in just an eight-yard punt by stand-in Adam Gray-Hayward, who punted for the first time.

SDSU was trailing 20-10 midway through the fourth quarter when the offense found its rhythm for the first time. A 37-yard field goal attempt by Garrett Palmer, however, missed to the right. It ended SDSU's 74-yard drive and effectively killed the Aztecs' chances to win the game.

SDSU would penetrate the red zone again late in the game but was held on downs.
