## FLORIDA STATE GOLF CAMPS

Since 2004, Seminole Golf Camps have been providing top-level instruction to junior campers from around the country. The goal is to provide campers with an extensive, personalized learning experience. Each camper will get a taste of what collegiate golf is all about. From practicing at the private Florida State University team facilities, to staying on campus in residence halls, to learning from some of the top collegiate coaches in the country, and listening to current team members talk about their experiences, this camp will expose you to life as a Seminole Golfer.

The Seminole Day Camp is targeted for local junior golfers who have an interest in playing golf and improving their skills. The camp focuses on fundamentals of the game including: grip, swing mechanics, putting stroke and playing rules. The camp takes place at the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course, home of the Seminole men's and women's golf teams' state of the art practice facility. It is a fun and challenging environment, with men's and women's golf team members serving as camp counselors. Campers should have some experience with golf and will need their own set of clubs. This camp is open to male and female golfers age 7-15.

The Seminole Overnight Camp is for junior golfers who have experience playing golf but are ready to take their game to the next level. Whether you are trying to make your high school team, or are hoping to land a college golf scholarship, this camp is a must for you. Campers will have access to the Florida State University golf teams' private practice facility which includes state of the art video analysis with the V-1 Swing Analysis Program and Trackman System. We will analyze your fundamentals; then help you develop a practice plan that you will be able to utilize when you leave camp. We will also discuss tournament selection and preparation, course management, mental preparation and rules of the game.

This camp is designed for advanced golfers but tournament experience is not required. Golfers will be grouped according to skill and age level. This camp is open to both male and female golfers, age 11-17.



# DON VELLER SEMINOLE GOLF COURSE

The Dave Middleton Golf Complex and the Don Veller Seminole Golf Course are home to the PGA Golf Management Program, which is one of only a few programs in the country that is accredited by the Professional Golfer's Association of America. A 27,000-square-foot clubhouse, the Dave Middleton Golf Complex boasts private technologically advanced Wi-Fi classrooms, study and teaching labs, an internship library, a fully equipped club repair room, a pro shop, public locker rooms and the Renegade Grill. The \$7 million facility (for use by the Florida State Golf teams and PGM students only) is a two-building complex, which also includes a multi-directional driving range, a video analysis instructional center with hitting bays for inclement weather, chipping and putting greens, as well as locker rooms, team lounge, auditorium and fitness facility.

The golf course was renovated in 2004 with the reconstruction of all 18 greens, complexes, tee boxes and the state-of-the-art TiffEagle Turf was installed on all the putting surfaces. Each year the facility hosts over 60,000 rounds of golf. The golf course was recently recognized as one of the top 10 golf courses in the country by the National Golf Foundation for customer loyalty and satisfaction.



# 2016-17 SEASON PREVIEW

SEMINOLE S LOOK TO EARN 12 TH CONSECUTIVE NCAA APPEARANCE

The Florida State women's golf team, which won three of its four tournaments during the fall season, enters the spring 2017 season ranked No. 3 nationally with three Seminoles – senior Matilda Castren (No. 13), junior Morgane Mettraux (No. 18), senior Lydia Gumm (No. 93) -- ranked among the nation's top 100 individuals in the collegiate rankings by GolfWeek.

The Seminoles are also ranked No. 3 in the national rankings by GolfStat – the scoring system utilized by the NCAA to select and seed teams for the NCAA Championships in May.

Florida State's wins in the fall came at the Schooner Fall Classic, the Jim West Challenge, and the Cardinal Cup. The Seminoles carded 10 of 12 team rounds under par, averaged an ACC best 283.3 strokes per round, and carded its first nine rounds of the season under par. Florida State finished its four-match fall season 44 strokes under par.

Individually, the five Seminoles who made up the starting lineup throughout the fall season carded nearly half of their total rounds under par (28 of 60, 46.7 percent), earned two victories (Morgane Mettraux at the Schooner Fall Classic and Castren at the Jim West Challenge) and had each of their five players (Morgane Mettraux, Matilda Castren, Kim Mettraux, Lydia Gumm and Amanda Doherty) earn two top-10 finishes each. Castren (in the second round of the Jim West Challenge) and Kim Mettraux (in the first round of the Schooner Fall Classic) tied the school record with single rounds score of 65. Castren set the school record with a 203 three round tournament score and earned her school record sixth individual title at the Jim West Challenge.

"I am really proud of all of our girls because they have worked hard to achieve the success they are enjoying this fall" said head coach Amy Bond. "We played really well in the first four tournaments of the year. What we have to do between now at the Florida Challenge in January is continue to work in order to improve as individual golfers and as a team. I am excited to work with our team for the remainder of the fall and into the spring season."

The Seminoles' 12-member team will embark on a very ambi-



itious schedule during the spring – a schedule that Bond has prepared to get her team ready for the postseason in April.

"Our schedule includes five tournaments we played in last season and four that are new to our schedule," said Bond. "Our schedule includes events played on an exciting mix of courses with different types of grasses and against fields that will test us against the best teams in the country. I am really excited to play our way through our schedule because the courses and the competition are going to help us become a better team throughout the season."

"We are really looking forward to this season," said Bond. "I was happy with the fall season because we played well and learned a lot about ourselves. I am excited about the spring season where we can climb our ladder to success. We are

entering the spring season with a lot of opportunities ahead of us – a year that can be a lot of fun."

Florida State's firepower begins with its returning seniors – Castren and Gumm. Castren earned All-America honors as a freshman in 2014 and is a two-time All-ACC selection while Gumm earned All-ACC honors as a sophomore in 2015. Both golfers played in the 2016 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championships and have played in three NCAA Regional Championships and ACC Championships during their careers.

Castren holds the Florida State record for career stroke average (72.69) and is tied for the all-time Seminole lead with 18 career top-10 finishes. She became Florida State's second-ever regional champion as she finished in a tie for first at the 2016 NCAA Shoal Creek Regional Championship in leading the Seminoles to the best regional finish in school history (second).

Gumm, who has played in 33 career events, is ranked fourth in school history with a career stroke average of 74.26.

"It's very rare that you have two golfers with as much experience as Matilda and Lydia have on your roster," said Bond. "Our two leaders have played in a combined 65 events and a combined 187 rounds. Those are two incredible numbers for collegiate players. We are looking for both players to have special years as seniors."

For Castren has been one of the most successful golfers in school history. As Florida State's all-time leader in career wins, Castren will be a contender for ACC Player of the Year as well as All-America honors in 2017.

Gumm has played as well as any Seminole golfer in the past two seasons and is set for her best collegiate season as a senior. She finished in a tie for first at the spring 2016 Florida Challenge, finished in a tie for 15th at the NCAA Shoal Creek regional and earned six top-10 finishes as a junior.

"The great thing about Lydia is she has played good golf in her first three seasons and her best golf is ahead of her," said Bond. "She learned what it takes to win an event last season and she has played well on the biggest stages of our sport. Lydia played well in the summer leading up to her senior season and I see great things happening for her as a senior."

Kim and Morgane Metraux, a pair of juniors, are certainly on the fast track of becoming two of the top players in all of collegiate golf. Kim enters her junior season with the third-best stroke average in school history (74.30) while Morgane is not far behind with the seventh-best average in school history (74.50).

Kim, who has played in 21 career events, finished in a tie for second in the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up and earned six top-10 finishes as a sophomore. She was as good as she has been as a Seminole in finishing in a tie for seventh place at the spring 2016 NCAA Shoal Creek Regional.

"Kim continues to improve as a golfer," said Bond. "She is such a smart player who continuously thinks the game of golf. Her desire to get better every time she comes to practice has clearly been illustrated with her improvement during her first two seasons at Florida State. We expect her to continue to get better in the final two seasons of her career

as a Seminole.

Morgane, who finished in the top three in the individual standings at both the Gator Women's Invitational and the Briar's Creek Invitational, is also just beginning to realize her incredible potential as a golfer.

"Morgane has such a high ceiling as a golfer, as does Kim," said Bond. "Her play as a sophomore with pair of top-10 finishes and a stellar performance in the NCAA Finals really displayed her incredible potential. Morgane's performances during the summer of 2016 illustrated how good of a golfer she can become."

Kayla Jones, one of five returning members of the Seminoles' lineup from their successful season in 2016, enters her junior season with a tremendous amount of confidence after playing in 12 events as a sophomore. She finished with a career-best 74.91 stroke average and played as a member of the Seminoles' lineup in the NCAA Championship Finals. Jones finished in a tie for third place in the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic and in 12th place at the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up.

"Kayla has really persevered and that has helped her improve during her first two seasons at Florida State," said Bond. "She has played in 21 events in her first two seasons

including an NCAA regional and the 2016 NCAA Finals – she knows what it takes to be successful."

Senior Anna Sophia Böhmer, a senior, and Dominika Gradecka, a sophomore, will work hard to earn a spot in the lineup throughout the year.

Böhmer, who played in the spring 2014 NCAA East Regional Championships, has been one of the Seminoles' steadiest players during the first three years of her career.

Gradecka enjoyed a fine freshman season as she played in four events in helping the Seminoles earn their 11th consecutive NCAA Championships berth.

A pair of upperclassmen – senior Sherrell Buckley and junior Lexie Flerlage – will continue to work for playing time as both add depth to the Seminoles' roster.

Florida State's staff recruited well and brought in three freshmen who all have the ability to play for the Seminoles this season. All three – Amanda Doherty, Ashley Mangan and Sandra Salonen – will have the opportunity to earn their way into Florida State's lineup as soon as they arrive on campus in the fall.

"We are really excited about this group of newcomers," said Bond. "All three are very skilled players who will help us throughout their careers. We think they can all contribute this season and are confident in their abilities to be successful quickly."





# HEAD COACH AMY BOND

## SEVENTH-YEAR HEAD COACH TAKING SEMINOLES TO NEW HEIGHTS



First as a player, then an assistant coach, and now in her seventh season as its head coach, Amy Bond's energy and enthusiasm for elevating the success and storied tradition of the Florida State program is rivaled by few coaches in all of collegiate golf. During her first six seasons as Florida State's head women's golf coach, Bond has coached two All-Americans, two regional champions, eight All-ACC selections, 19 All-ACC Academic Honor Roll selections with 39 academic honors, 12 players who have been named to the All-ACC Academic team and four who have been named to the All-America Scholar Athlete team.

As the Seminoles' head coach, she has led Florida State to six consecutive NCAA Championship Tournament appearances – a streak that brings the program's current school-record streak to 11 consecutive NCAA appearances entering the 2016-17 season.

With her student-athlete first approach, her love of the game of golf, her unbridled love for Florida State University and her ability to recruit top-level talent, Bond constantly works to take the Seminole women's golf program to a higher level. That higher level is in the classroom, her relationships with her players, and Florida State's success on the golf course have all allowed her program to become recognized as one of the top all-around programs in all of college golf.

The Seminole women's golf team is recognized as a star among stars as Florida State is annually celebrated as one of the top athletic programs in the nation. Florida State has finished in the top 25 in the Director's Cup in each of the last eight years.

In her six seasons at Florida State, the Seminoles have played in six NCAA Championship tournaments, produced the school's first two NCAA Regional Champions (Maria Salinas in 2012 and Matilda Castren in 2016), earned three All-American honors (Matilda Castren in 2014, Salinas in 2011 and 2013), earned nine All-ACC selections (Salinas in 2011 and 2012, Jessica Negron in 2013, Castren in 2014 and 2016, Alex Milan in 2014, Lydia Gumm in 2015 and Kim Metraux in 2016) and had 16 players earn All-ACC Academic honors.

As a player Bond earned a spot on the ACC's 50th Anniversary team; as an assistant coach she helped the Seminoles to three NCAA Tournament appearances.

Throughout her playing career at Florida State, she played as one of the Seminoles' top players (she was named Florida State's team MVP in 1997, 1998 and 1999), played with a number of touring professionals (including LPGA major winner and current Golf Channel analyst Karen Stupples) and has coached many of Florida State's recent greats including the only four-time golf All-American in school history (Caroline Westrup). While achieving success during her career as a player and a coach, Bond has never lost sight of her ultimate goal: the success and achievements of her student-athletes. In her 11 seasons as a Seminole coach (five as an as-



istant and six as the head coach), every student-athlete who has played golf at Florida State has earned her bachelor's degree and every one played on at least two NCAA Tournament teams during their careers. The Seminoles are among the NCAA leaders with a perfect APR rating during the first six seasons of Bond's head coaching tenure at Florida State.

### RETURNING HOME

Amy Bond joined the long and illustrious list of Florida State alumni who have returned to coach their alma mater when she was named the Seminoles' head coach on June 25, 2010. She returned to her Seminole roots after an outstanding playing career at Florida State (1995-99) during which she finished in 30th place in the 1999 NCAA Championship Finals and a five-year career as an assistant coach (2001-06) when she helped lead the Seminoles to the NCAA Championships three times. Bond is one of three Florida State University alumni who are current head coaches at their alma mater joining Jennifer Hyde (women's tennis) and Mike Martin (baseball).

### FIRST SIX YEARS AT FLORIDA STATE

Florida State head coach Amy Bond has guided each of her first six Seminole teams to the NCAA Tournament. Including her four years as a Seminole player (1996-99), her five years as a Seminole assistant coach (2002-06) and five as Florida State's head coach, Bond has participated in 13 of 15 NCAA Regional Championships while wearing the Garnet and Gold.

### OUTSTANDING SUCCESS IN 2016

Florida State finished the 2015-16 season ranked 19th nationally by Golfstat, 24th nationally by Golfweek, finished 15th nationally in the NCAA Division I Championship Finals, finished in second at the NCAA Division I Shoal Creek Regional, won team championships in the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic and the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up, finished in the top five of nine of its 13 matches, had two players earn NCAA Shoal Creek All-Region honors (Matilda Castren and Kim Metraux) and had two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Kim Metraux). Academically, the Seminoles had each member of its team named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll, saw four players named to the ACC All-Academic Women's Golf Team (Castren, Lydia Gumm, Kim and Morgane Metraux) and had two players (Kim and Morgane Metraux) named to the WGCA All-American Scholar Athlete team.

### 2014 WAS A SPECIAL SEASON AT FSU

Amy Bond led Florida State to its ninth consecutive NCAA Regional Championship, to the team championship at the Web.com/Marsh Landing Intercollegiate, had one player earn All-American honors (Matilda

Castren), and had two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Alex Milan) in 2014. In earning All-ACC honors, Castren established a school record for low stroke average in a single season with her 71.83 scoring mark. Florida State's team victory at the Web.com/Marsh Landing Intercollegiate was the first team championship by the Seminoles since the 2010 season when it won the Bryan National Collegiate championship.

### BOND AS A TOURNAMENT HOST

Bond's passion for growing the game of golf has increased her desire to plan and host large-scale tournaments at Florida State. She hosted the NCAA East Regional Championship in 2014, a 24-team event that showcased the best in women's collegiate golf for the first time in school history. Bond will play host to the fifth Annual Florida State Match-Up in February of 2017 as she continues to attract high level competition to the city of Tallahassee on an annual basis. Bond and the Seminoles will host the NCAA Tallahassee Regional in 2018.

### SUCCESS AT PRINCETON

Bond was successful in her first head coaching position at Princeton (2006-10) as she guided the Tigers to eight tournament victories and top four finishes in four Ivy League championship tournaments. The Tigers finished in second place in the Ivy league championship in 2007. Bond coached Susannah Aboff to consecutive Ivy League individual championships in 2008 and 2009. It marked only the third time in league history that a player had won consecutive individual conference championships. Aboff earned All-Ivy League honors three times during her career in becoming just the second player in school history to be named to the all-league team three times in her career. During her four seasons at Princeton, only the Tigers and Harvard performed consistently well in the conference championship by finishing in the top four of the team championship from 2007-10.

### RECRUITING SUCCESS AT FLORIDA STATE

During her first six seasons as the head coach at Florida State, she has continued the tradition of recruiting talented players and outstanding student-athletes to Tallahassee. Her list of top recruits includes Matilda Castren, who earned All-American Second Team Honors in 2014, and four players who have been named to the WGCA All-America Scholar Athlete team. Kim and Morgane Metraux, two of the top rising amateur players in the world, were also recruited by Bond to attend Florida State. In five years as an assistant coach at Florida State, Bond helped recruit four players who earned All-ACC honors a total of eight times and formed the nucleus of two top 20 ranked teams. The

### RECRUITING SUCCESS AT PRINCETON

During her four seasons at Princeton, Bond coached/recruited two players (Susannah Aboff and Kelly Shon) who qualified to play in at least one NCAA Regional Championship each and five players who earned All-Ivy League honors a total of 11 times. Aboff won eight individual tournament championships during her career and finished in a tie for 23rd place at the NCAA East Regional Championship in 2009 - the third highest NCAA regional finish in school history. Shon played in the 2011 and 2012 US Women's Open and was ranked No. 4 nationally among junior golfers at the time she was recruited. Shon earned All-American Honorable Mention Honors from the Women's Golf Coaches' Association in 2013, played in the 2013 NCAA East Regional Championship and the 2013 NCAA National Championship, was named the Ivy League Golfer of the Year and won Ivy League Championship in 2013.

### PROFESSIONAL PLAYERS

Bond has recruited and coached seven players who have played, or who are currently playing professional golf. She recruited and coached Kristin Tamulis (Florida State) who is currently playing on the LPGA Tour. She also recruited and coached four-time All-American Caroline Westrup (Florida State) who earned her LPGA Tour Card for the 2014 season (and who played in the 2013 U.S. Open), another who is playing on the LPGA Tour (Lacey Agnew), two who earned success on the Symetra Tour (Jaclyn Burch and Macarena Silva), one who is playing on the Symetra Tour (Alex Milan), one (Maria Salinas) on the European Tour and three players (Susannah Aboff, Marlowe Boukis and Michelle Grilli) who began their professional careers on the LPGA Symetra Tour.

### SEMINOLES AT THE 2013 U.S. WOMEN'S OPEN

Bond and the Seminoles were well represented at the 2013 U.S. Women's Open at Sebonack Golf Club with four of the top players in the history of the program - Karen Stupples, Kristin Tamulis, Macarena Silva and Caroline Westrup - all playing in the event. Prior to the event, Bond said of the one of the great fourfomes in program history: "This is a great week for each of the four players and for the Florida State women's golf program. To have four of our players in the U.S. Open in the same year is exciting and illustrates the rich tradition of our program. I am very happy for Karen, who I have known for so many years and for Kris, Maca and Caroline who I had the good fortune of coaching during their careers at Florida State. Playing in the U.S. Open is an awesome accomplishment for all of them and I couldn't be happier for them."

### BOND ON THE NATIONAL SCENE

Bond is the immediate past President of the Women's Golf Coaches Association; she served as the President of the organization from 2013-16. She has served in a number of positions on the national governing board after serving the organization as its treasurer beginning in 2008. Bond began on the WGCA Board as its treasurer (2008-12), served as its vice president (2012-13) and then as its President (2013-16). The WGCA was formed in 1983 as an organization to promote participation in women's collegiate golf. The vision of WGCA since its inception has been to encourage the playing of intercollegiate golf for women in correlation with a general objective of education and in accordance with the highest tradition of intercollegiate competition.

### ACADEMIC ACCOLADES

Academic success is the cornerstone of Florida State's program under Amy Bond. In 2016, every member (10) of the Seminole women's golf team was named to the ACC Honor Roll, four players were named to the All-ACC Academic team and two were named All-American Scholar Athletes by the WGCA. The women's golf team earned the highest grade point average (3.591) of the Seminoles' 20 athletics team in 2016. During Bond's first six seasons as Florida State's

head coach, the Seminoles have totaled 42 ACC Honor Roll selections, 20 players have been named to the All-ACC Academic team and six players have been named to the WGCA All-American Scholar team. The Seminoles' individual success has certainly translated into team success during Bond's head coaching tenure at Florida State. The Seminoles team was lauded by the NCAA for attaining a perfect multi-year Academic Performance Rate score of 1000 for the latest measuring period in 2014-15. The Florida State women's golf team has achieved a perfect APR in each of Bond's seasons as Florida State's head coach. Calculated over the four most recent years of data, the multi-year APR is a real-time measurement of eligibility and retention of student-athletes competing in every NCAA Division I sports team. Bond developed her academic achievement philosophy as a player at Florida State as she was named an Academic All-American in 1998 and 1999 and earned ACC Academic Honor Roll accolades three times during her playing career (1996, 98, 99). Bond's teams in both 2015 and 2016 were presented with the Golden Torch at Florida State's annual Black Tie student-athlete gala for the team with the highest GPA. Bond's 2015 team finished the 2015 spring semester with 12 players earning a 3.0 grade point average or higher. The women's golf team was the only team at Florida State to accomplish that feat during the spring 2015 academic semester. The Seminoles' earned a cumulative GPA of 3.591 during the 2015-16 fall and spring semesters.

### TOP 50 PLAYER IN ACC HISTORY

Bond was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference 50th Anniversary team in 2002 along with Seminole greats Karen Stupples and Louise Wright. Bond was a 1998 All-ACC selection and the Seminoles' top player from 1996-99. She earned 10 top-10 finishes during her career and was named the Seminoles' Most Valuable Player three times during her career. Bond competed in the NCAA Championship tournament in 1999 and played in three NCAA regional tournaments while finishing in the top 20 in four consecutive ACC Championship tournaments. She was an All Region selection in 1999 and was the medalist at the 1998 Ryder/Florida State Championship tournament.

### COMMUNITY SERVICE CHAMPIONS

The Seminoles women's golf team has won 13 of the last 15 Athletic Director's Cups for Service at Florida State's annual Golden Nole Banquet. The Athletic Director's Cup for Service is presented annually and is the most prestigious award given to the Seminole student-athletes. It goes to the team that contributes the most service hours to the community over the course of an entire year. The Seminoles won the Athletic Director's Cup for Service in each of Bond's five years as an assistant coach and in four of her first six seasons as the Seminoles' head coach.

### PERSONAL

An Ocala, Fla., native, Bond earned a bachelor's degree in sport management from Florida State in 1997 before earning her master's degree in sport administration from Florida State in 1999. Bond's twin brother, Tommy, is the Director of Athletics and head baseball coach at Trinity Catholic in Ocala, Fla. Tommy led Trinity Catholic to the 4A state championship in 2014.

# ASSISTANT MARY MICHAEL MAGGIO

ASSISTANT COACH



Mary Michael Maggio, who helped lead the Seminoles to the NCAA Championship Finals in 2016, is in her second season as an assistant coach at Florida State. During her first season in Tallahassee, she helped coach the Seminoles to a 15th place finish at the NCAA Championship Finals, a second place finish at the NCAA Shoal Creek Regional Championships and a pair of regular season team championships. Florida State's appearance in the NCAA Championship Finals was the Seminoles' first since 2010 and helped them finish the season ranked 16th nationally.

Florida State's golfers also earned a great deal of individual success with Maggio on the Seminoles' coaching staff during the 2015-16 fall and spring seasons. Matilda Castren finished as the co-champion of the NCAA Shoal Creek Regional, Castren and Kim Mettraux earned All-ACC honors and Florida State finished third in stroke average in the incredible competitive ACC. A pair of Seminoles – Matilda Castren (three individual wins) and Lydia Gumm (her first career individual win) – earned individual championships and Morgane Mettraux set the school record for best win and lowest school in an NCAA regional championship.

Maggio came to Florida State after one year as an assistant coach at Baylor (2014-15) and one season as an assistant coach at Houston (2013-14). She helped coach the Baylor women's golf team to a second place finish at the 2015 NCAA Championships.

Maggio helped coach Florida State to the fourth round of the 2016 NCAA Championship Finals as she helped the Seminoles to the cusp of match play to decide the national champion. The Seminoles qualified for the finals with a second place finish at the NCAA Shoal Creek Regional Championship – the highest regional finish in school history. Florida State's regional finish advanced it to the championship finals for the first time since 2010 and for the 10th time in school history.

Maggio is no stranger to success in the NCAA Championship Finals and she helped coach Baylor to within one hole of the NCAA Title in 2015.

She coached the Bears to a national runner-up finish at The Concession Golf Club in Bradenton, Fla., in May of 2015. The Bears fell to Stanford on the first extra hole of a playoff to finish second and earn Baylor's highest NCAA finish in the sport of women's golf.

Maggio began her coaching career at the University of Houston where she was an assistant coach during the inaugural season for the Cougar women's golf team during the 2013 and 2015 fall and spring seasons. She worked with head coach Gerrod Chadwell and flourished as a staff with only three golfers on their roster. With only three golfers, the Cougars were ineligible to compete as a team. Maggio helped coach sophomore Raegan Bremer to All-AAAC honors and an individual victory in the Houston Baptist University Husky Invitational during the spring of 2014.

Maggio forged a successful collegiate playing career at both LSU (2010 and 2011) and at Texas A&M (2012 and 2013). During her first two seasons at LSU, she helped lead the Tigers to the team championships at the 2009



NGCA Match Play and 2010 Mason Rudolph tournaments. During her two seasons at Texas A&M, Maggio won the 2012 Big 12 Championship, earned All Big 12 and All Big 12 Tournament honors in 2012 and was named to the 2013 SEC Academic Honor Roll. Individually she earned individual championships at the 2012 Big 12 Championship and the fall 2012 Liz Murphey Fall Preview.

Maggio enjoyed a stellar junior career before beginning her collegiate playing career. She earned All-American honors by the American Junior Golf Association and was ranked No. 9 nationally in the AJGA in 2009. Maggio was a two-time Arkansas state champion (2006 and 2007) and earned All-State honors in each of her four seasons on the girls' varsity golf team. In 42 high school matches she was a medalist 37 times and was the runner-up in the other five events.

Maggio earned her Bachelor's Degree in Agricultural Communications and Journalism from Texas A&M in 2013.

## MAGGIO AT FLORIDA STATE

Maggio helped Florida State finish the 2015-16 season ranked 19th nationally by Golfstat, 24th nationally by Golfweek, 15th nationally in the NCAA Division I Championship Finals, second at the NCAA Division I Shoal Creek Regional, win team championships at the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic and the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up, finish in the top five of nine of its 13 matches, have two players earn NCAA Shoal Creek All-Region honors (Matilda Castren and Kim Mettraux) and have two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Mettraux).

## MAGGIO AT BAYLOR

Maggio helped lead Baylor to a second place finish in the NCAA Championship Finals in her only season with the Bears in 2015. The Bears finished third in stroke play and missed winning a national championship in match play against Stanford by one stroke. Baylor won four events during the regular season as it captured the team championships at the Northrup Grumman Regional Challenge, the Texas San-Antonio Tri Match, the Big 12 tournament and the NCAA San Antonio Regional Championship. Maggio helped coach senior Hayley Davis to three individual championships and All-American First Team honors in 2015. Davis was the first All-American First Team selection in Baylor history. Davis and teammate Dylan Kim both earned All-American honors in 2015. Both Davis and Kim also earned All-Big 12 honors and Kim was named the 2015 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year.

## MAGGIO AT HOUSTON

Maggio joined the University of Houston Women's Golf program as a volunteer assistant coach in the summer of 2013. She was promoted to full-time assistant coach in February 2014. At Houston, Maggio worked under head coach Gerrod Chadwell. The coaching duo led the program through its inaugural season with only three

participating players, making the Cougars ineligible to compete as a team. However, Raegan Bremer won the individual title at the 2014 HBU Husky Invitational, and she went on to earn a pair of The American Golfer of the Week awards and was named to the All-American Athletic Conference Team. The trio of golfers combined to record 13 top-25 individual finishes in 26 events.

## SUCCESS AS A PLAYER AT LSU

Maggio began her career at LSU and completed her career as an All-Big 12 selection at Texas A&M. She averaged 75.40 strokes in 14 events during her career at LSU (2009 and 2010). Maggio helped lead the Tigers to the team championship at the fall 2010 Mason Rudolph Championship and earned her best finish as a Tiger – tied for eighth – at the fall 2009 NGCA Match Play Championship. At the Match Play Championship, she finished in a tie for eighth in stroke play and was undefeated, 3-0, in match-play.

## SUCCESS AS A PLAYER AT TEXAS A&M

Maggio transferred to Texas A&M for her junior and senior seasons and flourished as a golfer in College Station. She was a two-time All-Big 12, a two-time All-Big 12 Tournament team selection and was named the Big 12 Golfer of the Month in April of her junior season. She was named the National Golfer of the Week by GolfWeek in October of 2012. Maggio averaged 74.86 strokes in 18 career events as an Aggie including a single-season career low 74.85 strokes per round as a junior. She won the Big 12 championship, earned All-Big 12 honors and was named to the All Big 12 Tournament teams as a senior in 2013. She helped Texas A&M advance to the NCAA Championship Finals during her junior season and the NCAA Regional Championships in both her junior and senior seasons. The Aggies finished in a tie for 16th place at the 2012 NCAA Championship Finals. Maggio won the individual championship at the 2012 Big 12 Tournament and won the individual title at the Liz Murphey Fall preview during the 2012-13 season.

## COMMITTED TO ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Maggio earned her bachelor's degree in agricultural communications and journalism and was named to the 2013 SEC Academic Honor Roll. During her first season at Florida State, all 10 members of the Seminole women's golf team were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll while four members of the team were named to the ACC All-Academic Women's Golf team and two were named to the WGCA All-American Scholar Athlete team.

## STANDOUT JUNIOR GOLF CAREER

Maggio enjoyed a standout junior golf career and is still considered to be one of the top high players in the history of the state of Arkansas. She was named the 2004, 2005 and 2006 AWGA Player of the Year, was the state junior match play champion (2005, 2006) and the state junior stroke champion (2004, 2005). Maggio won the 2007 Valero Texas Open Championship and the 2008 Bubba Conlee event as she earned nine top 10 finishes and five top five finishes in AJGA events. She was a four-time qualifier for U.S. Girls' Junior Open championship.



# ASSISTANT COACH ROBERT DUCK

ASSISTANT COACH



Robert Duck, whose tenure as an assistant coach with both the Seminole men's and women's golf teams has coincided with the greatest period of growth in the history of the two programs, is in his sixth season at Florida State. Under Ducks' tutelage, both Seminole teams have become perennial leaders in national rankings and course statistics as well as in the production of All-Americans and All-ACC performers, as he has helped raise the profiles of both programs to the levels necessary to compete as top collegiate programs on an annual basis.

Duck plays an integral role in the successes of both programs including the men's national ranking of No. 1 and the women's national finish of 15th during the 2016 season. Duck has helped coach both programs into the NCAA Tournament in each of his first five years while working with All-Americans and All-ACC honorees on both teams.

In his first five seasons at Florida State, the men have produced seven All-Americans, 12 All-ACC selections, two ACC Golfers of the Year (Brooks Koepka in 2012 and Hank Lebioda in 2016) and two ACC Freshmen of the Year while the women have produced two All-Americans and seven All-ACC performers.

During each of his five seasons, the Seminole men and the Seminole women have appeared in the NCAA Tournament five times each with the men finishing in ninth in the team standings in the 2012 NCAA Championship finals and 11th in the 2015 NCAA Championship finals and the women finishing in 15th at the 2016 NCAA Championship Finals. The men have finished in second (twice) and third once and the women have finished third once and have earned two fourth place finishes in their respective ACC Championships.

Duck's work with Florida State's players has led to incredible individual success in his first five seasons in Tallahassee. His teaching abilities and coaching philosophies have helped accelerate the careers of two of the top men's players in school history – Brooks Koepka and Daniel Berger – as well as four of the top performers on the women's team – Matilda Castren, Lydia Gumm, Maria Salinas and Jessica Negron. Koepka was named the ACC Golfer of the Year in 2012 and was a three-time All-ACC selection while Berger earned All-ACC honors and played for the United States' Palmer Cup team in 2013. Duck also worked with Seminole All-America Hank Lebioda – who earned All-America honors in 2015 and 2016, was the 2013 ACC Freshman of the Year, a four-time All-ACC selection and was a member of the 2014 United States Palmer Cup Team. Castren earned All-American honors in 2014, is a two-time All-ACC honoree and holds the record for lowest stroke average in school history. Gumm was an All-ACC selection in 2015, Salinas finished in a tie for first in the NCAA Central Regional and earned All-America honors in 2012 and Negron earned All-ACC honors in 2013.

Duck has helped coach the Florida State men to 13 tournament championships in his first five seasons in Tallahassee. The Seminoles won four consecutive tournaments, earned six overall team championships and were the No. 1 overall seed in the NCAA Golf Championships in 2015. Duck helped the Seminole women win three team championships and finish in second place at



the 2016 NCAA Shoal Creek Regional.

The Seminoles – both the men and the women – have been ranked among the nation's top 30 teams throughout his first four seasons at Florida State. The men were ranked as high as No. 1 in 2015 while the women were ranked as high as No. 16 in 2016.

### COACHING EXPERIENCE

Duck is one of the rising stars in collegiate coaching. He was the acting head coach at Augusta State in 2002, served the Jaguars as a volunteer assistant coach during the 2001-02 season and was an assistant coach for the program during the 2002-03 season. During his tenure as the acting coach at Augusta State, the Jaguars were ranked as high as No. 9 nationally.

### COLLEGIATE PLAYING EXPERIENCE

Duck enjoyed a standout career at Augusta State (1998-01) where he earned All-America honors as a sophomore (1999) and led the Jaguars to three NCAA Championship appearances (1998, 1999, 2001). He is one of the top golfers in the storied history of the Augusta State program and remains listed prominently in the record book 15 years after his playing career ended. Duck is ranked second in school history for lowest stroke average by a freshman (73.22) (which stood as the school record for nearly 15 years). It is an average that still ranks in the top 15 in school history. His career stroke average of 73.86 is ranked 14th in school history. During his career he earned 12 top-10 and 28 top-20 individual finishes.

### COLLEGIATE COACHING EXPERIENCE

Duck's ability to communicate with the players he coaches is illustrated by the success those players have earned on the golf course. In his first five seasons at Florida State he has worked with 10 All-Americans, 19 All-ACC honorees, two ACC Golfers of the Year and three ACC Freshmen of the Year. Each of the ten teams (five men's and five women's) he has helped coach at Florida State has played in the NCAA Tournament and both teams have been ranked in the nation's top 20 during the first five years of his tenure in Tallahassee.

### 2016 WAS A SPECIAL YEAR FOR THE SEMINOLES

Duck helped the Seminole women finish the 2015-16 season ranked 19th nationally by Golfstat, 24th nationally by Golfweek, finish 15th nationally in the NCAA Division I Championship Finals, finish second at the NCAA Division I Shoal Creek Regional, win team championships at the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic and the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up, finish in the top five of nine of its 13 matches, have two players earn NCAA Shoal Creek

All-Region honors (Matilda Castren and Kim Metraux) and have two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Metraux).

### 2015 WAS A GREAT YEAR

Duck helped the Seminole men's golf team to the best season in program history in 2015. The Seminoles finished 11th in the final standings at the NCAA Men's Golf Championships, finished in second place in the ACC Championships, earned a program-best national ranking of No. 1 during the season, were the No. 1 seed in the NCAA men's Golf Championship tournament, had three players earn All-American honors.

### ON COURSE COACHING

Because he has played and coached at such high levels, Duck is known as a players' coach. His ability to help each student-athlete create long-term training schedules and encourage them to work towards those goals on a daily basis has helped create a teaching environment that has fostered the recent successes of both the Seminoles' men's and women's programs.

### NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY AS A PLAYER

Duck led Augusta State (now Georgia Regents University) to three NCAA Championship tournament appearances and helped the Jaguars to a seventh place finish as a senior. The seventh place finish was the best in program history at the time. With the foundation put in place by Duck and his teammates, the Jaguars won the NCAA Titles in 2010 and 2011.

### SUCCESS IN PROFESSIONAL WORLD

Duck enjoyed a successful career as a manager of professional golfers for the Hambric Sports Group (2003-2012) before accepting his current assistant coaching position at Florida State. Based in London, Duck was the supervisor of the European Division of Hambric Stellar Golf. He was a player manager who oversaw public relations and marketing for seven clients including 1988 Masters champion Sandy Lyle, 2005 European Tour Rookie of the Year Gonzalo Fernandez-Castano, former Augusta State All-American Oliver Wilson and Francesco Molinari.

### PERSONAL

Duck is married to the former Michelle Digsby. The couple has two daughters, Annabel (nine) and Hannah (six). He earned his Bachelor's Degree in Marketing from Augusta State in 2001. A native of Northampton, England, he represented Great Britain-Ireland as a member of the 1998 Palmer Cup team. Duck played in the 1997 European Amateur Championship and finished tied as the runner-up with Sergio Garcia and Luke Donald.



# DIRECTOR OF GOLF TREY JONES

## ONE OF THE NATION'S TOP COLLEGIATE COACHES



Top national finishes, All-Americans, professional success and academic achievement have become synonymous with the Florida State men's golf program under Trey Jones. Now in his 14th season as the head men's coach and Director of Golf for the Seminoles' men's and women's golf programs, Jones has lifted the sport of golf at Florida State to new heights.

Under his direction, there is no limit on how high the Seminole programs will go. Florida State Golf will remain in excellent hands in the foreseeable future, as Director of Athletics Stan Wilcox announced on June 5, 2015, that he extended Jones' contract through the 2020 season.

Jones is responsible for attracting nationally ranked recruiting classes, upgrading the Seminoles' schedule to where it is ranked among the nation's toughest on an annual basis and creating one of the most functional player development facilities in all of college golf on one of the Seminoles' five home golf courses. Jones continues annually to build on the Seminoles' success in developing the nation's top talent into national contenders and collegiate golf's elite players.

The top-notch head coach helped FSU Men's Golf achieve more milestones in 2016. For the fifth consecutive year, the Seminoles made the NCAA Tournament – the longest active streak in the ACC and tied for the sixth-longest nationally. Senior Hank Lebioda became the third Seminole to win ACC Player of the Year honors, while redshirt junior Cristobal Del Solar's career year put him on the All-ACC Team and PING Southeast All-Region Team alongside Lebioda. Senior leader Lebioda was also a PING All-American.

FSU's two All-ACC selections in 2016 makes it 10 straight years the Seminoles have garnered multiple all-conference selections. Heading into the 2016-17 season, FSU has finished in the Top five in 51 of its last 72 tournaments played, equating to an impressive 70.8 percent.

Jones guided Florida State to its most successful season in program history in 2015, earning ACC Coach of the Year honors for the second time. FSU ranked No. 1 in the Golf Coaches Association of America Poll for most of the season and entered the NCAA Tournament as the No. 1 overall seed for the first time ever. The Noles set a school record with six tournament victories and established three All-Americans in Jack Maguire (First Team), Hank Lebioda (Second Team) and Rowin Caron (Third Team) - the most in a single year.

Named the 2008 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year as he led the Seminoles to the first conference championship in the sport of golf in school history, Jones is no stranger to competing with the nation's best in one of the top conferences for college golf.

Building championship teams and elevating those teams onto the national stage is nothing new to Jones, who has earned five conference coach of the year awards and led 15 of his 20 teams at the Division I level to the NCAA Championship tournament. His teams consistently hold prominent places in the national rankings, are adept at winning conference championships and are annually among the top producers of All-American and all-conference performers.

Jones has become one of the winningest coaches in school history in his first 13 years in Florida State. He is the only coach in school history to lead the Seminoles to 11 NCAA Tournament appearances (no other coach has led Florida



State to more than five appearances) and he is ranked first in school history with 20 tournament championships (second is nine by Don Veller). The Seminoles have appeared in a school record 11 consecutive NCAA Tournaments entering the 2016-17 season.

### 2015 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

A prominent season was capped by an 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championship Finals, as the Seminoles fell just short of reaching the top eight by the final round. Individually, Jack Maguire finished 22nd overall while Del Solar ended at 35th. Maguire would earn first-team All-America honors from Golfweek and second-team honors from the GCAA, while Lebioda earned second-team All-America honors from both organizations. Rowin Caron highlighted his junior season as a third-team Golfweek All-American while getting honorable mention accolades from the GCAA. FSU enjoyed a dominant stretch of winning four consecutive tournaments, and also won four tournaments by coming from behind on the final day.

### 2014 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State once again returned to the NCAA Championship Finals, but it was with a much different looking team from the previous year. The Seminoles fielded the youngest team in the tournament with two freshmen, two sophomores and a senior and was one of only three schools (in a field of 30), with only one upperclassman in the line-up. Freshman Jack Maguire became the first freshman to be ever named an All-American at Florida State as he was named to the second team by Golfweek and to the third team but the GCAA. Maguire and sophomore Hank Lebioda were named to the All-ACC team and Maguire was tabbed the ACC Freshman of the Year. The Seminoles smashed apart the record book at the USF Invitational as the team posted the lowest round (24-under 264) and lowest three-round tournament score (41-under 823) in school history. Maguire created his mark with the lowest round in school history (10-under 62) and second lowest tournament score (16-under 200).

### 2013 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State finished in 11th place at the 2013 NCAA Championship Finals at the Capital City Club Crabapple in Atlanta, Ga. The Seminoles are just one of two teams to finish in the top 11 of the NAAs in three or the last four years. Sophomore Daniel Berger led the team at the Championships finishing tied for second with a 6-under 204. Both Berger and Chase Seiffert earned All-American status for the year as Lebioda was named 2013 ACC Freshman of the Year.

### 2012 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State earned an eighth place national finish at the 2012 NCAA Championship Finals to mark the second time in three seasons the Seminoles finished in the top eight of the standings at the national tournament. The Seminoles entered the championship ranked No. 19 in the nation by GolfStat and finished as one of only two teams ranked outside of the top eight to finish in the top eight of the final standings.

### 2010 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State finished in a tie for third place at the 2010 NCAA Championship Finals to earn the best national finish in school history. The Seminoles fell to Augusta State (the 2010 National Champion) in the semifinals of the championship tournament after defeating Texas Tech in the first round of match play. The Seminoles led the stroke play portion of the tournament and finished in second place to earn the No. 2 seed in the match play portion of the event. The third place finish at the NCAA Championship marked the best finish in school history - one better than the Seminoles fourth place national finish in 1957 and tied for fourth place finish in 1958.

### 2008 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

Florida State, which was led by All-Americans Jonas Blixt and Matt Savage, won its first ever Atlantic Coast Conference championship as it defeated Duke by three strokes at the 2008 ACC Championship at the Old North State Club at Uwharrie Point. The Seminoles defeated Duke as they rallied from a one stroke deficit after two rounds to claim the school's first ever ACC championship in the sport of golf. Each of the five team members contributed to the victory as the Seminoles closed the 54-hole tournament with four players under par. Blixt and Savage led the way with eight-under par 208 scores as they both finished in a tie for third in the individual standings.

### RECRUITING

Known as one of the nation's most dynamic recruiters, Jones is nationally recognized as one of the top talent scouts in all of collegiate golf. His ability to recruit talented players, which in turn helps him build solid teams, is one of the aspects of coaching that has made Jones a top Division I coach. Florida State's recruiting class ranked fourth best in the nation in 2007, fifth best in 2008, sixth best in 2005 and among the nation's top 15 in 2006, 2010 and 2012.

### HANK LEBIODA

Hank Lebioda, who played at FSU from 2012-16, will go down as one of the top golfers in school history. The four-year letterwinner leaves FSU as the program's career leader in par or better rounds (76), percentage of counting scores (93.4 percent) and birdies (467). The Winter Springs, Fla., native was the 2016 ACC Player of the Year, a four-time All-ACC Team member, a two-time All-America and a two-time ACC Player of the Month. Having an FSU legacy in his family, Lebioda embodied the true meaning of being a Seminole and has an excellent chance of succeeding on the pro tour.

### BROOKS KOEPKA

Jones coached Brooks Koepka – the school record holder for lowest stroke average in a single season (71.09) and for a career (71.85) – the ACC Golfer of the Year in 2010 and 2012 and a three-time All-ACC selection. Koepka was named the ACC Golfer of the Year twice, the ACC Rookie of the Year

in 2009 and earned All-American twice in his career in leading the Seminoles to four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and two top-10 NCAA Championship Finals finishes. As a senior, Koepka tied the school record with a nine under par score of 63 in the third round of the FAU Spring Break Invitational and set the school record with his 199 total for three rounds of the event. Koepka won three events as a senior – at the Brickyard Collegiate Championship, the Seminole Intercollegiate, the FAU Spring Break Invitational. Koepka secured his status on the PGA Tour by tying for fourth place in the 2014 U.S. Open, and finished the 2015 season with Top 10 major finishes at The Open Championship (T-10th) and the PGA Championship (T-5th). He won his first tournament at the 2015 Waste Management Phoenix Open.

### DANIEL BERGER

Under Jones' tutelage, Daniel Berger secured All-America status in 2013 by earning first-team honors from the GCAA and Golfweek. Berger's 69.79 average score in the 2012-13 year makes him the only Seminole to shot sub-70 in a season, an average score that led the country. He finished as an All-ACC selection in the same spectacular year, and joins former teammate Koepka as two of the best young players on the PGA Tour. Berger was honored as the 2014-15 PGA Tour Player of the Year, and won his first tournament at the 2016 FedEx St. Jude Classic.

### JONAS BLIXT

Jones coached one of Florida State's all-time best players - Jonas Blixt - to All-America honors and the first individual ACC Championship in school history. Blixt earned Ping/Division I All-American First Team honors in 2008 and Ping/Division I All-American second team honors in 2007. He is one of only three players in school history to earn All-American First and Second Team honors during his career. Blixt won the ACC individual championship in 2007 to become the first Seminole to win ACC medalist honors. He helped lead Florida State to the 2008 ACC Championship - the first ACC golf championship in school history - and earned All-ACC honors twice during his career. Blixt is currently playing on the PGA Tour with two wins, the 2012 Frys.com Open and 2013 Greenbrier Classic. He finished tied for second in the 2014 Masters Tournament and fourth in the 2013 PGA Championship.

### DREW KITTLESON

Jones also coached Drew Kittleson, who will long be remembered as one of the top golfers in school history. Kittleson played in the Masters Championship at Augusta in 2009, the U.S. Open at Bethpage Black in 2009, four NCAA Championships and four ACC Championships during his standout career as a Seminole. He earned All-American Honorable Mention honors from Ping/Golf Coaches' Association of America in 2010 and Southeast Regional All-American honors in 2011. Kittleson helped lead Florida State to the

2008 ACC Championship - the first ACC golf championship in school history and to a third place finish at the NCAA Division I Championship finals in 2010 - the highest national finish in school history. After a second place finish at the 2009 U.S. Amateur, he earned exemptions to play in both the 2009 Masters and U.S. Open Championships. Kittleson is currently playing on the Web.com Tour.

### ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Committed to the academic and athletic success of his student-athletes, Jones has coached 33 members of the ACC Academic Honor Roll, seven members of the ACC Academic Golf Team and three members of the Golf Coaches' Association of America All-American Scholar team. His team was also nationally recognized in 2010 as one of the few schools in the NCAA to achieve a perfect APR score of 1000 since the inception of the Academic Progress Rate program in 2003. During his tenure at Georgia State, he coached 10 members of the Atlantic Sun All-Academic team and 20 members of the TAAC All-Academic team.

### JONES NATIONALLY

Jones has been an active member of the Golf Coaches Association of America since 1993. He is currently a member of the steering committee for the Collegiate Golf Hall of Fame. Jones served the board as the Division I Director for the East Region and served as the chair of the District 3 South Regional NCAA Selection Committee. He was also a representative in the District 3 South NCAA Selection Committee from 1999-2002.

### GEORGIA STATE

Trey Jones was named the head coach at Georgia State in 1995 and immediately began to assemble one of the dominant men's golf programs in the southeastern United States. He led the Panthers onto the national scene for the first time in school history including their first appearance in the NCAA Championship tournament (2003), first conference championship (1998, Trans America Athletic Conference) and highest national ranking (20th during the 2000 season). Jones was responsible for the program in its entirety including recruiting, coaching, fundraising, public relations, strength and conditioning, scheduling and all budgetary matters. Under Jones' leadership, Georgia State amassed 91 wins over SEC teams and 33 wins over ACC opponents from 1997-2003. During that period, the Panthers earned 23 victories over top 25 opponents.

### PERSONAL

Jones is married to the former Cathy McVeigh, who is the coordinator of financial aid for student-athletes at Florida State. They are the proud parents of a daughter, Jordan (14) and a son, Drew (10). Jones earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education with a minor in business administration from North Alabama in 1991.

**On Jones:** A member of Florida State's lineup at the 2016 NCAA Championship Finals...has played in 21 of 24 events in the first two seasons of her career and has been in the Seminoles' lineup in 19 of her 20 career events...averaging a career-low 74.91 strokes as a sophomore...played in 12 of the Seminoles' 13 events including the 2016 NCAA Championship Finals as a sophomore...finished in a tie for first place at the fall 2014 season opening Mo Morial Invitational - her first career event... Jones was joined by only Duke freshman Leona McGuire - who won three events - as the only newcomers in the ACC with individual wins in 2014-15...the first freshman in school history to win her first career event as she finished in a tie for first place in the Mo Morial Invitational at Texas A&M University...in earning co-medalist honors at the 2014 Mo Morial Invitational Jones finished with her career-best score of 209 for the three round tournament...her score is tied for the seventh best tournament score in school history and is the best three-round score by a freshman in school history in her first career event...set personal-best for a single round score (67) in the second round of the fall 2015 Schooner Fall Classic and in the first round of the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic...her best 36-hole scores (139) came in the first two rounds of the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic as she helped lead the Seminoles to the team championship in the event...her best tournament score (209) came at the fall 2014 Mo Morial Invitational where she won the first individual championship of her career...named to the Rolex Junior Honorable Mention All-American honors in 2013...one of 48 girls named to the Rolex All-America team which recognizes the world's premier junior golfers...played in a qualifying round for the U.S. Women's Open at age 14...the No. 36 ranked junior golfer in the nation during her senior season of high school...named to the 2015 All-ACC Academic Women's Golf team...named to the 2015 All-American Scholar Athlete team by the Women's Golf Coaches Association...named to the 2015 and 2016 ACC Academic Honor Roll...earned Academic Dean's List Honors at Florida State during the fall of



2014 and the spring of 2015...averages 74.95 strokes in 61 rounds during 21 tournaments entering her junior season.

## SEMINOLES PLAY IN SCHOOL RECORD 11TH CONSECUTIVE NCAA REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP



**FLORIDA STATE PLAYS IN SCHOOL RECORD 12TH NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT**  
 Florida State finished the 2015-16 season ranked 19th nationally by Golfstat and 24th nationally by Golfweek. They finished 15th nationally in the NCAA Division I Championship Finals and finished in second at the NCAA Division I Shoal Creek Regional after finishing ninth at the 2016 ACC Championships. The Seminoles won team championships at the fall 2015 Jacksonville Classic and the spring 2016 Florida State Match-Up, finished in the top five of nine of its 13 matches, had two players earn NCAA Shoal Creek All-Region honors (Matilda Castren and Kim Metraux) and had two players earn All-ACC honors (Castren and Metraux).

**FLORIDA STATE IN THE NATIONAL RANKINGS**  
 Florida State finished the 2015-16 season ranked 19th nationally by Golfstat and 24th by GolfWeek. The Seminoles' national ranking of 16th heading into the NCAA Division I Championship Finals on May 22 was their highest of the 2015-16 season.

**SEMINOLES IN THE INDIVIDUAL**  
 Florida State finished the 2015-16 season with two players -- No. 56 Matilda Castren and No. 95 Kim Metraux -- ranked in the top 100 players in the final Golfstat Cup Rankings.

**FLORIDA STATE IN THE 2016 NCAA DIVISION I CHAMPIONSHIP FINALS**  
 Sophomore Morgan Metraux finished in a tie for 20th place in the individual standings and the Seminole women's golf team finished in 15th place in the team standings at the 2016 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championships at the Eugene Country Club. The Seminoles finished within the top 15 in the first three rounds of stroke play, played in the knockout round and competed in the fourth round of the event. The University of Washington won the national championship with a match-play victory over Stanford. (2002-06).

**FLORIDA STATE IN THE 2016 NCAA SHOAL CREEK REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP**  
 The Florida State women's golf team finished in second place in the team standings and Matilda Castren finished in a tie for first in the individual standings at the 2016 NCAA Shoal Creek Regional Championship. Florida State's second place finish marked

the highest regional championship finish in school history and allowed the Seminoles to qualify for the 2016 NCAA Division Women's Golf Championship finals for the ninth time in school history and for the first time since 2010. Castren's individual championship is only the second individual regional championship in school history. Maria Salinas also finished in a tie for the individual title at the 2012 NCAA Central Regional Championship.

**CASTREN AND KIM METRAUX EARN HONORS**  
 Florida State junior Matilda Castren and sophomore Kim Metraux were named to the 2016 All-ACC Women's Golf team in a vote of the league's 12 head coaches. It marks second time Castren has earned the honor, the first time Metraux has earned all-conference honors and the 16th consecutive year at least one Seminole has been named to the All-ACC team. Florida State (two selections) and Duke (four selections) were the only two teams in the league who had multiple selections to the All-ACC team and were one of eight teams who had at least one player named to the 12-member team.

 Florida State was one of a record 10 ACC teams that earned the chance to play for the NCAA Women's Golf Championship. They finished the 2015-16 season ranked third in the ACC in stroke average (293.8 in 36 rounds), carded the lowest single round team score of the year among the 12 ACC teams (274/-14)

**SEMINOLES PLAY IN A RECORD 13 MATCHES**

 Florida State head coach Amy Bond has guided each of her first six teams into the NCAA Tournament. Including her four years as a Seminole player (1996-99) and her six years as a Seminole assistant coach (2002-06), Bond has participated in 14 of 16 NCAA Regional Championships while wearing the Garnet and Gold. The Seminoles made their first appearance in the 2016 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship finals under Bond.

... The Seminoles have finished in the top five of 17 of their last 24 matches dating to a second place finish at the fall 2014 season opening Mo Morial Invitational; ... The Seminoles have earned nine top-five team finishes during the fall 2015 and spring 2016 seasons. It's the most top five team finishes since Florida State's 1991 NCAA Championship Finals participant team also earned nine top five finishes. The school record for top five team finishes in a single season is 11 by Florida State's 1981 AIAW National Championship team.

Florida State finished in 15th place at the 2016 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championships – the sixth best national championship finals finish in school history. **FLORIDA STATE WITH STRONG INDIVIDUAL HISTORY**

Sophomore Morgane Metraux carded a 1-under par score of 71 in the fourth and final round of the 2016 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championships and finished in a tie for 20th place in the individual standings with a total of 289. She carded scores of 70-72-76-71 and a 1-over par total of 289 for the championship. Her 289 gross score is the best NCAA finals score in school history and her tied for 20th place finish in the individual standings is the tied for the best in school history in an NCAA Championships finals event. Metraux became the first player in school history to card three or more scores at par or better in an NCAA Championship finals event. Maria Salinas also finished in 20th place at the 2010 Division I Championships at the Country Club of Landfall in Wilmington, N.C.

**FLORIDA STATE WITH NINE TOP FIVE TEAM FINISHES**

Florida State earned nine top five team finishes and finished outside of the top nine in only one of its 13 events during the fall 2015 and spring 2016 seasons. The Seminoles finished first in two events (the Jacksonville Classic and the Florida State Match-Up), second in five more events (Jim West Challenge, Cardinal Cup, Florida Challenge, Gator Women's Invitational and the NCAA Shoal Creek Regional Championship) third in one event (Bryan National Collegiate) and tied for fifth in one event (Briar's Creek Invitational).

# 1981 AIAW NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

With two players finishing in the top 15 of the individual standings, the 1981 Florida State Women's golf team won the AIAW National Championship. The Seminoles, led by coach Verlyn Giles, finished in the top four of all ten regular season tournaments in which they participated. The team won the Lady Gator Invitational, the Lady Paladin Invitational, the Dick McGuire Invitational and the South Florida Invitational in Tampa, Fla. They also finished with one second place finish, four third place finishes, and one fourth place finish.

After the first two rounds of the four-day tournament Florida State found itself down by eight strokes – behind the host school, Georgia, and defending national champion Tulsa. The Seminoles shot a tournament-best 298 in the third round and took over the lead from Georgia. The Seminoles finished strong in the fourth and final round outlasting Georgia on the last hole to win the tournament by three strokes.

Seminole junior Lisa Young, who won three LPGA events later in her career, finished in third place in the individual standings – only one shot behind the champions. Florida State's Barb Bunkowsky finished in a tie for 14th. Jane Geddes, the 1986 U.S. Women's Open and 1987 LPGA Championship winner, finished tied for 31st. Michele Guibault finished 57th and Marla Anderson finished in a tie for 73rd.

Young and Guibault earned All-America First Team honors while Bunkowsky were honored with All-American Second Team honors. Four of the six members of the Florida State Athletics Hall of Fame were on the Seminoles' National Championship team including Young, Bunkowsky, Guibault and Geddes.



# COMMUNITY SERVICE / OK KIDS KORRAL

When Tricia Covell, the wife of country music mega-star Toby Keith, came up with the idea of starting a golf tournament to raise funds for the OK Kids Korral for pediatric cancer patients, they brought 12 invitations to the Women's Golf Coaches Association's annual conference in 2012. When one of those 12 invitations was presented to Seminole head coach Amy Bond, she knew she had hit the jackpot.

"I was so excited for our program to have been chosen as one of the schools to play in the inaugural Schooner Fall Classic in 2013," said Bond. "It is truly an honor to play in this event; one that I and the members of my team look forward to each season. The tournament has developed into one of the top events in women's college golf but, truthfully, it's about so much more than three great days on the golf course."

The Toby Keith Foundation was started in 2006 and supports the OK Kids Korral – a 25,000 square foot facility in Oklahoma City. The Korral is dedicated exclusively to serving the needs of pediatric cancer patients. This cost-free home away from home facility has 16 guest suites, a gourmet kitchen, playground and an indoor theatre.





# COMMUNITY SERVICE / DIRECTORS CUP

The Florida State University women's golf team has won the prestigious Athletic Director's Cup for Community Service in 13 of the last 15 years. The award is presented each year at the Golden 'Nole Banquet - one of the most important banquets of the year for all of Florida State's student athletes.

The Athletic Director's Cup for Service began during the 1996-1997 academic year in order to promote community service participation among all teams. The annual award recognizes the thousands of hours of community service Florida State student-athletes donate each year. Seminole student-athletes logged more than 6,100 community service hours in 2016.

"Community service is very important to my teammates and me," said senior Sherrell Buckley. "We make it a point to give back to the community any time we have the chance. We are so very fortunate to be able to be student-athletes at Florida State and play the sport we love as Seminoles. With this privilege comes the responsibility to help others. We have the chance to help influence young lives in our community and we like to take advantage of every opportunity we have to help other."

During the 2015-16 school year, the women's golf team combined for 287 total hours of community service for an average of over 26.0 hours per team member.

"Giving back to the community of one of the most rewarding things we do as a team," said head coach Amy Bond. "We are very blessed to be members of the Florida State community and everyone is very supportive of us. It's nice to have the opportunity to spend time with others and raise funds for special causes. The best thing about serving our community is being in the community and encouraging togetherness."

The women's golf team annually participates in the Tee Off for Tots Tournament presented by the Tallahassee Memorial Hospital Healthcare Foundation. The Seminoles help raise charitable gifts and sponsorships that positively influence the medical outcomes of thousands of thousands of infants, children and their families. The annual event is held at Golden Eagle Country Club in Tallahassee and is in its 23rd year of raising money for those families in need of support for young children.





# ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 64th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 146 national championships, including 74 in women's competition and 72 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 163 times in men's competition and 129 times in women's action.

In the sport of women's golf, Duke is second in all-time NCAA championships with its five titles (1999, 2002, 2005, 2006 and 2007), only trailing Arizona State's seven. Miami claimed one NCAA national title in 1984, before joining the ACC. Duke is third in NCAA individual champions, claiming three national medalists - Candy Hannemann (2001), Virada Nirapathpongporn (2002), Anna Grzebien (2005) and Virginia Elena Carta (2016).

The ACC currently has 12 teams competing in women's golf with the newest additions being Miami, (2004), Boston College, (2005) and Notre Dame (2013).

The conference recognized women's golf as a conference sport in 1984-1986 when a minimum of four teams (Duke, North Carolina, NC State and Wake Forest) competed. After a five-year hiatus, women's golf became a sponsored sport once again in 1992 with Duke, Florida State, North Carolina and Wake Forest competing. Maryland joined the ranks during the 2000 season, while NC State joined the following year (2001).

Duke has won 19 ACC championships, followed by Wake Forest (five) and Virginia (two) and North Carolina (one). Duke leads the schools in ACC individual championships with 14, followed by Wake Forest (six), Virginia (two) and North Carolina (two). Virginia held off Wake Forest in the final round of the 2016 ACC Championship to repeat as conference champion.

An ACC-record 10 women's golf teams (Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Louisville, Miami, Notre Dame, North Carolina, NC State, Virginia and Wake Forest) were represented at the NCAA Regionals in 2016.

The 10 schools that will carry the ACC banner this season have produced 78 first or second team All-Americans, five National Player of the Years, four NGCA Division I Player of the Years, three national Freshman of the Years, and six National Coach of the Years.


