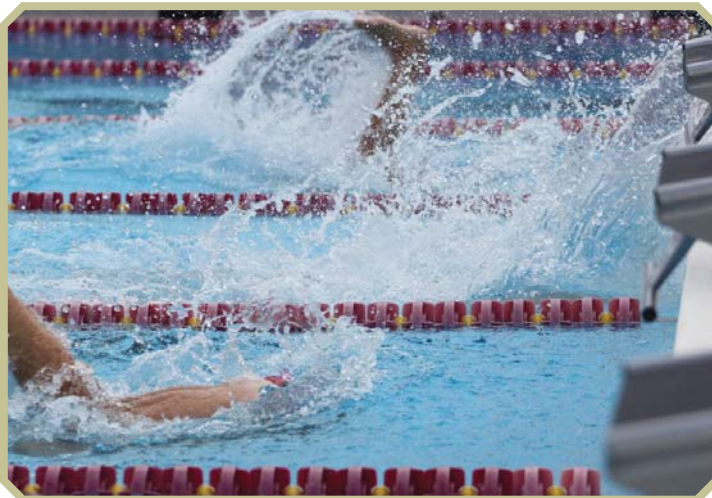

HEAD COACH NEIL HARPER

Entering his 13th season as head coach of the Seminoles, Neil Harper has established one of the elite programs in the ACC. With 84 ACC Champions, 56 NCAA All-American honors and one National Champion in that time span, Harper's Florida State squads are consistently represented on a national level. Heading into the 2011-12 season, Harper has a total of 14 athletes that have qualified for the 2012 Olympic Trials in Omaha, Neb.

During the 2010-11 season, both men's and women's teams finished in third place at the ACC Championships with Harpers guiding four to the NCAA Championships. Three of those athletes walked away with All-American honors and two found themselves on the podium.

The team's lone ACC Champion was senior Rob Holderness, who ended his NCAA career with a seventh place finish in the 200 breast with a time of 1:54.86, capturing All-American status in the event.

On the women's side, junior Stephanie Sarandros competed at the NCAA Championships in the 200 back for the third straight season. She would go on to finish 28th.

In an overall FSU effort, the swimming and diving team was able to contribute to another season in which the Seminoles were represented at the NCAA Championships in all of its sports.

The 2009 season was a year of milestones for Harper and his athletes. Along with his 200th career win, Florida State broke five ACC conference records and seven school records at USA Short Course National Championships. By the end of 2009 Harper directed his men to a second-place finish and his women to a fourth-place finish at the ACC Championship, to a top 20 showing at NCAA Championship, and his teams raced against nine teams ranked in the CSCAA top 25. Through this all, the swimmers and divers broke 24 school records, won ACC Performer of the Week six times and Andy Hodgson earned a Nation Collegiate Swimmer of the Week.

Florida State earned back-to-back ACC Championships when the women earned their first conference title in 2006 and the men followed with their first in 2007. The teams' ACC Championships garnered Harper two consecutive ACC Coach of the Year awards. Over the last 11 years, the women's team has won 45 titles and the men's 37. The 16 championships in 2006 and 2007 under Harper were the most during Harper's tenure.

Every school record on the men's and women's side has been broken during Harper's tenure in Tallahassee. Not only are more of the Florida State records held by Harper's student-athletes than any other head coach's, but the all-time top ten contains more of his athletes than all of the former head coach's combined.

Harper's 98-39 (.715) mark on the men's side is second in school history and his winning percentage is first among active ACC coaches. Since the 2001-02 season, the women have won at least nine meets in all but one season and have only one loss outside the Top 25. The men have produced at least nine wins per season in all but two seasons during that same time frame with just five losses beyond the Top 25.

Previous Coaching Experience

In May of 1999, Harper returned to Tallahassee to take over the men's and women's swimming and diving teams after two years as the women's head coach at Ohio State. In two seasons with the Buckeyes, Harper's team posted a 15-12 mark while qualifying six athletes for the NCAA Championships. In the classroom, Ohio State excelled just as well as both of his teams received NCAA All-Academic selections. Within the conference, the Buckeyes received more than 20 Academic All-Big Ten Conference honors during his two seasons.

From 1994-97, Harper served as the top assistant at Florida State under Don Gibb. His two duties were to coordinate recruiting efforts and take charge of the team's strength and conditioning. With Harper on staff Florida State produced

numerous All-Americans, including the school's first female All-American one in six years and FSU's first NCAA champion, Stephen Parry, in the 200 butterfly.

Harper spent six years as an assistant coach at LSU prior to his first stint at Florida State. During his time in Baton Rouge, he helped the LSU swimmers earn 21 NCAA All-America honors and seven Southeastern Conference titles. During the 1991 season, both the men and women posted one of their best finishes at the NCAA meet and came away with a 14th-place showing.

International Experience

Harper's acumen in the pool extends internationally as he has coached at the biggest most prestigious international competitions over the last six years. During the summer of 2004, he was on deck for his fourth Olympic Games as he traveled to Athens, Greece to coach Wickus Nienaber, the top swimmer for the Swaziland contingency. Nienaber was just one of five of Harper's former Seminoles competing in the Olympics as Chris Vythoulkas swam for the Bahamas, Golda Marcus carried the El Salvador flag and Julio Santos represented Ecuador.

The biggest thrill for Harper at the 2004 Olympics was watching one of his former student-athletes reach the medal stand. Parry brought home the bronze medal in the 200-meter butterfly for Great Britain.

In 2000, Harper was a member of the South African Olympic coaching staff in Sydney, Australia coaching Olympic medal hopefuls and Olympic finalists Brendon Dedekind and Brett Petersen.

In 2001, he traveled to Fukuoka, Japan to coach Nienaber in the FINA World Championships. The following summer he mentored Nienaber at the Commonwealth Games in Manchester, England, where he was joined by former Seminole All-American's Parry and Petersen, as well as Vythoulkas. In 2003, he returned to the FINA World Championships in Barcelona, Spain to coach Nienaber.

Swimming Experience

As a competitor, Harper is one of the top swimmers in LSU history. He first made his name in the SEC when he won the 100-yard backstroke at the 1986 SEC Championships. Throughout his career, Harper collected four SEC titles while earning seven NCAA All-America awards. During his final year, LSU won it's only SEC Team Championship and finished sixth at the NCAA championships, the highest in school history. He still ranks on the Tigers' all-time top ten performers in four different events.

The London native represented Great Britain in the 1984 and 1988 Olympics in the 100 and 200-meter backstroke as well as a member of the 400-meter medley relay with sixth and fourth-place finishes respectively.

Personal

The 45-year-old Harper is married to the former Paige Busch from Orlando, Florida, who was also an All-American and SEC champion in the 100-yard breaststroke at LSU. The couple have two daughters, Katherine (16) and Kelly (14).

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH ANDY ROBINS



Florida State has solidified itself at the top of the ACC and one of the main reasons is the presence of associate head coach Andy Robins, in his 16th season with the Seminoles.

Robins has worked with the Seminole sprinters under head coach Neil Harper and it was the sprint group that produced some of the team's top results in 2008-09. Under the tutelage of Robins the group was part of five conference record breaking performances during the USA Short Course National Championships in December of 2008. Robins' group also earned Honorable Mention All-American status in the men's 400 free relay at the 2009 NCAA Championships and Jarryd Botha ended his storied career as a Seminole with a pair of All-ACC honors in the 100 free and 100 fly. The Seminole sprint group now has more than 30 All-ACC honors with Robins at the helm. In all, the men's and women's sprint groups had a hand in five school records while almost every swimmer in the group earned a collegiate best time in at least one event.

Robins' helped add a new chapter to FSU's illustrious sprinting history in 2008. Under the coaching of Robins' junior Scott Baker had a career year culminating with All-America honors in the 50 free at the NCAA Championships. Baker swam a personal best 19.49 to earn a seventh-place finish. Baker's time is now second only to Seminole legend Brendon Dedekind. Robins' also helped lead senior Lauren Sparg to her first career individual honorable mention All-America honors with her 11th place finish in the 100 fly. Sparg was also the ACC Champion in the 100 fly and now owns the school record in both the 100 and 200 fly events.

Five Seminoles qualified for the 2007 NCAA Championships in sprint events. Florida State sprinters have earned ten All-American honors during Robins' tenure. Most recently on the women's side, Christy Cech won back-to-back (2001-02) All-America awards in the 50 freestyle. The Seminoles have also brought home 17 All-America certificates in the 200 and 400 freestyle relays.

Under Robins, FSU sprinters have now won 17 ACC titles in

the 50 and 100 freestyle events and 20 gold medals in the 200 and 400 freestyle relays. All told, more than 25 sprinters have collected All-ACC honors.

Prior to coach Harper's return, Robins worked primarily with the stroke disciplines and individual medley specialists. He most notably worked with Stephan Parry, an NCAA Finalist, as well as a 2004 Olym-

pic bronze medalist. During that time Robins also coached Seminole All-Americans, Anne Blachford, Keam Ang and Nelson Mora.

Florida State's team results during his tenure speak for themselves. The men's squad has scored points at the NCAA Championships in eight of his last 12 years, including four of the past five, with the highest finish in school history, a ninth-place showing in 1997. The women's 16th-place finish in 2006 was their best ever and part of 11 trips to the NCAA Championships since 1995.

Since 1995, the Seminoles have had just one sub .500 season and have a combined 255 dual-meet victories.

Even prior to his graduation from college, Robins had been actively involved in coaching and his involvement with local swimming and diving dates back more than 20 years. His association with swimming in the Big Bend began in 1985 when he took a position with the Area of Tallahassee Aquatic Club. Robins took over the head coaching duties for ATAC in 1993 and led the squad to a top ten finish at the 1996 Junior National Championships.

In conjunction with his work with ATAC, Robins served as the head coach at Leon High School in Tallahassee from 1986-91. After only his second year on the job he was named High School Coach of the Year by the Tallahassee Democrat.

He also served as head coach for the Florida All-Star Team in 1990 and 1991 after spending the previous two seasons as an assistant coach. Away from the pool Robins served on the Florida Swimming Board of Directors, the House of Delegates and the Technical Planning Committee from 1987-98.

A 1983 graduate of The College of William & Mary with a bachelor's in psychology, he earned his master's in science education from Florida State in 1987. While in college, Robins swam both the backstroke and distance freestyle events. His swimming accomplishments at William & Mary include setting the school record in the 1650 freestyle while also serving as co-captain.

The 51-year-old Robins and his wife Karen have four children, Beth (33), Kurt (32), Jenna (26) and Annemarie (15).

HEAD DIVING COACH PATRICK JEFFREY

To mold a championship diver it takes a true champion, and Florida State's Patrick Jeffrey certainly fits that bill. A three-time NCAA Champion and two-time Olympian, Jeffrey was inducted into the Ohio State University Athletics Hall of Fame in 2005. Entering his 12th year in Tallahassee, his experience has helped Florida State divers re-write the ACC and Seminole record books year after year.

Just when it looked like the ACC is catching up to the Seminoles on the boards, Jeffrey's group once again asserted its dominance in 2010. Florida State divers had a presence at the NCAA Championships with both Terry Horner and Landon Marzullo earning top 16 finishes. Horner finished his brilliant career with a pair of All-American finishes on the one and three-meter boards while Marzullo earned honorable mention All-American honors on the one and three-meter boards. The Seminole divers also dominated the podium at the ACC meet. On the men's side Horner (1M & 3M), Marzullo (1M) and junior Mike Neubacher (platform) earned All-ACC honors while junior Katherine Adham (1M) and seniors Aleia Monden (platform) and Katie Sirounis (3M) earned All-ACC awards on the women's side.

After a record breaking season in 2008, the Seminole divers once again took their performance to another level in 2009. Terry Horner became the most decorated diver in Florida State history earning All-American honors on the three-meter and Honorable Mention All-American status on the one-meter, adding to his previous four All-American awards. Jeffrey also helped lead the divers to an ACC Championship, guiding Dan Frebel to his first career title on the platform and five All-ACC honors at the ACC Championships. In all, the FSU divers broke three school records in 2009.

Jeffrey has also helped usher in a new era in international competition for the Garnet and Gold with Horner earning a place on the 2009 World Championship team. Horner earned a 16th place finish in the one-meter. Horner also finished second in the one-meter at the USA Diving National Championships later in the summer of 2009 and seventh in the three-meter.

The 2008 season was business as usual for Florida State divers with three All-American performances, four All-ACC results and two ACC Championships. On the men's side Jeffrey's four divers under Jeffrey earned 10 top-eight finishes at the ACC Championships led by a pair of victories by Horner (one-meter, three-meter) and a pair of second place finishes by Frebel (three-meter, platform). The women also held their own at the ACC Championships with the team's four divers earning points in 11 out-of 12 opportunities. At the NCAA meet, Horner once again earned All-American honors with a third-place finish on the one-meter and Honorable Mention All-American honors on the three-meter. Aleia Monden also earned her first career Honorable Mention All-American honor on the platform. Jeffrey's divers now have a total of 15 All-America certificates during his time at FSU.

Jeffrey's divers made a significant statement at the USA Diving National Championships in 2008 where Horner captured the National Title on the one-meter and third-place honors on the three-meter. Frebel finished in seventh place in the platform dive, while he and teammate Scott Derner took home fourth-place in the men's three-meter synchronized competition solidifying the men's team third-place finish at Nationals. On the women's side Monden placed third with

her partner in the platform synchronized competition.

An NCCA Division I Champion himself, Jeffrey can now say he's coached one with Terry Horner's victory in 2007 on the one-meter board.

Since Jeffrey's arrival in 1999, he's not only put Florida State Diving on the map, he's set the standard for diving in the entire conference. Seminole divers have captured 20 of the 48 ACC championships on the boards during Jeffrey's tenure. Under his guidance Florida State has claimed

at least one conference title on the men's side in seven of the past 11 seasons and the school's four-straight championships on the one-meter and three more in the three-meter have not been equaled in nearly 20 years. Additionally 15 of Jeffrey's divers have earned All-ACC honors and over the last 11 seasons, Florida State divers have claimed four Women's ACC Divers of the Meet awards, three Men's ACC Diver of the Meet honors as well as a Women's ACC Swimming & Diving Rookie of the Year accolade.

The only records not owned by Jeffrey's divers are from All-Americans Paul Spray and Wendy Fuller which will stand forever because of event format changes.

Jeffrey's coaching accolades also stretch internationally. On the world stage, he most recently was a member of the USA Diving coaching staff at the 2009 World Championships in Rome, Italy where he coached Horner. In 2007 Jeffrey was a member of the United States World University Games staff where he coached two of his own student-athletes, Horner and Frebel. He was on the 2000 US Olympic team coaching staff along with the 1997 and 1999 US Senior World Cup staffs. He also coached the 2001 US World Championship team in Fukioka, Japan. He has served as a Senior National team coach from 1997-2000 with a one year stint (1998) with the Junior National Team. Under Jeffrey's tutelage, divers have won five US Senior National titles, three Junior National championships, and a pair of third place finishes for the Senior Men's team in US national competition.

Jeffrey's wealth of diving knowledge is a direct result of his own career. A seven-time All-American, he highlighted his tenure at Ohio State with a tremendous senior season in 1988. He became the first, and still only, diver in NCAA history to sweep all three diving events with championships on the one-meter, three-meter and platform, earning him 1988 NCAA Diver of the Year. Leading up to those NCAA Championships, he swept the Big Ten Conference meet as well and was honored with 1988 Big Ten Diver of the Year.

On the international scene, Jeffrey was a finalist on the ten-meter platform at the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, South Korea and the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Ga. He is a five-time U.S. National Diving Champion splitting those championships between disciplines with three in the ten-meter platform event while holding a pair of titles in the three-meter springboard event. He was also the US Olympic Trials Champion on platform in 1996. In addition, he won bronze medals at the 1991 and 1995 Pan-Am games. He competed as a member of the US's 1989 and 1995 World Cup teams as well as at the 1993 Goodwill Games Team.

Most importantly, Jeffrey has drawn from all his experiences on the boards and as a coach to structure a program that is designed to develop up and coming athletes into national and world level contenders. He takes from the knowledge that he obtained in his 20 years as an athlete and the subsequent 15 years at the world and national levels.

ASSISTANT COACH GARY TAYLOR

Entering his fourth season with the Seminoles, Gary Taylor looks to continue making the distance group at Florida State one of the premier programs in the ACC.

Taylor's swimmers have accounted for six- NCAA appearances, and seven school records. Contributing to that number this past

season was junior Charlotte Broadbent. She set a new mark in the 500 free at 4:42.92. Senior Mateo DeAngulo also represented the Seminole distance group this summer by competing at the FINA World Championships in Shanghai, China. While a member of the Colombian National team, DeAngulo now owns all three distance records (400m, 800m and 1500m), thus earning the crown as Colombia's fastest distance swimmer ever.

In just his second season in charge of the Seminole distance program, Taylor made tremendous progress on the women's side. Under the direction of Taylor three women broke school records in 2010. Broadbent broke the school record in the 1650 free, Marissa Harrington earned school record in the 1000 free. The women's group also sent two representatives to the NCAA Championships in Broadbent and Harrington. The highlight of the year for Taylor came at the ACC Championships when Broadbent earned All-ACC honors with her third-place finish in the 1650 free, shattering the school record in only the second mile of her career. On the men's side Taylor helped train junior Ian Rowe to his third consecutive NCAA Championship.

Taylor proved that his coaching techniques were effective in his first season with the team, guiding Florida State's distance swimmers to a pair of NCAA appearances, five school records and numerous personal best swims. The group was led by Kyle Young who earned NCAA Honorable Mention All-American status in the 800 free relay and competed at the NCAA Championships in the 500 free and 1650 free. Under Taylor's instruction, Young was able to break his own school record in the 500 free and 1650 free and broke the school record in the 400 individual medley an event that Young had not competed in previously. Young earned All-ACC honors in the 500 and 1650 free as well. Taylor also helped lead Ian Rowe to the NCAA Championships for the second consecutive season in the 500 and 1650 free and a fifth-place finish in the 1650 free at the ACC Championships. On the women's side, Taylor took the most pride in watching Meredith Martelle swim personal best times in the 400 individual medley and 200 back at the ACC Championships.

Prior to joining the Florida State staff, Taylor coached for the Dynamo Swim Club in Atlanta, Ga. for three years. In 2007 he was named the Georgia Age Group Coach of the Year. Taylor also gained experience working with the Senior 1, Senior 2 and Masters Levels during his time at Dynamo.

Prior to Dynamo, Taylor spent six years coaching with the Twin Cities Swim Team as the lead site coach in Minnetonka, Minn. Taylor's track record of developing champions began with Twin Cities. He had the opportunity to guide his swimmers to become USA and Minnesota high school state champions, USA and Minnesota high school state record holders, Junior National qualifiers, high school All-Americans, Minnesota Masters record holders and Masters National top 10 performers.

Taylor graduated from the University of Minnesota in 2001 while earning his B.S. in Sport Management. While at Minnesota, he was a member of the Golden Gopher swim team including the Big Ten championship team in 1998. Taylor has also earned his ASCA Level 4 rating and continues to gain knowledge in the sport of swimming through coaching and education.

ASSISTANT COACH TRICIA HARM



Tricia Harm is in her first season at FSU and joins the Seminoles with a wealth of swimming experience. She spent last season as a part of Clemson's staff and prior to that stint, she served as an assistant for the University of Miami for two seasons.

During her career at Georgia, she was portrayed as the ideal team-player by establishing a substantial role on the 2005 National Championship squad as well as the 2006 SEC Championship team, which knocked off the heavily favored Auburn Tigers.

Also in 2006, she was crowned a National Champion as a member of the 200 Medley Relay, swimming the backstroke leg of the race. Her teammates included Mary DeScenza and Kara Lynn Joyce, both of whom competed in several Olympics and World Championships for the United States. In addition, Harm also claimed a pair of second places at the NCAA meet as a part of the 200 and 400 freestyle relay teams. Individually in 2006, she finished second in the 200 IM at the NCAA Championships.

Today, her times are still among the top swims in the history of the Bulldog program. She is also a three-time Olympic Trial qualifier.

As an eight-time All-American, Harm also excelled in the classroom establishing herself as an Academic All-American.

After her swimming career at the University of Georgia, Harm attended The Ohio State University as a graduate student, where she coached on both the collegiate and club levels.

Harm is a native of Philadelphia, PA. She earned a degree in Sports Studies and a minor in Sociology from the University of Georgia in 2006. She went on to attain a master's degree in Sport and Exercise Management from The Ohio State University.

ASSISTANT DIVING COACH YAHYA RADMAN

Heading into his second season, Yahya (YA-Hia), Radman continues to be a vital asset to one of the most powerful diving programs in the country in his assistant coach role.

After a successful season in 2010-11, Radman was named to coach Team USA at the World University games in Shenzhen, China over the summer. During the competition, he was able to coach Senior Landon Marzullo to a fourth place finish in the Men's 3-meter synchro event.

In just his first season as assistant coach, Radman helped guide each of the Seminole divers to the NCAA zone qualifier, with two of them moving onto the NCAA meet. Marzullo garnered All-American honors and sophomore Mike Neubacher earned honorable mention honors. The Seminole divers would also go onto medal in each of the events at the ACC Championship. In addition, Radman helped lead the men's team to a championship at the 2010 USA Diving winter nationals.

Aside from his coaching duties, Radman serves as the meet director for several big events at the Morcom Aquatics Center, including World Syncro Championship Trials, Spring Masters Nationals and the USA Zone Diving Meet. He is also the head coach and camp director for the Seminole Diving Academy.

Radman arrived in Tallahassee in 2010 after spending a year in Egypt and a year and a half in the Republic of China as an ESL teacher and diving consultant.

Radman was born in Austria, and was educated in the Yemen, United States and France. A core philosophy in Radman is that anyone can coach, but only a few can teach. He learned this while teaching in Egypt and Taiwan prior to moving to Tallahassee with his wife. His ability to communicate is one of the most crucial aspects to having and being a part of a successful program.

Before his travels, Radman was the Director of Operations for the Indiana University Swimming and Diving teams (2006) and the head age group coach of Indiana Diving where he had been since his high school years in 1999. Starting as a diver in the club and working his way to assistant head coach, he learned the art and sport of diving under many accomplished coaches and colleagues.

After returning from a year abroad during 2004-2005 in Aix-en-Provence, France, Radman became the head coach of INDiving's Junior Olympic Team and dedicated his efforts to bringing the club to the elite status that it once held when he was a diver. Under his direction, Radman's divers won local and regional championships on a regular basis. They qualified to nationals as well as finished in the top spots in the Indiana State Championships, U.S. Zone meets and Nationals. In the summer of 2001, as a junior in high school, he started his coaching career at the Indiana University Outdoor Pool "Learn to Dive" program, which he took over the following summer. In the fall of 2002, Radman was offered the Lessons Program position with Indiana Diving and had a hand in operating the club. He was also the head coach for a number of high school and middle school programs in the area.

Radman is married to Anisa Ghrairi Radman from Charlotte, N.C., who is pursuing a Master's in ESL. He graduated from Indiana University in 2005 with a Bachelor's of the Arts (B.A.) degree in French as well as in Near Eastern Languages and Cultures and is fluent in Arabic and French.

Although he's recently graduated from that United States Sports Academy in Daphne, Ala., he began his collegiate career swimming at LSU.

SEASON OUTLOOK

There's a buzz out at the Morcom Aquatics Center this season as the Seminoles look to improve on last year's third place ACC finishes. With an outstanding core of leadership from senior captains Michael Aitken, Mike Neubacher, Lisi Rowland, Tori Richmond and junior Jamie Barrett, in addition to multiple talented veterans, combined with an eager group of freshmen and transfers, they certainly have the tools to build yet another successful season.

Over the summer, the Seminoles built a great deal of momentum for the 2011-12 season. A total of 14 Seminoles qualified for Olympic Trials, 13 competed in national competitions and one displayed his talents on the world stage.

The class of 2015 is loaded with talent in that all 17 incoming freshman have had success on the national level, swimming for prestigious USA Swimming club teams and high schools. Four of those incoming freshman are a part of that Olympic Trial statistic and will compete at the event in June. "They've set themselves up to come here and contribute," head coach Neil Harper said. "We are excited to get them here to train with our upper classmen and raise the bar for our program. For our entire incoming freshman to be able to compete at national level really builds their confidence and with that hopefully we can have a great year."

Elizabeth Pepper, who is arguably the most versatile swimmer in the group, comes to Tallahassee with two Olympic Trial qualifying marks in the 200m free and 200m fly and will be a great addition to the Seminole middle distance group. Qualifying in the 100 free, Kaitlyn Dressel will be a key addition to the sprints and will be a factor in relays.

On the men's side Josh Friedel, accomplished Olympic Trial times at the 2011 Junior National Championships in the 100 and 200 back and in the process turned in the second fastest time in both distances at the meet. Juan Sequera has also made the mark in the 400 IM, but is hopeful to display his talents in the Olympic spotlight for Venezuela.

The biggest addition to the diving program is junior Ariel Rittenhouse in the springboard diving events. An Olympian in 2008, Rittenhouse joins team after a two year stint at the University of Southern California and she is looking to get back on the Olympic track.

Although the Seminoles graduated 102 ACC points from the men's diving program they've added a gem in freshman Ford McLiney, who comes to Tallahassee as one of America's most talented divers. This summer he recorded a 10th place finish at the AT&T Diving National, qualifying him for the 2012 Olympic Team Trials. In addition to tower, he will also contribute in the springboard events.

This season, Harper and the rest of the coaching staff has tailored the schedule to challenge the Seminoles on both sides, filled with ranked SEC opponents, including Alabama, LSU, South Carolina and Florida. These challenges will ultimately prepare them for the end of the season ACC Championships.

The toughest weekend on the Seminoles schedule is set for October 14 and 15 when LSU, Alabama and South Carolina come to town with the Noles battling the Tigers on Friday, and the Tide and Gamecocks on Saturday.

"We're the type of team that doesn't back down from a challenge, therefore we've scheduled both ACC and SEC teams so we can get those challenges early and often." Harper added.

The Seminoles will also face a tough, all-around challenge when they make their first trip up to Christiansburg, Va. to face Virginia Tech, Duke and UNC-Wilmington. This meet give the Noles and opportunity to compete at the venue where the ACC Championship will be hosted on Feb 15-18 and Feb. 22-25.

Men's Outlook

Free

In the sprint events, the Seminoles have a solid core led by juniors Trice Bailey and Mark Weber. Both have chances to make debuts on the NCAA level in relays and individual events. Joining the group is University of Kentucky transfer David Sanders, who was a prime factor in the sprint relays for the Wildcats.

Although he competed for half of the season last year, senior Mateo De Angulo is looking to make a statement in the ACC this year. Over the summer, De Angulo participated in the World Championships in Shanghai, China and recorded his fastest 800m free time en route to becoming Colombia's fastest distance swimmer ever. He now holds the Colombian national records in the 400m, 800m and 1500m free events.

Breast

The Seminoles graduated 66 ACC points worth of talent in the breaststroke events, including All-American and NCAA seventh place finisher in Rob Holderness. Filling in the gap, will be Sequera, freshman Doug Ramos and transfer sophomore Alex Rodriguez.

Fly

The fly events will feature a number of different Seminoles. Looking to contribute in both distances are , Mark Cox and Danny Ngyuen. Both more effective at the 200 distance where they both swam in the consolation heat of the ACC Championships last season.

Sanders, Weber and newcomer Cadell Lyons will make an impact at the 100 dis

tance. Last season, Weber was the only Seminole to earn a second swim at the ACC Championships.

In the 200 distance, De Angulo could contribute in addition to junior Ngyuen and Cox, however another weapon will be used in freshman Connor Knight. Knight qualified for Olympic Trials in the event over the summer.

Back

Backstroke will be an extremely competitive group for the Seminoles, with four guys looking to score on the ACC level, led by junior Brad Morrison and a trio of rookies to watch out for in Fridel, Harrison Brogden and Kevin Rogers. All three freshmen competed in both the 100 and 200 backstroke events at the 2011 Junior National Championships.

Individual Medley

This group will be led by sophomore Mike Thomas and Tyler Ball, who both competed in the IM events at the 2011 ConocoPhillips National Championships. Thomas would go on to make the Olympic Trial time in the 400 IM and Ball would come very close to that mark. They will be joined by Sequera, who is the current Venezuelan National Champion in the 400m IM.

Diving

One of the strongest programs in the ACC, the Seminole will feature four talented athletes that could be showcased on the national level. Although McLiney will be debuting for the Noles, returning is senior captain Mike Neubacher, who claimed an All-American honorable mention with an 11th place finish at NCAA's last season on the 10-meter platform. His brother, sophomore Thomas Neubacher took seventh on all three boards at last year's ACC Championships and junior Nick Klein had a great summer by placing sixth in the synchronized platform event at the AT&T USA Diving Nationals. He will look to build off his 11th place finish on the platform from ACC's this season.

Women's Outlook

Free

Sophomore Tiffany Oliver will lead the Seminoles in the sprint events, but following her closely will be a plethora of freshmen in Kaitlyn Dressel, Ginny Grams and Katie Cook. All three freshmen have had previous experience racing each other on the premier stage of Florida High School State swimming. Both Oliver and Dressel both will represent the Seminoles at the Olympic Trials in at least one sprint event.

An all-around talented freestyler, Senior Charlotte Broadbent will be the featured Seminole in the distance events. She comes into her senior season as the record holder in the 500 and 1650 freestyle and is looking to qualify for her second NCAA championships. Joining her is junior Marissa Harrington, who also holds the school record in the 1000 free. Sophomore Julia Henkel could step in for the Seminoles in the middle distance events.

Breast

A solid and competitive area for the Seminoles is in the breaststroke events. The Noles return a Trio of scorers from last year's ACC meet in junior Kristine Polley, Richmond and Barrett. Sophomores Melissa Cooper, a transfer from Texas A&M and Kendall Sieron are looking to make an impact in both distances as well.

All three ladies put up big numbers at the ACC Championships last season, including two third place finishes from Rowland and Young.

Fly

Looking to improve on last season's 10th place finish in the 200 fly at the ACC Championships will be Henkel as she is the only returning scorer in the fly events. This stroke will also feature a pair of newcomers in both Grams and Pepper. Grams specializes in the 100 distance and will also contribute to the medley relays and Pepper is an ace at the 200.

Back

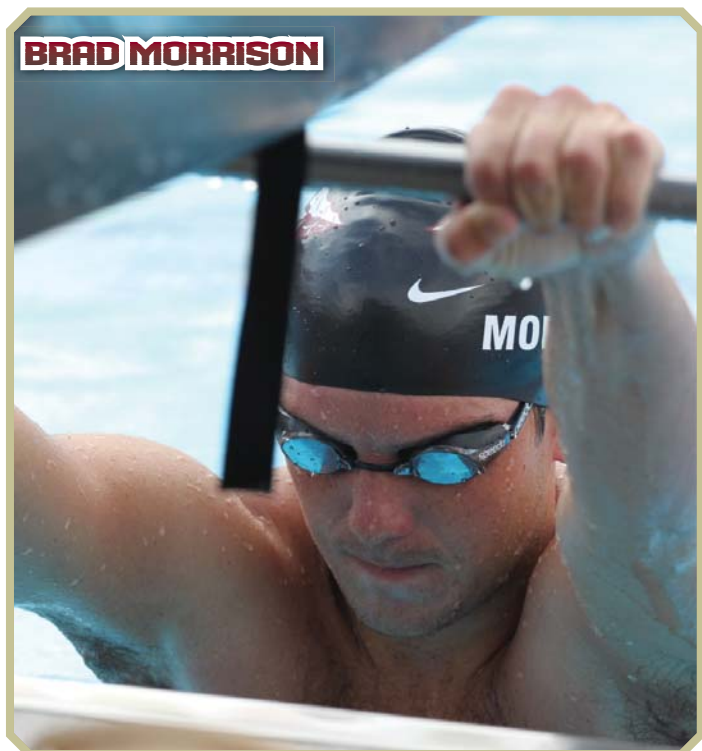
This group will be highlighted by senior Stephanie Sarandos, who is a three-time NCAA qualifier and school record holder. Three veterans

- For the third consecutive season the Seminole men earned a top 25 finish at the NCAA Championships. Florida State was one of only three teams to have both a swimmer and a diver earn individual All-American honors.
- Seniors Rob Holderness and Landon Marzullo both earned All-American honors with seventh-place finishes in the 200 breast and three-meter diving competitions respectively. Marzullo also earned honorable mention All-American honors placing 15th on the one-meter board. Junior Mike Neubacher earned honorable mention accolades placing 11th on the platform.
- Junior Stephanie Sarandos qualified for the Women's NCAA Championships for the third consecutive season. She competed in the 200 back, 100 back and 200 IM.
- The women placed third at the ACC Championships with three earning All-ACC honors. Junior Lisi Rowland earned third-place finishes on the one and three-meter boards including a school record breaking performance on the three-meter. Junior Stephanie Sarandos placed third in the 200 back for the third consecutive year and freshman Katrina Young earned All-ACC honors in her first career ACC Championship appearance on the platform.
- The men also placed third at the ACC Championships as six garnered All-ACC honors. Senior Rob Holderness became the first Seminole to sweep the breaststroke events earning ACC Championships in both the 100 and 200 breast. Senior Landon Marzullo was runner-up in all three diving events, placing second on the one and three-meter and platform competition. Three Seminole seniors earned a spot on the podium for the first time as Matt Shead placed second in the 100 breast, Robby Hayes finished third in the 200 IM and 100 free and Jordan Horsley placed third on the one-meter. Junior Mike Neubacher placed third for the second consecutive year on the platform. His brother, freshman Tom Neubacher grabbed seventh place on all three boards at the ACC Championships.
- The men's and women's swimming and diving programs contributed to an overall institution success. Each of Florida State's athletic programs were represented at the NCAA Championships.
- The men's diving team won the team title at the 2010 USA Diving Winter National Championships.
- A total of 14 athletes from both teams were named to the ACC All-Academic Honor Roll.
- During the regular season, both teams were able to knock-off archrival Florida in a dual meet for just the second time in program history.
- Freshman Thomas Neubacher and Juniors Elysse Rowland and Jessica Sabotin won the Golden Torch award for recording the teams highest GPA.
- A total of seven school records were broken in 2010-2011. Freshman Tiffany Oliver posted a 49.26 in the 100 free, junior Charlotte Broadbent set a new mark in the 500 free at 4:42.92, junior Tori Richmond arrived from Tennessee in the middle of the season and claimed the record in the 200 IM at 1:59.04 and junior Elysse Rowland set a new mark for 6 dives on 3-meter with a score of 365.65. For the men, Senior Robby Hayes captured a new record in the 100 free with a time of 43.38 in addition to the 200 IM at 1:45.81. THE MORCOM AQUATICS CENTER

In 2008 Florida State opened its new \$10.5 million Morcom Aquatic Center. The state-of-the-art facility is located off-campus next to the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course. The main pool features up to 30 practice lanes and maintains a temperature of 80 degrees.



FSU will be swimming in the same pool that hosted the 2005 FINA World Championships in Montreal, Canada. During those World Championships nine world records were broken. Included in the record breaking performances were American's Aaron Peirsol (200m back), Ian Crocker (100m fly) and Jessica Hardy (100m breast).

The diving well features two one-meter and two three-meter springboards as well as one, three, five, seven-and-a-half and 10 meter platforms. The platforms are 10 feet wide making them the widest in the nation. The diving pool is kept temperature controlled at 82 degrees and also features a compression bubble used to soften a divers impact during entry while practicing platform dives. Divers will also be able to practice their dives using the dryland equipment which includes two springboards attached to an intricate rope and pulley system and a trampoline.

Spacious locker rooms and coaches offices are located in the adjoined 10,000 square-foot building, which house the

athletes equipment and coaching staff

Since the unveiling, Florida State has hosted several prime events. The Morcom Aquatics Center served as host to the 2009 USA Diving Nationals, the 2010 National Zone Diving Championships and the 2010 US Master Championships. It also was the diving training site for the 2009 World Championships, which took place in Rome, Italy.

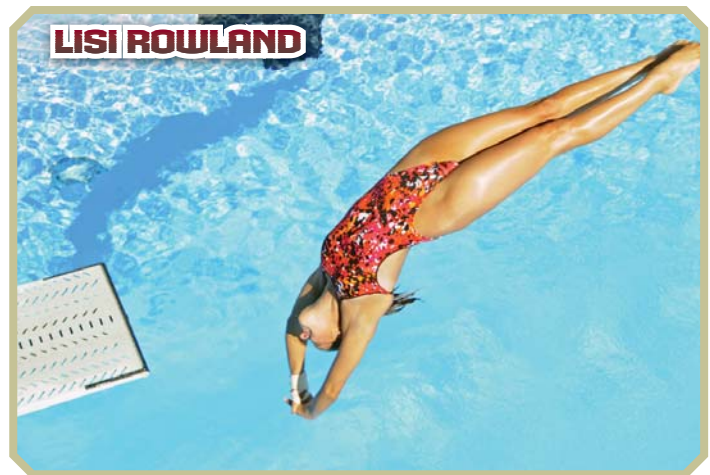

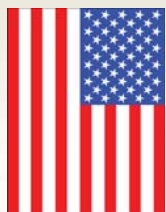

For an athlete, the highest honor a nation can bestow upon them is to have them represent their country in the Olympic Games. It is a childhood dream that comes true. Since the 1976 Games in Montreal, Canada, the Summer Olympics have had a Garnet and Gold feel to them. All told, 14 current and former Florida State swimmers and divers have represented 11 different countries.

Dating back to Florida State's first Olympic representative in the pool, diver Phil Boggs at the 1976 Games, the Seminoles have had at least one representative in all but two of the last eight Olympics. At the 2004 Games in Athens, Greece, Florida State had five representatives – the second highest total in school history – and former Seminole Parry produced the school's second medal in the pool as he took the bronze in the 200-meter butterfly.

The last three Olympic Games have been especially bountiful for Florida State representation at the aquatics center. Eleven of the Seminoles' 14 Olympians took part in either the Atlanta, Sydney, Athens or Beijing Games. The 2000 Sydney Olympics saw FSU's highest participation as six former Seminoles competed at the event. In the last two Games, Florida State has had eight different participants.

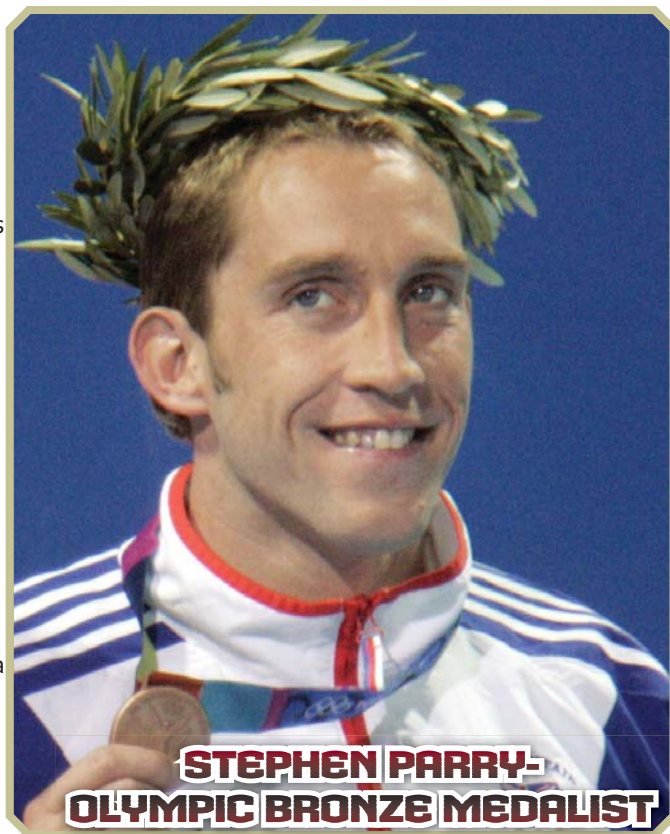
Success was immediate for the Seminoles the first time they had an athlete in the pool at the Olympics. Diving for the United States, Boggs captured the school's first medal when he won gold during the springboard event in Montreal. It would be another 28 years before a Seminole would appear on the medal stand after Great Britain's Stephen Parry captured the bronze in the 200-meter butterfly.

While Parry ended Florida State's 28-year medal drought, a different dry spell of almost equal length was halted as well in Athens. In 1980, Wendy Fuller became the first female FSU swimmer or diver, and only the second overall, to compete in the Olympics when she dove for her native Canada. It wasn't until 2004 when the Seminoles had their second female in the water as Golda Marcus, competing for El Salvador, swam in the 400 and 800-meter freestyle. Besides being only the second female Olympian in the program's history, Marcus is part of another elite group. She and teammate Chris Vythoulkas—a member of this year's Bahaman team—are two of only four FSU swimmers to ever compete in the Olympics while still part of the active roster. The first pair of current Seminoles to compete in the Games was South African Brendon Dedekind and Rob Braknis of Canada when they swam in the 1996 Atlanta Games.

The most current participant in the Olympic Games is newcomer Ariel Rittenhouse. As a 17 year old, Rittenhouse finished fourth in the 3-meter synchronized event.

Up until this year, no Seminole had participated in more than two Olympic Games. All of that changed in 2004 as Julio Santos made his third appearance in the games for Ecuador. A two-year All-American, Santos made his first trip to the Games in 1996 then returned in 2000. All told, five Florida State swimmers and divers have participated in more than one Olympics.

Florida State has been well represented on the pool deck by a pair of coaches. Head coach Neil Harper, an Olympian himself in 1984 and 1988, served as the head coach for South Africa in 2000, while returning in 2004 as a member of the Swaziland coaching staff. Diving coach Patrick Jeffrey made the trip to Seoul and Atlanta as an athlete and then four years later to Sydney as a coach for the United States.

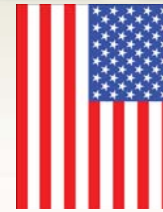

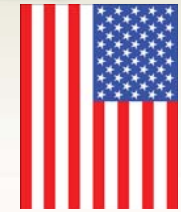

When the collegiate careers of Florida State University swimmers and divers are finished, it doesn't necessarily mean they are done in the water. Over the last ten years current and former Seminoles have made a name for themselves on the international scene. Representing ten different countries, Florida State athletes have competed at the top level of swimming and diving in biggest events on the planet, including the Olympics and World Championships.

2011 Pan-American Games

Taking a break from collegiate competition, senior Mateo De Angulo competed in the 200m and 1500m free for Colombian and sophomore McKayla Lightbourn swam the 200 IM, 200 back, 100 and 200 breast events for the Bahamas.

2011 FINA World Championships

Senior Mateo DeAngulo competed in the 200m, 400m, and 800m freestyle events for Colombia. While in Shanghai, DeAngulo became the fastest distance swimming in Colombian history, by setting the national record in the 800m free. He currently holds all the national records in the distance events.

2011 World University Games

Seniors Landon Marzullo competed in the 1-meter and 3-meter springboards as well as the 10 meter platform. His best event was the 3-meter synchronized event where he was a part of a fourth place finish. Assistant Diving Coach Yayha Radman also represented the United States as a coach.

2010 Commonwealth Games

Senior Rob Holderness began his final season at Florida State in Dehli, India, competing in the Commonwealth Games. Holderness represented his native Wales in style placing sixth in the 200 breast and ninth in the 100 breast. The Honorable Mention All-American hopes that this meet will be a stepping stone to the 2012 Olympics in London.

2010 FINA World Junior Diving Championship

Freshman Ford McLIney represented the United States in his first international competition by diving individually on all three boards.

2009 World Diving Championships

Florida State diver Terry Horner accomplished many things as a Seminole, but perhaps one of his greatest achievements was representing his country at the 2009 World Championships in Rome, Italy. The NCAA Champion qualified for the event on the one-meter and earned the opportunity to compete against the worlds elite on one of the events biggest stages. Current transfer from USC, Ariel Rittenhouse earned fifth place on the 3-meter synchronized event.

2008 FINA World Junior Swimming Championships

Sophomore Rob Holderness competed against some of the world's best young swimmers and placed third in the 200 breast at the 2008 FINA World Junior Swimming Championships in Monterrey, Mexico. Holderness touched the wall in 2:15.67 to earn a bronze medal.

2008 World Diving Cup

Before her appearance at the Olympic Games, Junior Ariel Rittenhouse earned the bronze medal in the 3-meter synchronized event at the World Cup in Beijing.

2007 World University Games

In 2007 three Florida State athletes competed in the World University Games in Bangkok, Thailand. Jarryd Botha, Dan Frebel and Terry Horner competed against the world's best swimmers and divers with Horner coming away with the groups best finish a seventh place mark on the 1m board. Horner was the highest American finisher in the event.

2007 Pan American Games

At the age of 16, Ariel Rittenhouse earned the silver medal in the 3-meter synchronized event in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.
