2013 REVIEW AND 2014 OUTLOOK

A successful 2013 campaign for the Seminoles included a 16-10 record and advanced to the ACC Final for the third time ever. Florida State defeated No. 11 Clemson and No. 13 Virginia en route to the final before falling to No. 10 Miami. FSU reached a season-high ranking of No. 16 and also qualified for its seventh-consecutive NCAA Tournament but lost to No. 33 Memphis in the first round.

Sophomore Daneika Borthwick earned All-ACC honors and was named ACC Player of the Week after singles wins against USF's Katie Vasenina and Miami's Kelsey Laurente.

Senior Amy Sargeant finished her career with the Seminoles on a high note posting a 30-7 record overall which included a 16-1 record on court four as well as a 12-match winning streak.

Kerrie Cartwright arrived in the spring and made an impact right away. The sophomore finished with a 13-6 record, including a 10-5 record from court five.

Senior Francesca Segarelli played great for the 'Noles and came up with some clutch points on the season. Her come-from-behind victory over No. 26 Jeukeng from Clemson clinched the 4-3 victory of the No. 11 Tigers in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament. She finished with a 23-13 record, playing a majority of her matches on court two.

Junior Kristina Schleich amassed an impressive record of 19-8, doing most of her work on courts five and six

The 'Noles took care of business off the court as well. For the ninth time under head coach Jennifer Hyde, the Florida State women's tennis team won the Golden Torch award for having the highest team GPA. They were also categorized as an ITAAII-Ac-



ademic Team, while Leyla Erkan, Schleich, Mia Vriens, Segarelli and Sargeant earned ITA Scholar-Athlete status. Daneika Borthwick also joined Sargeant and Segarelli on the All-ACC Academic Team for 2013.

The 2014 Florida State women's tennis team will continue to build on the foundation of previous seasons, but also has an infusion of new talent that will look to lead the 'Noles into the future.

Freshman Majlena Pedersen and Duda Santos arrived for the fall and have already posted some quality matches. Pedersen won the Singles B draw of the ITA Southeast Regional while the doubles pairing of Santos and Laurence Porry made it to the quarterfinals of the USTA Clay Court Invitational at Disney.

Junior Mia Vriens has put together a nice fall season with a 3-2 record, including straight set wins over New Mexico's Emily

Olivier and Texas Tech's Samantha Czarniak at the USTA Clay Court Invitational at Disney.

Borthwick and Cartwright have continued to lead the way for the 'Noles.

Borthwick advanced to the second round of the qualifying draw of the Riviera/ITA All-American Championships, and also reached the quarterfinals of the USTA Clay Court Invitational at Disney.

Cartwright is on a four match winning streak, and has an 8-3 record already in the fall. With two victories over ranked opponents and a quarterfinal appearance at the Bedford Cup, she is ready to help lead the 'Noles in 2014.

Two new faces have arrived in Tallahassee just for the spring of 2014 in Emily Fanning and Daniela Schippers.

Fanning comes to FSU from New Zealand where she has represented her country at the Junior Fed Cup and was named the New Zealand Junior Player of the Year in 2011 and 2012. She has won several ITF Junior titles and reached a career high ITF Junior ranking of No. 38 in 2012.

Schippers is a Guatemala native that has also been successful on the ITF circuit. She has three ITF doubles titles and had reached six other finals. She was the youngest player to play for Guatemala in the Fed Cup in 2010 and also played for them in 2011 and 2012. Schippers also paired with former 'Nole Segarelli to win the doubles title at a 10K WTA event at Quintana Roo.

The veteran leadership and fresh talent looks to be a great combination for success for the 2014 Seminoles.





JENNIFER HYDE

Head Coach – Tenth Year

Hometown: Alpharetta, Ga.

College: Florida State '95

Jennifer Hyde enters her tenth season at the helm of the Florida State program. Hyde has led the Seminoles to seven straight NCAA appearances, including their first ever Sweet 16 in 2010. With an exceptional list of accomplishments and milestones from her career at FSU, including an honor of ITA South Region Coach of the Year in both 2011 and 2007, Hyde looks to guide the Seminoles deep into the NCAA tournament in 2014.

For the third time in school history and second time while leading the Seminoles, Hyde led FSU into the 2013 ACC Championship match after defeating Wake Forest, Clemson and Virginia en route to the final against Miami. During that run, the Seminoles defeated the Tigers for the first time since 2001 in a match that saw well over five hours of play.

In addition, Daneika Borthwick earned All-ACC honors while helping the team to a 16-10 overall record.

At the start of the 2012-13 season, Hyde led five Seminoles to the Riviera/ITA-All-American Championships - the most to ever qualify for the event in Los Angeles in FSU history.

Hyde and the Seminoles continued to rewrite the history books in 2011-12 as the squad's six straight NCAA appearances marked the first time in school history the feat had been accomplished. Hyde has also guided the Seminoles to five top-20 finishes.

The Seminoles concluded the 2011 season with an eight-match winning streak, landing the Seminoles back to the ACC Title Match for just the second time in program history. The first time occurred in 1994 when Hyde was an athlete on the team. During that span, FSU recorded the most successful weekend of play in program history by beating No. 3 Duke and No. 4 UNC in back-to-back matches to close out the regular season. Using the momentum into the ACC Tournament, the Seminoles knocked off Wake Forest, No. 8 Virginia and No. 3 Duke for a second time as Hyde earned her 100th career victory in the process.

In addition, the Seminoles jumped to No. 11 in the ITA National Rankings, breaking the previous high mark of No. 12 set by the 2007-08 team.



Just one season earlier, Hyde led the Seminoles to perhaps the most successful season in Florida State history taking her team to its first ever NCAA Sweet 16. After being selected to host the first and second rounds of the NCAA Championship for just the second time in program history, both under Hyde, the Seminoles dominated both North Florida and No. 17 South Carolina to punch their ticket to Athens, Ga., and to the highly coveted Sweet 16 round of the NAAs. Hyde also watched her first 'Nole earn ACC Freshman of the Year when Francesca Segarelli captured the honor in 2010.

The 2007-08 season welcomed several firsts for the program with Florida State hosting the first and second round of the NCAA Tournament. The Seminoles reached a No. 12 national ranking, the highest ranking in women tennis program history at the time. With the help of big wins against top ranked programs during the 2008 season, the Seminoles finished the year with an overall record of 19-7, the winningest season since 1999, ranking second on the all-time list at Florida State. Also, Hyde coached freshman Katie Rybakova to a top 20 national ranking in which Rybakova also received a bid to participate in the NCAA Singles Championships as a freshman. Hyde's players have made seven appearances at the NCAA Championships in singles as well as two doubles pairs. Rybakova

is one of two players in FSU history to qualify for the NCAA Championships three out of her four years (2008, 2009, 2011) in singles.

Off the court, Hyde athletes have continued their brilliance in the classroom by securing the Golden Torch Award nine times since her arrival, which is given to the Florida State athletic team with the highest GPA. In addition, numerous Seminoles have landed spots on the All-ACC Academic team, All-ACC Honor Roll and ITA Scholar-Athletes list in Hyde's nine years as head coach.

Both Federica Suess and Rybakova earned ACC post-graduate scholarships. Suess was awarded the scholarship in 2009 during her senior year, while Rybakova earned the honor for her fifth-year in 2011.

After graduating from FSU in 1995, Hyde began her coaching career as an assistant for the Seminoles prior to heading north to the University of Iowa in 1995. Hyde spent two years in the Midwest before returning to the south with an assistant coaching stint at the University of Alabama (1997-98).

Hyde moved on to coach at the University of North Carolina in 1998-99 where she established herself as one of the best young coaches in the sport. With her assistance, UNC enjoyed one of its best seasons in program history, moving from outside all the national polls to a top-25 ranking and the school's first NCAA tournament berth.

In 1999, Hyde accepted her first head coaching position at the University of Houston. Hyde spent five increasingly successful years with the Cougars before returning to Tallahassee, where she first started her collegiate tennis career.

The Alpharetta, Ga., native posted an impressive career with the Seminoles establishing herself as a four-year letter winner, NCAA Tournament participant (1994) and ACC flight champion in doubles alongside teammate Jenny Graf. Hyde captained the 1994 Seminole squad whose No. 17 ranking previously stood for sixteen years as the highest year end ranking until 2010's No. 14 finish. Hyde earned a Masters Degree from Florida State in Sport Management in 2011.

ZSUZSANNA FODOR

Assistant Coach – First Year

Hometown: Budapest, Hungary

College: California, Berkeley '07

Zsuzsanna Fodor, a two time All-American in both singles and doubles, who spent the past three years playing professional tournaments around the world, returns to college coaching and enters her first season with the Seminoles as the assistant coach of women's tennis.

As a six-time Hungarian national champion, Fodor brings an extraordinary array of experience to the Florida State Seminoles coaching staff.

In 2008, Zsuzsanna Fodor was the assistant coach of women's tennis at the University of California, Berkeley where the Cal Golden Bears advanced to the NCAA team championship finals and completed the season ranked No. 3 in the ITA. That same year, the Golden Bears' pairing of Jana Juricova and Mari Andersson also captured the NCAA doubles title.

As a player at Cal, Fodor was twice named to the All-Pac-10 first team (2006 and 2007). She first earned the honor as

she captured the 2006 Pac-10 singles championship on her way to being named Pac-10 Player of the Year.

Coupled with fellow All-American Susie Babos, Fodor also received conference recognition as part of the 2007 Pac-10 Doubles Team of the Year as they posted a 21-7 record together.

Fodor earned an ITA No. 3 singles ranking and a No. 2 doubles ranking as a junior in 2006 as she won the ITA Northwest Regional Championship doubles title with Babos. In the fall of 2005, she won the singles title at the ITA Northwest Regional Championship.

She arrived at Berkeley after transferring from Mississippi State, where she was named the Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year in 2005.

Fodor received a degree from Cal in interdisciplinary studies in 2007 and currently resides in Tallahassee, Fla.

Fall: Finished with a 3-6 record in singles and a 3-5 record in doubles...paired up with Duda Santos and advanced to the quarter-finals of the USTA Clay Court Invitational at Disney before falling to the eventual champions from Texas A&M...had a nice three-set victory at the same tournament over New Mexico's Natasha Smith, 6-4, 4-6, 6-2.

Junior 2012-13

Appeared in one match during the spring for the Seminoles...went on to defeat Gabriela Srodowski of Maryland 6-3, 5-7, 1-0...recorded an overall showing of 2-2 in singles and 2-1 in doubles.

2010-2012 (With State College of Florida, Sarasota-Manatee):

Senior 2013-14

Fall: Finished with a 2-5 singles and a 1-5 doubles record in the fall for the Seminoles...played well at the Bedford Cup with a singles victory over Candela Munoz of FGCU 6-1, 6-3 and a doubles shutout with Porry over UNF's Hollander and Calderon, 8-0.

Junior 2012-13

Spring: Went 19-8 in singles in her first season as a Seminole...worked mostly out of court six where she posted a record of 8-5...was 17-9 in doubles overall this year...paired well with Kerrie Cartwright in doubles and posted a record of 4-2 for the year...was the clinching match for the doubles point against No. 11 Clemson in the ACC Quarterfinals where the Seminoles went on to defeat the Tigers 4-3...during that same match she came back to defeat Tristen Dewar 1-6, 7-5, 6-2 in three-sets proving to be one of the turning points in the historic win...came back in a three-set thriller against Andrea Retolaza of Wake Forest as she was down 0-5 in the first set and came back to take the match 7-6, 6-4 from court five.

Fall: In her first matches as a Seminole, Schleich posted a 3-2 record in singles while going 4-2 in doubles on the fall.

2010-2012:

Two-year letter-winner at Colorado ...two-year win total was 32 singles and 16 doubles victories... as a sophomore won a team-best 16 singles matches during the year, eight of them during the spring ...won seven singles matches at No. 1 position playing against the opponent's top players, the other win at No. 2... played against nine nationally ranked opponents in the spring and upset No. 48 Liudmila Vasilieva of Washington State in three sets after dropping the opening set ...named the team's Co-Most Valuable Player after her freshman year... CU's first freshman player at No. 1 singles since 2003-04 ...led the Buffaloes with eight dual match singles victories.

High School and Junior:

Member of the 2009 German Team Championship team...member of two state championship teams (2001, 2002) and a pair of runner up finishes (2003, 2005)... won the ITF junior doubles title in Spain in 2007.

Personal:

Born August 24, 1990...daughter of Peter and Ingrid Schleich...older sister, Kathrin is a tennis coach...majoring in business management...named to the 2011-12 Pac-12 honorable mention academic team.

Class: Junior

Junior 2013-14:

Fall: Ranked No. 46 during the fall and posted a 5-4 singles record, including a 2-1 record over ranked opponents...finished with a 2-4 mark in doubles...played in the qualifying draw of the Riviera/ITA All-American Championships and defeated No. 66 Sarah Pham of Utah in three sets, 7-5, 5-7, 6-4...was ultimately eliminated by No. 43 Yang Pang of Arkansas, 6-3, 3-6, 7-5... competed well at the USTA Clay Court Invitational at Disney, reaching the quarterfinals by defeating Texas A&M's Paula Deheza and Florida's Stefani Stojic.

Sophomore 2012-13:

Spring: Played most of her matches on court one...was named to the All-ACC team in 2013...played 26 singles matches against ranked players and posted an 18-18 record overall...was named ACC Player of the Week after FSU's wins against USF's Katie Vasenina (No.35) 6-4, 6-4 and Miami's Kelsey Laurente (No.52) 7-5, 4-6, 7-6...the win over Laurente lifted the Seminoles to a 4-3 victory over the Hurricanes - the fifth in program history...was 16-18 in doubles... while paired with Francesca Segarelli the duo defeated the No. 52 pair of Caroline Price and Whitney Kay of UNC 8-4...was ranked in every single ITA poll in 2013 and peaked at No. 31 before finishing out the season at the NCAA Championships at No.62.

Fall: Without even playing a match as a Seminole, Borthwick was selected to play in the prequalifying rounds of the ITA/Riviera All-American Championships in singles and doubles...made her FSU debut by defeating No. 18 Brynn Boren of Tennessee at the

Furman Fall Classic...defeated two more ranked opponents in No. 86 Chanelle Van Nguyen of UCLA and No. 49 Alex Cercone of Florida...rated the ninth-best newcomer according to the ITA...finished the fall with a 9-4 showing in singles while going 6-4 in doubles.

Freshman 2011-12:

Sat out the season.

High School:

In 2011, qualified for the Junior Championships at Wimbledon, advancing into the third round...was a member of the U-18 Great Britain team for the Moreen Conally competition, which is set up as Great Britain vs. the U-18 American team...represented Great Britain during the U-16 IC tournament...Borthwick attended the Nelson Thomlinson School where she played netball, hockey, cross country and participated in athletics in addition to tennis.

Fall: Had an impressive fall season with an 8-3 record in singles along with a 2-5 record in doubles...posted a 2-0 record over ranked opponents with victories over No. 77 Katerina Popova from South Carolina and No. 123 Michaela Bezdicikova from New Mexico... fought hard at the USTA Clay Court Invitational at Disney with two three-set victories in the consolation bracket... paired up with Daneika Borthwick in doubles during the fall, and while only posting a 2-5 record, four of the losses were with an 8-6 score.

Sophomore 2012-13:

Spring: Joined the team in January of 2013...posted a record of 13-6 in singles and 12-7 in doubles...worked mostly from court five in singles where she played a record of 10-5...defeated one ranked opponent during the season in No. 104 Clementina Riobueno (Miami) 6-4, 6-2...paired well with Kristina Schleich in doubles and posted a record of 4-2 for the year...was the clinching match for the doubles point against No.11 Clemson in the ACC Quarterfinals where the Seminoles went on to defeat the Tigers 4-3.

Sophomore 2012-13:

Spring: Posted a record of 18-16 in singles this year...gave the Seminoles the clinching point against NC State with a 6-3, 6-1 win over Nicole Martinez...picked up a crucial win in the Seminoles' 4-3 ACC semifinal victory over No. 13 Virginia on court three against Hana Tomljanovic 7-6, 7-5...worked well with Amy Sargeant in doubles where the pair went on an eight-match winning streak during the season...posted an overall record of 17-7 while playing alongside Sargeant...was listed in several ITA polls this season peaking at No. 48.

Fall: Was selected to play in doubles at the ITA/Riviera All-American Championships with Danieka Borthwick...earned her first win over a ranked opponent in No. 29 Katie Vasenina of USF at the State of Florida Championships...was awarded the Sportsmanship Award for the tournament as she made a semifinal appearance in the event... was 8-3 in singles for the fall while posting a record of 4-4 in doubles.

Freshman 2011-12:

Spring: Played on courts two, three and four in singles for the Seminoles...went 7-13 on the year in singles while playing to a 8-14 record in doubles.

Fall: Began her career as a Seminole with a 2-2 record in singles during the fall season.



THE SCOTT SPEICHER TENNIS CENTER

With the first stage of construction completed in the summer of 1993, the Donald Loucks Courts at the Scott Speicher Tennis Center opened its gates to the public for the first time at a Children's Miracle Network charity tournament. Since then, many successful tournaments including the 1996 NCAA Women's Championships and 2007-2010 NCAA Regionals have graced the courts at one of Florida State University's premier athletic facilities. During the fall of 2012, the Seminoles hosted the ITA Southeast Regional Championships for the first time.

Costing \$1.2 million to build and then another \$800,000 for recent additions, Florida State's Speicher Tennis Center has become an example of the increasing dedication and commitment the University has to all of its 19 varsity athletic programs.


The Speicher Tennis Center houses 12 lighted hard courts, over 1,000 court level seats, coaching offices, men's and women's locker rooms, equipment and storage rooms, a team lounge and a public address system. The growing pride Florida State has for its tennis program and its premier tennis center was honored just after it's opening in 1994, when the United States Tennis Association (USTA) awarded the structure with its "Top Notch" facility award.

The Speicher Tennis Center was named in honor of Lieutenant Commander Michael Scott Speicher, a graduate of Florida State University. Speicher was considered the first American casualty during Operation Desert Storm, but was later reclassified by the United State's government as missing in action in 2001 and missing or captured a year later. However, in 2009 Speicher's remains were found in the Anbar province of Iraq after a nearly 20-year search. The Scott Speicher family was later honored by Florida State at a home football game with a missing man formation fly-over from the Navy. By Presidential directive, the facility bears the name the "Scott Speicher Tennis Center."

In 1947, Loucks became Florida State's first basketball coach and a year later was named the school's first tennis coach. His tennis team was the first athletic team. The varsity tennis courts were named for Loucks in 1981. He served as Dean of men from 1957-1967 and was known as a servant of leadership, service and devotion to many worthy causes.

The Speicher Tennis Center was designed by EMO/Architects, Inc., a Tallahassee-based architectural firm, in collaboration with Global Consult Group, Inc., an internationally recognized Tennis Facility Design Consultant. The complex was funded by private sources and supervised through the state university system of Florida.

Through its 20 year existence, the Scott Speicher Tennis Center at the Donald Loucks Courts has served as the home courts for all Florida State men's and women's home dual matches, the annual Seminole Fall Classics, City of Tallahassee tennis championships, various USTA regional and zonal tournaments, the 1994 and 1995 Men's Intercollegiate tournament and the annual Children's Miracle Network Charity Invitational benefiting Shands Hospital in Gainesville. The tennis center has also been the site for the ITA Summer Circuit for men's and women's tennis in which high school and collegiate athletes participate in singles and double matches. The facility was resurfaced in the winter of 2012.





THE INDOOR TENNIS FACILITY

After breaking ground on construction in January of 2010, the Indoor Tennis Facility was completed in April of 2011. The multimillion dollar Indoor practice facility serves as an additional playing arena for the Florida State tennis teams. Since the completion in spring of 2011, the facility has served as both a site for training and competition.

The building hosts six regulation courts, locker rooms, athletic training room, equipment room, office and lobby. With this new facility, both Seminole Tennis teams are equipped with the tools to host both regional and national championships now and in the future. For the next phase, plans are in place to add spectator seating, team lounges, extended locker rooms, offices and a press box.

Besides use from the tennis programs the Multi-Purpose Educational Facility is used for academic classes, clinics and camps. The facility is the only indoor tennis facility approved for college competition in the state of Florida and only one of a few in the southeast.

Florida State Head Women's Tennis Coach Jennifer Hyde stated, "We are very excited about the indoor facility that is being built for the tennis programs. This facility will ensure a consistent training program, with weather never being an issue affecting our practice schedules and training regime. It will allow us to host conference, regional and national championships in the future, which will only bring about more positive attention to our program. This facility highlights the continued support for our Women's Tennis Program demonstrated by the administration at Florida State. We are very excited for the completion of this project."

The women's tennis team had its first practice on April 6, 2011 while the men practiced the next day on April 7. At the men's Seminole Invitational during September 2011, the back draws were played there for the facilities first competition. The first women's dual match was played on January 21, 2012 against UCF where Florida State won 6-1. The men's team played Furman on January 22, 2012 and came off the courts with a 7-0 victory.

The three million dollar building was designed by Lewis + Whitlock while construction was completed by Rippee Construction.

The facility is located adjacent to the Morcom Aquatics Facility and the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course and Club at 2566 Pottsdamer Rd. and is open to the public.
